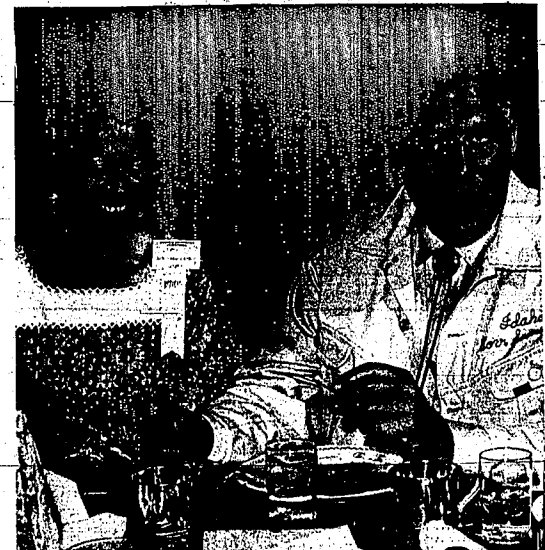

## White House Appeals To Israel On Annexation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House made a public appeal to Israel today to avoid any quick annexation of the old section of Jerusalem seized from Jordan in the Middle East war. "The President is confident that the wisdom and good judgment of those now in control of Jerusalem will prevent any such action," the statement said. "The pronouncement came on the heels of word from Jerusalem that the Israelis, in a step toward annexation, had unified municipal services between the sectors of the city. Assistant press secretary Tom Johnson read the statement which said Johnson "assumes that before any unilateral action is taken on the status of Jerusalem there will be appropriate consultation with religious leaders and others who are deeply concerned."

## Hussein Expected To Ask Johnson For Help To Bail Out His Battered Nation

WASHINGTON (AP) — King Hussein of Jordan is expected to ask President Johnson to help bail out his battered nation—No. 1 loser in the Arab-Israeli war—when the two talk at the White House today. U.S. officials said Hussein's expected appeal for help will meet with sympathy from the President. But they said Israeli occupation of some of Jordan's most valuable territory makes unclear what action the United States could take. Behind administration sympathy for Hussein and his nation is the King's long-standing status as the most pro-Western head of state in the Arab world. There also is recognition that Jordan needs speedy assistance in easing the burden of daily increasing numbers of refugees from land now held by the Israelis. Officials note, however, that the refugee problem is international in scope and has been handled most effectively by the U.N. Relief and Work Agency. UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Secretary-General U Thant in his report to the U. N. General Assembly Tuesday said Egypt was responsible for "the direct confrontation" with Israel that led to war. But he avoided pinning blame on Egypt by firing the first shot in the six-day war between Israel and the Arab Nations that began June 5. The statement came in his defense of his decision to withdraw at Egypt's request the U.N. Emergency Force that had been requested by the uneasy armistice since the Israeli-Egyptian conflict of 1956.

# Tax Surcharge Consideration May Be Slow

By EDMOND LEBRON (AP) WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite prodding from two influential administration-figures, Congress is unlikely to begin considering until late summer the income tax surcharge President Johnson proposed six months ago.

Chairman William McCleskey Martin Jr. of the Federal Reserve Board said Monday that he is in favor of a surcharge, saying he would support a steeper increase than the proposed six percent if it needed to combat inflation.

Then on Tuesday, Chairman Gardner Ackley of Johnson's Council of Economic Advisors

agreed urged congressional consideration of the surcharge, but said it would be more than six percent would do the job.

But the congressional timetable appears to rule out hearing the bill until August, when Johnson was to send to Capitol Hill legislation spelling out his tax proposals—which he has not yet done.

There were indications Johnson, who originally asked for an increase effective Saturday, may be happy to have one six months later.

The House Ways and Means committee, where all tax legislation is first considered, is now near finished with its consideration of a complex bill to amend the Social Security Act, which would raise the tax on such as medicare. The House begins a 10-day July recess Thursday, as does the Senate.

Committee Chairman Wilbur

D. Mills, D-Ark., has said the committee may be held by the Security bill likely in July, but other committee members speculate about dates like Aug. 15, another week or 10 days would be required for House consideration and passage, and the committee would not take up another major measure during this period.

Heckings on a tax increase, if any are held, are likely to be prolonged. Although the administration would like to confine the issue to a simple yes or no on an increase in personal and corporate income taxes, spokesmen for a variety of projects will be pressing for a chance to voice them.

## Small Number Of Auto Workers May Veto UAW Negotiations

By A.F. MAHAN — which production workers attempted to lure tradesmen from UAW ranks, contending that industry-wide unions such as the UAW are dominated by production workers and wants of the skilled are overlooked.

The UAW amended its constitution in 1966 to permit contract voting by segments and to give the segments veto power.

Separate voting was made contingent on approval of the union's international executive board. Approval for 1967 now has been granted.

The Independent International Society of Skilled Trades has

approved for some 8,000 union-represented white-collar workers at Chrysler.

If any segment — production, skilled or white-collar — turns down a contract, the pact is killed for all workers within that company.

Automakers fear such a ratification procedure heightens chances of a major strike. Current contracts expire Sept. 5. Bargaining begins in 12 days.

Production workers within the Big Three outnumber skilled tradesmen more than 5 to 1. Chrysler's white-collar workers are less than one-tenth of the UAW's membership within that corporation.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther is on record as saying if skilled, production or white-collar workers vote against ratification "then there is no contract — it is as simple as that."

## Rep. Green Battles Educators

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., appears on the verge of another triumph over the Office of Education in her fight to enlarge the role of states in federal education programs. The Senate is expected to give approval today to a bill redefining the Teacher Corps along lines laid down by Mrs. Green in the House Education and Labor subcommittee she heads. ## Scientific Research Explosion Is Bringing Revolution In Dentistry

Back in the Revolutionary War era, a wealthy man sometimes would buy another man's tooth.

It would be a healthy tooth. A dentist would pull it, and then place it in the purchaser's jaw to replace a missing front tooth, or a molar for a better attack on a steak.

Unhappily, the borrowed tooth lasted only a matter of months. Some 6,000 years earlier, wealthy Chinese had tried the same experiment, with similar failure.

But now an explosion in scientific research is bringing a revolution in dentistry. From it may come:

- Tooth banks to give you healthy living teeth when needed.
- Vaccines to prevent tooth decay. Researchers are already identifying certain germs that appear involved in decay.
- Reductions of 50 to 80 per cent in present rates of decay through new or more effective ways of using protective fluorine compounds.
- More effective prevention and treatment of pyorrhea or periodontal disease, the destroyer of gum and bone tissue, and the main reason why people lose their teeth after age 35.
- Dentistry is maturing to become a true health science.

Dr. Robert J. Nelson of the National Institute of Dental Research, Bethesda, Md., who developed the first successful high-speed water-cooled turbine drill.

How, he and others explain, dental research is leaping ahead through enlistment of cooperative skills of engineers, biologists, polymer chemists, physi-

ologists, bacteriologists, metallurgists, crystallographers, and other specialists as well as dentists.

This year some 3,700 research projects concerned directly or indirectly with tooth and mouth health are in progress in this country alone. The range is tremendously varied.

Barnacles are one interest. These creatures exude a liquid that hardens in water to form an unbelievably tenacious cement, as any sailor knows.

By solving the barnacle's secrets, scientists hope to fashion new dental cements that will hold indefinitely and prevent tooth decay from occurring by health fillings. Similar cements might be found to serve as filling materials themselves or as protective coatings for the tooth to last a lifetime.

Longer-lasting dentures are promised from findings by Dr. George C. Paffenbarger, senior research associate of the American Dental Association at the National Bureau of Standards, Washington, D.C.

He and associates applied a new silane glue to bond porcelain teeth to acrylic resin denture bases. Tests show the dentures made stronger—and that germs and bacteria cannot seep between the teeth and base.

This technique also may eliminate the need for gold alloy pins to attach front teeth, thus promising savings up to \$3 million a year. The dream of borrowing a natural tooth is being pursued at several centers, including the National Institute's clinical section headed by Dr. Harold R. Stanley.

LeFlore has served on several civil rights groups and is the first Negro member of the Mobile Housing Board. He also was named to the Mobile Transit Commission and the U.S. Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights.

## President Defends War Policies

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—President Johnson, not libbing freely and drawing their applause from a convention of youthful businessmen, has strongly defended his policies and crisply criticized his critics.

In a speech that led the ring of campaign oratory, the President assailed the "cussers and doubters" and asked support from "doers and builders" to carry out his policies at home and in Vietnam.

Johnson disputed claims by antiwar critics that war exists are curtailing sharply antipower programs.

Johnson only briefly mentioned his weekend summit meetings with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, saying: "Though our differences are many and though they run very deep, we know that in the world's interest it was important that we understand the motivations as well as the commitments of each other. We religiously, dedicatedly, and determinedly worked at that assignment for two days."

"That is why we met—to bring about better understanding, and to discuss respective goals and commitments, we came there."

"When we left I believe we had achieved that."

McFarland said he also got to see John Stahnaker, executive secretary of the Council on Presidential Scholars; Sargent Shriver, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity; Justice Douglas and Thurgood Marshall, newly appointed Supreme Court Justice.

He also caught a glimpse of Mrs. Johnson and saw Lyndon Bird Johnson at the Presidential reception.

McFarland, who has been named a National Merit Scholar to attend New Mexico Highlands University at Las Vegas, N. M., next fall to major in chemistry, will spend the summer working on the family ranch.

## Grand Jury Wants To Check Powell's Expense Records

WASHINGTON (AP)—A federal grand jury wants a look at Adam Clayton Powell's expense records as part of its probe of the elected but unseated congressman's affairs.

Powell, a Democrat from Harlem, was excluded from the House at the start of the current session because of alleged financial misconduct.

The grand jury's request for travel vouchers and telephone costs of Powell and his staff was revealed Tuesday when the House clerk and sergeant-at-arms said they have been subpoenaed to bring the records to a grand jury session Aug. 7 in Washington and the House gave its required approval.

Powell, a Negro, told a news conference Tuesday at his Bahamian retreat on Bimini that he would be willing to accept censure by the House—the punishment meted out by the Senate last week against Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., also accused of financial misconduct.

But Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., who headed the house committee that probed Powell's financial affairs, said he sees no chance his colleagues would be willing to admit Powell and then censure him.

Powell was re-elected overwhelmingly in April to the seat vacated by his exclusion from the House. But he has not attempted again to be seated. Instead, he has pursued his court bid to overturn his original exclusion.

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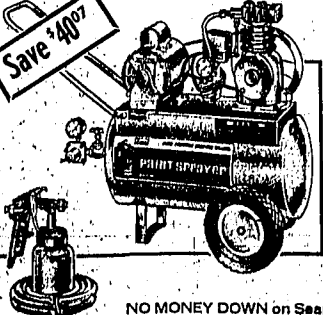
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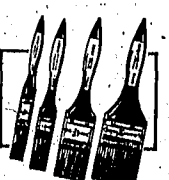

# N. Y. Welfare Workers Protest Wages; Losers Are Slum Needy

 NEW YORK (AP) — The young man and his wife sat on the wooden chairs in the sterile gray and green room and held hands. He was 23 and she was 18. They had been married four months. They were being evicted from their apartment and had three days to find a new place. They were losers—two of the 650,000 persons on the city's welfare rolls.

This month many of them are losers—caught in the middle of a situation they didn't want, didn't cause and don't need.

It started 10 days ago when about 80 per cent of the Department of Welfare's case workers began refusing to do their assigned tasks in a demonstration to underscore a contract dispute with the city.

To avoid breaking a state law prohibiting strikes by public employees, they went to work but did no work, meeting in seminars instead.

A few days later, the city decided that if the case workers wanted to hold seminars, they could hold them just as well on sidewalks and permitted only those willing to perform "assigned work" to enter the welfare centers.

At some of the city's 33 cen-

ters, those willing to work under the specified conditions numbered only two or three of a normal staff of 100 or more. Supervisory personnel and office help were brought in to replace missing case workers.

It hasn't been enough. Welfare Department spokesmen said that the temporary setup has been sufficient to maintain at least emergency services.

Some doubt it.

"This is our third day here," the young husband said. "Each time we come about 10 in the morning and at 4 in the afternoon they give us cards and tell us to come back tomorrow. They give us numbers to keep us in order. Today I got number 37. About 12:30 they called number 45. They haven't called another number since."

It was then 2 p.m.

"We owe 3 1/2 weeks rent," the man said. "This morning the landlord told us he couldn't wait any more. They've got to help us today."

He said he'd held a job which paid him bare subsistence wages until last week. Then he quit because he couldn't get a raise.

In the early morning hours since then he has walked the streets looking for work, he said, but he can't spend the whole day at it because he has

to be at the welfare center early.

He said he knew where there were some jobs—but he didn't have the 40 cents in subway fare needed to get there and back.

Outside, six members of the Social Service Employees Union marched back and forth.

"We feel awful about those people in there," said Michael McKain.

"But I'll quit before I go back in there if the city doesn't honor its promises to us," McKain declared.

The SEU contract expired last Jan. 15. At that time, the contract dispute precipitated a three-day walkout that ended when the city said it would send the wage issue to fact-finding, open direct negotiations on "other issues" and later send still-unresolved problems to fact-finding.

Mayor John V. Lindsay has called the nonworking case workers "small irresponsible group that caused trouble for everybody."

The city, through its director of labor relations, Herbert Haber, now says there are some issues which are "not bargainable"—demands by the union for control of what the city considers management prerogatives.

According to SEU President Judith Mage, the city promised in January to allow fact-finders to decide what was not—and is therefore now going back on a promise.

One of the issues, she said, is whether the contract should provide for a fund to pay case workers full salary while they are sustained on the job. This, she said, the city has termed un-bargainable.

The union's action now threatens to spread to the city's three children's shelters, the institutions run to care for children whose mothers cannot be with them during the day.

One of the welfare recipients affected by the dispute says he couldn't care less which side is right or who will win. All he knows is that he is losing.

There was one man who had to plead with a policeman to put him on a subway free so he could ride 54 blocks to his center to sit all day and hope someone would give him money for a small dinner and train fare home.

No one did.

Another man had been wait-

ing for a welfare check two weeks overdue. He had been living for two weeks on handouts from friends. Tuesday, he said, "I ran out of friends."

The administrators who have continued working, and the office people filling the gaps, are distressed by the dispute.

"What are you going to do?" one working administrator said. "My people aren't striking for money. They're out fighting for protection for when they have to go into slum areas on field calls. They deserve the protection. But 650,000 people also deserve to eat and sleep with a roof over their heads."

"This isn't a clear-cut issue. It's just a tragedy."

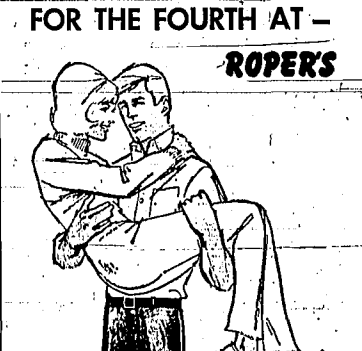

# Consumers Organize To Protest Deception

WASHINGTON (NEA)—What happens when the consumer is pushed too far and becomes fazed by shoddy merchandise, unscrupulous salespersons, misleading credit charges?  
Waits happened.  
That is the opinion of many who are working with the poverty programs. They are watching the handling of the numerous consumer protection bills outlined by President Johnson in a special message to the 90th Congress.  
The multimillion dollar shock to retailers and property owners last summer in Los Angeles is a dramatic, if loaded, argument for more interest in the consumer.  
The President's Committee on Consumer Interests points out that two groups need the most protection from federal, state and local governments. These are the poverty-stricken and the elderly.  
A pilot project on consumer education for the low income people in the capital is under way and, if successful, will be used in other cities. Special committees are meeting to investigate bilking of the elderly through real estate fraud, drug and medical quackery. And the President asked for congressional action in these areas.  
It is estimated there are 10 million American families living in or on the doorstep of poverty. Allied with them are the retired or elderly called "the most in-tense" consumers. These really are the full-time consumers who must get the most for their money.  
However, the politicians who may use the consumer bills to look in '68 votes are thinking of the midstrata, those who supposedly can read, write and who should be equipped to buy wisely.

"We are concerned with the middle class. They could use their money to better purposes." That they find it difficult to do so when shopping comes out in a study revealed by the president's Consumer Advisory Council. College-educated shoppers directed to select the least expensive packages in 20 product categories failed 43 per cent of the time, at an extra cost of 9 per cent. This is one argument for federal action to help the consumer.  
Another point is that "the consumer must be a chemist, mechanic, electrician and nutritionist to fathom what he is buying, what it will do, how well it will perform and endure, and how to take care of it."  
Some consumer dilemmas include:  
The woman who bought a \$14.98 per square yard carpet and discovered one sunny day that the fabric installed varied in quality and color from room to room.  
The young man who took a trial membership in a health club and learned later he had unknowingly signed a contract and owed the club \$168.  
The mother and father who accepted and paid premiums for a "serviceman's policy" issued by a fly-by-night firm.  
According to Gale Gotschall, assistant counsel for the FTC, in the last year there has been a 40 per cent increase in deceptive practice complaints. He feels, though, that this reflects "not so much an increase in actual deceptive practices going on in the economy but more awareness of the consumer of availability of aid."  
Yet he also answers the question, "Does the consumer know where to go for help?" with, "If more consumers would factually report what they think is deception, fraud or a bad product to the FTC, the FDA, the BBB or local Chamber of Commerce, we could focus on the problems more effectively," Gotschall adds.  
He stresses that about half of the complaints to FTC are from legitimate businessmen who would like to see bad business practice stopped. It hurts the consumer, the FTC, however, and other governmental agencies would prefer state or local officials to take the lead.  
But Gotschall realistically doesn't believe in the honor system. "The public can't protect itself from false, fraudulent acts through self-regulation by industry if the regulation is not backed by laws and departments to protect the honest."

Consumers are organizing. Mrs. Paul West, a housewife who spearheaded the supermarket boycotts in the Denver area last year, is president of the new United National Consumers Association, Inc.  
Another group, the Consumer Organization Federation, is headed by the Rev. Robert J. McEwen, S.J., chairman of Boston College's Economics Department. He was a member of the President's Consumer Advisory Committee. It is reported there are 30,000 members in 37 states of Federated State Consumer groups.  
The Office of Economic Opportunity has an \$8-million budget and has set up 114 consumer education projects. Work being done with the Girl Scouts, the YWCA, the Omaha Job Corps as steps in shaping up tomorrow's better buyers.

The American Home Economics Association plans a national workshop in the fall on "Credit in Family Financial Management." There are a few pilot projects in high schools but here only the seed is planted. It will take three or four years to work on a similar education into schools.

## Senator Kennedy May Find Colorado River Challenge

PAGE, Ariz. (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy may find the mighty Colorado River more of a challenge than he bargains for, says Ted Hatch, a veteran river runner in charge of Kennedy family trip this week.

Kennedy is expected to test his skill in a kayak during part of the trip as he and 40 friends and family members float 87 miles down the river from below Glen Canyon Dam to Phantom Ranch in Grand Canyon National Park.

"I think these big rapids will be too much for him," said Hatch.

"But I know him — he will tackle them anyway."

He says the New York Democrat is "pretty good in a kayak" but believes the river will "win" and force Kennedy back into the party's larger watercraft. Hatch took the Kennedy's down the Yampa River in Utah and Colorado in 1965 and down the Middle Fork of the Salmon in Idaho last year.

He is the leader of leading river expeditions in the West.

"The party will leave Lee's Ferry Friday and will quickly hit some of the most challenging rapids of the planned 3 1/2 day trip."

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Mrs. Billie Jean King restored order to the Wimbledon L.A.W.A. Tennis Championship Tuesday by winning the first match in defense of her crown. Mrs. King of Long Beach, Calif., went into the third round with an 8-6, 6-2 victory over Ingrid Lofdahl of Sweden.

The American girl, frowning on fashion, played in an all-white ensemble and relied solely on her smashes and volleys to take her into the next round. But while Billie Jean kept to traditional white, other girls were producing a minor revolution on the hallowed courts of Wimbledon by playing in bloomers and dresses trimmed with red lace and red buttons.

Virginia Wade, eighth-seeded English girl, and Annette Van Duijn of South Africa, seventh-seeded, both broke through the Wimbledon barrier of all white. Miss Wade, a charming brunette, had red-trimmed bloomers and Annette wore a dress with red buttons.

Not a word of protest came from the All-England club officials — the most austere in the world of tennis — and not a word of protest came from opponents and umpires.

For a time it appeared as if Mrs. King might suffer the same fate that struck Manuel Santana of Spain, the defending men's singles champion, who was defeated in his opening defense on Monday.

The California matron, however, struggled into a 6-6 victory in the first set and then ran away with the second when she got her volleying at the net under control.

# Auto Club Reduces Threat Of Turbocar By Restricting Air Intake To 15 Inches

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — The U.S. Auto Club refashioned the turbine engine formula Monday and closed the garage doors on the revolutionary STP "Turbocar" which almost ran away from the Indianapolis 500-mile field this year.

Andy Granatelli, president of Stacker's STP Division and backer of the "Turbocar," called USA's restriction of the air intake area of the turbine "an outright political method of banning turbine engines in American racing."

"There is no way to change this engine," Granatelli said, "and have it operate properly or safely."

Earlier he said if his car was outlawed by penalties impossible to meet, "the door is clearly open to buy any other mechanical or safety change which will contribute toward winning."

USA's board of directors said the new formula would be effective Jan. 1, 1968. This permits the "Turbocar" to race the rest of this year, but no plans have been announced by Granatelli for other events.

committee and findings of experts, Binford said, showed the present formula was too generous. He said it gave the presently-used turbine engine a distinct advantage over the conventional piston engines.

Binford said it is felt the new formula will bring the turbine engine more closely in line both in horsepower and torque as applied power, with the piston engine.

Paul Baynes, a General Motors engineer who served as turbine consultant to the directors, said it would take two to four years to develop a new turbine engine that would meet the new limits.

The cost of such a project has been estimated as high as \$25 million, but more realistic guesses have set the figure at less than half that amount.

## Taxing Units To Be Advised On Levies

BOISE (AP) — Legislative officials promised prompt action today in an effort to advise all Idaho taxing units not to improve ad valorem levies in excess of their needs.

Arthur Wilson, secretary of the Senate, said his staff now is gathering addresses of the more than 1,000 governmental units in Idaho which have authority to levy taxes.

He said copies of the resolution enacted by the legislature's special session will be in the mail to the taxing units within a few days.

The resolution was enacted as a result of the failure by the regular session to continue a tax rollback that was ordered by the 1965 Legislature to compensate for increases in valuation during the four-year adjustment period it authorized.

The Supreme Court ruled early this year that the provision of the 1965 law which required utility property to be as-

essed at twice the ratio to actual value as other property was unconstitutional.

The 1967 Legislature enacted a new assessment equalization law, requiring that all property including that owned by utilities be assessed at 20 per cent of actual value but providing for a 10-year—instead of four-year—adjustment period to achieve that level.

The 1967 law, however, did not include the rollback provision, and in many areas assessed valuations already had been boosted substantially as a result of the 1965 law.

The resolution enacted by the special session called attention to the lack of the rollback and said "re-evaluation has resulted in large increases in the amount of property valuation available for assessment to local tax units."

"Consequently there is available to some taxing units more funds under the statutory limi-

tations than are needed to properly and economically fund units of local government."

Each district, under terms of Idaho law, is authorized to levy up to a certain amount. Tax authorities said that unless the units revise their levies, after getting official notification of their assessed valuation totals, considerable more in tax revenue could be collected than is justified.
