# De Gaulle To Enjoy Speech On Tuesday

PARIS (AP) — If it is true, as his critics say, that President Charles de Gaulle flourishes in a crisis atmosphere, then he should be content as he prepares the address he will give at his news conference on Tuesday.

For it is at this meeting with the press, the first one this year that De Gaulle is expected to elaborate on his government's surprise request for special powers to reform the nation's economic and social welfare structure.

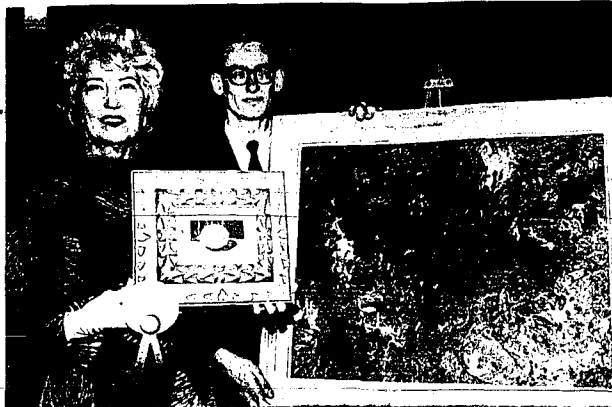
Looming dangerously in the background is a 24-hour general strike being organized in a rare spirit of cooperating among Communist, Socialist and Christian labor unions to protest the government's proposal.

The general strike, the first in France with a uniquely political objective since 1938, is scheduled for Wednesday, the day the National Assembly begins debate on the so-called special powers bill that would permit the government to rule by decree on economic and social matters until Nov. 1.

In a show of force, the Communist-led CGT syndicate is sponsoring a monster march Wednesday from the Bastille to the Place de la République, the traditional rallying point of the French left.

And Saturday, the National Assembly where the Gaullists have a finger-majority of one seat, votes on a constitutional revision up to Socialists and Communist deputies to bring the government down.

# Bomb Found In Las Vegas Hotel-Casino

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A bomb and a note demanding \$75,000 were found in a tower room at the Sahara Hotel-Casino on the Las Vegas Strip today after thousands of guests were evacuated from 100 hotels in Nevada and Arizona.

The Clark County sheriff's office said the bomb was found after a man called the pit, or center of the gambling area, in the Sahara and said the device was set to go off shortly after 4 a.m.

Deputies followed instructions in the note on how to handle the device and removed it from the multimillion-dollar hotel-casino without an explosion.

The note said other bombs were planted in the Sahara Hotel-Casino on the south shore of Lake Tahoe and the Mint Casino in downtown Las Vegas, the sheriff's office said.

The FBI was called in to aid in the search and investigation. Agents began an immediate investigation into the identity of the anonymous caller.

Officers said the caller tele-

phoned a second time while the search and evacuation were under way to tell them of another note under a huge neon sign in front of the Sahara.

The note sent them to a third location, where they found still another note that sent them somewhere else, deputies said.

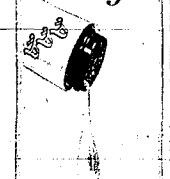

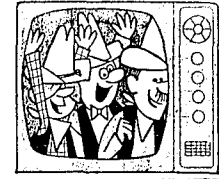

By WILLIAM F. ARBAGAST — The House and Senate are expected to face a tough test of 1967 during the coming two weeks. The action will be in the House and involves aid for secondary and elementary education, rent subsidies and the model cities program. Involved is an administration bill that authorizes the expenditure of an additional \$4.4 billion to help elementary and secondary schools. ## Fulbright Faces Toughest Political Challenges As Dove In Hawkish State

By HARRY KELLY — LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Sen. J. W. Fulbright, of Arkansas, challenger of presidential foreign policy for a quarter century, faces his toughest political challenge as a dove in a state regarded as hawkish on the Vietnam war. Two of Fulbright's most prominent fellow Democrats on Arkansas—former Govs. Orval E. Faubus and Sid McMath—both Democrats but both planning to vote with the voters because of his attacks on administration warfare and on will be vulnerable in next year's primary. # Jordan Asks State Control Of Fund Use

Use of Land and Water Conservation Fund allotments should be left to the discretion of the state, U.S. Sen. Len B. Jordan, R., Idaho, has informed the Senate Appropriations committee.

The Idaho senator also forwarded a letter from Gov. Don Samuelson, asking states make their own determination of ratio of federal allocations on land acquisition and site development.

Republican leaders have insisted since they picked up 47 seats last November that they were not going to deal with Southern Democrats to bring the "Great Society" to a halt.

The current maneuvering over the extension of federal education programs has shown that Republicans, while lacking a state-rightist alternative that would naturally appeal to many Southerners, are not looking to Southern voters of a deal in exchange for votes.

Rep. Carroll B. Ford, the House GOP leader from Michigan, said in an Ohio speech last week that Republicans are following "my Southern strategy."

"The strategy is to drive Southern Democrats out of office into the arms of the administration—where they belong—so that we will hurt them in the next election," he said.

# Anniversary

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Today is the first birthday of Nimbus 2, the weather satellite, and the spacecraft has sent back more than a million pictures to stations at Fairbanks, Alaska, and Rosman, N. C.

Scientists at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said Nimbus 2 was designed for only about six months duty, but its day-time camera is still working normally.

The nighttime pictures from space are no longer coming in because of a malfunction in tape-recording equipment.

The satellite was launched last May 15 from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

# Replacement Of American Falls Dam Discussed At Burley Chamber Meet

**RUPERT** — Glen Simmons, Bureau of Reclamation, Burley, discussed the required replacement of the American Falls Dam when he appeared at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon meeting Tuesday at Hiram's Cafe.

Mr. Simmons said that in 1964 the dam was studied in Burley for analysis and engineers concluded that the dam no longer meets Bureau of Land Management requirements for safety. The dam no longer can be used to full capacity, and the bureau requires immediate steps for replacement.

The deterioration of the dam is caused by get a new concrete dam to occupy more space than its parent materials, producing an uncontrollable expansion in the parent concrete.

Mr. Simmons stated that 150,000 acre feet of water was lost last year because the dam couldn't store the water with the ice load.

The BLM has suggested three alternatives for replacement of the dam, the first to replace at the present site and kind of dam at a cost of about \$39,000,000 water users—total cost of the proposed replacement would be approximately \$10 million, and because of the multiple uses of the waters other agencies would share the cost would include fish and wildlife, recreation, flood control and power products.

The second proposal would raise the reservoir six feet with an increase of 300,000 acre feet storage, and a cost of \$10,000,000.

# Wiretapping Necessary To Combat Crime

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — A presidential crime commission report says wiretapping is needed to battle organized crime, which is so rich it needs business executives to help it.

Organized crime is so sophisticated in its operation that there will be no place at the top for the uneducated, the report said.

The crime panel, formally called the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice, released Sunday night the report on organized crime. It is the third of six reports to be released following a sweeping study of all types of crime in the United States.

G. Robert Blakey, a law professor at Boston University, is called a consultant to the commission, recommended federal legislation to permit carefully controlled, court-ordered wiretapping and electronic bugging to help combat organized crime.

Blakey's views, like those of other consultants, were not necessarily endorsed by the full commission.

However, the commission has recommended legislation on wiretapping and bugging. President Johnson has asked Congress to outlaw all such surveillance except in cases where national security is involved.
