

NAACP Plans To Expand Membership

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is chopping its Philadelphia branch into five pieces in hopes of expanding membership and civil rights activities.

But, so far the major result is a rip-roaring battle among Negro leaders. One says it could destroy the movement.

The national NAACP is taking similar base-knowledgeing action in other American cities where the Negro population is more than 200,000. In Twin Falls, Mo., Los Angeles, San Francisco, Omaha, Kansas City, Mo., Chicago and Detroit.

But in these places there is no serious struggle for power as in Philadelphia.

Moore Butcher this week might seek further legal action. Philip Savage, director of the NAACP for the first four months of this year, compared Moore's departure with a "big earthquake."

Savage reported that the national NAACP had counted only 10,000 members in the entire country for the first four months of this year, compared with 4,000 at the end of 1966.

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Utah Has Killed 44 Men At Gallows Or Firing Squad

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) —domned in an isolated area north of the main prison complex, a few witnesses, a physician and a chaplain see the sentence carried out.

There has been growing opposition to the maximum sentence in Utah in recent years. An attempt to leave the sentence at discretion of judges failed in the 1957 Legislature.

Execution for murder has been practiced in Utah since territorial days.

The first victims on record were Long Hair and Antelope. Indians found guilty of killing two white men. They were hanged along the West Jordan River in what is now Salt Lake County Sept. 15, 1854.

Since then, prison records show three others whose hanging. The last man to walk up the gallows was Barton K. Kirkham on June 7, 1958.

All persons ordered to die have been executed.

Twenty-one have had death sentences commuted to life terms by the three-man board. Utah has never executed a woman.

The other two convicts are Roy Lee Poe, 37, and Darrell State Poulson, 35. Both have chosen the firing squad. Under Utah law, the condemned person may choose between the methods.

The last execution for murder in Utah was James W. Rogers on March 30, 1959. He was shot. Only first degree murder carries the death penalty in the state. If a jury does not recommend leniency, as in the case of the four on death row, the death sentence is mandatory.

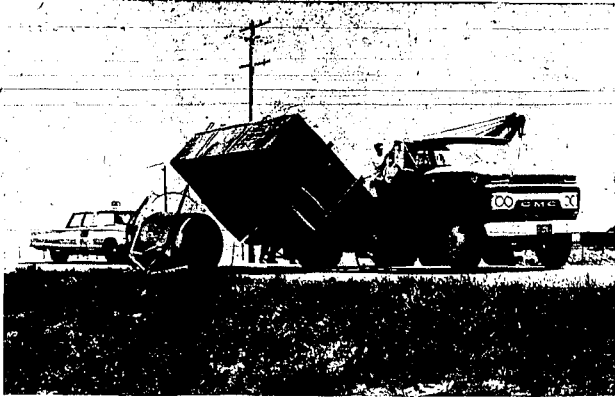
And, unlike other states still performing executions, the governor cannot commute a death sentence. This power rests with a special attorney general of the Board of Corrections. The governor can only delay execution.

Both Poe and Poulson have court appeals pending and it is expected appeals will start soon for Poulson and Kirkham, thereby delaying their executions, which are set for sunrise July 7.

A defense attorney, Jim Mitsunaga has said the case may be carried to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Poulson was convicted in Utah County five years ago of attacking Hazelrill Barton, Meekling of American Fork. Poe was convicted in Washington County last April of shooting 15-year-old Kenneth Hall of St. George.

Papandreou Charged In Conspiracy

ATHENS (AP) — Andreus Papandreou was charged today with conspiring to commit high treason in the alleged Aspida plot in Athens. The Greek minister and make Greece a neutral socialist state.

The charge was filed by the Attorney General, Ioannis Karamanlis, after he questioned the 45-year-old ex-premier, George Papandreou at the hotel outside Athens where he had been confined since the military coup April 21.

The younger Papandreou is accused of leading a secret organization of leftist army officers. Fifteen army officers were convicted of treason in March in the case and sentenced to prison terms ranging from two to 10 years, but Andreus as a member of parliament was protected by parliamentary immunity. His immunity was canceled by the coup.

The maximum penalty on the treason charge is death. U.S. officials reportedly have sought assurance from the new military regime that Andreus, who gave up acquired American citizenship to enter Greek politics in 1951, would not be executed if convicted.

Committee Of Generals Votes To Drop 15 Guard, 4 Reserve Brigades

WASHINGTON (AP)—A committee of regular Army, National Guard and Reserve generals has secretly voted 11 to 10 for a controversial plan to drop 15 National Guard divisions and four Reserve brigades, it was learned today. Narrow as it was, the vote is regarded as a boost for the plan, which is believed to have at least the general blessing of Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara.

The 21-member Reserve Force Policy Committee voted last week. The regular Army and 18 independent brigades—total of 42 brigades—manned at have seven representatives each on the panel. Pentagon officials have classified details as secret. The Army said details include information on force structure, manning and equipment levels, and mobilization and contingency planning. Officials said most of the units which could assist a potential now in these low-priority divisions probably would be absorbed into first-line outfits. The officers and enlisted men in the four Army Reserve brigades also are expected to wind up in high-priority units. These bri-

gades are manned at between 75 and 90 per cent of maximum strength. Under the plan as now drawn, even the eight high-priority guard divisions would be re-scanned geographically. The effort is being made to give as many states as possible at least one brigade of about 4,000 men each. Several of the large states would get as many as three brigades. Guard officials have said that about 42 brigades are needed to permit the states to handle internal problems such as civil rights disturbances and natural disasters. The package will be considered by Gen. Harold K. Johnson, Army chief of staff, and Secretary of the Army Stanley Resor before being sent to McNamara for final approval. In successive stages dating

back more than five years, McNamara has sought to cut away those Guard and Reserve units which he considered surplus to war plan requirements and too lightly manned and equipped to be of any quick use in a mobilization. Despite counterfire from Capitol Hill, powers and Guard and Reserve backers, McNamara has eliminated 19 Reserve divisions, four National Guard divisions and thousands of miscellaneous units. Congress succeeded in blocking his proposal two years ago to merge the Reserve into the National Guard. This year, Congress prevented the deactivation of eight Air Guard and Air Force Reserve transport units.

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Negro Pianist Perishes In 'Copter Crash

DA NANG, South Vietnam (AP) — Philippa Schuyler, American Negro concert pianist and former child prodigy, was killed Tuesday night in the crash of a U.S. Army helicopter evacuating Vietnamese children to Da Nang.

A Vietnamese child was also killed and a U.S. soldier aboard the helicopter as a passenger was missing. Seven other Vietnamese children, four U.S. crewmen and two South Vietnamese soldiers were rescued by Air Force, Marine and Army helicopters that sped to Da Nang Bay.

Mrs. Schuyler, 35, had planned to leave Vietnam Saturday but delayed her departure to help bring Roman Catholic children from Hue where tensions between Catholic and Buddhist factions was reported rising again.

The cause of the crash was not immediately established, but spokesmen said it apparently was not due to enemy action. The helicopter crashed about 30 yards from shore just north of Da Nang, and there was no enemy fire reported in the area.

Miss Schuyler first came to Vietnam last year to give concerts for American servicemen and Vietnamese groups.

She returned about a month ago as a correspondent for the Manchester (N.H.) Union Leader and several religious magazines.

Miss Schuyler, who grew up in Harlem, was the daughter of George Schuyler, noted Negro writer and former publisher of the Pittsburgh Courier, and Josephine Schuyler. Her mother is white.

When she was 2½ years old, Philippa could recite verses from "The Rubáiyát of Omar Khayyam" and find the Mississippi River on the globe.

She began her career as a pianist at 4, when she won her first gold medal in the National Piano Teachers Guild competition by playing 10 works from memory.

In later years, Miss Schuyler made a number of world tours and became fascinated by Africa. Her recent compositions included "Sanga," an Ethiopian dance, and "Chisambara the Ngonzo," who was a 16th-century Mozambique emperor.

In the past, the Office of Economic Opportunity has refused to fund a newspaper project because, as one official said last week, "there are serious doubts as to the priority of federal funding of a commercial newspaper."

The OEO has, however, given funds to local community action agencies which have used part of the money to print newspapers.

Independent Student Paper Has Debut On Utah Campus

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A liberal, independent student newspaper called "The Voice" made its debut on the Utah campus Tuesday in the midst of a controversy over student freedom of the press.

Immediately following appearance of the 3-page, mimeographed publication, about 250 students marched in protest against the college administration for the recent appointment of English major Ralph Mabey as editor of Taylor, a red-haired, blue-eyed, 21-year-old student who stood on the balcony of the Chronicle's office, shouting that his off-campus, so-called "underground" newspaper would continue to be circulated on campus "as a voice of the students, but free of administration pressure or censorship."

He charged the appointment of Mabey was a move by the administration to stifle student freedom of the press and planned that the Publications Council had ignored staff seniority when it made the choice. Wallace E. Bennett, associate dean of the Law School, called the move an "out-of-balance issue."

"I just don't think Paul and the others are looking at things in a very mature perspective," Bennett said.

Meanwhile, the Chronicle continued to be published by a skeleton staff under guidance of associate editor Harris Vincent, junior journalism major from Salt Lake City, who admits he was once a member of the rebel group but felt it was his "moral responsibility" to continue publishing the paper.

"I'm caught between the devil and the deep blue sea," Vincent said at his Chronicle desk. "I think the underground paper is just great. I wish them every success."

Taylor said 500 issues of the "Voice" were circulated on campus Tuesday and 1,000 copies of the second number would be out Wednesday. The fired editor still makes his headquarters in the Chronicle office. He boasts a staff of some 20 students, most of them selected from the Chronicle.

"We don't intend to keep publishing on mimeograph paper," he added. "But right now we don't have any funds, and we're putting the paper together with whatever materials we can beg or borrow."

"Many people think we will not last long, but that's what they said about the Berkeley Barb which is now a prospering off-campus paper at the University of California."

Organizing the standing committees for the coming year was begun, Mr. Kauffman, newly-elected president, stated he wished to thank the many parents and interested persons who have called him offering their services in the new organization.

"Several details remain to be worked out and public interest is greatly appreciated," stated the president.

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New Budget Is Adopted At Minidoka

RUPERT — The Minidoka County School Board adopted a proposed budget for 1967-68 following a hearing Monday night in their regular board meeting.

The budget total of \$2,246,574.25 includes in the breakdown \$452,312 for administration, \$1,356,996 for instructional service, \$155,383 for plant operation, \$155,383 for auxiliary services and \$115,500 for charges, \$141,185 for transportation, \$154,750 for capital outlay, \$47,990 for debt service, \$14,232.25.

The board approved contracts for two teachers, Sherry Harris, who is receiving her degree from Brigham Young University, and who is returning to the county school system in its primary grades, and Mrs. Kurt (Mary) Moller, to teach English at Minico High School.

Leo Moore, board member from district No. 1, Heyburn, has filed a petition for reelection in the district election set for May 23. A second trustee for District 1, City of Rupert, also will be elected. Dr. Howard O. Tuess, who presently holds the position, has not indicated an intention to run again. Tuess is the only person who has filed a petition so far.

Two houses which were purchased from Minidoka Dam for \$168 will be used at Minico High School for industrial arts classes. Trustees originally planned to use the houses to make a new central school office, but at the board's request, they voted for the alternate use of the buildings.

They will be set up east of the main building at Minico near the hot lunch storeroom. Total area covered by the two houses into classrooms is estimated between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

The board authorized a call for bids to black top approximately 10,000 square yards at Minico, including the area for bids will be announced when surveys and specifications can be completed.

Trustees adopted a resolution urging the State Board of Education to reconsider its proposal to close the resident center in the Burley-Rupert area for adult education under continuing education.

Minidoka County schools have been accepted for a program of outdoor education for the summer. The cultural and educational program for 20 students who will enter the seventh grade next year will place the students in a variety of outdoor educational programs, with major concerns in natural science and conservation.

War Deaths Put On MONY Tabulation

Mutual of New York, which makes an annual study of the causes of death among people who own individual life insurance policies with the company, has dropped tuberculosis from its tabulation and added war deaths.

K. Gaylord Erickson, MONY assistant manager, Twin Falls, reported that the company in 1966 paid a total of \$16 million in death benefits on the lives of 14,043 policy holders. Only three of these deaths were caused by tuberculosis. Seventy-four policy holders died in 1967, and on these MONY paid \$74,000 in death benefits.

While the war accounted for one-half of one per cent of fatalities among all age groups, it caused 10.2 per cent of the deaths among MONY policyholders under age 40.

The insurance company's study for 1967 showed that the number one killer among owners of individual policies continued to be the disease of the heart and circulatory system. It accounted for 58 per cent of the fatalities among those age 60 and over and 48.1 per cent among those from age 40 to 59.

Among policy holders under age 40, traffic accidents caused the greatest number of deaths, 20.2 per cent. Other accidents accounted for 17.1 per cent of the fatalities in this age group, while heart disease caused 16.1 per cent of the deaths.

Cancer took its greatest toll in the 40-59 age group, accounting for 18.5 per cent of the fatalities.

Daily bomb explosions, waves of violence, murders and gun battles in the murky back streets—all have become part of the normal pattern of life and pointers to its future.

The Indian and Arab merchants who grew rich off the port since the British rule have been stopped ordering new stock. They no longer bother to wipe the dust from their piles of gold, silver and diamonds. No one repairs the watches shattered by terrorist band grenades.

Law and order have become largely theoretical. Political prisoners and journalists in Aden's jails are in a state of virtual anarchy. Most Arab police inspectors have been city and bloodshed.

They face the approaching chaos as though hypnotized. "Nothing can be done," said one Indian shopkeeper. "I will leave with the British. There is no hope for this place, no hope for our people."

Legislative Tax Group Plans Meet

BOISE (AP) — A legislative tax committee met for the first time Tuesday with members of the State Tax Commission and planned a study of Idaho's tax situation.

Alternative methods of financing local government units, appraisal practices and utility property taxes were listed as major topics for study as a result of 1967 property tax equalization amendments.

The State Supreme Court declared parts of the 1965 Property Tax Equalization Act unconstitutional, and the 1967 Legislature amended those parts and in the same measure created the committee.

The court ruled against provisions setting real and personal property tax assessments at 20 per cent of full cash value and utility-owned property at 40 per cent.

A gradual adjustment to those ratios was provided for in the law. The respective ratios were at 13 and 31.7 per cent in 1966.

Amendments passed this year called for equalization at 20 per cent by 1977, but no adjustments toward that end have been made.

"There is reason to believe there are other ways out. It just could be that all potatoes grown in Idaho will be sold through regular channels," Hansen stated.

"I understand the biggest shipment of potatoes out of Idaho this year was made this week," he added. This could be from the unseasonable cold weather in California which will make the east potato crop late in getting to market.

When asked about the report from a group of Rupert potato growers who went to Washington to push a five-year plan, Hansen stated he thought they could be of little assistance on the success of their trip.

Hansen urged people to attend the water hearings that are being held in southern Idaho and make their views known on the water in Snake River and the American Falls Dam problem.

Other items discussed were importing of cattle and sheep, security and Medicare and gun legislation.

Glenn Simmons reminded chamber members of the water project meeting at 2 p.m. Thursday at the Ponderosa Inn. H. T. Nelson, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation, and many other dignitaries and authorities in regard to Idaho water problems will participate in the meeting.

Airport Is Being Prepared For Fire-Fighting Bombers

Summer home base for Forest Service fire retardant-carrying bombers is being enlarged at Twin Falls Municipal Airport.

Aviation Manager Ed Wood said Twin Falls is the only Idaho airport south of Boise which has facilities to house those bombers during summer fire-fighting operations.

He said Boise and Elko, Nev., are the closest facilities, so all Forest Service conversations and test fires in the southern Idaho area are fought out of the Twin Falls facility.

"A parking lot" for these bombers is now under construction at the local airport. The southern Idaho area is in the last stages of construction, Mr. Wood said, and should be finished by the time the fire season begins about the first of July.

He said the City Streets Department, under direction of Kevin Hunt, is working on the project in its spare time.

Whenever fires crop up in this area, the Forest Service bases its forest bombers here. Last year four TB-66s and two four-engine bombers were based at Twin Falls Airport. Reeder's Flying Service also has five fire bombers based there.

Mr. Wood said a real problem was created last year during the fire season. He said the size of the planes made it extremely difficult to operate in existing facilities — the wing span of the large Navy bombers is equal to the existing taxi strip.

He said one plane's wing was damaged trying to get through the taxiway.
