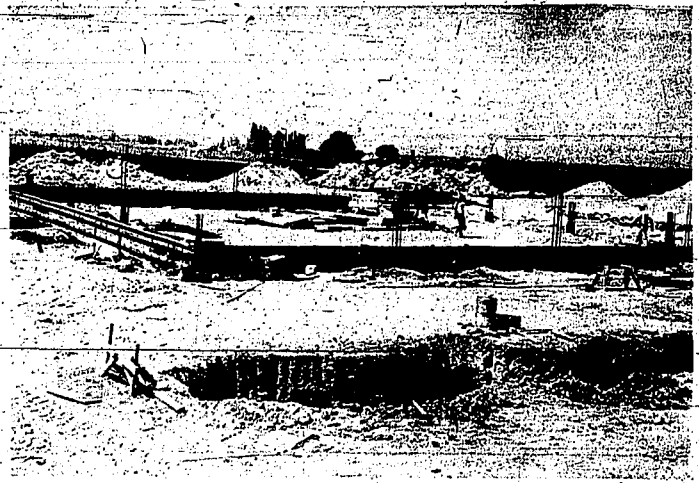

Labor Day Weekend Death Toll Is Lagging Behind Estimates

CHICAGO (AP) — The Labor Day weekend death toll was lower than expected as four-day holiday entered its final day today. National Safety Council officials feared that homebound traffic on the final day would cause a death toll to skyrocket.

Some 41 persons were dead early today as the result of auto accidents. The National Safety Council had predicted that 50 to 60 persons would die in traffic accidents over the holiday.

The record for long holiday traffic deaths was set last Fourth of July when 122 persons died. For comparison, The Associated Press found that 533 highway deaths occurred during a nonholiday four-day weekend period from 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 18, to midnight Monday, Aug. 21.

Traffic Trouble On Holiday Light Here

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Vietnam Military Ticket Wins Vote

By GEORGE McARTHUR SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnam's military ticket won the presidential election Sunday as expected, but 10 civilian tickets were holding Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu and Premier Nguyen Cao Ky to only 47 percent of the vote as the count nears completion.

Thieu, the erstwhile 44-year-old lieutenant general who has shared power for the past two years with Air Marshal Ky, had said he would be satisfied with 40 percent of the vote. Thieu's flamboyant vice president running mate, who will be 47 next Saturday, had expressed confidence that the military ticket would get more votes than all the civilians combined.

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP) — Members of the Public Land Review Commission are to go today to Jackson Hole, Wyo., for a Labor Day break Monday through a three-day weekend.

The group — which held a public hearing in Spokane, Wash., Saturday, and then flew to Jackson Hole, Idaho — arrived here Sunday evening.

Members of the commission — including Sen. Lon B. Jordan — were told at a luncheon Sunday that the public land review should not be suspended into a single classification of all forest lands in the West.

War Resumes After Vietnam Election

SAIGON (AP) — American and South Vietnamese soldiers resumed fighting in the northern part of the country, where U.S. Marines are in a small force of North Vietnamese units.

The air war against North Vietnam was unaffected by the elections, with 127 missions flown Saturday, 129 on Sunday and 130 on Monday. A B-52 bomber chief shot down by Communist ground fire each day. The two losses raised the total of U.S. combat planes reported lost over the north to 672 and both pilots were killed.

Courthouse Annex 75 Per Cent Complete

Workers on the Twin Falls County Courthouse judicial annex have moved inside and are currently installing interior walls, door casings and other interior finishings.

George Ottens, building supervisor, said the structure is now about 75 per cent complete and the next 60 days should see it ready for occupancy by legal branches of the county and the judges of the Fifth Judicial District.



Interior walls of the building's hallways are being built with a special ceramic-covered block, which appears as wall tile. White mortar filler later will be used to even and beautify the tile spacing.

Offices and courtrooms, Mr. Ottens said, will be paneled or finished according to the wishes of occupants. Carpeting also is planned in the building hallways, courtrooms and in offices where desired.

The building has no windows along the entire courtroom area because of first floor courtrooms and the problem of outside distractions during court sessions, Mr. Ottens said.

Tinted glass is being used in the windows of the building to eliminate sunlight glare. There will be fluorescent lighting installed in the ceiling and flush with the false ceiling.

There are also no windows in the law library and probate courtroom of the new building again, because of the design to eliminate outside conflict with interior use of the structure.

Each individual courtroom will be designed with the judge's chambers, bench, witness chair and jury box in a position of greatest convenience. Several courtrooms have been studied and several judges consulted in courtroom planning, Mr. Ottens said.

Crews from Smith Roofing Co. also began work Friday on the asphalt roof over the new annex. This assures work can continue on the building in case of what might develop in the way of fall weather with the roofing and final window installation to complete the exterior portion of the building.

Black Box

ROSSELL, N.M. (AP) — A Roswell electronics firm is coming up with a black box to fall back-cited Viet. Cong. bringing down U.S. helicopters in Vietnam.

Bill Underhill, president of Electronics Industries, said the device would be placed in helicopter cockpit to pick up sounds of enemy bullets, first within 50 yards.

The detector would indicate the sounds of fire on the helicopters control panel. It would be beeping while in the pilot's headset. He said noise level in helicopters is so high that sometimes the pilot doesn't hear the shots aimed at him.

The Army is to begin tests of the device in Vietnam soon, Underhill said Thursday.

Big Night Is Just Around Corner For Miss Rodeo Idaho Candidates

The big night is just around the corner for 16 excited young candidates for the coveted Miss Rodeo Idaho crown, currently held by Rosemary Vassar, Caldwell.

Miss Vassar will relinquish her title during the final night of the Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo Saturday.

The hopefuls, ranging in age from 17 to 22 and from all parts of Idaho, will begin a four-day round of judging for character, personality, poise, intelligence, conversational ability, showmanship and appearance Wednesday.

Entries in this year's event have been accepted from three Miss local rodeo queens who were not able to participate in

the 1966 state contest. Gene Hill, chairman, noted that the relocation of the contest in Twin Falls from Caldwell made it necessary for this exception since the Caldwell rodeo is held several months earlier than the Twin Falls event.

Acceptance of candidates from 1966 has made it possible for the three sponsoring organizations to have two queens riding in the state contest this year only—he pointed out.

"This will be a catch-up year and in 1968 we should have a normal situation of one contestant riding for each sponsoring organization," he added.

Eligibility is generally limited to contestants who have won local rodeo queen contests between Sept. 1, 1966, and Aug. 15 of this year.

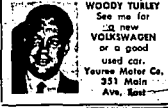

3 Men Picked For AEC Awards

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission has named three men to receive AEC citations for their work on the creation and development of nuclear energy.

One of them, Dr. Frank H. Spedding, director of Ames Laboratory of Iowa State University, produced the uranium used in the first self-sustaining nuclear reactor in Chicago in 1942.

Another, William Westerman, Boston member of the AEC's advisory committee, was cited for his work toward the development of nuclear electric power, especially in connection with the building of the Yankee Atomic Electric Station in Rowe, Mass., in 1960.

The third recipient, Dr. Henry D. Smyth, professor emeritus of physics at Princeton University, was an AEC commissioner from 1949 to 1951 and has been ambassador to the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna since 1961.

Douglas Has Plan To Leave Slums Behind

NEW YORK (AP)—Former Sen. Paul H. Douglas, now chairman of President Johnson's Commission on Urban Problems, suggests that some of the people living in city slums should be moved into houses already standing in the suburbs.

Douglas, Democratic ex-senator from Illinois, said Sunday that Federal Housing Administration mortgages on 4,000 single-family houses, many of them in the suburbs, are foreclosed each year.

"Why not use some of them, discreetly, for public-housing clients?" he asked.

Douglas emphasized that he spoke for himself, not for the commission, which will open hearings here on Wednesday.

Douglas, who appeared on a WNBC-TV program and was interviewed later by newsmen, said that construction of 500,000 public-housing units a year seems a reasonable goal to ease the pressures of the nation's slums.

Douglas suggested four sources of public-housing sites or dwellings: urban vacant lots, dilapidated urban buildings, pieces of federally owned land and the houses on which the FHA has foreclosed mortgages.

When a mortgage is foreclosed, he said, the house could be turned over to a public-housing agency rather than put on the market.

Young Man's Body Found In Sinkhole

TRENTON, Fla. (AP) — The body of a young farmer was found today in a foul smelling lime sinkhole by 25 searchers who had dug, dredged and blasted in the hole for two weeks.

The weary workers caught a glimpse of the body of Cecil Davis, 20, Sunday night buried in sand.

But a flash thunderstorm flooded an underground creek which runs through the hole and the men watched helplessly as the body was covered again by the torrent.

It was finally recovered from three feet of water 57 feet below ground level.

Searchers had worked 24 hours a day at the hole since Aug. 19, five days after Davis disappeared with his horse. Hooptrunk, a dark-colored horse, also sinks, common in north and central Florida, are caused by the collapse of underground limestone formations. A number of homes are damaged or destroyed each year when sinkholes open under them.

Actor James Dunn Dies At Age Of 61

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — A winsome, boozy grin was the trademark actor James Dunn rode to an Academy Award in a film career as "a well-meaning type of fellow whom women marry to mother."

Dunn, who won his Oscar in 1946 for his portrayal of a drunken man in "A Tree Grows In Brooklyn," died of a long illness. His death, at age 61, was announced Sunday.

His performance in the hit film was referred to by one critic as "the most powerful argument for prohibition and abstinence ever seen on the screen."

Dunn entered acting after trying his hand at almost every trade possible—including marking stock—quitting on the board in his father's New York brokerage firm.

He toured an eastern theater circuit as a bit-piever until he wandered into the Paramount studio—then in New York—where he won several small parts. He liked the pay, so he stuck with the movies.

Produced from hit parts in 1931 and was signed to feature roles by 20th Century-Fox studios, appearing in 20 movies in the next five years. Between roles, he worked as a vaudeville song and dance man, and as a radio personality. Shirley Temple in her first film, "Stand Up and Cheer," and also appeared with her in "The Boy Who Came From New York" and "Baby Take a Bow." His other films included "The Young Man With a Horn," "Welcome Home," and "Hold That Woman."

As his career began to wane in the 1940s, he achieved a reputation as an irresponsible performer—partly earned by his drinking and partly by his unemployable by the studios.

But on a gamble, Darryl Zanuck brought him back to 20th Century-Fox to play the father of Peggy Ann Garner in the film, "A Tree Grows In Brooklyn."

Dunn's portrayal—friends said some of it came from his own life—was sensation and won him the Oscar as best supporting actor.

Burn, baby, burn, some of the marchers yelled as they kicked pulled out of a fire hose along the route today. More than 50 fires were reported in the Inner Core during the week-end.

Two major rallies were held Sunday, one in an Inner Core park and the other inside St. Boniface church, which was filled to capacity for two hours of songs, "Black Power" chants and speeches with a strong anti-white flavor. Negro comedian Dick Gregory and officials of the Congress of Racial Equality spoke at the rallies as did Father Gropp.

The demonstration began last Monday when the youth council marched on the predominantly Polish-American South Side. On both Monday and Tuesday night the council met to plan the thousands of jobs.

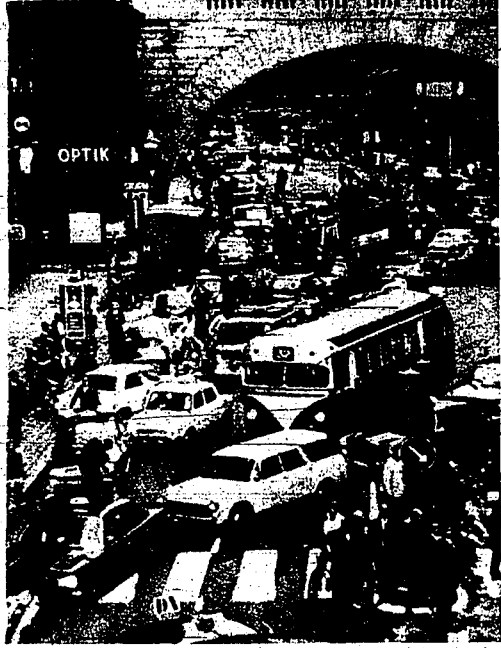

A week ago, I didn't even know I'd be here," Knight said he was favorably impressed by the election procedure but he added it was difficult to assess what the Vietnamese people were really thinking. 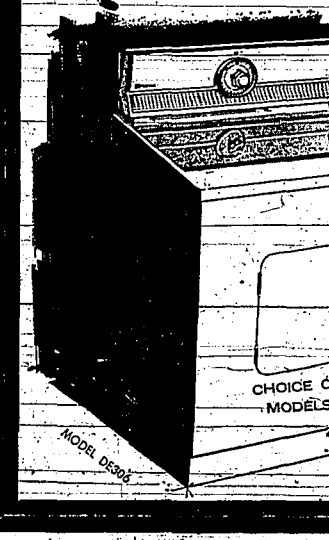
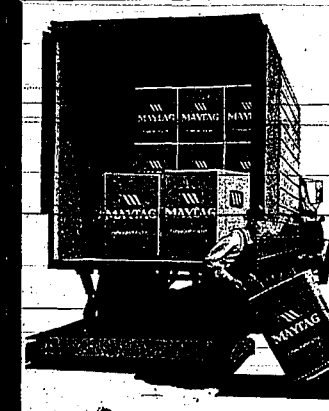

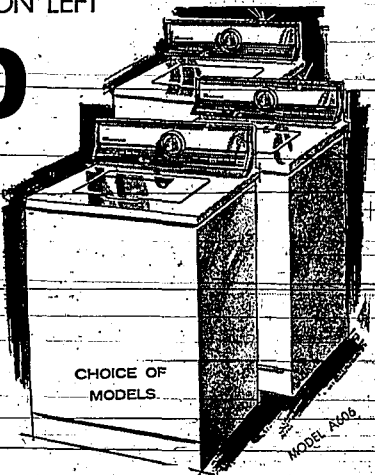

Detroit Paper Says Deaths Unnecessary

DETROIT (AP)—The deaths of a majority of the 43 persons killed during Detroit's July riot could have been prevented, an investigation by the Detroit Free Press concludes.

The Free Press investigation said that the National Guard "did not obey" orders to unload weapons and fire only at the command of an officer, and, "as a result, the guard was involved in a total of 11 deaths in which 9 innocent people died."

A 24,000-word copyright story was published in the paper Sunday. It appears to be the most exhaustive study yet made public of the riot deaths.

The Free Press said three reporters interviewed more than 300 people and pored over hundreds of documents before coming to the "inescapable" conclusion that "a majority of the riot victims need not have died. Their deaths could have been — and should have been — prevented."

"Eighteen of the 43 riot victims were shot and killed by Detroit police, and of that number, 14 have been confirmed as looters in the Free Press investigation. The other four are a sniper, a possible but unconfirmed arsonist and two of the three

Israeli-Led Schools To Admit Arabs

TEL AVIV (AP)—Some 235,000 children whose Arab schools were closed by the Middle East war are to be sent Monday under Israeli supervision, and with books carefully rewritten to eliminate anti-Zionist propaganda.

The educational experiment in Arab territories occupied by Israel is being watched by Israel, Arabs and the world beyond the Middle East.

Some of the children will have no books. Israeli authorities still are printing thousands of new texts on history, geography and literature.

And some will have no teachers. Most of the more than 2,000 Arab teachers have indicated they will work under the Israelis, but many have refused. No Israeli teachers will work in the Arab schools.

"If teachers don't have books, they'll just have to teach without texts or on the subjects for which we have cleared books," an Israeli Education Ministry spokesman said.

Arab books were scrutinized by Israeli educators for weeks. Of 134 types of books seized in the Israeli-occupied west bank territory, only 16 were found acceptable. Only 33 of 129 from the Gaza Strip were cleared as free of anti-Zionist material.

Israeli officials said most of the objectionable material was found in history, geography and Arab literature books. But officials said in one arithmetic book they found 8-year-olds were given the following problem:

"If our defense forces killed three Zionist terrorists and captured another when seven attacked our town, how many were left?"

In such a case the entire book has to be reprinted under the Israeli rule.

"We have to reprint—even if there is only one sentence we find objectionable," said Ya'acov Sarid, director-general of the Israel Education Ministry. "If we just crossed it out or snipped it out the children would ask questions."

The new textbooks are printed in Arabic and generally the Israelis say they have not changed the Arab curricula.

Israel does, however, intend to introduce Hebrew gradually into Old Jerusalem, the sector of the holy city seized from Jordan. Israeli officials said Hebrew will be introduced in other occupied areas "if the parents request it."

The 200,000 Arab children on the west bank of the Jordan River and the 100,000 in the Gaza Strip will start school in the fall. But in Old Jerusalem, parents will have to pay for transportation and amount of family income.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP)—South Carolina's State Law Enforcement Division will help investigate a melee during which seven Negro children were beaten by a group of 150 whites at a high school football game, Gov. Robert McNair said Friday.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has demanded a "swift and thorough" investigation of the Thursday night incident.

NAACP state officials also have asked U. S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark to aid in the investigation.

They said several children, including "some as young as 6 years old" were beaten when they and a few adults showed up for a football game at predominantly white Hartsville-Ridgeville High School. They added in a telegram to McNair and Clark that "brown" white men "smashed car windows and ransacked Negroes' cars."

Dorchester County Sheriff Carl Knight said "some confu-

don developed" when about 16 Negroes, adults and children, walked toward their cars at the end of the game.

"It turned into a real riot, that's the only way to describe it. There must have been at least 150 people fighting," Knight said.

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

Tourists To Have Parking Near Capital

WASHINGTON (AP) — Tourists finally are going to get places to park near the Capitol, but not in the House's new \$13.5 million underground garages or on convenient Capitol Plaza.
Instead, Capitol visitors—who number in the millions each year—will have set aside for their parking needs a tiny 85-space lot in the shadow of the massive Rayburn House Office Building.
If they can find the lot, visitors will be able to park there up to two hours while they observe congress at work.
Additional spaces could have been provided by moving some congressional staff members' cars off the Plaza into the new garages. But no one wanted to do that.
Another possibility, tourist parking atop the two new garages, was rejected several years ago in favor of a \$1,425,000 beautification project.
Congressmen — and visitors themselves — are disappointed that the Capitol was the nation's only major tourist attraction without a tourist parking place.
"It is probably the one place in all America that they want to see that they cannot find a parking place," Rep. Mark Andrews, R-M.D., complained to Capitol Architect J. George Stewart during appropriations hearings earlier this year.
But Stewart said he didn't know what could be done because of the demand for places by congressional staff members.
However, Chairman B. F. Sisk, D-Calif., of the House's new parking committee, says

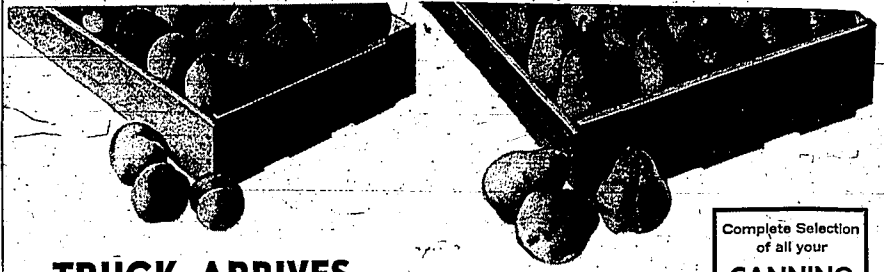
Hoover Pushes For Legislation On Gun Control
