

37 Florida Prisoners Killed In Fire Triggered By Convict Brawl

JAY, Fla. (AP)—Thirty-seven prisoners were killed in a fire triggered by a convict brawl swept a locked barracks at a recently integrated state prison road camp here today.

The first fire alarm came at 10:42 p.m. Guard Cocker Nelson said the aging World War II style barracks was destroyed in eight minutes.

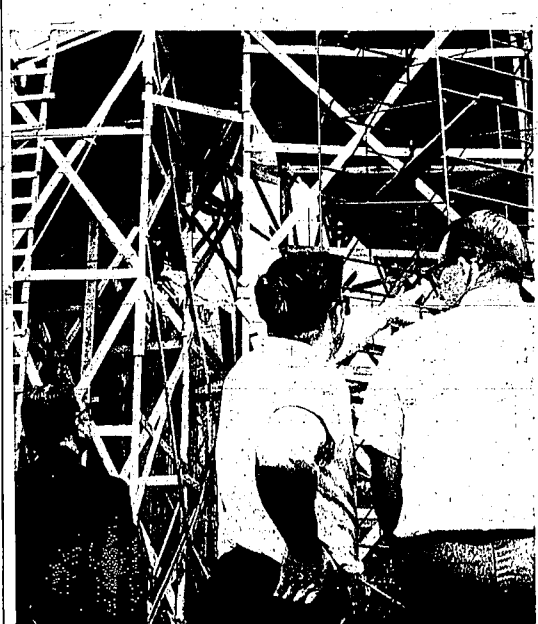

Two men had to be dug from beneath the wet concrete and wooden boards and fellow workers said all five were covered by a wet, mud-like cement.

Newark Violence Subsides As Trouble Erupts In Plainfield

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — With most businesses shut voluntarily, Newark police and National Guardsmen started a careful building-by-building search today in the riot-torn but peaceful Newark slums for sniping soldiers who had fired an occasional wild shot during the night.

Meanwhile, this city of 400,000, New Jersey's largest, started efforts to return to normalcy, with major attention to hauling away piles of rotting garbage and debris. Collections were halted Thursday after the first night of rioting that brought death to 23, injured more than 1,100, resulted in the seizure of 1,200 guns and caused property damage of over \$5 million.

Two of the men, Joe Peterson and Ed Anderson, roto topping scalded 25 feet to the ground on June 22 when an entire quarter section collapsed, killing Herbert Thompson, 38, Twin Falls. Both were ejected from their seats at the hospital following that accident. At the hospital, Mr. Peterson and Mr. Anderson calculated the load on the structure. Workers at the scene said they felt the project to be "fixed," agreed they were not planning to stay on the project to find out if it will be completed. One worker said he felt the lumber being used is poor, saying they are using about double the amount of timber support on this project as on other jobs, but this is the second time something has given away. Dallas-Tyler, 25, Twin Falls, who was working on the end of the roof section where concrete was being poured, said there was no warning except for the sound of sliding cement and suddenly the entire section was gone. He said he could see some of the end scaffolding and managed to stay off the structure, but he had to assist in digging Mr. Anderson and Mr. Peterson from under the cement and debris. R. L. Sutton, project superintendent, dejected after two accidents on this job, declined to explain the roof collapse and unable to say what the firm will do. Mr. Tyler said when the roof went, another bucket of cement, containing about two yards, was being raised into position by the large Sling crane, but it was too late to do anything. Workers, he said, were waiting for the bucket to reach the top of the wall and be poured and were about to do so into the air. Pouring of the roof section began early this morning and all of the cement was wet when the accident occurred at about 10:30 a.m. and involved a 100-foot by 30-foot section. Observation Of Canal Cease-Fire Delayed

Some last-minute hitch delayed U.N. observation of the Suez Canal cease-fire between the Egyptian and Israeli guns along the waterway were silent for the second day.

Small teams of foreign military men were on both sides of the canal, making preparations to observe the operation of the new cease-fire that halts the air and artillery battles Saturday. But the Israeli government said the United Nations had informed it the cease-fire operation could not start functioning until "a number of questions regarding the Egyptian stand" were cleared up.

The semi-official Cairo newspaper Al-Ahram said the start of the U.N. patrols was delayed by continuation of talks in Cairo and Tel-Aviv by Lt. Gen. Odd Bull, head of the U.N. Palestine truce organization.

AP correspondent Dennis Neid reported from the Israeli headquarters at El Qantara, on the canal, that Egypt had refused to allow direct communication between U.N. forces on opposite sides of the canal.

The Egyptian government announced it has informed Bull any Israeli attempt to move troops on the Suez Canal would be considered a violation of the cease-fire and Egyptian forces would immediately open fire.

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The Israeli newspaper Ha'aretz said the fighting in Israel's demand for use of the Suez Canal, from which Egypt has barred Israeli ships and cargo vessels for Israel since the Jewish state was founded in 1948.

In Jerusalem, Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan by implication raised the threat of an Israeli blockade if Egypt does not lift its ban. He said Israel will permit Egyptian boats to use the canal if Egypt does not interfere with Israeli use.

At the moment the canal is blocked by several ships sunk during the war. Egypt says it will do nothing about removing them until Israeli troops give up the territory they seized.

The five-nation Arab summit conference in Cairo issued a communique saying they had agreed to take "effective measures of aggression" and called for a united Arab stand.

In New York the emergency session of the General Assembly was a month old today. The Soviet Union, which demanded the session, was trying to prolong it for at least two more days in the hope of negotiating a resolution calling for withdrawal of Israeli troops from Arab territory. But there was no word of progress toward a compromise that could get the two-thirds vote necessary for adoption.

Young Militant Negro Tells Why He, Others Rioted

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — "White men are masters of tricknology," said a young militant Negro in explaining why he and his friends were rioting. "We're tired of always getting nothing."

Doug Jones, 22, father of four, lounged against a weathered picket fence Friday night on the edge of the riot-torn Negro neighborhood, near the towering housing project where his family lives.

Near here, on the street before dusk Friday evening, a Negro man was shot to death. Snipers' bullets, whining and snapping from windows and roofs, killed a policeman.

"There's no leader in this thing," he said, and his four friends agreed. "One guy picks up a brick, and the others just join."

"They think it is necessary. You know, it's got to stop, this picking on us particularly by the cops. Why if we all had guns, guns," his voice faded in his thoughts.

Jones, slender but tough, may be bitter. But his pal Yonk! "No first name, man" — hates with every breath.

"I'm not Negro, I'm a West Indian born in Jamaica who is now a Muslim in Newark, all five ways," said Yonk!, almost poking his finger into a newsman's eye for added emphasis.

"I can't get a job because my complexion is black," he yelled.

"I'm a high school graduate and I can't get a job. But if you're white, you get a job."

"They heat that guy up," said Calvin Thelall, 17. "I saw it

McNamara Records Nine Visits To Vietnam

NEW YORK (AP)—Since 1962, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara has gone to South Vietnam nine times and after each visit a statement was issued on the war as it appeared then and an official estimate of the future course of events.

A vast difference stands between the first and ninth statements. It indicates three things: 1. The ability of the Vietnamese to demonstrate repeatedly in 2,000 years—to confound their enemies.

In wars of independence, they defeated the Chinese in the first and the French in the 1950s. After 1962, Vietnamese Communists escalated the war more rapidly and more effectively than American officials apparently anticipated.

2. Misplaced optimism in Washington.

In 1962, the White House issued a statement saying the "major part" of the U.S. military effort could be completed "by the end of 1965."

3. The problem of how much to report about the war and how frankly to report it.

Military men usually claim that the facts are the facts and state them as all, so as not to reveal information of value to the enemy, and to avoid damaging the morale of the troops in the field and civilians at home. For example, in 1963 the New York Times quoted an official as saying, "I admit the press was sometimes lied to in Saigon in the past, but that does not mean that lying has continued and that the military press is never taken at face value."

In any event, here are the same statements issued following McNamara's trips and the events that followed.

1962—After a visit of two weeks, the secretary said the United States had "no plan for introducing combat forces into South Vietnam." He said he was "tremendously encouraged" by developments there. American forces then amounted to 8,000 men.

President John F. Kennedy defined their role as "training and transporting" and was assisting in every way he properly can the people of South Vietnam. He touched on the problem of "official sources" in saying, "This is an area where there is a good deal of danger and it's a matter of information."

In October, six months later, American troop strength rose to 10,000. More significantly, they no longer were engaged solely in "training and transportation." Correspondents noted that the soldiers were firing enemy fire and not merely returning it.

1963—On Oct. 2, after a survey in Vietnam, McNamara and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor reported to Kennedy. The White House then issued a statement which said:

"(They) reported their judgment that the major part of the U.S. military task can be completed by the end of 1965, although there may be a continuing requirement for a limited number of U.S. training personnel."

"They reported that by the end of this year the U.S. program for training should have progressed to a point where 1,000 U.S. military personnel assigned to Vietnam can be withdrawn."

American military forces then were reported to total 14,000, an increase of 4,000 in a year.

On November 2, Sen. Dink Rostenkowski, president of South Vietnam, was assassinated.

In a news conference Nov. 14, a reporter asked Kennedy if the "changed situation" in South Vietnam would check the plan to withdraw the 1,000 men. The President replied, "No. We're going to bring back several hundred before the end of the year."

The next day, the U.S. Command in Saigon announced the repatriation would begin on

Dec. 3. Dispatches said this report a month earlier.

Lyndon B. Johnson succeeded Kennedy on Nov. 22 and he sent McNamara back to Vietnam—

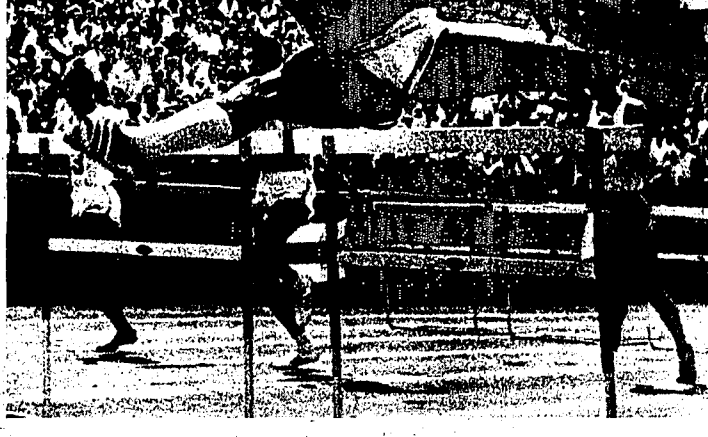

Hearing Set On Headgear For Cyclists

BOISE — A public hearing to determine the type of protective headgear to be worn by motorcycle and motor scooter riders ended Jan. 1, 1967, with the hearing room of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement Building, Boise.

The law regarding the wearing of protective headgear was passed during the regular session of the 1967 Idaho Legislature.

Law Enforcement Commissioner Werner C. Miles said this is one of the safety standards required under the federal government's Traffic Safety Program.

The Idaho law provides that the commissioner shall determine the type of headgear.

Among the helmets to be discussed was the type known as hearing which has the specifications for helmet, face shields and goggles.

Both oral and written testimony on the hearing may be submitted at the hearing.

Mutineers Holed Up In Plantation

KINSHASA, the Congo (AP) — White mercenaries in Katangan troops who mutilated against the Congolese government are reportedly holed up in the vast plantation of Mafu, Jean Schramm, their Belgian leader, in a tropical rain forest 155 miles southeast of Kinshanga.

The mutineers who seized part of Katanga, formerly South Africa, July 1965, last week, leaving it to the Congolese army. The army did not pursue the mutineers but instead started looting.

Mercenaries and Katangan troops took over Bukavu and Kinsanga after news reached them of the kidnapping July 1 in Europe of their former leader, ex-embassador Mafu Schramm. Schramm is now being held in Algiers, and Congolese President Joseph Mobutu's government is seeking his extradition as an executive officer.

Schramm, about 40, fought for Katanga during the Katanga secession in 1961 and led a mercenary force when a Congolese premier in 1964. A Belgian resident of the Congo, he was among the mercenaries who remained with the army after Katanga was overthrown.

"Estimates on the strength of the rebels at Katanga fluctuate but in July 1967 were about 150 whites and from 200 to 500 Katangans.

Three U.S. Air Force C-130 transports sent to Mobutu by President Johnson and two Red Cross planes evacuated 200 Europeans and Americans from Kinshanga and were continuing to fly supplies in to Congo troops.

3,000 Trying To Leave Biafra Area

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP)—About 3,000 Americans and Europeans are trying to get out of the seceding Biafra today as federal Nigerian troops were reported advancing toward the rebel capital.

Automobile convoys were bringing an estimated 200 Americans out of Lt. Col. Odumegwu Ojukwu's Biafra to the Eastern Nigerian port of Port Harcourt. Permission was being sought from the rebels to allow planes to land for lifting out the Britons.

When Ojukwu fled his refuge, independent of Nigeria May 30, there were about 2,000 Americans, including 120 Peace Corpsmen, plus British, Canadians and 300 Italians living there. Many of them, especially wives and children, were flown from Lagos.

Ojukwu's declaration of independence for his 30,000 square mile region, which holds 14 million of Nigeria's 60 million people, prompted the Congo to dissolve Africa's most populous state. Other regions of the country were reportedly ready to join the breakaway, and the government of Ojukwu's accession succeeded.

Newly Developed Mini-Mine Goes Up In Puffs Of Smoke

FORT WALTON BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Secrecy surrounding a new "mini-mine" being developed by the military went up in little puffs of smoke Sunday. Thousands of the explosive devices drifted onto a public beach in North Florida.

Several hundred servicemen were ordered into the area to gather up the bombs along some 120 miles of beach.

A canister loaded with the brownish disks was reported to have exploded accidentally on a beach near Eglin Air Force Base, Florida Panhandle. The disks are the size of a quarter with knobs protruding from each side.

When squeezed or stepped on they explode with the force of a large firecracker.

The secret device, being developed for use in Vietnam as a mine against sneak attacks, became unseer when Donald Spinnell of Fort Walton Beach found one.

Spinnell, 24, was treated for eye and hand injuries after he tried to pull one apart with his fingers and it exploded. A military spokesman said the mine on the beach had been "sensitive."

In an official release the Air Force said the objects had been dropped under "emergency situations," but would not elaborate.

However, a civilian official in the area said the accident was caused by a pilot taking off in the "wrong plane."

Many of an estimated 10,000 Sunday bathers were asked to leave the beaches.

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
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
