South Korea Says Pact Is Mere 'Scrap Of Paper'

SEOUL (AP) — The South Korean government declared today the Korean armistice agreement has become a "mere scrap of paper" because of mounting attacks from the Communist North. It said it would "take certain very serious actions" against any further rocket attacks.

Choi Kyu-han and Defense Minister Kim Sung-eu would confer with U.N. officials and leaders of the U.N. Command.

The council also discussed proposals for reviving the South Korean militia or employing national police troops to crush infiltrators from the North, a ranking government official said.

A ranking government official reported after the Security Council meeting that the government plans to ask the U.N. General Assembly to send a new U.N. group to supervise the armistice.

"Full and effective supervision of the armed peace in Korea is imperative because of ever-increasing North Korean acts of violence," the official told newsmen after an emergency session of the National Security Council.

President Chung Hee Park called the council together a day after accidents believed from the North mined a South Korean freight train—hauling 10 miles north of Seoul. The explosion wrecked two cars and damaged four. Eight days previously a passenger train 25 miles north of Seoul was derailed by an explosion.

Information—Minister: Hong Joon-chai said after an emergency session of the National Security Council called by President Chung Hee Park that North Korea must bear the responsibility for the situation.

Samuelson Says He Will Aid Truckers

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)— Idaho trucking industry representatives here. Don W. Samuelson suggest today a relaxation of highway weight restrictions and consolidation of highway districts.

In remarks prepared for the 33rd annual convention of the Idaho Motor Transport Association, Samuelson said he was disturbed by "the failure of federal legislation permitting increased sizes and weights for commercial vehicles."

The governor said he would assist truckers in obtaining legislation to liberalize the restrictions.

"I feel that a strong push by the western states for liberal sizes and weights will produce economic benefits for everyone concerned," Samuelson told the group.

He also said Idaho could reduce or combine its highway districts with county jurisdictions and provide maximum use of money and equipment.

Samuelson told the truckers that the highway trust funds industry is important to Idaho's development, employing more than 85,000 persons with a \$200 million annual payroll.

Idaho's Fire Activity Is Still Slow

Fire activity continued slow in North Idaho Thursday, but in Oregon state foresters said burning had been well advanced in Oregon forests said it was hot and windy there, and if the dryness continued there would be new closures of the woods or mandatory "hoot owl" operations. All forests in western Oregon are open, but forecasts called for highs near 90 Thursday with no rain in sight.

Fire activity is reported out of control near Roseburg and foresters said burning dead trees and fires started four of the 13 new fires reported Wednesday.

North Idaho's two major fires—Noria Idaho's Lake and Trappee Park—reportedly were inactive Thursday morning. A forest fire near Wilson, Kootenai county, temperature dipping to 37 at Sandpoint Wednesday night, helping to hold the fires down.

Sun Valley Has New Sister City

SUN VALLEY (AP) — An Austrian community, Klitzbuehel, has been chosen as a sister city of Sun Valley, it was announced Thursday.

Ceremonies marking the designation are planned Saturday and Sun Valley Mayor Winston Gray will be invited to Klitzbuehel. Both Klitzbuehel and Sun Valley are primarily resort communities and both have world-famous ski resorts.

Sigi Engl, head of the Sun Valley school, is a native of Klitzbuehel and he will be in Sun Valley to sign the charter in Austria for the event.

Federal Fire Aid Use Outlined

BOISE (AP) — Procedure for using federal emergency funds to aid in paying costs of fighting fires and rehabilitating Idaho forest lands was outlined today at a Statehouse conference.

Loren Strawn, Everett, Wash. deputy regional director of the U.S. Forest Service, met with Gov. Don W. Samuelson and other state officials concerned with the fight against this year's disastrous forest fires.

Richard Hughes, an aide to the governor, said Strawn explained to the state that "it's a sort of open-end" project applications showing "the nature of the work to be done and justifying the financing."

"It's a long-winded process," Hughes said.

He said the designation by President Johnson of Idaho as a disaster area, effective Aug. 1, because of the widespread fire, makes the state eligible for the federal aid funds.

An original allocation of \$20,000 was made but Hughes said the state does not get this in a chunk. Instead, grants are made as the project applications are approved. Hughes said the total aid may be either more or less than that.

N. Y. Teachers Picket In Defiance Of Court Order

NEW YORK (AP) — Public school teachers carried picket signs in defiance of a court order to go back to work from the fourth day of their strike.

The absence rate among the city's 1.7 million school children went over 60 per cent.

The union's walkout continued despite a State Supreme Court's temporary injunction.

A hearing today on criminal contempt charges against officials of the union was adjourned because the teachers' union requested. However, Justice Emilio Nunez warned that it was the last delay he would grant.

If found guilty, the union officials would face a maximum penalty of \$100 in fines and 30 days in jail.

Nunez had issued the injunction after the union ignored a restraining order as it began its walkout Monday, the scheduled opening of the school term.

Albert Shanker, president of the 49,000-member AFL-CIO United Federation of Teachers said Wednesday its picket lines would stay until the teachers have ratified a contract.

"While legal maneuvering continued here we were seeing signs of student discontent," Shanker said. "Teachers are in a hard spot."

Attendance at the city's 900 schools fell to only 412,739 students by Wednesday. It had decreased according to board of education figures. Officials said no plans had yet been made for classes.

Then, declaring "the teachers executed resignations to engage in a concerted work stoppage—in an attempt to evade the law," Nunez ordered the injunction.

In the background of the legal maneuvering is the state's new teacher law, as yet untested, which provides—lines of up to \$10,000 a day against any union directing a strike of public employees.

At the outset the UFT asked a wage scale for teachers of \$7,500 to \$18,000 a year as opposed to the present scale of \$5,400 to \$11,550. A special three-man mediation panel recommended a scale of \$6,600 to \$13,650—a year which the board endorsed.

Britain Is Protesting China Action

LONDON (AP)— Britain has protested the Chinese seizure of a 15-year-old consulate in Shanghai and plans a formal note demanding "compensation and retracting British rights to the property."

The British Foreign Office said the Shanghai Revolutionary Committee seized the consulate Sept. 8.

The big wall compound was commandeered at the time, Chinese agents having been forced to leave with their family last May after they were ousted and arrested by rioting by rampaging Red Guards.

In Moscow, the Soviet government newspaper Ivestia said the seizure of the consulate in Shanghai was "a serious violation of international law and diplomatic immunity by attacking a neutral consulate."

Moscow radio declared that Mao had purged more than half the members of the Communist party central committees but was still unable to bring China out of chaos.

It was said there was evidence that anti-Mao elements have in fact begun to assume great power.

The Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said a Red Chinese paper has accused the world of "being intimidated by the having her enemies reared, frozen and hanged upside down. Liu's was sealed and armed with glue."

B52 Bombers Strike At Hidden Sites For Red Missile Stations

SAIGON (AP) — High-altitude B52 bombers struck hidden North Vietnam today at hidden sites where the Communists were preparing to put up missile stations in an effort to halt the damaging blows from the Strategic Air Command's demilitarized zone.

The B52 raid three miles inland from Hanoi's center was one of three heavy strikes during which the big bombers dropped 400 tons of bombs from 60,000 feet above the zone north.

Hurricane Beulah Explodes In Size

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Beulah exploded in size and fury today and became one of the most powerful storms in history as it headed for the western Caribbean.

"This is going to become a very serious storm," said a National Hurricane Center spokesman. "Beulah has become once again a very dangerous storm."

It was a small, lightly-wound hurricane when it roared through the eastern Caribbean last night, but it was now taking a big toll of crop and property damage.

Knocked down by a tropical storm, Beulah said she was expected to continue to grow in both size and intensity.

She switched her due west course toward Honduras and began angling toward the west-northwest to the general Gulf of Mexico.

A morning satellite picture revealed that Beulah again had spread out over a major portion of the western Caribbean. She was thrashing along slowly, sucking up energy from the warm sea surface.

"She has gone through a complete change of character," Simpson said. "Beulah has become a very serious storm."

Beulah's new direction was a slow movement and the location of its furthest advanced development.

"It's bad news all the way around."

Romney Is Urged To Announce

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney has been urged to hurry an announcement of candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination but is holding back, a Romney source acknowledged today.

The source added that "even before in June, people were urging the governor to declare the next day."

Romney has taken the advice of some of his top aides not to announce until his position is expected soon the source indicated.

One of those reported to have urged Romney to announce is a Rochester resident known as George Nelson A. Rockefeller, of New York, an early supporter of Romney for the nomination.

Romney is expected to see Rockefeller tonight in New York City in connection with a sampling of urban political views.

Wednesday, Romney flew into Rochester in his undeclared quest and sought answers in a Negro neighborhood to urban uprisings. He got some hard questions.

Steel Truckers' Wildcat Strike Grows More Bitter In 3 States

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Bands of men raved the highways in cars, trucks and pickups, firing shots and hurling rocks at trucks today as a wildcat strike of steel truckers in three states grew more bitter.

The strike by men who own and drive their own trucks began three weeks ago in demand for more money. But the walkout has grown in intensity this week.

Alex Baker, 35, of Monroe Falls, Ohio, was wounded in the arm by a shot from a white hauling steel near Medina.

Near Lisbon, Ohio, two drivers reported shots, were fired at them. One truck was hauling grain and another farm machine, but the highway patrol said the shots could have been misfires taken for steel trucks.

A spokesman for Steel City Transport in Pittsburgh reported another shooting incident.

"I just talked to one of our drivers who said he was shot at yesterday near Moravia, Ohio," the spokesman said. "He told me some men in a car shot out his rear tires. He said he stopped and was changing his tires when they came back and they shot him out his windshield and radiator."

Police in Ohio and western Pennsylvania have received reports of other scattered incidents on the roads—rocks thrown at trucks, shots fired at trying, carloads of men trying to halt trucks.

CAIRO (AP) — U. N. Secretary-General U Thant has threatened to resign unless the United States and the Soviet Union make more serious efforts to solve the problems and difficulties confronting the Middle East in the world, the semi-official newspaper Al-Ahram reported Wednesday.

In a dispatch from its New York correspondent, Al-Ahram said that Thant threatened the U. S. and Soviet governments recently.

Thant was especially bitter, the report said, because of the failure of the United States to give any advice on Vietnam. His chief recommendation has been for a "halt to North Vietnam."

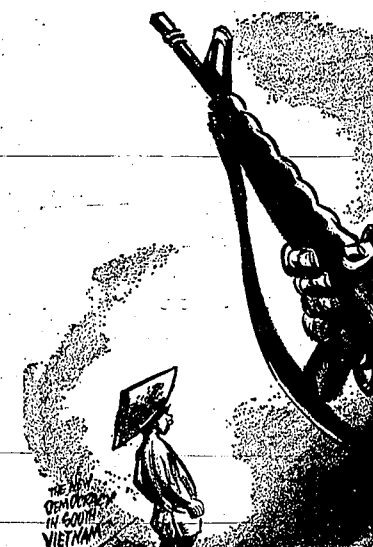

McNamara Directs Work On Combat Planes

By GAYLORD SHAW
WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara has directed the Army and Air Force to proceed with preliminary work on a new high-performance combat aircraft even as his TFX warplane program continues plagued by engineering problems and buffeted by political controversy.

Officials say the new plane would replace the F4, current first-line mainstay in the Vietnam air war, and would supplement—not substitute for—the TFX, or F111.

Designated the VFAX, the craft is intended to be both a fighter and a dive-bomber. It probably would have a swingwing, sport a new engine and pack the most advanced weapons and electronic gear, top Navy officials say.

As Pentagon studies continue, of defense disclosed that development of the Navy's version of the TFX, the F11B, now is 2½ years behind schedule because of "inherent technical difficulties."

The contractors are all doing a lot of work already," Vice Adm. T. F. Connolly, deputy chief of naval operations, told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee in testimony released Wednesday. "The situation has gone quite far."

At the same July 14 hearing, Paul H. Nitze, deputy secretary

of defense disclosed that development of the Navy's version of the TFX, the F11B, now is 2½ years behind schedule because of "inherent technical difficulties."

Nitze and other Pentagon officials also conceded in their endorsed testimony that: "The latest Navy test model is 'extremely deficient in combat mission capability.'"

Test pilots have reported the F11B models they flew contained 22 deficiencies, including 100 they classified as "mandatory for correction."

These pilots concluded that development models are "unsuitable for service."

—Estimated per unit cost of a fully equipped F11B now stands at about \$10 million, more than triple original estimates.

Controversy over the TFX has raged since 1962, when McNamara awarded General Dynamics Corp. a contract to develop an all-purpose craft that could meet major mission responsibilities of both the Air Force and Navy.

The Air Force version, the F11A, has been relatively trouble free. Sources say the Air Force may deploy some F11As in Vietnam early next year, but officials told the committee that carrier tests of the Navy version won't begin until August 1969.

Adm. David L. McDonald, chief of naval operations, testified that recent studies conducted that even when the F11B becomes operational the Navy "also would have to have another fighter plane aboard the carrier."

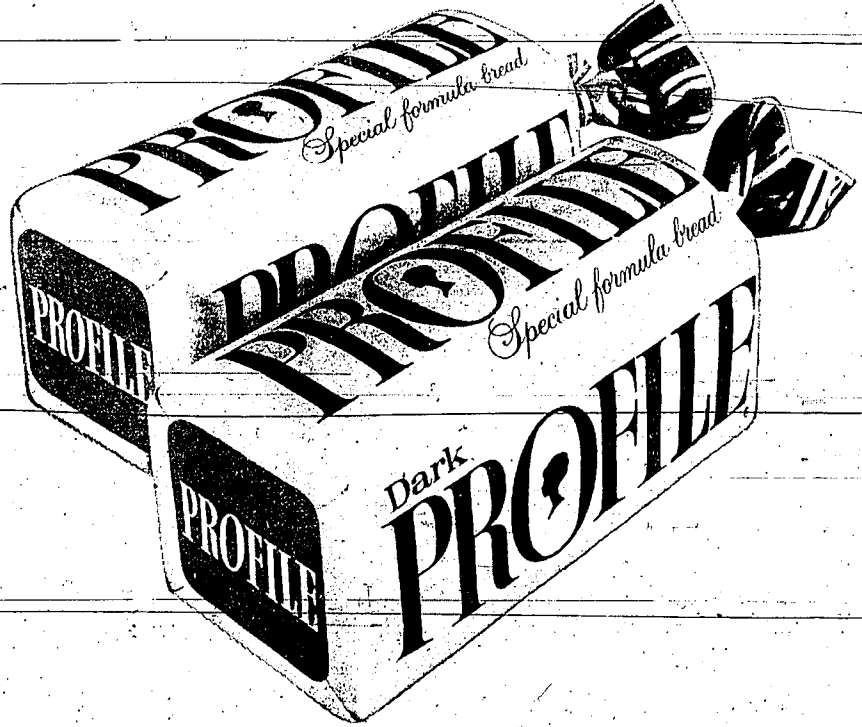

LBJ May Be Heeding Military Chiefs More And McNamara Less On War

WASHINGTON (AP) — Broadening of U.S. bombing in North Vietnam has long opposed McNamara has often expressed his uneasiness about the military chiefs more and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara less on the course of the war.
 If true, the days ahead may bring more U.S. attacks in high-risk, politically sensitive areas of the Communist country, while magnifying whatever differences may exist between McNamara and the military.
 A few days ago McNamara denounced the need for striking the three major Communist ports of Haiphong, Cam Pha and Hon Gai. He told Congress this would not prevent the enemy from getting essential supplies through to forces in South Vietnam. The Joint Chiefs of Staff wanted all three hit.
 Monday, McNamara was quoted as saying: "The enemy is not being starved."
 Tuesday, American planes attacked Haiphong in what the military billed as an attempt to seal off the main port.
 Hon Gai will be next on the list, with the timing dependent on when the port is empty of Soviet ships—the condition under which Cam Pha was raided.
 These were the latest in a series of new targets to be hit this year.
 An Associated Press check of communiques shows that more than 20 new, militarily vital targets have been struck by U.S. planes since February. McNamara reportedly had reservations about the values in bombing at least some of the targets, as well as the risks involved.
 McNamara's press office drew a distinction between facilities hit in Haiphong Tuesday, and the inviolate docks.
 Phil G. Goulding, chief Pentagon spokesman, denied any approval had been given for striking the port facilities—a move McNamara has long opposed since Soviet vessels often unloading there.
 Two bridges, a railway and a storage warehouse were attacked, all within two miles of Haiphong's center, all previously untouched and all removed from the docks themselves.
 The White House for the second time this month denied any major disagreement exists among the top civilian and military heads. White House press secretary George Christian told newsmen Wednesday it was "not correct" to say McNamara opposed bombing within Haiphong.
 Despite McNamara's contention that Hanoi cannot be bombed to the negotiating table, the face of the air war has changed significantly this year, both in terms of targets and numbers of flights.
 The emphasis has switched from raids against moving "targets of opportunity" in North Vietnam's southern panhandle to strikes against fixed, key transportation and war-related industrial complexes in the northeast quadrant encompassing Hanoi and Haiphong.
 Information gleaned from military reports and interviews indicates that so far this year the administration has authorized three major distinct phases of what may be loosely termed escalation.
 These phases involved attacks on new, but not necessarily new types, of targets.

Rockefeller's Disavowal Of Candidacy Buys Romney Hopes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's fresh disavowal of presidential ambitions Tuesday bought George Romney's supporters that the Michigan governor will get New York's 22 votes at the 1968 Republican convention.
 In both moderate and conservative party circles Rockefeller's disavowal Wednesday that he has attained a "sense of fulfillment" and no longer is interested in going after the presidential nomination was greeted as defining his present intentions.
 But there were quick reservations that shifting political tides—particularly if Romney should fall in the presidential primaries next spring—could force the New York governor to change his mind about becoming available.
 Sen. Thurston B. Morton, R-Ry., a former GOP national chairman, was plugging for the nomination of a moderate, said he doesn't for one moment question Rockefeller's sincerity, but he will not concede that he will not seek the nomination, but he is going to do everything he can for Romney.
 "But I still maintain that if the convention delegates seek the nomination will be a different bill of goods."
 Rockefeller himself shrugged off the possibility of a draft, saying, "I'm not concerned about these things happen."
 Rockefeller's statements to AP correspondent Reiman Martin in a New York interview

reassured the Romney camp his campaign bandwagon over the "highly coveted" Rockefeller. The New York Times called Rockefeller his party's strongest candidate.

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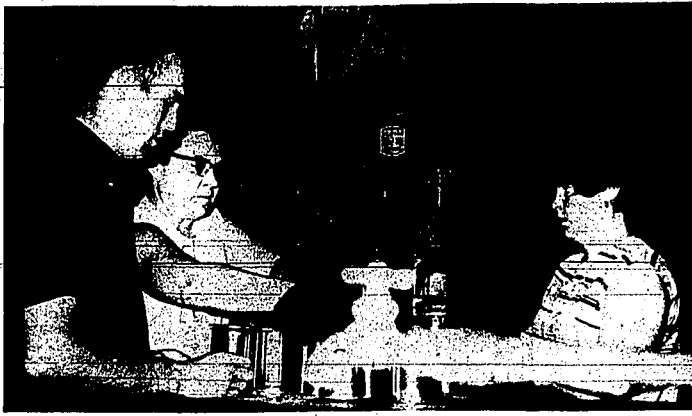

Hot Fighting Pushes War Death Toll Up

SAIGON (AP) — The hard fighting which followed South Vietnam's presidential election pushed American and Communist combat dead last week to their highest total in two months.

The U.S. Command reported 242 U.S. troops killed in action, 1,490 wounded and seven missing, while 2,103 of the enemy were reported killed, nearly double the 1,064 reported the week before.

It was the highest American and enemy toll since the week ending July 8, when 2,159 Red troops were reported killed, American casualties that week were 232 killed, 1,170 wounded and one missing.

The heavy casualties resulted from fierce U.S. Marine fighting around coastal Tam Ky and 150 miles to the north near the fringes of the demilitarized zone.

By unofficial tabulation, the casualties brought the total number of Americans killed in combat in Vietnam to 13,129 and the total number of wounded to 81,028.

The American casualties last week compared with the 157 U.S. troops killed, 1,588 wounded and 230 missing in the previous week ending Sept. 2.

South Vietnamese casualties last week were reported as 250 killed, 843 wounded and 23 missing, compared to 280 dead, 674 wounded and 44 missing the previous week.

Pfc. William Joe Thelsen, son of Bill Thelsen, Kimberly, and Mrs. Carol Thelsen, Twin Falls, was injured Sept. 3 in the Quang Tri area of Vietnam. He is with the U.S. Marines.

Private Thelsen received a fragmentation wound in the left eye from hostile-rocket fire while in a defensive position. He was treated in the field and returned to duty. He enlisted Sept. 12, 1966.

Pfc. Dennis C. Butcher, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Darrell D. Butcher, 2311 Burton, Burley, was assigned to the 25th Infantry Division in Vietnam, mortarman in Company D, 2nd Battalion of the division's 12th Infantry located near Dau Tieng.

Radiobiologist Presents Paper

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP) — Malignant diseases occurred in 46 of 293 persons known to have been exposed to radium in the 1920s and 1930s, a scientific paper presented here Wednesday showed.

The paper was among those given at discussions among scientists from seven nations on delayed effects of bone-seeking radioactive substances.

More than 100 radiobiologists from the United States, Canada, England, West Germany, Spain, Israel and the Soviet Union discussed the effects of accumulated radium in human and animal bones.

The paper which reported malignancies in 46 of 293 persons was a study of a group of girls who had worked painting luminous dials on watches and a group of mental patients who had received injections of radium as medication.

The paper was by Drs. Asher J. Finkel, Robert J. Hasterlik and Charles E. Miller, all of the Argonne National Laboratory in Illinois. Data collected in the study was used to establish certain maximum permissible levels of accumulated radium.

The meetings of radiobiologists continued today. The conference is under direction of Dr. Charles W. Mays of the University of Utah Medical School. It is sponsored by the university and the Atomic Energy Commission.

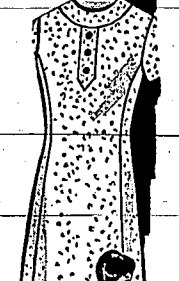

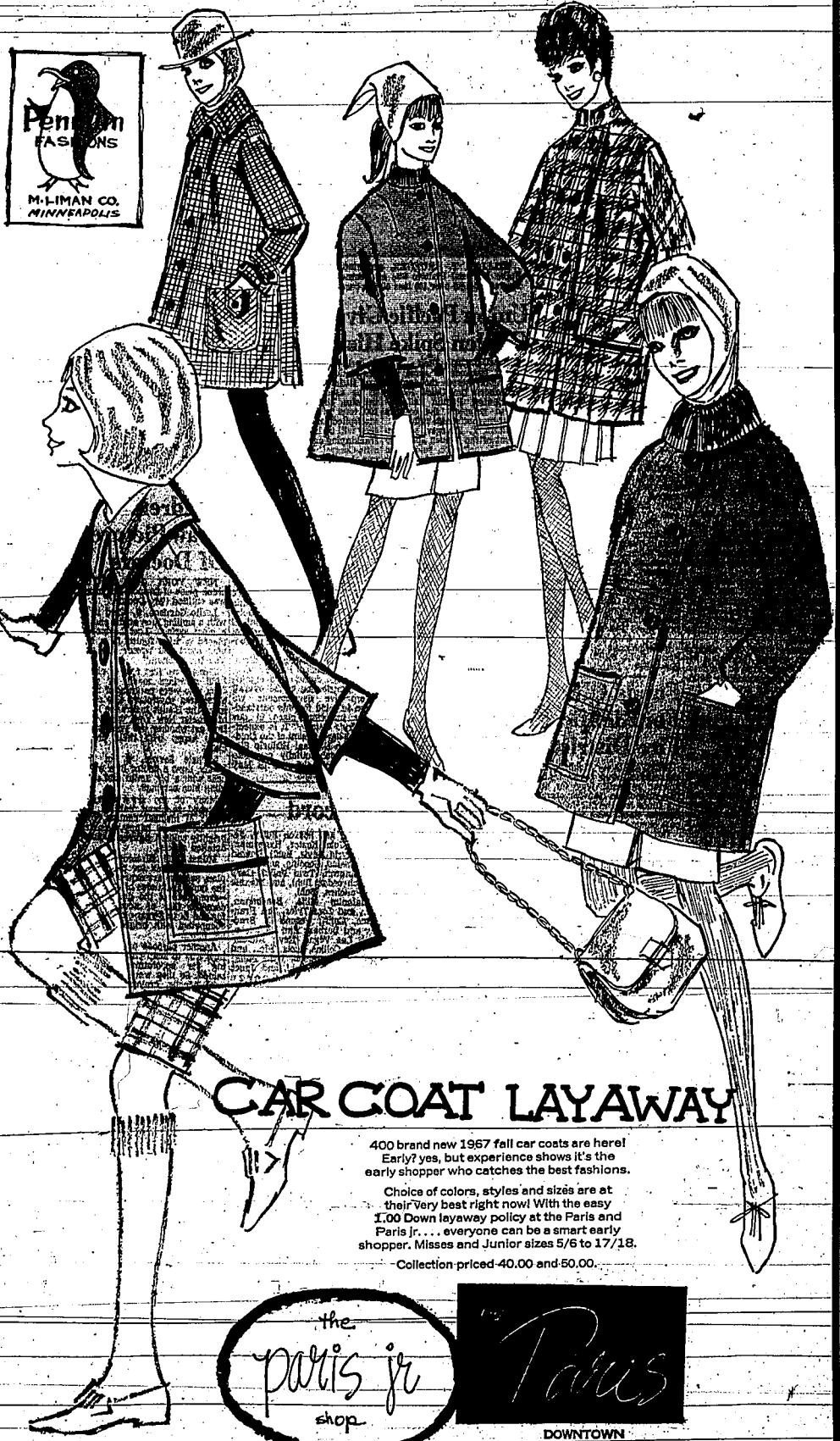
DEAR LIES: The way "guy" looks may be none of your father's business, but the kind of fellows who call on his 14-year-old daughter is probably the most important business a father has.

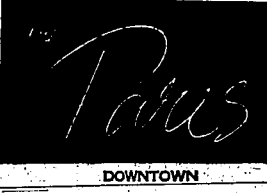
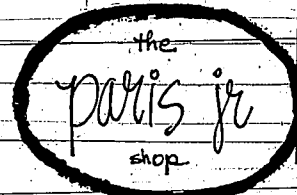

Sage Grouse Season To Begin Saturday

Chukars, Quail, Huns Also Open; Dove Hunt Ends

Magic Valley's upland bird season—headed by the always popular sage grouse shoot, will begin Saturday morning with overall prospects running similar to last year.

Opening in addition to sage grouse, will be the seasons for Chukar and Hungarian partridge, all varieties of quail and Blue, Ruffed and Spruce Grouse. But the big concentrations for Saturday are expected to hit in the sagebrush lands north of Shoshone and the Shoshone Basin, south of Twin Falls. The season will run from Saturday through Wednesday in all Magic Valley counties with daily bag and possession limit of two.

An exception to the five-day season will be a large portion of Owyhee County, which will remain open through Oct. 1. The portion of Owyhee County included in the five-day season is that portion lying east of the boundary beginning at G. J. Strike dam, up the Bruneau River to the junction of the east and west forks, up the west fork to its junction with the Jarbridge River and up the main and east-fork of that river past the Hot Springs to the Nevada state line.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department believes success will be closely followed that of last year. Booming ground and brood counts show production about the same as 1967.

Currently the birds appear to be pretty well bunched, making targets for hunters. Should rainy weather strike just before or during Saturday, the birds will disperse and hunters will have to get out and search.

Seven checking stations will be in operation throughout the area and hunters are reminded they are required by law to stop at these and produce any game they are hunting. The law also requires that dead dressed birds must be kept in readily identifiable condition. This may be accomplished by leaving one fully feathered wing.

As in past years, the department will ask hunters for permission to clip a wing, which is used for aging and sexing and devising a better idea of production.

The daily bag limits for partridge and quail will be 10 chukars and 10 in aggregate of quail. Possession limits after the first day is 20, respectively.

The only portion of Magic Valley not opening to partridge and quail is found in Gooding county, basically along the main canal.

That area, which will open Oct. 22 and run through Dec. 31, includes the area lying north and west of the boundary along the North Gooding main canal at the Gooding-Lincoln county line, west along the canal to Dry Creek, down Dry Creek to the Wood River, down Big Wood River to the Union Pacific Railroad line and west along the road to the Elmore-Gooding county line.

Sam McNeill, biologist for the department, notes once again production is about comparable to last year. He said he had conducted walking brood counts in the north of the rock bluffs in the Clover and Call Creek areas. He adds two new plantings of Chukars were made south of the Oakley Reserve.

The Blue, Ruffed and Spruce Grouse will open all counties except Ouster, Idaho, L. E. M. H. Lewis, Nez Perce and Valley.

Hunters also are reminded that few Mourning Doves still remaining in the state will be legal targets through Sunday.

In 1966 the Lobos won their first two games convincingly, and then about faced and lost eight straight. They return over 28 lettermen, including highly-regarded quarterback Rick Beutler and a whole flock of receivers.

ISU has built its offense around all-Pro Sky candidate Bill Ingram, who rewrote all ISU games and season passing records despite missing two games with a concussion. 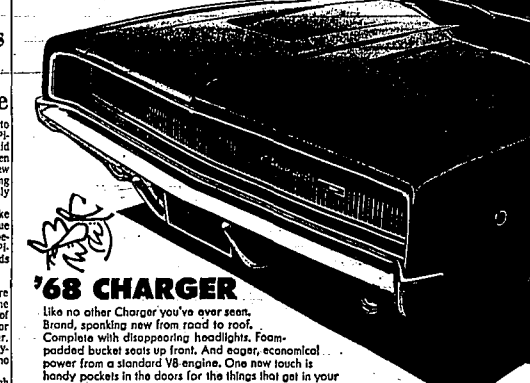
Walker was replaced by Danny Murtagh on July 18. The latter pitched the Pirates to the NL pennant and a World Series victory over the New York Yankees in 1960.

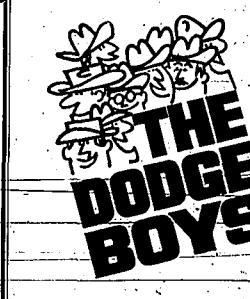

\$1 Billion Slum Investment Pledged By Industry

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$1-billion slum investment promise by the life insurance industry has boosted President Johnson's battered rent supplement program.

Life insurance leaders announced at the White House Wednesday they will make \$1 billion of their \$16 billion in annual investment money available for use in the city slums.

And Gilbert W. Fitzhugh, board chairman of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. said "the rent supplement program is probably the area into which we will move most rapidly."

Immediately, the move will provide the rent supplements program with private long-term mortgage money which has been lacking. This will counter critics of the rent supplements program who have argued supplements were not feasible because private firms wouldn't invest in the buildings.

The move also could give rent supplements a lift in Congress, where the program is fighting for its life. A House bill would kill it by denying expansion funds. The Senate Appropriations Committee gave new hope to supporters of the program by voting it the full \$40 million the administration asked.

Rent supplements are the difference between a determined reasonable rental and the 25 per cent of their income which qualifying families pay.

Wednesday's announcement also gave the President his second announced new thrust into the low-income housing field in as many days. Robert C. Weaver, secretary of housing and urban development, said Tuesday it would be possible to double last fiscal year's output of public housing units to about 70,000 this year.

And less than a month ago Weaver announced a new plan to bring private enterprise into construction and management to speed production of low-income public housing.

In addition to providing mortgage money for the rent supplement program, the life insurance industry will make such money available for residents of blighted areas to buy or improve their homes.

Fitzhugh, chairman of the Urban Problems Committee of the American Life Convention and American Life Convention and Life Insurance Association of America, also indicated the industry will finance some commercial developments in the slums. Money for these purposes now is extremely scarce—and what is available draws burdensome interest rates, federal housing officials said in a series of interviews, explaining that private lenders consider blighted areas bad risks.

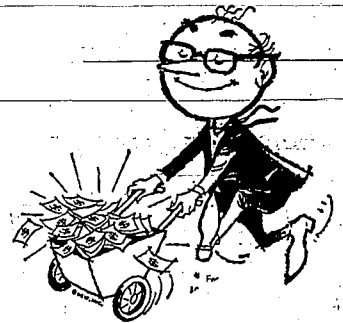

been made because he thought that West would make his contract. It was a good save. East and West made one club, two diamonds and a heart and collected a 700-point penalty, but the slam was there for them.

South told West, "I bid hearts to ask for a lead and a heart lead would give you the spade slam." West replied, "So would any other lead. Suppose North opens a diamond. I would win in dummy and draw trumps with two leads. Then I would lead my singleton heart. If North rose with his king, I would lead dummy's queen of hearts through South's ace for a ruffing finesse and eventually ruff my three clubs and discard by one leading diamond on the heart honor. If North ducked, my jack of hearts would force South's ace. I would ruff dummy's two little hearts later on. North's king would fall and I would still get rid of my losing diamond." "Right," said South, "it seems that we did out best after all."
