Wall Of Water Reservoir Two-Thirds Done

Working an additional shift per day and with doubled equipment, crews of the Crom Prestressing Co. are closing the circle of the outside walls on the Twin Falls water reservoir north of the city. After two tragic accidents during early stages of the construction, the contractor is now building the wall as a complete unit before starting on the dome roof. City officials said the tank has a circumference of 500 feet, and workers have now completed about 300 feet using gunnite spray equipment to build up a concrete coating of from 11 to 15 inches. The first accident occurred June 22 when one man was killed and three injured, and on June 23 when one man was killed and three injured, and on July 17 five men were carried to the ground by collapsing roof sections, but all escaped serious injury. Engineers pointed out that both accidents resulted as roofing was being poured and the city's consulting engineer ordered the contractor to re-form of Morrison-Maierle and Associates. In both engineering experts concur on the procedure, the contractor will be authorized to go ahead with the dome construction. These were the terms of an agreement between the contractor, city and consulting engineers during a meeting. Because of the delay caused by the contractor by the two accidents, completion date for the five-million gallon reservoir has been extended to Oct. 3, city officials explained. This is less than a month's extension, and if necessary, the city has agreed to make further extension.

Novice Pilot's Night-Flying Nearly Fatal POCATELLO (AP) — "I knew I could fly it in the daytime, but flying at night is something different," novice pilot Ronald Darrow Van Leuven said as he was booked into Bannock County jail Monday. The 24-year-old Downey man is charged with destruction of an aircraft. Police said Van Leuven, with only three hours of flying instruction and somebody else's plane, took off from the airstrip near the small South Idaho community of Downey about 3 a.m. Sunday. When the noisy plane circled the city, a number of townfolk awakened and rushed in cars to light the airstrip with their headlights, as is the custom when a plane is in trouble. But the plane stalled, crashed into a nearby ditch and burst into flame just as Van Leuven jumped free, City Marshal Joe Zapitello said. The four-place Cessna 141 was termed a "total loss" by owner Dan Jensen. Van Leuven suffered minor burns and a head cut.

Fulbright introduced a resolution Monday that would require a joint congressional-presidential declaration to seal any national commitment abroad. The President could not make commitments to foreign nations without the Senate's consent. While the Constitution requires Senate ratification of formal treaties, many pacts between the United States and foreign countries are never so formalized. Constitutional scholars say the president can control foreign policy totally if he so desires. Fulbright, perhaps the Senate's most persistent critic of President Johnson's Vietnam policies, told his colleagues the resolution was aimed at no "current crisis abroad, and is not a measure directed against any single administration in this century—or against anyone at all."

Senator Dodd's Life Appears About Same As Before He Was Censured By JOHN CHADWICK WASHINGTON (AP) — On the surface at least life for Sen. Thomas J. Dodd now appears about the same as it did before he was censured 92 to 5 by his colleagues last month. But it is apparent from talking to the 60-year-old Connecticut Democrat and other senators that neither he nor they can erase the censure from their minds. "Of course I'd like to forget about it," Dodd told a reporter. "But it just isn't possible." Colleagues observe all the amenities in their contacts with him, but there are differences not readily apparent. One senator, for example, who had invited several colleagues to speak to summer leagues to work in his office, said he had not and would not invite Dodd. The Senate censured Dodd June 23 for conduct "which is contrary to accepted morals, derogates from the public trust expected of a senator, and tends to bring the Senate into dishonor and disrepute." This was based on a finding by the Senate ethics committee that Dodd had converted to his personal benefit at least \$116,083 of campaign and testimonial funds. The Senate rejected 51 to 45 a second count that Dodd billed both the Senate and private groups for the same travel expenses. The censure vote did not deprive Dodd of any of his rights or privileges as a senator and he has made an obvious effort to carry on his work as usual. He has put out statements about pending legislation and anything wrong "I didn't actively try to prevent the extradition of former Prime Minister Moise Tshombe to the Congo, where he has been sentenced to death on treason charges. Tshombe is held in Algeria. But Dodd has been most prominent since his censure as chairman of the Senate Juvenile Delinquency subcommittee, presiding over hearings on the federal gun control bill that is part of President Johnson's anti-crime program. Puffing on his pipe, the white-haired senator seems to conduct the hearings with assurance as he questions witnesses and engages in occasional banter with other senators. And yet it is evident his censure is on his mind. In an interview in his office, Dodd said he has not noticed any difference in the attitude of his colleagues and does not feel awkward in presiding over the hearings. "And for a simple reason," he said, "I truly don't believe I did anything wrong. If I did, I wouldn't stay here and I wouldn't preside."

Despite the disclaimer, the resolution appeared likely to arouse still another congressional debate on Vietnam. Critics of the war say President Johnson has continued to escalate the U.S. commitment there without consulting Congress.

3 Arrested In Plymouth Mail Robbery

BOSTON (AP) — A major break has occurred in the great Plymouth mail truck robbery with the arrest of a woman and two men in the \$1,551,277 cash haul.

The woman, mother of four children, and the two men are accused of committing "with other persons unknown" what is believed to be the largest cash robbery in the nation's history.

A federal grand jury charged the three with the 1962 robbery in indictments returned Monday — two weeks before the five-year statute of limitations runs out for the federal government to prosecute.

Named in the indictments were Thomas R. Richards, 42, of Weymouth, an electrician for New England Power Co.; John J. Kelley, 51, of Watertown, unemployed; and Patricia DiAferio, 32, of Boston.

Richards was arrested at his home by U.S. marshals. The other two surrendered by arrangements made through their attorneys.

The men, both represented by noted criminal lawyer F. Lee Bailey, were released in bail of \$25,000 set by U.S. Commissioner Francis H. Farrell. Mrs. DiAferio, represented by attorney Joseph Bailliro, was freed after posting \$5,000 bail.

The indictments charge that the three, and others unknown, robbed two postal workers of the money in Canadian and U.S. currency. It also charges them with putting the lives of postal employees in jeopardy. Convictions would carry a minimum sentence of 25 years in prison.

Two months after it occurred, about 30 U.S. marshals and post office inspectors tore Richards' \$18,000 home apart.

They ripped out ceilings and walls, pried up floor boards and took panels off outside walls and eaves. A search warrant said they sought \$1 million of the mail loot.

In the search of Richards' home, \$350 in cash was found hidden beneath a bathroom floor, authorities said. Richards said it was gambling winnings.

The searchers said they found a shotgun and a .45-caliber pistol, two bullet-proof vests and two belts of the type worn by policemen.

A power shovel was used to dig up a cement patio Richards had built the summer of the robbery.

Kelley has accused post office inspectors of harassing him in their investigation.

The mail truck was en route to the Federal Reserve Bank in Boston with shipments of cash from Cape Cod banks.

CORE Leader Sees Start Of Revolution

NEW YORK (AP) — The head of the Congress of Racial Equality has shrugged off the civil rights movement as passing and said that this summer's racial explosions may well be recorded in history "as the beginning of the black revolution."

In what he called "a black manifesto," national director Floyd McKissick said: "The tactics and philosophy of the civil rights era can take us no further along the road to total equality. New methods must be found; a new era must begin."

McKissick said in a news conference Monday that not only the demands of integrationists should be met, but those of black separatists who want to establish communities in Africa and demand financial reparations from the federal government for past wrongs to Negroes.

He also demanded the owner-

ship of all ghetto businesses be turned over to Negroes and that they be given charge of all public facilities in black communities.

"Release all political prisoners," he said. "Now! By that we mean, those seized during the recent rebellions. Half all political prisoners will be freed."

McKissick also issued this warning: "Any nation that can afford to spend \$66 million daily on a murderous war in Vietnam can afford many times that amount to aid the suffering and the oppressed."

"If America again ignores its responsibility to the black population, we will be faced with increasing year-round violence and destruction."

Last Feb. 16, WO Thompson served as co-pilot of a command and control helicopter of the 1st Air Cavalry Division during a battle with Viet Cong forces. He voluntarily landed in an area under heavy enemy fire to evacuate several wounded soldiers.

As the aircraft lifted off with the wounded, it was hit and went out of control. WO Thompson assisted the pilot in stabilizing the ship and bringing it down safely.

WO Thompson also has been awarded the Air Medal.

Brody's Wife, Children Are Disinherited

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A will of lawyer Samuel S. Brody, killed with actress Jayne Mansfield a month ago in an automobile accident, disinherits his wife and their two children and leaves the entire estate to the late blonde performer.

The will, handwritten and dated 18 days before Brody and Miss Mansfield died on a New Orleans, La., highway, was filed Monday by Matt Cimber, third husband of the actress.

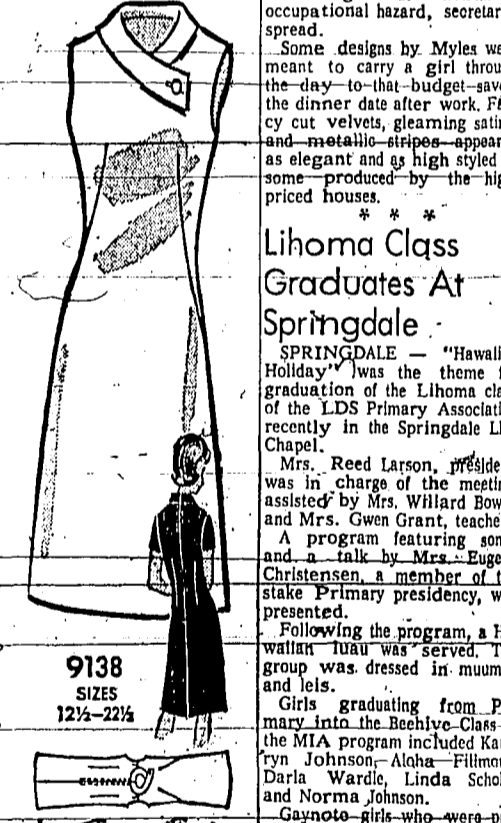

Gunmen Rob Cargo Office Of Gold Bars

NEW YORK (AP) — Two gunmen forced their way into the KLM Royal Dutch Airlines cargo office at John F. Kennedy International Airport early today, and firing a shot into the ceiling, stole two gold bars valued at \$23,376.30, police said.

The theft was the second to hit KLM this year. In April, a 40-pound gold bar worth \$40,000 vanished after it was said to have been placed on board a flight from Kennedy to the West Indies island of Aruba.

Police said the two bandits burst into KLM's export office in Kennedy's cargo loading area and announced, "This is a stickup."

Clerk John Parker laughed at one of the men's long-barreled revolvers and replied, "Quit kidding." His remark drew a quick shot into the ceiling.

At that moment, according to detectives, manager Earl Erickson saw Parker, clerk Hans Brinkhouse and the gunmen and ran to a car where he said he knew there was a hunting rifle.

One of the gunmen reportedly cried out, "We're spotted, let's hurry!" and using an auto jack handle, ripped open a gate to a 4 X 4 foot cubicle where the gold was stored.

The robbers grabbed two wooden boxes containing the bars and fled before Erickson could return. The boxes weighed 19 and 29 pounds, but police could not specify the weight of the gold.

The bars were part of a shipment from Canada that had been consigned to Caracas, Venezuela.

Congressmen Get Many Letters On Riots

WASHINGTON (AP) — Obviously disturbed and concerned by urban rioting and looting, citizens by the thousands, are expressing their views to senators and representatives.

Most congressional offices report their riot mail as moderate to heavy in volume. There isn't a great deal in the way of proposed solutions or constructive suggestions, congressional offices say. Most people simply express their thoughts and feeling, often with strong emotion.

To sum it up, several members of Congress said, "The folks are against riots." Most of the letters appear to be from whites, particularly those with Southern postmarks. But there are some from Negroes.

Letters — Here are samples of what Mr. and Mrs. America are writing their senators and representatives about the matter: From Tennessee — "I am not a racist. Neither are the people for whom I speak, Negro as well as white. We are outraged and frightened parents who believe the time has come for firm, startling and immediate action by the government. A stop has to be put to rioting and pillaging, flagrant disrespect of our country, our flag, our rights, our lives."

Some Gun Dealers Halt Sales In View Of Violence In United States Cities

By BOB MONROE
NEW YORK (AP) — The demand for guns, particularly handguns, has increased in some of the cities struck by violence this summer. A few dealers say they've temporarily halted further sales.

Called for something to be done about such militantly outspoken Negro leaders as Stokely Carmichael and H. Rap Brown. Many others suggested that money required for the Vietnam war might better be spent in the United States.

Most members of Congress decline to permit their correspondents to be quoted by name but do permit quotations from letters so long as the writer is not identified. On that basis, The Associated Press obtained many of the riot letters.

Seattle — "These rioters act like mad dogs. If people act like that, the police should be allowed to use machine guns on them."

Spokane — "I wish to add my protest to others who feel these devastating race riots would not have occurred had Congress been thinking of the welfare of the American people."

Mississippi — "Send them all back to Africa and give them 160 acres and a tractor."

Michigan (a Negro) — "My people are not responsible for this. We believe in law and order and we are just as heart-sick about it as you are."

In an Associated Press survey, many of the dealers said their new customers were predominantly white. In the words of one store owner: "I think they're the type who get them for home protection."

Two nationwide retail firms — Sears Roebuck and Co. and Montgomery Ward & Co. — said they had halted over-the-counter arms sales in a number of cities where violence is occurring.

From 2,400 sold in the first week the number grew to better than 3,750 in the fourth week. The figures were not broken down by geographical area or race.

Atlanta, Houston and Dallas distributors all noted seasonal increases. A similar report came from New Orleans but white buyers in Baton Rouge had pushed up sales 50 per cent in one big store.

Many sporting goods stores in New York City reported what one owner described as "a great increase" in the number of rifles and rounds of ammunition sold since the Newark, N.J., riots.

Gov. Reagan Has Bladder Operation

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan underwent a 45-minute operation Monday for removal of bladder stones.

A popular sporting goods store in Minneapolis noted a definite increase in sales to persons the owner described as ordinary citizens wanting guns for protection.

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—The California Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation, part of the State Justice Department, reported an upsurge of handgun sales during July.

At the same time a small benign tumor was removed from the governor's hip, Nofziger told a news conference.

At another outlet the manager noted: "We haven't sold many guns but a hell of a lot of ammunition. We've sold some box of shells to a Negro. All the rest have been white."

—We are not in the hunting business at present," said a spokesman for one firm. "We have stopped selling rifles entirely and we won't open again until September. There are no guns in the windows. We don't want to contribute to the mess."

Tourist's Guide To London Eating Places Includes "Appalling" Rating

LONDON (AP) — In a country accused of a national indifference towards good cooking, few experiences can be so grim as eating in a trio of places openly described as appalling.

The new Egon Rommy-BMC (British Motor Corp.) Guide to Hotels, Restaurants, Pubs and Inns, contains a courageous chapter which begins:

"We are giving our brutally frank views of the shocking standard of catering of most of London's tourist attractions. In doing so, we hope to influence those responsible to improve things."

The guide rates 32 of these places — which are visited by thousands of visitors every year — as "good, reasonable, acceptable, bad and appalling."

Three are called good — the Commonwealth Institute, National Gallery and the Royal Festival Theatre.

Seven are listed as reasonable — The BOAC Terminal, British Museum, Gatwick Airport, Kew Gardens, London Airport's Ocean Buildings, Victoria Station's Golden Arrow Bar and West London Air Terminal.

Three come under acceptable — The Royal Academy, Tate Gallery and Tower of London.

Six are said to be plain bad — Battersea Festival Gardens, Huston Station Buffet, London Airport's Europe Building, London Airport's Queen's Building, Paddington Station and Victoria and Albert Museum.

Then come the three branded as appalling — Hyde Park's cafeteria, Victoria Coach Station cafeteria and Waterloo Station's Long Bar.

Of this trio of shockers the guide says:

Hyde Park — "The sandwiches, cakes, tea and coffee are of the poorest quality, served by a staff who appears to equate the customers with the indignant clearing of the ashtrays."

Victoria Coach Station cafeteria — "Queuing for our tea we observed the pot watered down three times before acquiring a plate of complete tastelessness. Responding to a complaint the prevailing attitude was such-

cinely expressed: 'Where do you think you are?' — It was a fair question. Nothing about this place — food, service, appearance, dirty lavatories — makes it possible to supply an answer."

Waterloo Station Long Bar — "If you like the unusual, metallic-flavored tea in plastic cups from a machine and 'automated' coffee, if you are ravenous enough to eat food however unappetizing it looks, then this is what you have been looking for."

"British Rail (the national railways) have not missed a trick. Drab in appearance, casual in service, standards are depressed in a grim determination to be utterly third-rate."

Forewarned, this American correspondent set out in a cold, wet windy morning to sample as many hundreds of other foreigner must have done within the last week — the food in these heartburn havens.

The gay looking little cafeteria in Hyde Park was the first stop, and coffee was the first order.

"White or black?" "White, please."

"It came out black." "That's black."

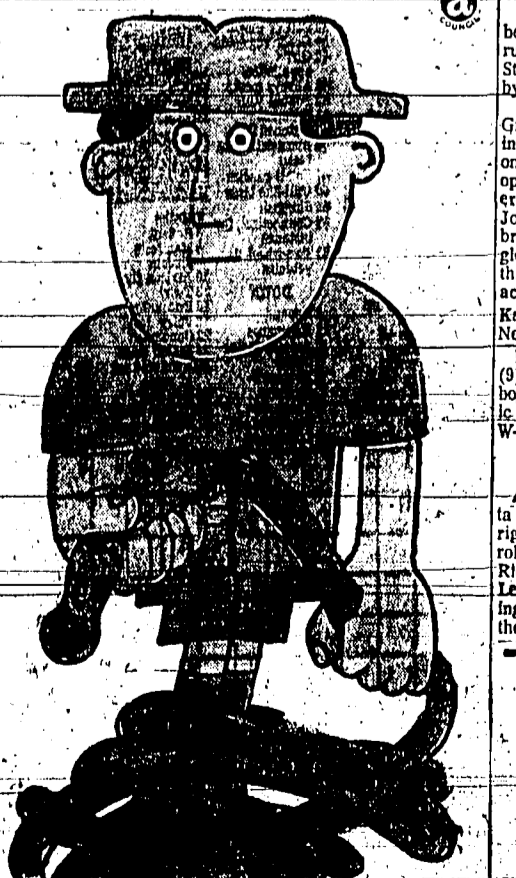

COUNT THE COST IF FINESSE FAILS

If the spade finesse loses? No—nothing much if East returns a spade but there is no law that sheer joy of finessing, go ahead requires him to lead back a diamond. If you want to win spade, East just might shift to a diamond. Look around first and see what you have to gain with success or lose with failure. South is in a very normal position. Suppose you don't finesse the spade and lose the club finesse. What happens to you in that case? You are still going to make your contract. You will have the ace of spades in and will have no trouble making three hearts and four clubs. In addition you will surely make either a second spade trick or a diamond-trick.

A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush. You refuse the spade finesse and win the rubber. Of course, a diamond lead would have beaten you, but you didn't get a diamond lead. You got a spade lead which gave you a sure thing.
