Mariner 5 Off For Venus



THUNDERING upward on the tip of this fiery Atlas-Agena rocket, America's Mariner 5 spacecraft successfully roared toward Venus today. The craft, which blasted off at 2:01 a.m. (EDT) from Cape Kennedy, is chasing a heavier Russian Venus probe launched two days earlier, rocketing from Cape Kennedy at 2:01 a.m. EDT today on the first U.S. venture to Venus since 1962.

The 3,300-pound Mariner 5, less than one-quarter the weight of the Soviet Union's Venus 4 craft launched two days earlier, rocketed from Cape Kennedy at 2:01 a.m. EDT today on the first U.S. venture to Venus since 1962. The probe is expected to reach Venus in about 110 days. Project officials reported after tracking the spacecraft for several hours, Mariner 5's trajectory is well within the capability of an onboard motor to adjust its path later in the flight, they said.

"Spacecraft performance also appears to be very good," said Allen E. Wolfe, Mariner 5 systems manager for the Jet Propulsion Laboratory at Pasadena, Calif., which oversees the Mariner 5 project. Wolfe said experiments to study radiation in interplanetary space were turned on and the craft's four power-producing solar cells deployed. Guidance sensors aboard the \$15-million Mariner 5 locked onto the sun for orientation as planned.

During a brief 20-minute encounter Oct. 19 when Mariner 5 is to pass within 2,000 miles of Venus, electronic signals of high-frequency radio waves were to penetrate through dense Venusian clouds to study radiation levels and atmospheric temperatures, pressure and density. These findings would be important to scientists trying to decide whether Venus can support life.

Moisture Puts 2,000 Phones Out Of Order

About 2,000 Twin Falls residents were without telephone communication Wednesday when moisture caused an outage in a large section of town according to Mountain States Telephone officials. They said the northeast and northwest sections town were affected when rain drenched a large feeder cable running along Sheehon Street. Art Davis, local manager of Mountain States Telephone, said the outage was caused by the cable system being flooded, causing the extreme dampness. The 2,000 disrupted phones, about a seventh of the total connections in Twin Falls, were still out at 1 p.m., but Mr. Davis said he expected service to be restored late Wednesday afternoon as soon as the cable was dried.

He was a member of the Fish and Game Commission nine years ago and resigned. When he resigned then, Gov. Robert F. Smylie named Cullen to the post.

Tornadoes Rip Through Nebraska

By The Associated Press — Tornadoes roared through the night in Nebraska and heavy rains and high winds were widespread today. The weather bureau said at least 21 twisters were reported in 24 hours — mostly in south central and east central Nebraska. Tornadoes damaged homes and farm buildings in Wall Hill, Osceola and Ashlin in Nebraska. There were no reports in Iowa. "Thunderstorms swept from the International area and central Rockies to the Midwest, leaving heavy rain fell in western Nebraska and sent rivers and streams over their banks. More than 5 inches of rain fell in Riverside, Neb., and 2.40 inches in Bradshaw, Neb.

Tampa And Cincinnati Negro Riots Continue

Justifiable Homicide Ruled In Shooting

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — The killing of a Negro youth by a white policeman — the incident that triggered Tampa's first major race riot — was ruled justifiable homicide today by State Atty. Paul Antinori. Negro leaders had predicted, they said, such a decision would lead to renewed violence in the city, and Tampa's NAACP president, Robert Glider, was asked immediately afterward about his own plans. "My plans are to go pray," Glider retorted. "And I definitely suggest that the whole of Tampa be the same." News that Patrolman James R. Calvert had shot 19-year-old Martin Chambers in the back of the head through Negro neighborhoods Sunday night, triggering three nights of shooting, burning and looting. Antinori said that Chambers had committed burglary and grand larceny, was running from police and was about to escape when Calvert shot him. "Under the facts, circumstances, evidence and law of the State of Florida," Antinori said, "the death of Martin Chambers must be ruled justifiable homicide." Antinori said that "you're going to have a very small segment of violent people and demonstrators who are not going to accept this ruling." "We cannot simply 'for the purpose of appeasement, discard the laws," he said. "To do so would be to say that society is nothing, the law is nothing." Antinori said that he would be in Tampa Tuesday night, but withheld until this morning on orders from Gov. Claude Kirk. Antinori said his investigation considered only the question of whether the shooting as described under oath by Calvert and witnesses, including the dead youth's 14-year-old brother, was manslaughter or justifiable homicide. Soviets Press For Emergency Session

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Soviet Union pressed today for an emergency session of the U.N. General Assembly to take action against Poland — amid speculation that Premier Alexei N. Kosygin might attend. The Security Council was scheduled to meet today on a Soviet resolution calling for Israel to withdraw immediately from the territory it seized in its blitz war against Egypt, Jordan and Syria. Council delegates believed the resolution would give only four of the nine votes needed for adoption, clearing the way for action on the Soviet request for the assembly to meet. Following defeat of the Soviet resolution, Secretary-General U. Thant would call the 122 U.N. members by telegram and a necessary majority of 67 countries was expected to agree to the emergency session. Thant would be likely to call the session on 24 hours' notice. Speculation that the Soviet premier would attend stemmed from a letter from Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko to Thant Tuesday saying "lead-

Russia Ready To Join In Weapon Halt

LUXEMBOURG (AP) — Russia today was reported ready to join the United States in moves for speedier international action to halt the spread of nuclear weapons. Secretary of State Dean Rusk advised fellow foreign ministers of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization that the Russians have agreed in recent days to the presentation of a jointly drafted but incomplete treaty of nonproliferation to the Geneva Disarmament Conference. The American-Soviet draft that is being prepared to go before the 17-nation Geneva conference would contain Article 3, dealing with the sort of controls and safeguards needed to insure that signatory countries do not cheat. The focus in today's debate was on the Middle East and France's foreign minister, Maurice Couve de Murville, declared French opposition to imposition of any United Nations settlement in the area. Later the ministers went to secret session on Vietnam.

Financing Bill Okayed By House

WASHINGTON (AP) — History's biggest appropriation bill, a \$70-billion Defense Department measure, went to the Senate today described as a House expression of all-out support for the U.S. military effort in Vietnam. The cleared the House late Tuesday 407 to 1 after predictions the \$20.3 billion it earmarked for the Vietnam war wouldn't be enough to meet demands for stepped up Vietnam military operations. The money, added to \$12.7 billion available from previous bills, would finance Defense Department activities for the fiscal year starting July 1. It was the largest amount of money ever brought before Congress. At the height of World War II, defense appropriations totaled \$50 billion but were provided in several bills. Rep. George E. Brown, D-Calif., cast the only dissenting vote Tuesday.

Protection Plan Urged In Land Sale

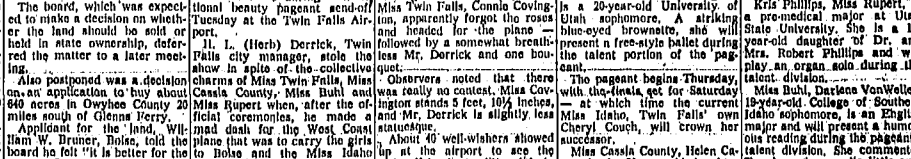
BOISE (AP) — A Boise resident urged members of the Idaho Land Board Tuesday to require prospective developers to submit a protection plan for the Payette River Channel prior to sale of state land. Peter Johnson, Boise, who told members how a "buy" about the proposed sale of 1,700 acres of state-owned land north of Payette Lake by the U.S. Forest Service, including industrialist Jack Simplot — have indicated they would like to buy the land to develop it into a resort and recreation area. Johnson urged that preparation of a river protection plan be required to assure non-pollution of the Payette River or Payette Lake should be made a precondition to any sale of the land. 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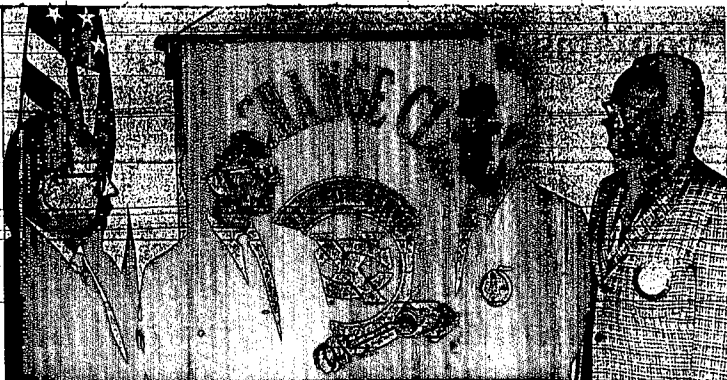

LOS ANGELES (NEA)
Nyah, nyah, nyah. (That's a continual emotional counter.)
The man who makes that drastic character analysis is Everett L. Shostrom, a practicing psychologist. His new book, "Man, The Manipulator," discusses the ways in which of us adopt a pose in order to control others.
Shostrom divides people into two groups — those who cast themselves as "Top Dogs" and those who work out of an "Underdog" posture. Within each of the categories, Shostrom pictures four types of manipulation devices:
Top dogs can be an over-critical judge, an overaggressive bully, a calculator, who exaggerates his ability to control, or a dictator, who exaggerates his strength.
Underdogs, as Shostrom sees them, are either an over-sensitive weakling, a super-dependent clinging-vine, an overly warm nice guy, or a protector, who exaggerates his sympathy and support.
I asked Shostrom to apply his theory to celebrities, and see how they fit into his psychological gallery. In effect, this is a kind of instant psychoanalysis of the stars. Here is how he saw them:
Elizabeth Taylor: A female lion.
Her husband, Richard Burton, plays the Nice Guy. Shostrom says this is a typical case of Top Dog-Underdog interplay. "Their marriage must be a continual emotional counter."
(Incidentally, Shostrom believes that in any battle between a Top Dog and an Underdog, the Underdog always wins.)
Frank Sinatra: An emotional Bully, strong and assertive. Mia Farrow, Mrs. Sinatra, is a Weakling, but also something of a Calculator. Mia plays the Underdog-to-Frank's Top Dog; but the Underdog is winning.
Zsa Zsa Gabor: A typical female Calculator. "She uses her beauty to calculate and get what she wants by playing stupid. She's a Clinging Vine, but calculatedly."
Twiggy: A Weakling. "She brings out the Protector in men."
Julie Christie: Another Weakling, but she calculates her weakness—wearing a miniskirt to the Academy Awards was sheer calculation."
Paul Newman: "The Bully Image."
Rock Hudson: "The Nice Guy Image."
The Beatles — They are Judges—"rebel Judges, who say we're not going to play your way, we're going to play our way."
Ringo Starr projects the Weakling image — "the stupid look is the game of the Weakling."
Debbie Reynolds—A Nice-Guy girl, but "underneath I see a strong Calculator."
Julia Andrews—A Protector, exhibiting "the image of virtue, but underneath I think she's very strong, a Dictator."
The Kennedys—Shostrom sees Bobby as a Bully, Ted as a Nice Guy and the late President John Kennedy as "a combination of both—assertive but good."
In Shostrom's terms, an Actualizer is someone who has stopped manipulating and begun living a full life, treating others as persons rather than healthy things to be used. As examples, among those in the public eye, he cites Bing Crosby—"assertive yet tender"—and Bob Hope—"a pretty good balance."
As for the movie-going public, Shostrom analyzes us this way:
"People go to the movies to watch others get emotional. They get vicarious emotional thrills. They say, 'Gee, em,' and can enjoy emotions without becoming involved. It isn't healthy."

Satellite Communications May Soon Shrink World Into Single Time Zone

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top U.S. space official says satellite communications and supersonic transportation soon will shrink the world-into acceptance of a single time zone.
Leonard Jaffe, director of space applications programs for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, predicted worldwide acceptance of a single time zone, with a standardized length day lasting 23 hours and 56 minutes.
Under a single time zone, New York would observe noon during darkness part of the year, he said.
But Jaffe said a day four minutes shorter than present would give everyone an equal number of days in each year, with sunlight during working hours. Clock-time and sun-time no longer would synchronize.
"It would be noon for everyone in the world at the same time, even though the sun is at its zenith in New York while it is below the horizon elsewhere," he said.
Jaffe said in a Thursday speech to the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association that the problem of multiple time zones is exemplified by planned, June 25 global television program.
"The telecast, made possible by use of four communications satellites, will be viewed simultaneously in virtually all the world's time zones."
He said time variations between nations now are an accepted inconvenience, but "as our business and cultural patterns change in this space era, these time differences will become intolerable."
"The new world of communications and transportation will create a smaller, more unified world. This 'one world' will probably require 'one time.'"
Jaffe said establishment of a common time, and acceptance of a day not geared to the rising and setting of the sun, would make possible maximum use of global facilities.
"Just imagine three-shift use of our roads, our schools, our factories, our communications and transportation facilities," he said.
"Our current facilities theoretically could handle three times as many people."
Jaffe said 24 nations will take part June 25 in the most extensive connection of television transmission facilities ever put together.
"Just imagine—people from Vladivostok to Tokyo, around the world the long way from Sydney to Australia, will be simultaneously watching the same program," he said.
He said that for at least two hours two Intelsat satellites, one over the Pacific, and a Soviet Molniya 1 satellite over the Asian continent — along with thousands of miles of conventional ground distribution circuits — will be tied together in a single global system.

Jerusalem's Gates Are Thrown Open

JERUSALEM (AP) — The gates of Jerusalem's Old City were thrown open today for tens of thousands of Israelis to celebrate the ancient harvest feast of Shabouth at the Wailing Wall, Judaism's most sacred site.
A stream of men, women and children from all parts of the country arrived at the venerable area in what seemed to be one of the biggest pilgrimages in the history of the 3,000-year-old city. An estimated 150,000 Jews crossed over from Israel proper by early afternoon.
The former slum area to the west of the wall has been bulldozed away since Israeli forces took the Old City last week. They cleared a wide space around the 60-foot high wall, last remnant of the second Jewish temple that was destroyed by the Romans in 70 A.D. Now it can be seen in all its imposing might.
There Orthodox Jews wearing white-prayer shawls swayed back and forth, lamenting the destruction of the ancient temple.

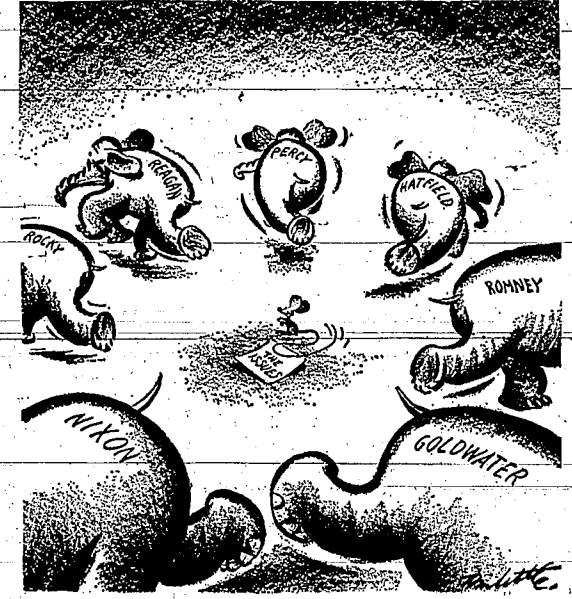

 A defense appropriations bill approved by the House Tuesday included \$1.9 million to cover the cost of ammunition given by the Army's Division of Civilian Shooting Clubs around the country.
 "These clubs all are affiliated with the NRA. An Army regulation permits only NRA members to get the ammunition."
 NRA affiliates also are the only groups eligible for another DCM program under which military weapons are lent to civilian shooting clubs for practice and familiarization.
 How much of NRA's membership of 823,000 can be attributed to the link with DCM no one can say but NRA mentions the arrangement frequently in its advertisements for new members.
 The free ammunition and training of the guns are all part of long-standing Army policy.
 Men who learn about guns as civilians, the theory goes, make good marksmen when they go into uniform.
 "These weapons and ammunition are used only for prescribed military courses, of fire," NRA's public affairs director, John Hess, said. "Every bullet fired is accounted for by NRA," he said.
 The advisory board that guides the DCM program, the National Board for Promotion of Rifle Practice, also has a strong NRA flavor. Its members include the president, executive-vice-president and four advisory council members of the NRA.
 But the embrace is being loosened. An attempt is being made by Secretary of the Army Stanley R. Resor to get a broader range of viewpoints on the board.
 And the NRA's authority to be the only source nominating civilians to the board ended last year and these nominations now can come from a variety of sources, said the board's executive officer, Lt. Col. Joseph B. Berry.
 Because of its strong opposition to some gun control bills Congress is considering, NRA is often accused of being the dominant force in a powerful national gun lobby.
 Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., author of one of the strictest gun control bills and a principal target for those opposed to strict controls, says the position is powerful but not centrally directed.
 He gets it from all directions — from the NRA, other members of Congress, gun magazines, manufacturers, weapons importers and gun owners everywhere.
 "I think it's a loose thing," Dodd said of the opposition. "I think they're acting independently of one another."
 An aide to Sen. Roman Hruska, R-Nebr., sponsor of a bill less stringent than Dodd's, sees the people fighting the various legislative proposals as large in numbers but hardly a unified force.
 "Compared with organized labor and the AMA," he said, "these people aren't even in the same league."
 The Dodd bill would outlaw interstate mail-order sales of handguns—pistols and revolvers—to individuals, although a person could make a mail-order purchase by having his local dealer place the order for him.
 It would permit mail-order sales of rifles and shotguns, after the seller notified police in the purchaser's area of the impending sale. An additional seven-day wait would then be required before the weapon could be mailed.
 The Johnson administration has offered an even tougher bill that would prevent mail-order sales of shotguns, rifles and handguns.

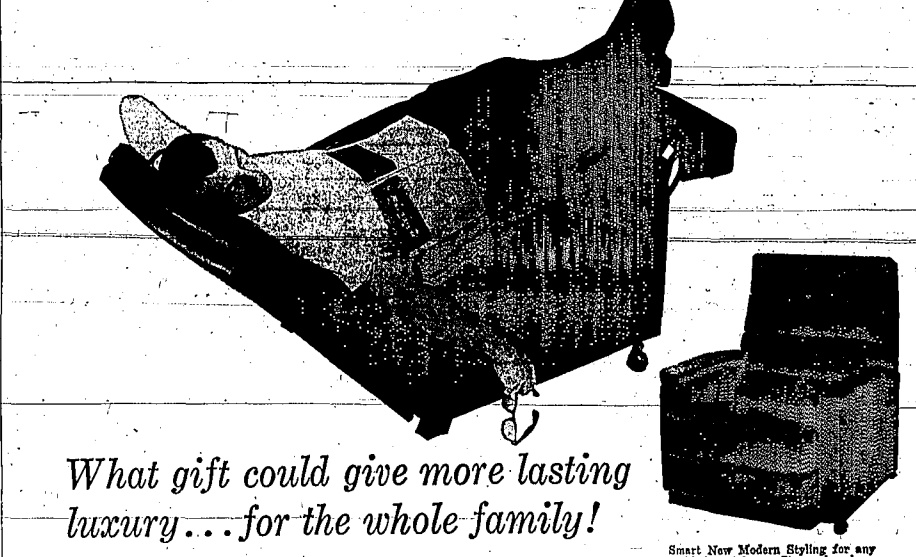
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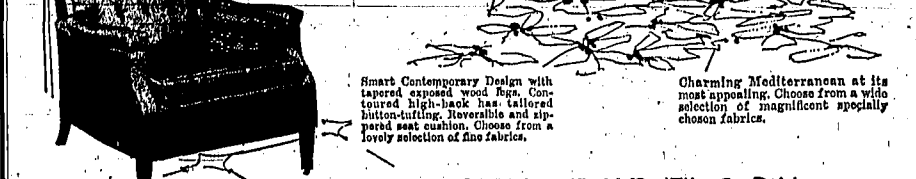

Appointment Of Negro Certain To Be OK'd

BY JACK BELL

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's appointment of Solicitor General Thurgood Marshall to the Supreme Court is the first Negro named to the post. It appears certain to be confirmed when the Senate gets to it.

Johnson's announcement Tuesday that he is nominating Marshall, 56, to succeed retiring Associate Justice Tom C. Clark surprised neither the solicitor general nor his supporters.

A senator who maintains close relations with the President said he felt certain Clark's successor would be either a Negro or a woman.

"That man is going to be first in everything he can," the senator said. "If there is another vacancy, we'll have a woman member of the court."

And "White House" aide said he suspected Johnson deeply wanted to be the first president to nominate a Negro to the court, and he was the first to nominate a Negro to the cabinet when he picked Robert C. Weaver for secretary of housing and urban development.

The general opinion among senators was that Johnson's selection of Marshall represented a bid for support in Johnson's expected bid for re-election next year.

White House officials indicated they were uncertain about the reaction—the nomination would receive in the Senate and were prepared for noisy opposition from long-time segregationists and, perhaps, from some others who may have been disturbed by the so-called black power movement.

However, they said Johnson looked upon Marshall as a symbol of Negro progress through full implementation of legal processes, as contrasted with mob violence.

Johnson, they said, had been thinking about Marshall as a potential Supreme Court justice for a long time and has been mindful that the emergence of the black power stalwarts might work against his choice.

But they said he felt he could not stand aside and lose the momentum they said he has gained through persistent espousal of the Negro cause.

In announcing the selection in the White House rose garden with the nominee at his side, Johnson said Marshall had earned and deserved a place on the high court and is the man best qualified for the job by training and experience.

He said Marshall had lost only eight of 52 cases he argued before the Supreme Court.

"I believe he has already earned his place in history," the President said.

Although Marshall predicted there may be a long delay in confirmation, Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen earlier approval. He said the appointment will ameliorate racial tensions "because it demonstrates that 'Negroes' can reach the top of the heap."

Asked if he felt the appointment represented the Johnson civil rights program for 1957, Dirksen grinned and said he didn't see much chance for any new legislation.

The appointment of the former U.S. Circuit Court judge and chief legal officer for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People obviously did not please some Southerners who have opposed Marshall's views on civil rights questions.

But the changing times which have recorded gains in the legal rights of Negroes appeared to be reflected in the softened attitude of some Southerners to the questions.

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., said he will oppose confirmation and does not believe in the doctrine of states' decisions—letting decided matters stand.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D-La., said he was "neither surprised nor disappointed" by the appointment.

Among Southerners who class themselves as liberals, Sens. George A. Smathers, D-Fla., and Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., praised the appointment and forecast relatively speedy confirmation.

Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., assistant Democratic leader, said, "I have no race prejudices, but I am a direct constructionist and I believe the Constitution means what it says. This man has a record of judicial legislation and no record on Tuesday."

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., said he will oppose confirmation, not because Marshall is a Negro, but because he does not agree with Marshall's interpretation of constitutional questions.

Sen. Sources at the White House said Johnson did not do much sounding out of Senate opinion before submitting the nomination. And they said he got the American-Bar Association's support on Marshall only on Tuesday.

Israeli Win May End War In Yemen

BEIRUT (AP) — The question of whether Israel's blitz victory over the Egyptians may be an end to the civil war in Yemen—either through a quick and bloody Royalist victory or by a peace agreement.

The destruction of much of Egypt's air force and army raises the question of whether President Gamal Abdel Nasser, with his economy teetering on the edge of ruin, can afford the men, money and material which are the mainstay of the Yemeni Republican regime. The fighting in Yemen, largely forgotten in the crisis with Israel, began in 1962 when rebel army officers threw Imam Mohammed el Badr off his 11-century-old throne and set up a republic in

the Red Sea Kingdom in the southwest corner of Arabia.

The Imam rallied loyal tribesmen for war and Nasser sent more than 70,000 troops to shore up the rebel regime led by bearded, sullen Col. Abdullah al-Sallal.

Alarmed by the presence of the Egyptian Army on his border, Saudi Arabia threw its support behind the Royalists.

Principally commanders of the Royalist forces claim the death toll in Yemen goes into the hundreds, of thousands. They say some 30,000 Egyptian soldiers have been killed or wounded in the fighting.

Egypt gives no statistics on the war, and there is no way of checking the Royalist figures, but signs of massive death and destruction abound in Yemen.

Egyptian air raids have shattered hillside villages. Hundreds of villagers have died from Egyptian poison gas, the use of which was confirmed this month by the International Red Cross.

The Imam's tribesmen have slaughtered entire Egyptian units in isolated outposts and seven parts of the country with wrecked tanks and trucks. In the early days of the war, Royalist guerrillas defeated tanks by cutting their fuel lines up rear exhaust pipes to stall the engines and then beheading the crews as they emerged.

Nasser and King Faisal of Saudi Arabia agreed to end the war with the Jeddah Pact of August, 1965, which called for a halt in Saudi aid to the Royalists and the withdrawal of Egyptian forces. Nasser charged Faisal with violating the agreement and refused to pull out his army. The war wound on.

Later Nasser made clear that Egyptian forces would stay in Yemen until neighboring Saudi Arabia gets independence from Britain in 1968, raising fears of an Egyptian takeover there.

The Egyptian strike in Yemen is now said to be approximately 40,000 men and the fighting has become sporadic. The Egyptian withdrawal was by Nasser's jets.

Nasser has not yet announced his new plans with regard to the Egyptian strike in Yemen. Egyptian withdrawal from the Arabian Peninsula would probably mean a bloody but quick end to the war. Saudi Arabia's victory as well as relief to the South Arabian Federation.

Another peace agreement between Nasser and Faisal, whose own country has frequently been bombed by the Egyptian air force—could also clear the way for a unilateral Egyptian retreat.

Johnson Says His Pledge To Mideast Lands Is Unchanged

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson says his pledge to back territorial and political integrity of all Middle East nations—issued before Israel's rout of its Arab foes—remains unchanged.

But he told a White House news conference Tuesday that how this policy will be effectuated "will depend a good deal upon the nations themselves, what they have to say and what their views are, what their proposals are."

Some observers say in Johnson's remarks a hint that the United States would not oppose any changes in boundaries worked out between Israel and her Arab neighbors, Egypt, Syria and Jordan — some of whose territory Israel occupies.

With most of the news-conference dwelling on the Middle East, Johnson also challenged suggestions his government had failed to realize the seriousness of the Israeli-Arab crisis before war broke out.

He was asked specifically about a Baltimore Sun story which he was told quoted a U.S. Embassy official in Cairo as saying the administration was not as sensitive to the crisis as it should have been.

"I do not believe anyone very high in the administration would at 10.

feel that way about it," said Johnson, adding the Middle East has occupied a good deal of our thoughts, our attention, and the line of some of our ablest leaders in our government ever since I came into the executive branch in 1961.

"It still does."

The President reiterated the United States played no part in the Arab-Israeli war, Egypt, Jordan, and Syria have charged U.S. airplanes participated in Israeli attacks on Arab targets.

Responding to other questions Johnson: "The best thing for us to do is let things clear up" before pressing for resumption of diplomatic relations severed by numerous Arab nations during the Middle East crisis.

—Acknowledged a U.S. review of aid to the Middle East was in the works.

—Played down the importance of U.S.—Soviet use of the Washington-Moscow "hot line" during the crisis except to say it did save time.

Recreation Area Named Emerald Lake

RUPERT—Minkola County Commissioners have selected the name of Emerald Lake for the new county recreation area located off the interstate highway near the Heyburn interchange.

A prize of \$25 for submitting the winning name went to Ted King.

The board noted that the highway district, as a subdivision of the Minkola County Civil Defense Plan, is authorized to purchase surplus government property.

A request of the University of Idaho for an increase in the county's share of salaries for the extension service was denied. The county presently contributes \$1,000 each toward

the extension salaries, and the increase would have been a raise in wages for the agents in the county.

Approval was given to adoption of a uniform building code for the county, with details to be announced.

The bid of Superior Lamwood Buildings was accepted for construction of a 100 by 100-foot fair building, to be completed in time for this fall's fair.

The commissioners recognized the resignation of Byron Williams as Democratic precinct committeeman for the Acquia District. They noted that the vacancy can be filled by petition from the Democratic Party, with at least 10 signatures, and the commissioners can appoint a committeeman until the next election.

Neil Weir was appointed as a member of the board of trustees

for the Department of Agriculture, as required by SB 10, passed by the last legislature. Weir was suggested for the appointment by the South Idaho Chamber of Commerce.

The commissioners signed an agreement with the City of Rupert for use of the city communications and city dump grounds. The county pays \$3,000 for radio use and \$600 for the dump grounds.

Creation of County Planning Commission, to be the same members as the Zoning Board, was approved.

Building permits during the month of May went to Russell Lindstrom-Kenneth Gentry and Don Jensen for new homes; Clint DeLeon, Eugene Landa and Mrs. Olga Lish, mobile homes; Norman Ashby, and Newell Dockstader, garages, and Franklin Suhr, an addition.

Reagan Will Sign Law On Abortions

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Gov. Ronald Reagan announced Tuesday that he will sign into law a historic bill easing California's rigid abortion law which was finally legislative approval a few hours earlier.

When signed by the governor this week, the legislation will put California alongside Colorado and North Carolina as having a mounting nationwide campaign to ease abortion laws that generally were enacted in the 19th century.

The bill would permit physicians to perform abortions if pregnancy was caused by rape or incest or would endanger the physical or mental health of the mother.

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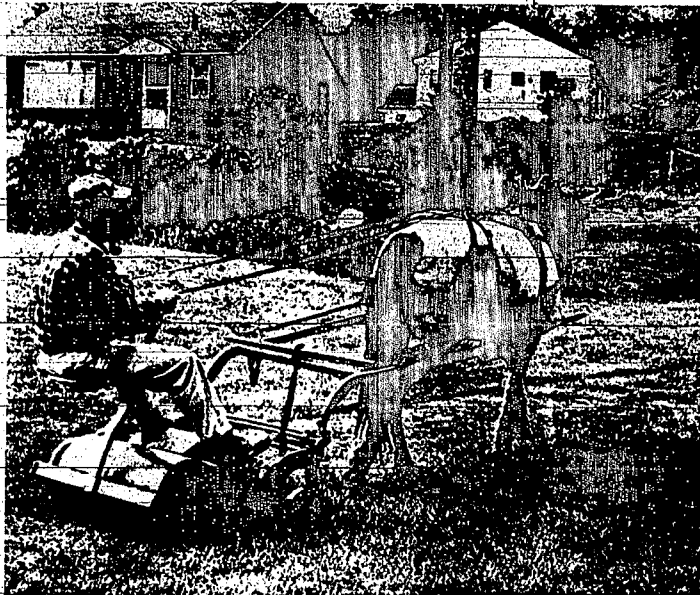
Grangeville Man Rescues His Brother

Damage By Flood Waters Is Estimated

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho (AP) — The dike held during the recent North Idaho flood threat, but the swollen Kootenai River still caused extremely heavy crop damage to an estimated 2,000 to 3,000 acres behind the levees, Don Jensen of the Soil Conservation Service said Wednesday.

It may be three weeks to a month before the full extent of damage is known, he said, but it will run into the thousands of dollars. He said most of the losses will be in oats, barley, wheat and some white Dutch clover seed crops.

The crops were damaged from two directions — from water which seeped through the saturated dikes, and from the underground water table, which was elevated by the high level of the Kootenai.

Low-lying pasturesland, unprotected by dikes, were damaged by water table, which raised, although farmers lost for a time the use of the pasture.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Weather Bureau in Spokane said only extremely heavy rains could bring unusually high temperatures could cause another serious threat.

The river stood at 30.5 feet Wednesday morning — that's six inches under flood stage — and is expected to fall to 28 feet by Thursday and 26.1 feet by Friday.

With the threat apparently gone, the Corps of Engineers was cutting the size of its emergency force which had been brought in to guard against dike failure.

The staff was cut from a peak of 44 men to 16 Wednesday. One of the team's biggest projects, aside from 24-hour patrols along the dikes, was sandbagging the Smith Creek area dikes near the Canadian border. More than 30,000 sandbags were used there.

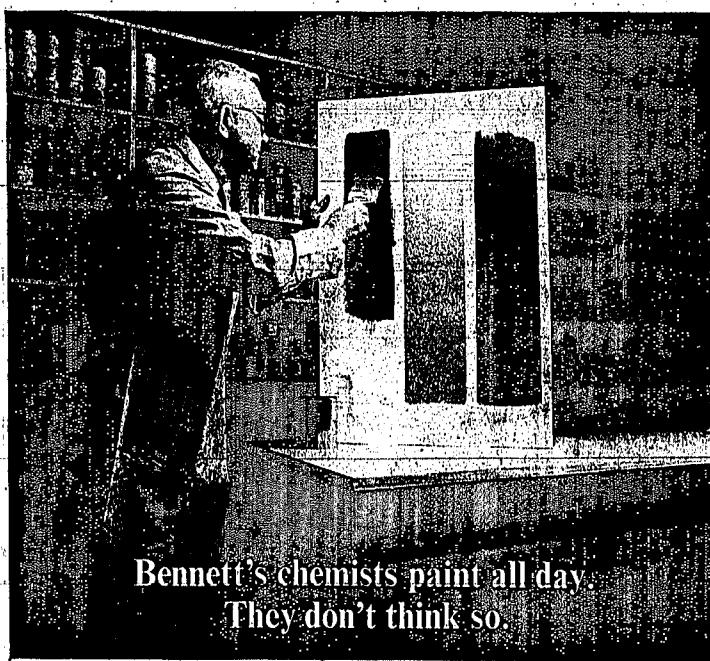

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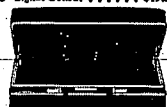

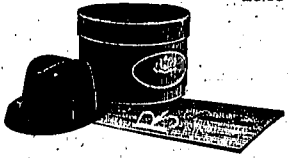
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Mrs. Kennedy Will Be Guarded By 25 Irish Police

—WASHINGTON (AP)— Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, opening his defense against proposed censure by his colleagues, hits hardest at the charge he bilked the government on travel expenses. But he says if he is judged a thief, he should be expelled from the Senate.

The white-haired Connecticut Democrat acknowledges that he used some campaign and testimonial funds for personal expenses—although not to the extent reported by the Senate ethics committee in recommending his censure.

In denying during Tuesday's opening of debate on the resolution that he deliberately billed the Senate for travel expenses collected from private groups, Dodd said, "I am telling you the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, so help me God."

The ethics committee, after a 16-month investigation, found Dodd billed both the Senate and private organizations for travel expenses on seven trips and also used political funds for his personal benefit.

Dodd blamed the double-billing on bookkeeping errors and disclosed for the first time that he had sent a check for \$1,763.98 to the Senate disbursing office in full payment for the seven trips that were erroneously billed to the government.

Dodd's speech was released during debate Tuesday, but its delivery was delayed until today's Senate session after Sen. Russell B. Long—his lone announced defender—complained only 70 of the Senate's 100 members were present to hear it.

"We are sitting here as a jury," said Long, D-La., adding that only those senators who heard all the debate should vote on the censure resolution.

In his statement released to newsmen, Dodd said the ethics committee's charge that he had requested and accepted double reimbursement for travel could only mean he deliberately defrauded the government.

The 60-year-old Dodd, serving his second Senate term, said his fellow senators "judged him to be a thief," they should expect him from the Senate rather than just censure him.

The bipartisan ethics panel said Dodd should be censured for a course of conduct that tends to bring the Senate into dishonor and discredit.

Committee Chairman John Stennis, D-Miss., bore down most heavily on the panel's finding that Dodd converted at least \$116,083 in political funds to his personal benefit.

"As a hush settled on the normally noisy Senate floor, and as Dodd's wife and other members of his family listened from the gallery, Stennis said: "There emerges an inescapable conviction that the senator from Connecticut deliberately set out on this course of conduct to convert to his own use funds over which he held only a trustee or fiduciary control."

He was referring to contributions to Dodd's 1964 re-election campaign and to funds raised at a series of testimonial affairs for Dodd between 1961 and 1965.

Torpedoed Ship Creeps Into Harbor

VALLETTA, Malta (AP)—The torpedoed U.S. Navy ship Liberty, an American victim of the Arab-Israeli war, crept into Malta's harbor today with orange cannon marks on her gray paint matching the colors of the dawn.

The 11,000-ton Liberty, victim of an Israeli air and sea attack in the eastern Mediterranean Thursday, came in under her own power.

She was down by the bow, and her starboard side, gaping torpedo hole and cannon and rocket holes spread from the waterline to the top of her gray funnel. The shells had scraped through the gray naval paint to expose the orange primer beneath.

Twenty-four of the Liberty's 27 crewmen were presumed dead, trapped in flooded holds. The bodies of nine other crewmen and the most seriously of the ship's 75 wounded have been transferred to the carrier America.

The ship will be put into drydock in Malta. A canvas "bandage" will be put over the torpedo hole in her starboard side while the water is drained from the two flooded holds to ensure that the trapped bodies will be recovered quickly.

The U.S. Navy threw a strict security wrap around the crew and said none would be available for interviews until the Navy's court of inquiry was completed, a process likely to take some days.

The Israelis have apologized for the attack, saying it was an accident. A Navy spokesman said the Liberty was armed with only four 50-caliber machine guns.

350 Apply For Admission To College

More than 350 students have already applied for admission during fall 1967 semester at the College of Southern Idaho, according to college officials.

The academic portion of the school has received just over 200 new student applications, according to Dr. James L. Taylor, president. He said the 350 applications are from students who have not previously attended the college here.

Wayne Rodgers, Director of the Vocational Technical school, said that portion has received more than 150 applications for the coming semester.

He indicated that courses offered will include automotive mechanics, automotive body repair, agriculture business law enforcement, welding technology, electrical applications, distributive education and radio-television technology.

He said applications for all classes, except automotive mechanics, which is already filled, are now being accepted.

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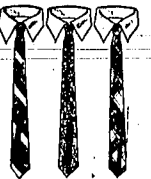

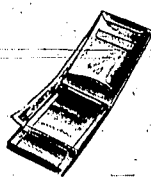
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

Scenic Spots On 350-Mile Loop Trip In Area Listed

Spring flows gently into the valley of the sun and melts all trace of seasonal snow. The spur and gentian replace winter-donor and the year-round playground blossoms into a landmark for travelers. It is the season of discovering by automobile and Sun Valley is only one stop along an exhilarating 350-mile loop trip through Idaho. Climbing north from Sun Valley and Ketchum to a height of 8,700 feet on Galea Summit it is possible to view the Stanley Basin, a vast, sun-baked valley to the south and the once-pulsating mining towns that spatter the map. In a day's drive from the resort a family car can advance through the Stanley Basin recreational area in the Sawtooth mountains and enjoy facilities for camping and fishing at Alder Lake, Redfish Lake and the beautiful Sawtooth Wilderness area adjacent to the Basin and pack trips can be arranged with guides in Sun Valley and Stanley.

Before encountering Idaho's national monument, Craters of the Moon, a lava bed of numerous cones and craters and stretches of barren desolation, resembling the surface of the moon, one passes through Mackay and Arco, the free world's first city to be lighted by atomic power. It is the home of the world's famous National Reactor Testing Station of the Atomic Energy Commission. Dipping down U. S. Highway 93 in the form of a "V" the four miles of Shoshone Ice Caves, another attraction worth investigating. The cave is a natural refrigerator creating a living glacier in an arid lava desert. Indian Ice Caves stretch three blocks long, 30 feet wide and rise to 40 feet in height. As the motorist approaches his starting point in Sun Valley he already begins to re-experience the country of the Sawtooths before brushing Hailey and Ketchum. The remaining 20-mile stretch fills his spirit with memories of an expanse of country strictly Idahoan.

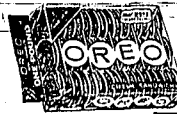

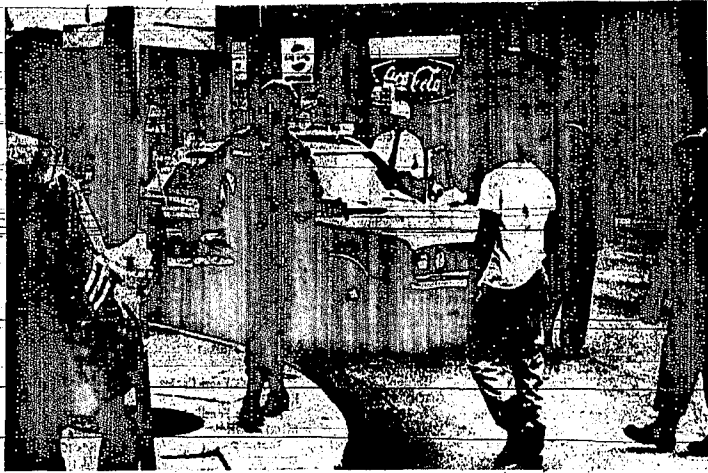

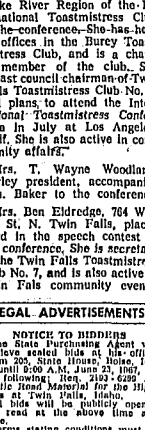

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Environmental Causes Account For Cancer

By MICHAEL GIRSDANSKY
NEW YORK (NEA)—"A much higher proportion of human cancer than we had even recently suspected... perhaps amounting to as much as 50 per cent—may be due to environmental causes."
 These words are those of British Sir Alexander Haddow, president of the International Cancer Congress held in Tokyo last October.
 Those who have devoted their careers to the study of cancer, the figure of 80 per cent was probably less of a surprise than it was to the general public. It was jolting enough, even so. It need not have been, however. Three years earlier, Dr. Wendell Scott, famed radiologist and 1954 president of the American Cancer Society, stated, in addressing the society's annual meeting: "Collectively (tumors) are mostly British... these substances are organic compounds, that is, they contain atoms of the element carbon. And because carbon atoms have the ability to link with one another, the number of possible organic compounds is, to all intents and purposes, limitless. Which of these compounds—many of them man-made and not found in nature—are carcinogenic (cancer-causing) is the subject of much present-day research."
 And, of course, the problem is not simply the question of which substances—organic or inorganic—cause cancer in laboratory animals. Much more to the point is which of them can and do cause the disease in man.
 It is not only chemical materials which can cause cancer, however. Still another significant carcinogenic factor is radiation.
 The term "radiation" has become largely a byword since the first nuclear explosion took place in the summer skies over Hiroshima more than two decades ago. But, in fact, "radiation" is not confined to atomic bombs or atomic power plants. The word simply refers to any type of energy which passes directly through space.
 One of the most common types of such radiation is the ultraviolet which pours down every instant upon the earth—from the sun. It is this "invisible light" which stimulates pigment-containing cells within the skin, producing a tan. But, as long ago as 1894, it was strongly suspected that excessive exposure to ultraviolet could also cause skin cancer and, since that time, mounting evidence has turned that suspicion into as close a certainty as there can be in medicine. There is an educated suspicion among many researchers that they may also be responsible for certain human cancers as well, leukemia among them. But as yet, the evidence of virus-action in human malignancy is inconclusive.

Most recent of all on the list of possible or actual carcinogens are the viruses. Highly complex structures, the viruses are organisms that divides the living from the nonliving (there is still considerable debate as to whether to call them "organisms" or "molecules"). Viruses have been shown to cause various types of cancer in birds and lower animals. There is an educated suspicion among many researchers that they may also be responsible for certain human cancers as well, leukemia among them. But as yet, the evidence of virus-action in human malignancy is inconclusive.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court threw out today a \$500,000 libel judgment won by former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker against The Associated Press.
 All nine judges voted to set aside the judgment, won by Walker in a Fort Worth, Tex., state court in 1964. They entered four separate opinions to state their views.
 In the controlling opinion, Justice John M. Harlan said there was no evidence of "personal prejudice or incompetence" on the part of the AP's reporter, Van Savelle, or The Associated Press.
 Harlan said that Walker had "denied categorically" making part in any charge against the federal marshals. However, Harlan also noted that Savelle was actually present during the event described and had reported them almost immediately to The Associated Press office in Atlanta.
 "We therefore conclude that Gen. Walker should not be entitled to damages from The Associated Press."

CIA Shock Waves Reverberate On Campus

By PHILIP R. WERDELL — The James B.ond Finishing School, writes student Barry students and the spooks are no longer in the headlines although the shock waves caused by this particular explosion are still reverberating on campus.

Thoughtful student leaders and editors are asking, "where do we go from here?" The tone of most campus editorials has been one of saddened outrage and frustration.

"If the Administration had led us very best to totally alienate and to win the undying mistrust of a generation of youth, it could not have done a better job of it than to turn the National Student Association into

the United States did approve the Central Intelligence Agency's link with the student organizations; surveys clearly show that rank-and-file students certainly did not.

This was deserved for he answered all questions, including a few embarrassing ones, in a frank manner."

The national staff of NSA in Washington has now contacted about 200 of its over 300 members. "No one seems to doubt the association's will to continue," reports Rose Ann Alderson, NSA's student government information service director.

"There have only been disaffiliation plans starting on about 10 campuses that we have contacted so far, and this is not very unusual. A number of schools come in and out of the association every year."

— an independent newspaper survey of 40 NSA member schools in New York state revealed there was general support for the association but there were still some questions to be answered. "Was CIA money used for any domestic programs?" "How can we be certain that future officers will not re-establish the clandestine relationship?"

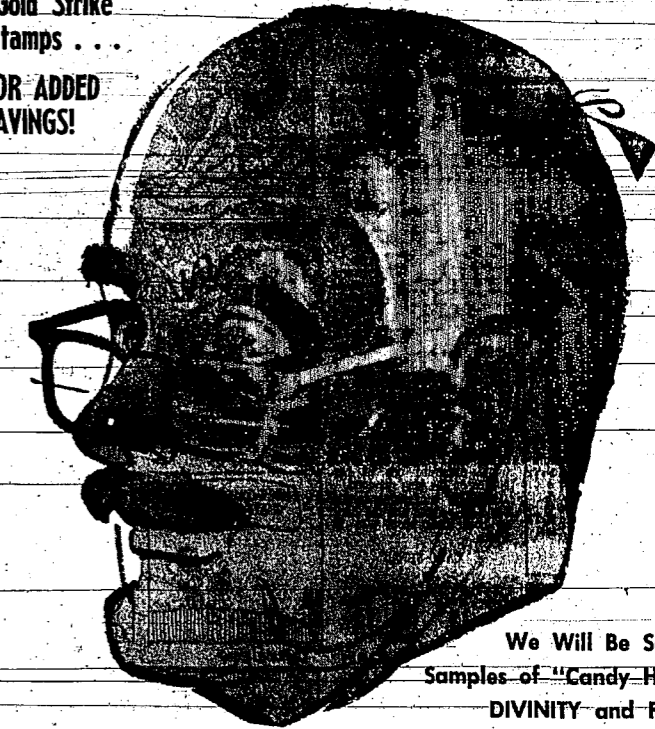
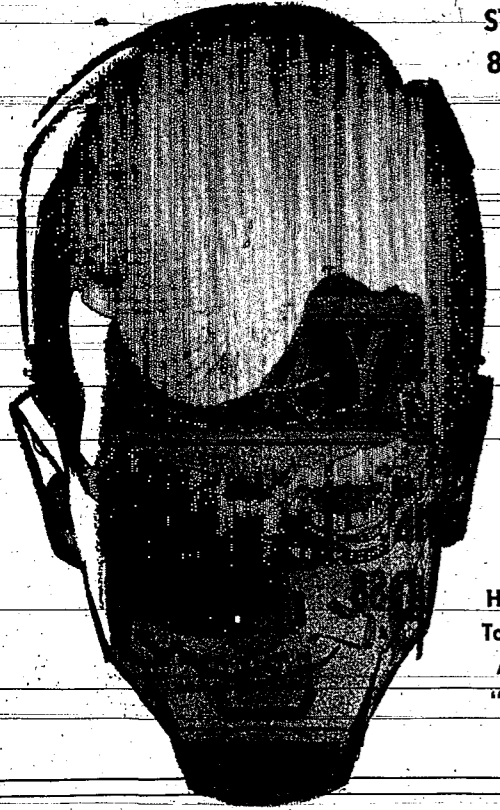

CLIMAX THAT FATHER'S DAY DINNER WITH PRIME RIB

Father's Day is the time for a roast like this: it's the special occasion. Impressive in appearance, a joy to serve and superb to eat, this roast may be in two, three or four rib sizes varying in weight from five pounds to ten or more.

When served, this kingly roast beef will always be the big attraction. It matters little what goes with it, so keep the remainder of the menu simple but harmonious. Oven-browned potatoes garnish the roast along with sprigs of parsley. Green beans with toasted, silvered almonds are a happy choice as a vegetable.

Roast meat thermometers chart the exact degree of doneness desired while oven temperature is kept constant. There's a simple beauty in the preparation for neither basting nor watching is required.

For easier carving, remove the chine (back) bone. Place the roast, bone side down, on a rack in an open roasting pan. Insert a roast meat thermometer so bulb reaches the center of the thickest part, making certain the bulb does not rest on bone or in fat. Roast in a slow oven (325° F.) until meat thermometer registers 140° F. for rare, 160° F. for medium and 170° for well-done. This takes 23 to 25 minutes per pound for rare, 27 to 30 minutes for medium and 32 to 35 minutes for well-done. The roast will carve more easily if allowed to "rest" 15 to 20 minutes after removing it from oven. Meat continues to cook upon removal from the oven and if it is to "rest," the roast should be removed from the oven when the meat thermometer registers 5° to 10° lower than the doneness desired.

With roasting completed, remove the chine bone. Tiny feather bones will come off with it. Only rib bones remain. Carve across the face of the roast, then release slices from the rib bones with tip of knife.

Midge held a minimum no-trump opening and she trilled less but it looked as if all her cards were going to be working so she bid four hearts to show the ace. Kay might have jumped right to the grand slam but she wanted to suggest seven no-trump possibilities. The game was match point duplicate and no-trump counts more than clubs or diamonds. Midge's four no-trump was a signoff. She had bid her 15 points to the limit and Kay's seven club call ended the bidding.

It was the right place to stop. Playing at clubs Midge took her ace of hearts, ruffed her small heart, drew trumps and eventually discarded one of her spades on the long diamond.

At no-trump or diamonds this could not happen and the limit at both those spots was 12 tricks.

CARD SENSE

For some time most expert pairs have been trying to discover how to get to minor suit slams after no-trump openings. Pass 3 and 4 N.T. Today's bidding was by Mrs. Pass 3 and 4 N.T. James (Kay) Nicholson is of AAK1054 and K62 and AAK87. Dallas using the Jacoby transfer.

In the Jacoby transfer the two spade responses shows a minor suit hand of any strength, but guarantees at least 5-4 in the minor suits. Midge, sitting South, rebid three diamonds. This shows better diamonds than clubs. With equal minor suit strength Midge would have said three clubs.
