## Air Crash Claims 34 Lives

**CANDER, NHD (AP)** — A Cander airliner with 39 persons on board crashed in flames shortly after taking off from Cedar Rapids today, claiming 34 persons and injuring the other 35. Many of the survivors suffered critical burns.

The Soviet-built Ilyushin 18 had stopped here to refuel on a flight from Prague, the Czech capital.

The controller in the tower at Cander International Airport said he had talked to the pilot after the plane lifted off. He said there was no indication of trouble.

"I didn't see what happened," he said. "The first thing I knew was when I saw a ball of flames coming from the runway and it slipped up by the flames. It was a white flash."

The plane came down in a patch of woods two miles from the runway near railroad tracks that skirt the airport. The crash occurred at 2:40 a.m.

The injured, identified as Czechs, Poles and Cubans, were being treated in the hospital here, but arrangements were being made to transfer 13 persons suffering mild degrees of burns to Halifax for special treatment.

The dead included the plane's pilot and copilot and two other crew members. The ground crew officer and two hostesses survived.

Helicopters of Eastern Provincial Airways and the Newfoundland mines and resources department headed for the crash scene shortly after the accident and began snuffing bodies and injured back to the airport.

The helicopter pilot, the Jelliner was deep in mud when they arrived and they had to ferry him to the site. He was trying to pry the twisted fuselage out of the mire.

One pilot said several bodies were found under the wreckage and rescuers were finding bodies every few minutes.



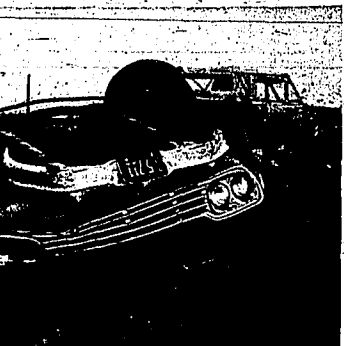

## Road Death Toll Is Short Of Record

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Highway traffic took a heavy toll in deaths during the three-day Labor Day weekend, but the toll for summer's last holiday fell short of the record set a year ago.

The 588 deaths reported at the end of the 78-hour weekend at midnight local time Monday compared with last year's record Labor Day toll of 636, and a toll of 533 on a recent holiday weekend.

Although cool temperatures and a light rain were reported in many parts of the nation, boating accidents claimed 22 persons drowned over Labor Day.

# De Gaulle To Walk Tightrope On Visit

 PARIS (AP) — When President Charles de Gaulle visits Poland Wednesday, he will try to avoid doing anything to upset West German officials who are expanding France's relations with Communist East Europe, in former sources said today.  
 But his policy of opposition to blocs may create some resentment among Communist leaders, they added.  
 To avoid upsetting the West Germans, De Gaulle is expected to make little reference to the Oder-Neisse frontier between Poland and East Germany which he said eight years ago should not be questioned.  
 He also is expected to maintain his refusal to recognize East Germany. He is scheduled to make a short visit to Zabrze, formerly Hindenburg, in the territory Poland seized from Germany in the war, but he will not deliver a speech there.  
 The trip to Poland is part of the individualism of each country's most European countries. Sources said he intends to insist on the individualism of each country into the Communist bloc in an attempt to help them recover self-determination and play their own part in what he calls a renewed "European Europe."  
 He advocates the same sort of independence from American leadership in Western Europe.  
 Any appeals for self-determination and independence may raise eyebrows in Polish official circles and in Moscow, but observers in Paris feel De Gaulle's statements will be cautiously worded in order not to impede his long range policy of rapprochement with the East.  
 Sources close to the Elisee Palace said De Gaulle would recall that France got out of the North-Atlantic Treaty organization last year and was the first country to free itself from a European military bloc.  
 These sources said an appeal for political independence may impress the Polish people who feel the burden of Soviet leadership is too heavy for them. The government considers its firm attachment to Moscow the best defense against West German ambitions to regain the lost territories. Although the positions of the two governments toward each other are many miles apart, the sources said De Gaulle would try to persuade Polish officials a new approach is needed to ease tensions.

# Michigan Has Shortage Of Teachers

DETROIT (AP) — Thousands of Michigan youngsters faced the possibility of classrooms without teachers today as last-minute contract negotiations failed in many cases to bring the teachers back to work.  
 Lt. Gov. William Milliken announced Monday that 54 Michigan schools districts would not sign contracts with teachers.  
 School opening has been postponed in six districts, including Detroit with its 11,000 teachers and 300,000 pupils.  
 In Detroit, the board of education in the Detroit Federation of Teachers agreed to pull off from Wednesday to Thursday the scheduled school openings.  
 However, the federation refused to submit its differences to arbitration by a panel of fact-finders. The school board had agreed to a state-appointed fact-finder, Ronald Heston.  
 "This is merely an attempt to indicate the situation can be normal if we just settle today," said Mary Ellen Rioridan, Federation president. "The situation is not normal."  
 Mrs. Rioridan said teachers will vote today on the board's latest offer.  
 The offer includes a \$500 raise and reduction of the school year from 40 to 39 weeks. The union had been seeking a \$1,200 raise and a 38-week school year. Minimum salaries are now \$5,500 annually.  
 The situation looked bleak across the state.  
 "Until Sunday we were getting eight to 10 settlements a day," said a spokesman for the Michigan Education Association. "Things are starting to have come to a standstill."

In the first month of MiniLiner equipment, using Piper Navajo's instead of DC-3's, outgoing passengers totaled 404, compared with 28 a year ago and with a previous all-time high of 278 set in January, 1961.

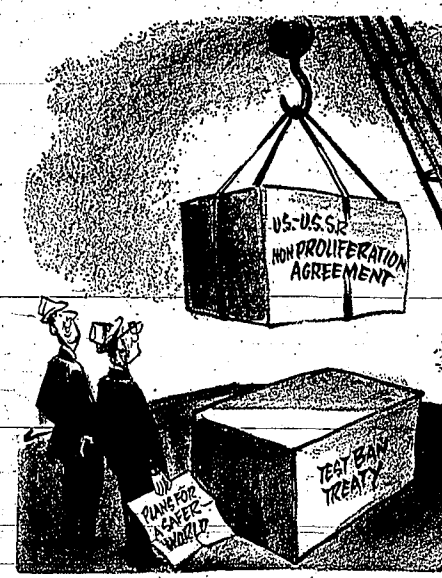

Mayor Johnson said there have been some complaints regarding the council members' salary increase of 100 per cent, but he explained, salaries were only \$50 per month and were

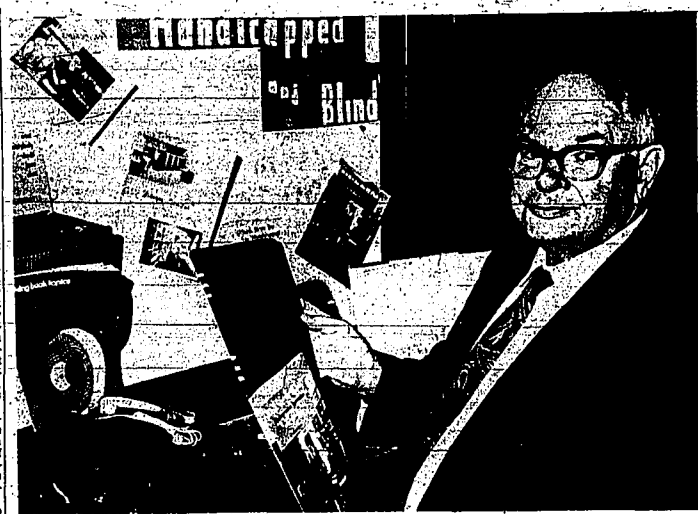

## Talk... Talk... Talk... A Blessing For Those Who Cannot See Or Move

If you were totally blind, partially blind, or handicapped to the extent that you couldn't turn the page of a book, how would you enjoy the world of good books? Impossible? Not now—it isn't.

Talking Books are distributed through the Library of Congress, Division of Work for the Blind.

The service up until recently was offered only to the completely blind, but under a new title of the Library Service to the Handicapped such materials can be distributed to the handicapped who are unable to manipulate the physical act of turning pages, or the process of reading.

Under the new title the Regional Librarian in this case Robert Bruce, for the Twin Falls Region, one of six in Idaho, certifies an individual qualified to receive the material under the regulations.

The Twin Falls Library presently has several units and can receive as many as there are qualified recipients. The unique aspect of the talking books program is that the subscriber keeps the unit, which is a costly and very special phonograph, for as long as he or she wishes.

It remains the property of the Library of Congress but it can be used by a qualified subscriber for their entire life if they wish.

The books are sent to the individuals directly and are sent postage paid. There is no cost in any way, for the complete

service. The individual receives a booklet called "Talking Book Topics" which lists the books available. They range from classics to contemporary selections.

Some of the selections possible are Steinbeck's "Travels With Charley," the "New Testament," or just plain murder mysteries.

The booklet lists literally hundreds and hundreds of selections from which to make a choice. The records sent are quality reproductions of excellent readers reading books in their entirety.

The records are played at 8 1/2 r.p.m. compared to the 3 1/2 r.p.m. normal klay-play/records. The records play for a considerable time so that the user does not have to change records nearly as often.

The user sends the records back in containers provided for

him, postage paid, and he can reorder any book he wishes.

Fairley new books are also offered such as "E. H. Hottel's "Papa Homingway." Literature is available at the Twin Falls public library on the program.

NEW YORK (AP)—A tough-talking, free-swinging, straight-shooting, and colorful newspaper breed, Godfrey Bligh is not for the faint of heart.

Bligh, 63, is a former editor of the *Enterprise*, a newspaper with a passion for exhaustive detective work. Bligh specializes in tracking down financially worthless stocks and bonds.

Because they still may be worth money, says Bligh, perhaps a lot of money.

Take the case of a Louisiana land firm that lost its charter years ago for failing to pay a state tax and had its stock judged worthless.

A few years later another group took over controlling interest, changed the company name, got the charter reinstated, and began operating its sugar, oil and gas. The company began to prosper years later a man showed up with almost 400 shares of the original land firm. The shares were convertible into the new firm and were worth about \$200,000.

Or, a company which was entirely extinct and then suddenly got some unexpected distribution to its shareholders.

"Unfortunately, they no longer have a list of these shares," says Bligh. "So they came to us and asked us to find them. One of those we located was a big holder—he had 8,000 shares and got two cents a share. Not much, but not bad for someone who had no record."

Bligh is president of R. M. Smythe & Co., Inc., a Wall Street and firm in New York City since 1939. It has a history back to 1889. It was founded by Roland M. Smythe, also known as "No Telephone Smythe" because he considered it the ultimate reward to break in on someone on the phone without being announced.

Smythe's passion was obsolete securities and he wrote three books and numerous articles about the subject.

Although Smythe died in 1930, the firm continued to publish a list of valuable extinct securities until 1939 when it stopped because, as Bligh says, "it was decided it was not in the firm's best interest to give information away."

Bligh, who had dealt in securities for many years, joined the firm in 1931. Recently it combined its offices with Herzog & Co., Inc. The firm specializes in over-the-counter securities, and John Herzog, 31, is secretary-treasurer of Smythe as well as Bligh's right-hand man.

In an office jammed with bookshelves and file cabinets, the two men rely on thousands of file cards, dating back to 1900 and 1,200 books containing active and obsolete securities for the information they need to do a successful piece of detective work.

"Most of our business is with banks and attorneys," says Bligh, "but we get a fair amount from ordinary people who find an old stock certificate in the attic and want to find out if it's worth anything. We charge a \$10 search fee to find out for them. If it has any value we will get the money for them for an additional fee."

## Reagan Hopes Legislature Cuts Spending

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Gov. Ronald Reagan looked optimistically to the California Legislature today to uphold his decision to cut another \$35 million in state spending, insisting, "I did not veto lightly."

Dressed in a cream-colored sport coat and dark slacks, his face sunburned, the governor returned to Sacramento Monday night after a month in Southern California recovering from an operation to remove bladder stones.

Facing him was the first veto session in state history, with legislators getting a last chance to save the bills Reagan vetoed when the regular session ended a month ago.

The assembly's Democratic majority also considered whether to contest an earlier Reagan economy measure—\$43.5 million cut from the budget in June.

But the legislature's most powerful Democrat, Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh of Inglewood, said he anticipated no move to override either the budget-cut or Reagan's latest slash in special appropriation bills.

The appropriations bills included measures to improve education and help the mentally retarded.

The Montana workers had lost \$7 million in wages.

2 teaspoons vanilla  
2 cups whipping cream

Peel and pit peaches. Cut into chunks and crush with electric blender or potato masher. Add sugar and almond extract. Refrigerate.

In a saucepan, blend eggs, add milk and flour. Gradually add milk. Cook over low heat until mixture coats spoon, about seven minutes. Stir constantly. Remove from heat and cool.

Add to cooled custard the vanilla and whipping cream. Pour into two freezer trays. Freeze until frozen about one half inch around edge of tray. Remove from trays to a chilled bowl and beat until smooth and fluffy. Fold in crushed peaches. Return to tray and freeze until firm. Makes about two quarts.
