

Israelis Reach Suez Canal, Claim Egypt Defeated

Israeli forces, showing no respite through Egypt's defenses, seized strategic Sharm el Sheikh today and reached the Suez Canal.

Earlier the Israelis reported their forces within 20 miles of the canal.
All this came despite the cease-fire ordered Tuesday night by the U.N. Security Council. Israel obviously was seizing territory before the cease-fire became effective.

The Soviet Union, threatening to break relations with Israel, asked the Security Council to set a 4 p.m. deadline for "Israeli agreement on the cease-fire."
On the northern front, Jordan sought a "cease-fire" as an echo to the Israelis' capture of Old Jerusalem.

Cairo admitted today that its troops had fallen back before the Israeli drive toward the canal, but there was no indication of the extent of the withdrawal.
Israel's radio said two tank columns were racing toward the canal along two paved highways through the Sinai Desert and Egypt's coast road farther north.

The Communist East German news agency said the Israelis had struck to within 25 miles of the canal along the north shore, but there was no confirmation in Israel. There was no indication of how far the tank columns were from Suez.
Hand to hand fighting between Israelis and Jordanians was reported in Bethlehem, Jesus' birthplace, 10 miles southwest of Jerusalem.

Saudi Arabia, the Middle East's second biggest oil producer, has decided to cut off oil sales at once to the countries that are helping Israel in aggression.
This presumably was aimed at the United States and Britain,

accused by the Arab countries of aiding Israel.
Iraq, Kuwait and Algeria halted the sale of oil to the western powers Tuesday.
U.N. Secretary-General U Thant cabled the Security Council's cease-fire appeal to all the belligerents shortly after the 15-nation council approved an unanimously Tuesday night Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban told the council his government welcomed the appeal but said the Arabs must accept Israel's existence as a state and its right to use the Gulf of Aqaba, its only direct route to the Red Sea and its oil supply in Iran.

Manhunt Is Called Off

CANJILON, N.M. (AP) — National Guard troops called off today their search for a band of Spanish-American fugitives in the rugged northern New Mexico mountains.
State Police Chief Joe Black said 25 of his officers would remain in the area, but the nearby 40th Army and other officers were being sent home.
The some 30 fugitives fled into the Carson National Forest on Monday after raiding a rural courthouse, wounding two officers and holding several persons hostage.
Black said he believed none of the group's leaders still were hiding in the forested hills and canyons.

Political Writer Points Out Recall Bar

BOISE (AP) — A U.S. Senate committee ruling of more than 30 years ago was cited today by a Idaho political writer as a bar against the proposed recall of Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho.
John Corlett of the Idaho Stateman said the Senate Privileges and Elections Committee ruled in 1935 that a senator was a federal officer and not subject to recall by the state he represents.
Secretary of State Pete T. Conrath, to whose office any recall petition would be presented, said he was not aware of the Senate committee ruling.
However, he said, that before accepting a petition he would ask legal advice of the attorney general's office.
A preliminary petition must contain signatures of 20 qualified voters. If it is approved, signatures of more than 25,000 voters are required before a recall election could be forced.
Conrath has turned down two preliminary petitions submitted by Gons G. Miteck of St. Maries, chairman of the "No Union in Vietnam Committee," who announced the recall move in a recent issue of the weekly administrative policy in Vietnam.
The secretary of state said he was advised a third preliminary petition, bearing the required 20 signatures, has been checked by the Kootenai County auditor's office in a letter from the state in Idaho, Don Conrath said the petition has not yet been submitted to him.

Council Holds Emergency Meet At Soviet Request

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. Security Council held an emergency session at the request of the Soviet Union today to consider further action to halt the Middle East war.
The meeting was scheduled for 12:30 p.m. approximately 90 minutes after the request from Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko was received by the council's president, Ambassador Hans R. Tabor of Denmark.
The council was awaiting responses from Israel and the Arab nations to its unanimous request for an immediate cease-fire issued Tuesday after a sudden Soviet retreat on the issue.

Governor To Begin Conferences On Topics For Special Session

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Gov. Don W. Samuelson arrives in Boise late today and will begin conferences with legislative leaders and department heads on topics for the special session of the Idaho Legislature slated June 19-20.
Samuelson has been away from the capital since last week he announced in Lewiston Saturday he would call the session after being informed that mediation assistance in negotiations on state welfare would end July 1 without corrective legislation.

Revision

CALDWELL (AP) — A former Idaho legislator suggested Wednesday a revision of the electoral college system of electing a president be revised, rather than eliminated.
Frederic H. Schwiebert, Caldwell, said direct popular election of the president would virtually eliminate any influence the small states might have.
He said he favors naming of the electors on a congressional district basis, rather than in the state at-large.

Truce Observer Shot To Death

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — An Irish member of the U.N. disarmament force here said today that a truce observer was killed early today as he drove on a road from the village of Qunetra to Damascus, Syria, the United Nations reported.

China Postpones Meet In Warsaw

WARSAW (AP) — Communist China has postponed for one week the 133rd meeting of the Chinese and American ambassadors in Warsaw, the U.S. Embassy announced.
The Chinese cited "administrative reasons" as grounds for the postponement without explaining what these were. Embassy sources said the Americans had agreed to the postponement with reluctance.

Final City Water Project Step Approved

Plans and specifications for the final phase of the Twin Falls water improvement project were approved Tuesday evening by city commission members, providing the water project will be completed by late summer or early fall.

The third phase, also the final, is to install an extensive expansion of the water distribution system, and renovation and covering of the old five-million-gallon storage reservoir south of Twin Falls.

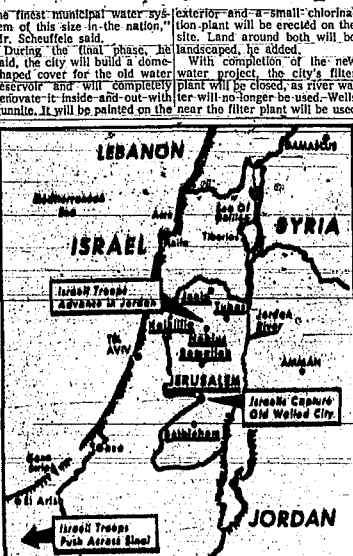
Expected to cost \$1 million, the third phase was made possible through a \$2,500,000 bond issue passed in the community, city commissioners said.

Rodney Prater, engineer with the firm of Morrison-Maierle "Associates," Helena, Mont., met with city officials in an official session Monday night to present the final plans to the city. They were sent Wednesday morning to two locations for final approval.

Approval is necessary from the Idaho Department of Health, Boise, and from the Transportation and Planning Department of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Boise, before bids can be called.

Ken Scheuffele, city engineer, said this should mean the city will be ready to call for bids on phase three by August or September, and within a year from now the entire city water program will be completed.

"We are confident this will be



to supply the old reservoir and only a small amount of chlorination plant will be erected on the site. Land around both will be landscaped, he added.

With completion of the new plant, the city's filter plant will be closed, as river water will no longer be used. Wells near the filter plant will be used.

Water from the south will flow into city lines to maintain pressure. From that direction, meeting water pumped from the Snake River Canyon springs to the north. This should insure good pressure throughout the entire system at all times of the year, Mr. Scheuffele said.

As for new distribution lines in the third phase, they will include pipe from 24 down to 6 inches in diameter. New lines are slated for South Park, West Park and extensively through new portions of the city and into areas scheduled for future development.

"Several large lines will be installed in the vicinity of the junior college property and new residential development of the north part of the city.

Because of the approximately \$1,000,000 in federal appropriations it will be possible to install additional main lines where residential development is anticipated. As the new housing projects are completed water will be immediately available upon construction of connecting lines.

Many of the lines in the third phase are also scheduled to improve connecting links in the existing system.

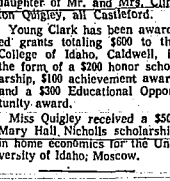
A crossing from the south of the Rock Creek is also scheduled near the golf course to tie in with lines and improve pressure in the south and west parts of the city. Industrial lines will be installed in the Chamber of Commerce site and the industrial area just south of Rock Creek.

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Vote Waxed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The way apparently has been cleared for the House to vote June 14—Flag Day—on a bill making it a federal crime to desecrate the American flag.

The measure, primarily a result of anti-Vietnam war protests which feature flag-burning, won approval Tuesday from the House Judiciary Committee. It provides for a fine of up to \$1,000 and a year in prison for violation. All the states have similar laws.

Not all the committee members approved the bill. A main argument against it is that it is "vague" and infringes on the First Amendment's guarantee of free speech.

Priests Are Polled On Celibacy Law

NEW YORK (AP)—A poll of Roman Catholic priests shows the younger ones want priests to be allowed to marry but the overall majority is opposed to such a change.

The poll asking: "Do you favor a change to optional celibacy for the diocesan clergy?" was mailed to some 1,300 priests in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut, and 2,705 responded.

The poll was taken by the Metropolitan Coordinating Committee, an affiliate of the National Association for Pastoral Renewal, which was formed last September to work toward a modification in the celibacy law.

A majority of priests in New Jersey and Connecticut who responded said celibacy should be optional. But priests in New York and Brooklyn, usually older, said they were "strongly" opposed to such a change.

The vote was 1,413 opposed to 1,331 in favor and 181 did not express an opinion.

Sponsors noted, however, that more than half of the priests responded "yes" to the question: "do you favor the readmission to the active ministry of those married priests who wish to return to priestly work?"

Examination For Accountants Set

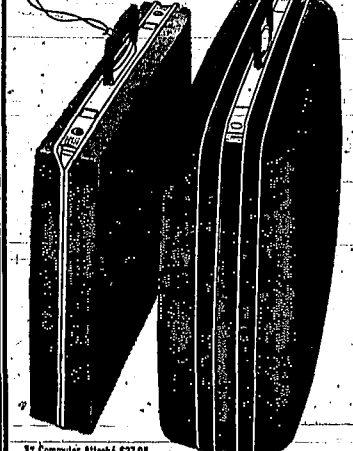
Idaho accountants planning to take the special enrollment exam, which was formerly held in November, will be notified of a modification in the exam by the Internal Revenue Service.

Council Action May Avoid U.S. Involvement

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.N. Security Council call for a cease-fire in the Middle East strengthens the possibility today that the United States can avoid military involvement in the Arab-Israeli war.
It also contributes to prospects the war may be contained in that area and that a U.S.-Soviet military confrontation there will not develop.
Overcoming these two perils has appeared a major objective of President Johnson since the war broke out unexpectedly Monday morning. This objective lay behind the statement of a neutral policy first made at the State Department a few hours after the fighting started. It also guided later efforts to back away from the neutrality idea without actually abandoning it. There has been concern here that if the conflict continued too long or if it began to turn out badly for Israel the pressures on the United States to send some kind of military assistance would become very great.

Finally Secretary of State Dean Rusk said the United States was not a "belligerent" in the conflict and urged the world to note that the word "neutrality" did not mean indifference. The fumbling for a definition raised a question not only of the real U.S. policy behind the cover of words, but also what was meant by neutrality and non-belligerent.
The simplest explanation of the difference is that neutrality is the proper term used in international law to define the position of a country which chooses not to take part in a war between two other countries. The term "non-belligerent," according to lawyers, has substantially the same meaning.
U.S. officials worried however, that overtones of the idea of neutrality would suggest the United States did not care whether Israel or the Arab states won the conflict, which in the eyes of the United States would accept defeat for Israel if the war came to that.
U.S. officials had been saying privately for days the United States did not intend to see Israel destroyed though they did not seem to fear that this was threatened. Israel's military capability has always been highly rated in Washington. The Arab governments evidently did not consider the United States impartial on the issues for they began breaking relations with Washington Tuesday.

...The debate over neutrality which arose here Monday obscured rather than clarified U.S. policy toward the conflict. In part this seems to have resulted from official explanations at a time when officials wished to avoid getting pinned down to any course of action other than President Johnson's chosen way through the United Nations.
The first comment from a State Department spokesman following a "neutral" policy reportedly brought protests to the administration from people who feared for the safety and support of Israel. Then the White House refused either to support or disavow what the State Department said.

Charge Filed Against Man For Murder

SPOKANE (AP) — A second degree murder charge was filed Tuesday against Frederick D. N. Westphal, 27, Spokane, in the slaying of Ann A. Chittenden, 45, whose body was found in a dingy alley stairwell earlier in the day.

The woman had been beaten and stabbed four times. Parts of the body were mutilated. An autopsy indicated death may have been caused by a blow to the head.
Westphal lived in an apartment house near where the body was found. Officers said it appeared the woman had been dragged from the apartment building, into the alley and dumped at the bottom of the basement stairway.

Idaho Man Dies In Utah Crash

SCOFFIELD, Utah (AP) — A Rice Idaho truck driver was killed Tuesday when his rig loaded with coal lost its brakes and overturned at the intersection of U.S. Highway 50-B and Utah 86, about 17 miles north-east of this central Utah town.
The Utah Highway Patrol identified the victim as Dale Miller, 31, an employee of the Rigby Coal and Feed Co., Rigby, Idaho.

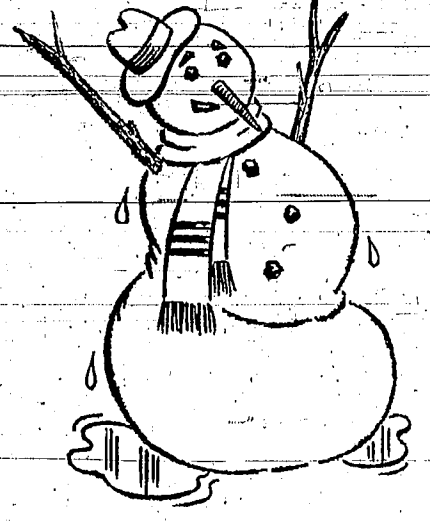

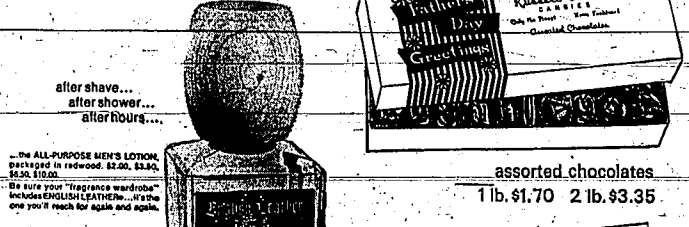
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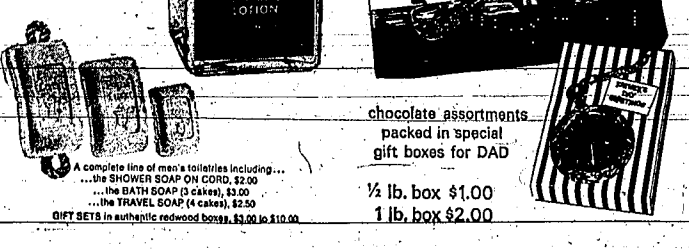

NEW YORK (NEA) — Appalling as it may seem, there are several million young people in America today who are handicapped by extreme overweight.

To their combat this serious national health problem and to give some help to many young girls, Camp Seascap on Cape Cod was organized.

It was founded primarily to provide consistent motivation, guidance, education, diet and abundant activity to help prevent the obese young girl on the hard road to normal weight.

In re-educating the campers, their attention to food and eating is diverted to other very important to replace the calories we take away—with something else. The something else need not be edible, however. It need only be an interest in something else. Instead of a full stomach we prefer an interest in a full life," explained Dr. John Spargo, director of Seascap.

Upon their arrival at Seascap, campers are organized, by age, into groups. They work together as campers, therefore making it easy for them to understand their common problem.

The actual weight is de-emphasized. The emphasis being placed rather on dress size and appearance. This is the realistic approach as the girls are concerned, here they see results.

According to Mrs. Peckos, nutritionist at the camp, "We don't advocate dietary foods as a remedy for obesity. More is to be gained by teaching these overweight children how to eat ordinary foods and get back to normal weight. Portion control is the key word."

There are no forbidden foods at Seascap. The young guests are even given desserts and candy. But the girls are taught to incorporate these goodies into their diet and still be able to lose or maintain weight. The

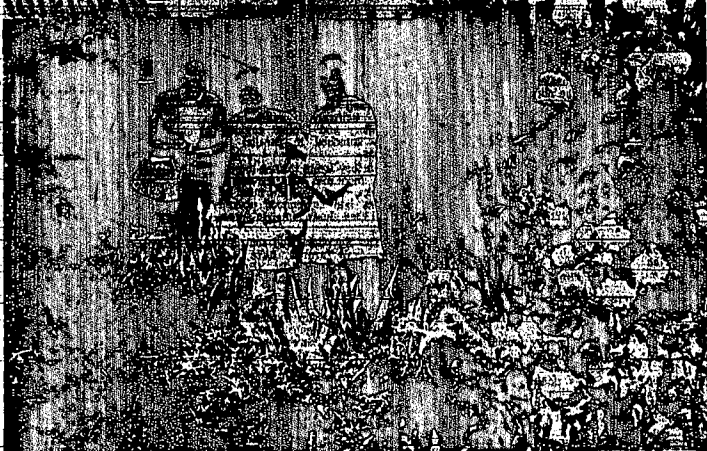

Israelis Move Rapidly Toward Objectives

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Hard-charging Israeli armored columns have moved so fast they may reach their key objectives before a U.N. proposed ceasefire can take effect, U.S. military sources say.

U.S. military officials are following reports of the progress of the Israeli advance through the Sinai Peninsula and actions elsewhere in the war zone rimming Israel.

U.S. military officials who accurately predicted the course of events, so far even before the fighting started, said it was possible the Israeli advance would start over Egypt in less time than in 1956. That conflict became known as the 100-hour war.

The main thrust of the Israeli tank and armored-halt-track units was along three roads running roughly north-south east and west through the Sinai Desert from Israel's border to the Suez Canal and the upper end of

the Gulf of Suez. Two of those roads are paved.

American military experts discounted the prospect the Israeli army would try to push a road through the canal, because of military country shielding that Egyptian city.

Another major Israeli thrust was pointed from El Kuntilla, a road junction some 35 miles northwest of the Israeli city of Elath.

The army that controls El Kuntilla dominates road radiating into southern Sinai and toward Elath, at the head of the Gulf of Aqaba.

From there, Israeli forces could knife down the west coast of the Gulf of Aqaba against an Egyptian stronghold at Sharm el Sheikh, whose main defense is the Strait of Tiran. If successful, this would crack open Egypt's blockade of the gulf.

Israeli objectives in the sector around Jerusalem are less clear. Troops of the Israeli army have punched into Jordan-

held bulges north and south of Jerusalem.

In the north, facing Syria, the Israeli army appears content to maintain a holding operation against none-too-vigorous Syrian attacks.

The Israelis are battling an Egyptian army which, before this week's fighting, was credited with being much improved over the 1956 force in training and Soviet-supplied equipment.

Also, American officials noted, the Israelis are battling a group of Arab armies and air forces this time. In 1956 the Israelis fought only Egypt.

In 1956, the British and French had forces in the fight against Egypt. Now Israel is fighting by herself.

Judging by results so far, Israeli military doctrine is proving itself.

This doctrine, based on the conviction that Israel must win a quick decision, is rooted in the idea that the only way to defend

against an armored assault is to attack using surprise, speed and maximum mobility.

Israeli tanks, infantry-carried halitacks, self-propelled artillery and combat engineers are launched in parallel columns.

As they lunge toward the enemy, their aim is to envelop his flanks, to break his men and tanks into surrounded pockets, and then shock him into surrender.

The Egyptians and some other Arab armies have been schooled in Soviet doctrine, which entails a three-line defense in depth.

The front line of such a defense is put up by tanks and self-propelled guns. Then comes a line of anti-aircraft guns. Finally, there is a belt of tank obstacles, traps and minefields.

If the Egyptians put up this kind of essentially static defense, the Israelis obviously find it only a slight deterrent.

Soviets Seem To Reject Arab Charge

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet government appeared today to have rejected the Arab charge that British and American planes were fighting for Israel, possibly because accepting it would mean the Soviet military forces should come to the aid of the Arabs.

The rejection of the charge was indicated by the failure of the tightly controlled Soviet press and radio to make any mention of it for 24 hours after Cairo radio first made the charge.

Israeli successes and Arab reversals in the Middle East war also were not reported, and the Soviet public learned of them only from widely heard foreign news broadcasts.

The leading Soviet newspaper, Pravda, published on its front page an Egyptian account claiming military successes up to Tuesday morning. It also published dispatches from abroad expressing agreement with the Soviet government's statement Monday of being strong supporters for the Arab nations, accusing Israel of aggression and demanding that Israeli troops cease fire and withdraw.

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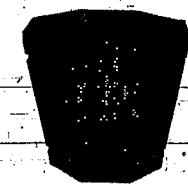
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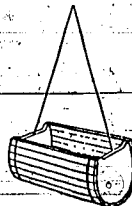
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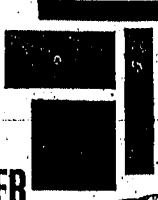
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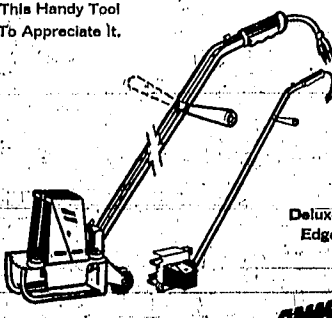
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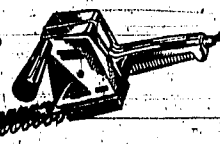
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Rail Strike Proposal Steams To Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's proposal to sidetrack — a threatened nationwide rail strike steams toward Senate debate with Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield expressing hope the measure will be in House hands by Thursday.

Mansfield called for a morning debate on the bill and put aside another measure — on congressional redistricting — originally slated to occupy the Senate floor.

Mansfield said he felt the Senate had to dispose of the rail plan this week because the Senate is expected to devote most of next week to debating a resolution — O-DConn.

Congress already has voted two extensions of the no-strike no lockout pact, and the railroads handling about 85 per cent of the nation's rail traffic.

The present extension runs out June 19.

The administration contends

that with a war on in Vietnam, a nationwide rail tieup would be a disaster.

Johnson's bill would extend the no-strike no lockout pact another 30 days during intensive mediation efforts would take place under a special five-man board he would create.

But if no settlement were reached in this time, the board could make its own determination of fair terms and order these into effect until Jan. 1, 1968.

The unions labeled the plan compulsory arbitration in hearings on the bill and urged Congress to reject it. Administration officials insisted it varied from compulsory arbitration in several ways.

The railroads said they would go along with the proposal as long as it appeared feasible to avoid a strike at this time.

Senators who supported the union's position tried unsuccessfully to amend the bill in the Labor Committee and said they

expected to renew their efforts in the floor debate.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., lost narrowly in committee on a proposal to add a provision imposing the railroads' profits for the seizure period.

Yarborough said he was trying to find a way to "balance the scales" and not put all the pressure on the unions under the bill.

The unions contended that under the President's proposal they would lose the right to

strike, would be forced to accept a government-decreed settlement of terms and undoubtedly would have to take lower pay scales than they could justify — their "lower economic strength."

The Senate committee approved the measure 14-2 Tuesday after rejecting all amendments.

The House Commerce Committee scheduled its final public hearings on the legislation for today.

Arab Refugee Problem Violent

Until the problem of the Arab refugees from Israel is solved, the Middle East will remain politically explosive and a danger to world peace, but the problem seems utterly insoluble.

For almost 20 years, a quest for a solution has been going on. Neutralists close to Middle East problems saw three basic ways to approach the problem of establishing stability:

One was to seek a method to resettle the refugees. It failed. Another was to seek political settlement between Israel and the Arab nations so some refugees could return to their former homes. It failed. The third way was war. It, too, has failed so far — with the Arabs not strong enough to accomplish a solution by means of battle.

The slogan uniting all Arabs against Israel is a cry for "liberating the Arab homeland." Its emotional appeal, far from abating over two decades, has become stronger as the parent passes the word to child.

The problem was created at the outset of the Palestine war of 1948, when Jewish forces storming through Arab villages, expelled the inhabitants and sent them fleeing behind the protection of Arab lines.

Hundreds of thousands were displaced this way. Nobody knows the exact figure. Over the years, their numbers have grown by the natural process.

Today, by best estimates, perhaps a few more than a million persons claim the status of refugee.

They have lived in slums in the outskirts of cities in Lebanon, Syria and Jordan, and in the Gaza Strip which Egypt occupied on Israel's southwest Mediterranean coast after the war. They were a constant source of political ferment, an easy prey to pan-Arab agitation stirred up by the followers of Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser.

Only some of the families who fled before the Israeli troops eventually wound up in other Arab countries. Most clung tenaciously to their status as refugees. They said that to do otherwise would be to imply forfeiting their right to return to their former homes.

For the little kingdom of Jordan, they became a grave problem. Jordanians feel themselves superior, intellectually

and otherwise, to the Bedouins who hail from the east side of the Jordan River and who made up the tiny never-never land of Transjordan before 1950.

In that year, Transjordan's King Abdullah annexed Palestine territory on the west side of the river fronting on Israel. By doing so he tripled the country's population and left a massive constant headache for the future king of Jordan.

In the capital, Amman, refugees were provided into the Majidiya Souk, a hothbed of riot, most of them hating the king. Only a third of Jordan's refugees lived in camps. Others lived in its shacks, took huts, some in no homes at all, just carrying about their worldly goods in boxes, sleeping and eating wherever they could. The Jordanian government could not ignore them. It gave them a vote, places in the Cabinet and in the legislature.

In Lebanon and Syria the ref-

ugees live in mud huts or concrete block shacks, and hoods constantly about their former homeland, prompting Israel to retaliation.

While Israel feels itself stronger than all the Arabs combined, there seems no prospect of persuading the Israelis to make concessions on the refugee problem. Israel says the Arabs fled their homes of their own accord and thus are not Israel's responsibility. The Arabs say they were driven out by Israel.

Israel has never moved to negotiate on the question of repatriating Arabs. The Arabs steadfastly refuse to give up their claims to lands the Jews inhabit. They have refused even to let United Nations investigators take a refugee census, for fear it would show reductions and make a less impressive refugee figure than the 1.3 million they claim.

The Arabs' building up for the new war, did so on the claim that they were going to restore their brethren to their rights. It is a battery no Arab ruler dares to resist.

Education Moves In Silent Revolution

NEW YORK (NAP) — A decade ago, no one had heard the words "community tutorial." Five years ago, only a handful of unassuming programs existed. Today, over 1,200 colleges and universities have tutorial programs in which over 250,000 college students spend over seven million hours annually tutoring children from underprivileged areas.

The student-manned community tutorial movement is beginning an educational revolution. It has generated fascinating and effective new teaching techniques. Tutors and their pupils, or "tutees," don't read "Dick and Jane." At the San Francisco State College Tutorial Project, for example, the tutor sits down with his "tutee" and asks him to tell the most exciting story of his life. The story is tape-recorded and transcribed exactly. The child learns to read from the story he wrote — the story he is interested in because it is about him, not about Dick or Jane.

The campus tutorial project has dealt with the fundamental problem of motivation more successfully than have formal educational institutions.

Children teach as well as learn

in some tutorial projects. In a Philadelphia tutorial, eighth graders teach sixth graders; sixth graders, fourth graders, and everyone teaches the tutor. Tests taken by young tutors in a New York project showed that they advanced three years and four months in silent reading ability while a group of students who had not tutored advanced only one year and seven months.

The campus tutorial project affords personal teaching-learning relationships in a mass society. In all its projects on North Carolina campuses, Youth Educational Services (YES) has encouraged a pattern of one-to-one tutoring. No tutor wants to be a status symbol to his charges but he isn't displeased when one of his tutees says, "I have my own special teacher."

In short, tutorial programs have put the heart back in learning — by making learning what the child not only wants to learn but does not feel afraid where there is time for a personal relationship to develop and it is encouraged, where a college student is completely free to teach creatively.

Derner, an untested politician prior to a May 18 primary in which he placed second in a five-man field, smashed Roosevelt's bid for reelection.

Roosevelt, 55, son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, had said before the election that his political ambitions were limited to Miami Beach.

With machine ballots in all 25 precincts counted, Derner had 8,384 votes to 8,100 for Roosevelt. Election officials said less than 600 absentee ballots remained to be tabulated.

The son of a restaurant owner, Derner is president of the Miami Beach Bar Association. He had been given only a slight chance to win Tuesday's election.

Roosevelt's administration, Derner charged, was pitted by pickering and fighting that spoiled its effectiveness.

Derner trailed Roosevelt by almost 2,000 votes in the May 18 election, but he trimmed the field in Miami Beach's nonpartisan election.

Roosevelt was elected mayor in 1965 when he defeated incumbent Melvin Richard, a veteran of 18 years in the city's political life.

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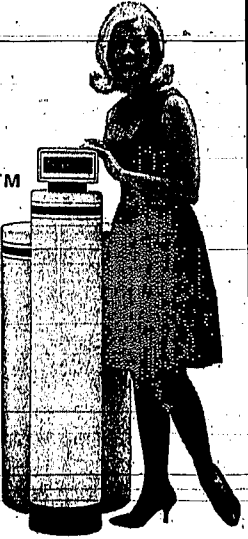

Each of the 20 big league teams selected one player from each selection. Each of the Class Triple A farms was allowed one pick from the Class C clubs had unlimited selection rights.

Following the regular phase, involving the newly eligible players, the National League was to be held. That covered players drafted previously but not signed.

Of 150 players picked by the majors, there were six pitchers, four catchers, three shortstops, three third basemen, two first basemen and two out-

fielders. Under the new college rule, no players can be selected while attending a four-year college unless they are 21 years old. The Los Angeles Dodgers, drafting 20th and last, picked Don Ray Denbow, a 24-1/2, 185-pound third baseman from Dallas, Texas, who is a junior at Southern Methodist but who celebrated his 21st birthday last Monday.

Most of the draftees are high school boys who will be graduated in a few days.

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Doctor Writes Book On Prescription Drugs

NEW YORK — (AP) — The high price of prescription drugs is a hard pill to swallow for the person who must take Whastix for weeks of even years.
 Setting out to pressure doctors to change this situation is one of their colleagues, Dr. Richard Burack, a Boston internist and clinical associate at Harvard Medical School, has compiled a \$1.95 paper back which many think will rock the drug industry much as Ralph Nadler's "Unsafe at Any Speed" did the auto manufacturers.
 Called "The Handbook of Prescription Drugs, Office Names, and Sources for Patient and Doctor," the book urges doctors to write less expensive prescriptions for safe, effective drugs by using their generic names. (Each new drug receives a generic or official name and a brand name selected by the manufacturer who developed the drug. After 17 years other firms can produce and sell a drug under its generic name.)
 "Why?" Burack asks, "should you pay \$25.50 for Whastix when it is possible to buy it as oxybuty for \$5?"
 "Helping him put this question before the public recently was Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., in a major speech before Congress on drug industry practices. Burack, his wife and five children beamed down from the Senate gallery.
 Burack admits the listing of drugs and prices was not his idea. "Each of my medical carter, a druggist with a social conscience pointed out I could write lower priced prescriptions for generic names." As a result he began to compile a list and made up mimeographed sheets to be used in teaching hospitals. These were to help students keep up with new drugs after a course in pharmacology which most take in the second year of medical school. "After that," he points out, "the student relies on clinicians to guide him in prescribing drugs."
 Burack blames doctors for relying heavily upon pharmaceutical firms to keep them informed on drugs. He criticizes manufacturers for allowing the price of brand name products by their extensive advertising. Doctors may turn to one or two official drug reference books for help but Burack feels these, too, are influenced by ad pressures.
 "Burack feels his book won't confuse the consumer and believes its real value will be to simplify things for the doctor."
 "I would like to see it used regularly in training hospitals. My own role in drug selection is that of just a doctor," he adds. "Dissemination of information as an educator and any legislation is up to the legislators."
 "I have found," he says, "that most druggists are humane and helpful. They will stock a generic drug if they know customers need it. There is no reason why a druggist can't stock up even if he has to sell to the consumer a more expensive brand name drug first."
 "The more aware consumer," he feels, "may remind his doctor to suggest a generic drug to save him money." Currently, though, the consumer is bored in using the same generic name written by generic name then the druggist must fill the order by brand name even if a less expensive equivalent is available. This is true in 39 states.
 Another practice the former Coast Guard medic officer would like to see checked is that most druggists will dispense a brand name containing the same active ingredients even if a doc-

for orders the generic Burack wonders if it will be possible to change the doctor's habit of writing 90 per cent of their prescriptions in brand names.
 An industry argument against this is that the millions lost to them will throttle their research for new wonder drugs. Accord-

Egyptian Missiles Fail To Make Appearance

WASHINGTON (AP) — What's happened to Egypt's missiles?
 Three years ago, President Gamal Abdel Nasser watched four rockets test-fired from a base north of Cairo and indicated they could hit Israel. He said then the rockets were made entirely in the United Arab Republic and that they were in full production.
 But so far in the new Arab-Israeli war, there has been no mention of the use of any surface-to-surface missiles.
 The Egyptians were reported to have developed three types of rockets, two of them military and one designed for scientific experimentation.
 "The most powerful missile

was said to have been built to carry a warhead up to 375 miles. This would cover all of Israel's American military experts have been skeptical for some time that the Egyptians actually have any kind of a missile force which would work, even though the Egyptians were reported to have had help from West German rocket scientists.
 "Also, there never has been any evidence that the Egyptians have any nuclear warheads. Without such a warhead, a missile is not much more than long-range artillery which could have a nuisance effect, but which could not inflict widespread damage with only a high explosive warhead."
 "The Institute for Strategic

Studies reported late last year that the Egyptians had organized a missile command of about 4,000 men, including civilian technicians.
 "About 100 missiles have probably been built," the institute said, "although considerable help from West Germany has been made."
 "The strategic studies group said there is no evidence that the Egyptians have developed a

reliable guidance system for these missiles." In other words, they couldn't be sure the missiles would hit where they aimed them—which may be a key explanation for their absence in this war.

Jamming Of Calls Brings FCC Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission is trying to determine whether radio jammers are jamming wounded servicemen in the Vietnam area are being jammed deliberately by a ham operator in the Watts area of Los Angeles.

 No amateur operator has exclusive rights to any given frequency. But groups of hams often come together on specified frequencies at certain times to relay calls like those from the hospital ship, which is about 160 kilometers away from the frequency used by the Sanctuary.

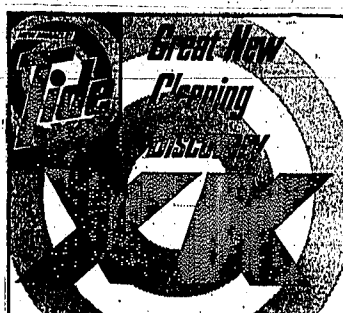

Russ Interest In Advertising Believed To Be Hopeful Sign

 NEW-YORK (NEA)—One might not long ago foreign diplomats attending the French embassy reception in an elegant Moscow restaurant were startled when at an early hour, all the Russian dignitaries left in their black, chauffeur-driven limousines.
 The remaining diplomats were in a turmoil. Only an earth-shaking event would detach the ever-hungry Russians from the buffet tables, growing under hams, turkeys and caviar.
 Had the Kremlin summoned its-commissioners to authorize a final visit to the city? Or had the Kremlin decided on a perilous confrontation with the Americans in Vietnam?
 Actually, the Soviet wheels were speeding home to watch a revolutionary innovation on Soviet television—the first Russian plural is correct—the first U.S.A. commercial ran bunched together, one after the other, and they begged for brand names, for there are no individual brands in Russia, but general products and places.
 One showed a buson, thirty last lady healthy as any 4-Cubber, urging viewers to "Drink more tomato juice—it's healthy." Another showed a fine sweep of Black Sea with an announcer said: "Rest this summer in Yalta, so you can work the commercial run uninterrupted seven straight minutes!—Yes, advertising has come to the U.S.R. after years of wrangling between the Old Ideological Establishment which asks: "Would Marx approve, comrades? Is the New Realistic Establishment, which asks: "Will it sell, comrade?"
 Oddy-enough, Soviet egg-heads have been out for importing Madison Avenue to Corick Street. Recently Russia's intellectual "Literary Gazette" sprouted older readers by complimenting American men in gray flannel trousers.
 "We—Russians," editorialized the magazine, "must improve the quantity and quality of consumer goods. One way is to create public demand for more and better goods through advertising. We can learn a lot from the Americans."
 "Without excellent advertising the United States would never be able to eat all that it consumes. Which makes us think: There is no stimulus in Russia and growing like people sprouts or spinach because there is no demand."
 "Only advertising can create a demand for Russian exports and only advertising—polish American-style advertising."

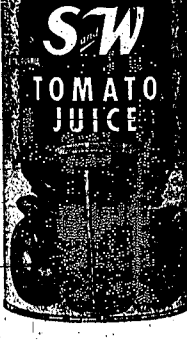



Disneyland Faces New Era

ANAHEIM, Calif. (NEA)—The trouble with tomorrow is that it becomes yesterday very quickly. That's what happened to Tomorrowland, one of the subdivisions of Disneyland here, which became so outmoded by real events that it is now being almost completely rebuilt.

While Tomorrowland didn't exactly become Yesterdayland, it had lost a lot of excitement. One of the attractions was a Rocket to the Moon ride—designed originally in 1955 by Werner von Braun—but science had gone so far that the ride was no longer very tomorrowish.

Now a new flight to the moon is being built, incorporating the latest dreams of visionaries and the latest facts of science. The rebuilding of Tomorrow-

land is costing \$20 million, which is \$3 more than the entire park cost originally. And a stroll around the area shows why. Six vast and costly new attractions are being built. Hundreds of workmen are rushing to get them finished by summer.

One of the most ambitious of the new features is the People-Mover, also, sometimes called the WEDway, after Walt E. Disney's initials. This will take people on cars through the entire area on a new kind of transportation system. The cars move on an endless belt and never stop, but the passengers board and disembark via a platform that moves into synchronization with the cars.

Another exhibit, and is a duplicate of an attraction the Disney people built for the New York World's Fair. The audience revolves around a circular stage, on which audio-animatronic figures portray the progress of mankind.

There will also be an expanded and modernized "America the Beautiful" exhibit, in which the audience sees a motion picture.
