## Communist China Claims It Has Exploded Hydrogen Bomb

TOKYO (AP) — Red China announced it successfully exploded its first hydrogen bomb Saturday. It said the blast—a falling blow at the "nuclear blackmail" policy of the United States and the Soviet Union.

The explosion was reported to set off "over the western region" of the mainland, which evidently meant at or near Lop Nur, the atomic research center in remote Sinkiang Province.

The test was the sixth in an atomic series launched Oct. 16, 1964, with the explosion of a device that Western experts said had the force of 20,000 tons of TNT, about the power of the bomb a U.S. plane dropped over Hiroshima, Japan, Aug. 6, 1945.

The most powerful of the previous explosions—rated at the equivalent of 300,000 tons or more of TNT—was the fifth, Dec. 28, 1965.

The hydrogen bomb announcement created no great surprise in Tokyo, which is especially sensitive to nuclear weapons development around the world, or in Washington, which is trying to limit the spread of such weapons.

A Japanese government source said explosion of the bomb "would not affect the nuclear balance between East and West." He added, however, that it could be broken when China completes development of nuclear long-range missiles.

American officials, closely following China's five previous tests, had concluded the Chinese were moving toward the hydrogen bomb development.

The Atomic Energy Commission in Washington began tests atmospheric directly through its worldwide monitoring system to determine the nature and size of the device.

"We have no reason to question that Peking has exploded

its first hydrogen bomb," a commission spokesman said.

The White House, Pentagon and State Department had no comment.

At the United Nations, Secretary-General U Thant said "any explosion of an atomic or a hydrogen bomb by any country anywhere is to be regretted in the context of the General Assembly resolutions on the matter."

Those resolutions oppose such tests.

The broadcast announcement from China, which is not a U.N. member, came at the adjournment of the first session of an emergency meeting of the General Assembly on the Middle East crisis.

The hydrogen bomb test, the New China News Agency said in an English-language dispatch monitored in Tokyo, "marks the entry of the development of China's nuclear weapons into an entirely new stage."

The agency said Communist party Chairman Mao Tse-tung expressed belief in June 1958 that it would be entirely possible for China to "make some atomic bombs and hydrogen bombs in 10 years."

"We solemnly declare to the people of China and the whole world that this prediction of Chairman Mao has now been

realized while our proletarian cultural revolution (the current purge) is winning resolute victory," it said.

Crediting the success to Mao's thought, the Chinese said the latest explosion "is a very great encouragement and support to the Vietnamese people in their war against the United States and to the Arab people in their resistance to aggression by the U.S. and British imperialists and their tool, Israel."

Peking reiterated that its development and testing "are entirely for the purpose of deterring, with the ultimate aim of abolishing nuclear weapons."

"We solemnly declare once again that at no time and in no circumstances will China be the first to use nuclear weapons," the broadcast said.

President Johnson warned Red China last Oct. 30 that any atomic weapons power it devel-

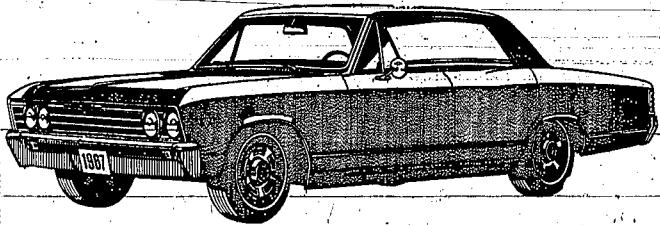

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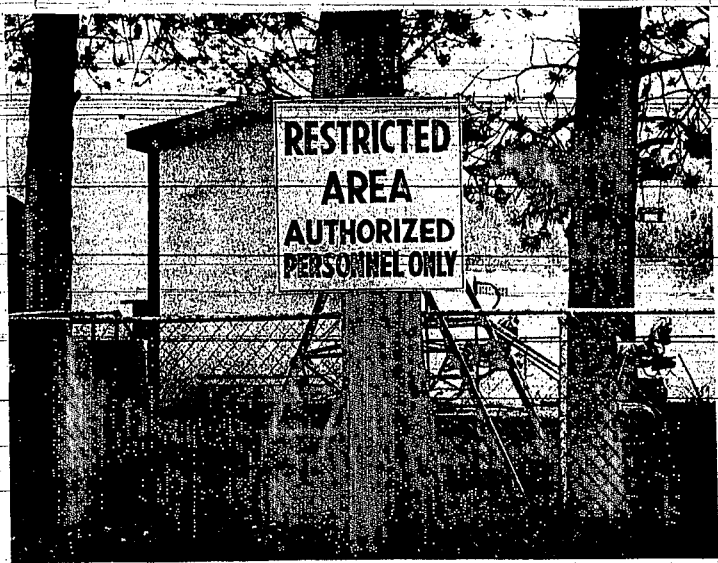

# Arab Ministers Hold Emergency Session

# Kosygin's Daughter Accompanies Him To New York

**MOSCOW (AP)**—An elegant, dressed brunette who speaks English well and has been described as "an extremely nice person" is accompanying Premier Alexei N. Kosygin as his hostess in New York.  
 Mrs. Ludmila Alexeyevna Gvishiani, 38, the only child of the Anglican bishop of Coventry Cathedral in England. Now, she is expected to charm persons she meets on her first trip to the United States.  
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She is variously reported to work in the archives of the Soviet Foreign Ministry or in some other archives. When she puts on her glasses for reading, Mrs. Gvishiani assumes the properly scholarly look for such a job.  
 At the Tashkent conference between India and Pakistan in January 1966, she was one of her father's chief secretarial aides as Kosygin pulled off a diplomatic triumph of negotiation. Recently, she played a large part in arranging a British-Soviet historical exhibit in London.  
 Ludmila was born Sept. 4, 1928, to Alexei and Klavdiya Kosygin at a time when the future premier was an instructor of factory management in Siberia.  
 Much of her childhood was spent in Leningrad. By the time she was ready for college her father had become a deputy premier in Moscow under Premier Joseph V. Stalin.  
 A dandy handsome young technical student from the south Soviet mountain region of Georgia—Stalin's home territory—entered her life, and Ludmila married Dzermen M. Gvishiani. In 1948 their son, named Alexei for his grandfather, was born.

# Long Clouds Future By Defending Dodd

WASHINGTON—(AP)—By his abrasive defense of Sen. Thomas Dodd, D-Conn., against charges, Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., appears to have clouded his future in the Senate's Democratic leadership.

No colleague wants to be quoted publicly on Long's attitude toward Dodd's future in the Senate, but it is clear that Dodd has done nothing wrong and nothing worse than some of his colleagues in the double billing of the Senate and private sources for travel expenses and in using testimonial dinner funds to pay personal bills.

But in the cloak rooms and in the cases around the chamber there is a shaking of heads and general agreement that the Louisiana senator has damaged his standing with the establishment to the extent that his future in the job of majority whip, or assistant leader, is in jeopardy.

Another possible aftermath of the Senate vote was underscored Saturday when Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., said he will resign from the Ethics Committee if the Senate refuses to censure Dodd for using personal purposes funds raised at testimonial dinners.

McCarthy said in an interview that such a vote would lead him to feel that the committee's monitoring work had gone down the drain.

"In that case I would feel that the Senate was not very serious about the matter of either conduct of its members, I couldn't justify continued service on it," McCarthy added.

There have been hints that the committee's findings in its first investigation might not be limited to a single resignation.

On the eve of the debate, Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R-Utah, vice chairman of the committee, said that even a major violation of the pending resolution "would be an attack on our committee and its judgment."

Told of McCarthy's threat to resign from the committee, the Senate majority leader, Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., commented to a reporter, "I assume the committee feels it is on trial in this matter."

Mansfield said he hopes the Senate can reach a vote on the Dodd matter by Tuesday or Wednesday. He said he trusts Dodd and Chairman John Stennis, D-Miss., of the Ethics Committee to wind up the debate.

Long was elected to his assistant leadership post last January with strong Southern support and with President Johnson keeping hands off.

"But a Southern senator, who voted for Long at the time, said that if there was a vote today, he fears the Louisiana would be dumped."

By tradition, Long's tenure lasts throughout the 90th Congress and he would not face a challenge to continue in the leadership until the beginning of the 91st Congress in January 1969. There could be a move next January to replace him, but it is not likely to materialize.

"We'll just have to suffer in silence until the next Congress, but let us hope for the best," a Democratic senator said.

The irritation against Long goes deep. He has courted some bitterness among his colleagues when he has again and again attacked them in the Senate in unsuccessful efforts to save the income tax checkoff method of financing presidential candidates from the voters.

The assistant leader's rough handling of his colleagues then and during the Dodd debate apparently has caused a kind of resentment that takes a long time to wear off. Whether this will subside in 18 months may depend on his actions in that period.

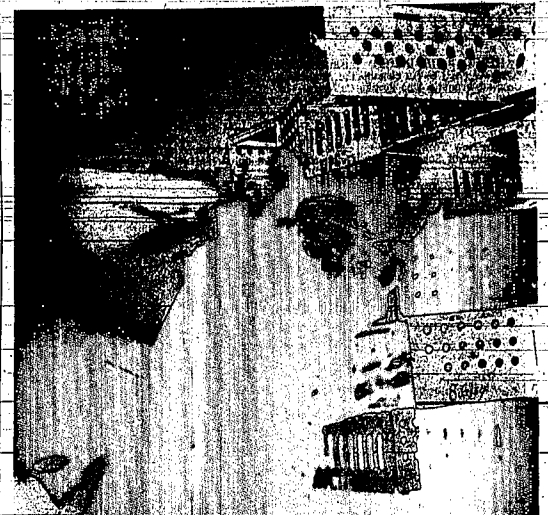
The most asked question among his peers is, "What's the deal?" None of his colleagues has come up with any satisfactory answer for his flamboyant defense of Dodd.

The generally accepted view is that Long has nurtured for years a resentment of the Senate's treatment of his father, the late Huey Long. He is said to feel that on charges of an earlier day treated his father as an outcast.

In any event, the elder Long made such an impression on the depression-ridden voters of his day that his "share the wealth" and "every man a king" proposals made Franklin D. Roosevelt politically uneasy about the prospect of having to deal with the Louisiana senator as an opponent in 1936.

Huey Long was the underdog in those days. He generated wide public appeal on his basis. Russell Long, by contrast, is for Dodd, who has said he can't live on his \$30,000-a-year salary and carry out his duties as a senator.

If he had presented a quiet, orderly defense of Dodd, there probably would have been a more amicable admission in the Senate for Long's efforts to help a fellow senator in distress. But the majority verdict of those who sit in judgment on the matter even privately is that Long has done rather than helped Dodd by his melodramatic tactics.

## Gov. Samuelson Airs Special Session, Anti-Americanism At VFW Meet

RUPERT — The appearance of Gov. Don Samuelson was a highlight of the Veterans of Foreign Wars convention which ended its final day here Saturday.

The governor referred to his tour of Farragut State Park last week and noted that he was stationed there for two years during World War II as a gunner's mate in the Navy.

In reference to the special session the governor assured the VFW and 11 military veterans groups that their budgets will not be cut 40 per cent by the Legislature as has been rumored.

Primary purpose of the special session is to allocate funds to the Department of Public Assistance and the governor said that while "some department budgets could be trimmed by 40 per cent with no loss of efficiency or service" it is not the intention to transfer funds to the Department of Public Assistance from other budgets, that "it will be allocated from another source."

The governor praised the VFW and similar groups for their head-in-emphatic-Americanism in the state and nation. He reminded that "if America fails, the entire free world crumbles," and said for this reason he is "defeated with scorn" to the Beatniks, peace-niks, kook-niks, screwball-niks, and added the draft card burners and flag burners to the list.

He held up for the greatest scorn those who want to "give blood to the Viet Cong and the Communists" and offered a contribution to their "one-way ticket" to North Vietnam.

Following the governor's address, the patriotic instructor, Mrs. Alice Cook, Bonanza Ferry, presented the governor with a U.S. flag, which he said he will take to the governor's residence in Boise.

## Timber Bid Not Accepted By Engineers

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—The Army Corps of Engineers said Friday it must reject as "not acceptable" the one bid opened Thursday on sale of 10,320,500 board feet of standing timber within the Dworshak dam reservoir area.

The bid, \$500, It was made by Terry R. Rudd, Lewiston forester and independent timber appraiser.

The corps said it has asked Rudd if he wishes to raise his bid "substantially."

Rudd said he won't.

The government estimate was not disclosed.

Rudd agreed the bid is probably the lowest for a like amount of timber in recent timber bidding history. But he said he bid the \$500 because this was "all I thought I could and still come out financially."

The timber is in an 11-mile-long narrow ribbon along the North Fork of the Clearwater River from 21 to 32 miles upstream from the damsite. When completed, the 693-foot high dam will extend the reservoir 53 miles upstream.

Rudd said if his bid had been accepted, he would have received "what timber I could" and left the rest. Much of it, he said, "would take a mountain goat to get to."

## Dog Heroine, "Snooks," Destined For Limelight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some dogs, like some people, seem destined for the limelight.

So it was with Snooks, the only dog ever to have been presented with a real gold medal by a real U.S. vice president. Snooks' flare for the unusual has extended even after her death at 18.

It was on May 22, 1956, that Vice President Richard M. Nixon gave Snooks a medal for saving the life of her owner, Shirley Y. Mesher, when she was bedridden and helpless with nephritis and pneumonia.

An account written at the time of the medal-awarding said: "Mrs. Mesher's nurse, in the next room, fainted while she was ironing, and her cigarette lit the ironing board cover."

"Snooks" went into action, rendering first aid by whining and licking the nurse's face. Nurse recovered but then fainted again — and poor Snooks had to do her rescue work all over again. This time the nurse revived and was able to douse the flames.

Well, Snooks took Nixon and the medal in stride, had seven puppies, survived an operation for tumors and a hysterectomy, and finally died of a heart attack in El Paso, Tex., where her owners were vacationing.

Unobscured by the incident, the Mesheres decided Snooks, half collie and half Spitz, should have a fine funeral. Sidney Mesher, a tax consultant, arranged to have her embalmed, put in a coffin and sent by express back to a pet cemetery in suburban Silver Spring, Md.

Then the Mesheres cut short their vacation and hurried home for the funeral.

Alas, somewhere around Chicago, embarrassed express officials told the Mesheres the coffin was lost. Despite constant prodding by the Mesheres, 10 days have gone by and it still hasn't been found.

"Please help us get her back," said Mrs. Mesher.

"She was a real heroine," said her husband.

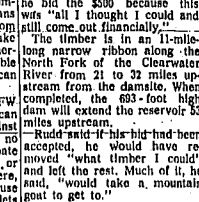

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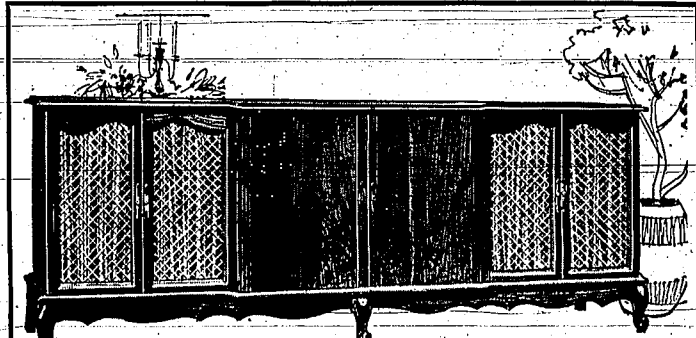

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## Food Problem Is Viewed By Analysts

By QUID A. MARTIN WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's Science Advisory Committee said Saturday the world's food problem is of such scale, severity, and duration that a massive, long-range, innovative and unprecedented effort will be required to master it.

This effort, the committee said, will make it necessary to "re-examine the leadership of the non-Communist world and of all international institutions in inaugurating and carrying out a gigantic program for bringing populations under control and expanding food production."

A somber picture of food needs and of a massively outlined effort to meet those needs was supplied in a committee report to President Johnson. The report was prepared after more than 15 months' work at the President's request.

As a panel of distinguished scientists see it, a program to head off mass famines, with accompanying riots and disorders, could cost Americans \$2 billion to \$7 billion a year more than the United States currently puts into food aid and in agricultural and economic development in deficit areas of the world.

"The over-all problem of the world food supply is so large and so extremely complex that it is almost impossible for the casual observer to comprehend its true dimensions or to grasp its intricate interrelationships with the many other aspects of economic growth and development," the report said.

The panel came to such basic conclusions as:

- The problem must be solved within 20 years or the battle may well be lost for all time.
- The attainment of an adequate supply of food must come out of the development of all phases of the economics of underdeveloped areas, not of agriculture alone.
- President Johnson, in a forward of mass famines, said the world food problem is "one of the foremost challenges of mankind today."

## Gov. Don Samuelson Inspects Facilities For 12th World Boy Scout Jamboree

Situated in the Coeur d'Alene National Forest, between rugged mountain peaks, among towering pines and lush greenery and near a beautiful Northern Idaho lake is Farragut State Park.

This 5,000-acre site, formerly an old naval training center, will be a miniature "world" of its own. This will be the place where 12,000 Boy Scouts from more than 100 countries will converge for the 12th World Jamboree.

Preparation for the historic event — the first ever held in the continental United States — was recently given an old Scoutmaster's approval for the Jamboree.

"Everything is going along real fine," Gov. Don Samuelson said after an on-the-spot inspection.

Gov. Samuelson was assured by Scout and park officials that by the time the scouts arrived the park would be one of the finest in the country.

This reporter accompanied the Governor and three state officials plus aides and nine other newsmen on the one-day visit to the park. Our group flew from Boise to Coeur d'Alene in an Air National Guard plane piloted by Brig. Gen. James Trall, assistant Idaho adjutant general for air.

The other three state officials were Jim Deffenbach, state budget director; Louie Shaddock, state secretary of commerce and development, and W. M. Becker, director of the Idaho Department of Parks.

While inspecting the park, Gov. Samuelson showed this reporter several of his "old favorite spots," including his swimming spot. Scouts from many countries will be swimming in the same spot in about one and one-half months.

Gov. Samuelson first visited Farragut in 1944 as a navy boat when the site on Lake Pend Oreille was a naval training center. He stayed two years to teach rifle and pistol marksmanship to other sailors.

This year's encampment will have another meaning to Gov. Samuelson. He was a Boy Scout himself, reaching the rank of second class before his troop was disbanded. And from 1934-35 he was scoutmaster of a troop for 40 boys in Woodhill, Ill.

Amid rumors that Farragut will be the site of the 1969 National Boy Scout Jamboree, work is proceeding toward a more immediate goal — getting things ready for the World Jamboree.

Gov. Samuelson commented that chances for the National Jamboree being held at Farragut are good. More than 50,000 scouts are expected to attend the next National Jamboree.

Since the Girl Scout Roundup, held in 1965, more than \$400,000 — about half of it federal money — has been spent renovating Farragut.

Mr. Becker, state parks director, said many of the improvements at the park will be used by the public after the Jamboree. Some of these improvements include docks for fishing and boating, a water system, a beach and many other buildings and roads.

### State Agencies Working To Solve Pollution Problems

SALMON — Three state agencies have joined forces to tackle the problem of mine wastes escaping into Panther Creek west of Salmon National Forest. F. E. ever, about which I am concerned, and one is education. I believe that our teachers should be complimented many times when we fall to do so on the other hand, there are matters for which they should be made to answer.

During the past school year I entered one of the school buildings in our community. As I walked into the office I noticed a gentleman behind the counter smoking a pipe. Whether or not he was a teacher, administrator, or salesman, I do not know; however, his presence in the school office assumed that he should have accepted responsibility for the action.

The attorney general's office has published its findings concerning the possible effects of smoking upon the human body, pointing to the strong evidence that smoking caused cancer.

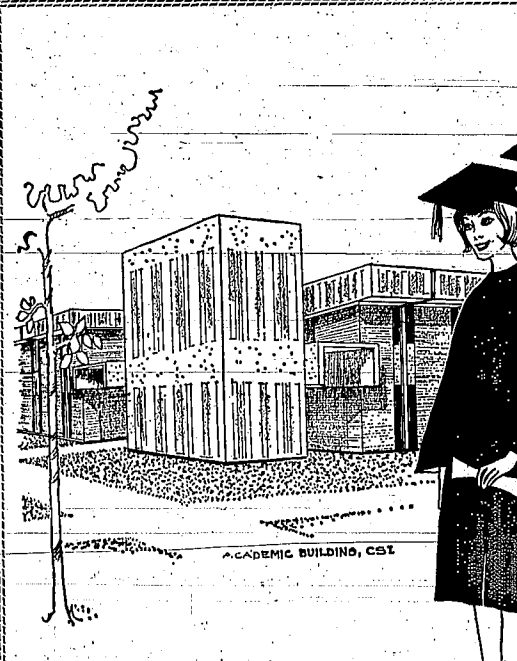
Many schools and health organizations have cooperated to alert youth to the harmful effects of the use of tobacco. Many churches have attempted to create respect and responsibility for our bodies by pointing out that "The Body is a temple of the Holy Spirit." "So glorify God in your body." (1 Cor. 6:19-20).

It becomes, therefore, an educative process; our teachers in the public schools by virtue of their positions become a part of that process. Civil rights, consequently, are being ignored when children are forced to observe such behavior as a teacher, learning down by example what others are attempting to teach by precept.

Furthermore, in a conversation with some high school students recently, I learned that slang and profanity are used by some teachers in the classroom. If God has no place in the public school-through-prayers-and-like, because some feel that rights are being violated by praying, reading of the Bible, or other expressions of faith in God, then neither does His name belong in colloquial use.

Even the use of such terms as "damn," "hell," and "the like" have no place for every verb demands a subject and only God can demand if God and "hell" do not exist, then such talk is meaningless—and out-of-order by those who feel that praying, or those who feel violated by it, is a violation of their rights.

Now, what about my civil rights, or those of my family, or those whose views on the above matters parallel those of mine? A teacher, because he has freely chosen that profession, must accept the responsibility of defending and protecting not only the rights of those for whom God does not exist but also the rights of those for whom He does exist, both by example and teaching.

RICHFIELD—Richfield school trustees outlined a summer work program at the June meeting Tuesday night.

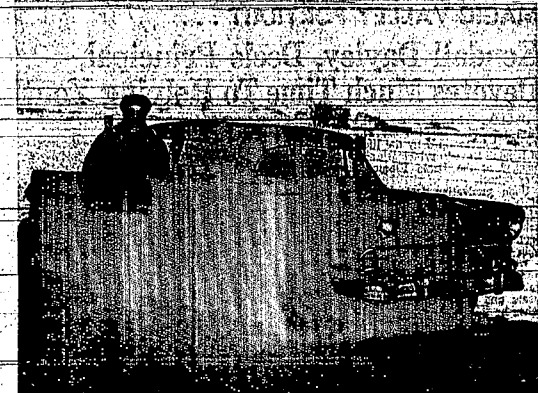
The project will include repair of the eaves and painting of the west side of the school by Marshall Cardin, local carpenter.

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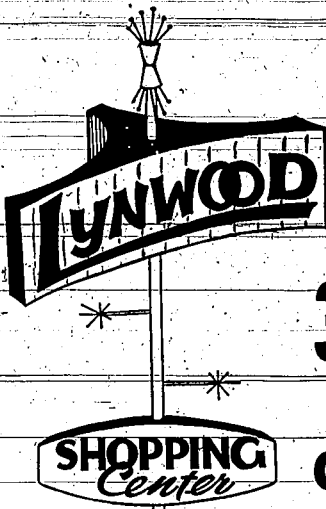

# Heavy Snow Runoff-Fills Basin At Unfinished Horsethief Creek Dam

By JIM HUMBIRD

What Idaho's newest trout fishery will look like next year was glimpsed in an unbridled "snark" preview recently when debris clogged the trash rack intake at Horsethief Dam, backing up 50 acres of snowmelt waters in a pond averaging 17-18 feet deep.

Work on the 58-foot dam across Horsethief Creek started last year. It should be done in September and will store a peak 5,000 acre feet of water that will drain through the seasonal hidden valley for a length of two miles, and a width of a half mile. When full, it will cover 20 acres with water up to 40 feet deep. The rest of the 420-acre site owned by the Idaho Fish and Game Department will be for a trout hatchery.

The development of new public fishing waters is part of the department's Five Point Program for the future, a continuing program that was first announced back in 1962.

Tentative figures compiled by the fisheries division point out that Idaho's 718 stream miles of fishing represents only 21 1/2 percent of the state's available water surface area. The rest is found in 1,721 alpine lakes, 125 natural lakes and 109 reservoirs. Stacy Gebhardt, state fishery management supervisor, stressed the fact, however, that although streams provide only 21 percent of the state's water area, 38 percent of the state's fishing pressure is found on streams. He adds that reservoir developments will further reduce the total stream acreage to about 13 percent by the year 2000.

As the years pass, the trend may change. The growth of boat fishing in the last few years is one indication that lakes and reservoirs will get more attention than streams. In general, the swing to outboard motors and small craft that can be towed down highways and back country roads to the hills means that water sports are popular with family groups. Stream fishing, by way of contrast, appeals more to "loner" types and those who cannot afford the expense of a boat and motor.

Fishing from a boat often is more productive than casting out from the bank. Sitting in a boat where necessary, of course, then scrambling over slippery rocks and boulders, wading chest-deep water, and sliding up and down brush-covered banks. Unskilled tyros as a rule like

its waters will be held as close to capacity as possible, with little fluctuation in level. It will not be used for irrigation water storage, subject to heavy draw-downs to meet the needs of valley ranches and farms.

When the dam is completed early this fall, Horsethief Lake will be filled. Had the dam been completed, the snow runoff this year would have done 60 to 80 percent of the job. However, if less than normal snowfall is recorded next winter, it may take two years to fill the lake.

Provision has been made for channeling the waters of another creek into the lake for the purpose of creating a new fishery. The last one was the \$75,000 McArthur Reservoir in Bonner County. It has about 700 surface acres—three times the cost of Horsethief Lake—but McArthur does not have a dense population area nearby and so does not get fishing pressure to compare with Horsethief.

Another department-created fishery was opened a few weeks ago. Mosnow at a cost of about \$125,000. It is Spring Valley Reservoir, with a dam 45 feet high and a surface area of 155 acres. Still another, built by the department 20 years or so ago near Elk City is Elk Creek Reservoir. Others include Dog Creek Reservoir in Gooding County, Carey Lake redevelopment projects, eight lakes on the Hagerman-Wildlife Management area, and two lakes on the Sand Creek Wildlife Management area.

Newly created fisheries such as Horsethief Reservoir are stocked with both fingerling trout and catchable-sized fish to give "instant action" in the same season it is opened. When the water and other habitat conditions are good, fingerlings released into a reservoir in the springtime put on enough growth to be 7/8 to 1-inch catch-

ables before the end of the fishing season Oct. 31. Those that stay in the reservoir as "holdovers" until the next general fishing season should have gained a pound or more in weight. Fish put in as catchables are real tackle-busters by the next spring.

This is one of the ways the Idaho Fish and Game Department is going to stay abreast of the mushrooming demands of anglers who want to get out and catch a fish or two without going too far.

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

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# Book Review

## UNDISCOVERED COUNTRY

By Kathryn Hulme  
Since the success of "A Nun's Story" there has been a demand for anything that Kathryn Hulme writes.

This is only her second book since "The Nun's Story" and he entire output over a considerable period of years is only seven books. Each of these is the expression of a powerful personality who has known and observed a wide variety of people under many different circumstances.

If ever there was a born writer, it is Kathryn Hulme. She left university to prove to herself that she could earn her own living and to acquire the raw materials for writing through experience.

She enjoyed work, whether it was in a factory or in a shipyard. She shows as much pride in her ABS Master Welder's card as she does in her books. Her co-workers in the shipyard or in the drug factory mean much to her as the famous people with whom she was associated in Paris.

To this reader, the one discordant note in a fine book is the amount of space devoted to the Russian mystic, Gurdjieff. Perhaps a more realistic reader would never understand the factors in Gurdjieff that attracted so strongly a group of American women resident in Paris at the time he was successful, some famous, some wealthy, they believed profoundly in Gurdjieff and his ideas.

To a reader of non-mystic temperament he is repulsive. His ideas are deliberately vague. They were given more interpretations by his disciples. The almost sadistic cruelty of his behaviour towards them seemed to appeal strongly to a crowd of middle-aged adorers.

The Second World War swept Gurdjieff off the scene, though he seems always to have retained his hold over Kathryn Hulme. She had little time to think about him during her two years on the swing shift at the Richmond, Calif., shipyards. "I loved the yards from the day I entered them, though I never knew from shift to shift if I would emerge alive."

Then she went to work for UNRRA. This was the climax of her life. Though Hulme is still alive and active, one cannot imagine any experience that would top that of working with Europe's war refugees. And she met Chouka. The readers who wondered whether "The Nun's Story" was a biography or fiction will find out here.

This is a most interesting book, the record of a strong, vital person and her full life. No whimpering here about personal identity and Freudian excuses. And it may well be that other, more sympathetic readers will understand the Gurdjieff influence. I do not.

Construction crews have just recently completed paving a road down to the swimming beach at Beaver Bay. A brick bathhouse, which has baskets for 200 persons, also has been built there.

Walt Rodgers, director of physical arrangements for the jamboree, said the park will be divided into six camps where the scouts, representing over 100 countries, will live and cook. Food for the scouts will be drawn from a central commissary and distributed to the boys in four areas. The scouts then will cook all but one of the meals themselves.

This one evening meal will be a hot barbecue which will feed all the scouts and guests. One-hundred-foot pits have been constructed for this special barbecue.

The opening and closing ceremonies will be held in a 60,000-seat amphitheater with near perfect acoustics carved from an old oak and loggagan run. This amphitheater has a 300-foot stage on which many activities, including a masque dance, will be held.

The food required for the 32 meals that the scouts will cook and consume total 117 different items, including 36,376 loaves of bread, 175,808 quarts of milk, 50,854 pounds of fresh meat and fish, 84 cases of fruit, vegetables and juices plus 110 cases of soap to wash the pots and pans.

All the meals will be cooked over an open fire of charcoal.

The scouts from the many countries of the world will be busy. They will be participating in such activities as hiking, archery, conservation practices, swimming, boating, canoeing, fishing, skill-rams, scoutcraft and campfire pursuits.

Under the theme "For Friendship," the 12th World Jamboree will not only be a showcase of international skills in camping, outdoor craft and folklore, but a living example of scouting's fellowship and brotherhood that transcends national boundaries.

The Jamboree will be a high-light of World Scouting's 60th anniversary year, marked from 1907 to 1967.
