## Black Power Meet Sets Radical Resolutions

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Black Power, for one year an unclear rallying cry shouted at civil rights rallies and scrawled on many in Africa-derived clothes, meaning distinctly opposed to present American society.

The first national conference on the once cloudy concept produced a string of resolutions Sunday that would, in effect, set up a black-oriented society distinctly anti-white, anti-Christian and anti-race in tone.

With almost every fraction of the Negro community represented at the start of the four-day meeting, it was clear at the final session Sunday that the militant separatists had won.

One enthusiastically approved resolution called for "starting a national dialogue on the desirability of partitioning

the United States into two separate nations, one white and one black."

The nearly 1,000 delegates, many in Africa-derived clothes, cheered every proposal for black-oriented financial, educational, employment and law enforcement institutions, including paramilitary training for black youth.

Some termed it the start of "the black revolution."

A deep distrust of white society was evident as the delegates

cheered through proposals to set up permanent contacts with African nations, independent black-controlled political parties or voting blocs, and gear the products of Negro artists and professionals more closely to "the needs of black people."

Speakers who used the word "Negro" were shouted down.

"The Negro is a white man's creation," one man shouted.

Most of the dozens of resolutions put great stress on the troubled history of Negroes—the

unwilling removal in chains from Africa, the systematic breaking up of Negro families by white slaveowners, the segregation that once sanctioned wholesale lynchings and still exists in schools, housing and jobs.

They included:

- A demand that black athletes stay out of both the 1968 Olympic games in Mexico City and out of professional boxing until "Minister Muhammad Ali" —Cassius Clay—is returned his heavyweight title.
- A demand that "every black church and all religious institutions that do not join the black revolution." Christianity was termed "a white religion that has taken the diamonds and minerals of the world in exchange for the Bible—a bad deal."
- A "black militia to train black-families in all aspects of self-defense and racial survival" and a school for black political organizers.
- A "black university," a "black national holiday," a refusal to accept birth control programs and a national anti-drug movement. "Our position is hell no, we won't go!" shouted one workshop chairman.

## Divers Still Search For Man's Body

# Troops Ordered To End Detroit Riots

President Johnson ordered federal troops flown to the Detroit area today as uncontrolled riots in that city left five dead, nearly 1,000 injured and property damage of over \$100 million.

The troops, requested by Gov. George Romney of Michigan, were being flown to Selfridge Air Force Base, about 30 miles from Detroit. Additional orders from Johnson will be required to move them into the city.

The President also sent Cyrus Vance, former deputy secretary of defense, to Detroit to assess the situation and say what federal help was needed.

Only two of the dead in more than 24 hours of rioting were

Negroes, a loner shot by a Negro supermarket guard and an elderly man found burned to death in an alley.

Fires set Sunday raged unchecked in many sections as rioting coursed crazily through an ill-defined area covering more than one-sixth of this city, the nation's fifth largest.

There was no immediate response from federal officials to Romney's plea for at least 5,000 troops.

An aide declined to comment on a report that Romney must first declare a state of insurrection.

However, Art. Gen. Ramsey, Clark's car showed up at the

White House at midmorning, prompting speculation that some sort of federal action might soon be forthcoming. Clark is known to have received regular reports on the situation in Detroit during the night.

The governor retired to his home in suburban Bloomfield Hills for a nap, after touring the city with Mayor Jerome Cavanaugh and writing his plan for help to President Johnson and the attorney general.

Romney said experience had shown that the second night of rioting rises is "usually worse than the first."

"Without help, the situation could become 'uncontrollable,' he told newsmen.

Most recent riots, like those in Newark, Harlem, Rochester, N.Y., and the Watts section of Los Angeles were confined to Negro ghetto areas.

"There are no such places in Detroit although there are predominantly Negro sections. However, few of these are slums, including areas of the innermost rioting.

## Puerto Ricans Spread Violence In Harlem Area

NEW YORK (AP) — Puerto Ricans spilling from crowded tenements spread violence through Spanish Harlem again early today, bottle-bombing police from streets and rooftops and looting stores from windows of high-rise white neighborhoods to Negro Harlem.

More than 1,000 helmeted officers struggled for a second day in that city, to the Spanish-speaking area, cajoling crowds and moving them with their nightsticks at first, while

This morning when the area was quiet again, Mayor John Lindsay drove through and found conditions "virtually normal."

On the 30-minute tour, Lindsay saw some 40 broken store windows but most shopkeepers opened their stores as usual.

The renewed violence in "El Barrio," Spanish for "The Neighborhood" came late Sunday night as Puerto Rican leaders discussed with Police Commissioner Howard R. Leary a similar five-hour outbreak Saturday. Lindsay had worked out a shut-lived truce with community spokesmen after the first night's trouble.

But Puerto Ricans charged the city had gone back on its word by sending the riot-trained Tactical Patrol Force into the area again Sunday. The special elite corps consisted of six-footers specially trained for such disturbances. They were rushed back to the scene when the first bottles began to fly shortly after 11 p.m. Sunday.

As the disturbance worsened, bars were ordered closed and all of Manhattan's patrolmen held over for extended duty. An entire workforce—about 500 men—from the Bronx were brought into the area, and police in the city's three other boroughs were frozen on duty for a while.

Then officers fired a volley of about 15 shots at a suspected sniper atop a building, and cleared street corners with their nightsticks.

A police official reported that the block on Third Avenue between 10th and 18th Streets, usually brooding with Latin music, was "destroyed" and that "the only thing we can do is keep the policemen and one fireman here injured."

The disturbance did not cross into the East Side or central Harlem with its enormous Negro population, the scene of a riot during 1964.

Three policemen and one fireman were injured.

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## Drains Being Installed To Curb Floods

Work is nearing completion on the construction of three cross drains and one valley gutter designed to eliminate flooded intersections in two different parts of the city.

Ron Scheufele, city engineer, said the cross drains are located on S. Washington Street at the intersections of Fourth Avenue and South, Fifth Avenue South and Sixth Avenue West.

The valley gutter is being built at the intersection of Heyburn Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard North.

All are designed to carry water from one side of the street to the other and distribute it over a wider area with a minimum of flooding problems and traffic disturbance.

On June 20 the city awarded a contract to the Ben Walton Construction Co. for as low bid of \$38,774.50 for the four structures. The bid was \$38,774.50.

"The cross drains, Mr. Scheufele explained, are constructed under the street and carry the water across the intersection by underground passageway into the valley gutter. The gutter is a rough deep water during heavy rainstorms.

The intersections where construction is underway this year are just part of the many where flooding occurs during storms. With no storm sewer system in the city, the engineers said, it is difficult to handle the water other than to distribute it over as wide an area as possible.

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WORKERS OF THE Ben Walton Construction Co. put finishing touches on the middle portion of a valley gutter and cross drains being installed by the city and contractor to improve the handling of water which collects at strategic intersections following heavy rains and melting snow.

## Nasser's Budget Asks Sacrifices

CAIRO (AP) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser's new budget being published today calls for sacrifices to enable war-crippled Egypt to struggle against Israel, but Nasser says the door is still open for a political settlement.

In a broadcast speech Sunday night, Nasser said he had "no objection to conferring with the Americans" on restoring peace to the Middle East and had instructed Egypt's United Nations delegation "to meet with the Americans if feasible."

Nasser's speech, his first in six weeks, was considered surprisingly restrained in tone although there were plentiful references to the United States. The Egyptian leader again blamed it for the Israeli victory in the June 5-10 war but revised his charges.

Nasser dropped his claim during the war that the U.S. planes attacked the Arabs. Instead, he said President Johnson engaged in deceptive diplomatic maneuvering.

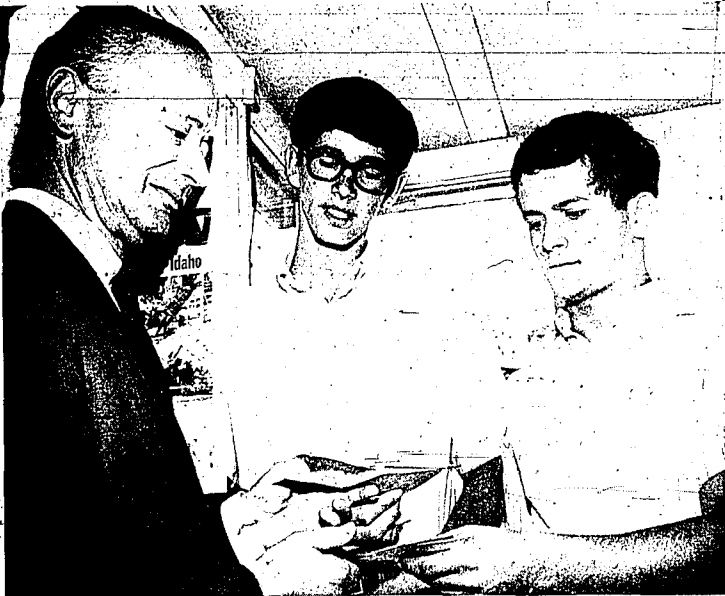

WASHINGTON — There is little doubt that the United States will be forced to build a "thin" anti-ballistic missile system, and as soon as possible.
The question of whether the Soviet Union might agree to expand its ABM system at all is already a moot point. In American self-interest, the only pertinent fact is that Communist China has developed a hydrogen bomb. This may further delay in building our own ABM system is filled with disaster.

China's latest nuclear bomb is said to be heavy to be fired by a missile. It probably weighs four tons. But the Chinese are working feverishly to reduce its size and weight for their next test, probably at the end of this year, almost certainly will result in a bomb that can be carried as a rocket warhead. Shortly thereafter, the Chinese will have the capacity to send a hydrogen bomb 400 to 500 miles into the Soviet Union by means of short-range rockets whose model was successfully tested last October.

A current Pentagon estimate is that it will be 1972-75 before China will have enough H-bombs and intercontinental missiles to pose a threat to the United States. But the same experts were wrong in their guesses on when China would test its first H-bomb — three to four years wrong. Some people are now saying that unless political turmoil fouls up the schedule, the Chinese could have an ICBM by 1970.
In other words, in from two to eight years, China will be able to reach large areas of

the United States with missile-armed H-bombs.
Even if the 1975 estimate is accepted, which would be criminally casual, it is still later than anyone wants to hear. Defense Secretary McNamara has said that a "thin" ABM defense could be built for about \$3.3 billion. However, most Pentagon experts agree the job would take several years. Therefore, should the Chinese develop a hydrogen bomb by the year 1970, the U. S. would still have a big, perhaps fatal, hole in its defenses.
In the meantime, not only the Soviet Union but Japan, India and all of China's Asian neighbors would be in a hurry to develop their own nuclear arsenals. Indeed, some observers suggest that China now has a stockpile of perhaps 50 smaller atomic bombs and short-range rockets for their delivery, the hour of truth already has arrived for its neighbors.

China's new nuclear power is of grave concern elsewhere. Mao Tse-tung's loud-mouthed propagandists already have declared that a portion of Russia's "betrayal" of its Middle East allies, Peking now stands ready to provide the Arab world with nuclear weapons. Arab nations are needed to defend itself against the "imperialists."
Not now, but in a later year, this could mean that China would take a portion of its nuclear arsenal to Nasser's Egypt. Peking is thirsting to replace Russia as the major communist influence in the Middle East, and by merely furnishing nuclear weapons to the Arabs it could make a practical gesture of friendship while staying out of any conflict that resulted. And, of course, Castro's Cuba is another possible beneficiary of China's nuclear generosity.

Is Secrecy Dead?

For probably as long as there has been a government bureaucrat, the issue of government secrecy versus the people's right to know has existed. As government bodies multiplied and expanded, the right to public information became more elusive.

Both the executive and legislative branches of the federal government today are guilty of conducting a large part of the public business behind closed doors.

Over the years various committees of Congress have investigated secrecy in government, with little success until last year. At that time, spearheaded by Rep. John E. Moss of California and Sen. Edward Long of Missouri, Congress passed a "Freedom of Information" law, which became effective July 4, 1967.

There are nine exceptions listed in the law, such as income tax returns, military secrets and raw investigation files. Everything else is supposed to be made public, either voluntarily or upon request.

Although the law is the most definitive thus far in determining what may or may not be withheld from

the public, there are still areas which permit "room for more than one interpretation," according to Attorney General Ramsey Clark.

This time, however, the burden of proof is on the government. The statute in the law provides that any citizen denied information by a government official may go to court to seek the data requested, and the burden of proof is on the government to show why the request should be denied.

As the attorney general said in a memo to all agencies, the new law imposes on the executive branch an "affirmative obligation to adopt new standards and practices." But the suspicion exists that it will require more than these words from the Justice Department, or the mere enactment of the law, to change the attitude of buck-passing and cover-up which have become ingrained in the minds of many public officials.

Only by frequent testing of the law in the courts, and winning, can the average Joe Blow be sure his government is making public everything he is entitled to know as a measure of his birthright.

How Long And To What End?

WASHINGTON (NEA) — At higher troop levels and with heavier and more costly fighting, the Vietnam war plainly is going to go on and on. The still unanswerable question is: How long and to what end? It is the ugliest, most complex, most difficult war in this country's history. The Viet Cong-North Vietnamese adversary is, by the expert testimony of veterans of three wars, the toughest ever faced by Americans.

Further U. S. troop commitments seem sure to be offset, at least in part, by new commitments from Hanoi. U. S. bombing of North Vietnam is reaching its practical limits.

In consequence of all this, the war is seen a long way from its critical point where the enemy concludes that there is no profit but only unacceptable loss in pursuing the war further. Only when that point is reached can there be hope of even moderately fruitful negotiations.

Around The World

The adventuresome round-the-world flight of Mrs. Ann Pellegrino not only captured the imagination of people everywhere, but it proved at least two things.

Because the pilot is a woman, it demonstrated to the satisfaction of all the allegedly gentler sex that a woman is quite as competent at the controls as a man, and the ladies are backed up by this assurance.

More important, it demonstrated the progress made in aircraft instrumentation in the last 30 years. Mrs. Pellegrino's plane was an identical twin of the one in which Amelia Earhart attempted the same flight in 1937.

But it had, the modern instruments the earlier version lacked. Mrs. Pellegrino made it. Miss Earhart did not.

Perhaps the lack of instrumentation was not the only reason Miss Earhart was lost. No one may ever know for certain. But the Michigan housewife's flight did show beyond question that the new instruments make flying immeasurably easier and safer than formerly.

Mrs. Pellegrino doesn't know as yet whether she has been able to cast any light on the disappearance of Miss Earhart. But whether she does or doesn't, her flight is nevertheless memorable.

AFRICAN CIVIL WAR

There are historical parallels to the current critical situation in Nigeria, Africa's most populous nation. The independence of Eastern Nigeria and its challenge by the federal government sets the stage for civil war as in America just over a century ago, when the area that is now Nigeria was still called by many "the Slave Coast."

A GOVERNOR WHO ISN'T MARKED

Unmarked state police cars may or may not be less effective than marked vehicles. But, regardless, the marked cars are not the violation of basic rights that some critics seem to consider them.

If the use of unmarked cars is to be questioned, it is on the ground that they are less effective than vehicles that are clearly designated. The governor believes many more motorists will comply with speeding laws if there is no way of telling whether the car behind them is a patrol car.

So the governor may be wrong, but it is being overboard to suggest, as some have, that the unmarked cars are a sneaky little ambush. The obvious effect of the result is that traffic slows to safe speeds wherever the many police cars travel.

However, there is nothing to indicate unmarked state police cars will lead to that. That means there is no one to mark the law. And the protest raised by State Auditor John Williams is not really a serious objection. Williams' proposal is that a bill require that all state cars be marked, apparently including police cars.

Eastern Nigeria, Iko Katanga, is rich in economic potential. The rapidly growing Nigerian petroleum trade draws about two-thirds of trade oil from the area.

Eastern Nigeria is threatened. If the federal government can win even nominal support of other regions in opposing the secession with force, its 14 million people represent one-quarter of the nation's population, living in less than one-tenth of its area.

The East's defiance could, however, be the trigger for the dissolution of the federation, which would leave the independent within the British Commonwealth in 1963 with such optimistic promises of progressive self-government. The people of Nigeria are divided among more than 200 tribes, some of them exercising territorial control.

Chief Obafemi Awolowo of the Western region has threatened secession. Large sections of the population in the Northern region are in conflict with the military regime of Lt. Col. Yakubu Gowon, a northerner, exercises firm control only in the territories of Lagos and Oyo.

There are 10 million non-Africans in Nigeria's population of almost 60 million. There have been about 2,000 Americans including 125 Peace Corpsmen, about 9,000 Britons and 200 Italians in the country. Nigeria, which is a member of the United Nations, has proclaimed the independent state of Biafra. About 700 American women and children were taken out by chartered planes this weekend.

The experience in The Congo should illustrate the dangers inherent in intervention by the United Nations or its members in such internal African conflicts rooted in tribal differences. In fact, the artificial de-lineation of the boundaries of Nigeria in the early 1900s should not be charged, in part, with the disastrous civil war that prevailed there since the assassination of Prime Minister Sir Abubakar Tafawa Balewa and other federal officials last year.

The governor should be permitted to test his theory. He should also consider re-establishing a full complement of routing signs on state cars to check the weight on logging trucks that have now given more freedom to loggers and hunters in the state. A few more state regulatory vehicles of that type—marked or unmarked—would serve us well. —Marion Tabor.

JAMES MARLOW Two Tart Tongues

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Dwight D. Eisenhower, when he took office, and President Johnson, who had plenty, worked out for themselves independent, simple techniques which paid off.

This, the only thing the two men may have had in common, was to call it a bluff or don't make any extra trouble if you can help it.

In private both men have been accused of using tart tongues to ward people who annoyed them. Publicly they avoided name-calling, but they were not into an enemy and need-less arguments which Johnson once described as shouting matches.

While hot arguments stir interest, they also give everybody an excuse for choosing sides with the victor and leaving the loser in the dust. If a politician can't be liked, at least he doesn't rise being disliked, which is true of Johnson.

Eisenhower had a rather placid presidency but he managed to keep dislike down so much he won the Nobel Peace Prize. Un-derstandably, Johnson got elected overwhelmingly the first time and is expected to try again in 1968.

His strong point is ability, his weak one is personality. He appeared to forget that in his first two years, if he really had a good idea, he could stay away from the television camera.

There is little doubt the ever-pressured part of his deep-rooted desire to be liked—by his unskilled gestures and over-the-top verbal excursions—will harm his ratings in the public opinion polls dribbled down into the basement.

That the cause of this was his personal number being held but did wrong as president, seems clear enough because, while he didn't think up any stirring words, he did not say anything obvious disasters, either. And, except for Vietnam and sending troops into the Dominican Republic, Johnson managed to stay clear of big controversies.

In his very successful Senate

years he was always at his best working out solutions with his colleagues. Johnson would not in his speeches on the Senate floor.

It took him a while to grasp this but he did, beginning last year, when without explanation he called a halt to his public appearances for a while and thereafter abandoned dramatics for the simple, direct approach in public.

A change occurred in his popularity. Last week the AFL-CIO said a poll of its 12.5 million members showed they greatly favored Johnson's re-election. A separate public opinion poll showed his popularity had shot up.

To some extent this could have been expected after his meeting with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin and his nimble avoidance of the missile issue in the Arab-Israeli war. Yes, in both cases Johnson avoided disasters.

There is quite different from the sudden surge in President John F. Kennedy's popularity after forcing the Soviets to back away from their missile in Cuba. This was one of the most dramatic episodes of the century.

As an example of what is meant by Johnson's return to the methods of his Senate days, with little public fireworks and a lot of hard work out of sight, he did not say anything against major allies, Johnson, instead of taking drastic action to end the war, let it drag on for settlement.

He got the leaders of both sides to agree to a ceasefire and then rushed on television to announce it proudly. Shortly afterwards the rank-and-file union members repudiated the settlement, which left embarrassed Johnson holding the bag.

This week he acted swiftly, he did not say anything against railroad strike and did it in two days. This time he stayed out of sight. What the public will remember is that Johnson did what the public wanted without going on camera to show what a great man he was.

# Puerto Ricans Vote To Back Government

 SAN JUAN, P.R. (AP) — Supporters of commonwealth government in Puerto Rico today had the vote of confidence they wanted from island voters, but their next move wasn't clear.

In a victory statement Sunday, former Gov. Luis Munoz said there were no immediate plans to request any additional powers from the U.S. Congress.

Elated, Munoz hailed the outcome as proof that Puerto Ricans support commonwealth "as the only political form that is fully adapted to the needs of Puerto Rico."

Commonwealth received 425,081 votes, 68.5 per cent of the total; statehood received 273,315 votes, or 38.9 per cent, and independence received 4,205, six-tenths of 1 per cent.

Most independence groups boycotted the plebiscite. Pre-election forecasts had said commonwealth would need at least 60 per cent for a clear-cut victory.

The victory was seen as a personal triumph for Munoz, 62, four-time governor of the island and chief architect of the commonwealth link with the United States in 1952.

Munoz came out of retirement to lead a vigorous campaign for commonwealth. He spoke in virtually every town and hamlet on the island, urging the plebiscite last year, a special advisory committee recommended naming a U.S.-Puerto Rican commission to study ways to implement the voters' mandate. It appeared that might be the next step.

## Nearly One Million U.S. Women Will Have Illegal Abortions This Year

 NEW YORK (AP) — Nearly a million American women will have illegal abortions this year, Planned Parenthood Federation of America, Inc., predicted Thursday. A thousand or more may die in the process. And it will cost them millions of dollars.

"We take four young women sitting around a bridge table. Chances are statistically, anyway—one of them probably has had an abortion," a Planned Parenthood spokesman said.

The New York City unit of Planned Parenthood asked Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller this week to appoint a commission to study the abortion problem in New York State with an estimated total of 100,000 illegal abortions a year.

"Abortion has reached epidemic proportions, constituting a major health problem and threatening the welfare of thousands of New York women," Lawrence S. Munson, union chairman, wired the governor.

Munson said that if the same statistics referred to "typical public health officials would consider it an emergency and take whatever measures were required to counteract the threat."

Estimates of the number of abortions nationally range from 300,000 up to two million a year. Planned Parenthood estimates a million and notes that only 10,000 to 20,000 are legal.

The death rate from abortion has fallen off since the 1930s, doctors agreed. But they added they cannot begin to estimate how many abortion-related deaths escaped official notice.

"The New York City unit of Planned Parenthood said more than 2,000 women die in the state every year from criminal abortions and thousands of others suffer complications."

But Dr. Christopher Tietze, medical director of the National Committee for Maternal Health, says that figure is "a gross exaggeration." He estimates

## Romania Red Chief Asks Facts Deleted

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Romania's Communist party chief, Nicolae Ceausescu made a strong plea today for abolition of the Atlantic Alliance and the Warsaw Pact, demanding withdrawal of all troops—including Soviet forces—from foreign territories.

In a major foreign policy speech before the National Assembly Ceausescu also warned Arab countries that Romania recognizes Israel's right to exist and would not support Arab attempts to destroy Israel in any new war.

"To sail his regime considered the abolition of all military bases an essential precondition to a worldwide detente."

"The withdrawal of all non-European troops from Europe and the withdrawal of all the troops from the territories of other states, the dismantling of foreign military bases and the abolition of military blocs would have a particularly positive effect," he declared.

The 2½-hour speech was devoted mostly to a reaffirmation of Romania's stand on Warsaw pact affairs and relations with the Communist countries.

Romania's membership in the alliance has become little more than formal. It has refused to follow Soviet policy on the Middle East situation and has no forces or high-ranking officers in the organization.

## Military Equipment Use Draws Concern

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Defense and State departments are concerned that military equipment is being sold to U.S. allies in being resold as surplus hardware to nations engaged in arms races.

John H. Rogers, deputy assistant secretary of defense for international affairs, told Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee his department is seeking ways to head off future arms transfer.

Jeffrey C. Kitchen, deputy assistant secretary of state for politico-military affairs, reported there will be 7,000 M1 and M48 tanks among the surplus equipment in Europe being sold.

"We are darned concerned about those tanks," he commented.

Rogers said the anticipated surplus would result from accelerated arms sales to West Germany to offset U.S. expenses in maintaining military forces in Europe.

They testified last March, April and June at a series of hearings by the subcommittee on Near Eastern and South Asian affairs studying arms sales.

A heavily censored transcript was released today.

But testimony of three principal witnesses remains classified and none of it appeared in the transcript. They are Lt. Gen. Joseph F. Carroll, director of the Defense Intelligence Agency; Lucius D. Battle, assistant secretary for Near Eastern, Eastern and South Asian affairs; and Stuart Symington, D-Mo., said in a statement accompanying the transcript that American officials had their way into countries never intended to receive them and private firms were making extraordinary profits in the resale of U.S. arms.

"Revisions in laws pertaining to this matter are urgently needed," he said.

The hearings are part of a closer congressional link at the White House of U.S. military aid to foreign nations.

Current policies have been criticized on the grounds arms supplies have contributed to world tensions.

## Reagan And Nixon Make No Deals

**SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)** — Gov. Ronald Reagan and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon say they do not intend at "the summit of Bohemia" but agreed the Republican party must nominate a candidate who can beat President Johnson next year.

That was the word from Reagan's advisers Sunday after California's governor returned to Sacramento from a weekend meeting with Nixon at the Bohemian Grove, an exclusive retreat for businessmen and the Russian River north of San Francisco.

It was the first meeting of the two since Reagan's stock as a potential candidate began rising. Nixon jokingly referred to the weekend as "the summit of Bohemia."

A spokesman for the governor said Reagan and Nixon broke through the "ice" of their relationship, but "nobody proposed any deals."

The former vice president is an undeclared candidate for the nomination. But some of his conservative support appears to be slipping away to Reagan who last year defeated Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown by almost a million votes. Nixon lost to Brown in 1962.

Reagan publicly insists he is not a serious candidate for the nomination and would like to see himself being California's favorite son at the convention. But his name is likely to be on the open presidential ballot in Oregon, Wisconsin and Nebraska next year.

Some of his advisers are convinced Nixon will later beat the GOP convention and Reagan will pick up his delegates.

## GOP Could Make Fresh Assault On Policies

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's suggestion that Congress consider declaring war on North Vietnam got a cold reception from party leaders here last week.

But his contention that the war must have priority over domestic programs seems to have solid support among members of the Republican Policy Coordinating Committee.

The coordinating group, made up of congressional leaders, governors and former presidential candidates, meets today but had no specific Vietnam items on its day-long agenda.

Sen. Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, however, forecast a policy pronouncement on defense spending likely to emphasize the threat of a huge deficit if domestic outlays are not reduced.

Sen. Jack Miller, R-Iowa, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said he agrees with Eisenhower that the war should have priority over all other government programs.

"Instead, the Johnson administration has tried to follow a 'guns and butter' fiscal policy which has caused inflation and high interest rates," Miller said.

Disagreeing, Sen. J. Sparkman, D-Ala., a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said in a separate interview he thinks the war has built priority. But he added that doesn't mean needed domestic programs should be abandoned.

"With a \$70 billion national outlay, I think we can have both guns and butter," he said.

Although Sen. Thurston B. Morton, R-Ky., and Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., thought Congress should look into the effects of a declaration of war, there was strong Republican opposition to any move to thus formalize the conflict.

Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., said any such declaration might bring Red China and the Soviet Union into the fighting, Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, said it would imply involvement of North Vietnam, which he could not support at this point.

Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., said a declaration might involve the complete destruction of North Vietnam in an effort to win a complete military victory. He said he doesn't believe that should be the U.S. objective.

Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., said that instead of going all out, the United States should retract its bombing of North Vietnam to cover only the points where infiltration routes pass through the 17th Parallel.

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## Kidnaped Official's Family Continuing Search Efforts

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The family of Gustav C. Hertz, a top U.S. official kidnaped by the Viet Cong in February 1965, says it will continue its efforts to determine whether Hertz still is alive.

"It's been a long, frustrating effort and, yes, he can be dead. But we are going to continue to do everything we can to free him or find out," promised Hertz' brother, A. Burke Hertz of suburban Falls Church, Va.

A Viet Cong broadcast last month indicated that Hertz had been executed. But Friday Burke Hertz got a cablegram from the Viet Cong, saying prisoners are treated well.

Although it did not mention Gustav Hertz, who worked for the Agency for International Development, Burke Hertz surmised the cablegram meant his brother had not been executed — that he either was alive or had died of starvation or illness in a prison camp.

The State Department was unable to give any indication of Hertz' status. Hertz' family says all efforts so far to obtain his release, including payment of a ransom for a prisoner exchange, have failed.

In another development, some of the college students who are participating in this summer have charged they are being threatened with the loss of jobs because of efforts to express disagreement with the Johnson administration's Vietnam policy.

Five of the 1,300 students in the Agency's Internship program said in a statement Saturday they were trying to get Hertz to sign a letter to President Johnson opposing his Vietnam policy and urging him to de-escalate the war.

The five interns said Saturday Michel's speech, had caused many students to ask to have their names removed from the letter because they were told they would lose their jobs if they signed.

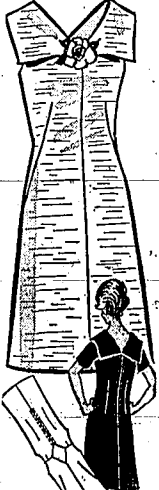

Summer Living Can Be Rough On Wardrobes

SHOSHONE — Summer living can be rough on wardrobes, so clothes need regular and particularly good care at this season, says Esther Nystrom, clothing specialist of the University of Idaho-extension service.

Washable cottons, she advises, should be laundered promptly after wear. If the fabric has discolored because of perspiration, sponge it with a dilute solution of vinegar and water to help restore the original color.

Rinse well and then launder the entire garment in clean suds. Give special attention to stains caused by suntan lotion, insect repellent and other seasonal cosmetics. Rubbing, such as stains with thick suds before washing will remove most of them if action is prompt. Scrub grass and foliage stains with hot water and suds. If necessary, use a mild bleach on white fabric, then wash in clean suds.

Sun, sand, salt water and chlorinated fresh water are hazards to bathing suits. More rinsing under running water won't wash away salt, chlorine or sand. Zippers sometimes just if exposed to salt water. These are all good reasons why suits should be swished through warm soap or detergent suds after each use.

Humid air makes clothes feel damp if they are worn more than once without laundering. Unless lingerie and other clothing are clean, they can't absorb perspiration which air-conditions the body as it evaporates. As new perspiration re-unions to the skin, instead of being blotted by clothes, it leaves a sticky feeling.

When fabric gloves get dirty, Miss Nystrom advised, they should be wet, then rubbed with soap or detergent into the soiled spots and roll each glove lightly, starting from the fingertips. Let them "set" for an hour or

so to loosen the dirt. Wash in clean suds. For washable leather gloves, use lukewarm water and work them over the surface with your fingertips. Don't rub. Rinse and dry flat on a towel. While still slightly damp, massage the gloves to soften the leather. If they're slightly stiff, moisten your fingertips and work the gloves on your hands.

### English Pub Is Hottest Export Item

By EDDY GILMORE  
LONDON (AP) — One of the hottest British export items today is a cool drink English pub. It's surprising, says Ralph Shafran, "but an awful lot of countries are suddenly wanting English pubs, and we are making them and supplying them."

He is shipping them complete with barmaids.

"Yes, as we are now exporting an image, part of the British way of life, as you might say, we have agreed to furnish the barmaids as well."

He and his brothers-in-law, operators of the pub factory, have 20 experienced girls ready to export.

"It's a good job for the right girl," Shafran observes.

"Care paid, living and expenses, \$15 pounds, \$42 a week. This month a pub called the John Bull opened in London by the Shafran group, opened in Caracas, not far from Lisbon. A pair of English barmaids went down to it.

The pub makers also are negotiating with an American company to furnish 200 English pubs over 45 states.

If the deal goes through, the pubs will be shipped across the United States.

The company's first job was making and shipping the Bull Dog pub at Canada's Expo '67.

"We number all the parts and care for them with detailed instructions for assembling," Shafran explains.

"This has proved so popular that we now are building the structure and the furniture with the appropriate decorations. You know-how, brass, iron, wood, built-in, printed signs, words, unit of armor, even stuffed owls."

The average fully-equipped pub costs \$22,000-\$25,000.

### Bomb Claim Disputed By U.S. Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force has disputed a claim by Rep. Craig Hasner, R-Calif., that a public plane could knock out the United States' 18,000 megaton nuclear bombs.

Hasner, a critic of the Department's decision to build an anti-ballistic missile system, contended the attack would destroy 30 percent of the nation's nuclear capability.

Hasner's theory was contained in what he called a scenario of a hypothetical attack written for the House Republican conference.

The Air Force's reply in a statement: "The assertion that the United States' nuclear force could be rendered ineffective by 18,000 such weapons has no basis in fact."

"Our deterrent capability is assured by the fact that our strategic nuclear force, consisting of land-based missiles and air-based planes, is invulnerable to any conceivable attack."

# Clifford And Taylors' Tour Important

SAIGON (AP) — Some observers in Saigon consider the tour of the Vietnam allies by Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor and Clark Clifford to be more important than the recent visit to Saigon by Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara.

Although Taylor denied it on his arrival in Saigon, a major purpose of the two presidential advisers is to put the squeeze for more troops on the governments of South Vietnam, Thailand, South Korea, Australia, and New Zealand and the Philippines. How many they get especially from the South Vietnamese, the Koreans and the

Australians—will have considerable bearing on how many more American troops are sent to Vietnam.

McNamara on his visit two years ago spent little time with Vietnamese officials. Taylor and Clifford have scheduled several hours with Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu, Premier Nguyen Cao Ky and others.

The United States is pressing the South Vietnamese for greater war efforts, and Saturday Ky announced a 55,000-man increase in the armed forces and a reorganization of the military structure. He said much emphasis would be put on the regional and popular force militia who are supposed to guard the rural areas and provide much of the security for the pacification program.


