Children May Have Been Poisoned For Insurance

ARCADIA, Fla. (AP)—DeSoto County Sheriff Frank Cline today, a motive—a father's anticipated collection of life insurance benefits—had been established in the insecticide poisoning deaths a week ago of seven children.

Cline said he had information that five of Richardson's children, aged 5 months to 7 years, died in Jacksonville, "over the past few years."

The motive was "reimbursement for life insurance, the cause of death was eating something which contained parathion which was in the pots of food which the children licked clean at noon time the day they died," Cline said.

Viet Cong Attack Loc Ninh

The 200-room barrage fired at one of the American battalions defending Loc Ninh wounded only one man. A total of 365 Communists have been reported killed in attempts this week to overrun the town 72 miles north of Saigon, apparently for a propaganda victory to take honor bloom of the inauguration of President Nguyen Van Thieu.

Humphrey Sees Marine Battleground From Air

By PETER ARNETT DA NANG, Vietnam (AP)—Flying a quarter of a mile high between the range of Communist machine-guns and missiles, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey surveyed the DMZ.

Humphrey, dressed in light blue slacks and a sports shirt, suggested landing at Dong Ha, the Marine base 17 miles south of the DMZ, as he could "make a little helicopter ride north."

Humphrey ended his visit to South Vietnam for the inauguration of President Nguyen Van Thieu with a visit to the Marines at Da Nang before flying to the Malaysian capital of Kuala Lumpur.

President's Anticrime Bill Emerges From Committee Full Of Amendments

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's anticrime bill has emerged from a Senate Judiciary subcommittee bristling with amendments that would grant expanded powers to police, including wiretapping and eavesdropping authority.

The subcommittee's version of the measure strikes out at recent Supreme Court decisions on criminal case confessions and electronic eavesdropping.

And it flies directly in the face of Johnson's request that Congress outlaw all electronic eavesdropping except in cases directly related to the national security.

As proposed by Johnson, the bill would have provided federal funds to assist in better training and equipping of local police forces.

As approved Monday by the subcommittee and sent to the full Senate Judiciary Committee, the measure also would:

—Remove Supreme Court restrictions of the admissibility of confessions in criminal cases.

—Permit wiretapping and other electronic eavesdropping by law enforcement officers under court order without previous determination that national security was involved.

—Authorize the FBI director to establish a National Institute of Law Enforcement Training.

and, at the request of any state or local government, provide training for its police force.

—Bar federal courts below the Supreme Court from granting writs of habeas corpus in cases where a conviction has been affirmed by a state supreme court.

—Permit snowpasses to a crime to identify suspects in a police line-up when the suspects have no attorney present to represent them.

Subcommittee Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark., said he hoped Congress would act on the bill this year. He has repeatedly accused the Supreme Court of handcuffing the police.

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., who sponsored some of the chief additions to the legislation, said: "I felt that any legislation designed to curb crime in our nation would be inadequate without something being done about recent Supreme Court decisions which hamstring the police."

—Lurleen Wallace Leaves Hospital HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Gov. Lurleen Wallace of Alabama leaves a hospital today after nearly eight weeks of cobalt radiation therapy treatments.

Mrs. Wallace, 41, underwent cancer surgery at M. D. Anderson Hospital and tumor institute last July and shortly thereafter began the radiation treatments at the hospital as a precautionary measure against recurrence.

Joining in sponsorship are Protestants of denominations affiliated with the Idaho Council of Churches, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Boise, which comprises the entire state, and the Greek Orthodox Church in Idaho.

Clothing and materials contributed will be distributed by Catholic relief services, Church World Service, Lutheran World Relief and a Greek Orthodox Relief Agency.

Veterans Protest New Burial Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)— The Veterans of Foreign Wars are protesting new burial policies at Arlington National Cemetery by refusing to participate with other veterans' organizations in Veterans Day ceremonies at the cemetery.

The Department of Defense announced in February that Arlington had almost no burial plots left and that interment there would be available only to Medal of Honor winners, veterans who held high public office, career military men and those killed on active duty.

VFW Commander Joseph A. Scerra announced Tuesday the VFW would not join other organizations in the Veterans Day observance Nov. 11. Scerra was following orders spelled out in a resolution adopted in August at the VFW national convention.

The VFW's position, a spokesman said, is that all veterans are equally entitled under present law to burial in Arlington or any other national cemetery, and that the Department of Defense has no authority to make Arlington a special preserve for certain selected veterans.

PLATES ARE MADE
BOISE (AP)— About half the 1.2 million rectorized license plates that will be issued to Idaho vehicle owners have been manufactured in the factory at the Idaho State Penitentiary.

Prison Industries director Ira Gunn said Wednesday the balance of the plates will be made by February.

The plates—bearing for the first time a rectorized substance on the numerals—will be issued at county courthouses beginning Dec. 1.

WASHINGTON (AP)— Senate probes open public hearings today on Negro rioting and other civil disturbances with testimony about a Houston uprising last May in which one policeman was killed.

The probe by the Senate's permanent investigations subcommittee, headed by Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., was ordered by the Senate Aug. 11.

Since then, the subcommittee has had tens of investigators gathering information in riot-hit cities throughout the nation.

The riot in Houston on May 16 and 17 broke out on the campus of Texas Southern University, the state's largest all-Negro college. Nearly 600 Negroes were arrested, some of them students at the university.

Testimony about the riot and its causes is expected to take two days or more. Next week the subcommittee plans to examine a riot last April in Nashville, Tenn. Hearings on riots in Plainfield and Englewood, N.J., are expected to follow.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Democratic critics of President Johnson's Vietnam policy suggested the kind of debate which he carried on in party councils as Democrats prepare for the 1968 White House campaign.

'Think Small' Is Message Of Subcommittee

By JOHN BECKLER
WASHINGTON (AP) — "Think small" is the message a House subcommittee is trying to get across to Defense Dept. officials who acknowledge their attention wanders when the dollar volume drops.

With mounting dismay, the subcommittee heard Tuesday the details on a number of purchases in which the government paid far more than the going price for small lots of items needed by the military services.

"This is a sick day," said Rep. Otis G. Pike, D-N.Y., "it's a sick system," echoed Chairman Porter Hardy Jr., D-Va., of the Armed Services subcommittee exploring procurement practices.

One of the main troubles, readily admitted, Defense Dept. witnesses, is that the people doing the buying in the "small purchase" units don't know what they're buying or what it should cost.

"We've gone from 81,000 transactions to 20,000 and from 300 people to 1,000 in the five years," said a department official, "and I defy anyone to find that many people qualified in procurement."

He said another problem is that a department that spends \$45 billion a year on procurement has a hard time adapting itself to the purchase of 64 coupings at \$40.75 each.

"We've never spent much time pricing items in this area," agreed Col. Stanley Allen, director of procurement for the San Antonio Air Materiel Area, "it's a matter of emphasis and manpower."

Girl Comes Out Of Coma After 4-Year Silence

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — A 19-year-old girl whose parents said she went into a coma after hearing of the death of President John F. Kennedy, woke up and spoke Tuesday for the first time in nearly four years, a doctor said.

There was no report of what she said.

Dr. Doraz Morales said Maria Elena Tello had been flown here last week for special treatment after lying motionless since 1963 in San Juan, a provincial capital in western Argentina.

Political Club Wants To Assist Nelson Rockefeller

A political club that helped gain Republican presidential nominations for Thomas E. Dewey and Dwight D. Eisenhower wants to bestow the same favor on New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller in 1968.

But Rockefeller said again Tuesday he isn't a candidate "and wouldn't be a candidate."

His statement came after the 1,500-member New York Young Republican Club said it will launch a draft Rockefeller campaign Nov. 8, no matter what the governor says. It was an early, enthusiastic backer of Dewey in 1952 and Eisenhower in 1952.

"The club's position," said Chairman Stanley B. Thomas of the group's board of directors, "is that the governor is the most qualified man in the United States to be president."

Another possible candidate for the GOP presidential nod meanwhile offered an alternative to President Johnson's Vietnam policy.

Michigan Gov. George Romney told a Providence, R.I., news conference the United States should press for neutralization of the Southeast Asian nations involved in the Vietnam fighting and thereby "defuse the war."

And Sen. Barry Goldwater, the 1964 GOP presidential nominee whom both Romney and Rockefeller refused to support, predicted neither would end up as the party's 1968 candidate.

That honor, Goldwater forecast in a Miami speech, would go to former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who did support the party's 1964 ticket.

McCarthy said Tuesday the process has no overtones could lead to contests over foreign policy pronouncements in the Democratic platform and perhaps over the presidential nomination itself.

"You have to anticipate ultimately that there may be a challenge to the President," McCarthy said.

McCarthy said in-party debate over Vietnam would be politically better for the Democrats than "to pretend a unity which is not genuine."

Should Johnson, as expected, seek a second full term in the White House, "it would appear virtually impossible for any challenger to wrest the nomination from him."

McCarthy acknowledged that, but said the process of challenge could itself have some impact on administration policy.

Chairman J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., of the Foreign Relations Committee said open discussion of war policy in the months before the Democratic national convention would be helpful to Johnson.

Fulbright said polls indicate a widespread public belief that the nation is not getting the full story on Vietnam, and pre-campaign Democratic discussion of the issue would help overcome that.

"It would be a very healthy thing for the country," Fulbright said.

"This debate should be within the Democratic Party," McCarthy said in an interview. "Republicans are not really confronting this."

Gov. Reagan Denies Report By Pearson

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan has denied a report by syndicated columnist Drew Pearson that two former members of Reagan's staff "were engaged in homosexual activities."

"It's a lie," Reagan told his regular weekly news conference Tuesday. Once he pounded the speaking rostrum with his fist.

"I'm not going to dignify Drew Pearson by even attempting to answer anything as scurrilous and as ridiculous as this report."

In a statement issued in Washington, D.C., Pearson said "the facts in this case are incontrovertible and he knows it."

The column was published in some newspapers Tuesday but others did not print it. Pearson did not name anyone to whom he referred.

At Reagan's news conference, which lasted 15 minutes, no one was named.

Reagan said, "I think the part of thing goes along with the game of politics. Fortunately, this is one place where the business I was in does give me a little conditioning for the present occupation because it also sort of went along with show business."

Wallace also claimed Negroes and whites get along better in Alabama than in most other places in the nation.

'Draft Benson For President' Move Starts

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — An embryonic political group has begun a movement to draft former U.S. Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson as an independent presidential candidate in 1968.

Benson, a general authority of the LDS Church, says he "had no knowledge of the group" and he was "not seeking public office."

He was a cabinet member during the Eisenhower administration.

Petitions to place Benson's name on ballots in Utah began circulating Tuesday. At the helm of a group called Independent American Party is Gregory W. Killips, a 21-year-old printer who recently moved to Salt Lake City from Independence, Mo.

Killips said the party derives its name from a prediction by Mormon Church founder Joseph Smith that a third party would form and assume reins of a faltering American government.

The movement to draft Benson has no official connection with the Mormon Church. A church spokesman said he could not verify Killips' reference of a third party as part of Smith's writings.

Killips said his group of some 400 is not affiliated with the American Independent Party, actively drafting former Alabama Gov. George Wallace as an independent candidate for president.

Killips said he has written for the election laws of all states, something which reportedly has prompted curiosity from political observers.

"Petitions will be in circulation within a month in various other states," Killips said.

He said his group picked Benson "because he stands for the constitution as it was originally intended." Killips said members of the right-wing John Birch Society belong to the draft movement as "some of our ideas are similar."

He said his party's basic platform contained states rights and a "get out of Vietnam" plank.

The Independent American Party was formed in June 1966 at Independence, but didn't become active until "about a month ago," Killips said.

He said he planned to meet with Benson "within the next few days."

Benson said Tuesday he "would be like any red-blooded American who would want to serve his country if he felt there was a cause."

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Ford Is Recalling 700,000 Autos

DETROIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. said Tuesday it is recalling more than 700,000 1968 and 1967 model cars for possible defective steering wheels.

The recalls involved 745,000 cars, including 447,000 1967 model Mustangs of which 267,000 have the type steering wheel that may be defective. The other models include 298,000 Falcons, Fairlanes and Thunderbirds produced in 1966 and 1967.

The company said the recall involves 1968 and 1967 model Falcons and 1968 model Fairlanes produced at the firm's Kansas City assembly plant and 1967 Thunderbirds manufactured at its Wixom, Mich., plant.

Economic Expansion In Its 81st Month

By JOSEPH R. COYNE
WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economic expansion moved into its 81st month today in history if it lasts through November — and the government's top economist says chances of keeping it alive indefinitely are "greatly improved."

But his optimism, added Chairman Gardner Ackley of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, hinges in large part on the future of President Johnson's proposed 10 per cent income-tax surcharge.

Ackley said the nation now has the knowledge and tools "which greatly improve our chances of sustaining a healthy expansion for an indefinite period."

But he warned that America must be willing to use such tools, and said at this time that means approval of President Johnson's proposed 10 per cent income tax surcharge and cuts through November — and the government's top economist says chances of keeping it alive indefinitely are "greatly improved."

Ackley said in a statement Tuesday. "We also must show that we have the self-discipline to apply necessary restraints when the economy is threatened by overstimulation."

As of Tuesday, the economy completed 80 months of expansion — matching the length of the boom that accompanied World War II.

The current boom began in February 1961, the month after the late President John F. Kennedy was inaugurated.

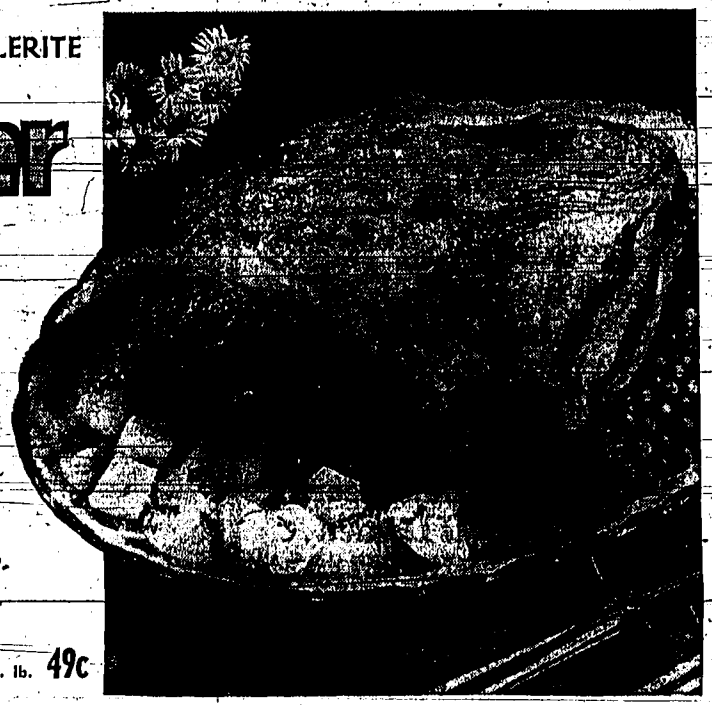

George Brown Is Deep In Controversy

LONDON (AP) — British Foreign Secretary George Brown was deep in controversy again today after telling the nation's biggest publisher "it is about time you shut up" and calling British newspapers "the most prostituted press in the world."

Brown turned on Lord Thomson of Fleet at a banquet the publisher gave for American executives Wednesday night, then later waded into a 10-minute row with newsmen covering the banquet.

Brown's outburst was apparently set off by a joke Thomson made introducing him. The foreign secretary put aside his prepared text to attack the London-born publisher, apparently for a series of articles in his London Sunday Times is running about Harold Philby, the former Foreign Office man who spied for the Soviet Union for 30 years until he defected to Moscow in 1951.

"You are doing your papers are doing under your control — a very great disservice to this country and a very great disservice to the affairs which we ought to be controlling," Brown said.

"I am your guest but I must make this quite clear: I think you are exceeding it and I think it is about time you stopped."

"It is about time we stopped giving the Russians half a start on what we are doing. It is about time you shut up."

"If you don't want to be a Cyrus Eaton," and here Brown went back to his prepared speech on "Britain in a Changing World." He made no further reference to Eaton, the American industrialist who has maintained close contacts with Kromlin leaders.

Mayor Vote Centers On 'Color' Question

GARY, Ind. (AP) — Gary's mayoral election, scheduled to be held next Tuesday, now centers largely on a color issue.

The Democratic candidate, Richard Gordon Hatcher, is a Negro. "The vote is polarized on that point," said the incumbent, Democratic Mayor A. Martin Katz.

"The issues being talked about are not the real issues," said Mrs. Phyllis Spencer, a Negro-assistant city attorney. "It's a question of color."

Hatcher's Republican opponent is Joseph B. Rndigan, a partner in his family's furniture business.

Tuesday Hatcher asked a federal court in Hammond, Ind., to postpone the election on the ground that registration frauds have been perpetrated. In his petition, he said more than 8,000 Negroes were purged from voter rolls, while 4,000 fictitious whites have been registered. He named as defendants John Krupa, the Lake County Democratic chairman, and other party organizations.

Ugly overtones pervade the atmosphere in Gary, a steel-producing community of 180,000, on the eve of the election.

In addition to the charges of registration fraud, predictions of election day violence have been voiced. A highly placed

city official who asked not to be identified said: "Some of the merchants downtown are scared of what may happen if Hatcher loses."

Hatcher, 34, is a soft-spoken lawyer.

He has been a deputy prosecutor in Lake County Criminal court, a member of the City Council, and then its president.

He sponsored an open housing law and a political observer. In Gary said, "He was death on crime as a prosecutor, and a councilman."

In the Democratic primary last spring, Mayor Katz sought the nomination for a second term. There was a third candi-

date, Bernard Konrad, Hatcher received 20,000 votes in 1960 for Katz and 13,000 for Konrad. Almost immediately, Krupa began opposing Hatcher.

He says he told Hatcher, "Some day we'll elect a Negro mayor of Gary, but you are not the right man."

"They don't achieve understanding of how each can help the other," said Dr. Donald Roark, vice president of the National Company and dean of the Institute for Certifying Secretaries. "They need a spirit of cooperation."

Roark's institute is attempting to do for secretaries what a similar institute has done for accountants, that is, establish professional goals and standards that must be tested in an examination. So far, 3,901 secretaries have qualified. "If communication were improved, secretaries, in excess of what would get a lot more production, the secretary a lot more satisfaction and perhaps higher pay from her job, and the firm and its customers would consequently benefit also."

"Most of us in management don't know how a secretary can be used," Roark said in an interview. Most executives, he believes, have their secretaries routine tasks based on manual skills such as shorthand and typing. To do this is to downgrade a secretary's skills to those of a simple manual dexterity, Roark believes, which is the same thing as saying an engineer is a man who works with his hands. Secretaries have brains, ambition and various other assets that can be used.

"I believe the secretarial profession is in a period of transition from manual skills to an emphasis on mental skills," Roark said. "A secretary should be the extension of the executive for whom she works." As such, he said, one of her principal functions is to handle the office in the absence of the executive, to compose some of the letters without being dictated to, to give instructions to employees, to make travel arrangements.

If this is the case, the role of the professional secretary would seem to be approaching that of the executive himself. This produces the distinct possibility that more men will enter secretarial ranks. Eight already have become CP's.

The CPS examination, which is given each year on the first Friday and Saturday in May by the National Secretaries Association, based in Kansas City, is no snap. The first section of 125 minutes tests the secretary's personal adjustment and human relations, her ability to deal with typical situations involving superiors, colleagues and subordinates.

Following that comes 60 minutes of business law, 105 minutes of business administration, 2 1/2 hours of accounting and tax problems, more than 2 hours of dictation and transcription and finally 75 minutes of secretarial procedures.

Q—These days there is so much talk about inflation that I would like to know how stocks would act, in case I'm a little short approach. Would it be better to invest in good stocks and/or real estate—instead of keeping my money in the bank? A—What do you mean, "in case inflation should approach?" The prices of all stocks dip from time to time. But the long-term trend for most stocks has been up. And inflation is a major reason for this. When you keep all your money in the bank, you get a fixed return in the form of a set interest rate. Good common stocks have records of increasing their dividend payments. That's a basic reason for buying them.

Of course, all stocks and all places of property don't continuously increase in value. Some fall and never rise again. The prices of all stocks dip from time to time. But the long-term trend for most stocks has been up. And inflation is a major reason for this. When you keep all your money in the bank, you get a fixed return in the form of a set interest rate. Good common stocks have records of increasing their dividend payments. That's a basic reason for buying them.

Stocks of well-managed companies have protected their investors against inflation in the past. While they can't be guaranteed, it's natural to expect that they will continue to do so in the future. The same thing can be said about real estate. But that's a specialized form of investment and usually requires more knowledge, personal effort and cash.

Now, I'm not telling you or anybody else to take all your money out of the bank; everyone should have a cushion of cash for safety sake. I'm just spelling out the facts that money in the bank does not protect against inflation. But common stocks have offset inflation in the past and should do so in the future. Q—We (my wife and I) have approximately \$5,000 in a savings account. I have a \$30,000 life insurance policy. We are interested in investing part of our future savings in mutual funds. How sound is this idea? What do we do about a broker, because we will move fairly frequently? I read in the A.T. Forces. Will we have to change brokers and will there be fees for closing and opening new accounts, if we keep investing in the same mutual fund? A—The idea is very sound. There are now more than four million mutual fund shareholders. Most of them are very happy with their investments. They have good reason to be—because funds, in general, have produced successful investment results. One of the big reasons for the ever-increasing popularity of mutual funds is that they make it easy for people to invest in them. Once you have started an investment program (through a broker or salesman) everything can be handled by mail. If you have an "accumulation plan" (through which you invest at fixed intervals—such as once a month) or an "open account" through which you invest a lump sum of money occasionally, your contacts can be with the home office of the mutual fund or with the fund's custodian bank. There's no need to close and open brokerage accounts every time you move, and there are no fees involved, even if you did so. Tax People Hang Curve On Baseball

Internal Revenue Service Tuesday threw a curve to organized baseball.

"I said baseball teams can no longer treat as ordinary business expenses the price of acquiring a player contract. This price, including bonuses paid to players, must now be depreciated over the useful life of the contract, IRS said.

In the past, a team could deduct the cost of acquiring a player contract in the year it assumed the expense.

IRS said the ruling stems from the baseball reserve clause which gives a team exclusive rights to a player unless he's sold or otherwise released by the team. The service said because of this team buying a contract gets an asset with a useful life extending "substantially beyond the taxable year in which the contract is acquired."

Houston, ninth a week ago, also lost and tumbled out of the Top Ten. Once-beaten Tennessee climbed from fourth to third. North Carolina State, Georgia and Purdue followed the Vols up one notch apiece and Wyoming was eighth, behind Indiana.

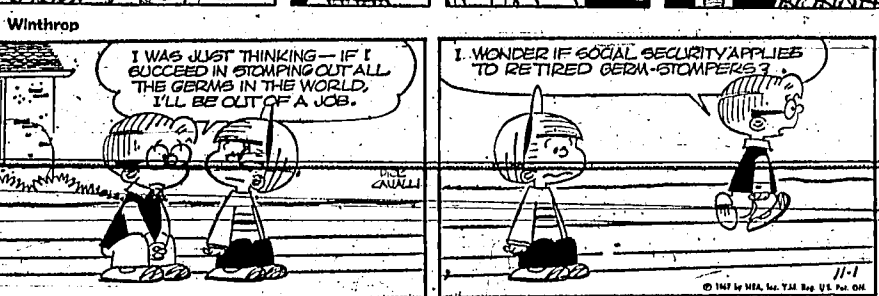

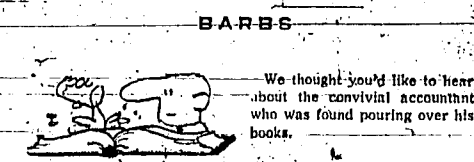

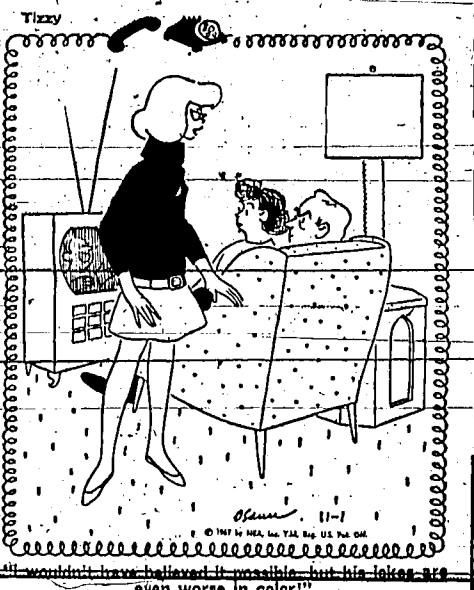

A short time later, police said a department spokesman said Anthony "Big Tony" Esposito surrendered himself to detectives at a Miami street corner in connection with the shooting. Esposito was in the company of an attorney.

Altamura, 53, had been called before numerous grand juries during the last 10 years in connection with gambling, labor racketeering, narcotics and contract murders.

Detectives said Esposito followed Altamura into the lobby of the eating place and chased away five times with a .38-caliber pistol.

"Witnesses said there wasn't even an exchange of words between them," an officer said.

Altamura was hit twice in the head. One bullet plowed through an upturned hand and into his neck.

Police said Esposito, 37, was the apparent target of a bomb which exploded in a Miami nightclub Sept. 23. He was uninjured. Authorities said Esposito has a record of arrests on charges of armed robbery and extortion.

Witnesses said Altamura's killer drove away from the restaurant in the company of a woman. Esposito was alone when surrendered by his lawyer.

for an hour. Knock after knock. My book was forgotten.

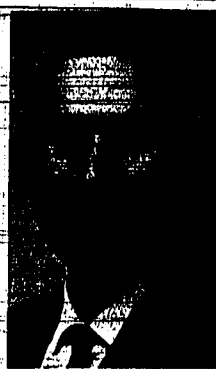

Mansfield Predicts Halt Of Bombing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cyticizing the Soviet Union for rejecting what he termed a new peace move, Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield predicts President Johnson would halt U.S. bombing of North Vietnam if the Geneva Conference were reconvened.

Mansfield said in an interview Monday the Soviets are unrealistic in dismissing the possibility a revived conference could lead to peace in Vietnam.

His statement came in the wake of publication in Moscow of a statement by Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin.

Kosygin in a letter quoted in part in Tass called "unreal" the notion that a conference revival could lead to peace. Kosygin also said any conference in which the North Vietnamese government and National Liberation Front or Viet Cong did not participate would have no chance of success.

The Soviet leader's statement came in a letter to Alex Dobler, president of the World United Nations Association.

Mansfield said that instead of maintaining a frozen position in regard to revival of the Geneva Conference, which directed a settlement in Laos in 1962, the Soviets should join with Great Britain as cochairmen in calling a new meeting.

Then they could see what this country's reaction would be toward stopping the bombing," Mansfield said. "I am confident the attacks would end and that President Johnson would be among the first to arrive in Geneva."







New Mayor Of Birmingham Is Republican

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Birmingham voters have elected a Republican mayor in a legally nonpartisan race.

No party labels were allowed on the ballot Tuesday but a breakdown of vote totals showed 54-year-old George Seibels scored heavily in traditional upper income, white collar areas where Republicans have their greatest strength in Birmingham.

The councilman outdrew his Democratic opponent, George Young, 37,709 votes to 25,338 in a race which drew less than half of Birmingham's 122,000 voters out into a steady autumn drizzle.

Young received the bulk of the Negro vote and more or less split the blue collar support with Seibels. He had the support of the Birmingham labor council and at least one Negro political group.

The campaign was not staged along party lines and neither candidate made an issue of his party affiliation. In fact, both denied any wish that such matters be considered by voters.

Seibels' appointment as mayor Republican to hold office in Birmingham. Political observers can't remember any other.
