

### Scientists Believe They Can Prevent Viral Infection

WASHINGTON (AP)—Scientists for a drug firm believe they have found a new way to prevent viral infection which also could be used to fight any types of cancer found to be of viral origin.

Five researchers for Merck Sharp & Dohme said Monday they discovered how to stimulate the human body to produce a natural germ-fighting chemical called interferon. This is a protein produced by the body but sometimes not enough is produced to overcome virus attacks.

A Merck spokesman said it's established that some types of cancer are of viral origin, the new discovery could have significant implications.

The researchers have used three interferon-inducing substances in animal tests and say the results were promising. They said the medication may be tried on humans.

Interferon slows the spread of infection by preventing viral reproduction in cells and works against several types of viruses. Consequently, if the research is fully successful, the use of a single interferon-inducing medication could replace the variety of vaccinations now given to prevent several diseases.

The research team, headed by Dr. Maurice R. Hilleman, plans to publish three reports on its work in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

Hilleman, working for the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research during the 1950s, was one of those alerting the nation in advance of the first Asian flu outbreak to hit the United States. The others on his team are George P. Lamson and Drs. Alfred A. Tytell, A. Kirk Field and Marjorie Nemes.

# Proposed Gas Rate Boost Is Withdrawn

BOISE (AP) — Intermountain Gas Co. announced Monday afternoon it has withdrawn its application for a rate increase.

The company said the withdrawal had been approved by the Public Utilities Commission, which earlier had set a hearing on the proposal for Wednesday.

Ralph Gibson, company president, who announced the withdrawal, said "a continuing study of economic indicators in the company service area and extensive interviews with gas customers" led to the decision. The company distributes natural gas throughout southern Idaho.

"Our first obligation as a public utility is to the customers we serve," Gibson said. "It is the intention of Intermountain Gas Co., as always, to provide the best possible service to the customers of our growing area at the least possible cost consistent with sound management."

"In order to accomplish this goal, in the best interests of our customers, we plan to utilize every means available to defer the necessity of a rate increase at this time."

"Recently completed projections of anticipated gas consumption indicate that this may be accomplished without material effect on the financial structure of our growing company."

"We plan to continue working very closely with the IPUC in the coming months to initiate an ongoing program of stringent operating controls and continuing review of all conditions involved, in order to guarantee the success of this program."

The proposed rate increase would have brought the company about \$3 million in additional revenue annually, the PUD said but increases would have varied for different classes of customers.

# Firm Aides Given Time To Set Pleas

BOISE (AP) — Five former officials of the closed Idaho Savings and Loan Association were given additional time Monday to enter pleas to charges of falsifying corporate records.

All had been scheduled to enter their pleas Monday in Fourth District Court.

But Judge Merlin S. Young reset the time as Aug. 21 for D. Spencer Groat, Provo, Utah, the principal stockholder in the closed institution, and Sept. 1 for the others.

The others are Horace E. Hayes, Preston; D. Wain A. Knigge, Boise; Ernest A. Garrett, McCammon, and Harold E. Hogan, Eagle.

Those five and Alexander H. Walker Jr., Salt Lake City, were indicted on the fraud charges by a Fourth District Court grand jury. Walker is scheduled to appear at an extradition hearing in Salt Lake City on Aug. 31.

The indictments alleged the six falsified corporate records in an amount of more than \$7 million.

The savings and loan association, which lacked insurance of its accounts, closed on July 6, 1966.

A part of its assets were sold last week to Equitable Savings and Loan Association of Portland, Ore., which announced plans to open offices within the next few weeks in Boise, Pocatello, Idaho Falls and Twin Falls, the communities in which IS&L had offices.

# Quaker Ends His One-Man Sit-In

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Quaker has ended his one-man sit-in at the Treasury Department which he began May 29 to protest the department's refusal to license shipments of medical supplies to North Vietnam and its freeze of two bank accounts the Quakers opened for Vietnam relief.

Ross Flanagan of New York said Quakers now feel they must find more direct ways of helping relieve civilian suffering which results from "the ever-increasing brutality of this war."

**ATTEMPTS CONTINUED**  
LEWISTON, Idaho (AP) — Attempts to enlist Idaho's financial support of a brochure on the Lewis-Clark Trail will be continued, an Idaho member of the Lewis-Clark Trail Commission says.

David Ainsworth, Salmon, told commission members meeting Monday in Lewiston he would continue efforts to gain some financial support from the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development for the project, agreed upon so far by eight of the 11 states through which the historic trail winds.

# State, Local Governments Got \$25 More Taxes In Fiscal 1966

CHICAGO (AP) — State and local governments collected an average of \$25 more taxes in fiscal 1966 than in the previous year, a study showed today.

The state-local tax take averaged \$290 for every man, woman and child in the nation.

The increase followed a trend shown since the Commerce Clearing House began annual reports on combined state and local taxes in 1962.

In five years the per capita state-local tax burden has increased as much as \$114 in Hawaii and \$101 in New York. The trend was less marked in the south, where increases in five years have been less than \$50 in a half-dozen states and only \$37 in Texas.

The range of per capita state-local taxes in 1966 was from South Carolina's \$188 to New York's \$410, with California, \$395, and Hawaii, \$365, next at the upper end. Six states—South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Kentucky and Tennessee—collected less than \$200, and the next two also were southern states—Georgia and North Carolina. The per capita median was \$287, an increase of \$12 from 1965, the CCH study of census bureau statistics showed.

The Commerce Clearing House is a private reporting agency on tax and business law.

New York was the only state to collect more than \$400 per capita state-local taxes in 1966 but 14 other states and the District of Columbia had per capita tax burdens of more than \$300. The states were California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, Washington, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

In 1965 only six states passed the \$300 mark and none was over \$400. Revised figures showed that New York topped the list in 1965 as well with \$372.

At the bottom of the scale, however, there was less difference. In 1966 eleven states—Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia—had per capita tax burdens of \$220 or under, while in 1965 thirteen states fell in that category.

Amounts of the increases in per capita tax burdens over fiscal 1965 ranged from a low of \$11 in North Dakota to a high of \$87 in Hawaii, in addition to North Dakota, five states—Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Texas—had increases of \$15 or less, while five states besides Hawaii—Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Washington and Wyoming—had increases exceeding \$40.

State and local tax collections rose to the record high of \$66.7 billion during the period, a jump of \$5.5 billion, CCH reported. Leading the way was New York with collections \$7.485 billion. Two states—Illinois and Pennsylvania—topped the \$3 billion mark and three—Michigan, Ohio and Texas—collected more than \$2 billion each.

More than \$1 billion was collected by each of nine states—Florida, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, North Carolina and Wisconsin.

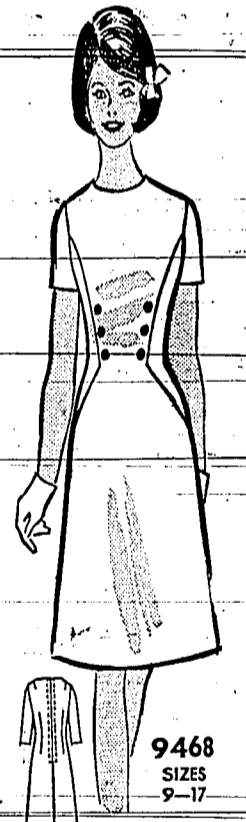

### Negro Mayor In Michigan Is Resigning

FLINT, Mich. (AP) — Mayor Floyd J. McCree, the only Negro in the nation heading a city of 200,000 or larger, declares he is resigning because the city commission has rejected an open occupancy housing law.

"I'm not going to sit up here any longer and live an equal-opportunity lie," the 44-year-old mayor said Monday night after the commission voted down the law, 5-3.

The auto plant foreman, elected in November 1956, said he will resign Monday.

McCree said he also will resign as commissioner of Flint's heavily-Negro third ward. He had represented the third ward for eight years when he was elected mayor by his fellow commissioners. About 25 per cent of Flint's 200,000 residents are Negroes.

"I can no longer serve in good conscience on a commission which does not represent the needs of all citizens," McCree said. He is the only Negro on the commission.

He has been an avid supporter of the proposed open occupancy law since it was proposed last year.

Commissioners rushed to prepare a final draft of the ordinance last week, just two weeks after violence spread to Flint and a number of other Michigan cities after Detroit erupted in the worst civil outbreak in recent American history. Flint is 60 miles northwest of Detroit.

The ordinance would have banned discrimination in housing and home financing. It would have established machinery for investigation of discrimination complaints.

### Sailor Saved After 3 Days In Atlantic

NEW YORK (AP) — A sailor rescued after clinging for three days to the wreckage of a yacht in the Atlantic was rushed today, sunburned and dazed, to a hospital. He was suffering from exposure and fatigue.

A Coast Guard cutter carried Chris Brooks, 22, to a dock where an ambulance from the Staten Island Public Health Service Hospital picked him up at about 4 a.m.

Again and again, Brooks asked for drinking water. "I don't think I'll ever stop being thirsty," he said.

There was still no word on Brooks' four companions who were reported missing after the yacht, a 64-foot converted shrimp boat called the Lanran, sank last Friday.

One of the missing, according to Brooks, is Dr. James Dodge, 56, of Hamilton Township, N.J. Brooks said that the Lanran, owned by Dodge, had either capsized or been smashed in a storm about 54 miles northeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C., four days ago.



### Jane Darwell, 87, Dies In Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Actress Jane Darwell, who often told friends her life and work had been completely without hardship, died as she was about to embark on a new film role.

The 87-year-old actress spoke of her upcoming role in "Seven from San Antonio" at a party last Friday. She described it as: "A lusty old gal with lots of spirit—something I can sink my teeth into—and I still have my own teeth!"

Miss Darwell died Sunday at the Motion Picture Country home. She had suffered a light stroke last Memorial Day and a heart attack last week.

She won an Academy Award in 1939 for her role as Ma Joad in "The Grapes of Wrath" and later said it was her favorite of the more than 200 films she made. Her career in films, stage and television spanned 61 years.

Miss Darwell was born Patti Woodard in Palmyra, Mo. She was the daughter of W.R. Woodard, wealthy contractor and president of the Louisville Southern Railroad.

He says he has never been ill in his life, has never lost a day's work, and has never taken a vacation.

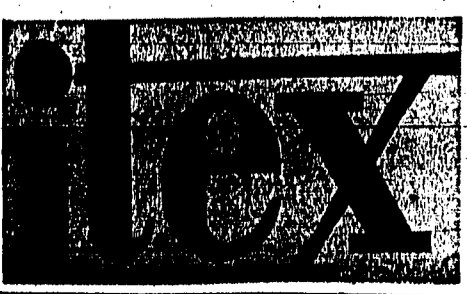
