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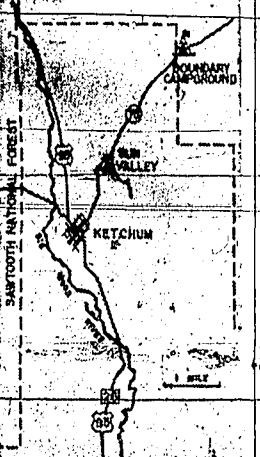

Hooded Assailant Kills Man In \$7 Theft At Campground

KETCHUM — The Boundary campgrounds on Trail Creek Road northeast of Sun Valley was deserted Wednesday morning, a Ketchum construction worker dead and his 14-year-old daughter wounded in the left leg — all for \$7.

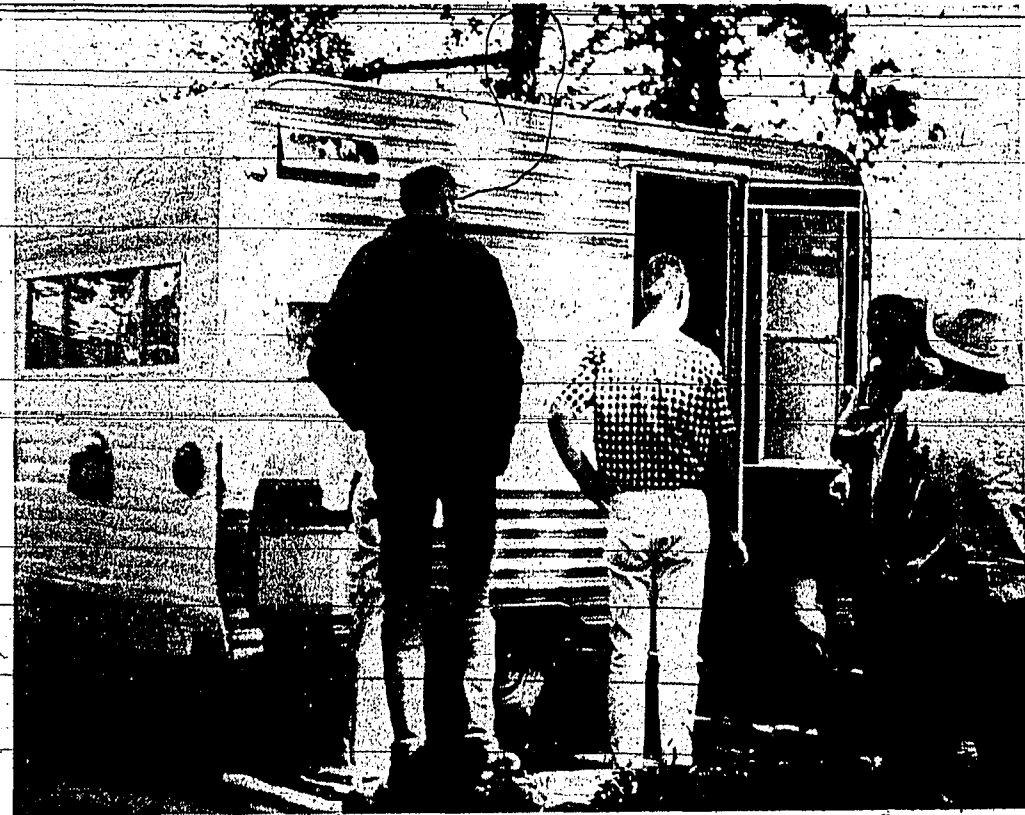
Glen A. Coppinger, 38, whose residence is listed as Boise, was fatally shot by a man reportedly wearing a black hood over his head, who came to the Coppinger trailer late Tuesday night asking for money.



Blaine County sheriff's officers questioned and later this morning released a 21-year-old man, who said he was en route to Oregon. He was picked up during a road block about four miles north of Shoshone at 2 a.m. Wednesday. He was released after questioning, but later was picked up again by Gooding police at the request of Blaine County Sheriff Orville Drexler. The sheriff said he was given a traffic citation.

Officers said the witnesses furnished widely differing descriptions of the intruder, who had a black mask over his face throughout the time he was in the trailer parking area.

City, county and state officers from throughout Magic Valley were called into service to maintain road blocks and assist in the investigation shortly after 11 p.m. Tuesday. Sheriff James H. Benham, Twin Falls, who participated in the road blocks, said traffic was extremely heavy in the area and several vehicles were stopped and occupants questioned during the eight-hour period following the shooting.

Committee Studies Cause Of Riots

WASHINGTON (AP) — Police Chief Bryce Kinnaman of Cambridge, Md., said today a fiery speech by Negro militant H. Rap Brown "was the sole reason" for a race riot that seared his town on July 24.

Not only did his speech cause it, but he led these people," Kinnaman told the Senate Judiciary Committee as Congress embarked on its first inquiry into the recent waves of racial violence.

For that committee, considering a bill that would make it a federal crime to cross a state line with intent to incite riot, Kinnaman played a tape recording of a Brown speech which he said preceded the riot.

"It's time for Cambridge to explode," he said in the recorded speech.

In words muffled by cheers, the voice said Cambridge and America — should be burned down.

"Take you violence to the hunk," the speech went on. "How can you steal from a thief? He done stole everything from us. He looted us from Africa."

Brown has been accused under Maryland law of inciting a riot and being an accessory to arson in the burning of a Cambridge elementary school. Arrested in Virginia, he is free on bond pending extradition proceedings. He is the chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

"Following his speech," Kinnaman said, "H. Rap Brown led a group of people to the main

district of Cambridge, that's the business district.

"He instructed these people to shoot any patrolman, white or colored," who tried to stop them," the police chief said.

Kinnaman said his 21-man police force used live ammunition to turn the crowd back from the business district. He said the crowd returned to the Negro section of town for a night of shooting, looting and arson.

The police chief said about 300 people heard the speech by Brown, and about 150 of them marched on the business district.

Earlier, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts said the pending anti-riot bill "may constitute a fraud." He said it might present an appearance of meaningful congressional action when there has been none.

Sen. Phillip A. Hart of Michigan said the bill and 97 more would not have prevented the violence that seared Detroit.

And Mississippi Sen. James O. Eastland said the Senate Judiciary Committee is "not seeking and we will not be seeking to find a scapegoat" in its hearings on city violence.

So began the initial congressional inquiry into racial riots which have swept American cities, a hearing on legislation making it a federal crime to cross state lines with intent to incite

Cease-Fire Broken Between Jordan And Israeli Troops

The cease-fire between Jordanian and Israeli troops was broken today with gunfire erupting across the Jordan River for the second straight day.

A Jordanian military communiqué in Amman said the two sides exchanged fire for one hour, broke off for five minutes, then resumed. The shooting was still going on this afternoon, it said.

It claimed the Israelis had suffered losses in men and vehicles, with no casualties on the Jordanian side.

The spokesman said the first exchange took place when Jordanian troops fired on Israeli positions with small arms.

The Israelis replied and the shooting lasted for about 55 minutes, he said. The second incident occurred at 3 p.m. when the Jordanians again opened fire, and received returning fire, the spokesman added.

The Jordanian communiqué said 12 Israeli vehicles rolled down to the river about two miles north of the Damia Bridge at 11:55 a.m. and fired on Jordanian positions in the hills east of the river. Jordanian forces returned the fire, and the exchange lasted an hour.

The Israelis used four armored troop carriers, four cars with heavy machine guns and four other armed cars, the communiqué said.

The communiqué said, "It was believed that many losses were sustained on the mechanized forces of the enemy."

It was the fifth violation of the cease-fire on the Jordan River since the six-day war in June. Gunfire flared across the river in almost the same place Tuesday in two exchanges lasting 30 minutes, but no casualties were reported.

At Khartoum, capital of Sudan, Arab foreign ministers were bogged down in efforts to

prepare the way for a summit meeting to deal with what they call "Israeli aggression."

Light-tipped and grim, delegates filed out of the old republican palace after a heated three hours of discussions.

Premier Sayed Mahgoub of Sudan, who is conference chairman, told reporters: "We began to study the agenda and it was

a deep and frank study. The discussion concerns concerted efforts to eliminate the results of Israeli aggression."

Delegates were privately pessimistic that the foreign ministers could create an atmosphere in which a summit conference could meet without aggravating Arab feuds, let alone achieve worthwhile results.

Human Torch Victim Dies From Burns

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The 24-year-old woman who set herself afire July 4 at a Los Angeles gas station, died early Wednesday with third-degree burns over 99 per cent of her body.

Doctors at the University of California Medical Center said Nancy Moore refused drugs during her hospitalization, telling them if she died with narcotics in her body she would suffer eternal damnation.

The woman's father blamed her death on the hallucinatory drug LSD.

Miss Moore, daughter of a vice president of North American Aviation, walked into a gas station, placed a picture of a bearded man in front of her and touched a match to her gasoline-soaked clothes. The picture was reported to be that of an Indian sect leader.

Virgil John Lickley Dies At Age Of 69

JEROME — Virgil John Lickley, 69, prominent area livestockman and rancher, died Tuesday afternoon in New Meadows where he was visiting a daughter.

Mr. Lickley was born Jan. 1, 1898, in Marion, Iowa, and moved to Idaho in 1908 with his parents. He moved to a farm southeast of Jerome with his parents and lived on the same farm until his death.

He was a well-known Idaho cattleman, raising registered Herefords and horses.

He married Nellie Williams Nov. 11, 1924, in Jerome. He was a member of the Methodist Church, the Jerome Lodge 61 A.F. and A.M. of which he also was a past master. He also was a member of the Scottish Rite Masons and El Korah Shrine Temple.

Mr. Lickley had served as a director and built a committee member of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association and currently was a director of the Magic Valley Cattlemen's Association.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Mahlon (Louise) Gibbons (Murray), Twin Falls, Mrs. Joe (Jeanette) Frazier, New Meadows; three sons, Albert C., V. Ray and Lawrence W. Lickley, all in Jerome, and 15 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. Friday in the Holy Funeral Chapel. The Rev. John N. Garrabrant will officiate, and the Jerome Lodge 61 A.F. and A.M. will conduct graveside services in the Jerome Cemetery. Friends may call Thursday and Friday until time of services. The family suggests memorials to the Methodist Church memorial fund.

Orbiter 5 Focuses Eye Toward Its Guiding Star

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The last of America's orbiting shuttles — Lunar Orbiter 5 — rolled over gently in space today, cocked an eye toward its guiding star and found a blur.

"We've got a star, but we don't know which one," a spokesman at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory said after two attempts were made to find the bright star Canopus.

The craft, he said, has to search with its light sensor for some bright heavenly body, and lock onto the light to maintain its proper attitude in space.

Canopus is normally the light source used.

The stubby craft was boosted aloft from Cape Kennedy, Fla., Tuesday in a launch that was called "textbook perfect."

Orbiter's goal — after its 250,187-mile journey through space, was to slip into orbit around the moon, from which it was to take pictures of the lunar surface.

Previous orbiters looked specifically for safe landing spots for astronauts, a task Lunar Orbiter 5 will also perform, but the main interest with the current mission lies in a classic scientific riddle.

Astronomers have long argued over what formed the moon's lumpy, pock-marked features — meteor impacts or volcanic eruptions. The weight of most opinion favors the impact theory, although photos from other orbiters indicate some of the features may be of volcanic origin.

Threshing

BUHL — Ed Vogel, Buhl, will be threshing grain Saturday and Sunday with his old stationary steam engine.

Chinese Hill Tribe Battle Claims 300

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — An estimated 300 persons were killed or wounded in a three-day battle between two Chinese hill tribes using machine guns and rockets, Deputy Premier Praphas Charusathien said today.

Praphas told his weekly news conference an unknown number of Burmese, Laotians and Thais were among the casualties.

Praphas said the two tribes of between 500 and 1,000 men each fought over what was believed to be a double-cross in their opium traffic.

Hoover Sees No Basis For Conspiracy Behind Recent Nationwide Rioting

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover has said President Johnson's civil disorders commission "there is no intelligence on which to base a conclusion of conspiracy" behind the nationwide rash of riots.

The commission chairman, Gov. Otto Kerner of Illinois, who relayed that information to reporters, said he thinks "all of these things seem to start from some little incident. From all the facts I can gather at this time, I think this would be true."

Hoover was one of the first witnesses Tuesday when the commission went to work on its task of trying to find the causes and cures for the civil violence which has hit big and little cities.

Who's To Say Miracles Don't Happen

The room was packed with drama as a 19-year-old girl strained to rise from a wheelchair and a small group of people made a conscious effort to prevent themselves from going to her aid.

"Don't help me, please. I've got to do it by myself."

A gutsy little teen-ager who answers to the name of Lee Ann Hone has been saying that for more than a year. It was a year ago last June that an automobile accident put her in a hospital with a broken back—paralyzed from the mid-chest down.

It was Sunday, June 5, 1966. At 9:22 p.m., Lee Ann Hone, oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Hone, Twin Falls, had a wreck in the world. The driver of a car—a boy who was a young 19 then—was going a bit too fast to negotiate a curve on Highway 74 near the old Twin Falls water reservoir tower.

The wreck occurred at 9:22 p.m. Lee Ann Hone became a part of the daily newspaper accounts of what are considered mildly routine accident reports. For a day or two, however, she was considered front-page material.

Then she, like countless other victims of countless other accidents, passed from the headlines and was largely forgotten by the general public.

Thus ends the routine account of an ordinary girl who, because of a wreck, has been spending the greater portion of her waking days in a wheelchair, and, on occasion, on crutches and in braces.

And thus begins the extraordinary account of a very basically

different girl who seems to be made of plain, old-fashioned guts—a girl who has met the challenge of a handicap with head-on courage, and faces a formidable prospect of life-long paralysis with a positive attitude.

Pollyanna she isn't, since she can be as irritating, moody, depressed and wistful as the next guy. To describe her by way of a string of completely positive adjectives would be misleading.

Definitely, she is a tough girl. Few people, if placed in the same situation, would react in the way Lee Ann has—defiantly, and with a gritty courage that seldom lets her down.

This courage kept her cheerful, at least most of the time, during a three-month stay in the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital and, later, during another three-month period in the Elks Rehabilitation Center, Boise. Now, it's keeping her optimistic during daily physical therapy sessions with Dr. Ivan Allred at the local hospital.

It's given her the will to enroll at the College of Southern Idaho and to make plans for getting a job. She started classes at CSI last January and found it "very easy to get around there—all the kids were so helpful and everything."

Quite naturally, life is not a bowl of peaches and cream for Lee Ann Hone, and what has been called her typical cheerfulness wits somewhat in view of Twin Falls' current spell of hot weather.

"The heat really bothers me," she says, looking somewhat wistful when she thinks about swimming and waterskiing. "Of course, the doctor says there is really no reason why I can't swim—since you don't really use your legs much—and that's

going to be my next goal."

Lee Ann's first goal was to get out of a wheelchair, and she made it with three months to spare over what the doctors had predicted. In a manner of speaking, this bubbly, brown-eyed teen-ager who was told by some that she would never walk again is walking—on legs enclosed by braces and on crutches, but walking nonetheless.

She puts on the braces by herself and onto crutches and can then, by using her arms and the crutches, to pull the rest of her now-paralyzed body, "walk."

One of the values of Lee Ann's story is that it is applicable to a great many other handicapped persons who continue to inspire the "more fortunate" elements of society.

"The way I look at it," Lee Ann says with an irresistible smile, "is that everybody has some kind of handicap. It's not always visible, but it's there no matter how perfect they may seem on the outside. My handicap just happens to be one of those you can see."

Lee Ann's spinal injury, by-product of the broken back, apparently can't be repaired through modern medicine. She, however, is hopeful about a recovery and the dreamed-about return of the use of her legs.

"I realize that there is no operation that can help me, but the doctors can't predict what an individual can do. Miracles do happen," she says.

So the little girl who has to believe in miracles continues her daily life—playing records, reading, and

cooking, doing housework, reading, visiting with friends, working out with the therapist.

She finds advantages in everything, and is one of the few people who can sound sincere when commenting, "I got sunburned the other day by sitting out in the yard, and my feet would probably hurt if I could feel anything in them—gee, that's a good thing I hadn't thought about before."

Gutsy—that's Lee Ann Hone. And we sure hope you find that miracle, Lee Ann.

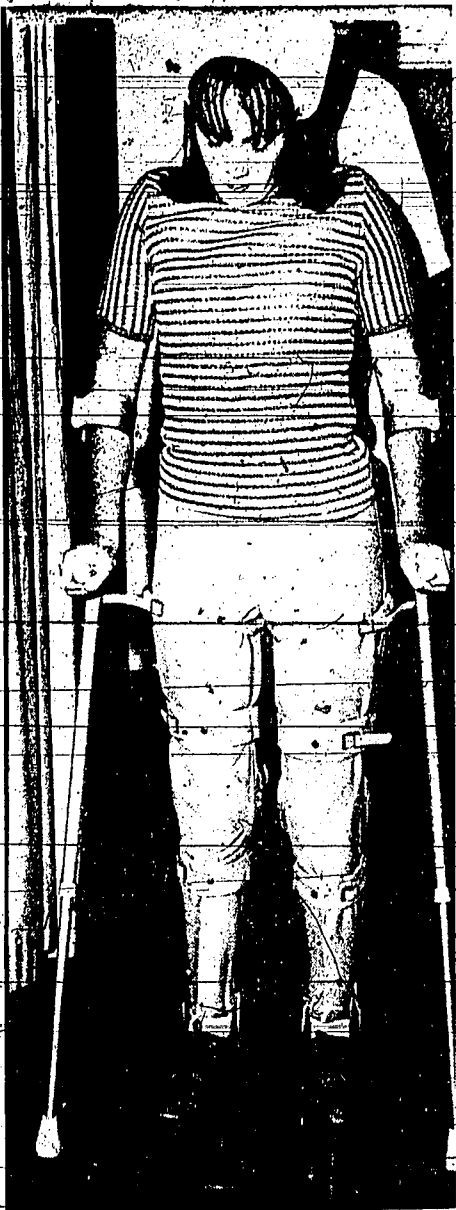

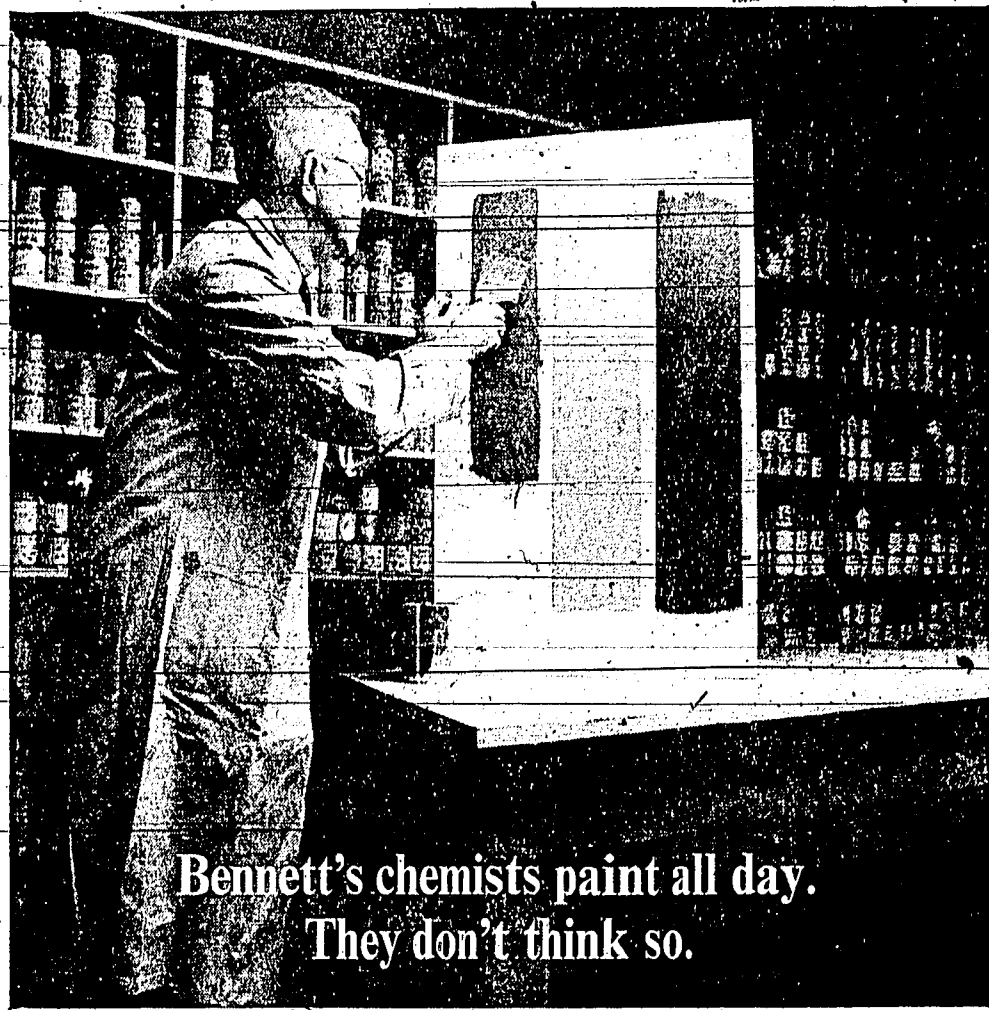

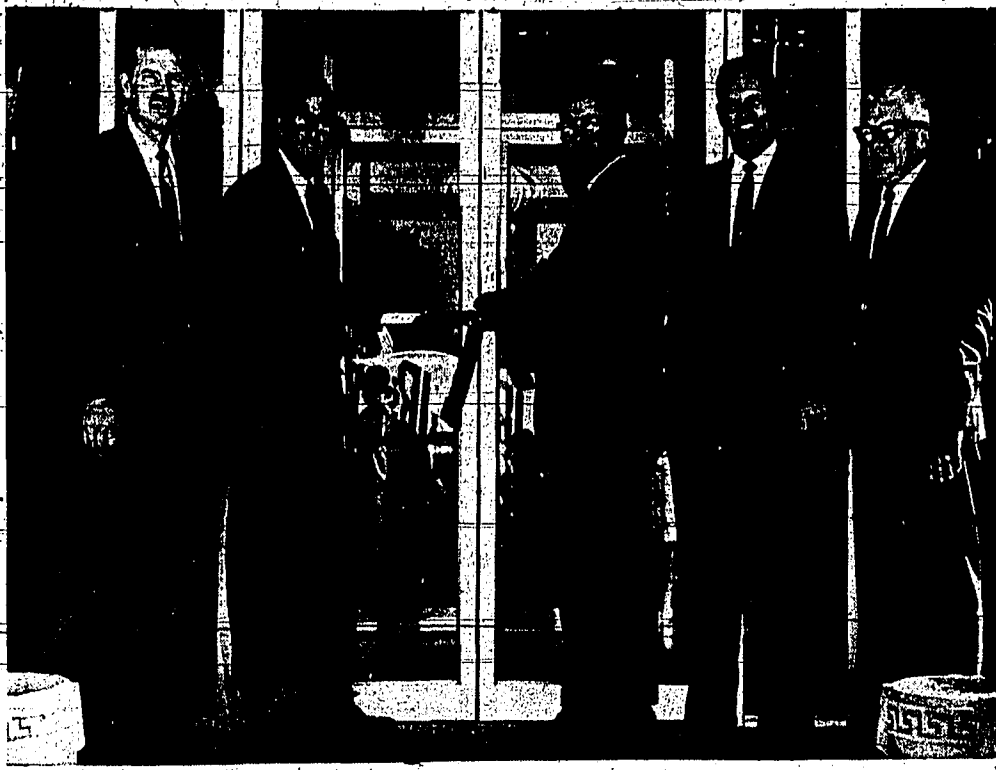

Nigeria To Give Military Burial To Rebellious Major

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP)—The Nigerian government will give a full military burial to the leader of rebellious Biafra's army, Maj. Chukwuma K. Nzeogwu, the head of Nigeria's military government announced today.

Nzeogwu was killed Friday while leading Biafran troops against federal troops at Obolo Eke, 22 miles from Enugu, the Biafran capital.

"Nzeogwu was a gallant officer in principle but he was misguided," said Maj. Gen. Yakubu Gowon, the Nigerian government head. Both were trained at Sandhurst, Britain's West Point.

The loss of Nzeogwu, 29, was expected to be a big blow to the Eastern rebellion led by Lt. Col. Odumegwu Ojukwu against the central government. Ojukwu's half brother, Tom Bigger, was also reported killed in action. Nzeogwu was one of the arch-

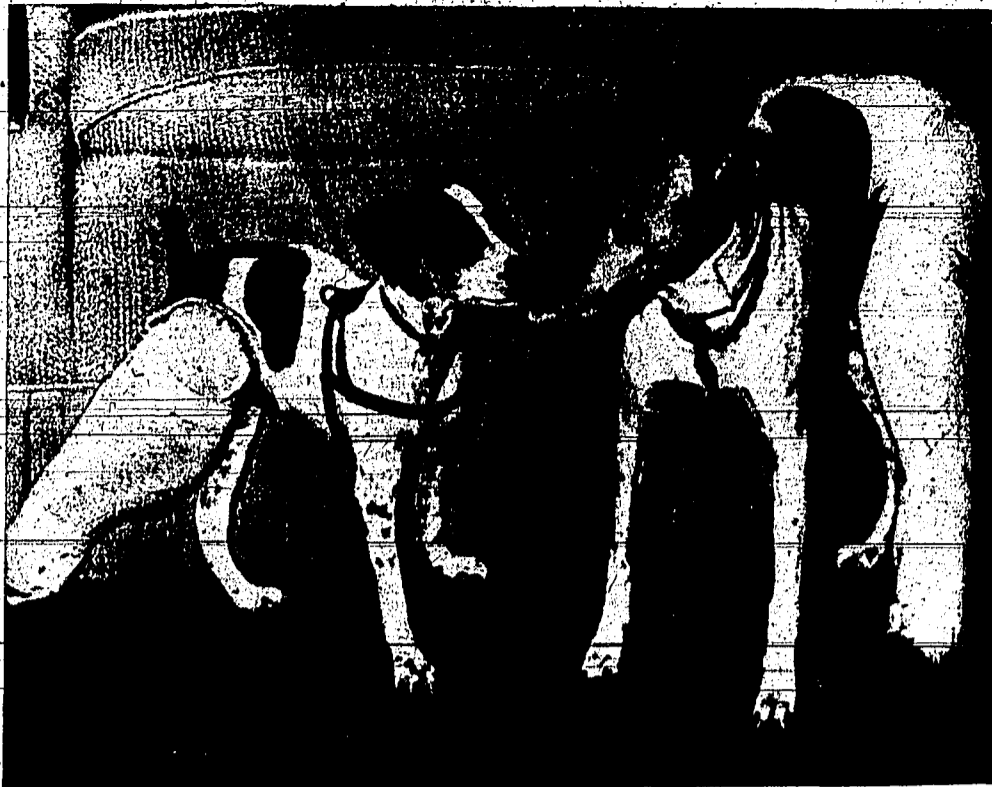
itects of the January 1966 coup that overthrew Nigeria's last civilian government. He was a Roman Catholic and a member of the Ibo Tribe of the Eastern region. He was reportedly also the architect of hit-and-run guerrilla tactics that have been harrying federal troops in their advance on Enugu.

In Biafra, meanwhile, anti-British riots broke out in Port Harcourt Tuesday after Enugu Radio accused the Shell BP Oil Co. of helping federal forces seize the Biafran oil port of Bonny last week. Fifty to 100 British men were still in Biafra, but police controlled the demonstrators, and no one was reported injured.

Committee Trims Social Security Proposals

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee is trimming President Johnson's Social Security proposals sharply to avoid piling a big payroll tax increase on top of an anticipated jump in regular income taxes.

Instead of a benefit increase for retirees of at least 15 percent as Johnson proposed, the committee now all but finally has voted for 1 1/2%. The Associated Press learned. Instead of raising the current \$44 minimum monthly payment to \$70, the committee would hike it to \$50.

Another preliminary decision is to set aside entirely the administration proposal to extend hospital and other benefits of Medicare, now confined to those 65 or older, to younger persons retired because of disability.

These rollbacks make possible a much more modest increase in the payroll taxes that finance basic Social Security and Medicare. These taxes now are levied on a wage base of a maximum \$6,000 per employee. Employers and employees each pay 4.4 percent.

Johnson's proposal would have increased the base next year to \$7,800, the first step in a staged rise to \$10,800 by 1974.

The committee instead has written in a single increase, effective Jan. 1, to \$7,600. Members concede future Congresses may have to make more increases.

The maximum annual Social Security tax an employee now pays is \$290.40. Under the administration proposal, the maximum next year would be \$342.20. Under the committee version, the maximum would be \$334.40—up \$44 from this year—and for those earning no more than \$6,600 there would be no increase.

NEW YORK (AP)—Your pocketbook eventually may feel the impact of the \$300-million annual freight rate increase won by the nation's railroads Tuesday.

"Groceries, cars and paper products may inch upward in price when the new interstate Commerce Commission rates become effective.

"The ultimate consumer will feel the squeeze of these increased costs," said one Wall Street analyst.

The increase was the railroads' first general rate hike in seven years and came despite administration pleas that such raises be considered "in the light of the national interest in promoting price stability."

The American Paper Institute, representing the paper and wood pulp industry, estimated the new rates would cost its members about \$22 million annually.

Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp. said the rates would add about \$1 million annually to its \$50-million railroad freight bill. "Rarely are costs of this type absorbed," said an Olin spokesman.

All decisions made by the committee still are subject to change before it votes to send the bill to the House.

Dividend Set

NEW YORK — Pan American World Airways' Board of Directors increased the dividend to 10 cents a share, payable Aug. 18 to shareholders of record as of the close of business July 28.

This dividend is the first such payment since the two-for-one stock split made on May 4. Previously this year, the company paid dividends of 15 cents in May and February before the stock split.

Woman Initiates Psychological Warfare

By ROBERT BERRELEZ
 CAMIRI, Bolivia (AP) — A woman guerrilla named Tania has brought psychological warfare to Bolivia's Marxist rebel front in the mountains.

A jungle version of World War II's Tokyo Rose, she uses a bull-horn during combat to exhort Bolivian troops to lay down their arms.

"Surrender, little soldier, you're surrounded," she will cry unseen in the dark green foliage of the mountainside.

"It is startling and really shakes you the first time you hear her," said a medic who has been involved in two clashes between the army and the guerrillas.

Tania also acts as a decoy. Her small, booted footprints are seen along the mountain trails.

"We've learned to start taking cover when we see her footprints," said the medic. "They usually mean ambush."

Tania is well known to many people in this oil town of 22,000 in southeast Bolivia, about 300 miles from La Paz, the capital. Her full name is believed to be Tania Gutierrez Baurer. She was a frequent visitor in February, a month before the fighting began, and because of a weakness for pasta became a regular at the Maietta restaurant, run by Italian Federico Forfori. He says she is about 29 with a deep voice and authoritative manner.

It was not known then, but at the time the guerrillas already had established a clandestine base 40 miles north of Camiri.

She is believed to have come on shopping or intelligence missions.

The fact the guerrillas brought Tania along for psychological warfare purposes is another indication to Bolivian military authorities here that the rebel band is largely an import from Cuba.

Many Eager To See Scout Jamboree

FARRAGUT STATE PARK, Idaho (AP) — Visitors anxious for a look-see at the World Boy Scout Jamboree, which officially began here Tuesday, poured into the park.

At one point Tuesday evening, cars were lined up bumper-to-bumper for four miles from the park's entrance to Athol, Idaho.

Although traffic was more brisk as the time for the pageant neared, the number through the gate as of 3 p.m. was 3,556, according to an Idaho State Police counter.

Four cars were involved in an afternoon accident but there were no injuries.

At the pageant itself, Scouts and visitors filled about two-thirds of the grass-covered Sutton arena, a natural amphitheater with a 65,000 person capacity.

"It has organizational refinements beyond the capacity of means of Bolivian Communists," said one officer.

The guerrillas, estimated at 80 to 100 men, appear to have opened up two fronts in the southeast part of the country. One group is known to be operating some 75 miles north of Camiri. The other has hit towns southwest of Santa Cruz, a prosperous oil and sugar center of 100,000 people 170 miles to the north.

On July 7, in the most daring stab since fighting began in late March, the guerrillas took over the small town of Samaipata, 60

Rising Aircraft Losses Over Vietnam Cause McNamara To Order Battleship

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rising aircraft losses over North Vietnam figured heavily in Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's decision to order up the battleship New Jersey for war duty, Pentagon sources say.

Officers estimated the 45,000-ton battleship, a naval behemoth of another era, may be able to do the work of roughly 50 planes a day, thus cutting down the number of U.S. aircraft exposed to Communist fire.

At the same time, Adm. Thomas H. Moorer, the new

chief of naval operations, stressed in an interview he views deployment of the battleship as an addition to, rather than a replacement for, tactical air strikes against the Communists.

To date the United States has lost more than 625 planes over the North in attacks against the same kinds of targets the New Jersey will be able to bombard with 1,900-pound shells—bridges, highways, supply dumps and defensive installations.

The battleship has enough armor to allow it to wade into the heaviest enemy gunfire currently in use along North Vietnam's coast. These include five-inch equivalent weapons capable of

sinking such lesser ships as destroyers.

McNamara approved Tuesday the Navy's recommendation to pull the New Jersey out of mothballs at the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard and add her 16-inch guns to Seventh Fleet forces now operating in the Gulf of Tonkin.

The Pentagon estimated it would take 9 or 10 months to get the 887-foot ship ready for its shakedown phase, which probably will be taken care of en route to Vietnam. Shakedown involves special crew training and test firing of the battleship's nine 16-inch and 20 5-inch guns.

Price of the reactivation was placed at \$27 million and sources estimated it would take \$12.5 million annually to operate the battleship with an abbreviated crew of 1,400 enlisted men and 70 officers. A full complement would be 2,700 men.

Trouble In Portland Albina Area Appears To Be Over

PORTLAND (AP) — The trouble in Portland's Albina District appeared to have ended Tuesday night.

Things were generally quiet and the area — scene of vandalism and arson on Sunday and Monday nights — returned to a normal summer pace.

A total of 115 persons — mostly Negroes — were arrested during the two nights of window breaking and fire setting. National Guard troops on standby during the height of the disturbances, were released by Gov. Tom McCall.

Tuesday's calm was attributed in part to a meeting earlier in the day between Mayor Terry Schruck and Albina youths and ministers.

The Negro teen-agers asked the mayor to help them get 300 jobs, provide better municipal service and housing conditions in Albina and withdraw heavy police patrols from the neighborhood.

One young woman, Beverly Williams, a Portland State College student, said the mayor "had missed the underlying im-

plications" of the Sunday and Monday disorders.

"It ought to be clear by now that Portland's Negroes are not content," she said.

Other youths asked for courses in Negro history to be offered in the city's high schools.

Some complained that few Portland neighborhoods have teen-age night clubs. "White kids can go anywhere they want," said one. "We go some place and there's a fuss."

The Rev. Sam Johnson, 34, told Mayor Schruck, "Right here in our own neighborhood, white people have all the jobs."

Schruck told the Negroes he would not make promises he couldn't keep. He said he could not offer jobs or change school curricula. "But I will use every influence and means I have to help," he said.

Adm. Moorer said the battleship may prove most useful in battering such targets as concrete and steel reinforced bunkers and artillery emplacements near the so-called Demilitarized Zone.

"No one will quarrel with the fact that a 16-inch shell is impressive—particularly those who listen to them whistle by," Moorer said in an interview a few hours after he was sworn in to succeed Adm. David L. McDonald.

The main advantage of the battleship, in addition to its heavier shells, is the long firing range. The New Jersey can stand six miles out and hit enemy targets 15 miles inland. Cruisers operating at that distance to avoid hostile fire have five miles less range with smaller eight-inch guns.

All blue ribbon winners of each group will be judged for the "Best of Dogs" ribbon.

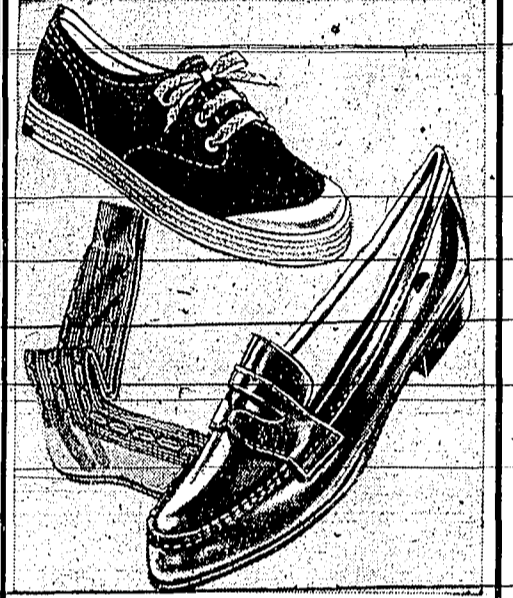
FCC To Use New Smoking Machine

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Trade Commission will use its new smoking machine to test the tar and nicotine content of about 50 brands of cigarettes.

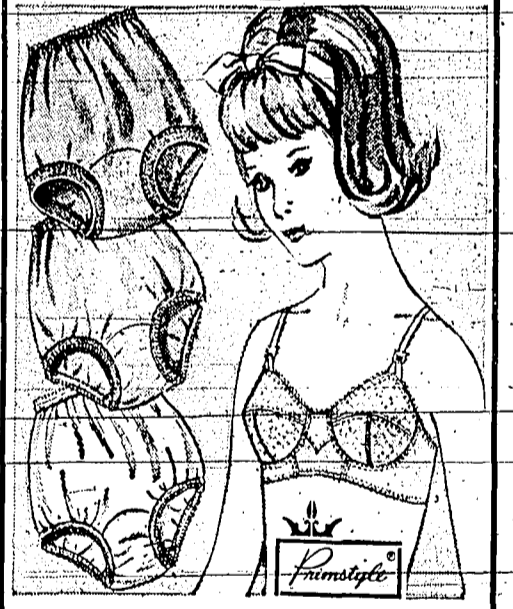

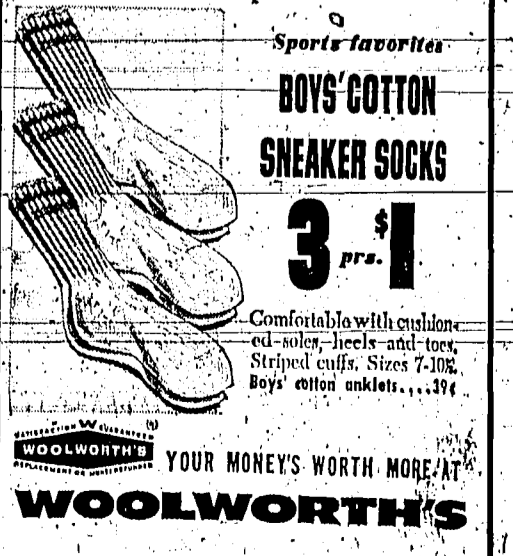

Soldier Goes AWOL To Fight In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — Louis Melendez wasn't supposed to be in Vietnam — but the Army says chances he'll be punished for deserting basic training are slight indeed.

After all, how many soldiers go absent without leave to fight in Vietnam?

That's what the 18-year-old Melendez did twice. The native of Bayamon, Puerto Rico, currently is at Walter Reed Military Hospital here, undergoing treatment for shrapnel wounds suffered during his second stint on the front lines.

He still wants to go back to Vietnam and "do something for my country," he told the Washington Post.

Melendez joined the Army last November and was assigned to training at Ft. Benning, Ga.

"But you know," he told the Post, "I was sitting there after three weeks of training and I had seven more weeks to go when I heard they wanted me to go to jump school, which was going to be another four weeks."

"That morning I read about how 250 Green Berets had been killed in a battle and that depressed me very much."

He said he deserted camp and took a plane from Atlanta to New York. He reported to Ft. Hamilton in Brooklyn, and there told officers he was home on emergency leave from Vietnam. He also said he was due back the next day but had lost his orders.

River Jordan Becomes Smuggler's Stream

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — The Biblical River Jordan has become a smugglers' stream for Arab people and produce moving clandestinely in and out of Israeli-occupied territory.

The crossings begin after nightfall when the searing heat of the Jordan Valley subsides and the west bank of the river is curfewed by Israeli army patrols.

Shopkeepers in Amman report that Arab truck drivers pay Israeli soldiers on the west bank 10 dinars — \$28 — per truck to look the other way while they drive loads of fruit and vegetables

across shallow fords in the river for the market in Amman. They pay again when they cross back into occupied territory for another load.

Arab refugees who fled from their homes on the west bank and are now crowded into desert camps around Amman report that many of their friends are crossing back to their homes by night. They pay Arab Palestinians five dinars — \$14 — per refugee to show them the river crossings and escort them past Israeli patrols.

The slow-flowing green waters of the Jordan are only five yards wide in places. The river is

easy to cross and bushes or orchards lining the banks in places provide good cover.

At least five Jordanians have been killed by Israeli troops in the secret nighttime crossings, Jordanian security officials report.

There is no way of estimating the number of trucks or people slipping across the river, but one Western official connected with the refugee camps said: "The traffic seems to be brisk and the Israeli soldiers must be making a lot of money."

"Hundreds of us are going back every night," said one refugee on the river bank. But

some officials estimate only a few dozen cross each night.

Seven weeks after the end of the war, refugees are still fleeing the occupied zone with Israeli permission, crossing in daylight over the Allenby bridge and the northern bridges at Damla.

Latest statistics show 64,500 refugees packed into camps around Amman, 45,000 of them in tent cities run by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency. The total number of refugees who fled to Jordan is estimated at 200,000.

Israel has announced it will let refugees return home starting Aug. 10. But the repatriation is deadlocked by Jordan's refusal to use repatriation forms headed "State of Israel" and Israel's refusal to use Red Cross forms.

More Federal Troops Leave Detroit Area

DETROIT (AP) — A second wave of federal troops began flying out of riot-wounded Detroit today as the nation's fifth-largest city coped with effects of last week's outbreak. Three battalions of the 82nd Airborne Division, boarded huge C130 transport planes and lifted off today from Selfridge Air Force Base, 20 miles northeast of Detroit. The 1,500 troops were en route to Ft. Bragg, N.C. Only about 1,200 of the 4,700 paratroopers sent into the city remained on duty. Tuesday 7,000 troops of the 101st Airborne Division left Tuesday for Ft. Campbell, Ky.

Responsibility for security rested with about 7,800 Michigan National Guardsmen, who remained under federal control, and with the 4,400-man Detroit police force. Detroit policemen went back to eight-hour shifts Tuesday for the first time since the riot broke out July 23.

Formation of a 37-member citizens resources committee dubbed "New Detroit" to stimulate and coordinate rebuilding of the sections ravaged by more than 2,000 fires was announced Tuesday.

The committee is made up of top auto company officials and labor leaders. Detroit department store president Joseph L. Hudson was named committee chairman.

The Nugents had left their 5-week-old son Patrick Lyndon in the White House with his grandparents, President and Mrs. Johnson, but they hadn't forgotten him. "He's fine—I haven't talked to him recently," quipped Pat, during intermission at the Imperial Theater, where he and Luci had joined a group of friends to see the musical "Cabaret."

Sniper Fire Erupts During Night, Shattering Curfew In Milwaukee

By FRANK S. JOSEPH MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — Sniper fire erupted in several locations Tuesday night, shattering Milwaukee's curfew. Gunfire pinned down police and National Guardsmen in the vicinity of their North Side command post during much of a three-hour outburst of gunfire in the predominantly Negro Inner Core district. Mayor Henry Maier lifted the curfew during daylight hours again today but said it would be restored tonight. Maier said Police Chief Harold E. Breier reported three persons were being questioned about the sniping. There were no reports of serious injury. Arrests continued Tuesday night for violations of the curfew that had checked rioting and most firebombing. The total arrest figure approached 890 today. Guardsmen and police fired at will in an area within eight blocks of Palmer and Lloyd, where the sniping broke out. The sound of small arms fire mingled with the heavy thud of 12-gauge police shotguns. National Guardsmen shot round after round of .30-caliber ammunition with World War II M-1 rifles. A sniper or snipers barraged the police emergency command post set up in a department store warehouse. Police doused the lights, hit the floor and traded shots for several minutes. Along Third Street, in a business district, police took cover behind a Brink's, Inc., armored truck and tried to hit snipers that appeared to be moving from roof to roof. During the sniper fights, officers and Guardsmen shot out street lights, plunging locations in darkness so they would not be good sniper targets. Calm returned to Milwaukee, the nation's 11th-largest city, jitters since Sunday night when the firebombing and rock-tossing began. Some Milwaukee housewives, worried that food supplies would dry up, rummaged around for their mothers' bread recipes and began baking. Groceries reported runs on flour, yeast and other baking supplies. And in the Inner Core itself, the daytime lifting of the curfew provided a chance for the curious to see for themselves what street violence does to a neighborhood. Police reported traffic jams along Third Street as residents cruised through the battered area.

Instant NCO

FT. BENNING, Ga. (AP) — Stripes on the sleeve, instead of bars on the shoulder, will mark the "90-day wonder" of the Vietnam war. A new term, "Instant NCO" will be the nickname for noncommissioned officers trained through 12-week classes at Ft. Benning under a program designed to produce thousands of new noncoms to lead fire teams and rifle squads. The program is patterned after the "90-day wonder" course which filled a shortage of officers in World War II. Officially titled the NCO Candidate Course, the new program is expected to turn out about 8,000 noncommissioned officers in 14 classes within a year.

Quakers Set Formula For Cease-Fire

By GEORGE W. CORNELL AP Religion Writer GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — The Quakers today offered a formula for a cease-fire in Vietnam and asked for a reconvening of the Geneva Conference to work out a peace settlement. To open the way for negotiations, they urged that the United States, North Vietnam and South Vietnam halt all military operations on a "cease-fire-unless-fired-upon basis." The appeal was drawn up in nine days of work by a special section of the Friends World Conference meeting here. Quaker representatives from 35 countries are attending. The delegates indicated general agreement on the proposal Tuesday, suggesting only minor revisions. The Quaker peace proposal said the National Liberation Front (Viet Cong) in South Vietnam should be represented at a reconvening of the Geneva Conference during the cease-fire. The statement also said any peace settlement should provide for "national independence and neutralization of Vietnam." Declaring that the Vietnam war "is solving and can solve nothing," the Quakers urged the world's peoples to demand that their governments withdraw all support from the war, and bring it to an end. "A dramatic act on the part of the U.S. and its allies, including the government of South Vietnam, is required in order to get negotiations started," the statement said. It then suggested the "cease-fire-unless-fired-upon" course with simultaneous international inspection and a request for reconvening the Geneva Conference.

Stokely Carmichael Advocates Negro Guerrilla Uprisings

By FENTON WHEELER HAVANA (AP) — Black Power advocate Stokely Carmichael called Tuesday for Negro guerrilla uprisings in U.S. cities and made threats against President Johnson, British Prime Minister Harold Wilson and other high U.S. officials. Declaring that Black Power advocates "are moving into urban guerrilla warfare in the United States," the militant Negro agitator told a three-hour news conference: "We have no alternative but to use aggressive armed violence in order to own the land, houses and stores inside our communities, and to control the politics of those communities." U.S. newsmen were barred from the news conference, but Carmichael's remarks were quoted by Havana Radio. George Ware of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, and Felix Greene, a British citizen reporting for the San Francisco Chronicle. Carmichael declared that Negro guerrillas "must develop a consciousness so that when people who are struggling get killed, the retaliation will be against the leaders of the West." "Let us develop a consciousness that when they touch one guerrilla, Lyndon Johnson, Dean Rusk, Robert McNamara and Harold Wilson must pay the price," he said. "We are not waiting for them to kill us. We will move to kill them first—or rather, we are working towards that goal." He presumably included Wilson because the Home Office last week banned him from Britain. "One good thing about the Vietnam war is that the United States has taught us how to kill," Carmichael declared later. "Our brothers returning from Vietnam are going to use that training well in the cities of the United States." The State Department is making preparations to revoke the passport of Carmichael, who came to Havana for the Communist-dominated congress of the Organization of Latin American Solidarity. The Justice Department is also investigating the activities of the 26-year-old militant, a native of Trinidad who was raised in New York's Harlem and the Bronx and is a naturalized U.S. citizen.

Clark Backs Action On Federal Troops

By STEPHEN M. AUGER WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark says federal troops were ready to be dispatched to riot-torn Detroit last week before Michigan Gov. George Romney asked for them. Clark told a Tuesday news conference Romney did not ask for federal troops to help quell the Detroit riot until nearly 11 a.m. on July 24, about eight hours after the governor had said he requested them. Outlining events during what Clark called that "tragic morning in American history," the attorney general said the first direct contact he had with Romney was at 2:40 a.m. He said the governor telephoned then and termed the situation in Detroit "very bad." He said Romney reported 80 unintended fires and widespread looting and said he thought he might need about 5,000 Army troops. But Clark said it was only after hours of back-and-forth telephoning between him and Romney that the governor finally sent a 10:46 a.m. telegram requesting the troops. Romney has said he requested the troops in a telephone call before 3 a.m. He said also Clark told him at first that an oral request would be satisfactory, but later demanded a written request and directed that he specifically there was an insurrection in Detroit which he was unable to control. Romney charged President Johnson with playing politics at the expense of the people of Detroit, and that Clark's demand for a written request was more political than legal. In announcing he was sending federal troops into Detroit, the President went to some lengths to emphasize he was doing so because of the inability of state and local officials to control the situation. He mentioned that point and Romney's name seven times in his brief statement to a nationwide television audience. The White House has said it considers the matter closed.

Mao Offers Forgiveness To Opponents

TOKYO (AP) — Mao Tse-tung has offered forgiveness to his opponents in Wuhan, making clear that the Red Chinese leader's foes still pose a major threat in the key industrial center. The offer came six days after Maoists warned that "heads may roll and blood may flow" in Wuhan, a central Chinese area of two million people where bloody clashes have been reported between Mao's supporters and those of President Liu Shao-chi. Peking Radio said today Mao has promised pardons, not only for the masses "deceived" by Liu but also for the "scoundrels" who have committed "grave offenses." Exactly what happened in the Wuhan area is still unclear, but the Maoists apparently regard the situation as a grave challenge to their leader's authority.

Envoy Denies Trip Is For Peace Plan

SEOUL (AP) - Clark M. Clifford denied today a report that he and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, presidential envoys on an Asian mission, are feeling out the Vietnam war allies about a possible peace proposal.

"The report was in error," Clifford said on his arrival with Taylor from New Zealand, Taylor talks with President Chung Hee Park and other South Korean officials.

"We have not discussed any peace plan. We discussed plans for aid and development of the war." That was his response to a request for comment on a statement by CBS television Tuesday night that President Johnson "is in the final throes" of deciding on a major peace gesture to the North Vietnamese to coincide roughly with the South Vietnamese presidential election Sept. 3.

Clifford and Taylor said they would discuss here "the next allied summit conference and any other points Park and other Korean leaders may wish to explore." But they said they were not here to reach any agreement of any kind.

They are here on the last leg of a tour which has already taken them to four other Vietnam war allies - South Vietnam, Thailand, Australia and New Zealand.

But early in July what appeared to be a heavy cold slowed Mays for three weeks, although he took only a week off—most of it in a San Francisco hospital.

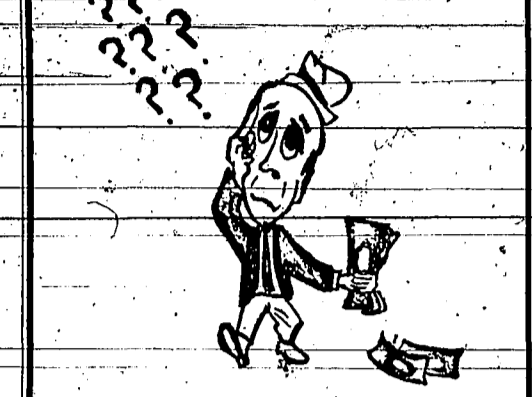

READING A HAND WITHOUT SEEING IT
East's four-heart bid put a lot of pressure on South but South had the sort of hand that could stand pressure. He simply tried Blackwood to check for aces and went to six spades when North showed one ace only. South knew that he was taking on North's diamonds. One way to get them would be to play the ace-king and a third diamond. This play would work if the queen dropped on those three leads. The other line of play would be to take a diamond finesse. That play would work if West held the queen of diamonds. Mathematically, the plays were about equal but South had some bidding to consider. East had bid four hearts and the play indicated that he held eight hearts to his partner's two. Each had followed to one spade so that nine East cards and three West cards had been accounted for. It appeared most likely that East would be quite short in diamonds. Then South knew a little about East's style. He had bid four hearts without the king or jack and with a loser in spades. It was very likely that he held only one diamond. This made the odds favor the finesse. South thought awhile longer to work out an alibi. If his play went wrong, led a diamond, played dummy's jack and claimed his slam to a chorus of "Well played!" from his partner and "lucky stiff!" from his opponents.
