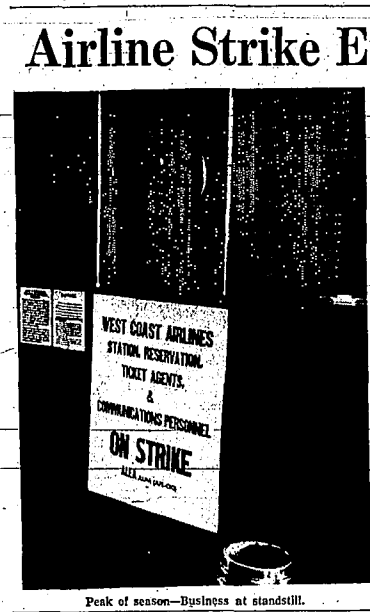

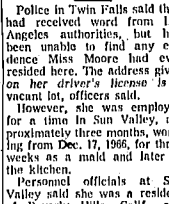

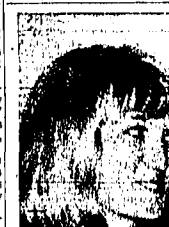

T. F. Moore, formerly Stanleyville, is about 775 miles north-east of Kinshasa. It is a former rebel stronghold. In a radio address to the nation, Mobutu said foreign settlers had attacked Bukavu, near the Rwanda border 320 miles from U.S. Consul Truisten F. Crigler. 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Newest Atomic Reactor Achieves Criticality

IDAHO FALLS—The Advanced Test Reactor, newest of the Atomic Energy Commission's materials testing reactors, achieved criticality (sustained a controlled chain reaction) at 8:32 p.m. Sunday at the AEC's National Reactor Testing Station in Idaho.

"The ATR can now proceed toward eventual operation at full power to provide valuable design data for atomic power plants of the future," AEC-Idaho Manager W. L. Ginkel said.

Regarded as the largest reactor of its kind in the world, the 250,000-kilowatt (thermal) ATR is the forty-first reactor to achieve criticality at the NRTS since its establishments in 1949.

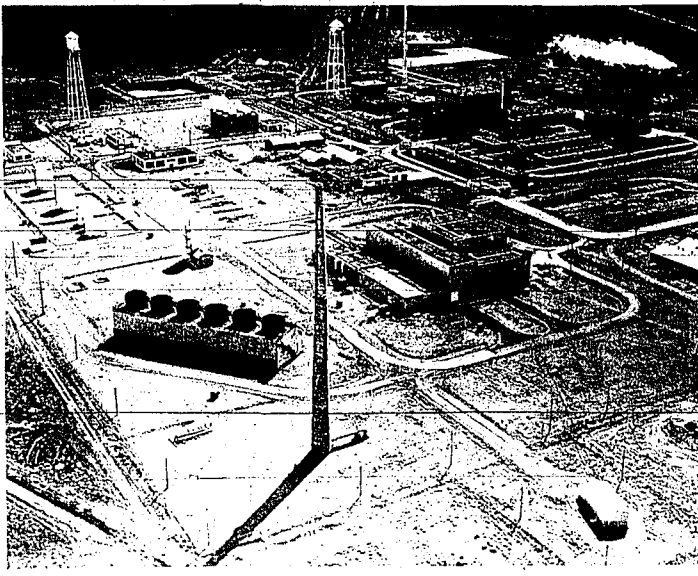
The new reactor will further international research work being done at NRTS in the 40,000-kilowatt Materials Testing Reactor (MTR) and the 175,000-kilowatt Engineering Test Reactor (ETR). From these test reactors the AEC obtains performance data for designing future reactor cores by studying the interaction of neutrons with sample materials, such as new reactor fuels and structural materials proposed for use in future civilian or military reactors.

The Test Reactor Area, including ATR, is operated for the AEC by Idaho Nuclear Corporation, Phillips Petroleum Co.'s Atomic Energy Division developed the conceptual design for the new test reactor, and the detailed design was performed by Ebasco Services, New York City.

Babcock and Wilcox, Lynchburg, Va., provided the design for the ATR internal and control and safety systems. The construction contractor was Fluor Corporation, Inc., Los Angeles. Howard S. Wright and Associates, Seattle, is constructing a gas experiment loop, scheduled for completion late next year. Meanwhile, the ATR will be operated without the gas cooled loop.

Total estimated cost of the ATR, including the gas cooled loop, is about \$55,000,000. The ATR's core design will permit multiple, yet simultaneous, materials irradiations under a wide choice of conditions. Extending through the four-foot-deep core are nine tubes for accommodating test samples in the core region. Each tube can be made into a completely closed test loop with its own pumps, heaters, and other special equipment outside the reactor containment.

Unique in the ATR is the arrangement of its fuel elements, as viewed from above the core. In most presently operating reactors the fuel is arranged in one of several conventional forms—circular, rectangular, or polygonal. In the ATR core, the fuel elements are arranged side-by-side in a serpentine four-leaf clover

Costly Program To Restore "Ravished" Land Proposed

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—

The administration proposed a vast, costly program to restore beauty and usefulness to land that has been "looted and ravished" by strip and surface mining.

Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall submitted a report to President Johnson outlining the scope of the problem and recommendations for tackling it, at a cost of perhaps \$75 million over 10 to 20 years.

The President sent the report on to Congress, which authorized the two-year study behind it. Udall said the recommendations would supply an urgently needed remedy for practices which he said—have severely damaged more than 3 million acres of valuable land and polluted hundreds of streams and rivers.

The report said about 1.3 million acres already have been reclaimed adequately, but about a million more—the equivalent of a mile-wide strip stretching from New York to San Francisco—require attention.

Each year the report said, about 150,000 more acres are being surface-mined, and the figure is expected to go up to 200,000 acres annually by 1959. By then—unless something is done—more than 5 million acres will have been affected.

Udall outlined a basic plan aimed at eventual treatment of the 2 million acres so far unreclaimed. This is where the \$75 million and 10 to 20 years would be involved.

Or, the secretary said, a start could be made on areas where stream pollution, soil conditions and land erosion are the worst, at a cost of \$301 million.

What the report contemplates is a cooperative effort pulling together federal, state and local governments as well as land owners, mining companies and conservation groups.

About 91 per cent of surface-mined land is privately owned. So there must be some effective regulation, including a licensing system with penalties, the report said, to assure that mine operators will pay reclamation costs in connection with future operations.

Land gutted up to 1965 ranged from 10 acres in Hawaii to 370,202 acres in Pennsylvania. The lure was all sorts of minerals, from gold to clay. But coal accounted for about 41 per cent of all the despoiled acreage.

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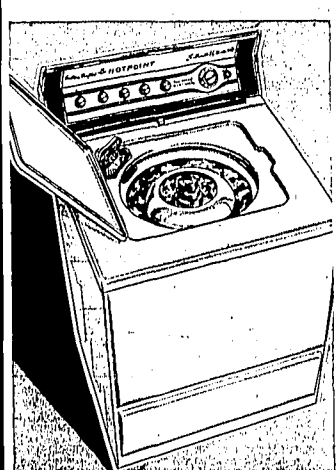

President Of Haiti Has Visits With Voodoo-Priest

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Papa Doc's chauffeur tears 30 miles through silt fields and salt marshes to fetch Antoine, a voodoo priest in a worn-out bowing shirt.

Like a doctor on a house call, Antoine packs what he will need for the president: a golden spirit-summoning, hell-bright "Vifiligre, a whisky carton where he stores little open-necked bottles supposed to house the essence of his soul; and a deck of cards tucked into the shirt pocket on which his wife has stiched "President D. for life."

Haiti's ruler, Francois (Papa Doc) Duvalier, 60, has called Antoine to his home again and has sent a chauffeur and a sub-machine gunner, standard equipment with any government car—to pick him up at his farm near Croix des Bouquets.

Then it is back along wash board roads that shake new

cars into jalopies in front of the control points where the Ton Ton Macoute guards shoulder automatic rifles, and finally down the streets of Port au Prince's Pig Hole district to the palace where a new sign blinks through the night, "I am the Haitian revolution—Dr. Francois Duvalier."

Antoine says he and the president sit side by side in the palace's dirt-floor basement and talk of Damballah, the god who looks like a snake-and-live-in-a-tree, and some times Baron Samedi, the malevolent zombie who dresses in top hat and tails.

"I only help," he's No. 1 here," says Antoine, tapping at his temple in admiration as he talks of Pap Doc. "He knows it all."

He tells this to a visitor to his farm, and its outdoor-voodoo altar pile with empty cognac and rum bottles, a crucifix, pictures of saints and a turtle shell. Antoine is pleased to talk because he is not aware a foreigner might consider voodoo an odd interest for a head of state.

The priest's specialty is questions about the future, and when they come, the broad-shouldered man's amber eyes roll back, his hand comes to his forehead and pinches tight as if working some clairvoyant vice, and the answer starts as suddenly as the wind when it cuts through his cane fields.

Most often, like men everywhere, says Antoine, Papa Doc wants to know about his enemies. Then the job is simple: "I show him the faces."

Most educated Haitians are christened, married and sent to "grave" by the Roman Catholic Church and feel embarrassed when conversation turns to voodoo's hold on people. To them this "showing of the faces" is the priest's main function with Papa Doc.

"It's not important whether Duvalier believes in it or not, although I would think he might," said a Haitian accountant.

For a casual visitor to his house, Antoine offers to do

Viet Cong Are Vastly Enlarging Their Stockpiles Of Weapons, Says Writer

By TOM TIEDE
 NEW YORK (NEA)—The enemy arsenal in Vietnam has always been incredible. Three years ago it was incredibly bad. Viet Cong soldiers were so ill-equipped for combat that they sometimes threw spears, and shot poison arrows from crossbows.

Many captured prisoners in those early days of the war readily admitted they had not been issued weapons. A few insisted they had never discharged a rifle. And it was not at all uncommon for several guerrillas to share a single, small revolver.

That was in 1964—11,000 American lives ago.

Today the incredible thing about enemy weapons is that there are so many of them. Thanks to steady supplies from several sources, the VC's vastly matured stockpile now includes nearly four dozen different kinds of individual arms.

The gain is staggering. According to one military handbook, Viet Cong armories now contain 21 separate models of machine guns alone.

To be sure, some of the guerrilla arms still tend to be antique. For example, VC often carry World War I vintage Springfield rifles which were first manufactured in 1903 and which fire at only 10 to 15 rounds a minute.

The enemy is also burdened with a number of clumsy, bolt-action Mosin Nagent rifles (circa 1891), Russian-designed Maxim machine guns which were operated by hand-crank and U.S. Thompson submachine guns in which were all the rage in the 1920's.

But such are the exceptions, at least eight other nations are contributing as well.

Even the United States is donating considerable numbers to the VC pile. The military estimate is that the enemy has at least five models of American machine guns, seven carbines, two of mortars, four of recoilless rifles and one type anti-aircraft gun.

The U.S. contributions are in-kind, of course. So are those of many other nations. The weapons simply fall into VC hands by way of pillage and confiscation.

However the VC get them, the Pentagon admits, "they get them." More over, says an Army arms expert, "Once they get them, they make sure they'll have them forever. The Viet Cong arsenal may be a crazy assortment of hand-me-downs . . . but it is nevertheless in remarkable working order."

"This is because guerrilla soldiers learn early that their weapons are precious possessions. Constant maintenance is a strict regulation. Each man is ordered to keep his piece clean and oiled. And God help the VC who ever loses his rifle."

Negro Woman Tells Of Teaching In White School

EDITOR'S NOTE—Eleanor Curry, a Negro, spent the 1967 school year as a teacher's aide in an all-white San Mateo elementary school on the San Francisco Peninsula. Here is her story as told in the district publication, Intercom.

SAN MATEO, Calif. (AP) — Only a few days after I reported for duty last October, a 5-year-old described me to her mother. "There's somebody at school who dresses like our teacher and talks like her, but she's very, very dark. What is she?"

I don't know how her mother responded, but the next day the youngster ran up to me smiling and said, "Come stand by me. I'll help you say the Pledge of Allegiance so you can learn about our country."

Soon I stopped wondering whether the children would accept me as they would any of the other 80 teacher aides in the district. I tried to act as natural as possible.

Whenever a question arose about my origin or background, I tried to talk privately with the child, helping him to grow out of attitudes about which he seemed uncertain and sometimes fearful.

But I did keep wondering whether there were real, basic differences between these children and my own. Even after eight months, when the children and I felt quite relaxed and confident with each other, a 5-year-old said to me, "I still haven't figured out what you are, but you're nice."

It was a somewhat shattering introduction to an experience that has turned out to be rewarding and revealing to me, and I hope meaningful and constructive to the children who at first regarded me as something from a museum.

As a Negro, as the mother of eight children, and as a citizen deeply concerned about education in our community, I had hoped that I could make a contribution to the school district as a teacher's aide.

Some days I mixed paints, read a story or helped with a puppet show, depending upon the needs of the teachers and children in two kindergarten classes to which I was assigned. During the lunch-hour I organized games and supervised the play of older children.

At first the children were polite and curious about me—too polite, I thought later, when they looked away if I happened to catch their eye.

Then the questions started coming. Rarely were they insulting or malicious; more often they were hesitant, tentative and honestly curious.

Since I was learning, too, how best to adapt my skills to the needs of each teacher and individual child, I could appreciate the children's needs to learn more about me.

There were those who found it hard to believe that my hands were not always dirty, and I really was brown all over. Some decided that I had to be from Africa.

Missile Motor Is Test Fired

BACCHUS, Utah (AP)—Hercules Inc. announced today the first test firing of the first-stage motor for the Poseidon missile.

243 Trucks Destroyed By U.S. Air Force

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. 7th Air Force reported today its planes wrecked almost as many North Vietnamese trucks during June as they had during the previous five months this year.

The Air Force said 243 trucks were destroyed and 71 others were damaged in June, compared with 293 vehicles destroyed and 69 damaged from January 1 to the end of May.

On Tuesday, the Air Force claimed even greater damage in June to railroad cars in North Vietnam. The Air Force reported 372 boxcars destroyed and 251 damaged last month, as against 30 destroyed and 160 damaged in the five preceding months.

Military spokesmen explained the major factor in the upsurge during June was the clearing weather over North Vietnam which permitted intensified raids.

Seattle Architect Wages War On Ugliness

SEATTLE, Wash. (NEA) — Bob Durham wears conservative suits that the hippy New Yorker equates with Squaresville. His hair is a would-be mirror of Ringo Starr's, the mink of his medicine cabinet. In LSD square-cube circles Durham couldn't even make a ground crew for a "trip." Yet his softly spoken ideas of what this country should do about urban ugliness crack louder than any sicket line chant.

Robert L. Durham is the new president of the American Institute of Architects. He moves into the job at a vital time for professionals, since architects suddenly realize it is time to stop talking to each other and explain their jobs to the public.

As a result, the association this year is waging its own "war on ugliness."

In this vein Durham feels: "We are building more ugliness now than we tear down. The United States cannot afford to use 3,000 acres a day doing this."

"We must train the voter, beginning with the grade 4 pupil, to recognize quality and spark an interest in good design."

It is sad that we pull the election machine lever for something cheaper, not better, for the community.

The 2,000 architects coming out of college should be more like the old family doctor in their relationship to the public. It is essential here and there to the residential market . . . to offer consultation for a reasonable fee.

"We must learn how to make democracy work. Few in this country really understand it after all these hundreds of years. It takes a small, militant group to make democracy work. We can't wait for 100 many to make up their minds. One hundred committed women in a community could paralyze it and pressure a city council into anything."

This Seattle architect's ideas are far from head-in-the-sand attitudes of a few associated with those outside the jet stream of thought.

He feels that it is time for engineers, sociologists, architects and city fathers who control the budget to join in contributing to a better environment.

"We have crowded 300 years of evolution into the last 30 years," Durham explains. "It's essential for everyone to be in the early stages of planning. The reality of a population explosion is here and it's time to stop highways from creating chaos in our cities because of a basic lack of design. From the time a road is thought of until it winds its way out of—or around—a city."

Highways are a major blemish on the landscape, and Durham says, "We have to do a completely attractive highway through a community."

"We are not interested in just planting pecanias along a highway or street. A road dictates commercial buildings and houses for everyone to get together against ugliness in our country."

in a town. That's why it's important to change our attitudes in city planning."

A paradox Durham throws out is the financiers and money lenders to consider is that church congregations with small building budgets ask for "creative design."

"They are aware," Durham says after designing hundreds of churches, "of what the program means to what it can produce. Congregations recognize that old, moldy rooms don't produce ideas."

Much of our bad design in home developments and highways he says, "is the fault of the leaders who don't appear to care about quality and good design. The lenders have accepted modern design but will lend as much for poor design as for good design. It is time

Meredith Characterizes March

By VERNON GUIDRY JR. CANTON, Miss. (AP) — James H. Meredith characterizes his march through Mississippi as "the best, the beginning of the end for fear and injustice." The last steps of the 165-mile walk brought the 39-year-old civil rights figure to the courthouse square here on Independence Day. Meredith said the completion of his 11-day march "does not signal a victory. It is a greater manifestation of the black world's historical, traditional and more fundamental defeat." He said he had failed in one of his primary purposes because "the fear that permeates the life of the Negro in the United States has not been eliminated." But he said he exposed "that fear."

"If Negroes no longer fear," he told about 40 Negroes who gathered as he spoke, "then the whites have only two choices: to kill them or let them be free." No one greeted Meredith when he walked into Canton on Liberty Street. A handful of Negroes across the street from the square shook their heads when he reached the nearly deserted center of town. Along the way, small groups of whites in parking lots and service stations stared silently at the 16 marchers. Meredith said he would "be going a lot of places" but intended to return to Mississippi before the Aug. 8 primary elections to expand a campaign for political activism by Negroes. Meredith's march began June 24 south of Hernando on U.S. 51 at the spot where a blast of hatred felled him on his first trek last year. Other civil rights

leaders took up the walk and, after he recovered, he rejoined them at Canton for a march to Jackson. He had planned originally to walk to Jackson, 25 miles south, again this year, but has been bothered by a sore ankle and blistered feet. An aide said he would return to his home in New York by car.

500 Students Released By Red Chinese

RANGOON (AP) — More than 500 Chinese students who were forcibly detained by pro-Peking ringleaders have been reunited with their parents.

The government had looked after the students, all naturalized Burmese, at a protection camp during the past work of violent anti-Chinese rioting.

With the situation in Rangoon returning to normal, the government notified parents and guardians to collect the students.

But 12 ringleaders, said to be trained in Peking, barred the doors and shouted, "We have no need of parents! We want to see only the representatives of Chinese Embassy!"

Parents hearing their children's pleas to be released, threatened to storm the building. One student escaped by leaping out of a 20-foot high window, and 48 others broke through a barricade.

The ringleaders finally allowed the students to join their parents. Meeting newsmen later, students said their ringleaders were Communist agitators who had misled them with false propaganda.

Last week's student demonstrations following a government ban against the wearing of Mao Tse-tung badges triggered the violent anti-Chinese riots in which 40 were killed.

Japan's Rains Sometimes Put Damper On Summer Tourism

By JOHN RODERICK TOKYO (AP)—Pack an umbrella, or better still wait until you get to Tokyo and buy a colorful "kara casa"—the official Japanese version—if you plan to visit Japan in the summer.

The rainy season starts in mid-June and extends into July. Sometimes it puts a damper on tourism.

The fact is, the weather in much of Japan is fleck. Rainy seasons have been known to be as dry as a bone and so-called dry seasons couldn't wetter. But even if it does pour occasionally, there is plenty of opportunity for enjoyment, indoors and out.

Japan has four main islands—Honshu, Hokkaido, Shikoku and Kyushu. It is largely mountainous and you are seldom very far from the sea. The climate varies from the near-tropics of Kyushu in arctic cold—in winter on Hokkaido.

The currency is the yen which exchanges at the rate of 360 to the U.S. dollar. Don't expect to pick up some extra money from the black market; the yen is one of the most stable currencies anywhere.

Americans need a passport and a visa if they plan a tourist visit. The visa is easy to get; good for 90 days at a stretch. Japan may be part of the mysterious Orient, but it has many of the most advanced techniques. It has the world's fastest trains—the bullet which hurtle between Tokyo and Osaka.

The fact is a red sun on a white background. Its government and its press are among the freest anywhere. The mass circulation press is outspoken, uncensored and huge. There are also excellent English-language papers, too.

The population of nearly 100 million is lively, energetic, industrious, fun-loving and prone to drink. A minuscule knowledge of Japanese will win the tourist the admiration and sometimes the hearty affection of the Japanese.

If you like festivals, prepare

for a treat: they abound all over the country, and particularly in Kyoto. That old capital has 3,000 temples, shrines and palaces and each one gives a festival at one time or another.

One of the adventures to be undertaken is a night or more at a Japanese inn. When you arrive, you change into yukata—a Japanese dressing robe—and become Japanese, soaking in a hot bath, eating Japanese food with chopsticks, drinking sake and getting a massage from a masseuse before dropping off to sleep on the mat floor.

Japanese food is among the best in the world, raw fish and all, and certainly one of the most varied.

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New Method Of Processing Food Developed

By LINDA DEESTEN The Daily Idahoan MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — Astronauts, campers, housewives: Here's news of a space-age method of processing food which will soon hold public interest. Through this process, ice cream and other foods can be stored at room temperatures. Dairy products can be stored in the cupboard and the burden of refrigerator shelves lightened. Dr. John L. Barnhart, University of Idaho dairy scientist, has further developed the method of freeze-drying, which he calls "a

unique food preservation process that removes moisture from frozen foods without appreciably changing the shape, color, or taste of the product." "The cellular structure remains intact," he said, "and with the water removed, food can be stored for long periods

of time without refrigeration. Moreover, the freeze-dried product loses up to 75 to 90 per cent of its original weight in the process." The product can be restored simply by adding water or other liquid. Barnhart says freeze-drying is the technique of removing moisture in the form of ice from a frozen food without melting the ice or food. The food is frozen to -40 degrees Fahrenheit, then an almost perfect vacuum is created. The ice crystals in the food turn to vapor and leave as a gas. This vapor is condensed on a cold surface in the form of frost. "Almost all of the moisture

Barnhart—has freeze-dried strawberries, peaches, cucumbers and carrots. Much of Barnhart's freeze-drying research is exploratory. Because of the lack of any published information on freeze-drying of dairy products, experimental runs were made on most dairy products manufactured in the conventional commercial methods. The results of Barnhart's work, plus results from many other researchers around the world, may well appear on your dining room table soon.

Intricate Diagnostic Equipment Is Used To Determine Automobile Ills

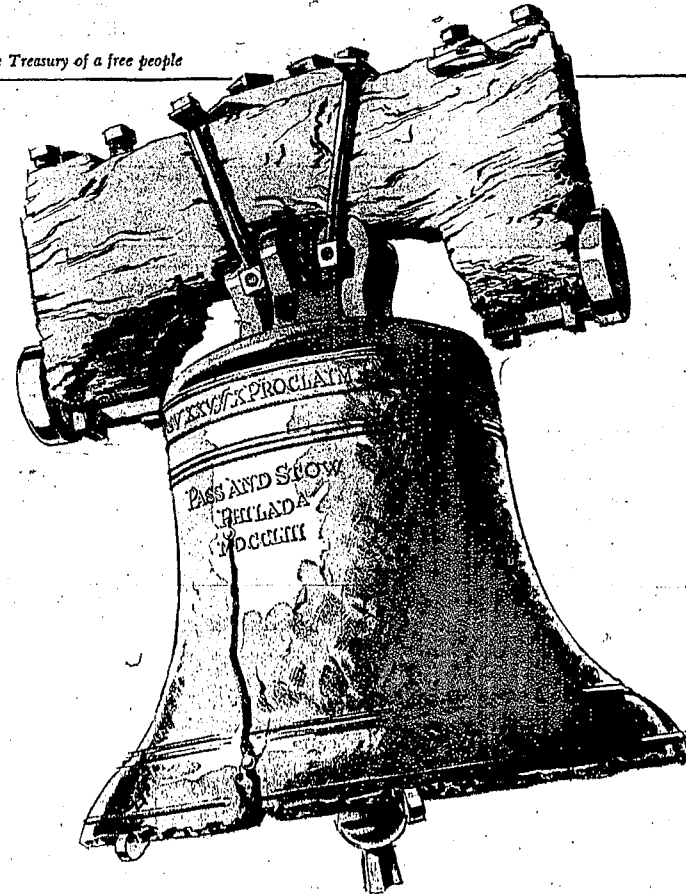

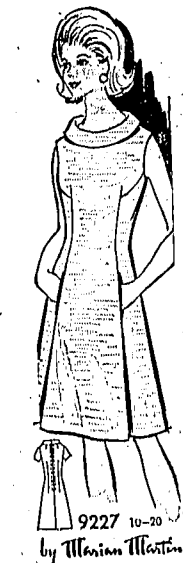

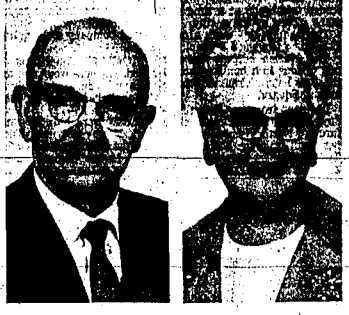

Area Below DMZ May Be Vietnam's Bloodiest Battleground

Interference In Walkout Is Claimed

WASHINGTON (AP) — An AFL-CIO spokesman charged Tuesday that Texas Rangers' heavy strike leaders are interfering with workers back into the field when they tried to join a farm-labor walkout in the Rio Grande Valley.

"The Rangers have come in and placed themselves squarely on the side of the employers," said William F. Kircher, director of organizing for the labor federation.

Kircher spoke in a radio interview recorded for the Mutual Broadcasting System.

His statement followed a blast at the Rangers by Texas State Sen. Joe Bernal, who said the officers acted like "a bunch of thugs" and used police-state tactics against members of the striking AFL-CIO United Farm Workers Organizing Committee.

Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has denied that the Rangers used brutality or sided with strikebound melon growers in Starr County, Texas.

Kircher said most of the Rangers had been removed from the strike scene since he complained to Gov. John B. Connally.

The farm workers union has been in a year-long "right to recognition" from the Texas growers and a minimum wage of \$1.25 an hour for field hands.

Kircher said present wage scales are 75 cents to 90 cents an hour. Most of the workers are Mexican-Americans.

SAIGON (AP) — The mountains, rolling hills and flatlands just below the demilitarized zone, the border with North Vietnam, have become Vietnam's bloodiest battleground.

In 1,000 Marines have been killed and more than 7,000 wounded this year in ambushes, pitched battles, artillery barrages and rocket and mortar attacks. This is roughly two-thirds of the 12,000 combat infantrymen in the 75,000-man 3rd Marine Amphibious Force, but many of the wounded were treated in the field without leaving their units or were out of action a few days or a few weeks.

Because of politics, terrain and the nature of guerrilla war, the Leathernecks are fighting with severe tactical disadvantages that may get worse as the war goes on.

In theory the Marines are on the border to prevent massive infiltration into South Vietnam by large North-Vietnamese reg-

ular units. They have not been able to do this to any degree and have repeatedly been forced into battle at a time and place picked by the enemy.

The fighting this week around Con Thien is a good example.

The Marine outpost there is one of four in a boxlike pattern that has been nicknamed Leatherneck Square.

Lookouts from Con Thien Sunday spotted a moderate sized force of North Vietnamese moving south from the border zone. Two companies were sent after

them. The force the Marines spotted was bait for a massive ambush. One Marine company was hit, cut into three segments and virtually wiped out. The second company took high casualties.

In all 58 Americans were killed, 170 were wounded, and 27 were missing, apparently dead and their bodies left on the battlefield.

The 27 were bait for another trap. It was not until Tuesday that the Leathernecks could get close to the bodies. Then the

North Vietnamese struck hard again, knocking out two tanks, killing 11 Marines and wounding 17.

The Marines had to pull back again. Wednesday they finally got their dead comrades back.

This time there was no fighting. The North Vietnamese had pulled back to their deep bunkers in the demilitarized zone to plan their next move.

Nearly everything seems to favor the enemy as the demilitarized zone. Since the area is just over the border, he has a

short and solid supply line. The Marines are at the furthest end of theirs.

The North Vietnamese have artillery buried and carefully camouflaged north of the border. U.S. planes have not been able to silence it. American rockets and mortar rounds, B52s have not been used in the immediate area for months because of the danger from Soviet-made surface to air missiles.

When the Marines launch sweeps, the enemy feigns until he feels the Americans have maneuvered into terrain that

gives the Communists the advantage. If the Reds don't want to risk an infantry attack, they call in their artillery.

The land around Con Thien is open and fairly flat. There is no place to hid from the big shells, rockets and mortar rounds.

An offensive could be launched to silence the artillery. Israel did this in its Syrian campaign. But the artillery is north of the border, and the political implications of an American invasion of North Vietnam have ruled against such a move.

Happy Event

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Even the rocket and mortar on duty found this love-in a happy event.

As 3,000 persons gathered at Long Beach recreation park, a young hippie gave one policeman a martini.

"I never had so many people say hello to me before — not just the hippies but everybody around," said Police Lt. Forest H. Smith.

"I wouldn't mind if they came back again."

BEATRICE, Neb. (AP) — "It started out as a kind of brain storm," says Joyce Lindquist of the bicycle trip she and her children made from Orangeville, Calif., to Beatrice.

"We drive back to Nebraska every year to see grandma, and it is always a monster trip. We wanted to go some way that we could see more of the country and we did," said Mrs. Lindquist.

She and her children, Dennis, 8, Pamela, 9, and Debra, 11, and Linda Lobdell, 11, rode 880 of the 1,400 miles after training for the trip a year.

Linda's mother, Shirley Lobdell, drove a van which carried the family's camping equipment and food.

They said they would stay in Beatrice about two weeks before heading back to California by car.

Harry Truman Watches Parade

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (AP) — Former President Harry S. Truman and his wife, Bess, sat on the porch of their independence home to watch a Fourth of July parade.

After the parade Tuesday a crowd of more than 1,500 gathered at the Truman Library to mark the 10th anniversary of its opening.

Although his health has not allowed him to leave home in recent months, the former president sent his "good wishes and warm regards" to the crowd at the library grounds.
