are determined to cut more than \$1.5 billion" in spending.
"We are aiming at a cut of over \$2 billion as a means of holding civillan expenditures below the January estimate," Schultze continued.

Fowler said the spending estimate submitted in January for the year that began July 1 may now be exceeded by as much as \$8.5 billion, including \$4 billion for defense, and that revenues may be as much as \$7.0 billion. may be as much as \$7 billion less than had been anticipated. Fowler sought to show that the proposed tax increase is less licavy than those enacted under comparable circumstances in

the past. He said that during World War II personal income taxes were raised by the equivalent of 730 per cent and the taxes associated with the Korean

War were equivalent to about a 28 per cent surcharge.
In contrast, he said, a married couple with two children and a \$10,000 salary typically—would pay about \$111 more under the pending surtax proposal, or not much more than one per cent of total income.



Baffling Problems-No Key

WASHINGTON (AP) — This country's two most baffling problems—city riots and the war in Vietnam—are like handcuffs on America for no one has found the key to either. Since this year's riots the air has been packed with suggestions for preventing or eliminating them: more_jobs_for_the_impoverished, more money for their areas,

more recreation, more educa-tion, sterner police actions.

It's odd how often the people of goodwill in their ideas for a cure concentrate on more be-nevolence and ignore or hardly mention the criminal elements even though they are a product of slum conditions.

with great speed Congress began hearings and President Johnson set up a distinguished commission to investigate riots. But it's doubtful any remedial legislation will result from the congressional—hearings this

year.
And there won't be any solu tions from the President's panel this year. It won't finish its work until about mid-1968. Meanwhile, there may be more

riots this year and worse ones This past weekend the United This past weekend the United States hugely intensified its bombing in Vietnam and Johnson announced he would send up = to=50,000 = more = troops = to -Vietnam by next June 30, bringing the total there to 525,000.

That will be about 500,000 more than were there in early 1965. But, despite the U.S. troop buildup and the escalation of the bombing which didn't begin un-til early 1965, victory looks no closer now than then.

Johnson himself, repeating what he said last January, told Congress last week: "I wish I Congress last week: "I wish I could report to you that the conflict in Victnam is almost over. This I cannot do. "We face more cost, more

loss, more agony. For the end is not yet. I cannot promise that it will come this year-or come next year."

At the rate it's going it could go on for a number of years, for as the United States increases its effort, the North Vietnamese tensify_theirs,

And this week the New York Times, in a full-page report on the stalemate after all the optimistic utterances by other U.S. officials, hit at the war's most sinister cancer. This is the indifference of the masses of peasants about the outcome.

Yet, over the weekend Clark

clifford, one of Johnson's spe-cial envoys to sound out think-ing among U.S. aliles in this war, said they agreed their goal "is the right of self-determination" of the people of

South Vietnam.

All this makes Vietnam, aside from the shooting part of it, look exactly like Vietnam under the exactly like Vietnam under the dictatorship of President Ngo Dinh Diem from 1954 until he

was assassinated in 1963.

By then, and as a result of Diem's failure to build a government desired and supgovernment desired and sup-ported by the masses, the Viet Cong overran the countryside and brought on the American in-try to keep Vietnam out of com-volvement to make one more try to keep Vietnam out of com-munism. interest to the plain citizen, then, when Reporter Jerry Kluttz charged in his column that Don

Also a room that is a little cool is better for both his skin. cool is better for both his skin and his general metabolism than a foom that is too warm.

Don't dress your baby in non-porous clothing with tight elas-tic bands. During his nap put a knitted soaker over his diaper rather than rubber pants. This will take up excess moisture and still allow air to reach his skin.
If you use a nonporous sheet
or mattress cover, always place an absorbent quilted pad be-neath this and the baby to soak up excessive moisture, The chief means of preventing

skin problems is to keep your baby's skin clean. If you enjoy giving him his bath he will sense your enjoyment and look forward to it, especially if he has certain toys he can play with only at that time.

Whether you sponge or tub your baby, get everything you will need within easy reach be-fore you start the bath. If, after

-Good-care-of-your-baby's-tend---you have-started, you find that you have forgotten something, take the baby with you. It is unsafe to leave him alone in onds.
Use a cornstarch base bath

powder in the folds of your baby's skin after you dry him. This will help to keep the skin dry. It is more absorbent than talcum powder and doesn't form beads in the skin folds. Don't shake the powder on him directly but pour or sprinkle it on your hand then apply it gently so he won't inhale the dust.

Proper laundering of your baby's clothes is important in the prevention of skin irrita-tions. Diapers should be treat-ed with an antiseptic rinse. Nev-er use boric acid for this purer use boric acid for this pur-pose. The rinse will prevent the formation of ammonia in dia-pers up to 15 hours after they become soiled. If you use a dia-per service, choose one that of-fers this kind of added protec-

tion. On warm bright days expose your baby to the sun but protect his face and limit the exposure to two minutes on the first day. 




