## Rockets Used On Marines

SAIGON (AP) — Communist forces unleashed their 140 mm rockets tonight in the battle against U.S. Marines before the demilitarized zone. The big Soviet-made projectiles exploded at Gio Linh, an artillery post two miles south of the DMZ.

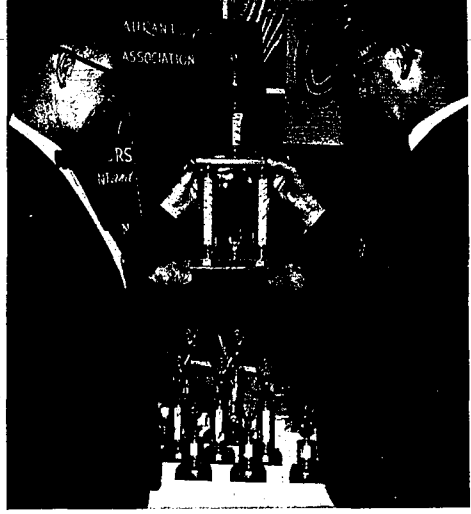
No details of the attack were immediately available.

Fresh fighting was reported in the area. Then, several miles west of Gio Linh, menaced by elements of three North Vietnamese regiments, perhaps 3,500 men. There are 5,000 U.S. Marines in the hopper sector, which all were not actively engaged at Con Thien.

American warplanes Tuesday night raided two surface-to-air (SAM) missile sites the North Vietnamese were setting up with Russian aid.

The U.S. Command said the anti-aircraft missile sites which were hit knocked out at least one rocket almost exactly on the 17th Parallel dividing North and South Vietnam and about eight miles in from the coast.

There was no immediate report of damage, and the headquarters spokesman did not say whether any of the big Soviet-made missiles were subsequently used. These were the first SAM sites reported inside the demilitarized zone. ## Rookie Policeman Slain As Lawmen Halt Student Snipers On Texas Campus

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—White helmets police firing as they stormed a men's dormitory at Texas Southern University Tuesday and halted student snipers who created a no-man's land on campus. A police patrolman was slain and officers and a student wounded.

Police took 450 men students on to jail and worked to discover which had fired the shot which killed Lewis R. Kuba, 25, who graduated from the police academy a month ago. Kuba was shot between the eyes in the first assault wave against the dormitory, which sheltered the snipers' nest.

Police died about 7½ hours after he was shot.

## SNCC May Shift Back Into Role Of Undramatic Political Organizing

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Indications are that the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee "a programmatic approach" standing disarray within SNCC will shift back into its traditional, apparently indicating more ac membership of role of undramatic political planning and concrete programs as opposed to emotional emphasis on speaking by the group after a year under "black power" symbol Stokely Carmichael.

Carmichael was replaced as SNCC's national chairman last month by H. Ray Brown, 23, the Alabama field director, in effect would join in a summer drive by the organization's staff in Atlanta.

At a news conference, Brown said the SNCC philosophy would be along the same line articulated by Carmichael. Brown's prepared statement reflected Carmichael's views, calling for nationwide anti-racial program and the building of political and economic forces among Negroes.

But there was perhaps a hint toward a "personality cult" for a difference. Brown spoke of himself. This fits with a long-standing "programmatic approach" standing disarray within SNCC. A leading role will be taken by the new program director, Ralph Featherstone, 27, veteran SNCC field worker who spent much of 1966 in tiny Philadelphia, Me., and one taught Carmichael school in Washington, D.C. Featherstone, a quiet, slender man, talked of the need for "positive efforts in terms of establishing economic control by the black communities." The economic euphoric, he said, will be added to SNCC's political organization efforts — such as the third-party project in Alabama's Lowndes County.

"I can pull off any substantial change with rhetoric. I'm going to push with them not to get sidetracked with these dramatic events, that the organization not get sidetracked with these ephemeral, eye-catching, dramatic things," he said.

## Edward Hopper, U.S. Artist, Dies

NEW YORK (AP) — Edward Hopper, whose brooding, shadowed canvases of American life brought him a place among the century's master painters, died Monday in his Greenwich Village studio.

The painter's wife, who announced his death Tuesday night, said he had been ill for three weeks. She indicated he would be buried near his birthplace in Brno, Czecho-slovakia.

Hopper, a raw-haired man of 57, was known for his stark, contemplative look, was called a master of light. He projected the emptiness of a big city street or the solitude of grass and dunes with a not quite definable sense of mystery.

## Four Recent Idaho Murder Cases Are Yet Unsolved

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Four persons, three of them teenagers, met violent death at the hands of persons unknown in four Idaho communities from August, 1966, through December, 1966.

The cases remain unsolved.

Farmer Kent Reed, a 35-year-old Area boy, left the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Reed, at 8:20 p.m. on Aug. 6, 1966. He was headed for a party at a ranch home near Howe. He disappeared from the party, and 24 hours later his body was found in a roadside ditch.

An autopsy showed the boy had died from extreme external pressure applied to his chest. Five ribs were fractured.

Susan Hansen, a pretty, 16-year-old brunette and a student at Blackfoot High School, jumped into the family car for a trip to a nearby grocery store the evening of Oct. 1, 1966. She was known of her whereabouts until police hunters found her body floating in Spring Creek on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation 24 days later. Her body was made open for ten days.

It was foggy and cold in the nearby mountains of Dec. 22, 1966, as Versal Hunter, 42, went about his duties as service station attendant on the South Valley-Losstone Highway near Idaho Falls. About 3 a.m., his body was found near the cash registers, punctured by six .25 caliber bullets.

The service station job was temporary for Hunter, who left a widow and six children.

Vernon Tavorn, 13-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Tavorn of Shelley, was enjoying Christmas away from the home of her mother, Mrs. Betty Tavorn. She had lunch with her mother Dec. 30. Mrs. Tavorn left Vernie waiting for a friend to come and join in their homemade recreation room. But a killer got there first, killing Vernie to death.

Although three sheriffs and the chief of police have outlined every means of technical criminology at their disposal, questioned hundreds of persons, utilized the assistance of the Idaho State Police and federal Bureau of Investigation, the

## U.S. Suppresses Japanese Films Of Ghastly After-Effects Of Atomic Bomb

By SPENCER DAVIS  
WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has suppressed Japanese films showing ghastly after-effects of the 1945 atomic bombing of Hiroshima. U.S. officials revealed today.

The Japanese government has asked at least twice that copies of the film be lifted, but the U.S. government has refused on grounds it might damage U.S.-Japanese relations, said the informants.

**Extortion Ring Exposed In New York**  
NEW YORK (AP) — A congressman, a general, an admiral, a British producer and two unknown American singers were among several hundred victims of an extortion racket that preyed on homosexuals over the last decade, the New York Times said today.

The newspaper said authorities that provided the information are withholding the victims' names to keep them from being "professionally and personally destroyed." The report said many are married men with families.

The existence of the ring was first disclosed Feb. 17, 1956, when 17 persons were indicted and nine arrested.

Since then, the Times said, at least 50 persons have been convicted and imprisoned on charges of extortion and impersonating a police officer. Authorities said a decoy, usually a young man, would lure the victim to a hotel room and get him in a compromising situation, the report stated. Then one or more bogus policemen would enter the room and threaten the victim with arrest and disclosure as a homosexual unless he paid.

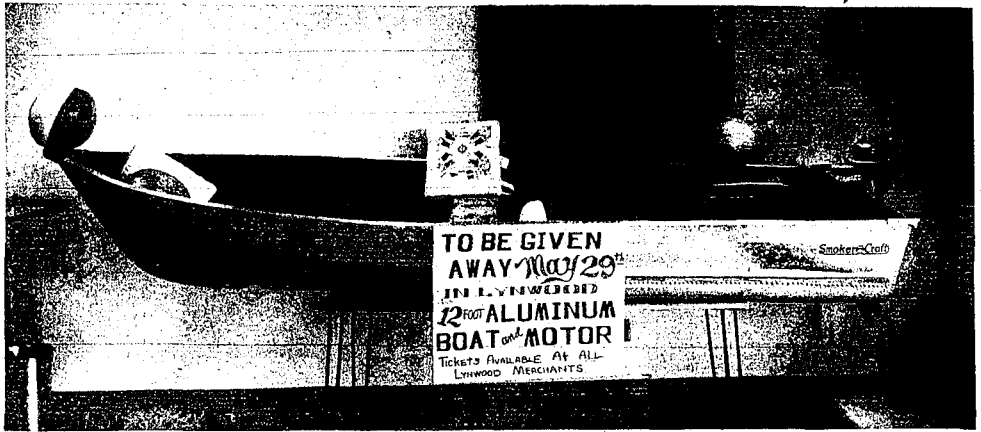
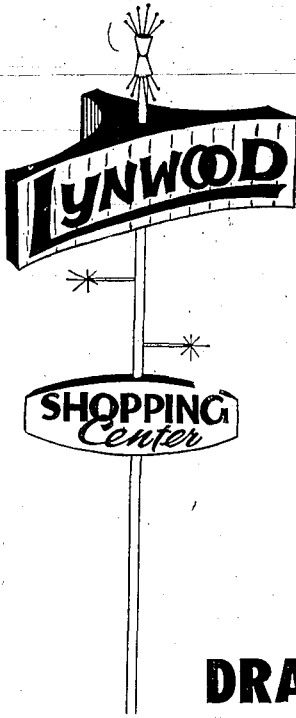

## State Will Revamp Old Constitution

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)** — Philadelphians voted Tuesday to hold a convention to revamp the state's antiquated 1893-old constitution, a proposal that had failed six times since 1891.

In Philadelphia's primary, Democrats revolted against the party leadership, renominating Mayor James H. Tate for a second four-year term by an almost 2-to-1 majority.

The organization had dumped Tate on grounds he was a "sure-loser" and endorsed former City Controller Alexander Hempstead for a second term by a 2-to-1 margin.

A third candidate, Lenore Roberts, a Negro real estate broker, trailed with 5,593 votes.

Republican Gov. Raymond P. Shafer, in office four months, gained the prestige of his administration on constitutional revision.

"It is a great victory," said Shafer. "Constitutional revision is vitally needed."

The convention, with delegates elected in November, will convene in the state's capitol at Harrisburg on Dec. 1. It will have three months to complete the job, but is limited by law from making any change that would allow a graduated income tax. It was this fear — and opponents hammered at this theme — that defeated the convention proposal previously.

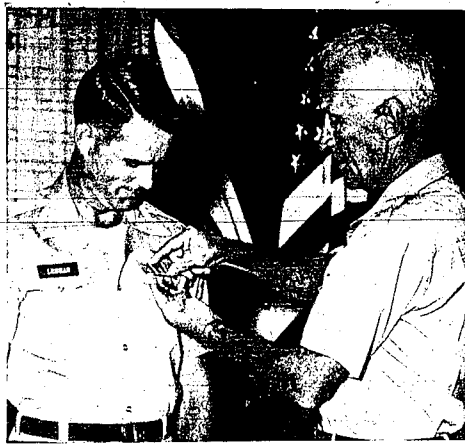

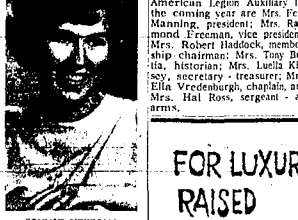

But there are many fakes in the fine arts, he says, and many have tried to capitalize on his ability and name by copying his work. (Times-News photo)

There is not always honor among artists, says Archie Boyd Teater, well known western artist who calls Hagerman Valley his home.

And Mr. Teater should know for on many occasions artists have used their talent to copy his work in an effort to capitalize on his ability and name.

Mr. Teater has just concluded the sale of a painting of the Teton Mountains to an art collector and educator in Washington, D. C. for \$3,500.

Fakers, Mr. Teater says, have been busy in the fine arts field for more than 2,000 years. As for his own experiences, he recalls a California couple who came to his Jackson Hole studio in Wyoming and told of an artist in their state who had been exposed as an art forger by his wife during divorce proceedings. Officers found the man had a studio filled with Teater imitations. He was arrested for copying the paintings and signing them "A. Teater."

In another case, a "Teater" painting showed up dated 1925 and signed by Mr. Teater. It had been painted on a large canvas.

Not only was the work not that of the Idaho artist, but it was painted on a large canvas which the artist recalled he could not afford to purchase back in 1925.

One young man even came to the Teater studio and spent many hours examining paintings. When asked about his interest, he replied he was studying the Teater technique.

"He is a success and I want to copy his kind of work," the young man, an art instructor for a college, explained.

During the depression, Teater says, Foreman Bros., Bankers, failed and their financial foundation collapsed.

"We will manage," they said, "with \$1 million in fine paintings."

However, the art proved to be mostly fakes and the bankers had nothing.

Art collectors are becoming more and more alarmed about the vast market in fake art, Mr. Teater says. In many large cities, art dealers, or so they call themselves, are opening galleries where they deal in factory produced art although they usually have several local artists connected with their galleries to give an authentic appearance.

Currently in Hagerman Valley, although he also spends much of his time in Jackson, Wyo., and traveling abroad painting scenes and people from all countries, Mr. Teater has completed a number of Idaho scenes this winter.

Some of the latest include

Shoshone Falls, which he says must be captured at certain seasons, but offers one of the most outstanding art possibilities in the state.

Spring in the Sawtooth Mountains is another favorite subject of the Idaho artist. At this time of year, he says, snow covered mountains with spring beauty and new green leaves in the foreground make for an unusual display of art.

Art Dealer Indicted In Fraud Case

NEW YORK (AP) — A Park Avenue art dealer was indicted today on charges of peddling \$163,800 worth of fake Picasso, Chagall and Matisse paintings.

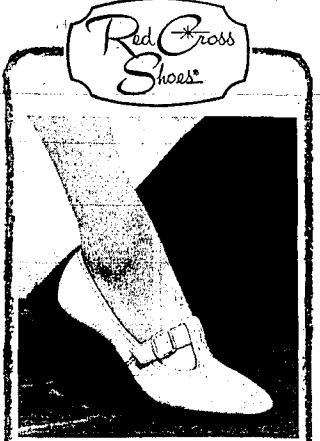
The dealer, David Stein, 31, a British subject, was accused of fraud and counterfeiting in the sale of 41 paintings to 12 purchasers. He was said to have produced the fakes himself.

Artists Pablo Picasso and Marc Chagall played an active part in an investigation that spanned the Atlantic.

Photographs of the works attributed to Picasso were sent to the artist in Europe and he labeled them in French, true or false. Chagall consulted with the Manhattan district attorney's office when he was here last fall for the opening of the Metropolitan Opera.

The original complaint to Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan's office came from Irving Yanet, a customer of Stein's. The defendant operated a gallery here and another in Palm Beach, Fla.

The investigation leading to Stein's indictment apparently had no connection with a probe currently under way into the apparent faking of 44 modern masterpieces in a \$1.26-million collection of Texas oilman Alger H. Meadows.

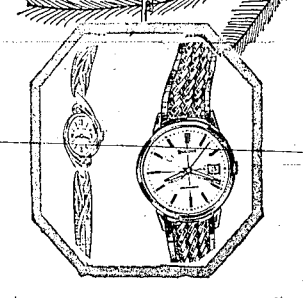

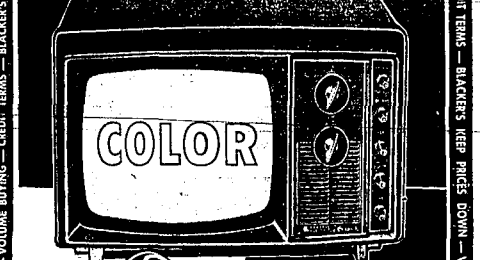

### Populicans Mount Attack On Funds Bill

By WILLIAM F. ARBOGAST, WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans mounted a three-pronged attack today against a \$1-billion appropriation bill financing the Department of Housing and Urban Affairs and 16 other federal agencies. They are centering their fire on a major controversial program—rent subsidies, a model cities project and participation sales certificates—but are reserving some pot shots for such other projects as urban renewal and mass transportation. The house ended general debate in the bill Tuesday but put off voting on amendments until today because many members were absent. The Appropriations Committee last week cut the rent subsidy program 75 per cent and hoped of more than 60 per cent of the funds the administration requested for the model cities program. Its members hoped to hold the line there. The rent subsidy program approved in 1965 calls for the government to supplement rents paid to owners of private housing by eligible low-income families. In two years the program has been financed with \$12 million. President Johnson asked for \$40 million for the program moving next year but the Appropriations Committee cut the amount to \$10 million. Reps. Glenn R. Davis, R-Wis., said he expected strong GOP backing for an amendment to knock out all the money.

### Tennessee Throws Out 'Monkey Law'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The legislature today threw out Tennessee's "monkey law" after 42 years of often bitter controversy over the teaching of evolution in public schools. Gov. Buford Ellington is now expected to sign the bill, passed by the Senate Tuesday after earlier passage by the House. A measure more than \$30 million long, the law prohibited the teaching in public schools of any theory on the biological evolution of man, and the only man ever convicted under the statute, John L. Scopes of Shreveport, La., said he was "very happy" about the repeal.

### U.S. Asked To End Silver Price Support

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Mexican Mining Chamber asked the U. S. government today to end its silver price support policy which it claimed has cost Mexico more than \$30 million the past three years. The chamber warned that Mexico is on the verge of losing its position as the world's largest silver producer because of its failure to discover new deposits. Mexican silver production has slumped from 2,600 tons in 1962 to 1,300 tons in 1966, while other leading world producers such as the United States, Peru and Canada steadily increased to the chamber said. It added that the gap between Mexico and the United States, the second largest world producer, has closed from seven million tons ounces in 1963 to only one million ounces last year. The chamber said the U. S. has kept the price of silver at 120.3 cents an ounce for the last three years by making up the difference between demand and production from its reserves. "Even U. S. miners oppose the price policy because it makes it unattractive to look for new deposits," the chamber said.

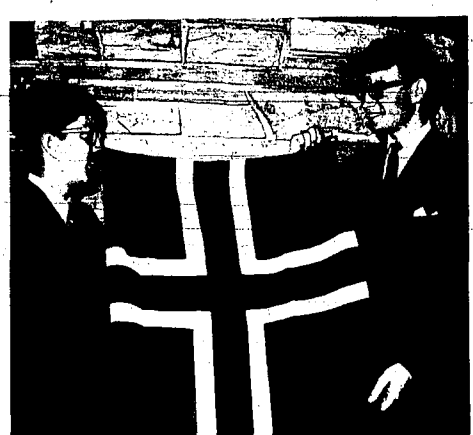

# Johnson Is Courting Governors In Apparent Effort To Avoid Criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is courting the nation's governors in the name of federal-state partnership and in an apparent effort to avoid the kind of criticism once aimed at him by Democratic state executives.

He underscored that courtnship Monday with a personal mission to rally foggy Windsor Locks, Conn., and with the appointment of a foreign affairs liaison man to represent the administration before the governors.

Johnson spent about 2 1/2 hours with the six New England governors, four of them Democrats, and declared again his dedication to White House-state house cooperation.

"We can succeed in dealing with the modern problems that confront our people in the 20th century only if the federal and the state governments are willing to work together," Johnson said. "With an exchange of ideas and information, and with the true spirit of real partnership."

The White House produced a deluge of data on 31 administration meetings with governors earlier this year, and nine more to come. Former Florida Gov. Ferris Bryant and a team of federal officials are conducting those sessions.

At Windsor Locks, Johnson took a personal hand in the campaign. He brought along a dozen top administration officials, four of them Democrats.

Around a long mahogany table, they talked with the governors about problems ranging from the future of the New Haven Railroad to the impact of shoe imports on Maine's economy.

Johnson named Winthrop G. Brown, now U.S. ambassador to Korea, to serve as liaison man with all the nation's governors.

"In connection with all matters concerning our relations with other nations, of course, he will be available to brief the governors and their cabinets at any time upon their request," Johnson said.

"Ambassador Brown will speak with the voice of the secretary of state."

## Blackfoot Teacher Case Resolved

BLACKFOOT, Idaho (AP) — A dispute between the Blackfoot City School Board and a junior high school teacher fired for giving a verbal "kick test" to her eighth grade class apparently has been resolved.

The two parties were close-mouthed today about the agreement, but there were indications the contract of Mrs. Barbara Latimore simply would not be renewed for next year.

Supt. T. Stoddard of the Blackfoot City Schools said the board has the right to refuse a first year teacher another contract without explanation.

Stoddard issued a statement today which said:

"The proceedings against Mrs. Latimore were dismissed on the 10th day of May, 1967, and to the satisfaction of all concerned and upon the advice and recommendation of legal counsel for both parties."

He said both sides had dismissed proceedings.

He declined to elaborate, but this appeared to mean that Mrs. Latimore was no longer fired, and that she was no longer protesting.

Stoddard said she had not returned to teaching at Blackfoot Junior High.

Mrs. Latimore and her attorney, L. F. Racine Jr., were unavailable for comment. Her husband, Lee, a teacher at Hawthorne Junior High in Pocatello, refused to talk to reporters about the matter.

The 24-year-old teacher was fired April 11. The action was taken because she asked a series of 38 questions to her class about their "sex experiences."

After she was dismissed, she hired an attorney and asked for a hearing before the board. The hearing was never held.
