Soviets, U.S. Try To Agree

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Soviet Union and the United States made a factitious attempt to reach agreement on U.N. action in the Middle East situation but there was nothing to indicate they had succeeded, informants reported today.

The emergency session of the General Assembly was scheduled to round up its current round of Middle East debate today with a resolution sending the unresolved problem of Arab-Israeli peace back to the Security Council.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko met with U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg late Wednesday at the Soviet Union mission and they discussed the problem at length. Informants said Gromyko initiated the meeting.

The cease-fire lines around the Arab territories conquered by Israel were quiet Wednesday. But statements and reports from all sides underlined the lack of progress toward a permanent settlement and the lack of prospects that the council can resolve the issues between Israel and the Arabs.

Israel's ambassador to the U.N., Eldor Agranat, wrote the presidents of the council and the assembly that his country could not be expected to withdraw from the occupied territories "without any simultaneous and parallel action by the Arab states to establish a situation of peace with Israel."

Gen. Moshe Dayan, Israel's defense minister, said in a radio address that Israel has the force "to hold to Arab territory occupied by her for quite a long time."

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Sen. Church To Have Busy Schedule

WASHINGTON (Special) — Sen. Frank Church will arrive in Magic Valley Friday morning to attend dedication ceremonies for the Cedar Creek Irrigation Canal near Teton, Idaho, and then address a banquet meeting of the Idaho Press Association in Burley that evening.

Sen. Church will conduct a tour of his region with constituents where he meets with residents of Minidoka County throughout the day in the Rupert Courthouse. He will hear the views and problems of Minidoka residents from 9:30 a.m. until noon and again from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. the same day.

It will be a crowded weekend for the Idaho senator as he goes to Pocatello Saturday evening for a Pioneer Days event and then returns to Rupert for a farmers' picnic on Sunday. Monday the senator flies to St. Anthony where he will take part in a Pioneer Days event.

Dedication ceremonies for the Cedar Creek project will be held Friday afternoon at the Lawrence Hill High School. Church will have a tour of the project that morning. The evening banquet address to the Idaho Publisher's Association will be given at the Ponderosa Inn, Burley.

Lightning Kills Shepherd

FEATHERVILLE, Idaho (AP) — One shepherd has been killed by lightning and another injured in the mountains 50 miles east of Boise.

Richard Sisco, 24, Grand View, was killed Tuesday.

Negro Leader Expects Fruitful Conference

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A Negro leader predicts a revolutionary movement to develop economic, political and cultural resources for Negroes will grow out of a national black power conference opening today in this riot-stricken city.

"We are going to set forth the need for developing programs that do not bring trickle-down people to do bring power," said Dr. Nathan W. Wright Jr., conference chairman and director of urban work for the Episcopal diocese of Newark.

"It is going to cause a great deal of debate and controversy, many circles," he said in an interview. "The black power movement is a civil rights movement in an old divisive debate about its meaning and effect when it was supposed as a rallying cry for the 1966 Mississippi civil rights march."

Wright, articulating his view, said Negroes must first "set their own priorities and deal with their own problems, not only their own problems, but also the

Antiriot Bill May Be Vehicle For Civil Rights Legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) — An antiriot bill that won overwhelming House approval Wednesday night may become the vehicle for civil rights legislation when it reaches the Senate last year.

The bill, which would make it a federal crime to travel across state lines with the intent of starting a riot, has been denounced by civil rights groups as an anti-Negro measure.

"They are expected to try to get pro-civil rights amendments in offer as amendments to the riot bill at least part of the civil rights package that died in the Senate last year."

In the House, where stricter rules prevented such amendments from being offered, the bill was passed by a vote of 347 to 73.

The vote against the bill was larger than expected. Last year a similar measure was approved 350 to 25, but died in the Senate.

The bill would fix maximum penalties of five years in jail and a \$10,000 fine for anyone convicted of using interstate facilities to incite, organize, encourage or carry on a riot.

Its author, Rep. William M. Cramer, R-Fla., said it should jail such "intentioners" as black power advocate Stokely

Dissenters led by Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., said the bill at best was an ineffective gesture and at worst could be an unconstitutional infringement on free speech and assembly.

But with the recent examples of Newark and Plainfield, N.J., and other riot-torn cities fresh in its mind, the House rejected such argument.

"The man on the corner wants to know if you're for riots or against them, and I'm against them," said a member who privately doubted the vote of the bill but felt he had to vote.

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Greenwood Section Of Interstate Opens

SHOSHONE — The Idaho Department of Highways announces the opening of another section of Interstate freeway in Magic Valley, according to D. H. E. Sessions, district engineer here.

Effective Friday, the section between Greenwood and the Jerome-Madison County line will be opened to traffic. This opening will connect and make operational approximately 7 1/2 miles of continuous freeway from Jerome east to Elk River.

This 7 1/2-mile freeway represents a substantial expenditure of highway user revenue, Mr. Sessions said. The construction of the total facility was completed since 1958.

During the time 25 contracts for various work was awarded. These included grading, major structures, base and surfacing, signing and illumination and seeding.

Contracts for roadside rest areas have been and are now in progress along the Interstate route. These contracts over the years have totaled nearly \$25,000,000 for an average annual expenditure in Magic Valley of \$2,861,000.

With this significant highway

investment, it is the department's wish that everyone throughout the area will benefit and enjoy traveling the freeway.

"The Department wishes to extend its thanks to the public for the patience and cooperation received during the construction of this Interstate highway," he said.

While the wall structure on the east end of the building is being put in place, other crews are pouring the last of the building floor on the west end.

Nearly all building materials have been purchased or contracted for, Commission Chairman Lester Longhouser reported. Commissioners hope to have the building ready for occupancy by early fall.

Contractors who brought suit in district court against the county commissioners because they are building the annex without benefit of a general contractor, have now appealed the district court decision which favored the county. The Supreme Court denied a petition by the contractors for an injunction to stop work on the building pending a ruling on the appeal.

Some of the labor involved in the brick and building block work is being handled by county prisoners under supervision of officers.

Traffic Light Operating At High School

A new traffic light went into operation at 8 a.m. Thursday at Elmer Avenue and Locust Street. City officials say it may take several days for motorists and pedestrians to adjust their traffic habits.

The light, representing the latest in modern traffic design, operates with ultra-sonic traffic detection equipment. As vehicles approach the intersection, they will be picked up by radar beams and the light change mechanism put into operation.

Unless there is traffic on Locust Street, the light is set to operate for a steady flow of traffic on Elmer Avenue.

As traffic approaches on Locust Street the light will change, but will not remain green for Locust Street vehicles more than 15 seconds before a break for Elmer Avenue traffic.

Designed to help improve conditions around the high school, the light also will be used in the downtown area.

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New Secretary Of Navy Among Dead In Plane Collision

HENDERSONVILLE, N.C. (AP) — The newly named secretary of the Navy, business executives, their wives and at least 10 children were among 82 persons killed in the flaming collision of a big jet airliner and a small private plane.

A spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration said the small twin-engine private plane "was about 12 miles south of Hendersonville, N.C., when it crashed Wednesday over western North Carolina mountains.

Wreckage and bodies showed the smaller craft swept over a wide stretch of the resort area near the city of Hendersonville in the Blue Ridge foothills.

The main part of the airliner missed a crowded youth camp by only 50 yards.

No one on either plane survived.

The smaller craft was out of the mountain haze and ripped a huge gash in the airliner's side. The smaller plane blew up, a mass of welded to the fuselage of the bigger craft.

The collision occurred at 12:01 p.m., just three minutes after the Piedmont Airlines 727,

carrying 74 passengers and a crew of five, took off from the Asheville airport en route from Atlanta to Washington.

The smaller plane, a Cessna 310 heading for Asheville, carried two Missouri businessmen and his pilot.

John F. McNaughton, 46, who was scheduled to become secretary of the Navy in about two weeks; his wife, Sarah, and their 11-year-old son, Theodore, were aboard the airliner. Theodore had been attending a summer camp, and his parents had come to take him back to Washington.

McNaughton Is Praised By Johnson

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson cited "the rare breadth of his abilities" and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara talked of "his courage, integrity and his devotion to this country."

Those were among the added tributes to John F. McNaughton, 46, newly appointed secretary of the Navy, following his death Wednesday in a plane crash in North Carolina.

But in the small Indiana town where McNaughton was born, a lifelong friend sounded a more personal note.

"He was a smart, clean, alert and moral," said Allen Jones of Hickel, a town of about 4,000 population in southwest Indiana.

"Perhaps I can tell you what he was not," added Jones. "He was not a climber. He always said he was from Hickel—even though he left here when he was 7 or 8."

McNaughton, whose wife Sarah and 11-year-old son Theodore also died—along with 70 others in the crash of a Piedmont Airlines commercial flight and a small private plane near Hendersonville, N.C.—had been nominated by Johnson to succeed Paul H. Nitze as Navy secretary.

The nomination already had won Senate confirmation. McNaughton would have stepped into the post Aug. 1.

It would have been the highest government job yet attained by a man whose career was widely varied and highly successful.

Minneapolis Sees Racial Violence

Violence broke out on the predominantly Negro North Side of Minneapolis, Minn., early today as riotous persons were injured and some arrests were made.

Firemen battling several fires were pelted with bricks and rocks as riot police, some armed with automatic rifles, moved in to stop the violence. Authorities said apparently some of the fires were set.

Meanwhile, racial situations in Erie, Pa., and Cairo, Ill., were quiet today under the terms of truces agreed to by leaders of Negroes seeking better economic and social standards.

Mayor Louis J. Tullio of Erie, third largest city in Pennsylvania, promised more jobs and recreational facilities in gaining the truce.

There was one shooting Wednesday night in Erie but it could not be determined immediately whether there was any racial connection.

Henry Williams, 23, a Negro, was shot following an argument at a restaurant, police said. He died in a hospital early today.

A temporary truce was being observed in Cairo, Ill., by young Negroes who live in a housing project where snipers' activities and firebombing have broken out twice recently.

Demands for economic and social reform were being prepared for Mayor Leo Stenzel and city commissioners by representatives of the young Negroes.

In Durham, N.C., Wednesday night, a rock-throwing, window-breaking melee climaxed a three-day march by some 150 Negroes and a few whites. The marchers met at a church in a Negro section to organize a committee to speak for the neighborhood in requesting improvements by the city.

Just what touched off the disturbance was not learned.

In other trouble spots, state police and National Guardsmen searched house by house for weapons in a Plainfield, N.J., Negro neighborhood; seven victims of bloody riots in Newark, N.J., were buried on the eve of a national black power conference.

New Shoring Is Erected At Reservoir

New shoring was being erected at the Twin Falls city water reservoir project on Falls Avenue and Harrison Street Thursday as work resumed on the construction of the five-million gallon structure.

The new shoring will be erected for construction of the wall sections of the circular reservoir. Work on the dome portion of the structure is being held up pending selection of a structural engineer to study shoring structures and other factors of the accident-ridden project.

Two serious accidents have occurred in which one death and several injuries have resulted. Consulting engineers who studied the project and conducted tests earlier in the week said the failure was in the shoring gully structure. It is believed further dome work until this is corrected.

A claim for \$100,000 was filed Wednesday by the city of Twin Falls in connection with the 22nd death of Herbert Thomas, 58, Twin Falls. He was killed in an accident at the reservoir in which a 100-foot section of wall collapsed.

The claim asks the payment of \$100,000 in damages for the loss of Mr. Thomas' life and was filed on behalf of his widow and other survivors.

In the action had been taken on the claim pending an official meeting of the city commission.

Destiny Of Higher Education Discussed



The destiny of higher education was discussed Wednesday by two college presidents as they met in Twin Falls for an informal meeting.

Dr. John Barnes, new president of Boise College, and Dr. James L. Taylor, president of the College of Southern Idaho, agreed that there is an urgent need for coordination of both private and public institutions in the state.

"They said one vital need for this coordination was to meet student needs without placing undue burden on taxpayers.

The impact on other schools brought about by Boise College's change to a four-year, degree granting institution, also came under discussion.

Dr. Taylor said that "a major change undoubtedly will have an effect on the four-year colleges in the state because of the strategic population center in which Boise College is located."

He said, too, that Boise College has a philosophy of emphasis on upper division and graduate work studies. CSI could become leader in the lower division schools in this area, as far as vocational-technical training and terminal programs are concerned.

The two presidents made a visit to the CSI site and the vocational-technical facilities here. Dr. Barnes registered his envy over the large college library and noted that Boise College is having size and location problems as it continues its expansion.

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Gallup People Feel Polling Is Accurate

NEW YORK (NEA) — There are 1,500 folks in the nation who next week may be asked to take a course of battle in Vietnam, who next month may influence legislation on homosexuality, who next year may elect the hopes of an entire political party.

Not congressmen or generals, but just folks.

One may be a night shift waitress in Fargo, N. D., or a Negro bootblack in Sacramento, Calif., and a third the town drunk in Green Bay, Wis.

In all, they are the Gallup Poll, adult American civilians 21 years and over who, for 32 years, have acted as the collective conscience of the land... and whose prolific pronouncements have altered more strategic decisions than any of them know.

A few weeks ago, as example, Gallup's 1,500 left President Johnson had handed the Middle East war and the Vietnam war a conference well enough to rate eight additional percentage points of national public support. Immediately after the Democratic convention endorsed the more popular F.B.J. as their 1968 Presidential choice.

Coincidence or not? You can get arguments either way.

The important thing is that there is room for argument, at least that there is even the slightest possibility that 1,500 people can influence anything as major. That, therefore, some may only believe 1,500 people can speak for all America.

One man, George Gallup, obviously believes they can. Now 66 and still daily active in his Institute for Public Opinion, Gallup insists that a few "carefully selected" individuals can act as accurate spokesmen for the nation as a whole.

The trick, he explains, is "careful" selection.

Here's how his system works: The Gallup survey called a "modified probability sample" slices the nation into four major and eight minor geographical areas. Cities in these regions are bracketed as to population. In each of the 300 "sample points" are chosen at random. Part-time field employees are hired in the sample areas. According to Gallup, the employees have no freedom of choice but receive "all orders from their home office — when to survey, what to survey, whom to survey, how to survey."

On a given assignment, each survey interview is five people. "The people are selected according to eight demographic categories, including race, sex, age, education, occupation, etc.," Gallup says, "care is taken to include people from all walks of life... even the town drunk."

Certain types, however, are excluded from the polling, including prisoners, hospitals, hotels, religious and educational institutions are not questioned. Neither are people under 21.

Field employees are provided routes and, for each assignment, are instructed exactly where to begin ("corner of Elm and Jefferson"). They are also obliged to obtain specific subject patterns — all men say, or three men and two women.

Each interview is then held in the home.

Participants are asked several questions. If one household refuses to respond, the interviewer continues on his predetermined search until he has his quota of five co-operating residents. The interviews usually take approximately a half hour.

Gallup assignments are normally completed in two days. Results are tabulated at the home office and distributed to nearly 120 newspapers by mail. Speed is critical because breaking news can often dramatically color public opinion.

And that's it.

Does it work? Is it valid? Gallup officials have no doubt. Says a spokesman: "When we total up the race, religion and other background data of our participants, we find that it very closely approximates the national census statistics."

"That is, if the census has determined the nation is 66 per cent Protestant, we find that 66 per cent of our participants are usually Protestant. I think this indicates that we are sampling a remarkably accurate cross-section of the population."

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexican authorities say they have squelched a \$1,600-a-month plot financed by Red China to overthrow the government and set up a Communist regime.

Acting Atty. Gen. Julio Sanchez Vargas announced the arrest of 13 men who were alleged to be part of the conspiracy apparently was safe in China.

Eleven Mexicans, and two reputed guerrilla experts, Venezuelan and Salvadoran, faced a court appearance today to answer charges of planning a campaign of sabotage, terrorism and insurrection in cities and across the Mexican countryside.

The government named former Mexican Communist party leader Javier Fuentes Gutierrez as one of the chief plotters but said he had flown to Chile in June 30, after a forged passport and an assumed name, in company with another leftist leader, Federico Emery Vaino.

Sanchez Vargas told a news conference the group planned to establish a guerrilla school at an isolated jungle spot in Chiapas state in southeast Mexico.

He said Peking was using the Mexican branch of the official New China News Agency in channel \$1,680 a month into the conspiracy, Mexico does not maintain diplomatic relations with Red China.

After training, Sanchez Vargas said, the guerrillas were to join others in the Sierra Madre Mountains.

Sanchez Vargas said those arrested included Daniel Canino Gonzalez, a veteran guerrilla leader from Venezuela, and Silvio Enrique Muroso Martinez of El Salvador, who was said to have led guerrilla operations in Nicaragua.

He said the group was behind the dynamiting July 3 of an army personnel carrier in rural Guerrero state. The attack apparently an effort to steal arms, fuel, and soldiers riding in the vehicle escaped uninjured.

Loyalty Of Nominee Is Questioned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The militantly conservative Liberty Lobby charged in a congressional hearing that Supreme Court nominee Thurgood Marshall associated with two "groups of questionable loyalty."

"We're not challenging his loyalty but his lack of judgment," general counsel Michael D. Jaffe of the conservative organization said of Marshall, the U.S. solicitor general who is bidding to become the first Negro Supreme Court justice.

Jaffe told the Senate Judiciary Committee, probing Marshall's qualifications in a four-day hearing Wednesday, that the nominee had belonged to the National Lawyers Guild and International Juridical Association — both labeled subversive in House Committee on Un-American Activities reports.

Marshall, who earlier completed testifying, was not offered an immediate chance to respond.

Committee Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., said the hearings would continue at an unspecified date.

Marshall's confirmation by the Senate — which in past years approved his nominations to the federal judiciary and solicitor general — is considered certain. President Johnson nominated Marshall to fill the Supreme Court seat vacated by Tom C. Clark's retirement.

Scientists Taking Reins On Weather

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson sent Congress a report Wednesday that scientists are starting to have some success in controlling the weather.

The annual report from the National Science Foundation says that by seeding certain types of clouds with dry ice or silver iodide, weather researchers have been able to increase rainfall as much as 10 per cent.

Heavy seeding may reduce hail storms, "disperse" large masses of cold ground fog, and — in one series of experiments — reduce the number of lightning bolts sparked during storms. The report said.

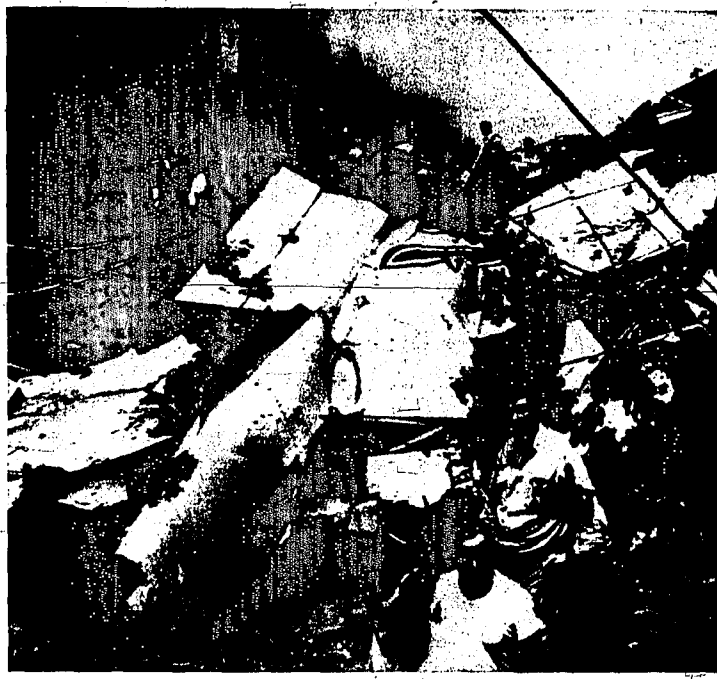

Fashion Sends U.S. On Wastepaper Binge

NEW YORK (AP) — The fun is in the bag — the paper bag — this summer.
 Paper bikinis, paper surf jackets, paper bras, paper culottes, paper sandals, paper wedding veils and paper garter flannel suits. Temporary fashion has sent the nation on a wastepaper binge.
 "Paper is now," said Melvin E. Davy, president of Lord & Taylor, the New York-based department store chain.
 "Only time will tell if it will be lasting."
 If designing keeps good, it will be lasting.

"The whole area has begun to expand like crazy," said a spokesman for Kimberly-Stevens Corp., a major supplier of paper-collared, paper-cuffed, 7 per cent cellulose and 7 per cent nylon.
 The Americans spent \$3.5 million on paper clothes last year while the first paper togery was introduced. This summer the paper paper is bigger than ever. Designers are more elaborate, prints are colorful.
 By 1970, paper will account for 25 per cent of the apparel business, predicts Oliver James Siffing, 30, a former Texas oilman.
 Sterling set up shop just this past year and now has six plants turning out 15,000 to 20,000 items a day. Items like cow-printed, calf-print, raffia-skirted mini-dresses, pant suits, evening culottes and tortoise-shell-strapped, evening dresses — all made from paper.
 His newest item is a double-breasted suit for men, to sell for about \$12. "It looks like gray flannel," he says. "It should be great for businessmen and conventions."
 It began almost inadvertently last year when Scott Paper Co. offered a paper A-line dress for \$1 to promote its colored tissues. It was swamped with orders for 500,000 dresses.
 Since then department stores across the country have opened paper boutiques and dozens of designers and manufacturers have jumped in. Paper prints now are sold by the dozen.
 There are matching bedspreads and curtains, chests of drawers in dazzling prints, whitened, mirrored chairs and a 7-foot daisy \$10 — all made from paper — at Peapack Place, the shop the Brooklyn department store Abraham & Straus opened this spring.

 That's the word from congressional sources, who indicated that the hike would be in the form of a 1/2 per cent increase. Estimates of hikes in such costs were off better than 100 per cent.
 The committee originally believed President Johnson's plan to extend Medicare to the disabled as well as aged could be financed by tapping the taxable base of an individual's income from \$6,600 to \$7,800.
 But sources said the panel has found that hospital charges are expected to jump about 7 per cent a year, instead are climbing at a 15 per cent rate.
 Sources said the panel formally has decided on a Social Security tax boost equivalent of four-tenths of one per cent on the tax base of \$7,800, half paid by employer, half by the employee.

So the biologists suggest "We have an interesting crash program of artificial insemination that will guarantee quality raptures for all deer, triplets for you and twins for me. We'll need a couple of extra days work on the ardkwags. In the meantime, Mr. Politician, would you loan us a long rope and treat our old field men how to lasso?"

"Don't be facetious," the politician retorts. "It's happened every year since Idaho can tell you that they are killing a lot of elk in Washington every year. I see no reason why we should be any less successful in this matter." After all, we lived off these people when they were beating the sales tax in their states.

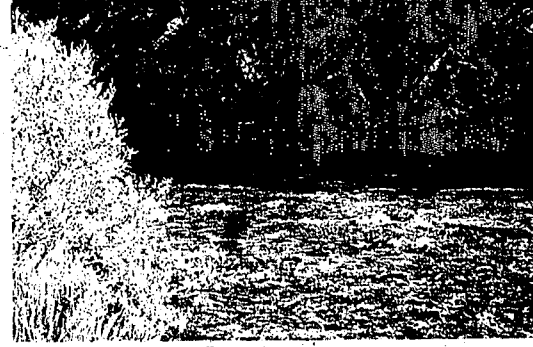

Fishermen's Telegraph Beats Out Results As Area Anglers Try For Chinooks In Salmon River Basin

STANLEY — Galleries formed as the rod and reel telegraph beats out the messages of fish salmon spots throughout the Stanley Basin area. It's the time of the year that everyone wants to go to the mountains and, fishermen or not, hope to see some one pull in a big one.

The scenes are reenacted daily but on Sunday the telegraph possesses nearly instant communication and the campers, sightseers and fishermen hunt the action on foot and in automobiles.

So accessible is the entire Stanley Basin to automobiles and so fluid and mobile the weekend population that a salmon can't be caught without some 25 miles away knowing all about the size, length of light and kind of bait within an hour.

Wood hooked a good-sized one—about 20 pounds—in the Salmon River just above the steel bridge near Redfish Lake turn-off. That makes it ideal for the telegraph. Crows formed as cars breezed along U. S. 93 spotted the action and joined in the viewing.

The big salmon broke water once, lifting itself perhaps three feet out of the water, but after that sank in the depths while the gallery was hoping for new excitement. As generally happens, the fish finally wrapped the line around a rock and just as quickly broke it. The gallery melted away.

Up Valley Creek, beyond Stanley, it didn't make any difference who you talked to. Everyone knew that Saturday evening four Chinook and one smaller buck were taken out of a hole immediately below some bluffs. Anglers perched on the rocks intently above the hole and waited for something to catch the line. Most of the fish, it

 "I want to bring to him at the Vatican some pan-Orthodox thought, opinion and desires," the patriarch said. "Our unity will come and the Pope's visit here will do much to hasten that day."
 The Pope, who first met with Athenagoras on a visit to the Holy Land in January 1964, is arriving in Istanbul Tuesday for a two-day visit.
 The patriarch has a color picture of their Holy Land meeting in his small, sparsely furnished studio in the city's Leuner district of the Golden Horn. It shows them arm in arm just after they embraced. That was the first such meeting of the church leaders since the schism between Catholicism and Orthodoxy in 1054.
 The future of Jerusalem, as well as ways to lead the world's 150 million Orthodox and 500 million Roman Catholics toward reunion will be the topics Pope Paul and the patriarch discuss. 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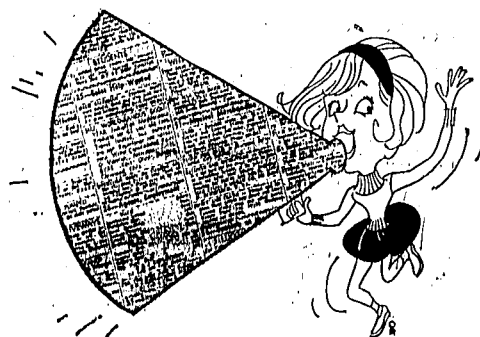

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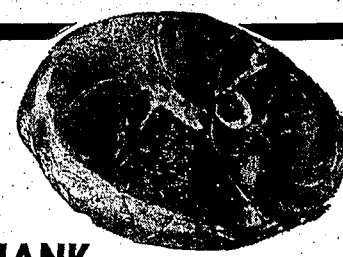

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Mexican government in an official statement Wednesday reported it has nipped a plot financed from Red China with the aim of setting up a "populist Socialist" regime in Mexico. The Mexican attorney general's office said a Venezuelan and a Canadian were arrested 13 persons arrested in the case. According to the official statement, the group was preparing to march into Mexico City from Mexico City and the provinces and had already blasted with dynamite an army truck on a rural road in the state of Queretaro seeking to procure arms. Tour Of Interesting Sites Near Hailey Discussed By T.F. Historical Group

Oddities and places of interest near Hailey were discussed Wednesday by members of the Hailey overnight tour sponsored by the Twin Falls Historical Society last weekend.

The trip, which was narrated by Joe Fuld and Gib Fleming, who have lived in the area all of their lives, began at the Blaine County Museum in Hailey. Many of the exhibits there were more than 100 years old. Tour members learned that Hailey was built in 1881 and the railroad from Shoshone was constructed in 1883.

The tour next visited the old townsite of Bullion which was located on the fringe of the "Gold Belt" in 1883, when between 20 and 30 mines were operating in the area. A group of these mines was located up Bullion-patch, some five miles west of Hailey. Mary Wilson, who was born at Bullion, is still living at Hailey.

Today, the Excelsior mine a few miles from Bullion and the Silver Star Queen Inc. at Broadford are being operated by Federal Resources, Inc. The Silver Star Queen Inc. was originally the "Minnie Moore."

A mansion still stands a short distance south of Bellevue which was owned by the son of a man who purchased one-half interest in the mine and married the daughter of the woman who ran a boarding house. It was furnished with choice furniture from foreign countries the couple had visited.

Only one man, Sam Stilt of Bellevue, is still alive who worked as a miner in the Minnie Moore mine at Broadford in the 1880's.

A visit to the coke-ovens at Muldoon revealed only one of the original 23 fringes. Pioneer Billie Dievel lived in one of the coke ovens in the 1900's. The ovens kept 700 men busy cutting logs to keep the 23 fringes. The Muldoon Mining District was opened in 1879 and employed 1,400 men.

Court Rules On Dispute

BOISE (AP) — A dispute between two Boise beer parlors over rights of franchise reached its culmination in the Idaho Supreme Court today.

The court reversed a decision of Fourth District Court in Boise which declared unenforceable any agreements made between the two upon ending a franchise contract.

Shakey's Inc., had terminated the franchise to the operators of the Rathaus Pizza Shoppe with the agreement that the latter would not engage in the sale of pizza products within 30 miles

of Boise for a period of one year. The lower court held that such a covenant was penal, in restraint of trade, and hence, unenforceable.

In reversing the decision, the Supreme Court contended that Shakey's Inc. has a legitimate business interest in the sale of its franchise and goodwill and thus the covenant was enforceable as long as it was limited in duration and territorial extent.

In a separate case, the court ruled that a Second District Court decision to dismiss a damage suit in the Lewiston area

Bank Robbed

SPOKANE (AP) — A lone gunman held up the Northwest Drive-In Branch of the Washington Trust Bank and fled with an apparently small amount of money Wednesday afternoon, police reported.

The stocky bandit, wearing sunglasses and a straw hat, walked into the bank about 1:45 p.m., brandished what appeared to be a .45 automatic pistol, and told teller Mrs. Doralyn Minkler, "Give me your money and be quick about it."

A stolen car, believed to have been used in the robbery, was recovered a few minutes later about 21 blocks from the bank.

Bank officials said the bandit got only the money in the teller's cash drawer, and the amount was small because to avoid large risks, only small amounts were kept there.

The bandit was described as about 35 to 40 years old, about 5 feet 6 inches and weighing 165 to 170 pounds.

Decision Upheld

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court upheld a decision today by the Idaho Industrial Accident Board, which awarded disability compensation to a man injured in connection with his job.

The court unanimously affirmed a board order awarding Raymond T. Gentry of Orofino full indemnity for loss of an eye when he was hit by a tree limb while working in a forest near Orofino.

The appealing insurance company and employer argued that Gentry should have been awarded limited recovery because his eye had been blind prior to the accident.

The high court, however, found that an indemnity provision of the workmen's compensation statute supported the board's award.
