Engineers Advise Change In Water Reservoir Plans

A \$100,000 damage suit was filed against the city of Twin Falls at about 1 p.m. Wednesday by the widow and children of Herbert H. Thomas, who died of injuries suffered when a portion of the new city water reservoir collapsed June 22.

The suit alleges the "injuries and death resulted, at least in part, from negligence on the part of employees or agents of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho." The widow and children, Mrs. Louise Thomas and Gene Thomas and Bonnie Thomas Evans, are represented by the law firm of Rayborn, Rayborn, Webb and Pike, Twin Falls.

Construction work resumed Wednesday morning along with some cleanup activity at the Twin Falls reservoir site at Falls Avenue and Harrison Street, after a meeting Tuesday night by engineers, city officials and the project contractor to map a revised plan of procedure.

Because of two serious industrial accidents on the project, engineers Tuesday night listed four specific measures to be followed by the contractor in order to resume construction on the five-million gallon reservoir.

John Morrison of the city's consulting engineering firm, Morrison-Materio and Associates, Helena, Mont., listed the procedure being taken with the selection of a structural engineer with timber work experience by the contractor, Crom Prestressing-Inc. This engineer will make a complete study of the shoring structure which supports the concrete and granite work of the tank and make recommendations to Jack M. Crom, contractor, for revisions.

These recommendations also will be secured by engineers of the Morrison-Materio firm to make certain all engineers are in accord on the procedure to be followed.

Clark Hand Appointed To Head State Police Force

Idaho State Police Capt. Clark Hand was appointed Tuesday as superintendent of the Idaho State Police Force by Gov. Don Samuelson.

Capt. Hand is a 20-year veteran of the force and served in Twin Falls as District 4 lieutenant from 1949 to 1961, when he was promoted to captain and moved to Boise. He has been the department's operations officer since then and said that position will not be immediately filled.

Lt. Dean Bennett, in charge of District 4, said he is extremely pleased with the governor's selection of Capt. Hand.

Explorer 35 Soars On Moon Mission

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—America's Lunar Explorer spacecraft streaked toward the moon today on a mission viewed as the "last chance" to learn about potential radiation hazards facing moon-bound astronauts.

The windmill-shaped craft, officially named Explorer 35, bolted skyward at 10:19 a.m. (EDT) on a fiery Delta rocket to begin a planned three-day trip to an egg-shaped orbit about the moon.

U.S. Bombers Stage Raids On North

SAIGON (AP)—American bombers flew more heavy raids Tuesday against North Vietnam, striking at four major rail yards north of Hanoi and blasting a missile site inside a soccer stadium midway between Hanoi and Haiphong.

Pilots claimed their rockets and 750-pound bombs blew up three of the Soviet-made surface-to-air missiles and their launchers in the Hai Dong soccer stadium.

Disaster Emergency Is Declared In Plainfield

PLAINFIELD, N.J. (AP)—Gov. Richard J. Hughes declared a disaster emergency in this town today, paving the way for a search for weapons in the sealed-off Negro area.

The search was scheduled to begin later today.

Arabs Fail To Get Support Of Soviets

President Hourri Boumediene of Algeria and Abdel Rahman Aref of Iraq, the latest Arab pilgrims to Moscow, apparently have failed to get Soviet backing for new military action against Israel.

A communiqué issued in Moscow after Boumediene and Aref flew back to Cairo Tuesday said they exchanged opinions with Communist party chief Leonid Brezhnev and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin on how to bring about an Israeli withdrawal from Arab land seized in the June war.

Temper Flare During Utah Copper Strike

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A Sheriff's deputy broke up a confrontation between pickets and several young management truopers early today at Kennecott Corp.'s silver processing plant west of Salt Lake City.

Temper flared briefly as employees ordered pickets to depart state young men in three out-of-state groups through picket lines of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

Railroads Rolling Back To Normal Operations

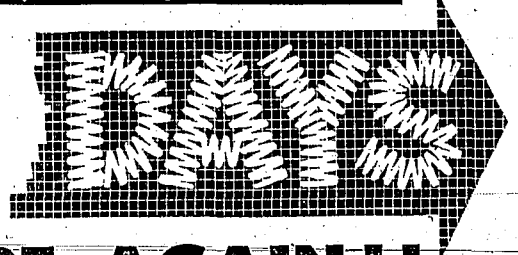
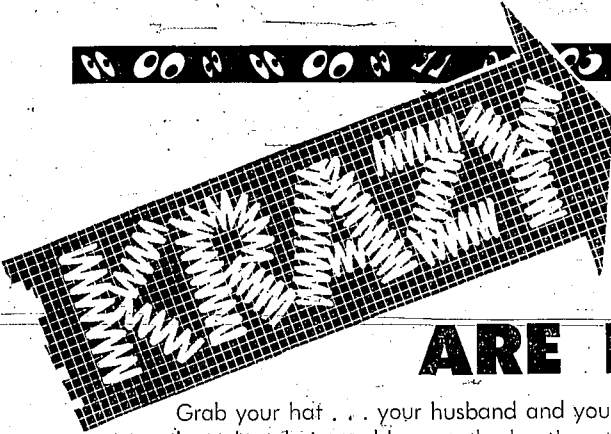
NEW YORK (AP)—The nation's railroads picked up momentum today as they rolled back toward normal operations. But some lines said full service was still a day or so away.

Oui, Si And Jawohl, It's A Unique Camp

KETCHUM—The first foreign language summer camp in southern Idaho will begin July 30 at the Cathedral Pines Camp north of Ketchum with the emphasis on speaking and living with a foreign language and culture.

The unique camp, an idea of the executive board of the Idaho State Foreign Teachers' Association, includes three separate camps, German students attending from July 30 to Aug. 12, and French and Spanish students, camping separately, from Aug. 13 to Aug. 26.

The project is financed by a federal grant of approximately \$12,000 through approval of the United States Office of Education and will provide both tuition and living expenses for the students attending, and salaries for the instructors and staff.

The camp is designed for first year language students, most of whom will be high school juniors this fall, to create enthusiasm for continuing their foreign language studies, according to camp director, Alvin L. Buzzard, College of Idaho, Caldwell.

Athlete Seeks Peace For Negroes

PLAINFIELD, N.J. (AP)—An Olympic athlete flew across the country to seek peace in the Negro neighborhood where he grew up and concluded deadly violence there "was agitated from the outside."

After talking Tuesday with young Negro men in the riot district here, Plainfield's Milt Campbell, a Negro, added, "These men who came in and started this violence have moved out, I believe."

Campbell, now 33, grew up in the Negro section of this suburban city of 50,000 on the fringe of the northern New Jersey metropolitan area. He gained sports fame as winner of a gold medal in the decathlon in the 1956 Olympic games.

He now lives in Toronto, Canada, but flew here from Silver City, Calif., where he was conducting a detoxification clinic when news of rioting in Plainfield reached him.

"This thing happened so damned quick for these people to have organized it," he said in an interview. "They had no organization whatsoever of their own."

Campbell said, "I think, except for negotiations, it's all over."

BIDS OPENED
BOISE (AP) — Two bids were opened for projects affecting state-operated institutions. Commissioner of Public Works Robert De Shazo reported Tuesday.

Neal Builders, Inc., Clarkston, Wash., was named apparent low bidder at \$4,700 to furnish a chemistry laboratory at Lewis and Clark Normal, Lewiston.

T. A. Myers Construction Co., Gooding, was the only bidder on contract to repair a furnace at the Idaho State Tuberculosis Hospital in Gooding. Myers' bid was \$5,200.

Pentagon Rules On GI Family Death

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon has ruled that any serviceman who loses a relative in Vietnam may be kept out of the war for at least six months. If the serviceman already is in Vietnam, he may be removed from the war zone for a similar period.

In either case, he must apply for the special treatment in writing himself—his father, mother, or wife cannot. The language reads this way: "Where a member of a family is killed or dies as a result of Vietnam service, other members of the same family will, on request, either be deferred from assignment to Vietnam for a period of at least six months following date of death or, if serving in Vietnam, be reassigned therefrom for the same minimum period."

The directive does not define "family" and no figures were issued on how many families have more than one member now in Vietnam. The provision appears in a Defense Department directive establishing uniform policies among the armed services governing assignment of military personnel to Vietnam. It states a policy that "assignments to duty in Vietnam will be shared as equitably as practicable by all members of the Armed Forces."

APPOINTMENT SET
BOISE (AP) — The appointment of \$10,033 to Idaho school districts for the 1967-68 school year was announced Tuesday by D.F. Engelking, Idaho superintendent of public instruction.

Engelking said the early appointment represented about 32 per cent of the total state money apportioned during the entire 1967-67 year. Final distribution of \$483,315 for the last year has just been made, he said.

Legislative action earlier this year made it the first time state school funds have been apportioned directly to districts, rather than through counties.

BOY DROWNS
BOISE (AP) — A four-year-old Boise boy drowned late Tuesday at the Sandy Point swimming area below the Lucky Beach on the Boise river, according to Ada County sheriff's officers.

Officers identified the boy as Paul Parent, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Parent of Boise.

The boy was reportedly last seen standing on a small dock and his body was pulled from the water about a half hour later at 6:20 p.m.

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho State Board of Medicine said Tuesday that 30 physicians have passed the examinations to practice medicine and surgery in Idaho.

Political Censorship Is Ending

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnamese military government is ending political censorship Thursday, two weeks before the official start of the presidential campaign.

President Nguyen Cao Ky said he would sign a decree abolishing the much-criticized censorship tonight. The decree will not affect military censorship imposed for reasons of national security. How long it would be in force was not disclosed.

The military government had promised more than a month ago to end political censorship. Ky made the announcement as he flew north from Saigon on a military inspection with his running mate for the Sept. 3 presidential election, Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu. Thieu is running for president and Ky for vice president.

Tampa "White Hats" Move Growing

NEW YORK (AP) — Fifty Negro youths wearing white helmets strode into Tampa's rioting Negro section last month in the name of law and order and helped end three nights of terror.

Tampa is having second thoughts about the "White Hats" now but the idea of sending boys and girls, some of whom are on the city payroll, to do a non-partisan job of "peace ambassadors" as fast as are the number of American cities hit by Negro rioting.

In Plainfield, three young men, one a Black Muslim, were issued Monday night as couriers in a successful effort after three nights of disturbances to negotiate with warring Negro youths. They were the only avenue into the trouble spots to persuade their neighbors, young or old, to "cool it."

Some city officials even hope they can use the teen-agers as a kind of early warning-system to head off trouble before it starts.

The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, recently suspended the patrol's funds because Mayor Sam Yorty said he was disturbed the organization was not funded through the city.

Lee Wilkins, patrol assistant director, has vowed the patrol will remain alive. "We'll operate even if the funds are withdrawn permanently," he said. "The community has had a favorable reaction to us and we'll keep going even if we have to take the money out of our own pockets."

Negro, White To Marry In Tennessee

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Herman McDaniel, a Negro, and his white fiancee plan to be married Friday in the first recorded interracial marriage in Tennessee.

The way was cleared for the marriage Tuesday when the state attorney general's office ruled that a county court clerk has no authority to deny a license to a racially mixed couple if they have otherwise complied with the law.

Spencer Campbell, the probate auditor, cited Tennessee's anti-miscegenation law and the state constitution's prohibition on interracial marriages.

Campbell said at the time, "We have to be bound by the existing law until it is declared invalid."

But Milton Rice, an assistant state attorney general, wrote to County Court Clerk R. E. Worrell that a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision, which overturned a similar Virginia statute invalidated Tennessee's bans against such marriages.

Attorney David Vincent said the couple plan to apply again Friday for the license and be married in a quiet ceremony at the Nashville Metropolitan Courthouse.

Redistricting Measure Is Floundering

By JOHN BECKER

WASHINGTON (AP)—Another attempt by House and Senate conferees to agree on a congressional redistricting bill appeared to be floundering today on an antigerrymandering provision.

The issue deadlocked the conference Tuesday after the senators and representatives tentatively had agreed to permit a population variance of 35 per cent between the largest and smallest districts in a state for the next five years.

Under the agreement the maximum permissible variation would be 10 per cent starting in 1972.

The question on which the conferees now are hung up is whether an antigerrymandering provision should be written into the law or whether the states should be free to decide if a district's lines are properly drawn.

Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., chairman of the House conferees, said a majority of them backed a strong provision in the law while the Senate conferees favored leaving it to the states.

Celler said another attempt would be made to resolve the dispute. If it fails Senate conferees will go back to the Senate for further instructions.

An earlier conference agreement that would have postponed any redistricting action until 1972 was rejected by the House.

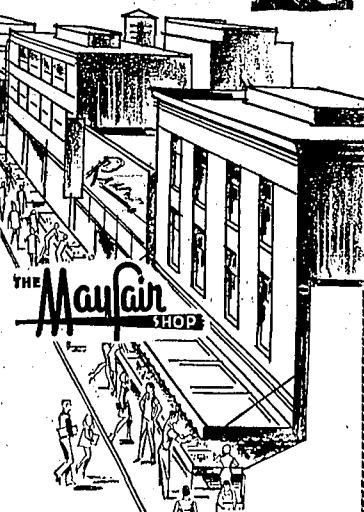

Qualifications For Social Security Set

About one of every five applicants for social security disability benefits delays so long before making his application that he risks possible loss of some benefits, Rudolph E. Minghini, district manager of the Social Security Office in Twin Falls, said Tuesday.

In order to remedy this situation, the Social Security Administration is asking anyone who might possibly qualify for disability benefits to contact a social security office as soon as possible.

"Some people fail to apply because they don't realize that they can benefit from the program," Mr. Minghini said. "Younger people often think that social security payments are only for people in their sixties, whereas the disability program was specifically set up to protect the wage earner who is forced to stop working before he is old enough to collect retirement benefits."

A person under 65 can receive monthly payments if he has a physical or mental impairment that has kept or will keep him from working for a year or more. Individual benefits range from \$44 to \$152 a month. If the worker has dependents, total family benefits can add up to \$338 a month.

Benefits begin after a person has been disabled for six full months. No benefits can be paid for months during this waiting period. Also, the law limits the back benefits a person can collect to the 12 months before the month in which he applies.

This means that the latest a person can file without losing any back benefits is the month that comes after the 18th month of his disability.

Benefits continue for as long as the disability lasts, or until the beneficiary reaches age 65. At age 65, disability benefits are converted to retirement benefits, without any change in the amount.

Permittees To Hear Good News Friday

BOISE — Winners of permits for controlled moose and goat hunts this fall will hear the good news by Friday noon, July 21, when printed lists will go to the state press for publication, and they will be advised personally by mail.

Not so, however, in the case of winners of permits for deer, antelope, elk and mountain turkey. The public drawing for these permits will be held in Boise Friday, July 21, and will be from ten days to two weeks before they are notified and the lists are published. This is due to the great volume of applications and cross-checking that must be done before the final lists are complete.

Most hunts for all big game species, including mountain goats, will have enough applicants to at least equal the number of permits available. But indications the day before the July 12 deadline for filing were that the odds won't be as great this year at the July 19 and 21 public drawings.

Social Security Field Hours For Valley Reported

Hours for field representatives from the Twin Falls Social Security office to several Magic Valley towns have been changed, according to Rudolph E. Minghini, district manager.

Towns with new hours for the visiting field representatives are Burley, every Tuesday, Rupert, twice a month on Thursdays, and Gooding, on Wednesdays, all from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. and from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Representatives will be in Hiley on the first Friday of every month, from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.

The social security representatives travel to area towns without social security offices to accept applications and answer questions anyone may have.

Scientists Believe Atlantis Discovered

BOSTON (AP)—The Greek philosopher Plato started the legend of Atlantis with tales of a huge and glittering island continent which sank violently into the Atlantic Ocean 3,500 years ago.

Two Massachusetts scientists said Tuesday they may have discovered Atlantis—not submerged in the Atlantic but buried under tons of volcanic ash on a tiny island in the Aegean Sea near Greece.

The report was made by Dr. James W. Mavor Jr. of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute and Emily Vermeule, a research fellow at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts.

Their nomination for the seat of the Atlantis civilization is the island of Thira about 60 miles north of the island of Crete and southeast of Greece.

Plato wrote of a race of conquerors from Atlantis which almost overran the Mediterranean and finally was defeated by Athens.

Then, in a single day and night, their island home sank into the sea.

For 30 years, scientists have believed that most of Plato's tale was fanciful but that an advanced civilization which gave him his theme did exist and did suffer a sudden and violent end, probably by being buried by a volcanic eruption.

Scientists have speculated, however, that Atlantis was not in the Atlantic but was part of the Minoan civilization which flourished about 1,500 B.C. and had its capital at the palace city of Knossos on Crete.

Following a hunch that the Minoan civilization could have jumped the 60 miles to Thira, Dr. Mavor and Mrs. Vermeule, working with a Greek-American expedition, began digging on the island this year.

They said they found buried under 30 to 60 feet of volcanic ash, the remains of a city of about 30,000 persons. They said most of the buildings, some two or three stories high, are still intact.

Dr. Mavor and Mrs. Vermeule said they believe Thira may have been Plato's Atlantis because of the evidence that a very advanced civilization existed there and because it apparently came to a sudden, violent end.

Mrs. Vermeule said the expedition found no human remains and concluded that the inhabitants had a warning about the coming eruption "and got in their boats and left."

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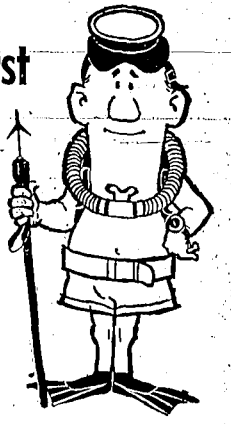

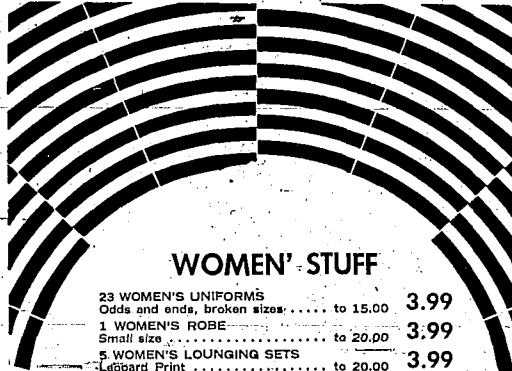

Fire started in the welding room of the manufacturing company after workmen left apparently from a spark that smoldered for a time and then broke into flames.

Firemen said there was no one in the building when the fire started but that workers left it only a few minutes earlier. There were no injuries.

Damage to the Baldwin building had not been determined Wednesday morning although it was reported extensive through the front portion of the structure.

Both firms were able to resume business Wednesday although the Baldwin firm was operating without electricity. The firm owned by B. C. Baldwin which said damage was largely in the ceiling and front portions. He said the fire resulted to equipment as most of the heavy items are outside and a truck bed which had just been completed had been removed from the area.

A pioneer manufacturing concern, Baldwin is engaged in custom manufacturing including all types of farm machinery and repairs to machinery and equipment.

War Viewed With Pessimism

By JACK BEEL
WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional leaders with varying degrees of pessimism about the prospects of how the war should be fought, are viewing the military situation in Vietnam with more than usual pessimism.

There are rising complaints that the conflict has become almost wholly an American war. There is skepticism about Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's reports of substantial military progress.

There is general acceptance that more U.S. troops will be sent to Asia and that the administration will be back in January for a \$4 billion to \$6 billion increase in the military budget.

Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., and Rep. Melvin R. Laird, R-Wis., raised the "American

war" issue. Byrd, who wants greater military efforts made to end the conflict, took McNamara to task for saying the United States had not requested allies to supply more troops.

Byrd, a Senate Armed Services Committee member, said it wasn't enough just to discuss these matters with other nations. He said troop requests should be laid on the line, not at the point be reached where Americans are doing all the fighting.

Laird, who heads the House Republican Conference, said in a statement that U.S. casualties are outrunning "those of the South Vietnamese two to one."

President Johnson told a news conference Tuesday that some-

times the Americans lost more men because of the places in which they are fighting. "The situation fluctuates," he said. "He added he didn't think anything really is gained by pulling out of this country or that country lost more yesterday than the one day before."

Rep. Clarence D. Long, D-Mo., said the South Vietnamese army must be revitalized as a part of the program of sending more U.S. troops.

Long, a member of the House Appropriations subcommittee on military spending, added: "We cannot and should not take over unlimited defense of a land that is not making the greatest possible contribution to its own self-preservation."

Crooks Scared

HIGHLAND PARK, Mich. (AP)—Police Chief William E. Stephens credited gun-toting merchants Tuesday for the fact that no store in his city of 38,000 has been robbed in almost three months.

"The crooks must be scared," said Stephens. "And they should be. The merchants aren't just armed, they're getting to be experts with their pistols."

Many merchants in Highland Park, a city surrounded by Detroit, began arming themselves three months ago as a defense against frequent holdups.

Stephens' department trained some in use of firearms in hopes of curtailing the holdup rate, which ranged between 8 and 10 robberies a week.

Export-Import Bank Measure Pinned Down In Crossfire

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation affecting the Export-Import Bank is pinned down in a crossfire, over \$2 billion in unpublicized loans for arms purchases by other countries.

Some members of Congress apparently have known for a long time about the government bank's role—greatly expanded in the past two years—as credit department for arms bought by countries approved by the Defense Department. But general disclosure in the past two weeks produced shock waves.

Thirteen Republican members of the House Banking Committee demanded Tuesday that the committee recall a bill it approved to extend the bank's life five years and increase its operating authority by \$4.5 billion.

Several Democratic members of the committee, enough perhaps to give the dissenters a

majority, have expressed similar sentiments. The administration sought the bill.

The Republicans said they had been given no inkling of the arms financing and complained of a "crisis in confidence."

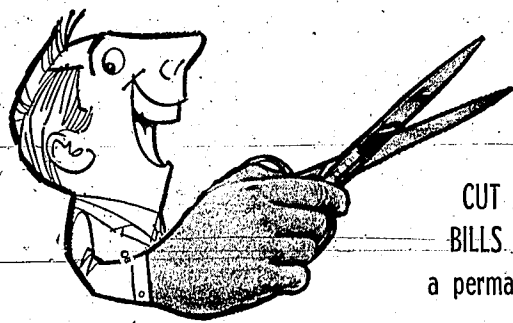
Chairman Wright Patman, D-Tex., hit hard at the Republican position Tuesday "as giving great comfort to our Communist enemies."

He said the minority is trying to "gain political advantage out of a critical world situation" and is "inadvertently performing great public relations work for the Soviet Union and Red China." These countries, Patman said, are extensively shipping arms to their allies without even requiring loans.

However, Patman held the bill back Tuesday from the House Rules Committee, which was ready to consider clearing it for House action.

Fallout Shelter Survey Being Conducted

A statewide survey in hopes for the Idaho Office of Disaster Relief and Civil Defense began this week, and Magic Valley residents were urged by local defense officials to cooperate with the survey.

Twin Falls residents received questionnaires through the mail and were requested to fill them out and return them as soon as possible. Towns such as Magic Valley, with the exception of Twin Falls, will send local teams of workers, trained by representatives of the U.S. Census Bureau, to individual homes to gather the necessary information.

Approximately 340 Idahoans throughout the state will call on each resident requesting the information. All those working with the survey will be identified by colorful red, white and blue badges from the U.S. Census Bureau.

The interviewers will be calling on families living in one-, two- and three-family homes in their local areas to obtain facts about the houses. Most census interviewers are women. Their official credentials bear their signatures and certify that they are authorized to perform the duties of a census interviewer, and as such, have sworn to keep confidential all census information given them.

Among the questions they ask are: How many people usually live in your household? How many floors does your house have? What type of roof? Do you have a basement or cellar under your house? If you do, what are the basement walls made of? And what is the height of each basement wall above the outside ground level?

Householders are asked to welcome the census interviewers when they call and give their full cooperation in getting accurate answers to all the questions.

Questionnaires have been mailed to addresses of one-, two- and three-family dwellings in other major cities besides Twin Falls, including Alameda, Boise, Caldwell, Coeur d'Alene, Idaho Falls, Lewiston, Moscow, Nampa and Pocatello. The householders are to fill out the questionnaires and mail them back to the Census Bureau.

Plans about a single house, whether mailed in by the census interviewer, will be processed at the Census Bureau. An electronic computer will calculate the protection against fallout the house provides.

This information will be mailed back directly to the household together with a Civil Defense booklet. Those who have received a booklet will receive a booklet describing suggested methods for increasing the amount of protection.

Those without basements will receive another booklet with general information on protective measures that can be taken by individuals and families.

The computer's report on the amount of fallout protection in a home is confined between the householder and the Census Bureau, and is provided without direct cost to him.

For the last five years, the National Office of Civil Defense, the State of Idaho and local county government have been conducting the National Fallout Shelter Survey, utilizing the services of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Large buildings were examined and evaluated for fallout protection. As of May 1, 1967, in Idaho, shelter spaces for 227,000 persons have been located in all structures.

To supplement such supplies

that may already exist in these buildings, a two-week supply of emergency shelter stocks consisting of food, water containers, sanitation and medical supplies, and radiation detection instruments for 158,000 people have been stored in 38 of these structures. A vigorous program of locating, marking and stocking shelter structures is continuing throughout the state.

When the Idaho survey is completed and the findings analyzed, the Federal Government will furnish statistical summaries of homes with fallout protection to the state and local governments.

State and local government officials will learn from area summaries the total number of residents in each Idaho community that could be protected in basements of their own homes.

The information received by local governments will aid them in planning to meet shelter shortages in their communities when people are at home and will assist in community planning to provide fallout protection for people at work and at school, for day and night population distribution.

Said Gov. Don Samuelson of the need for more fallout shelters, "Since more than 95,000 homes in Idaho have basements, we should develop over 254,000 shelter spaces to be used solely by the occupants of the home should disaster occur."

The success of the project will depend upon your acceptance and support," the governor commented.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thurgood Marshall, nominee for the Supreme Court bench, declares he is bitterly opposed to a judge using his own proclivities to decide a lawsuit.

Marshall told the Senate Judiciary Committee Tuesday that a judge should not inject into decisions "his personal idea that this is good or this is fair."

His statements came after two Southern senators on the committee questioned Marshall for the third day on his nomination.

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Newsman Backed By Sen. Kennedy

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Newsman Walter Sheridan, accused by Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison of trying to thwart his John F. Kennedy assassination inquiry, has been strongly defended by the brother of the slain president.

Sheridan, 41, of Washington, an investigative reporter for the National Broadcasting Co., goes before the Orleans Parish grand jury today.

The jury has been hearing much of Garrison's case. The district attorney contends a plot was hatched in New Orleans to kill the late President Kennedy who was killed in Dallas, Texas, Nov. 22, 1963.

Real Thing

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Igor Stravinsky may not have scored real lightning for the climax to his "Firebird Suite" but he got it Tuesday during a rehearsal of the London Symphony Orchestra.

"We were right at the peak of the number," said Andre Previn, "when along came a crash and a flash."

The lightning struck the top of the building near skylights that illuminated the stage. A corner of Peabody Auditorium was knocked off, scattering concrete over adjoining streets and yards.

Previn is guest conductor of the orchestra which is appearing at the Florida International Music Festival at Daytona Beach.

Kimberly Road Property Sold By Mitchell Hunt

What is reported as being one of the largest transactions involving commercial and industrial property along Kimberly Road in recent years, was announced Wednesday by John Coleman, attorney for the seller, Mitchell W. Hunt, former Twin Falls resident and businessman.

Student Group Has Estrangement Problems

By HARRY ROSENTHAL WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Student Association, which recently divorced the Central Intelligence Agency in February, is having typical marital estrangement difficulties. Who gets the house and who pays the bills? Both sides were embarrassed when the student-CIA tie was disclosed by former NSA officers. The NSA got bricks from its members for accepting money from a government agency that spies and influences; the CIA blushed like an undercover agent who drops his badge at a Mafia meeting. But the student association still has its national headquarters in two expensive inner-city townhouses, and it is paying nothing for them under an agreement with the Independence Foundation of Boston.

The foundation, the NSA president says, is a CIA conduit, or way to pass things like money without revealing the real source. Eugene Groves, president of the NSA, says the foundation is not trying to collect rent. It simply wants to be rid of its tenants. The students want to keep their headquarters, but they don't want the CIA to pay for it. "They are in the hot seat and want us out of the building," says Groves. "We had one meeting with the attorney for the CIA. He was rather nasty, using a lot of bluff, threats that we punctured very easily."

What kind of threats? "One is drying up the Independence Foundation in order that the tenant would no longer own the building."

The CIA, being in the secrecy business, won't comment on the association's comment on the CIA's pressuring them. There are a number of cases the NSA underwent so a balance is due the foundation. This is not a CIA front. The third contribution to the NSA was \$5,018.15 and \$48,938.09 in its income tax refund. Records for later years were not on file at the Foundation Library in Washington. Efforts to reach a spokesman for the Independence Foundation were not successful. Groves says the Independence Foundation and two other foundations now are submitting bills not connected with the rent. "What we need now is sizeable money to buy the building and then we have an asset to borrow on," Groves says. "We need \$75,000 so we can pick up the mortgage."

Prison Camp Was Known Fire Hazard

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A state prison camp where 37 convicts died in a fire was a known fire hazard that was scheduled to be phased out of operation, Florida's Cabinet learned Tuesday.

Doyle Conner, state agriculture commissioner and chairman of the Cabinet's subcommittee on corrections, said state agents "knew" the World War II type wooden barracks at Road Camp 12, near Jay, were hazardous because of their flammable nature. Conner said the Jay camp was one of 13 with wooden barracks that the state has been removing from the prison system. "We've been phasing out two to three each year," he said. "Obviously this should be accelerated and many of us regret we did not do it sooner."

In Milton, a coroner's jury circled the Sunday night fire was a "criminal act of arson." It said the fire was started by three prisoners—Thomas E. Ard, 28, of Pensacola; Earl F. Hoffman, 41, of Tallahassee; and Joseph Earl Wynder, 21, of Marianna. All died in the flames.

The jury indicated it did not attempt to determine why the prisoners set the fire, but a guard testified he believed the fire was intended as retribution for his confiscation of a pornographic book from Ard.

Britain Tells Plans To End Asian Bases

BY ARTHUR L. GAVSHON LONDON (AP) — Britain announced Tuesday plans for a massive withdrawal from its Southeast Asian land bases and a one-fifth cut in all armed forces by the mid-1970s.

A government policy statement disclosed the pullout will take place in two stages:

—By 1970-1971 British forces in the vast region between the Suez Canal and the China Sea will be reduced by half from their present strength of 40,000 servicemen and 40,000 local civilian employees.

—By 1975-1976 British bases in Singapore and Malaysia will be shut down totally, leaving only airfields and naval port facilities open for future British use.

The haul-down of the Union Jack in a region once dominated by the royal navy symbolized the final phase in the dismantling of the modern world's mightiest empire.

And it has been designed, too, to hasten the process of transferring Britain from a global to a strictly European power.

Or at least that's the popular opinion.

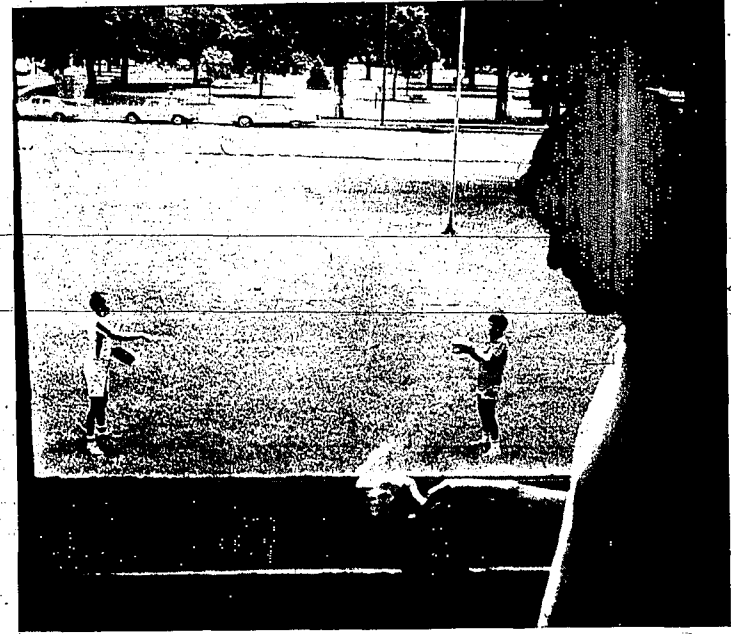
Actually, the school is far from vacant. Approximately 50 men, women and young people are working in the Twin Falls school during the busiest season for maintenance work.

These empty halls now echo with the roar of sanding machines, electric saws, and the voices of painters and workers who have the task of preparing the nine schools in District 411.

And, it is a big job. The largest single building project in the district is the remodeling of the hot lunch area at O'Leary Junior High School. School officials wish to improve the facilities and encourage the hot lunch program.

The O'Leary dining area is being enlarged by including a hallway as part of the lunch room. New partitions and a new doorway are part of the remodeling work.

More tables will be added to the area, and the benches will be removed and chairs used instead. The tables are made by the school district in the large workshop located in the school administration building. Another big project for all of the schools is painting. Room by room, those needing new paint are cleaned of equipment, tarps are spread and the scaffolds are moved in.

Electrical repairs are carried out through the summer, and new lights are being placed in the Washington School Annex.

Roof maintenance during the summer includes treatment with scaling materials.

The main office of the school administration sends out supplies to the schools during the summer months, reams of paper, gallons of duplicating fluid and booklets is done.

Box after box of books arrive at the schools, new ones and those sent to be rebound in Salt Lake and Boise. Approximately 1,500 texts and 500 literary books were sent for repairs this year.

Always there is continual bookkeeping. The office staff prepares the final books for the first school year and prepares for the school year to come.

Part of the bookkeeping is the payment of summer help. Of the 56 maintenance workers, 25 are members of the Neighborhood Youth Corps for young people under 21. The Corps trains young people for a trade.

That school that looks so vacant is a hive of activity as maintenance people battle the clock to get it ready for that first day of school.

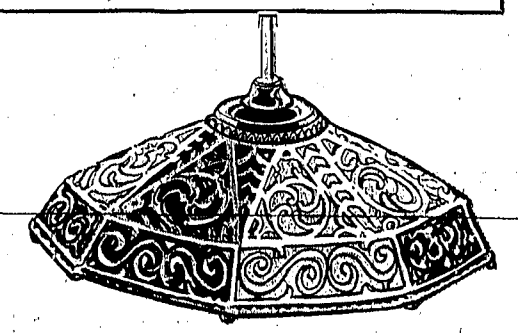

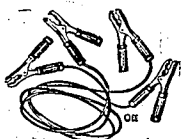

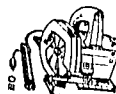

The applicant must meet all prerequisites for the course for which he applies, understand his assignment upon graduation, be re-enrolled in the Air Force, and sign a statement that he understands that failure to complete the course may lead to his discharge.

Rank will be determined by length of time separated from service.

Movement of dependents and household goods at government expense is authorized if enlisted in grade E-4 or above, has four years prior service, and course duration is 20 weeks or longer.

A total of 37 courses are now open to prior servicemen under the new program. Duration of the courses range from a low of nine weeks to a high of 42 weeks.

CSI Credits Good At Colleges Throughout Country

Students who have graduated from or attended the College of Southern Idaho and wish to enroll in other schools should have no fears about the acceptance of their credits, according to Dr. James L. Taylor, college president.

For example, Dr. Taylor said he personally knows of students who have had their CSI credits accepted at Harvard, the University of New Mexico, Washington State University, the University of Washington and Stanford, all out-of-state schools.

CSI is a candidate for membership in the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, an accrediting association, and as such, enjoys most of the recognition a regular member does, according to James Dennis, executive director of the association.

No school can be a full member of the association until it is in its own physical plant, Dr. Taylor pointed out. CSI expects to fulfill this requirement in the fall of 1968, and a team from the association will make a visit to CSI at that time.

The Northwest group consists of six such associations in the United States, all acting on a reciprocal basis.

However, a student who earns a credit at a low grade, or one who has a credit not applicable to the program he is studying, at another institution, runs the risk of having the credit classified as unacceptable, a standard practice with all institutions.

The credits are not actually lost after acceptance in the Northwest association, a common fear of students, but careful planning should be done by any student in any institution who plans to transfer credits to another.

A typical letter sent to Dr. Taylor after acceptance in the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, Boise College, Idaho, read:

Dean Chaburn's letter stated that "... on the basis of the acceptance of the College of Southern Idaho as a candidate for membership by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, Boise College, will accept credits for transfer purposes of students from your college."

Similar letters came from the University of Idaho, Idaho State University, Ricks College, etc.

State Lottery Sales Total \$6,447,605

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Sales of New York State lottery tickets in June — the first month of its operation — totaled only \$6,447,605, compared with the \$30-million goal that had been set.

State Tax Commissioner Joseph H. Murphy in announcing the official figures, contended, however, that the first month should not be regarded as a bumper because there had been "insufficient opportunity" to develop the full potential for sales, distribution and staff.

The law establishing the lottery — for educational purposes — was approved by the voters last November and went into effect April 1, but sales were put off to allow time for organization.

Republican Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, who did not endorse the lottery plan but went along with the voters and signed the implementing legislation, budgeted net proceeds of \$15 million from it for state aid to education, and additional money for local school districts has been planned.

Drawings for the winners begin this week, with prizes ranging from \$150 to \$100,000, based on horse races previously run.

Problem Smaller Than Expected In Spruce Budworm Spray Area

The Zectran spraying operation on the Big Smoky Spruce Budworm Control project north of Fairfield was completed Saturday, according to Sawtooth Forest Supervisor Max Rees, but the infestation was considerably smaller than first predicted.

Except for the follow-up checking by entomologists to evaluate the effect of the spraying on the budworm and other forest animals, the project is complete.

Due to the late spring, Supervisor Rees said, and perhaps some other factors the entomologists haven't identified, the extent of the infestation was markedly reduced from what had been expected last fall. It was possible to treat less of the area than had been planned.

Less than 5,000 acres needed to be treated. The Zectran was applied primarily to the Salt Creek drainage and the Flexa area near the confluence of the South Fork of the Boise River and Big Smoky Creek.

Dr. Arthur Moore, director of the Forest Service Insecticide Evaluation Project, advised that the field application trials to study the effect of Zectran, techniques for applying the insecticide in minute droplets and the mortality of the spruce budworm appear to have been successful at this stage.

He commented that he and his crew would make further studies before they would know how successful the spraying was.

Specialists attending the spraying included J. W. Bongberg, director of the Division of Forest Pest Control, Washington, D. C.; Dr. William M. Uphol, executive secretary of the Federal Forest Pest Control Committee, Bethesda, Md.; Dr. James J. Fettes, director of the Chemical Control Research Institute, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, and Dr. William S. Murray, Bureau of Budget House Appropriations Committee, Washington, D.C.

EAST RETURNS CORRECT CARD

The Eastern Open Pairs is the oldest contract tournament in the country. It was first played in 1929 and won by George Reine and a young man named Oswald Jacoby. Jacoby won it

him in five hearts doubled and he would have been down two or three.

Boris opened the king of diamonds against the four spade contract and continued with the ten. Someone has the one missing diamond. If East held it he would follow suit. If South held it Boris wanted Steve to ruff and return a club.

Sure enough, Steve ruffed and returned a club but he also returned the right club—the jack! There is nothing sensational about this play. It is the sort that any careful expert would make automatically but it is also the sort of play that most players overlook.

The basic reason for the play is that the jack lead smokes fourth's ten. If Steve had led dummy's best of third best or fifth best or sixth best South could have played his five spot. Boris would ruff but declarer would not lose another trick. The jack lead forced declarer to use either his ace or his queen and left Steve with a sure club winner for the setting trick.

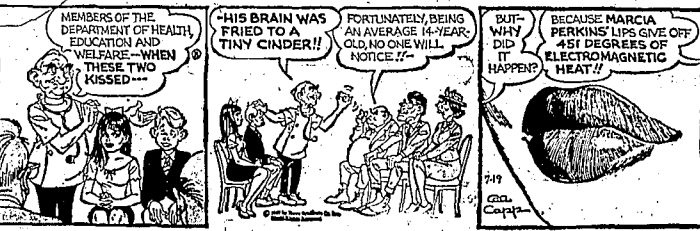

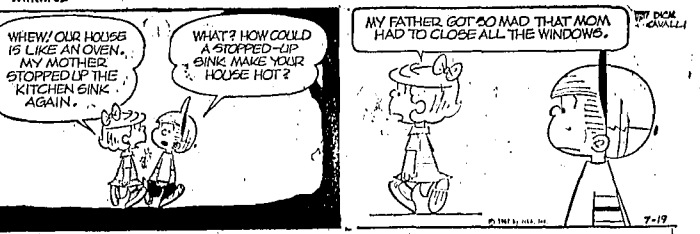

Mononucleosis Is Way Out For Students

BETHESDA, Md. (UPI) — It's certain to happen at least once every year on every college campus.

There comes a knock at the health center's door and in slumps a pallid, wheezing, woe-eyed student. "Yes, what is it?" the doctor asks.

"Sir, I'm pretty sure I've got mono. I'm tired all the time and I can't study. The student backs. "And I have a final coming up this week."

The student is behind in his work and is borrowing a little extra time. The physician knows it, but can't be sure he's not really telling the truth. So he's tactically powerless in the face of a frantic, test-fearing student who claims he has mono. The student gets his excuse.

Language Of Idaho Natives Being Taped

IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY, Pocatello — Phillip Miller, instructor of English at the ISU summer classes, wishes to record on tape the terminology and colloquial language of Idaho-born people for a dictionary of American regional English which is being compiled at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, for the purpose of preserving the language.

He is particularly interested in hearing from older people or those who remember the speech of local pioneers. He is also interested in people who have engaged in farming, railroad and other work which may have its own expressions and terminology.

Mononucleosis — has come to be the traditional grade-averer on the college campus. Because so little is known about infectious mononucleosis, students can claim it whether they have it or not and usually get away with it.

Infectious mono is also known as the kissing disease. It has been recognized worldwide as such for half a century. Virus is the best guess for its cause, but

so far no virus or other infectious agent has been isolated from sufferers.

Symptoms are fatigue, malaise, chilliness, fever, sore throat and swollen lymph glands in the upper part of the body. Mono is a masquerader. It may resemble diphtheria, the stiff neck of meningitis, the abdominal pains of acute appendicitis, the rash of scarlet fever, the trichinosis or the generalized abnormality of the lymph nodes which can be mistaken for leukemia.

Therefore, one of the objectives of the study (actually being conducted by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases) is to look for links mono may have with more serious or potentially fatal diseases.

"Most of the patients," said a NAID technician, "are between 15 and 25. Mono is more severe in persons over 30, but is rare after 35."

"We receive reports of about 10,000 actual cases in this country a year, plus thousands more with mono symptoms. There is actually a rise in the number of cases in late spring and a smaller rise again in October."

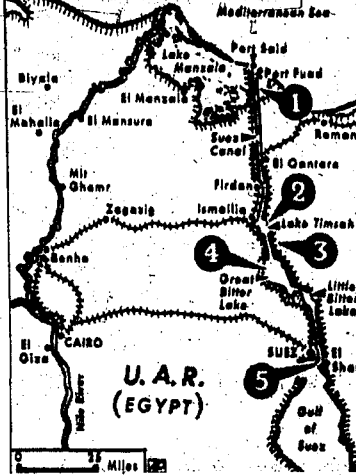
