Kosygin Accuses U.S. Of Inciting Middle East War

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin accused the United States Monday of inciting and encouraging Israel to war on the Arabs. The U.S. delegation quickly called the charge "entirely false."

Kosygin was not present to hear the reply from U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg. The Soviet leader, left the hall in a huff after his 15-minute speech. He was speaking in response to a question asked by the Soviet minister, Andrei A. Gromyko, said only "busy, busy" but in any case, Kosygin did not hear the U.S. reply. He made a verbal attack on virtually all aspects of U.S. foreign policy.

The Soviet premier accused the United States and Britain of inciting Israel to attack the Arabs. He promised the Arabs new Soviet support, and told the assembly to prove it was "able" to resist aggression.

Replying, Ambassador Goldberg said the United States was primarily interested in finding ways of narrowing differences with the Russians over the Middle East and "nothing could be further from the truth" than to say that the U.S. is in collision with Israel.

"Let me say that I must categorically reject as unfounded and unworthy the insinuation that the United States had any part whatsoever in the Middle East war, except to try to stop it by every means and in every stage," Goldberg reported.

Goldberg spoke briefly, in right of reply and promised that "tomorrow I shall set the record straight."

Kosygin spoke only an hour after President Johnson in Washington issued a major policy statement—urging international cooperation in the search for Middle East peace. The day thus brought indirect confrontation of the leaders of the world's two most powerful nations.

The Soviet leader warned that conflict in the Middle East could lead to nuclear war. He proposed a resolution seeking condemnation of Israel, its withdrawal from Arab territories, and the withdrawal of Israeli forces from captured Arab territory as a matter for negotiation along with the problem of Arab refugees, freedom of passage through international waterways, Arab recognition of Israel's right to exist and a limitation on the Middle East arms race.

"Certainly troops must be withdrawn, but there must also be recognized rights of national life—progress in solving the refugee problem—freedom of international maritime passage—limitation of the arms race—and respect for political independence and territorial integrity," Johnson said.

The President added that a simple withdrawal of Israeli forces would "not be a prescription for peace but for renewed hostilities," unless accompanied by negotiations for a general peace settlement in the area.

Johnson spoke at a foreign policy conference of educators at the State Department. But his policy statement was set in the context of global debate with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, scheduled to give his own Middle East policy views at a meeting of the General Assembly session in New York on June 20 or 21.

Johnson, laying down "five great principles of peace for the Middle East," appealed to the nations there to "shun another arms race, abandon 'a state of hate' and strive for a settlement."

"The world is watching," he said, "for the peace of the world is at stake."

Johnson's statement generally appeared to support what is understood here to be an Israeli position on troop withdrawals. It is, any agreement to withdraw Israeli troops from Egypt, Jordan or Syria should be linked to issues of vital interest to Israel, notably the Golan Heights.

Johnson for the most part was careful not to name specific countries, but it was clear he was speaking of Egypt when he referred to the closing of the Straits of Tiran—an action announced by Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser about two weeks before the fighting started.

If a single act of folly was more responsible for this war than any other," Johnson said, "it was the arbitrary and dangerous announcement that the Straits of Tiran would be closed."

Johnson, saying Israel and Arab states must be the peace-makers, promised U. S. support for peace measures both through the United Nations and through methods.

Johnson Talks On Arab-Israel Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson declared today that "certainly troops must be withdrawn" from captured territory in the war-torn Middle East but firmly linked the pull-back to negotiations of a general Arab-Israeli peace settlement.

In a major statement of U.S. policy, the President dealt with the withdrawal of Israeli forces from captured Arab territory as a matter for negotiation along with the problem of Arab refugees, freedom of passage through international waterways, Arab recognition of Israel's right to exist and a limitation on the Middle East arms race.

"Certainly troops must be withdrawn, but there must also be recognized rights of national life—progress in solving the refugee problem—freedom of international maritime passage—limitation of the arms race—and respect for political independence and territorial integrity," Johnson said.

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Lanting Is Named Speaker Of House As Session Starts

BOISE (AP) — A Twin Falls rancher and veteran legislator was sworn in today as speaker of the House as members of the 39th Idaho Legislature began their first special session.

Rep. William J. Lanting, R-Twin Falls, was elected by a unanimous ballot by the House. He replaces Pete T. Conrussa, R-Coeur d'Alene, who resigned after nine terms in the House, three of which he spent as speaker.

Two new members of the House were administered the oath of office. They are J. Wayne Hall, R-Pocatello, and John George, R-Shoshone. Hall was appointed to replace Rep. H. James D. Pocatello, who resigned shortly after the regular session. George replaced Conrussa.

With one additional Republican, the GOP holds a margin of 39 to 31 votes.

One new senator took his seat, John Gaige of Boise, replacing

Gov. Don W. Samuelson addressed a joint session this morning, praising the work done by the regular session and urging lawmakers to clear up the remaining problems and adjourn.

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Nasser Lists Changes In Government

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt announced sweeping changes in the government today and named himself premier of a new cabinet, Cairo Radio said.

The cabinet shuffle was announced 10 days after Nasser offered to resign as leader of Egypt in the wake of the Arab-Israeli war, Nasser's resignation was withdrawn when the National Assembly refused to accept it.

Cairo radio said Nasser appointed four vice presidents in the new government. One of them was Zakaria Mohieddin, whom he had named as his successor when he resigned.

Premier Sidky Soliman, replaced as premier by Nasser, was named vice president and minister of industry and power. He was also named minister for the Aswan High Dam.

Missing Burley Boy Is Feared Drowned

BURLEY — Searching operations for a 3 1/2-year-old Burley boy feared drowned in the Snake river continued Monday.

Cassia County Sheriff Ray Mitchell said the child, Jimmy Peacock, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Peacock, presently in Alaska where the father is stationed with the U. S. Air Force, was missed about 11 a.m. Sunday and a search was started immediately.

The boy had been playing in the yard at the home of his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Gale Burton, with whom he is staying. The Burtons live four miles west and one mile north of Burley along the Snake River.

After searching the immediate area and with neighbors, the Burtons notified the sheriff at 12:30 p.m. Sunday.

About 75 friends and neighbors walked through grain and hay fields over a two-mile square area Sunday afternoon. Dragging operations were begun on the river. The sheriff said the river raised about a foot during the afternoon and evening because of water released at American Falls.

John Brog, Burley pilot, flew over the fields in the area as well as the river Sunday afternoon.

Two boats were on the river Monday morning and another was expected, the sheriff said.

The little boy was last seen wearing a light blue turtleneck shirt and light blue pants, the family said.

Guerrillas Fail To Storm U.S. Position

SAIGON (AP) — A hard-core battalion of some 500 guerrillas left 45 dead on a blackened battlefield Sunday after failing to storm the bastion of a U.S. armored cavalry force.

Attempting to smash into American positions just after midnight, the guerrillas were met by the heaviest guns in the U.S. arsenal—175 mm cannon.

The American cavalrymen got a brief warning of impending attack when small Communist patrol ran into a Communist rifle team. The U.S. patrol was evidently then surprised at daylight that 45 bodies were found and more had evidently been carried off in the darkness.

The cavalrymen also took 13 prisoners and picked up 18 weapons.

In the central highlands and in the Mekong Delta, Communist forces continued harassing mortar attacks against U.S. and South Vietnamese units. Near Pleiku, in the highlands, a mortar attack on a 4th Infantry Division post wounded 15 Americans. In the delta mortar attacks were directed at militia outposts, inflicting light casualties.

In the air war, American pilots continued to concentrate on Hanoi's rail connections with Red China.

The Air Force communique noted that Hanoi's main air-cable rail line has been heavily pounded on 12 of the past 18 days.

Walkout Hits Rail Yards In California

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of the International Association of Machinists reportedly walked off their jobs in the Southern Pacific Railroad yards at Roseville, Calif., as a no-strike period imposed in six shopcraft unions by Congress came to an end early today.

The unions had pledged to continue working pending further congressional legislative action.

A spokesman for the Association of American Railroads said the workers quit at 12:01 a.m. and members of other unions were refusing to cross the picket line.

Union Pacific To Buy New Cars

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The Union Pacific Railroad has announced it is placing orders for \$3.3 million "worth" of new freight cars.

Union Pacific President Edd D. Beatty said the orders were placed in a quick response to President Johnson's signing of a bill reinstating the seven percent investment credit to industry.

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Kosygin Does Tourist Bit In New York City

NEW YORK (AP) — Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin took the "tourist" route through Manhattan Sunday, but left his limousine only twice to take a walk — along Wall Street and a special Avenue A area of expensive shops.

Following his 2 1/2-hour, 36-mile trip, Kosygin summed it up through an interpreter as "wonderful."

With Kosygin in the air-conditioned car equipped with bullet-proof windows, his daughter, Ludmila Gushchina, Soviet Ambassador to the United States Anatoly G. Dobrynin, and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko.

They were surrounded by thousands of Soviet tourists who were kept at least 50 feet from the party.

Among the sights shown Kosygin were the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, Brooklyne Union Squares, Trinity Church, Grand Central Terminal, and the East Village, the hippie headquarters.

The seven-car motorcade, flanked by armed police, began and ended the tour at the Soviet U.N. Mission on East 87th Street. Sunday traffic is usually light in Manhattan, and overcast clouds came down on the number of strollers and sightseers.

Kosygin became the first Soviet leader to visit New York City. Nikita Khrushchev was driven along the street in 1959, but stayed in his car.

Kosygin's four-block walk took him past the New York Stock Exchange and some major points of interest, including the echelons of American economic power.

On Fifth Avenue, the premier walked from 38th Street to 23rd Street.

The few passersby showed only mild curiosity. One woman said of Kosygin, who was wearing a dark gray suit and dark blue and black striped tie: "If I have all those people around him, I'd think he was a businessman."

Kosygin drew his first pickets since he arrived Saturday for an emergency session of the U.N. General Assembly.

Around the corner from the Soviet Mission, some 100 Jews protested Soviet support of Arab nations. The group sang, clapped and chanted for several hours before dispersing.

LONDON (AP) — The newspaper the Sunday Citizen folded Sunday. 42 years after it started as a successor to Reynolds News.

Reynold's News began in 1850, dedicated to "the cause of freedom and the interests of the enslaved masses." It was a left-wing newspaper.

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Divorced Mother Of Two Receives Welfare Aid To Win College Degree

NEW YORK (AP) — It took Gladys Moody more than 20 years-of and 0-10's get through college, part of the time while receiving welfare "payments," today with a sociology degree, Mrs. Moody starts work as a hospital caseworker, helping others with problems.

"I'm in a better position to help them," said a firm, divorced mother of two. "I can understand what they feel."

She knows first hand, she said in an interview, the "decided stigma" attached to being on welfare.

She said that when her youngest, Eugene, was born 2 1/2 years ago, she was separated and applying for a divorce. She said she didn't know her husband's whereabouts, and had given up her job to go to school to take care of the baby.

She had a hard choice to make. She could either put Eugene up for adoption, as friends suggested, and go back to work. Or she could go on welfare, try to finish school while she cared for the baby, and hope ultimately to land a job enabling her to support her family.

"Relief was a horrible word in my family," said the daughter of a tailor. "But I had no choice. I couldn't give up the baby."

Welfare workers, she said, told her they had never before said anyone through college. That, she said, was a test case in New York State.

Mrs. Moody secured a National Council on Social Welfare government program and went back to school.

She had started college in 1945, taking 1 1/2 years at a Rutgers-Union branch in Atlantic City, N.J., until she no longer could bear up to working nights and attending classes nights.

She came to New York in May 1948 and took a job. Later, she enrolled part-time at the City College of New York. Research. Then came night classes at Brooklyn College, finishing a 70-page, still unpublished novel, "When Sugar Comes Along," in 1955; and after son Werner, now 10, was born, more evening schooling at City College.

Bomb Rips Auto, Killing Ex-Convict

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An ex-convict, a businessman in a plush northwest Los Angeles area was blown apart Sunday by a bomb planted in his car.
