



The Logan Act adopted by Congress as long-ago as 1799 prohibits private American citizens from engaging in diplomatic negotiations with foreign nations without official authorization. Yet each generation of Americans

produces its own private meddlers in international diplomacy who violate

the law with impunity.
In 1915 it was Henry Ford who was convinced that by launching his "peace ship" he would bring a speedy end to World-War-I. He was discour-aged by President Wilson. But the automobile magnate was arrogant enough to believe that he could suc-ceed where the president of the United States failed.

The fantastic story of "Ford's Folly" has just been recreated vividly by the veteran journalist, Burnet Hershey, in his new book, "The Odyssey of Henry Ford and the Great
Peace Ship."

It is a fasoinating account, often

hilarious and sometimes sad, of a bit of true-blue Americana that has long been forgotten.

Ford's odyssey, as was inevitable, ended in failure. But it caused considerable damage to American interests. For many years it was also a rich source for diplomatic jokes. The assorted intellectuals, preachers and doves of the 1915 vintage who crowded the peace-ship took to fighting among themselves even before they crossed the submarine-infested Atlantic under the benevolent eye of the

Three or four victories in these—head—to-head matches would give either man the kind of momentum and impact he needs to go on and take the nomination at the convention—starting next Aug. 5.

While under the influence of LSD a person's awareness becomes so expanded that he is supposed to be able to understand the mysteries of God and the universe, an understanding that seems to evaporate as the effect of the drug wears off and

effect of the drug wears off and can be recaptured only on another "trip."

Although in some persons the hallucinations induced by the drug are described as pleasant, in others they are so terrifying.

Taking drugs for kicks is hazardous at best. Persons who will try anything once sometimes wears off in a few hours but discover that once is too often.

This is especially true of ly-thing that lasts several months may result.

One young man in a period of elation induced by the drug-believed that he could fly, jumped out of a 10th story window and fell to his death. Another drove his car through a series of beautiful red lights that seemed to beckon him on. He killed the occupants of another car. Four college students held a highly intellectual conversa-tion with the sun while look-ing "him" straight in the eye for several minutes. They wore permanently blinded.

A young experimenter tried LSD only once, He quit because it didn't turn him on. Two years later he suffered to the suffered t later he suffered a severe men tal-breakdown. This might happen to anyone whether he had used LSD or not but a cause-lad and offect relationship is strongly suggested by the fact that many others have had this same experience. The drug has hear experience. The drug has been used long chough now that some of its long-range effects can be studied.

AVON-BY-THE-SEA, N. (AP) — Deep sea divers are descending to the cold depths of the Atlantic Ocean in hope of unravelling a 25-year-old mystery of whether sunken oil tankers are seeping their cargoes to the surface.

termine whether any of the 103 tankers sunk off American shores— most of them victims of German submarines during World War II—pose an oil pollution threat to the coastline.

Divers, using underwater television cameras, went 90 feet to the ocean bottom Monday to examine the Guiltrade, a tanker sliced in two by a German torpedo in 1942, It sank with a loss of 18 lives and carried 4 million gallons of oil to the bottom. gallons of oil to the bottom.

Coast Guard officials said
there was no apparent trace of
oil. Today the divers investigate

the R.P. Resor, which also was toredoed off the South Jersey shore in 1942. Both ships are within 14 miles of the coastline. If any oil is discovered, offi-clais said, it will be siphoned

off.
"Little is known about what happened to the ships and their cargoes during their years at the bottom of the sea," said Donald G. Agger of the U.S. Department of Transportation which is supervising the project with the Coast Guard.
