

# Fairbanks Damage Near \$200 Million

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — Flood-desolated Fairbanks counted its known dead at three and damage at upwards of \$200 million today as round-the-clock evacuations continued and massive assistance efforts were mobilized.

About half of this Interior Alaska city's 30,000 residents had been evacuated by helicopters and river boats to refugee centers since Tuesday. The exodus still went on.

Brown, silted floodwaters of the wild Chena River, which slices through the center of the city, covered parts of Fairbanks to a depth of nine feet.

Six buildings had been destroyed by fire since Monday night and the threat of a holocaust was ever-present. The deep, swift water made fire fighting impossible.

At least three bodies had been recovered, one of them a child. A sense of urgency spurred relief efforts. Freezing weather was only two months away, and after that the bitter cold of winters that see temperatures drop to 60 below.

"We're going to need help—and we're going to have to wait in a hell of a hurry," said Mayor H. A. Boucher.

The worst of the flood appeared over. The Chena dropped six inches during the night and the Weather Bureau said the rain should end after a few light showers this afternoon.

Earlier, Gov. Walter J. Hickel said the flood would have greater impact on the state than the Good Friday earthquake of March 1964.

"Every piece of property has been touched," he said.

Even if there was no more rain, one forecaster said, it would take days for the river to return to the flood level.

Planes brought rations, medicine, typhoid serum for 40,000 people, and federal disaster and rescue personnel including doctors, nurses and Red Cross workers. The Army set up water purification units and handed out field rations to refugees.

The mayor, who estimated total damage starting at \$150 to \$200 million, said about 10,000 people were moved to evacuation centers by the Alaska National Guard, Army and civilian helicopters and boats manned by civilian, National Guardsmen and police.

Hickel said mass evacuation of the city was being considered, "because there will be no way to feed or house all of the residents" if they remain where they are.

But immediate mass evacuation was thought impossible because all roads and railroads were blocked by the flood. Only the Fairbanks International Airport remained open for emergency commercial and military flights.

The only telephone communication with the city was to a heavily sandbagged Alaska communications system building where disaster headquarters were set up.

Boucher estimated that 75 percent of the business establishments suffered major damage. Only a few homes were spared heavy damage, and some were reported crumbling from the pressure of the surging floodwaters.

"It's terrible! It's terrible!" Hickel kept repeating after a tour of the downtown area with the mayor late Tuesday. "I can't believe it! I just can't believe it!" Boucher added.

# Navy Pilots Accused Of Costly 'Game'

WASHINGTON (AP) — There's a hint of an enormously expensive game going on among Navy pilots operating off North Vietnam. The goal: get rid of every bomb and fly often to keep up combat records.

The Navy officially says nobody's playing it, but a former aviator says "it was common knowledge all the time I was aboard," and a ranking admiral says he got word from the top that such reported antics weren't to be tolerated.

Privately, some military officers say the practice went on in World War II and Korea and is still going on to some extent.

Waler, an AI Skyraider pilot aboard the carrier *Ticonderoga* until his discharge after nine years' service in February, said pilots were told to beat the other carriers' records on numbers of bombing missions.

"We would zip up and down the coast and unload, or dump them in the water," Waler said. "That way, the carrier would get credit for a sortie."

Waler said Navy pilots were risking their lives against cheap or worthless targets and often got sent out in dangerously foul weather on what he called meaningless missions.

Except for targets in Hanoi or Haiphong, Waler said, there are few profitable sites to hit in North Vietnam.

Within hours the Navy produced some top combat-proven officers to explain Waler's remarks.

Rear Adm. D.C. Richardson, commander of Task Force 77 on *Yankee* Station off Vietnam until last May, denied there was any formal sortie race among Navy pilots but he indicated that plenty of enthusiastic competition was underway.

Adm. David L. McDonald, former chief of naval operations, "took me aside before I went out and said 'I've had word of sortie races and want no part of it,'" Richardson said.

Richardson said top Navy people had "been aware of this thing" for the past two years.

The admiral disputed Waler's statements about bomb-dumping, but only in degree and reasons.

# House Attention Turns To Benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House turns attention from income taxes to boosted Social Security benefits and taxes asked by President Johnson, with prospects appearing bright for passage.

Scheduled to open today was debate on a bill that would raise the Social Security benefits of the nation's 22 million present recipients and of all future recipients.

The mammoth measure not only would give a 12½ percent or greater raise to all pensioners but would make dozens of other changes in the various programs provided for in the Social Security Act.

It also would hike the system's taxable base from \$8,500 to \$7,600—meaning a Social Security tax boost of \$4 a year next year for anyone making as much as \$7,600.

One of the most controversial of the proposed changes would establish new, stricter rules of eligibility for medicare programs such as New York State's.

These are federally-aided state programs of health services for persons not indigent, but considered unable to handle all their medical expenses.

Some states have broadened the financial standards for eligibility enough to take in large proportions of their population. The medicare program is not connected with medicare.

Other controversial amendments would require states to put more emphasis on job training and welfare opportunities in their federally-aided welfare programs.

There appeared to be little opposition, however, to the sections of the bill providing more money for beneficiaries of the basic programs for the aged, widows and dependent children.

The new scales would mean, for example, that the typical retired couple now receiving a little more than \$130 a month would receive about \$150. The minimum payment would go up from \$40 to \$50 a month.

Under the procedures laid down Monday by the Rules Committee, House members will have no opportunity to amend the measure, but only to pass or defeat it. It appeared likely to be passed intact in the House, but to face strenuous Senate efforts to revise it.

The Cassia county fair opened Wednesday at Burley with the fairgrounds buzzing with exhibitors and persons working at food booths and connected with horse racing. At Fairfield, 4-H members were completing their exhibits for the annual Camas county 4-H fair Thursday through Saturday as the fall season in Magic Valley rolled into the third week.

Judging was slowed at the Cassia fair because of the increased number of entries, judges said. Judging of entries in the women's department and 4-H projects was to be completed Wednesday morning, but it was expected it would take until late afternoon.

Livestock judging contest started Wednesday morning, along with beef fitting and showing contest. Pari-mutuel horse racing, with 9 races scheduled, opened at 1 p.m. and will be held at that time through Saturday.

# Merger Agreement Is Reached

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An agreement for merging Pacific West Coast and Bonanza air lines was announced Tuesday. The combination would create a system serving all Pacific Coast states and much of the Intermountain area from Calgary, Alta., and Great Falls, Mont., to Phoenix, Ariz.

A plan for merging Pacific West Coast and Bonanza previously had been approved by managements of those lines. The new agreement adds Bonanza.

Pacific is headquartered in San Francisco and serves California, Nevada and Oregon. West Coast, headquartered in Seattle, flies to Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Utah and Montana and to Calgary.

Bonanza is headquartered in Phoenix and serves Arizona, Utah, Nevada and California.

# W. W. Frantz Is Chamber Coordinator

W. W. Frantz, retired Twin Falls Postmaster, has been employed by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce as membership coordinator, according to Earl Faulkner, president of the Chamber's board of directors.

Mr. Frantz's duties will be to call on chamber members and prospective members to acquaint them with various activities the chamber is involved in.

Mr. Faulkner said that although those involved in the chamber are doing a "fine job, we want to work closer with our members and let them know what the chamber is doing for Twin Falls."

The board of directors for the organization, according to Mr. Faulkner, believes in the slogan adopted in 1965 that "together we can do better." They also believe, he said, that a membership coordinator can do a great deal in building a bigger and better Chamber of Commerce as well as keeping members informed about what is going on.

Mr. Frantz has been a resident of Twin Falls since 1919. In 1920 he was employed by the Post Office Department as a substitute clerk and carrier and in 1949 had worked his way to appointment as postmaster. He held this position until retirement in 1962.

Mr. Frantz is a World War I veteran, a member of the American Legion, the Kiwanis Club, the Elks and the Twin Falls County Draft Board. In 1942 he was awarded one of the highest Scouting honors, the Silver Beaver, and in 1949 was presented with the Jaycees' outstanding citizen award.

# Administration Position On War Policy Changes

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's Vietnam critics and backers see in testimony by the U. S. Pacific commander the emergence of a new administration position that the conflict can be won only through heavier bombing of the North.

Critics attacked what they viewed as a policy shift ending hopes for a negotiated settlement, while backers called it more likely to make North Vietnam sue for peace.

Johnson remained publicly uncommitted on Adm. U.S. Grant Sharp's contention that the ground war in the South is defensive in nature and on the argument that heavier bombing offers the best chance of getting North Vietnam to sue for peace.

But the release of testimony by Sharp that the war must be won by air attacks on enemy supply and infiltration targets convinced many senators that his views had full White House approval.

Chairman John Stennis, D-Miss., made public Tuesday testimony taken in a closed session of his Senate preparedness subcommittee Aug. 9 in which the admiral said:

"We must continue these operations in the North. They are the offensive element of our strategy. No war is ever brought to a successful conclusion by defensive action alone."

Chairman J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said release of Sharp's full testimony by the Pentagon after the subcommittee had rejected a previously heavily-censored version indicated the administration is taking the position the war can be ended only by bombing the North.

"This evidently means more and bigger bombings, precluding any possibility of a lull which might invite any offer for negotiations," Fulbright said.

In the House, Rep. Olin E. Teague, D-Tex., said Fulbright should apologize for his previous declaration that bombings near Red China were "stupid" and "invited Chinese intervention."

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., another severe critic of Johnson's policies, said in an interview: "The Pentagon is taking over foreign policy. 'We are near a military takeover,' he said. 'Despite the charades of democracy with which they clothe it, a military takeover is not impossible in this country.'"

# Disciples Off For National Band Contest

Conservatively-haired and extremely excited, the Disciples took off Wednesday for a crack at fame and fortune after bidding a boyishly dignified farewell to numerous parents, buddies and girl friends.

The group, composed of five 18-year-old 1967 graduates of Twin Falls High School, left for West Coast plans at 8:40 a.m. to compete as Idaho's representative in the national Jaycee-sponsored "Battle of the Bands" in Braintree, Mass., about 10 miles south of Boston. Their expenses are being paid by the Twin Falls Jaycees.

The local rock and roll band will face competition from 28 other groups who have placed at the head of state contests from Maine to California. The national winning band will receive a movie and recording contract and several other prizes, including scholarships and new cars for each group member.

# Senators Battle Forest Fire Near Challis

CHALLIS, Idaho (AP) — Crews continued today to battle a forest fire which has burned more than 200 acres of timberland along the Middle Fork of the Salmon River in Idaho's Primitive Area.

The fire in the Challis National Forest, broke out Sunday night but was believed controlled Monday afternoon after burning only 12 acres.

It flared up again, however, broke control lines and since has continued to spread across the rugged Primitive Area, which has no roads. Crews must either hike in or be ferried in by plane and helicopter.

# Senate Won't Back Military Aid Program

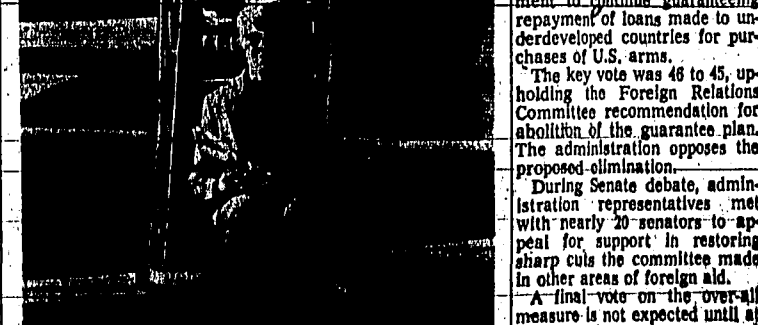
WASHINGTON (AP) — The administration has suffered a Senate setback on its military assistance program and is showing heightened concern over other parts of President Johnson's 1967 foreign aid bill.

The Senate refused Tuesday to allow the Defense Department to continue guaranteeing repayment of loans made to underdeveloped countries for purchases of U.S. arms.

The key vote was 46 to 45, upholding the Foreign Relations Committee recommendation for abolition of the guarantee plan. The administration opposes the proposed elimination.

During Senate debate, administration representatives met with nearly 20 senators to appeal for support in restoring sharp cuts the committee made in other areas of foreign aid.

A final vote on the overall measure is not expected until at least late this week.

# Canadian Mounties Hunt Killer

SHELL LAKE, Sask. (AP) — Royal Canadian Mounted Police set up roadblocks and turned bloodhounds loose in Saskatchewan farm country today as they pressed the search for the killer of nine members of a Canadian family.

Only a 4-year-old girl was spared in the James Peterson farm house near Shell Lake Tuesday. Bullets from a .22-caliber weapon killed Peterson, 47, his wife Evelyn, 42, and seven of their eight children.

Storekeeper Earl Dallan of Shell Lake said the family was well liked and hadn't "an enemy in the world."

Coroner Dr. Calvin S. Lambert of Leoville said "I don't think there was a suicide" because no weapon was found. Police Inspector Brian Sawyer said there was no apparent motive for the slayings.

"Mounties" set up roadblocks and were searching the surrounding bush with dogs, Sawyer said, and a search party of 250 persons was "ready to go."

The massacre was discovered by W.J. Lange, a neighbor of the Petersons, when Lange came to the one-story farmhouse to seek help with his hay. Lange found 4-year-old Phyllis unharmed in bed with two of her dead sisters.

Lange said he opened the door of the Peterson home when his knock went unanswered, adding that he thought he would kid Peterson about sleeping so late. Then Lange spotted Peterson's body by the kitchen door. The house had not been ransacked.

Lange found the keys to Peterson's 1957 station wagon and drove to Shell Lake four miles away to call police.

Dr. Lambert said all the victims had been shot with a .22-caliber gun. Police found five spent cartridges on the farm property.

Mrs. Peterson and her 1-year-old son were found dead in the front yard. The mother and infant must have jumped through a window which was found ajar, the coroner said.

The children slain were: Jean, 17, Mary, 13, Dorothy, 11, Pearl, 9, William, 5, Collin, 2, and Larry 1.

# Hearing Set Sept. 5 For Lawsuit In Recall Move

BOISE (AP) — Judge Merlin S. Young set Sept. 5 for a hearing in Fourth District Court in a lawsuit challenging an attorney general's opinion that a United States Senator cannot be recalled.

The action was filed by Boise attorney Eugene McCoy, acting in behalf of Ronald Rankin of Coeur d'Alene. Rankin attempted to file a preliminary petition Monday asking the recall of Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho.

Secretary of State Pete T. Cenarrusa refused to accept it, relying on the advice of Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shepard.

Shepard, in an opinion, said a United States Senator is an official of the federal government and not subject to recall under state law.

Young instructed Cenarrusa either to accept the petition, or say at the hearing why he will not do so. Cenarrusa said he will be represented at the hearing by the attorney general's office.

The legal action had been anticipated. Rankin, in presenting the petitions to Cenarrusa, said he was doing so simply to set the stage for the court test.

Rankin said the recall move, as far as Church is concerned, "is dead." But he said he wanted to reverse the attorney general's opinion so that it could not serve as a precedent in the event of future recall efforts, in Idaho or elsewhere.

In the court petition Rankin said Idaho's recall law provides that recall petitions "for persons who are by law required to file nominating petitions with the Secretary of State of the state of Idaho, shall be filed with the secretary of state."

Nominating petitions for United States Senator are filed with the secretary of state.

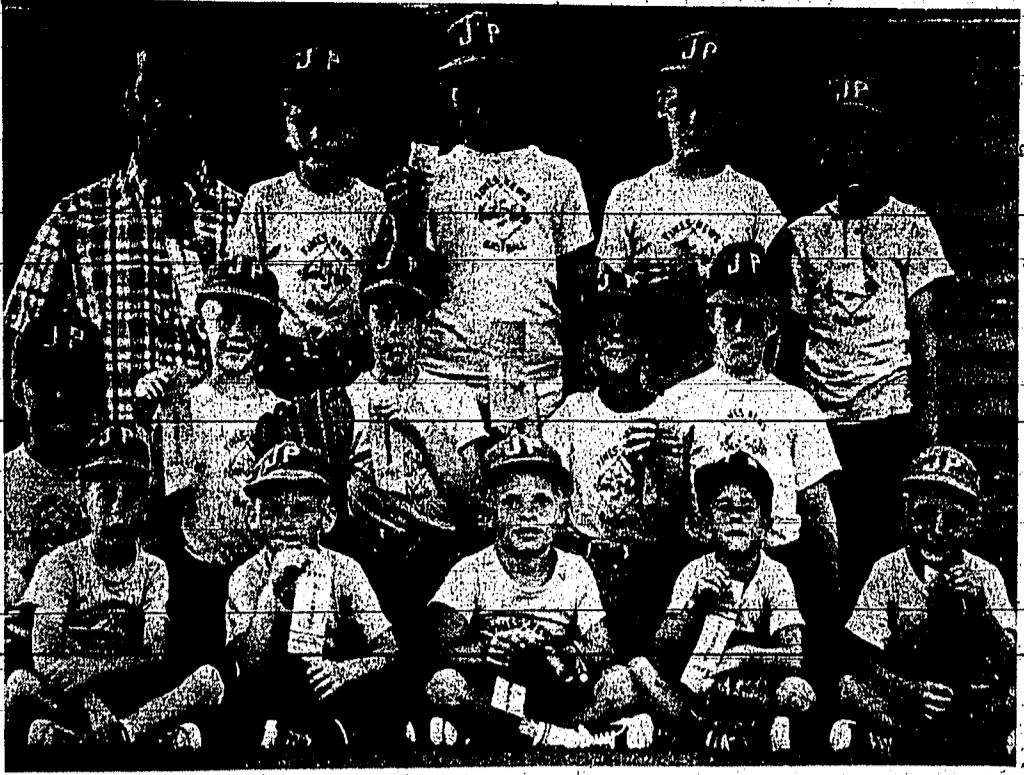

### Scotland Yard On Trail Of International Smugglers

By RODNEY PINDER LONDON (AP) Scotland Yard police believe they are on the trail of an international gold smuggling ring financing Chinese Communist terrorism and rioting in Hong Kong, police sources said today.

Submachine guns, rifles, revolvers, ammunition and molds for counterfeit coins were uncovered in raids Tuesday on a rambling Bedfordshire farm house and a bakery shop in Middlesex.

Sources said the detention of several British businessmen who make regular trips abroad is planned. Messages were dispatched to Interpol and other police forces in continental Europe and in the Far East.

Former British speedway ace Francis "Squire" Waterman, 45, and his fiancée, Avril Preston, 38, were charged Tuesday with attempted illegal exportation of gold. Customs officers stripped Waterman's car as it was about to be taken aboard a French ferry at Newhaven, England. They found \$28,000 in gold bars.

British intelligence reports show that recent troubles and riots in the British colony of Hong Kong have doubled the price of gold on the black market. The bullion is said to be urgently needed to help finance the Communist-led rioting against British colonial authority and to supply arms and ammunition.

Communist attempts to cripple British authority have so far been frustrated. More than 3,000 persons have been arrested on charges of terrorism and rioting, and Hong Kong police have smashed dozens of Communist headquarters and hideouts, seizing large stores of weapons and explosives.

Police raided the red-brick country house at Bedfordshire at dawn Tuesday. Bullets and gun bores of arms found there were matched with shells known to have been used in some of England's biggest armed gold thefts.

Officers collected dies for counterfeiting and other forgery equipment from the house and outbuildings.

### Government May Correct Roadside Hazards

By GAYLORD SHAW WASHINGTON (AP) — With \$30 billion already invested in 25,000 miles of interstate highways, the federal government is preparing to spend perhaps hundreds of millions more to correct roadside hazards built into many of the super expressways.

Belatedly, the government now realizes that thousands of miles of interstate highways simply aren't as safe as they could be — that they are lined with faulty guardrails, poorly constructed median barriers, badly placed signs, light poles and other obstacles.

Prodded by the Bureau of Public Roads, states are drafting corrective programs. The over-all cost of these won't be known until sometime next year, but one knowledgeable source pegs the price at several hundred millions.

The problem dates back more than a decade, when work was beginning on the \$50-billion interstate program. At that time, some road builders now admit, planners underestimated the dangers that might be posed by roadside obstacles.

And although research in the intervening years produced safer highway hardware, many of the undesirable features continued to be built into the new highways until at present "the hazards are as widespread as they are dangerous — they exist from coast to coast," says Rep. John A. Blatnik, D-Minn., chairman of a House subcommittee investigating highway design defects.

Some examples:

- It's been well-known in engineering circles that lightweight, breakaway poles that snap off harmlessly when struck by a car were available for roadside signs and light fixtures. But many states continue to erect signs and lights on heavy steel poles mounted in concrete bases, pillars of peril for any vehicle that smashes into them.
- Accident records show some guardrails steer careening cars head-on into unyielding structures like bridge abutments. With little extra expense, these rails could be bolted onto the inside surface of the abutment, allowing a car to slide safely by.
- Some states bury guardrail ends in the ground, but many others leave the end exposed — in position to skewer out-of-control vehicles.
- Trees, large ones, fully as deadly as steel and concrete, dot many roadsides. Among these potential hazards are some saplings planted in the beautification program promoted by Lady Bird Johnson. A few months ago the government banned such plantings within 30 feet of the road.
- The list is longer. Massive concrete bridge piers with no protecting guardrail. Median

barriers of bridge rails too weak to deflect a car back onto the pavement. Interchange areas so cluttered with obstacles that they resemble military tank traps.

Just as it does for interstate construction costs, the federal government will pick up the tab for 90 per cent of the corrective programs.

And Washington officials won't have to go far to get an idea of how expensive this will be. They can find a prime example in Interstate 495, a 66-mile, \$172.5-million beltway encircling the nation's capital.

After Blatnik committee investigators catalogued the beltway's hazards and pointed out that 77 persons were killed on it in three years, Maryland highway officials drafted a \$1.6-million

package to remove hazards on the 42.8-mile section in their state. This includes more than \$1 million for new, impact-absorbing guardrails.

Some other states have safety improvement programs underway, too. New York, for example, expects to spend about \$50 million in the next two years to correct safety deficiencies on interstate and other highways.

Texas has maintenance crews installing breakaway light and sign poles on its 68,000-mile state system.

California already has equipped most of its freeways with a mesh-and-cable median barrier that has passed grueling tests.

But most states only now are making inventories of the hazards. It could be years, officials

say, before corrective programs are completed in all areas.

Meanwhile, the Bureau of Public Roads is requiring that safety features, such as breakaway sign poles and buried guardrail ends, be incorporated in interstate projects now being built.

Blatnik's committee has zeroed in on the interstate network although statistics show beyond doubt that these highways, with their divided lanes, controlled access, long sight distances and flatter grades, are much safer than the narrow, crowded roads they replaced.

In 1966, when a record 53,000 persons died in traffic accidents, the fatality rate per 100 million vehicle miles on all streets and highways was 3.49, compared with 3.15.

She has remained hidden throughout the intervening years.

The knowledge of her existence has spurred anti-government feeling and action to the point that her extermination has become the obsession of the revolutionary command in power.

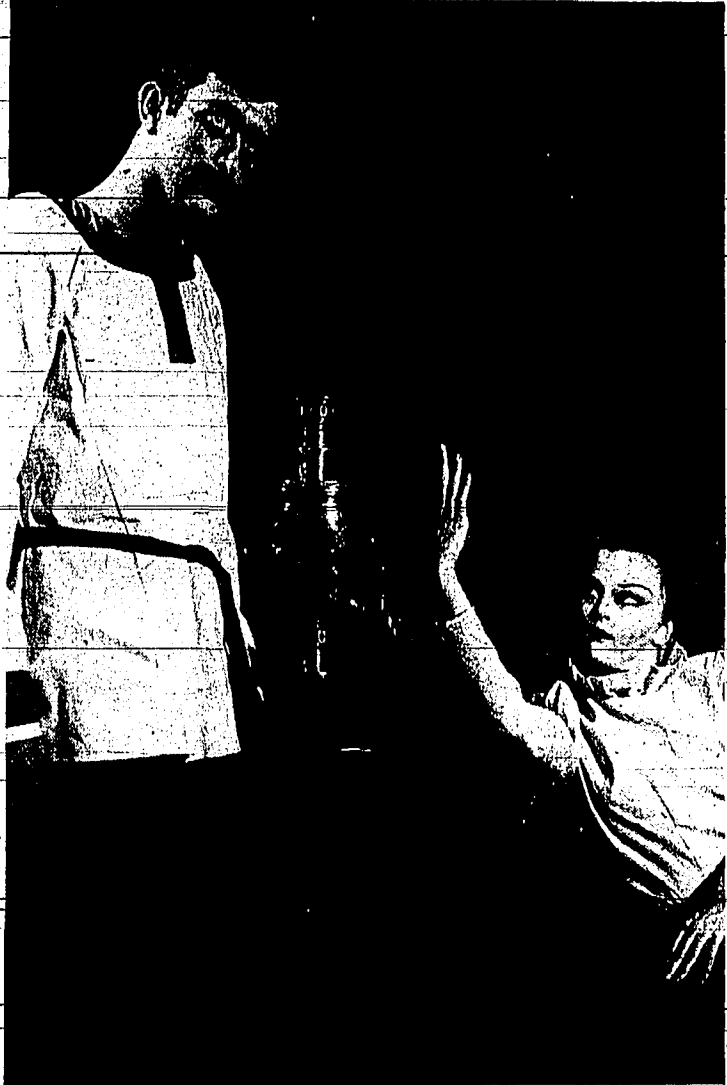
In the play rumors confirm that "she" is coming to pass through this particular border station. The officials are confounded by the fact that, hidden during her maturing years by royalist partisans, no one in the new

government has ever seen her. The detaining station becomes a kind of deadly kangaroo court for the two women. One of them must be identified as "The Queen," and publicly executed.

Present at the station, in addition to the regular attendants are a civil engineer, a greedy interrogator, a wounded officer in command of the local forces, a cleverly schooled police commissar and a psychopathic aide

to the officer. Charged with all the intriguing elements of a modern spy-thriller, "The Queen and the Rebels" is one of the finest examples of the theatre of our time taking in the reflection of some of the conditions that make up the world about which we daily hear and read.

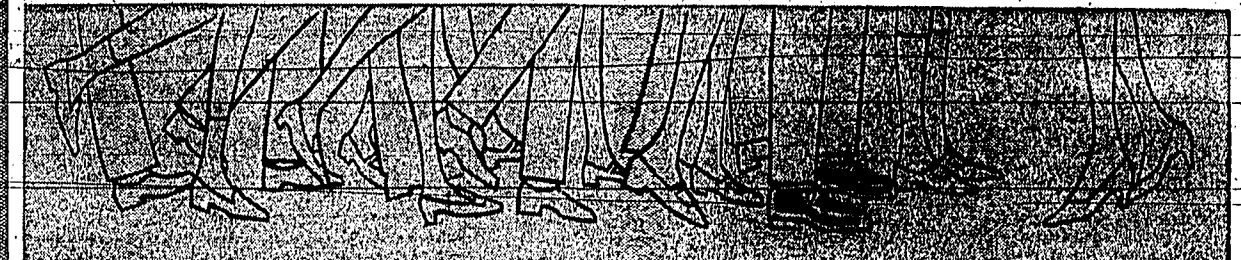

Magic Glass and Paint, Inc., Twin Falls, was awarded the bid for heavy glass entrance doors and the glass doors for the prosecuting attorney's office. Their bid was \$3,065.

## SNCC Charge Against Jews Brings Censure Of Black Power

**ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)** — The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee's charge that Jews are committing atrocities against Arabs has brought censure of the "Black Power" group from Jewish and civil rights leaders.

"Israel is and always has been the tool and foothold for American and British exploitation in the Middle East and Africa," said Ralph Featherstone, SNCC program director.

Featherstone, Executive Secretary Stanley Wise and Miss Ethel Minor held a news conference Tuesday to expand on a SNCC newsletter which charged that Zionists conquered Arab lands through terror, force and massacres. The newsletter also charged that the Israelis destroyed more than 30 Arab villages before and after they took control of Palestine.

Donald Stone, head of SNCC in Atlanta, said the group is not opposed to Zionism, but that the public should be "aware of these situations in the Middle East."

Reaction to SNCC's statements came quickly from several sources.

Whitney Young, executive director of the National Urban League, a Negro group, said in New York that SNCC's "divorce from reality is best illustrated by the resemblance of their comments to those of the American Nazi party on this question."

In a joint statement A. Philip Randolph, vice president of the AFL-CIO and president of the Sleeping Car Porters, and Bernard Rustin, executive director of the A. Philip Randolph Institute, said SNCC anti-Israeli pronouncements reflect "a complete divorce from the opinions and aspirations of American Negroes."

The Negro leaders said SNCC apparently "has formed an unconscious alliance with right-wing anti-Semites and extremists, while consciously trying to undermine liberal forces in this country."

"A statement so filled with anti-Semitic venom," they continued, "can only be interpreted as an attempt to divert national attention away from the problems of jobs, housing and education, as well as an attempt to divide the growing alliance of labor, liberal religious and civil rights forces."

A spokesman for the Israeli government at the United Nations said SNCC was taking the Arab propaganda line. Irwin Schulman, southeastern director of the Anti-Defamation League, said atrocious photographs in the newsletter which purported to show massacres in the Gaza Strip in 1956 previously had been published in Arab propaganda publications.

Rep. Joel T. Broyhill, R-Va., suggested SNCC be required to register as a foreign propaganda medium because of the newsletter. Broyhill also said Featherstone had been quoted as saying some of the material in the newsletter was obtained from Arab embassies.

The Virginia congressman said he would call upon the secretary of state and attorney general to investigate the source of the material and to ask any Arab diplomats involved to leave the country.

## South Vietnam's Civilian Candidates Finally Have Meeting With People

**BIEN HOA, Vietnam (AP)** — Southern Vietnam's civilian presidential candidates finally met with the people today—10 days late.

With the month-long campaign period almost half over, the civilian candidates went to Bien Hoa, 15 miles northeast of Saigon, to give 15-minute speeches from a common platform.

Scheduled to start a 22-stop tour of the provinces Aug. 6, the candidates had called off the tour in Quang Tri, the first stop, when they were angered by a transportation mixup and what they felt were inadequate arrangements by the government.

After several days of arguing among themselves and hurling charges of election sabotage against the government, they decided to resume the trips, but with only 11 stops outside Saigon.

A crowd estimated at 1,000 turned out to hear the 2 1/2 hours of speeches in Bien Hoa but in a light rain, dwindled down to fewer than 500 by the end.

The military ticket of Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu for president and Premier Nguyen Cao Ky for vice president was absent, as it was on the trip to Quang Tri.

A local representative spoke for the Thieu-Ky ticket at Bien Hoa.

The candidates spoke from a small stage, decorated with flags, in the yard of a girls' elementary school. Most of the crowd were civil servants and militarymen.

Lt. Col. Tran Van Hai, Bien Hoa Province chief, said he had been informed only Tuesday afternoon that the candidates were coming. He said the crowd was

small—there are 60,000 registered voters in Bien Hoa City and 170,000 in the province—because there was not enough time to spread the word and because it was the middle of the week and most people were working.

He said loudspeaker trucks of the government information ministry had gone around announcing the campaign rally. Information Ministry workers passed out campaign literature of all the candidates at the rally.

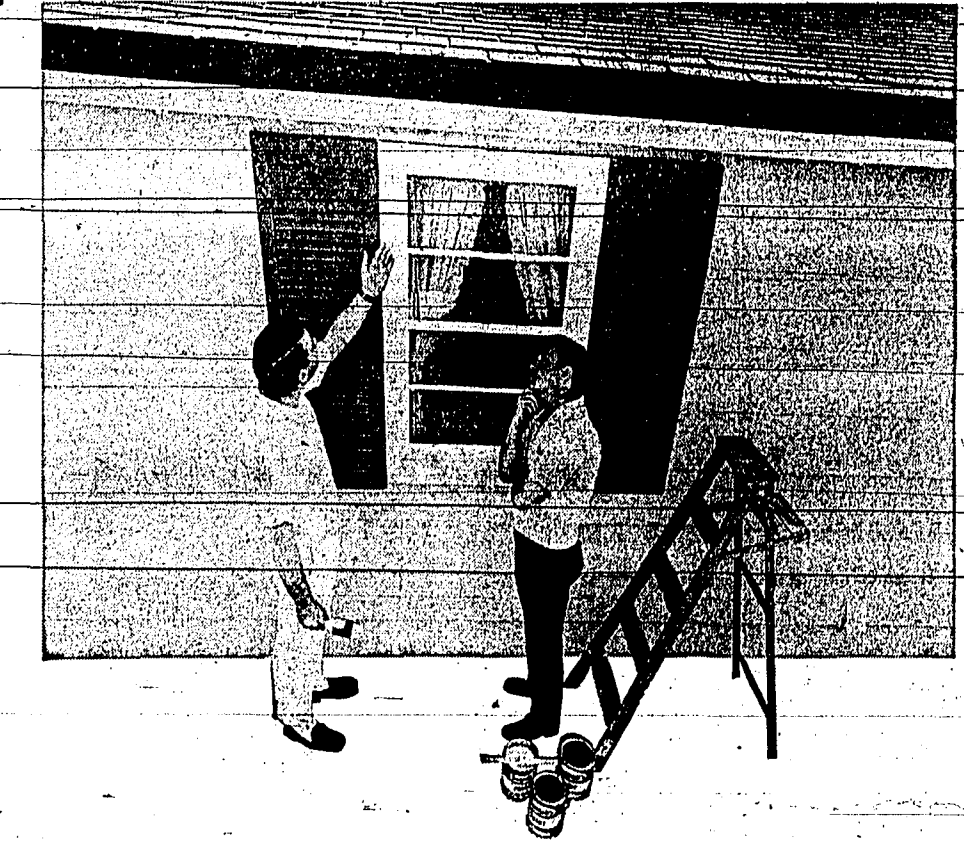

### California's Negro Senator Sets Blame For Summer Riots

WASHINGTON (AP)—California's first Negro state senator blames the two major political parties for the summer's riots and what he said was growing Negro advocacy of Black Power.

"Negroes are the victims of the two-party system," said Sen. Mervyn Dymally, a Democrat and national co-chairman of the recently organized National Conference of Negro Elected Officials.

"The Democrats take Negro votes for granted and they're afraid of the white backlash. The Republican party simply lacks the will to help wipe out the Negro ghettos," Dymally said in an interview.

As a result, he contended, elected Negro officials aren't able to show their voters rapid enough progress. "And hope gives way to hopelessness, and then to resentment and finally to Black Power and riots," Dymally, 41, a Trinidad native and former schoolteacher elected to the California Senate

know better than anyone that we can't produce."

Dymally predicted defeat of President Johnson in 1968, largely because of Negro apathy at the polls—in what he said shapes up as a close presidential election.

He called Republican Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Michigan's George Romney attractive to most Negroes, and predicted either would cut heavily as a presidential candidate into normally heavy Democratic support by Negroes.

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## Auto Industry Contract May Be Snarled

DETROIT (AP) — Indications are growing that militant skilled tradesmen may snarl peaceful new contract settlement within the auto industry.  
 Apparently taking cognizance of this, the United Auto Workers union demoted the chairman of its General Motors negotiating team Tuesday night for "association with activities" of a rebellious skilled trades group within the UAW.  
 Joseph Malotke of Warren, Mich., was fired as chairman. Glen Stack of Flint, Mich., was named to succeed him. The union said Malotke remains a member of its GM bargaining team.  
 Both Stack and Malotke are skilled tradesmen. Malotke could not be reached for comment.  
 Malotke endorsed a demonstration planned for a week from today by the United Skilled Trades Committee, formerly known as the "\$1-an-hour-now-committee," headed by Christopher Manning, president of Malotke's home local.  
 Members of Manning's committee are UAW members and their demonstration is planned at headquarters of Ford Motor Co. to impress UAW bargainers there and elsewhere of a determination by the skilled tradesmen to get a substantial wage boost beyond any general increase in new contracts.  
 Manning said a \$1-an-hour annual increase during the expected three-year life of new contracts at GM, Ford and Chrysler is a goal of his group.  
 The UAW's GM negotiating team last week termed the planned demonstration "ill advised and improper at this time" and recommended it be called off. Malotke said that had he been able to vote as chairman he would have favored the demonstration.

## Guardsmen Tells Court Of Detroit Incident

 DETROIT (AP) — A National Guard warrant officer has told a court he was on duty at the height of pre-dawn sniping during the city's riots last month when he heard shots fired a block away near a motel annex and went to investigate.  
 Theodore J. Thomas testified Tuesday in Recorder's (Criminal) Court that he saw the bodies of two Negro youths lying in separate rooms in the annex. Thomas said he saw a white policeman whom he identified as Patrolman Ronald August take a Negro youth to one of the rooms where he had seen a body. Thomas told his story at the preliminary examination of August and fellow Detroit Patrolman Robert Paille. The officers are charged with first degree murder in the deaths of two of the three Negro youths shot in the riots the morning of July 26.  
 Thomas said a uniformed man had given a shotgun to August. The guardsman said another man asked the patrolman: "Do you want to kill one?"  
 "I said, 'you can't kill them here—there are too many people around,'" Thomas said.  
 "I heard a shot and then heard something fall to the ground," Thomas said. "I saw August come out of the room alone."  
 "I told the police this was strictly their business and left the building," Thomas said. Thomas was the main witness in the second day of the examination.  
 August is accused of shooting Fred Temple, 18, and Paille is charged with the murder of Aubrey Pollard, 19. The death of the third youth, Carl Cooper, 17, is still under investigation.  
 "When I entered the building, I saw people lined up against a wall," Thomas said. "I saw an officer strike a man with a pistol butt."  
 "Patrolman August was very refined—he didn't say anything,"  
 Defense attorney Norman Lippitt asked: "You mean he was not bullying people about?"  
 "Yes, sir," Thomas replied. Thomas said the uniformed men were taking youths into rooms to scare those still in the hall. "We were searching for weapons," he said. "We were concerned about someone having weapons. We wanted the people in the hall to believe someone in the room had been shot or beaten," he continued.  
 "I thought it was better to create an illusion than to beat people in the hall."  
 Thomas said he went into a room with one Negro youth, told the youth to lie on the floor and fired a shot at the ceiling from his rifle. "One of the officers winked at me to show it was all right," he said.  
 Avery Welswasser, the prosecuting attorney, asked: "Did you know whether anybody told Patrolman August it was only a game?"  
 "No, sir," Thomas replied.

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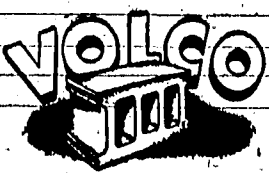
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# Rodeo History Given At Burley

## Collegian Studies War Policy, Riots At Democratic Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gale Fox, a 20-year old senior at Beaver College, Pennsylvania, is doing research at the Democratic National Committee on the causes of race riots and phases of Vietnam policy.

Over at the Republican National Committee, John P. Freese, 19, who has completed two years at Illinois State University, is researching the psychology of voters, trying to learn what moves a voter to register as Republican or Democrat.

Both Miss Fox, of Maplewood, N.J., and Freese, of Normal, Ill., are interns—college students spending the summer in Washington. Their primary aim is to learn more about how the wheels of government—and for these particular interns, politics—go around.

Altogether, there are some 8,000 students who have summer jobs in Washington. Not all are, strictly speaking, interns. Some just found and took jobs. But there are interns in government departments and agencies, in offices of Congress members and in quasipublic organizations such as the two major political committees.

For purposes of definition, an intern is one who got a job through an intern program.

And the whole idea of students interning in Washington is a growing one.

The Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A. have national programs called "Washington Citizenship Seminar" geared to interning.

Some colleges are giving academic credit in political science for certain summer work in government. More are extending financial aid to those interns who receive no salary.

Many interns are not paid, although those in government departments get the regular scale for which their jobs are rated.

None of the six interns at the Republican National Committee is paid.

The Democratic National Committee, which currently has 12, says the majority are unpaid volunteers. Congress members have \$700 each, available specifically for intern pay. It can be given to one or divided among several. Some in Congress who are financially well off dip into their own pockets to pay interns.

In Congress particularly, the problem is more applicants than jobs.

Wyche Fowler Jr., acting head of the Democratic Committee's Young Americans division, watches over its interns. "Our hope," Fowler said, "is

that the youngsters will take back to campus a better understanding of the complexities of government—the difficulties of the problems and also the possibilities."

Dr. John Hunger, head of the Republican committee's arts and sciences division, who directs its interns, said he would endorse that but added, "We're trying to do a political training job."

The youngsters with the Democrats all work together in one room. The Republicans are scattered in various divisions, working with "old pros."

Among the interns there already are stirrings of political ambitions.

Norman W. Miller Jr., a Republican intern from Norfolk, Va., acknowledges a hope he can make it to Congress some day.

"But first maybe I better get to the state Senate," he laughed.

Freese said the summer had added dimension to his studies in political science. "There," he said, meaning school, "you are concerned with theory and here you see the practical side."

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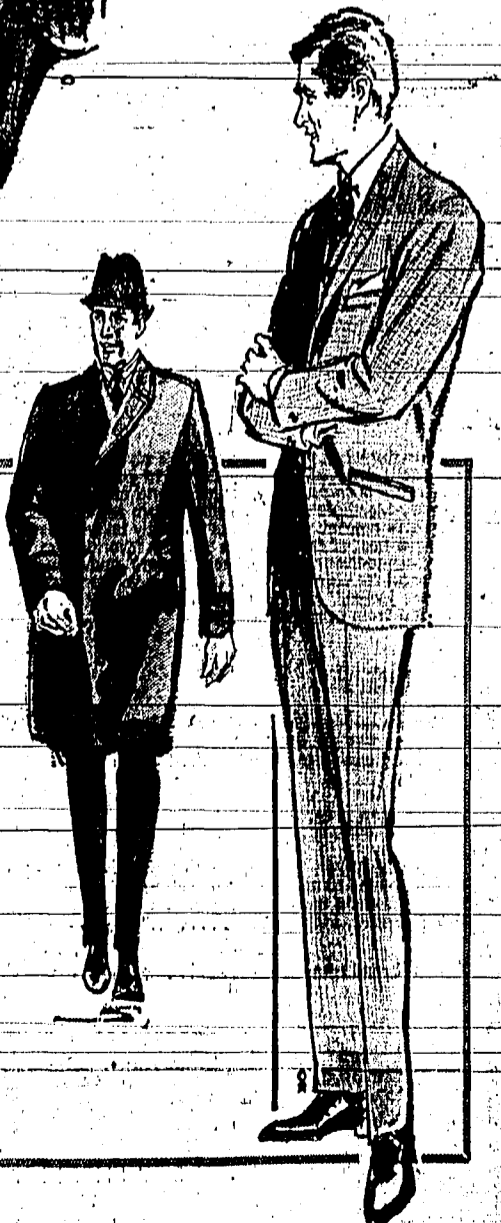

### Mao's Leadership Continues Attack On President Liu

TOKYO (AP) — Chairman Mao Tse-tung's leadership, continuing its attack on President Liu Shao-chi, claims that Liu and former Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev backed a plot to topple Mao in 1959.

The Maoist-controlled New China News Agency (NCNA) distributed Tuesday an 8-year-old document adopted by the Communist party's Central Committee accusing former Defense Minister Peng Teh-huai of plotting against Mao.

NCNA said Peng's followers at the time included Liu and other anti-party elements that tried to undermine the leadership.

The Peking People's Daily said today that "Peng was in league with the revisionist

Khrushchev trying to topple the ship." It did not tell how the then Soviet premier helped Peng.

The paper said the attack on Peng is "an important element to overthrow and completely discredit a handful of top party persons in authority headed by China's Khrushchev who are taking the capitalist road."

"China's Khrushchev" is the name Mao's leadership uses to refer to Liu. The paper refers to the former Soviet premier as Soviet Khrushchev.

After the Central Committee adopted the document in 1959, Chinese leaders announced Peng's dismissal and his replacement by Marshal Lin Biao, Mao's "closest comrade-in-arms" and his apparent successor as party chairman.

People's Daily said: "When Peng was ousted at the party Central Committee on Aug. 6, 1959, Soviet Khrushchev was so shameless as to praise Peng publicly as 'right and brave' and a 'best friend'."

Lin was appointed defense minister in September, 1959. Liu has been president since April, 1959.

NCNA's distribution of the 1959 party document alleging the plot against Mao followed an editorial attack on Liu by People's Daily and the party theoretical journal Red Flag.

The editorials listed "crimes" Liu is supposed to have committed in the party in the last 40 years, including that of trying to improve Red China's relations with the United States and Nationalist China.

In reorganization of the board, C. F. Chatfield, senior commissioner, was named chairman. Mr. Sorensen was appointed to the airport committee.

## Tshombe Action Gets Second Thoughts

ALGIERS (AP) — Both the Algerian and Congolese governments seem to be having second thoughts about extraditing Moïse Tshombe to the Congo to face the death penalty.

Algeria's Col. Houari Boumedienne is in no hurry to hand Tshombe over to Congo President Joseph D. Mobutu—despite the Algerian Supreme Court's July 21 decision recommending extradition.

Tshombe, 47, former Katanga separatist leader, and former premier of the Congo, was kidnapped on a flight over the Mediterranean and brought to Algeria June 30. He had been convicted in absentia of treason and conspiracy against the Mobutu regime.

Algerian officials and the government-controlled press have repeatedly hinted that the Boumedienne government may set up an international revolutionary tribunal to try Tshombe in Algeria for "crimes against Africa."

These hints imply that Algeria does not regard the Mobutu regime as sufficiently revolutionary to be trusted to deal with Tshombe in true revolutionary fashion.

Once Tshombe is extradited, Algeria would no longer have any control over what happens to him. A free pardon pronounced following his extradition would be regarded as a grave offense to Algeria's revolutionary dignity—a risk President Boumedienne may not be willing to take.

Diplomatic sources said Mobutu has refused to make the political concessions which might have persuaded Algeria to extradite Tshombe without delay.

Such concessions reportedly included a Congolese break with Israel, a disengagement from U.S. influence and an amnesty for Congolese leftist leaders in exile, including Antoine Gizenga, head of the short-lived Congolese People's Republic in Stanleyville, now Kisangani.

Mobutu's refusal was apparently delivered to the Algerians late in July. Since then, the attitude of both governments has undergone a noticeable change.

Diplomatic sources said Mobutu now recognizes that Tshombe's kidnapping was a political mistake.

Tshombe—who still has a substantial following—could create more problems than it would solve.

The course the Algerians seem likely to take is to keep Tshombe locked up in some secret place almost indefinitely—like ex-President Ahmed ben Bella, held without trial or charge since he was overthrown in a military coup led by Boumedienne more than two years ago.

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### Author Expelled

VIENNA (AP) — Ladislav Mnačko, one of Czechoslovakia's best known authors, who visited Israel, was deprived of his Czechoslovak citizenship and expelled from the Communist party.

The Czechoslovak news agency C.T.K. said Mnačko was also deprived of his honorary title of meritorious artist and of his state decorations.

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# Aaron May Wind Up Being League Career Leader

NEW YORK (AP) — At the rate Hank Aaron is hitting home runs he's likely to wind up as the National League career leader and the runner-up to Babe Ruth on the all-time list.

The Atlanta slugger remained in a tie for the NL lead with Houston's Jim Wynn last week. Each slammed a pair of homers for a season's total of 29.

Aaron's output has enabled him to close in on the career pacesetters. He is currently in 10th place with 471 homers, but only three among the top nine are active players.

Ruth leads with 714 homers. Willie Mays of San Francisco, No. 1 in the NL, has 557. Then come Jimmy Fox, 534; Ted Williams, 521; Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees, 516; Mel Ott, 511; Ed Mathews of Houston, 503; Lou Gehrig, 493; Stan Musial, 475; and Aaron, trailing Musial by only four.

Among those still active, Mathews has 10 homers this year. Mays is well behind his usual place with 15 and Mantle has 20. Mays is 35 years old while Mantle and Mathews will be 36 in October. Aaron is 33.

In the batting races through games of Monday night, Rusty Staub of Houston paced the NL with a .351 average and Baltimore's Frank Robinson, seeking his second straight title, led the AL with .324.

Staub dropped two points with nine hits in 27 times at bat last week. Pittsburgh's Roberto Clemente lost eight points to .344, but held the No. 2 position.

Orlando Cepeda of St. Louis is third at .340. He gained five points by collecting six hits in 12 tries. Curt Flood, another Cardinal, rushed up to grab fourth place, paring 11 hits in 27 attempts for a six-point increase to .332.

The Orioles' Robinson managed only eight hits in 30 at bats and slipped six points in last week's action. Boston's Carl Yastrzemski took over the No. 2 spot from Al Kaline of Detroit. Yastrzemski lost one point to .317 while Kaline, on a 6-for-24 performance, dropped six points to .313.

Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota continues to lead the AL in homers with 32 and is tied for the runs batted in lead at 79 with Yastrzemski. Cepeda is the NL's RBI pacesetter with 80.

**Phillies Take Twin Bill From Mets**

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Johnny Callison drove in three runs with a homer and a double and Philadelphia pulled a triple play Tuesday, downing the New York Mets 7-5 and sweeping a twilight doubleheader.

Bill White's homer leading off the 12th inning gave the Phillies a 3-2 decision in the first game and broke a five-game Mets' win streak as well as a three-game Phillies' losing skein.

In the second inning, Greg Goossen and Tom Reynolds singled for the Mets. Phil Linz grounded to Allen, who stepped on third, threw to Cookie Rojas at second for the force and Rojas threw to White at first for the triple play.

In the first game, the Phillies entered the ninth leading 2-0 behind Jim Bunning's two-hit shutout pitching, but the Mets slammed four straight hits, the last a double by Cleon Jones that tied the score.

East played the six and West won with the king. Then West went into one of those long trances that are so common among bridge players of all sorts and finally laid down his queen of hearts. South ruffed and claimed the rest of the tricks. East was bitter, justifiably, because West's play was terrible but East has to share some of the responsibility under the terms of Parkinson's first law. East knew where the king of clubs was and East was certain that South did not hold another spade. East should have played his queen of clubs. Of course West might have overtaken with the king and led the heart but the chances are that West would have let East hold the trick.

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# T. F. County Commission OK's 2 Retirement Plans

Approval of retirement programs for Magic Valley Memorial Hospital employees and all county employees was announced Tuesday by the Twin Falls County Commission.

Commission Chairman Heber Loughmiller said the programs will go into effect as soon as bookkeeping changes are made, probably in September or by Oct. 1.

Employees themselves will have the final say on the programs which have been selected by the county commissioners and the hospital board. If accepted by all employees the county program will cost approximately \$14,000 per year while the hospital program with more employees covered will represent about \$38,000 annually.

The county employees will receive about 5.5 per cent of their salaries in county funds and will put about three per cent of their salaries into the plan through withholding from their pay checks.

Hospital employees will receive about eight per cent in county funds toward retirement and will provide three per cent of their salaries.

Morris W. Carlson, commissioner, said taxpayers in Twin Falls County will be paying something like a half-million dollars in retirement costs with most of it going to teacher retirement. If the teachers are going to receive retirement bene-

fits, then certainly it is not fair to deny the county employees, Mr. Carlson commented.

County commissioners have been working toward an acceptable retirement program for several months, Mr. Loughmiller explained. The state plan, now available to other local government employees was determined to be too costly, commissioners said.

This year the county budgeted

\$12,000 for retirement and the hospital budget included \$38,000 for establishing retirement.

To complete the year in the program, commissioners estimated it would cost about \$4,000 from the county budget and \$9,000 in hospital funds.

Commissioners Loughmiller, Carlson and William Chancey said they believed the programs approved by their board and the hospital board are as good as

other more costly plans and will be accepted by the majority of the county and hospital workers.

As approved, the retirement program would provide consid-

eration for past service of long persons who had not completed 20 years of service but were 65 or beyond could continue work until age 70, Mr. Loughmiller would be compulsory although said.

Officers were called to the scene shortly after 2:05 a.m. and found one man hiding in the building and indications that another had fled from the roof of the building where he had been pulling six-packs of beer up from the tavern by means of a rope through a hole in the roof.

The second suspect was later arrested when found lying on the floor of a station wagon parked near the tavern.

A third man was picked up near the scene but was questioned and released.

Charged with burglary were Vernon Charles Will, about 25, and Richard F. Johnson, 31. Both told officers they were from Wisconsin.

## Divers Study Sunken Oil Tankers

AVON-BY-THE-SEA, N. J. (AP) — Deep sea divers are descending to the cold depths of the Atlantic Ocean in hope of unravelling a 25-year-old mystery of whether sunken oil tankers are seeping their cargoes to the surface.

President Johnson ordered the pilot project undertaken to determine whether any of the 103 tankers sunk off American shores — most of them victims of German submarines during World War II — pose an oil pollution threat to the coastline.

Divers, using underwater television cameras, went 90 feet to the ocean bottom Monday to examine the Gultrade, a tanker sliced in two by a German torpedo in 1942. It sank with a loss of 18 lives and carried 4 million gallons of oil to the bottom.

Coast Guard officials said there was no apparent trace of oil. Today the divers investigate the R.P. Resor, which also was torpedoed off the South Jersey shore in 1942. Both ships are within 14 miles of the coastline.

If any oil is discovered, officials said, it will be siphoned off.

"Little is known about what happened to the ships and their cargoes during their years at the bottom of the sea," said Donald G. Agger of the U.S. Department of Transportation which is supervising the project with the Coast Guard.

"This venture," he said, "is in many ways a mystery story."

Officials were unable to say if all 103 sunken tankers will be investigated.
