

Manslaughter Charges Are Dropped On 2

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — An involuntary manslaughter charge against two Utah State University students in connection with the March 2 death of a Wyoming girl has been dismissed on the grounds of "insufficient evidence."

Logan City Court Judge Zachary Champin said a preliminary hearing scheduled for May 11 for Michael John Wick, 26, Portland, and Keith Brent Reid, 22, Alhambra, Utah, would not be held.

The two were charged in a complaint by Logan Police Capt. Ray James alleging that they were responsible for allowing Connie Carol Cornelison, Evansville, to drink methyl alcohol mixed in punch during a party Feb. 27.

Wick and Reid told Jones they had obtained the alcohol from a stranger without realizing its "cheap quality."

Cache County attorney Barton Harris said Wednesday that "there is not enough evidence to suggest that the men realized they were using methyl alcohol."

Cancer Can Be Induced In Canines

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Cancer can be induced in dogs by training them to smoke cigarettes, and the rate of growth parallels that of cancer in humans, says a researcher.

Dr. Oscar Auerbach, chief of the department of his research "biological evidence" that cigarette smoking causes cancer.

The tobacco industry maintains that only statistical, rather than pathological, proof has been offered linking cigarettes to cancer.

Auerbach, senior medical investigator at the Veterans Administration hospital at East Orange, N.J., told at his findings Wednesday at the American Cancer Society's 1967 scientific meeting.

"It shows without question that cigarette smoking in dogs produces exactly the same changes as in humans," Auerbach said.

In his 18-month study he used 10 beagles as control and 10 beagles that he taught to smoke up to 12 cigarettes a day.

He performed a tracheotomy and attached to each dog's trachea a connector to a smoking machine outside its pen. After the first day, the dogs smoked on their own.

Auerbach said:

"Autopsies showed the non-smokers had no physical disabilities. The smoking dogs began to die of varying ailments after 10 to 20 weeks until five of the 10 smokers had died after 412 days, Auerbach said.

"Autopsies showed the dogs who died first had slight changes in the tissue around the lungs, and those who died later were killed during the last days of the research had advanced cancer of the lungs, he said.

Auerbach compared the staged advancing cancer with tissue taken from humans who had been light, moderate and heavy smokers and found the profiles parallel, he said.

Water Pipeline Is Being Installed North Of City

Work on the multimillion-dollar Twin Falls water development project is progressing on three fronts, city officials report.

One of the major projects under way is the installation of a 36-inch steel and concrete pipe along Washington Street North. Officials of Kloepper Construction Co., Logan, Utah, say the line will carry a main supply of water from the rim of Snake River Canyon to connect with the city's present distribution system.

The pipe, a special steel with concrete covering, weighs some six tons per section and is being set in some eight-foot-deep trenches. City Manager Herb Derrick said the pipe will permit later additions to be installed when necessary, above the large pipe without disturbing it.

The Kloepper firm also is constructing an intake structure in the canyon to tap the spring water which will provide the city's new source of water.

All of the three contract firms began late in March and is generally about five per cent complete, city officials said.

Other contractors include Com Dressing Inc., of Nevada and Florida, building pump structure and storage reservoir tank on Harrison St. and Falls Avenue, and Newell & Olson and Sons, Logan, in charge of the pump station construction.

The program is the first of a projected series sponsored by the newly-formed Sawtooth Conservation Council, a local group organized to further the cause of conservation in Magic Valley. The public is invited.

War Policy Backers Close Ranks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican backers of President Johnson's Vietnam policies marked Monday with actions intensifying the war and, Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., doesn't require that we echo what their party to go into nextfold the Senate "President him."

Sen. Burke B. Hickenloper, R-Iowa, followed up a call by Barry Goldwater, Wednesday night, for the GOP to stand solidly behind Johnson with an assertion he sees no need now for the kind of formal party policy statement GOP Senate dissenters are demanding.

Goldwater declared in an interview a Senate Republican Policy Committee staff report critical of Johnson's actions. He said he suspects an effort will be made to write some of its criticisms into the 1968 GOP platform.

"The 1964 Republican presidential nominee indicated any such effort would be defeated."

"In my travels about the country I have found an overwhelming majority of the Republicans — and the Democrats — back the President, especially now that he's doing the things that need to be done to win the war," Goldwater said.

"The Republican party that I know is not going to lag an platform plank that says the Republicans are not backing the President."

The policy committee staff report which exposed differences between Republicans and the GOP should not take responsibility for Democratic "mistakes."

Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen has promised that the committee's platform plank will take up the matter of a Vietnam policy declaration at the next meeting.

But Hickenloper, head of the Senate Republican Policy Committee and a member of the leadership group, said he thinks the GOP position already is known and "I don't see any necessity for any further statement."

"Fundamentally," he said in an interview, "we're supporting our boys fighting in Vietnam. There are arguments over how we put into this war and what is being done, but we want victory."

Dirksen already has lined up a policy committee majority for the most moderating.

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Rupert: VFW Condemns Protestors

RUPERT — Members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2771 have joined other protesters across the nation in condemning those who are protesting U.S. military action in Vietnam.

Robert Powers, commander of the local post, said the VFW at its 67th annual national convention in New York City approved a resolution attacking what it called the "small but apparently well-organized and vociferous minority" which is denouncing U. S. policy on Vietnam.

The resolution added that these protesters aid "radicalism, Communism" and damage the morale of U.S. fighting men in Vietnam. Commander Powers said that his post and all others in VFW support U.S. action in Vietnam, and the American flag is flying there.

He said that at the recent New York convention the VFW went on record as favoring the outlawing of the Communist party in the United States since its activities constitute "an out-right act of treason against our

Buffalo Stores Raided By Youths

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A gang of 20 young persons rioted through a section of Buffalo Wednesday night breaking windows and looting a pawn shop.

The persons, ranging in age from 16 to 20, carried off television sets, musical instruments and other items in the second consecutive night of looting, police said. Some of the merchandise was recovered.

Two persons were arrested and charged with malicious mischief, burglary and grand larceny.

The convention also approved a resolution urging legislation to prevent the hiring of Communists in any branch or level of government. Composed of a million and a half men who have served overseas in time of war or national crisis, the VFW also recommended passage of proposed legislation which would make deceleration of the U.S. flag a federal offense, and urged Congress to oppose any efforts to revise either the melody or words of "The Star Spangled Banner."

Intensified Viet Cong Attacks Are Battering Vietnamese Pacification

By JOHN T. WHEELER
SALGON (AP) — Intensified Viet Cong attacks are seriously battering the South Vietnamese government's latest pacification program, raising the specter of another failure in Saigon's efforts to win over the countryside.

In the first four months of this year 309 Communist attacks on pacification teams killed 218 government workers and wounded 239. Another 51 are missing and presumed captured, and several hundred of the government troops deployed to protect the pacification teams have been killed.

In all of 1966 there were only 23 attacks against a pacification program, now generally regarded to have been over-ambitious and ineffectual.

The scaled-down, more aggressive program launched this year appeared to be catching on. Captured Communist documents made clear that Revolutionary Development teams, as the pacification forces are now known, have divided into 50 from the Hue region alone.

A month ago Maj. Gen. Nguyen Duc Thang, the revolutionary development manager, warned 23 officials that they considered a vital threat. Thang said success or failure of the pacification effort might be decided by June.

One source says nearly 1,000 Communist troops died during the attacks on the teams or military forces protecting them.

Thang has about 20,000 pacification workers spread through 50 areas. Their main protection comes from 60 government battalions that have been sent through the two war-torn provinces where American Marines and not Communist troops have been present since last year. After the speech at a Baptist church, about 200 persons walked without incident to the city police station, about two miles and two hours away, where they sang freedom songs and dispersed.

King said he flew here to study the situation and give advice. He pledged his "absolute support" and that of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, which he heads, to the cause of having a city ordinance which would outlaw discrimination in the sale or rental of housing.

King's specific role in the proposed demonstrations, and possible discussions of the Kentucky Derby was not defined. "We'll have more to say on this later," he said.

McNamara Tells Missile Paradox

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara says more American missiles would hit Soviet targets in time of nuclear war than if the Soviets had no deployed anti-missile missiles.

Establishing this seeming paradox, McNamara used what he acknowledged was an extreme argument to show that the Soviets would face fewer U.S. missiles if they had never tried to defend against them.

This, he said, is because the Soviets' construction of an anti-missile missile defense system has pushed the United States into countering with a perhaps excessive offensive missile buildup.

As a result, in a nuclear exchange more American warheads would be hurled at the Soviet Union with special defense, penetration aids and electronic guidance to elude Soviet interceptor missiles, he said.

"I submit to you that the Soviet Union is in worse shape, facing greater risks and potentially greater damage to its people and its cities as a result of deploying an ABM than had it not done so," he declared.

McNamara's remarks were made in March before a closed-door session of a House Appropriations subcommittee as he presented the administration case against the immediate deployment of the multibillion-dollar anti-missile defense system.

The concerned testimony was released Wednesday night.

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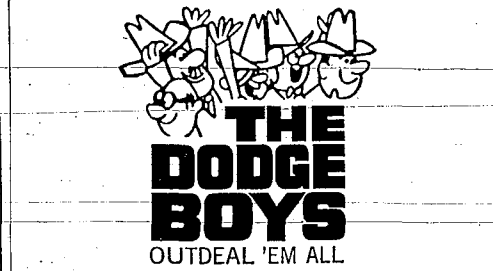
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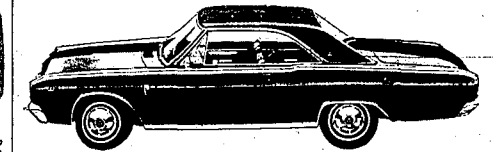
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Detroit Selects Walker And Dove In First Round Of NBA Collegiate Draft

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Sponsorship Of TV Show Is Canceled

NEW YORK (AP) — The Insurance Co. of North America on Wednesday canceled its sponsorship of a planned NBC special, "The Pursuit of Pleasure—An Exploration of the New-Fun Morality," on the grounds that it was not a suitable show for selling insurance.

The National Broadcasting Co. said sponsorship of such a program costs \$200,000 to \$250,000. It said the program would be telecast as planned on Monday at 10 p. m., even if no alternate sponsor is found.

Army Asked To Wipe Out Civil War Hero's Discharge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army was asked Wednesday to wipe out the distinguished service discharge of a Civil War hero whose troubles began after he was accused of cowardly killing to aid Col. George Custer at Little Big Horn.

Major Marcus A. Reno, who was cleared by a court of inquiry of any blame for the massacre of Custer's forces, was discharged from the Army four years after the battle on charges of cowardly fleeing and taking liberties with another man's wife.

A five-member panel of the Army Board for Correction of Military Records heard the colorful story of the Indian Wars at the Pentagon and took the case under advisement. A recommendation to the secretary of the Army for a decision will not be made for at least a month, board Chairman Albert J. Esser said.

The panel was told that the major, decorated for gallantry and outstanding leadership in the Civil War, is now a forgotten man, dishonored on "fimsy" misconduct charges.

The case was brought before the review board in the name of Charles Reno, 51, a New York City bartender, great-grandnephew of the major. The majority of the board asked the board to show Maj. Reno honorably discharged, and to al-

Convictions Of Two Men Are Reversed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The convictions of two men for the 1963 kidnaping of Frank Sinatra Jr. at Lake Tahoe were reversed Wednesday by the U.S. Court of Appeals.

The three-judge court ordered the retrial of Joseph Amisler and John Irwin in U.S. District Court at Los Angeles.

Amisler originally got life and Irwin 10 years, 8 months, for their parts in the abduction but Amisler's sentence later was reduced to 24 years, 8 months. Amisler was convicted on a kidnaping charge and Irwin was convicted as an accessory.

Wednesday's decision did not involve the accused mastermind of the plot, Barry Washington Keenan. He also got life but in-

ter a reduced sentence for the \$100,000 ransom plot against the son of actor-singer Frank Sinatra Sr.

Amisler's attorney, Mossie Lavine, said he understood the case was overruled on the basis of the U.S. Supreme Court's Smith vs. U.S. decision, in which kidnaping is defined as one offense.

"My client was charged and convicted on six counts," Lavine said. "They write everything up into six counts, which is against the Smith vs. U.S. decision."

The U.S. attorney's office in Los Angeles, however, said the decision was based on the fact that the defense was not provided with a jury list, a list of witnesses and a copy of the indictment three days before the trial — as required in a case involving a capital offense.

Sinatra, then 19, was abducted from a motel room at a gambling casino in the Washington Keenan. He also got life but in-

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Food Prices Take Jump This Week

NEW YORK (AP) — Food prices, which have been falling since last Thanksgiving, took a jump this week.

Consumers are likely to find higher price tags on meat, vegetables and fruit in the wake of falling meat production, heavy rains in California, a drought in Iowa and freezing weather in the Great Plains.

Demand for beef and pork has increased, and so have prices. A major supermarket chain in the New York area raised sirloin steak 10 cents a pound, rib roast 20 cents and leg of lamb 4 cents this week. Pork chops were unchanged.

Bacon is up 1 to 2 cents a pound in California and other pork cuts are 1 to 2 cents higher on the West Coast.

Chicken prices, however, are generally lower. So is turkey. Fresh produce selections have been limited by the weather.

Rains and killing frosts damaged broccoli and slowed strawberries, asparagus, cauliflower, tomatoes, cherries, pears and apricots in California. Strawberries, snap beans and peppers have been hit hard by rain in Louisiana.

The problem is just the opposite in Florida, where ministers have been praying for rain. In the Midwest, farmers are concerned about the wheat crop. Wholemeal flour prices went up this week.

Canned tomato product prices are headed up again. Stocks are 4 to 5 percent higher than a year ago. Consumers can expect to pay more for peeled tomatoes, catsup, tomato juice, sauce, pay and chili sauce.

Canned fruit prices also may rise.

PHUONG DONG, Viet Nam (NEA) — Private Walas has finally figured out how the enemy keeps getting recruits for his army.

Yes, sir.

They plant some kind of seed in the ground, see, and in a few months up pops a little of silk in a pair of black silk pajamas.

No kidding.

Walas swears to it.

Other day, as example, Walas, a 22-year-old rifleman from Butler, Ga., took part in a successful Viet Cong harvest on the swampy, steep banks of a Saigon River canal.

The VC, it was known, had been growing recruits on the river bank for years. The silk was fertile, and went with daily sun and frequent rains, the enemy could get at least a couple of crops every year.

Well, anyway, Walas's unit, the 27th Infantry, decided to put a stop to the farming of fighter forces and early the morning in pain, scores of United States soldiers slipped into the heart of the growing belt by way of narrow, reed-thatched boats.

Once on destination, the men ate the boats and spread through the thickly vegetated fields. Their mission was, of course, to uproot or chop down any and all enemy seedlings.

Walas set out to water up in his wading, his combat boots sinking into the ooze of the black river bed. Mosquitoes ripped his eyelashes and small gnats clustered in the exhalation of his breath.

First, it seemed futile. He saw nothing. There were plenty of bugs and beetles, a swimming snake now and then, yet Walas was damned if he could see a VC growing anywhere.

But he mused on.

The mud sucked at his ankles. Then, abruptly, his foot struck something that almost caused him to fall. Walas was understandably startled and whipped his rifle around to head in on a black object under the water surface.

The soldier prodded the figure. Then he reached down with his free hand, grabbed something slimy and pulled out. Sure enough, a full-grown enemy waterlily, replete with web gear and frown!

"Well, I'll be!" Walas exclaimed.

The guerrilla, Walas determined, had probably been growing in the water for some time. He remained submerged, naturally for his own safety. And he breathed by allowing only his lips to surface.

Needless to say, the discovery picked up the GI's spirits and

Walas poked him up quickly, and then searched on.

Sometime later, the soldier approached a blind hole in his path. Unknowing, he moved towards it along sloppy ground. He stepped sluggishly and his feet slipped against the wet earth.

He didn't see the hole until it was too late. He tripped into it.
