

The use of a soft landing to end the mission seemed to con-firm earlier indications that the docking was a rehearsal for a manned flight and the building in orbit of a huge orbiting space platform.

The announcement said Cosmos 186 was brought to an un-disclosed spot on earth at 11:29

a.m. Moscow time (3:20 a.m. EST) after "automatic linkup and other scientific tasks."

The other unmanned Sputnik, Cosmos 188, continued to orbit earth, it added.

Earlier in the day the Soviet Union disclosed it had sent up still another satellite-Cosmos 189. It also continued in orbit. Soviet scientists disclosed that

the unmanned spaceship was sent into space Monday while another Sputnik rocketed up to dock automatically with another unmanned vehicle. Soviet newspapers hailed the

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There has been speculation the Russians would send up a new manned spaceship for the anniversary.

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said Cosmos 189 was functioning normally, circling the earth every 95.7 minutes with 332 miles the maximum height of its orbit. No specific mission was announced for the craft, but the Soviets said it was "designed to continue space re-search."

Cosmos 186 and 188, which joined and then separated on command from computers 31/2

hours later, apparently continue to circle the earth, but there was no indication if they would carry out further joint maneu-vers. The docking Monday was a test for systems used in build-ing stations in space, the Soviet announcement said announcement said. It also seemed like an obvious

preparation for what the Sovie space program wants to do next-dorm a space platform by joining together manned craft in orbit. But the new unmanned testing suggested a cautious at-titude before cosmonauts are risked in space again. Space-man Vladimir M. WASHINGTON - Because the House is overset with self-serv-ing whoopers and red-blooded boobs, its motives must always be suspect even when it upholds motherhood. But it is hard not to sympathize with its action in inting a guernmant with action in oting a government-wide

ing on spending that could force cuts of \$8.7 billion. At the risk of courting a libel suit, it must be stated that there is a dab of the plain citizen in every House member.Undoubtedly, it was this that caused the House to reject another of those deorge Mahon, D-Tex., that it engage in one of those inter-minable and ineffective "re-

views" of individual programs before setting spending limits. Clearly, the House was in no mood for sweet reasonableness, probably because it had been tried so often before without results. Prodded by a flood of mail from constituents, our fed-up legislators decided the hell with the details and reached for the meat axe. Their sentiment was shown in the votes - 238 was shown in the votes — 238 to 164 to adopt the ceiling, 244 to 158 against referring it to the Appropriations Committee and 253 to 143 for final passage. In short, the House grew more "unreasonable" with every fleet-

Ing minute. The Administration had argued

that an \$8.7 billion cut would be impossible without "radical" reductions in federal programs. Okay, said the House, leave us have some "radical" reductions. Among other things, the House Celling would freeze Great Society programs at last year's low levels by banning step-ups scheduled for this year, an even-tuality sure to lose votes for Lyndon Johnson and some other Democratic candidates in 1968. Perhaps this is the best measure of the House's mood, and one some of its members may live

to regret. Still the House did not abandon all of its cunning, peasant cau-tion. Its basic pusilianimity was

reflected in the careful manne in which its members covered their retreat.

In dumping Mahon's proposal for selective cuts in spending, for example, the membership arranged matters so that it could not be blamed for specific cuts which might offend specific con-stituents. As Mahon remarked, the members wanted to make sure President Johnson could be blamed for the more unnonular blamed for the more unpopular budget reductions.

It was significant, too, that an amendment to make Congress subject to the proposed payroll cutback was defeated, 134 to 66. Politicians are a suspicious lot, and the House was not swallow-Ing assurances that almost cer-tainly no Congressman would be forced to fire any staff members.

In turn, the House also defeated a proposal to cut funds for development of the supersonic transport plane and a "do-it-

## A Confusing City

Urban renewal is a lot like the weather: Everybody talks about it but nobody really seems to know what to do about it.

"In the face of the most sweeping change since the great wave of city building in the Middle Ages, there is as yet no generally accepted concept of what should be sought in the form and fabric of a great city," complains Richard B. Morris, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards.

On the one hand are the "apostles of low density," who advise m or e planned satellite communities. They are countered by advocates of high density, who dream of "club sand-wich cities" that would stack up different uses of urban land on top of one another — such as apartment buildings that contain their own schools, businesses, recreation facil-ities, public services, etc.

Then there are those who believe that emphasis on mass transportation is the solution to the city's needs. They are opposed by those who feel the private automobile must be catered to at all costs.

Some urban specialists have turned against the detached single-family home, which has been the traditional American norm, feeling that bur-geoning metropolitan areas can no longer afford such inefficient use of land.

City change is also having an effect on the form of local government, as cities are faced with inadequacies of splintered municipal jurisdictions to cope with the problems of air and water pollution, public transit, highway planning and other problems which are no respecters of boundary lines. These are only a few indications of


new forces that are accumulating to bring about "the greatest extent of city change that any of us have known," says Morris. But in facing these new forces, he suggests we keep in mind a few basic factors:

"No city has ever achieved greatness without a deep respect on the part of its citizens for law and order. "Civic character of a great city is derived from a high degree of local responsibility rather than from dependency.

"A great city expresses in civic works and in the conduct of local affairs the distinctive character, the aspirations, the skill and enthusiasm ance of synthetic norms imposed upon it."

In other words, a city can be great no matter how hodgepodgedly it has grown.

But no amount of planning-assuming we can agree on our plans-will guarantee that this intangible something called greatness will be built in along with the bricks and girders.



The bullet pierced her chest and came out her back. After surgery at Doctor's Hospital, she remained in satisfactory condition today.

"Our recommendations on fi-nancing the project are just that - r e c o m m e n dations," Mr. Kelsch said.

Keisch said. The project area, known as the core area of downtown, has been changed a little since the idea was conceived and the urban renewal agency formed July 19, 1965.

From there it comes back to Second Street East, a turn across Main Ave nue to the alley between Main A v e n u e and Second Avenue West, then on to where the line


