## War Leaders Agree, More Men Required In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has acted quickly and with dramatic flair to try to squash any notion his administration is divided on the need for more troops in Vietnam. But Gen. William C. Westmoreland reportedly was ticked by Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's statements that more effective use must be made of troops already in Vietnam. As yet there is no word on how many more men will be dispatched to the Southwest Asian fighting but Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, said at a White House news conference Thursday, "I am being provided the forces, as I have recommended."

In a bid to emphasize administration solidarity, Johnson summoned reporters to his private living quarters on the second floor of the White House for the first news conference he has held there. He had with him Westmoreland, McNamara, Army Chief of Staff Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff,

to back up the presidential assertion that "we have reached a meeting of the minds." Dutifully, Westmoreland, McNamara and Wheeler, voiced their agreement with this statement as Johnson polled them in turn for the benefit of newsmen. With all that, Johnson and other participants in the unusual session made it clear many questions remain to be answered about future American troop commitments in Vietnam. "The troops that Gen. Westmoreland needs and requests, we feel it necessary, will be supplied," said Johnson. The President also said the exact time for sending reinforcements, the exact number to be involved, the exact type of military specialists to be dispatched — even the exact country whose uniforms they will wear — are matters to be worked on in consultation with other Vietnam allies. U.S. forces now number about 460,000 in Vietnam. Various reports on military desires ranged to 200,000 more troops but Pentagon speculation has centered in the area of 70,000. Westmoreland said "for every man that is deployed we will get

a double return in combat power. Or, to put my thought in other words, we have already written off the logistic support. "We will get greater return in combat power for the forces that are hereforth deployed." Sources familiar with Westmoreland's thinking said the four-star general regarded McNamara's statements on effective troop use and his criticism earlier this week of the ratio of support to combat troops as a reflection on Westmoreland's leadership. There was no outward sign of discord at the news conference. Wheeler declared the war flames "are in accord." But he emphasized the open questions remaining, saying: "The problem now is to settle upon the solution and how we are going to meet the requirements."

Judging from the words of the participants in the agreement, newly dealt more with principles than specifics. There has been growing speculation Westmoreland might be seeking far more additional U.S. troops than Washington felt able or willing to supply.

## Six Accused In Idaho Savings Indictment

BOISE (AP) — A secret indictment accusing six persons of falsifying records on more than \$6 million in Idaho Savings and Loan Association assets was returned today by the Ada County Grand Jury. Ada County Prosecutor Wayne Kidwell who called the grand jury to investigate last year's closure of the association, said the six are accused of 22 felony counts involving more than 50 criminal charges. All involve falsification of corporate records, Kidwell said. Arrest warrants will be served beginning Monday, Kidwell said. He hoped the six named in the indictment would be arraigned next week in Fourth District Court in Boise. Today's were the first indictments dealing with the savings and loan association since the jury began meeting in early May. The company has been in the control of the Idaho Department

of Finance since it closed. The indictment follows by several weeks announcement by the department of a plan to dispose of the Idaho Savings and Loan Association's assets. The plan calls for sale of the assets to Equitable Savings and Loan Association of Portland, Ore. Kidwell said the grand jury would take an August recess, then continue hearing testimony in the case. At the time it was closed, the Idaho Savings and Loan Association had insured shareholder accounts totaling about \$20 million. It operated offices in Boise, Idaho Falls, Pocatello and Twin Falls. The sale plan involving purchase of assets by Equitable would give shareholders a little less than 50 percent of their savings, immediately with the possibility of additional returns later.

## Troops Called To Quell Violent Newark Rioting

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Calling Newark a "city in open rebellion," Gov. Richard J. Hughes today ordered the deployment of "ample numbers" of police and National Guardsmen to stem the Negro rioting that left at least three persons dead. The victims, all Negroes, died of gunshot wounds. Hughes toured the city with Mayor Hugh Addonizio this morning following the night of rioting that exploded into gun fire. At least 25 persons were shot and another 300 received other injuries. Among the injured were at least 25 police and firemen, several seriously. The governor ordered all liquor stores and bars closed in the industrial city of 400,000 persons—more than half of whom are Negro—and declared: "We'll dry this city out." Atty. Gen. Arthur Stiles said he was preparing for suits to impose a curfew tonight. See NEWARK, Pg. 2, Col. 4

## 71 Association Has 50th Anniversary

Gov. Don Samuelson was a guest Friday when one of Idaho's most unique livestock associations celebrated its 50th anniversary with a gathering at Three Creek. The 71 Livestock Association, which counts both cattle and sheepmen among its members, has range rights in southern Twin Falls County, Owyhee County and northern Nevada. A tour of the range area will be conducted by the stockmen and guests including Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management personnel. During the celebration Gov. Samuelson noted that the recent Western Governors' Conference he attended in West Yellowstone, Mont., was very beneficial. He said he found general agreement and serious concern among the governors for existing problems of the cattlemen, sheepmen and farmers. "The major problem," Gov. Samuelson said, "is one of lower prices and higher costs. The consensus was that increasing meat imports were doing much violence to cattlemen, sheepmen and ranchers and that imports should be sharply reduced," he reported. "Let me say," Gov. Samuelson continued, "that I will continue to call in recent years," he said, "the tremendous inflow of meat and meat products into this country and will work with other governments to secure a more equitable delegation to insist that the western cattlemen and sheepmen be given a fair break. "They certainly haven't been getting it in recent years," he said. "I would like to see the industry and its supporters and it is up to all of us to redouble our efforts to try to restore a more equitable share in the national import policies." Maurice Guerry is president of the 71 Livestock Association, and Bill Swan is vice president.

## Progress Is Reported On Strike Pact

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. (AP) — Substantial progress was reported in attempts to settle a strike now in its fifth day at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co. plant. Local police maintained peace at the yard today. Pickets ended their requests to stay home during further union-management negotiations. Federal mediators said they have stepped into the dispute although they were not invited by either side. Before the strike the shipyard, which employs 21,500, was at work on 10 major projects, including five nuclear submarines, and outfitting the newly christened carrier USS John F. Kennedy.

## Officials Differ On Use Of Cars

Two executive officials were in opposition Thursday over the legality and desirability of recent use of unmarked state cars for patrolling state highways. State Auditor Joe R. Williams said a 1931 law required the Department of Public Works to letter all state cars to show their ownership. Gov. Don W. Samuelson told a Caldwell civic group that the cars were used unmarked in an attempt to reduce the number of persons killed on Idaho highways. Williams said in a Thursday statement that "unmarked cars may result in some additional arrests of traffic violators, but marked cars on highways serving as a constant reminder to motorists... will do much to prevent violations from occurring."

## Contracts Let On Materials For Annex

Four firms were awarded contracts for furnishing building material on the Twin Falls County courthouse judicial annex. The contracts were announced Friday. Bids were opened Thursday morning and reviewed by George Ottens, project supervisor, for the lowest bidder. Selected to furnish the building block was Velco Builders. Their bid included \$22,32 per 100 for 8 by 16 regular block; \$37.32 for bond beam special blocks of the same size; \$20.80 for 8 by 8 half-blocks; \$15.50 for 10 by 14 by 16 regular and \$45.70, bond beam special of the same size; \$24.12 for 10 by 8 by 8 half-blocks; \$26.76 for 8 by 8 by 8 regular and \$26.76 for bond beam special of the same size, and \$15.58 for 4 by 8 by 8 half-blocks. Other successful bidders in the annex building contract are Anderson Lumber Co. for plywood, masonry and insulation. Their bid was \$108 per 1,000 square ft., for three-quarter inch exterior grade plywood sheathing. For the same type stamped plywood, the firm bid \$118. They bid \$1.42 per square foot for 1/2 inch of building brick was awarded the bid in the amount of \$2 per 1,000. The bid for interior finished blocks for the entrance lobby and hall in the new building was awarded Idaho Concrete Products in the amount of \$3,776. This was the only firm bidding on this item.

## 28 Persons Flown To Safety In Congo

KINSHASA, Congo (AP) — Two Red Cross planes brought 28 Americans and Europeans to safety in Kinshasa, Congo Thursday night after they had been taken to the northeast Congo city for eight days. One American, Mrs. Ben Hobgood of Lexington, Ky., said she thought two or three Europeans from Kinshanga had accompanied the mercenaries. She also said she thought four Europeans had been killed after the mercenaries and rebellious Katanga troops took over the Kinshanga airport and part of the city — formerly Stanleyville — on July 5. The two C48 transport planes also carried 68 wounded Congolese soldiers. Twenty-one of them were taken off on stretchers and taken to hospital. The flight of the mercenaries from Kinshanga apparently ended the rebellion. "Eight controllers assigned at Kinshanga, Bukavu and Kipulu followed the hijacking of a plane in Europe carrying former President Mobutu Sese Seko Kondeko Ngbendu Ngbendu to Kinshasa, where he was overthrown."

## Surveyor 4 Wings To Moon In Crater Study

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Rocketing on a near-perfect parabolic path, America's Surveyor 4 winged moonward today to hunt for iron on rugged lunar terrain with a magnet. Flight controllers said Surveyor 4 was headed toward a spot on the moon only 120 miles south of its target zone—"well within the capability of a micro-course motor" aboard the craft to adjust it on a perfect path later in the mission. Surveyor 4 sensors successfully locked onto the sun. The sun's rays, aimed to soft landing, struck later in the flight, arched the craft during its 63-hour, 24,730-mile voyage to the moon. The robot prospector blasted off at 7:53 a.m. (EDT) today aboard a fiery Atlas-Centaur rocket, aiming to soft land Sunday at 10:30 p.m. on rough terrain. The central leg region, almost squarely in the center of the moon's visible face, is seen from earth. The Atlas-Centaur's performance was "flawless," said Robert H. Dilling, director of unmanned launch operations for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Kennedy Space Center here. The launch of Surveyor 4, the most complex automatic system built to scout a potential astronaut landing spot — originally scheduled Thursday, it was postponed until today as technicians could repair a minor rocket problem. In addition to taking thousands of pictures at the altitude of 100 feet, the 2,300-pound moon robot was equipped with an extendible claw-like shovel to test the soil's strength and deposit fragments from the lunar surface near a small magnet attached to one of Surveyor's three foot pads. If fragments stick to the magnet, it would lend support to a theory that the moon's craters were formed by the impact of objects as much as 10 percent of the lunar surface may consist of iron-bearing meteoric dust. "The little magnet may eliminate some scientific concepts about the makeup of the lunar surface," said Benjamin Millis, surveyor program manager for NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C.



# Drive On To Cut Spud Handling Damage

An all-out campaign is being launched by the Idaho Potato Industry to combat the \$25-million annual loss through potato handling injuries.

This was announced Thursday by Dr. Richard Ohms, University of Idaho potato specialist, Boise, chairman of the industry committee, following a meeting in Twin Falls.

Dr. Ohms said Cline Advertising Service, Boise, has been contracted to conduct a promotional program aimed at reaching all phases of the industry where potatoes are handled and thus subject to bruises and scars which result in down grading or loss of the potato.

Funds for the educational and promotional phases of the program will come from the Idaho Potato and Onion Commission, with fees derived from the potato growers, shippers, handlers and processors.

All phases of the industry were represented in the Twin Falls meeting, Mr. Ohms said, and gave unanimous approval to the proposed campaign.

Mass communications in the form of newspaper, television and national publication advertising, as well as outdoor billboards and printed information for individual delivery are planned in the coming campaign.

Dr. Ohms said the program goes into effect immediately to reach the harvesting and grading of the 1967 potato crop. Represented in the Wednesday meeting were the University research and experiment department, Dr. Ohms, Boise, and Jay Garner, Blackfoot, potato specialist; Idaho Potato Growers' Clarence Parr, Burley, president, and Kenneth Marshall, Castleford; Idaho Potato Shippers, Jim Keegan, Burley, and Bill Floyd, Kimberly; Idaho Potato and Onion Commission, Joe Taylor, Paul, and Don Robertson, Burley, vice president; processors, Paul Hansen, Heber, president, and Robbin, Burley; Nelson Howard, American Falls, and Charles Schroeder, Shoshone, and equipment representatives, Robert Carl, Twin Falls, and Carl Hall, Burley. Others attending included Virgil Cross, Burley, and Walter Sparks, Aberdeen.

University specialists, Ed Moore, Idaho Falls executive secretary of the Shippers Association.

Information has long been known as to how to prevent or lessen the loss from handling injuries, Dr. Ohms said, and it is largely a matter of educating all workers involved in potato handling.

The precautions range from the grower to the grocer and include preparation of soil and to harvesting, timely maturing of the crop to carry on harvest without excessive haste, proper handling, and proper training of people in using equipment including harvest, storage, fresh pack and shipping machines.

## 2 Area School Districts Heed Plea To "Hold Line" On Taxes

At least two school districts in Twin Falls county heeded the appeal of the county commissioners, clerk and assessor for holding the line on levies for the current year.

Commissioners were advised Thursday by Clerk Harold Lancaster that the Castleford district's levies have been certified at below the maximum as requested by county officials in a meeting several months ago.

At that time the county officials pointed out limitations on many levies, have been lifted, but should all taxing agencies

take advantage of new increases, the county taxpayer would be unable to meet the taxing burdens.

"We hope the Castleford district's action will set the pace county wide," Commissioner Morris W. Carlson commented.

One other district, Murtaugh, has also listed its levies with the clerk. The Castleford district maintained a 29 mill maintenance and operation levy rather than the 30 mill maximum and a total levy of 25 mills.

Last year the Castleford levy was the 26.07 on maintenance and operation.

Murtaugh levied the maximum 30 mills for maintenance and operation this year and the same amount a year ago with their total levy for this year at 30 mills. Last year, however, their total levy was 40 mills which also shows an effort on the part of that district to help hold the line as asked by the county officials, commissioners said.

The levy for another district, 416, only a small part of which is in Twin Falls county, is only nine mills. Most of the Three Creek district's levy is certified in Owyhee County.

**2 Soldiers Are Killed In Korea**  
SEOUL (AP) — Two South Korean soldiers were killed, and a third was wounded today in a North Korean attack on a Communist intruder south of the demilitarized zone, the army reported.

The North Koreans attacked a guard post on the central front about 60 miles northeast of Seoul, the army said. The attackers fled in the dark after a 10-minute exchange of shooting.

North Korean casualties, if any, were not determined, the army added.

It was the 10th serious border clash reported since the eve of President Chung Hee Park's inauguration July 1. At least 15 North Koreans and eight South Koreans have been killed and 17 South Korean soldiers wounded.

## Revival Of Aid Measure Up To Rusk

WASHINGTON (AP)—Administration hopes of reviving foreign aid proposals rejected by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee rest on a belated defense by Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

When the Middle East crisis prevented Rusk from testifying on President Johnson's 1967 aid bill, the committee went ahead anyhow and cut it back in several areas.

Rusk then arranged to appear today in support of the legislation.

There are indications the committee's rough treatment of the President's foreign aid recommendations stems at least in part from the opposition of several members to the administration's Vietnam policies.

The panel includes some of the Senate's leading Vietnam doves, including Chairman J.W. Fulbright, D-Ark.

—Cut more than \$250 million from 1967-68 requests, with more deletions expected.

—Refused most of the two-year authorizations requested by the President for advance planning.

—Voted to strip the President of his authority to increase, without congressional approval, the number of countries receiving aid in three categories.

—Deleted as superfluous policy declarations Johnson had proposed as a new look at the foreign aid program.

—Rejected a request for a \$2 billion increase to \$9 billion in the amount the administration can pledge to guarantee private U. S. investors from losses in foreign operations as a result of confiscation, war, revolution or currency-exchange problems.

And the committee added to the bill a provision to earmark \$50 million a year for birth-control programs in foreign countries receiving U. S. aid.

## Rescued

PORTSMOUTH, England (AP)—British novelist William Golding, author of "Lord of the Flies," was rescued with his wife, daughter and three friends today after his yacht and a Japanese freighter collided in the English Channel.

The yachting party was aboard the freighter.

Golding, 55, was sailing the yacht to Greece.

## Flying Ace Is Gravely Ill

MONTEBELLO, Calif. (AP)—Gregory "Pappy" Boyington, celebrated World War II flying ace and Medal of Honor winner, lies gravely ill, suffering from a brain disease.

Boyington, who shot down 28 Japanese planes and headed the "Black Sheep" squadron, underwent abdominal surgery recently and is hospitalized with bronchitis and emphysema.

The "Black Sheep" were about 30 fliers who, Boyington once said, had been kicked out of other squadrons but distinguished themselves throughout the war.

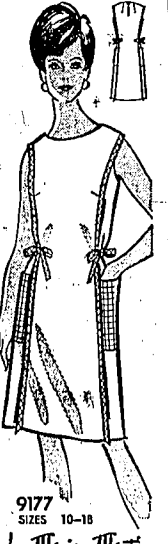

## Cedar Creek Watershed Dedication Is Set

**ROSEWORTH** — After years of hard work by federal, state and individuals a small watershed project designed for improved irrigation water supply, prevent pollution system features, improve irrigation efficiency and carry out a proper land use treatment program on all lands will be officially dedicated next week.

Home Administration provided low interest loan for this purpose. There is cost-sharing too. In the land treatment phase of the project, State and local ASCS allocated special Agricultural Conservation Program funds to supplement farmer and rancher contributions to this phase of the project.

Construction of the project began in 1963 as the 8,200-foot, 54-inch concrete pipe was installed in Cedar Canyon to replace a rapidly deteriorating Lennox type flume. The new pipeline, which is virtually maintenance free, forms an inverted siphon and transports water from the diversion dam to the main canal at the canyon rim.

In 1964 rebuilding of five miles of the main canal below the pipeline consisted of regrading and widening the channel to provide more capacity and trouble-free delivery of irrigation water from the pipeline to the Roseworth Tract.

The Cedar Creek Watershed tour and dedication, sponsored by the Cedar Mesa Reservoir and Canal Co., and the Twin Falls Soil Conservation District, will be held July 21.

The tour will begin at 9:15 a.m. at the old Twin Falls County Hospital building, 634 Addison Ave. in Twin Falls. Free bus transportation will be provided. The first stop of the tour will be at the inlet structure on the 54-inch concrete pipeline. The second stop will be the outlet of the pipeline. The third stop will be at the 125 acre-foot regulating reservoir.

The final stop of the tour will be at the Lawrence Heil ranch on the Roseworth tract where a free lunch will be served with the dedication ceremonies to follow.

Following the dedication a tour of the Heil ranch will be conducted to show the land treatment practices being applied on the Roseworth Tract. Guest speakers at the dedication ceremonies will be Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, and Richard Dailey, assistant deputy for Watershed Operations, Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D. C.

Sen. Church, who has been Idaho Democratic senator since 1964, is a conservationist.

He is an advocate of balanced development and has worked diligently not only to preserve, but to utilize the great natural endowment of Idaho for agricultural, as well as recreational purposes.

Sen. Church is sponsor of the Southwest Idaho Water Development Project—the most far-reaching reclamation project in the history of Idaho.

Mr. Dailey began work with Soil Erosion Service in 1934. He worked with that agency and his successor, the Soil Conservation Service, continuously since, except for the period, 1942-46 when he served in the Navy.

He has been an engineering aide, agricultural engineer, work field conservationist, civil engineer, deputy state conservationist and state conservationist in North Carolina before assuming the present position in Washington.

Master of ceremonies at the dedication will be G. A. (Gus) Eckler, executive editor of the Times-News. Introductions and acknowledgements will be given by Lawrence Sill, Twin Falls Soil District; John Bryant, Cedar Mesa Reservoir and Canal Co., and Lee T. Morgan, Boise, state conservationist.

The Cedar Creek project consists of 125,720 acres and the total cost was \$1,162,000. Local people supplied 66 per cent of the total cost. The Farmers

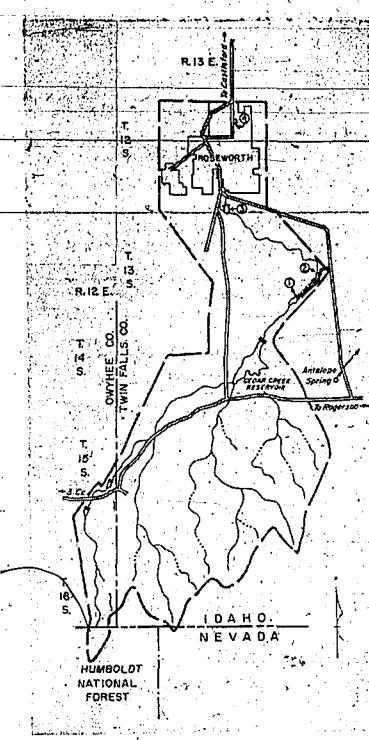

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# Nurserymen Pick George Abraham As America's Foremost Garden Writer

MIAMI—George (Doc) Abraham, Naples, N.Y., author of the popular Green Thumb garden feature, appearing in the Times-News and 105 other newspapers, was cited this week as America's foremost garden writer by the American Association of Nurserymen at the 32nd annual meeting in Miami.

This is the third national honor to come to Mr. Abraham for his Green Thumb writings. A special citation and award was given to him for outstanding contributions in the field of popular horticultural writing through the United States and Canada.

Mr. Abraham, a writer for nearly 25 years, has benefited for this national journalism honor because his down-to-earth columns provide inspiration, education and entertainment for many of America's 50 million gardeners. The Abraham family has also owned and operated a successful greenhouse and landscape business during that period.

In 1954, Mr. Abraham was cited by the National Garden Bureau in Chicago for his work in the field of horticultural journalism. In 1960, at the 78th annual convention of the American Seed Trade Association in Chicago, the Green Thumb was named the most outstanding horticultural writer in America by a distinguished group of newspaper editors and plant scientists.

The award-winning garden writer teams up with his wife, Katy, to put their down-to-earth ideas before an estimated six million gardeners. Doc, as he is commonly known by, and Katy both studied horticulture and

Journalism at Cornell University. The idea for the Green Thumb garden column was conceived when Doc was a soldier in the North African Campaign. The Green Thumb has been written by Editor and Publisher, George Abraham, since his retirement from the newspaper industry, and the Saturday Evening Post, which ran a 10,000-word "color" story on the author's life, and a full-page portrait of him in its November issue. Last year, the Green Thumb drew 150,000 pieces of mail. Doc is the author of the Green Thumb Garden Handbook, an encyclopedic, published by Prentice-Hall, Inc. His book was selected as one of the top 100 books of the year by three national book clubs and is in its fourth printing.

He attended seven years of primary school, three years in secondary school and has been two years at the Agricultural College of Sweden in Uppsala. He will return to complete studies for a degree in Agricultural Economics.

## The Green Thumb

By GEORGE ABRAHAM

**SUMMER SQUASH:** Many readers who raised squash for the first time this year tell us their vines have wilted, even though they contain some good blinks on them. This trouble is due to the squash vine-borer—and you can detect its presence by observing the plants. A small, whitish, grub-like insect (the frass) on the ground.

**CONTROL:** Borers already in the stem may be stabbed with a wire or penknife. Then the wounded stalk is placed on the ground and covered with soil. The roots will form in the wounded area. Also, dust or spray unaffected vines with Sevin, methoxychlor, or malathion. Two tablespoons of a gallon of water. Give two to three doses at seven-day intervals.

Incidentally, don't panic if blossoms fall off your squash and pumpkins. These plants normally produce 5 to 10 male blossoms to one female, and only a small per cent of the females will produce a fruit. The male and excess or unused female blossoms dry up and fall, leaving a romance shattered forever.

**FREE:** Squash has been called the orphan of the vegetable world here, but or bottom watering? It is one of our tastiest crops.

Try poking a hot wire into the cantrons. Or squirt some borer paste into the holes, seal off with putty. Keep healthy trees (especially trunk and base) covered with DDT or malathion to prevent borers.

Mountain ash bears anywhere from two to six years of age, depending on the care they get. This may be due to weather conditions at flowering time, their too-weak to cold, allowing only partial pollination.

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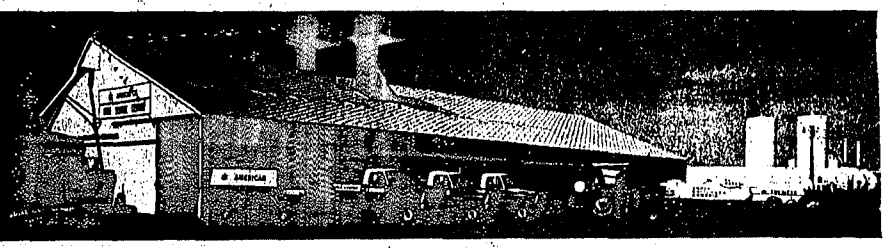

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# Workers Young But Tougher To Organize

By NEIL GILBRIDE  
WASHINGTON (AP)—American workers are younger, better educated and more sophisticated than ever before—and tougher to organize, says the AFL-CIO.

"These younger workers, inexperienced and unversed in labor history, have yet to learn the value and importance of trade unionism," said AFL-CIO President George Meany.

"Union organizing today is difficult," added the labor federation's organizing director, William L. Kircher. "Many veteran organizers say it is more difficult than ever before."

Meany and Kircher urged renewed organizing efforts by workers.

AFL-CIO's 120 unions among the nation's 32 million nonunion workers. Some 18 million U.S. workers are members of unions, including 13.5 million in the AFL-CIO.

In addition to the increasing youth of workers, Meany listed two other major reasons for labor's problems in organizing—the rapid growth of white-collar jobs where unions historically have less of a foothold, and non-union employers who match union wages.

The AFL-CIO magazine, The American Federationist, devoted its entire July issue to comments from Meany, Kircher and other officials on the problems of organizing today's younger workers.

"They are not the workers of a generation ago," when labor unions struggled for their existence, said AFL-CIO economist Marvin Friedman.

"A steadily growing number of 1930s only from history books," he said.

While collar employment has grown to nearly 50 per cent of the nation's total, while jobs in the traditional bastions of unionism—the goods producing industries—represent a steadily declining portion," Friedman said.

Despite a gain of some 3 million AFL-CIO members in the last 12 years, including sharp increases in rapidly expanding government jobs and consumer service industries, union mem-

# Premier Kosygin Doesn't Regard China As Necessary For Vietnam Settlement

DEEP COVE, Nova Scotia (AP)—Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin says Red China can be bypassed in an agreement to settle the war in Vietnam, military Industrialist Cyrus S. Eaton said Thursday in an interview.

He said he discussed the question with Kosygin in a conversation lasting four-and-a-half hours June 30, and he reported: "Mr. Kosygin said the war in Vietnam is the major problem. It is susceptible to settlement without the participation or endorsement of China. He was very positive about this."

Eaton said the Soviet leader also told him:

"The Russians will stand by the North Vietnamese with all their resources, financial and military."

"Kosygin was pleased with the reception he met in the United States and was greatly impressed with President Johnson. He felt that their meetings were constructive and helpful in the United States."

—Compromises will be found for the Arab-Israeli conflict but Russia will continue to insist that Israeli forces withdraw from Arab territory they overran in the fighting.

—In the long run, Red China and the Soviet Union will continue their differences, but "the solutions would come more rapidly if there were an over-all effort to reduce the tensions in the world and cut back the arms race."

Eaton, a Cleveland Industrialist, has had cordial relations with Soviet and other Communist leaders for more than 10 years. He had numerous conversations with Nikita S. Khrushchev when Khrushchev was premier. The Soviet deputy premier, Anastas I. Mikoyan, once visited him in Cleveland. Eaton received the Lenin Peace Prize in 1950.

He has said that the capitalist system is vastly preferable to the North Vietnamese "with all their resources, financial and military."

Consequently, he says, he has been bending his efforts for 10 years to improve the outlook.

Harvard Prof Sees Combat With China
CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Harvard University Prof. John K. Fairbank says there is more than an even chance that Communist China and the United States will be engaged in an armed conflict. He made the prediction at a dinner meeting Thursday with 40 newsmen attending a three-day seminar on China sponsored by the nonpartisan National Committee on U.S.-China relations. Contending that containment is not only out of date but a meaningless term, Fairbank said that there is great danger of Chinese intervention in the Vietnam war. He declared to say when this might occur, but suggested that Chinese Communist forces could be sent into Laos as well as into North Vietnam. Fairbank, a noted historian and expert on China, said the United States has every opportunity to sit out the conflict with China "but waiting until an armistice is reached is more inclined to take action. By waiting, Fairbank said that the United States should remove what he called discrimination against Communist China and that the country on the same basis as other Communist countries in matters of trade and representation at the United Nations.
