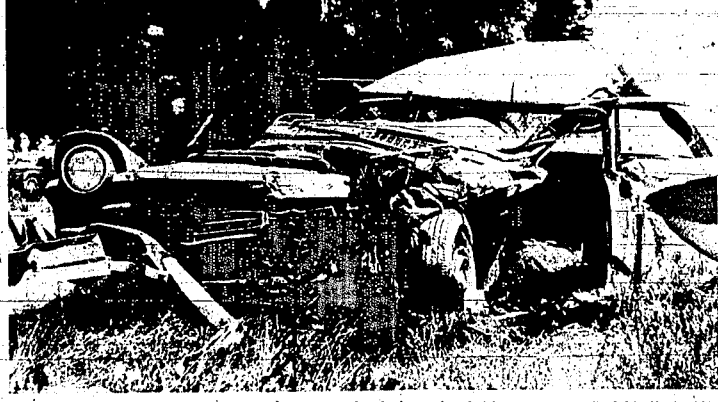

Scouts To Give "Camperships"

If the Snake River Area Council executive board has its way, everyboy in the area will have something to do for one or two weeks this summer.

The Scout executive board has donated funds for "camperships" for boys who would not otherwise be able to attend a camp because of economic reasons. Mike Mazzone, Scout executive, said that these camperships are available starting immediately.

Last year about a dozen boys participated in the program, but the executive board hopes to have over a hundred this year, Mr. Mazzone said.

The boys receiving "camperships" will attend a camp at Camp Bradley during regularly scheduled camps. Mr. Mazzone said all the boys need to provide is their personal gear. Boys from age 11 to 16 are eligible to apply for camperships.

The executive board, Mr. Mazzone said, "feels that each boy should have the opportunity to enjoy the experience of camping, and that no boy should be penalized because of a lack of funds. The "campership" program is in keeping with a national Scouting theory, and also with a presidential program consisting of all Scouting skills.

McNamara's Upcoming Vietnam Trip Could Play Key Role In Tax Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's upcoming trip to Vietnam could play a key role in determining the amount of taxes to be paid by Americans this year and next.

Government sources said today McNamara's post-trip report will weigh heavily with the administration in setting the size of the surcharge to be formally requested by President Johnson.

Johnson proposed a 6 per cent surcharge on corporate and individual income taxes to take effect July 1.

No legislation has been sent to Congress yet but a tax message with only the numbers missing reportedly is ready to go. McNamara probably will leave for Vietnam late this week.

Although government officials hesitate to describe their position as "beyond the point of no return," they don't see any possibility now of backing off on an increase this year—bringing unforeseen economic upturns.

But the size of the request still is open. Chairman Gardner Ackley of the President's Council of Economic Advisors said last week it won't be less than 6 per cent.

One alternative, and there reportedly are many still being considered, would call for different surcharges—8 per cent on individual taxes and 12 per cent on corporate taxes with an effective date of next Jan. 1.

Another alternative under study is for a 6 per cent surtax on both individuals and corporations to take effect Oct. 1 or Jan. 1, but retroactive to July 1, the date the tax originally was scheduled to take effect.

A third idea under discussion calls for sending a surcharge bill to Congress accompanied by a separate tax reform bill.

Rep. Henry Reuss, D-Wis., a member of the Senate House Economic Committee, has urged the administration to push for tax reform before seeking a tax increase.

McNamara's trip presumably will give the administration a better idea of present and future Vietnam war needs and how much it will take to finance them. Some congressional sources foresee an escalation of troop strength costing \$5 billion beyond the \$2.4 billion included for Vietnam in the President's budget for the new fiscal year.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said today he was informed that the world's most powerful test reactor has gone into operation at the National Reactor Testing Station in Idaho.

He called it "a major step by mankind over the threshold of the nuclear age."

The Idaho senator said he was advised the \$58 million advanced at the station near Idaho Falls had achieved criticality.

Using ATR, with its 250 thermal megawatts of power, Church said, "we will soon be able to speed the day of universal nuclear power."

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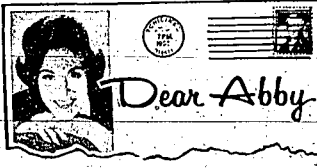

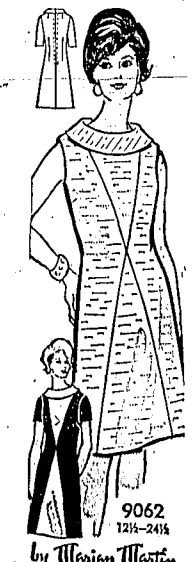

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Washington "Is On Trip" As Hippies Discover U.S. Capital

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Peaceful, quiet, aristocratic old Georgetown, for years the most exclusive section of the capital, has blown its mind.
 "You can't see one long-haired a u h o r i t a r y," suggested, "that Georgetown is on a trip."
 Hippies, their mushrooming numbers from Washington, Georgetown's main draw. The Street, its boardwalk and Georgetown fringe areas like DuPont Circle and grassy P

Street beach on the banks of Rock Creek are their meeting places.
 "Yes," said 7th police precinct Capt. Frances Conley, "they've become a problem. They've seemed to multiply like rabbits over the past year. I don't understand it. Some of these kids are the same well-scrubbed faces I saw just a year ago."
 What's happening is that the hippie cult is spreading nationally. And hippies—being hippies—know the adage: "There are only three towns in the United States—New York, San Francisco and Washington. Everything else is Cleveland."

Kevin Connell, "nonhippie but sympathetic" manager of a swinging M Street pub, says Washington right now is only a third-stage hippie city.
 "But it is not far from stage two and, as fast as word travels in the psychedelic world, it could move up to stage one by late summer," Connell said.
 Stage one is the ultimate—San Francisco (Haight-Asbury section) and New York (the East Village).
 A stage one hippie town has all the latest drugs (LSD), marijuana (grass, joint, etc.) and plentiful. Well-established—hippie music, hippie literature,

hippie bars (although real hippies seldom touch liquor) and hippie "head shops" which sell psychedelic posters, beads, flowers and love buttons.
 Second stage cities are, according to New Englander Connell, "Boston, Los Angeles and Chicago's Old Town section."
 "But Washington is the only one of the lower stage cities with a chance to make the big scene," Connell added.
 The main reason for this, hippies here agree, is the city's beauty—the many trees and parks, its architecture. "The real, bonafide hippie is sincerely and honestly hung up on nature

and love," Connell said. "A trip brings these things closer to him, though closer than he could ever get if he stayed (straight all day)."
 Captain Conley said Washington's estimated 3,000-4,000 real hippies and near hippies "actually seem sincere about this love business."
 "Except for drug and marijuana traffic, they don't do much other than disturb the peace late at night. They don't seem to steal, like junkies do, or vandalize, like the motorcycle crowd does."
 Conley said one big problem was the fights they get into, not

with each other but with rowdies and servicemen looking for people to punch. "Service men around here get weekend passes and go out looking for a bar, a girl or trouble. They pick on people with long hair."
 A hippie basking in the sun on P Street beach talked about the emergence of Washington as a hippie center.
 "We're striving for sophistication, like San Francisco's got. We already have two non-commercial head shops. We have plenty of nature here and love is beginning to groove."
 "We also have an LSD rescue service for people on bad trips."

By that I mean some kids get had on trips and they go to some of us who know what it's all about to learn how to handle it."
 "The movement here could really be important. With our own literature and music and an intellectual voice in the community, it is conceivable that our brand of love—love of man and love of nature—could influence legislators. Lady Bird Johnson, look what she's done! In a way, with her tree-planting programs and things, she's sort of a hippie."
 "Meanwhile, the cops here are getting after us. We're starting to

see narcotics fuzz, so the other night a group of us gathered here on the beach to discuss sophisticated ways of dealing with the law so we wouldn't hurt anybody. That's realistic, isn't it?"
 "Anyway, we didn't get much done that night. Man, the stars that evening were the most beautiful I'd ever seen. And it was warm. A really out-of-sight night."
 "So about all we did was sit and talk to each other. And later we bought some bread and peanut butter, made sandwiches and passed them out to people in Georgetown."

Sticky?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Resigned Deputy Secretary of Defense Cyrus Vance received a chestful of medals — but the Pentagon couldn't make them stick.
 Vance, stepping down as the Defense Department's No. 2 man, was awarded Army, Navy and Air Force medals at a Pentagon ceremony.
 But no sooner had the medals been pinned on than each popped off.
 "I'm going to have to start a research and development program to improve these things," said Dr. John S. Foster, the Pentagon's chief scientist.

 Some 100 Negroes and whites fought until a police riot squad broke up the melee. Several Ethiopians were taken to the hospital. Fifteen instructors were involved.

"We would like to make it clear that the boycott happens not because we are Ethiopians, but purely and simply because we are black," said Wondrosen Hailu, a spokesman for the instructors.
 He said the whites started the brawl by calling the Ethiopians "niggers" and objecting to their dancing with white female Peace Corps students.
 "We are not satisfied with the treatment we got from the police," Hailu said.
 He said he and other language instructors would boycott classes unless "satisfactory measures are taken to curb racism against us."
 The Ethiopians are training 120 teachers for Peace Corps assignments in their country.

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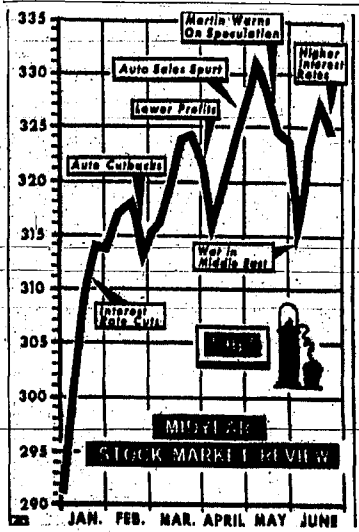

Humphrey On 2-Day Visit In Alaska

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey said Monday that as a result of the recent summit conference, Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin "very firmly" took up with Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro Cuba's attempts to export revolution to Latin-American nations.

This was one of the major benefits from the recent talks at Glassboro, N.J. between Kosygin and President Johnson, Humphrey told a news conference. The vice president is in Alaska on a two-day combination business and political trip, stopping on his way back from Seoul, South Korea, where he attended President Chung Hee Park's inauguration. Humphrey said Johnson told Kosygin that the United States "took a very dim view" of Cuba's export of arms and guerrilla-trained activists into other Latin-American countries. Johnson showed Kosygin the evidence and asked him to take up the matter with Castro, Humphrey said, adding "We know that he did, and very firmly."

Controversial Punting Rule Is Endorsed

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Commissioners of 11 major collegiate athletic conferences voted Monday to endorse the new NCAA football rules, including the controversial punt regulation.

The Collegiate Commissioners Association commended the NCAA Football Rules Committee for its continued progress and pledged "our complete cooperation and support in following the NCAA code during the upcoming football season."

Under the new punt rule, kickers cannot go downfield until the ball passes the scrimmage line. Some coaches, fearing the regulation may lead to injuries, have said they will not abide by it.

The association, with Big Ten Commissioner William Reed of Chicago presiding at a five-day session here, also recommended that graduate students be permitted to participate in intercollegiate sports if their eligibility has not expired.

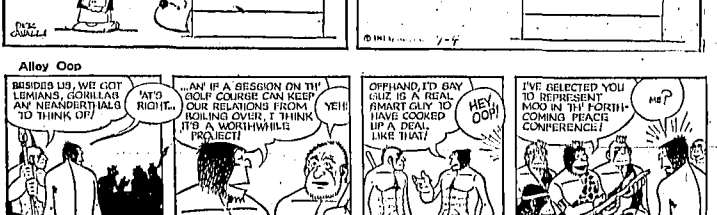
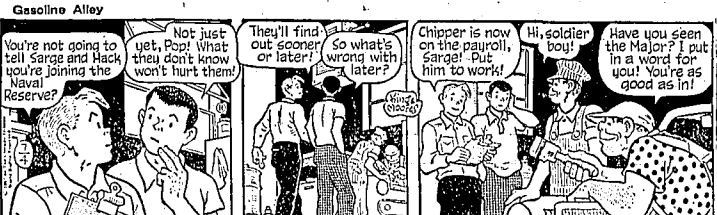
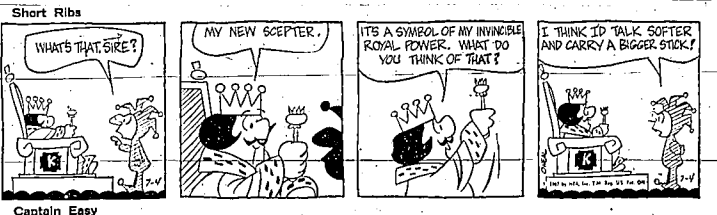

Gather The Gang, It's Gang Time!

The game lovers are at it again, and we love them for it. Here have been writing for you with their favorite party games and some of them are just too great to shove any longer. So, gather together the gang and try out these fun games.

Our first game is called "What else?" by our California writer. Everyone is seated in a circle and the leader begins by saying, "I'm packing my grandmother's trunk with a pair of slippers."

The person on his immediate left repeats this and then must add another object with the last letter of the mentioned object. For example, he could say, "I'm packing my grandmother's trunk with a pair of slippers and a snufflower."

Since "slippers" ends with "s" and "snufflower" begins with "s" is fine. The next object then must begin with "s."

Each succeeding person must repeat in order all the objects mentioned and add another. This would be particularly fun if the group is large and imaginative.

DRAW A TAIL

Here's a game which is an oldie but with a new twist. Get an old sheet and draw the body of a donkey minus ears, tail and legs. Then assign a player to hand him some colored chalk and assign him to draw in one missing part. When he's done, introduce another to draw in another part of the donkey's anatomy, and so on.

Played with two sheets and two teams, this can be a fun competitive game. But the poor donkey may end up with a tail growing out of his left ear.

This next game is fun as it is, but with modification could be used to match up couples or form teams. Float a number of corks in a large bucket. The corks should be floating freely in a lot of water. Give each person a small pin and assign him to "harpoon" a cork. He must not touch the cork with his hands, nor use the bottom or sides of the bucket to push his pin into the cork.

For pairing off purposes, you could use pins with different colored heads, so the reds could get together to form a team. Or a small flag stuck into the cork could name your team.

REMEMBER CRACKERS?

Remember the old cracker game—the one where everyone raced to eat a cracker and then whistle? Well, here's another version from a Texas cracker.

Pair off the gang and form as many twosomes as possible. Establish who is "A" and who is "B" in each pair.

At the given signal, the "A" member runs to a table in the center of the room, picks up a cracker, runs back to "B," who begins eating the cracker. Meanwhile, "A" runs back to the table, picks up a second cracker, runs back to give it to "B" again. After three crackers, "A" attempts to whistle a tune. Before the couple can be declared winners, "A" must name the tune correctly.

If your guests are not well acquainted with each other, here's a great mixer, send in by a Detroit writer. Divide the guests into "sliders" and "seekers." Write the name of each "slider" on a small cardboard or piece of wood. Then tie a string, a long one, to the wood and then hide the wood under a cushion, behind the piano, etc.

Then proceed to crisscross the string under furniture, over tables, etc. so the room is a web of strings. Then the sliders are a string to follow and when he finally does get to the wood, he seeks out the person it names, introduces himself and they pair off for the next game so they can get better acquainted.

Here is a silly game which sounds too easy, but try it. Use blackboards if they are available. Otherwise large sheets of paper will do.

Divide the group into two teams and assign each team to a blackboard. Write the name of each person on the board. The first person runs up to the blackboard and writes one word. He goes back to his team and the second member must add to the word so that it makes sense—yet does not complete the sentence. The object is to see who can get the longest sentence, without team discussion.
