Albania Makes Charges Against Soviet Union

By WILLIAM N. OATIS, UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Albania, the U.N. voice of Red China, charged today that the Soviet Union called the emergency session of the General Assembly to hide its "treachery" against the Arabs and as a plot to negotiate with President Johnson "at the expense of the peoples of the world."

The attack was delivered as Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin already was headed back to Moscow by way of Havana, Cuban Foreign Minister Alexei N. Nasti told the 12-nation assembly the Kosygin government had snubbed the Arab countries in the back.

"He declared the 'progressive peoples' of the world were 'profoundly indignant' at the 'treacherous' meeting of Kosygin and Johnson. He called the Soviet position on the Middle East 'hypocritical' and added that a Soviet aid to the Arabs 'is a vast fraud.'

"Down with the Kosygin-Johnson plot," he said. "The Russians, he added, not only failed to come to the aid of the Arabs 'but they reached an understanding with the United States to coordinate their actions inside and outside the United Nations.'

Nasti declared: "We would like to make this clear to you, the American imperialists and the Soviet revisionists—you will never conquer us, you will never take us by surprise."

"Do not imagine, you Americans, that Albania is alone and isolated. Albania has powerful friends."

To the Soviet "revisionists," he said: "We repulse your friendship."

"We are eternally faithful friends of our Soviet brothers. The Soviet people will punish

Tornadoes, Storms Kill 22 In Europe

LONDON (AP)—Tornadoes and violent thunderstorms roared across northwestern Europe over the weekend, killing at least 22 persons and injuring nearly 200.

A tornado that smashed parts of a half-dozen villages near Douai, France, left seven dead and about 110 injured. Another tornado that struck the French villages, killed 17 and injured 170 when a tornado swept through parts of the Netherlands.

Weatherman said it was the same tornado that struck the French villages.

Church Pushes For Cutting Arms Supplies

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress must take the initiative in curtailing U.S. arms supplies to other nations, Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, and Joseph S. Clark, D-Maine, agreed today.

They maintained that the White House and Defense Department had shown no inclination to cut back on military aid.

Both are members of the Foreign Relations Committee.

"Until Congress takes up an act," Church said, "the general arms giveaway will continue."

Clark suggested an initial step could be a congressional ban on any more U.S. arms aid to Arab nations.

"These discussions came before an almost-empty Senate chamber as Church delivered a policy speech on the arms race, particularly in the Middle East."

Fireworks

BOISE (AP)—The so-called "safe and sane" fireworks are being offered for sale in Idaho this year—but officials said there have been no indications that an attempt will be made to sell the "dangerous" type.

State law has banned sale or use of fireworks for many years, except under license for public display.

The 1967 legislature revised the statute, continuing the provision for licensing public displays but also authorizing cities and counties to regulate sale and use of the "safe and sane" fireworks.

Ed Simmerman, executive secretary of the association of Idaho cities, said: "Virtually all of the larger communities have enacted ordinances which, in general, permit sale of the 'safe and sane' type, but only during short periods of time including the Fourth of July."

Decision On Annex Appealed

Contractors of Twin Falls have filed an appeal with the Supreme Court to the decision of Fifth District Judge Gus Carr Anderson, Pocatello, in their suit against Twin Falls County.

Prosecuting Attorney Felton received notice of the appeal and was ordered with Lloyd Webby, appointed as special attorney in the case, to appear before the Supreme court in Boise Thursday at 10 a.m. to show cause.

In Sardis Sunday, as he celebrated his 34th birthday, Meredith said he may stop in Washington, D.C., at a Capitol 25 miles short of the end at Jackson.

Kosygin Leaves U.S. For Cuba After 9 Days

NEW YORK (AP)—Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin left the United States for Cuba today after an historic nine-day stay in this country during which he met with President Johnson and pleaded the Arab cause before the United Nations General Assembly.

The Russian's big turboprop aircraft, Ilyushin 18, lifted off at a runway at Kennedy Airport at 12:07 p.m. and turned south toward Cuba on a flight expected to take just over four hours.

Kosygin would be the first high-ranking Soviet official to visit the Caribbean regime of Prime Minister Fidel Castro since Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan traveled there in 1965.

Kosygin met for more than 10 hours in the little college town of Glassboro, N.J., last Friday and Sunday. They appeared amiable after each session, but neither retreated from stated positions on Vietnam or the Middle East.

President Johnson said he held an impromptu news conference at the airport during which he indicated, as he did Sunday, that he would not welcome Kosygin to visit the Soviet Union at present.

Asked if he had invited Johnson to Moscow, Kosygin said: "First of all, I think we

Summit Meet Fails To Change Postures On World Issues

By LEWIS GULICK, GLASSBORO, N.J. (AP)—President Johnson and Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin met for the summit and down again without shifting their postures on issues deeply divisive to the world's greatest powers.

This was not unexpected. But was the exercise worthwhile? From the U.S. standpoint, the answer is probably a qualified yes. A more definite verdict can only come with time.

On the plus side is the fact that familiarity with the other man and his views—that each leader gained in the 10 hours of talks, much of this in private sessions with only interpreters present. The two had never met before.

Another plus can be counted their orders to Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko to negotiate on some of the political problems which they did not unravel at Glassboro.

The summit push to keep diplomatic contacts alive between Washington and Moscow is reasoned, can eventually lead toward solutions of some of the deeply imbedded difficulties between them.

President Johnson and Premier Kosygin apparently made clear to each other and to a concerned world that they recognize the awesome responsibilities of avoiding a nuclear holocaust.

Mrs. Kosygin, in her stern words at his U.S. news conference Sunday night, quickly stripped away any euphoria that may have sprung from the length of his two-stage party with the President.

Senate Committee Approves Debt Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Finance Committee quickly approved today the bill to raise the national debt limit to \$35 billion.

The committee rejected three amendments offered by Sen. John Williams, R-Iowa, and then cleared the measure to the Senate floor by voice vote.

Democratic leaders are anxious to get the measure through the Senate without any change so that it will go directly to President Johnson without the necessity of a conference with the House.

The House approved earlier this month a hike in the national ceiling to \$35 billion.

Congress must complete action on it before a 10-day July recess starts on Thursday. Friday at midnight, the present \$34 billion temporary debt limit expires.

If the authorization is not granted by Friday, \$3.8 million in funds appropriated for the current year will be lost.

Senate leaders plan quick action if the House approves the bill, worked out in committee.

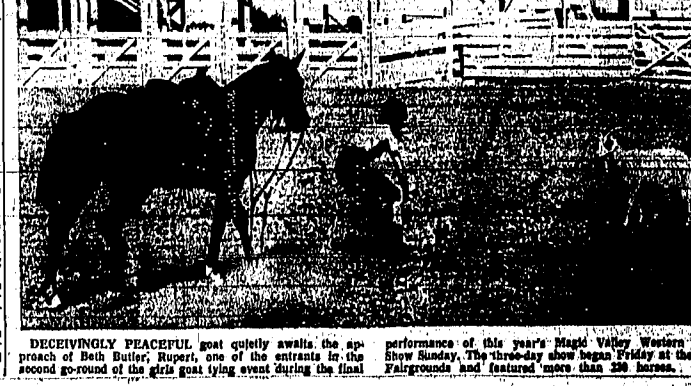

Tax Rise Expected

There no longer can be doubt that the on-again-off-again income tax increase is on again. Not only is it "definitely" alive, says Assistant Commerce Secretary Shaw...

The real inflation threat comes from the budget deficit. Even with a 6 per cent tax increase, the deficit in the new fiscal year is estimated at \$1 billion.

Lesson In Oil

Most arguments about import quotas and restrictions center on their economic aspects. Free trade partisans point out that the fewer the restrictions, the lower prices to the consumer.

Opening the borders to a still greater flow of foreign oil—above the 2.5 million barrels now being imported daily, at a cost of \$1 billion a year—would cause a proportionate shrinkage in the domestic oil producing industry.

Egypt Uses Dread Nerve Gas

WASHINGTON—In an isolated corner of the world inhabited only by primitive tribesmen—a new terror of modern warfare has been tested for the first time. Negro Riots Viewed As Cry For Help

WASHINGTON (AP) — The President's crime commission warns that Negro riots of recent years are a "cry for help" which must not be ignored. "The ghetto itself, with all the shameful economic, social, political and psychological deprivation it causes, must be dealt away with once and for all," the commission said. "The riots have let America know that this is what must be done. 'Now America must do it.' The statement on rioting — released Saturday — was one of several key conclusions reached by the commission in the last of nine reports on crime which it has issued during a 2-year, \$2 million study. The commission's executive director, James Vorenberg, said "a large part of the commission's work will have gone to waste" if Congress does not pass President Johnson's crime bill. That measure, set for vote in the House, would provide \$2 billion in the first year for grants to cities and states for improving crime control.

India Claims Support On War View

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Indira Gandhi declared Sunday night a 6 m.e. Western countries have swung over to India's view that Israel was the aggressor in the war with the Arabs. She told the closing session of a national meeting of her ruling Congress party that India's opinion as to who escalated the crisis had been corroborated by subsequent reports and developments. "We cannot support territorial changes effected by force of arms or agree that any country should be allowed to keep the fruits of aggression," she declared in referring to the territory now held by Israel. "The party adopted unanimously a resolution supporting the government's pro-Arab stand. It had been toned down because of an objection of some in the party hierarchy and did not specifically name Israel. It did refer to the government's earlier stand that the Gulf of Aqaba was not an international waterway."

General Dies

LONDON (AP) — The death of Gen. Sir Alan Burns, a founder of the British commandos, was announced today. He died Saturday at Torquay, Devon, aged 84. Gen. Burns was the first director of British combined operations. He formed the "Independent striking units" after the 1940 Dunkerque evacuation.

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — Kukuwa Cameron, a former vaudeville star who became famous in the 1930s as the partner of comedian Al Traham, died Sunday. She was 64.

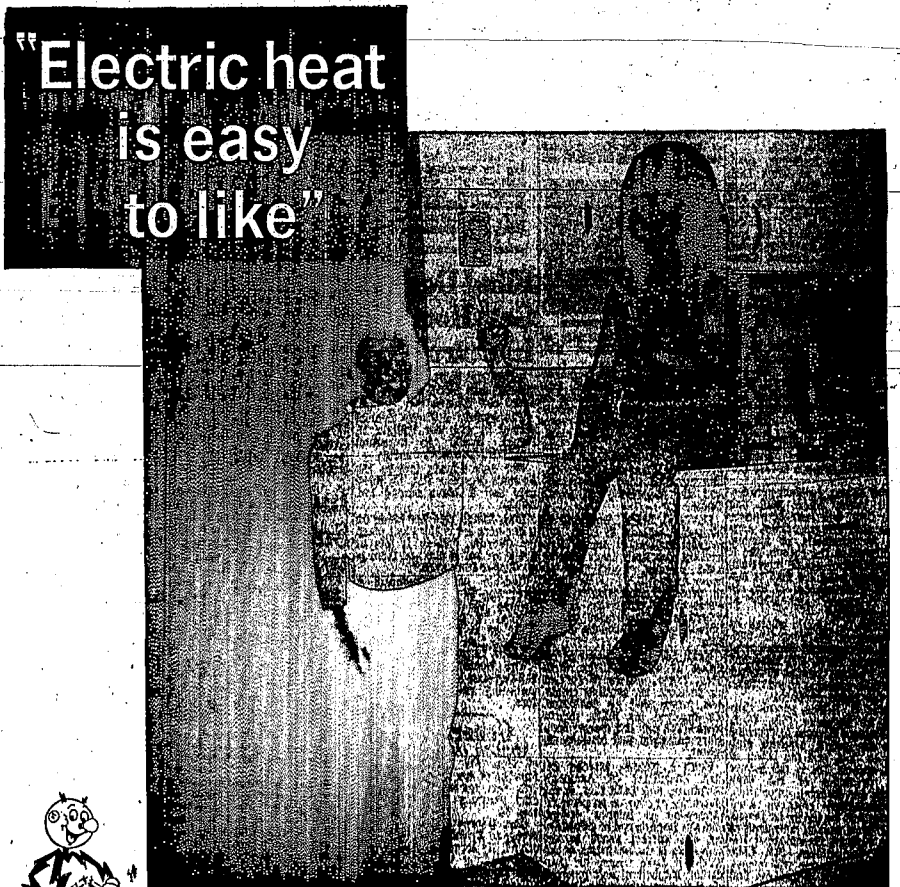

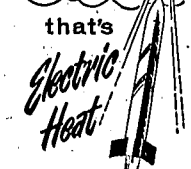

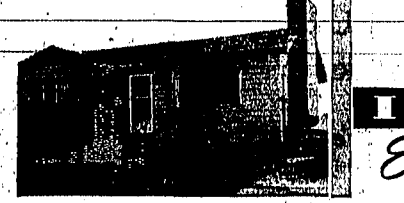

Bombing Strategy Argued By Experts

By FRED S. HOFFMAN
WASHINGTON (AP) — Some top U.S. officials are beginning to call the air war against North Vietnam a yielding, diminishing-gains—withering industrial-type target in the Hanoi-and-Haliphong areas.

But other authorities argue that to do so would result in swelling the volume of supplies and equipment to Communist forces in South Vietnam.

Those holding this general view say the Communists have been employing many more antiaircraft guns and more long-range North Vietnamese pan-artillery and that concentrating attacks there would not likely result in the toll of U.S. planes.

Moreover, they contend that the movement of material should be interdicted not only at the lower end of the pipeline but at the top where it enters the infiltration pipeline.

They also bring in missiles and other sophisticated equipment from the Soviet Union. Officers said they do not believe that the Chinese are holding up any of the Russian-made equipment.

Another area of bombing concentration is the panhandle and the route around the Bay near Laos and the Sihanouk trail via Cambodia into South Vietnam.

The lowest estimate shows that some 8,000 antiaircraft guns throughout North Vietnam, an increase of about a thousand since early spring.

The North Vietnamese have had little success with their surface-to-air missiles. An estimated 3,000 SAMs have been fired against U.S. warplanes so far and only about a 2 or 3 per cent have scored kills.

But American pilots say summary losses of U.S. fighters directly caused losses by forcing planes into evasion tactics which brought them to altitudes where conventional antiaircraft fire could reach them.

Pentagon sources said this situation has been countered to some extent with better radar jamming.

A total of 589 U.S. warplanes have been lost over North Vietnam since the first of the year.

The vast majority of the losses have been to F-4s, F-105s and 108mm antiaircraft fire.


