U.N. Group Adjourns Until Next Week

Israeli officials, meanwhile, sought to ally a furor aroused by Defense Minister Moshe Dayan's statement that the Gaza Strip, administered by Egypt before the June 5 war, would be incorporated into Israel.

Both the Israeli Defense Ministry and the Israeli delegation to the U.N. issued emphatic denials that the government of Israel had delayed decision on the future of the strip.

Legislators' Expense Issue Still in Doubt

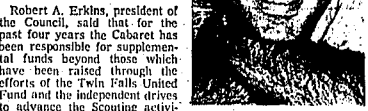
Linkletters To Appear Here At Scout Cabaret Internationale

AT&T To Cut Profits, Interstate Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission formally set a profit range of from 7 to 7.5 per cent Wednesday for the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. It was the first action of its kind.

At the same time the commission ordered AT&T—the nation's largest corporation, with assets more than \$32 billion—to reduce its interstate charges by \$120 million a year.

Drug Usage By Sailors Is Increasing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Navy figures show drug usage among sailors has climbed at a rate more than double that of last year. The hallucinatory drug LSD has been involved in 28

cases resulting in administrative discharges since February. The figures, as well as a new anti-LSD directive issued last month, seem to indicate more and more Navy men are taking psychedelic trips on LSD—trips that in most cases carry them right out of the Navy.

In response to questions, Navy said Wednesday that in the first five months of this year, 187 Navy men had been given administrative—nonpunitive—discharges because of LSD use among Navy ranks has risen at a monthly rate more

Wreckage Of Apollo Craft Is Packed

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The wreckage of Apollo 1, built with visions of rocketing three astronauts to the moon, was packed in cardboard boxes and plastic bags today for trip by slow barge to Virginia.

There it will be sealed in a silver container the size of two house trailers to remain in storage for 10 years.

The more than 1,000 packaged pieces of the ill-fated spacecraft leave Cape Kennedy next Wednesday aboard a flatbed trailer. They will then be hauled to an awaiting barge.

And six to eight days later Apollo 1 arrives at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Langley Research Center at Hampton, Va.

For the next decade, it will remain under the custody of Dr. Floyd L. Thompson, director of Langley, and head of the review board which investigated the Apollo 1 fire that killed Air Force Lt. Col. Virgil J. Grissom and Edward H. White II and Navy Lt. Cmdr. Roger B. Chaffee last Jan. 27.

Apollo 1's container—40 feet long, 24 feet wide and 19 feet high—will have a pure nitrogen atmosphere to prevent its components from corroding, NASAS spokesmen said. The smaller pieces have been wrapped in nitrogen-filled plastic bags.

The container is made of steel, coated with aluminum. Three tiers of shelves for the boxes and bags line both sides and one end.

After arriving at Langley, the craft will be placed in a fenced area at the center's west-end where NASA said it is to remain for 10 years.

No decision has been made as to when it happens to Apollo 1 after that.

Civil War Tactics Used In Vietnam War

MEMPHIS (AP) — DELTA South Vietnam (AP) — America's military commanders have hardened back to Civil War days on the Mississippi for tactics to fight guerrilla dominance of Vietnam's lush Mekong River delta.

It's called riverine warfare, a term first used by Union troops in 1862. The 1967 version combines amphibious tactics, river assault groups like those formed by the French in Vietnam, and an historical thank-you to Gen. Winfield Scott who saw the need for Navy gunboats on the Mississippi.

Bomber Goes Into Sea Near Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, P.R. (AP) — An Air Force B52 bomber plunged into the sea west of Puerto Rico on Wednesday. U.S. Coast Guard aircraft reported rescuing three of the seven crewmen.

The Air Force said the plane flying a training mission, was unarmed and carried no bombs. The Air Force said the plane had just taken off from Ramey Air Force Base in western Puerto Rico. The Coast Guard said it hit the water about half a mile off shore.

There were no details on what recovery operations were under way.

The Air Force announced there was "no immediate danger or need to evacuate the area," but it asked civilians to stay clear "in the interest of national security and to facilitate removal operations."

The Coast Guard Search and Rescue Center at San Juan said it sent two helicopters and two amphibious planes to the scene and announced the recovery of one airman about an hour after the crash.

For the past month a flotilla of barracks ships, gunboats and landing craft has been launching antiguerrilla sweeps in estuaries below Saigon. These craft hold one-third of Vietnam's people and furnishes most of the rice to government and Viet Cong alike.

The heart of the operation is the Benueh, a converted tank-landing ship now jammed with troop quarters, cargo and communications gear—as well as a popcorn stand.

Aboard the troopships are two battalions of the U.S. 9th Infantry Division; the officers anxious to make riverine warfare work and the infantrymen bemused at finding them crewmen, part soldier, part sailor and part Marine.

The shallow-draft landing barges are loaded with heavy old World War II craft but much better armed. Some carry machine guns and mortars. A special type carries a 40mm cannon. They are meant to not only land the infantrymen but then push into narrow waterways and give direct supporting fire where possible.

The delta, 75 per cent under water during the rainy season

now starting, has countless waterways where such craft can operate.

The Viet Cong has used these waterways freely in the past, filtering about in sampans at night and disappearing by day.

Many areas are honeycombed with bunkers, foxholes and trenches neatly hidden in palm stands, inside villages or camouflaged into the dikes crisscrossing the paddylands.

The Viet Cong move into them when needed, then fade away to another area if pressed too far.

Last year, U.S. planners sharply increased U.S. Navy patrol craft in the delta to cut down guerrilla mobility and—hoping—to force the Viet Cong onto high ground strongholds in the paddylands.

The idea of the riverine forces is to put infantrymen into the delta for relatively short operations before they are brought out for hot meals, clean beds, rest—before being sent out again.

RIVER UNDER CONTROL. ARCO, Idaho (AP) — The flooding Big Lost River was under better control today as Army Engineers and brigation district crews continued efforts to restrict its spread.

Flood waters have driven five families from their homes and inundated 7,000 acres of land, 3,500 of which are cropland.

Two breaks in river dikes in the "Darlington" area were repaired Wednesday.

No progress was reported on a section of U. S. Highway 93. Alternate washed away in the flood.

CLEMENCY REFUSED
BOISE (AP) — The state of Idaho refused further clemency Wednesday to a woman convicted nearly 20 years ago of killing her husband with poisoned hamburger.

The State Board of Pardons refused to terminate the sentence of Mrs. Elizabeth Lucey who entered the prison April 22, 1940. She has been released on parole for the past three years.

DAM "TOPPED OUT"
BOISE (AP) — Idaho Power Co. reported Wednesday its Hells Canyon Dam in the Snake River has been "topped out" at its full 220-foot height.

The dam is about 120 feet taller than the Idaho State Capitol.

66 ARRESTS MADE

BOISE (AP) — Officers in an unmarked car, used by 64 police in the McCall area during the Fourth of July holiday period, made 66 arrests, Law Enforcement Commissioner Warner C. Mills reported Wednesday.

The car is the first of a number of unmarked vehicles which state police are planning to place in service as soon as they are available.

He said the company hopes to find enough new lead-zinc-silver ore to keep the mine operating.

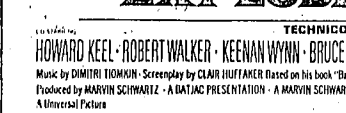

Daylan Says "Gaza Strip Is Israel"

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's military hero and defense minister, Gen. Moshe Daylan, said Wednesday "the Gaza Strip is Israel" and steps would be taken soon to make it a part of this country.

The statement drew immediate Arab fire at the United Nations in New York and a disavowal by Israel's U.N. delegation spokesman that the government of Israel has decided on the future of either the Gaza Strip or the west bank of the Jordan River. The strip was under Egyptian rule from 1948 until Israel seized it in early June.

Addressing a news conference in Gaza, Daylan said his thoughts on the Gaza Strip also applied to the west bank, an occupied part of the kingdom of Jordan.

At the United Nations, Somali delegate Abdurrahim Abby Farah, addressing the General Assembly, said Daylan's remarks created a "very serious situation" that could "set the spark for a renewal of hostilities."

The head of Jordan's U.N. delegation, Ambassador Muhammad H. El-Farra, told a newsman: "This is the last parcel of the expansionist designs of Zionism." He added that the "dreams of Zionism for more lands and for displacing more people will not be fulfilled."

A spokesman for the Israeli delegation later said there was no foundation whatever for the report that the government of Israel has decided on the future of the Gaza Strip and the west bank.

Jerusalem's Mayor Teddy Kollek meanwhile invited the United Nations to move its headquarters to Jerusalem. He cabled the proposal to Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban in New York for presentation to U.N. officials.

The U.N. General Assembly on Tuesday approved a resolution calling on Israel to withdraw its forces from the Gaza Strip and to move to take over the Old City of Jerusalem, which contains shrines of Christianity, Judaism and Islam.

Kollek's message said that after "breaking down of physical barriers, the hearts of Jews and Arabs went out to each other."

He added: "All citizens of Jerusalem would glory in being able to work together for peace organization to the world city of peace."

Funds Owed To U.S. Total \$41 Billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Other nations now owe the United States more than \$41 billion, about half in principal and interest from World War I debt. Officials estimated today that foreign governments are owed \$20.8 billion as of last March 31 exclusive of interest and World War I debt.

Principal and interest from World War I added another \$21 billion to the bill.

In past experience as a guide, the figures will go even higher.

Seventeen nations still owe money from World War I. At last listing 85 nations and 5 international organizations owed the other debt.

More than 90 per cent of the World War II and post-war debt is being repaid on time but the story is much different for World War I. Only Finland makes timely payments and is the only country not in arrears.

It's all legal, however. The United States has agreed that no further payments should be made on World War I debt until final settlement of German reparations. Payments actually stopped, except for Finland, in 1932.

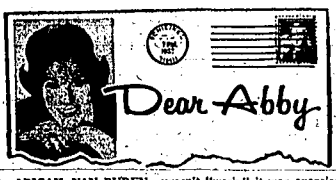

Israel Plans New Trade Route

ELATH, Israel (AP)—Israel is pouring millions of dollars into this sweltering little Red Sea port to build a rival trade route to the Suez Canal.

The Israelis want to build a dry Suez to their Mediterranean ports with a railroad, a major highway and an oil pipeline system through the Negev Desert.

They estimate that through the port they are carving out of rock and sand they could funnel at least 3 million to 4 million tons of general cargo, 2 million tons of bulk cargo and 20 million tons of oil every year to Europe.

Two things stand in the way: the reluctance of Western shipping lines to use Elath because of fears of blockading by Arab-Israeli war and the blockading of the Suez Canal, Egyptian charges \$1 a ton for oil passing through the canal. According to Israeli experts, piping the oil across the Negev would cut charges 50 to 65 per cent.

Trans-Israel pipelines and freight routes would neutralize Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser's use of the Suez Canal as a political weapon and would deal another blow to Egypt's already shaky economy.

Before the war, Egypt earned \$100 million a year from Suez. An alternate route to Europe would drastically reduce this.

Capt. Enrico Levi, a top official of the Elath Port Authority, commented: "With the Suez Canal blocked—and this seems to happen every 10 years or so—Elath is the only alternate route to Europe apart from the long voyage around the Cape of Good Hope."

Summer Weather Prompts "Keep Cool" Entertaining

Each summer every sane mother or baby sitter is faced with the problem of how to entertain youngsters when it is not possible to take them swimming or to a park.

Through pure accident, I stumbled across a sure-fire answer to the problem for the two girls I'm keeping, at least for a little while in the evening.

This "game" has the advantage of cooling the kids off, encouraging their homemaker instincts, providing a type of food and/or drink, but is relatively hard on your refrigerator.

The game entails the cost of a package of one of the granular mix drinks that dissolves in water, and the cost of the electricity in overloading your refrigerator.

The objective of the "game" is to make flavored ice cubes. Simple? Well, sort of.

First, allow the children to mix their drinks that come in packages of mix, but look at it this way, if they make it in the sink, the mess can be washed away.

Pour the mix into a couple of ice cube trays, and save the rest for later. Help the children put little sticks in the freezing compartment, but supply them with a chair, so that they can see where it goes. (I have an old-fashioned freezer that has the old-type freezer in the top.)

Notice the cool breezes emanating from the icebox? Isn't it nice?

Now is the waiting period. Allow each child to check the trays every few minutes.

This is the test of your icebox. Put a little bit of the other food, but the dividends are peace of mind for you.

By constantly opening the icebox doors, the cubes of course take a longer time to get hard. This is to your benefit.

If your home is not air-conditioned this serves a double benefit of cooling the children off. The cooler they are the less they will feel like fighting.

When at last the ice cubes are "done" they can be given to the children to be eaten outside in the shade. Since the ice melts quickly, and there is really very little to the ice cubes they can have as many as they want. They probably won't want more than three or four.

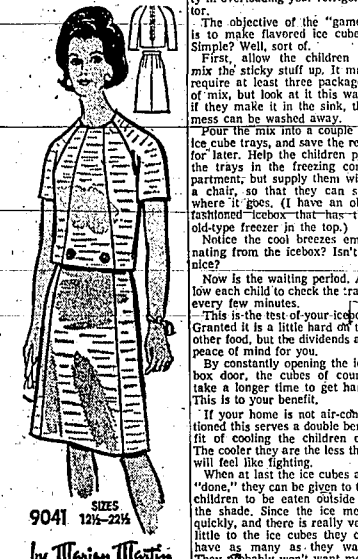
Later they can be used to pop up a glass of the left-over side by making two shades of the drink color.

If the kids go home, or if they tire of the flavored ice cubes, you can use them in iced tea. The light and flavor sweetens the tea and makes a fairly pretty drink. If a twist of lemon is added.

All in all, you as a housewife or sitter, have expended the energy necessary to see that the granular stuff does not get on the floor, flushing the mess away, and opening the icebox door, may be once when the trays are put in. NEW YORK (AP)—For the last than one year, the prices of some stocks listed on Canadian and American exchanges have advanced, tripled and more than quadrupled, bringing fortune to some speculators and tremor to market officials.

The eventual danger that market men see is the crashing return to earth of some of those stocks, with the impact certain to be detected by congressional and government listening devices in Washington.

Speculation that a small company might become successful can be healthy and profitable. But gambling on wildly rising prices, can only bring problems.

The immediate concern is that some stocks are being manipulated, that prices of others are rising on incomplete information, and that heavy trading in the market is nothing but a false glare.

Nevertheless, at least one company has been earning a rate of return of 200 to 1, and many others in the 50 or 100 to 1 category.

Some of these stocks warrant such respect because they represent thriving companies whose earnings are expected to continue to grow.

Others, once a speculation, has continued to grow. Others in the category are simply overpriced. Speculative activity has increased by trading volume, which generally has been setting one record after another in the past year.

Speculation is a game that the market has exceeded the total supply over a year's time, meaning that some shares were traded several times over.

Q.—When the husband of a friend of mine died nine years ago he left her an estate of approximately \$100,000. He had six children, but the wife was the only one who worked and about \$20,000 of the money is on deposit with the same company, for the benefit of employees and widows of former employees. It pays interest of more than seven per cent. That, of course, is a good rate.

It is my opinion, however, that \$70,000 is far too much to keep in a savings account, even at that high rate. With continuing inflation the purchasing power of the dollar keeps falling. It does not, however, put all (or even most) of his or her savings in stocks. It would be a different story if stocks were sure things — which they are not.

There's no substitute for the peace of mind that comes with a safe and solid savings account. Especially when you have, plus an unusually high rate of interest, at seven per cent, her \$70,000 gives her \$4,900 a year. How much more than the insurance of topping that in dividends and increasing values — in the stock market.

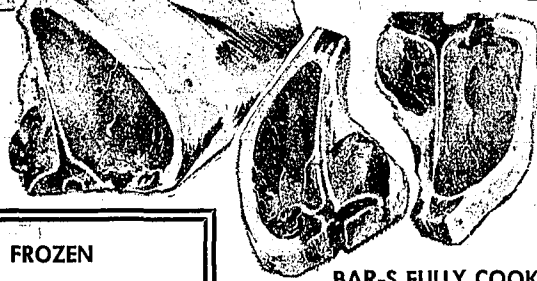

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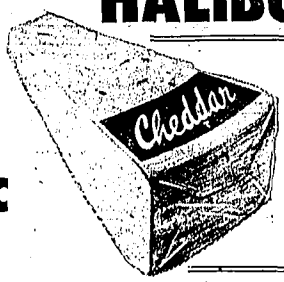
