## Troops Capture Hill 875 As Thanksgiving Prize

SAIGON (AP) — Battle-weary U.S. paratroopers and infantrymen captured Hill 875 today as their Thanksgiving prize after nearly five days of some of the bloodiest fighting in the Vietnam war.

U.S. commanders hoped capture of the hill signaled the end of the bloody, three-week battle of Dak To in the central highlands. But two hours before the final assault, other paratroopers killed 10 North Vietnamese in a short firefight a mile and a half to the north. And less than two hours after the paratroopers reported victory, a landing zone at the northern base of the slope came under mortar attack.

"It seems at this time," a senior U.S. officer in Saigon said, "that the North Vietnamese have pulled out but we're not going to get overconfident yet. If there's no more contact for another day, we'll know they've pulled out. But the North Vietnamese 174th Regiment still has some strength and it could resuscitate itself."

He added that the jungle terrain on Hill 875 was "very tough and the U.S. troops are moving very slowly," mopping up enemy remnants on the hill.

The hard fighting since Dec. 3 around Dak To was reflected in the weekly summary of casualties, which showed more Americans killed and wounded in combat last week than during any week since the Communist artillery siege of Con Thien last September. The estimate of North Vietnamese dead was 1,000 less than the week before, however.

The U.S. Command said 225 U.S. troops and 1,287 Communists were killed last week in combat, and 1,256 Americans wounded. An estimated one-third of the American casualties occurred at Dak To. However, the summary did not include casualties on Hill 875, where the battle began Sunday.

After nearly five days of some of the hardest fighting of the Vietnam war, Associated Press Correspondent Edwin Q. White reported from Dak To that a company from the 173rd Airborne Brigade and two companies from the 4th Infantry Division launched the assault on the last ridge held by the North Vietnamese at 11:30 a.m. Twenty-five minutes later, White said, U.S. forces consolidated their positions after meeting only light resistance.

There was no word yet on fresh casualties on the jungled hill where the fighting since Sunday had raked American losses in the three weeks of fighting around Dak To to 240 dead and 873 wounded.

It was the costliest battle of the war for both the Americans and the North Vietnamese, who lost at least 1,372 dead, the U.S. Command said.

Elsewhere across South Vietnam, minor actions were reported as thousands of U.S. servicemen in the field paused for Thanksgiving religious services and hot turkey with all the trimmings rushed to them by helicopter.

### British Gold Rush Is More Feverish

LONDON (AP) — London's great gold rush became even more feverish today in the wake of devaluation of the pound.

The seven nations still in the international gold pool were again forced to dig into their reserves to supply metal for another record buying spree on the London exchange—nearly 30 points below Wednesday's close at \$2,417. But it quickly moved up to \$2,419. Dealers said the move was expected.

Britain's Labor government rode out a tense vote Wednesday night on its devaluation of the pound. Political commentators continued to predict that Chancellor of the Exchequer James Callaghan, the man who takes responsibility for the move, will be transferred to another job.

Callaghan, a breezy 55-year-old Irishman, for months has wanted to quit the onerous Treasury post.

Amid the hue and cry after the pound was cut from \$2.80 to \$2.40, it seemed at first that he might succeed Foreign Secretary George Brown. But Callaghan's frank, incisive handling of critics of devaluation in the House of Commons won him new respect. Some political writers even pointed to him as a possible successor to Prime Minister Harold Wilson.

Wilson's government easily beat back a Conservative election motion in Commons. The vote, along straight party lines, was 335-258. Only one Laborite broke ranks and abstained.

A rush on gold following devaluation was intensified by France's decision to pull out of the international pool pegging the price. This forced the U.S. government to sell gold heavily to foreign buyers to keep the price from rising above \$35 a fine ounce, since a rise would devalue the dollar.

Britain's authoritative business daily, the Financial Times, said the United States is preparing opinion for the withdrawal of gold backing from the domestic dollar as a means to increase gold backing for the dollar in international trade. It attributed the rush to gold to belief that other countries may devalue their currency.

### Buhl Strikers Win Wage Hike, Benefits

BUHL — Twenty warehouse employees of Rangen, Inc. Buhl, Idaho, won a \$1.80 each wage hike and a 12% increase in benefits after a four-hour negotiation period brought on by a walkout over wages.

In independent collective bargaining, the employees also won several benefits they previously did not enjoy, including an annual six-day sick leave, two extra paid holidays and general improvement in their working conditions.

Fred Behm, a local attorney, acted as mediator between the warehousemen and Theodore Rangen, owner of the firm. He had presented the list of grievances during the negotiations.

### U Thant To Follow Up Peace Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Secretary-General U Thant is expected to follow up the U.N. Security Council's unanimous approval of a British peace formula for the Middle East by sending trouble shooter Gunnar Jarring to the area to try to get negotiations started.

Informed sources said Thant would name Jarring, a veteran Swedish diplomat who has served in the Middle East, as U.N. mediator under terms of the British resolution of the 15-nation council approved late Wednesday.

Key point of the resolution was a call for withdrawal of Israeli troops from territory it seized from Egypt, Jordan and Syria in the June war.

Israel has stressed that it will not give up any territory until the Arabs agree to direct peace talks. In the fact the both Israel and the Arab states need no major objections to the British formula was considered a major step forward after months of futile bickering.

### Marker Stolen

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — The headstone over the grave of Lee Harvey Oswald has been stolen, police report.

The time of the theft has been set at late Tuesday or early Wednesday, four years to the day after Oswald, according to the findings of the Warren Commission, assassinated President John F. Kennedy.

Still at the graveside was a weeping willow planted by Oswald's mother and a flower pot with a note written by a person of unknown identity, attached. The note read in part:

"Oswald  
"Now other voices speak that louder grow, who, by legal means to fail, will some names, true killers, tell."  
C.D.E. Jr."

### Traffic Death Number Spurts In Early Hours

The number of deaths from traffic accidents spurted today as the nation observed the long Thanksgiving Day holiday weekend.

At noon EST—the death toll stood at 81.

Hazardous driving warnings were posted for 15 states in the West, Southwest, North and Northeast, as roads were slicked with rain, snow and freezing rain.

Traffic deaths during Thanksgiving weekend last year set a record for any holiday period when 748 persons were killed during the four-day count.

The Associated Press made a comparative survey of motor vehicle fatalities for a non-holiday period of equal length from 6 p.m. Wednesday Nov. 8 to midnight Sunday Nov. 12. The death toll for that weekend was 567.

The count for Thanksgiving holiday periods always runs from 6 p.m. Wednesday to midnight Sunday.

The lowest traffic toll for a Thanksgiving weekend in recent years was 448 in 1960.

The National Safety Council does not make advance estimates of traffic fatalities during the Thanksgiving weekend because it regards the observance as a home holiday which does not involve as much driving as other holidays.

Traffic fatalities numbered 688 during the four-day Memorial Day celebration and 732 during the four-day Independence Day observance this year. Both were records for those holiday periods.

### Proposed Tax Boost Faces Opposition

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's proposed income tax boost, long mired in a hostile House committee, appears to face potentially tough opposition on the other side of Capitol Hill.

Chairman Russell B. Long, D-La., of the Senate Finance Committee said Wednesday he doubts a tax hike now would be a "good thing for the country."

Long's opposite number in the House, Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, has refused to take up the tax hike measure until the administration offers major spending cuts.

But Long indicated he favored putting the proposed 10 per cent income tax surcharge to a vote of both houses.

Long, in a radio interview for Washington stations, said Wednesday of the tax proposal, "It's not popular and frankly, with four per cent of the people in this country out of work, I doubt that it's a good thing for the country."

Earlier in the day Treasury Secretary Henry H. Fowler said the administration will offer Congress a package of tax increases and spending cuts that would allow \$11.5 billion out of a potential \$20 billion federal deficit this year.

## U.S. Agency Stoned In Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Anti-American demonstrators stoned the U.S. Information Agency building in Ankara today as Cyrus R. Vance, President Johnson's special envoy in the Cyprus crisis, arrived in Turkey.

More than 2,000 young persons gathered in front of the USA offices in Ankara's main square. Hundreds of riot police were called to prevent the crowd from entering the building. Some windows were reported broken.

Five student groups that organized the demonstration issued a statement condemning "U.S. and Greek imperialism."

Vance landed at a military airfield to avoid 500 other demonstrators who had gathered at Esenboga Airport, where his plane had been scheduled to touch down. "Vance, go home!" the crowd shouted.

Another special envoy, from United Nations Secretary-General U Thant, was en route to Turkey as fears of a Turkish-Greek war over Cyprus increased.

Turkey announced early today it was turning down a Greek proposal for further talks. The Turkish government reaffirmed its determination to ensure the security of the Turkish Cypriot minority on the island 40 miles off the Turkish coast, increasing speculation that the Turks were on the verge of landing troops on Cyprus.

President Johnson, who intervened when war on Cyprus appeared imminent in 1964, responded to the new threat by sending former Deputy Secretary of Defense Cyrus Vance to Ankara with orders to proceed from there to Athens. Vance, now a New York attorney, served Johnson as a troubleshooter in last summer's Detroit rioters.

Diplomatic sources said they believed it unlikely that Turkey would attempt any military action against Greece.

Also heading for the Turkish capital and then Athens was U Thant's special emissary, Jose Roiz-Bennet of Guatemala, a U.N. undersecretary for political affairs.

The new crisis, part of a centuries-long history of strife between Greeks and Turks on Cyprus, developed after a battle last week in which 25 Turkish Cypriots and two Greek Cypriots were killed.

About 80 per cent of the island's 600,000 inhabitants are Greek Orthodox, the rest Turkish Muslims. The two communities live in a state of armed truce since a U.N. peace force ended civil war in 1964 that followed the Greek Cypriot majority's revocation of special rights given the Turkish minority.

Following the battle last week, the Turkish government charged that Greece had landed troops on Cyprus in addition to those it is allowed by the Cyprus independence agreement. The Turks said they would send troops to the island if Greek forces were not withdrawn.

## Americans Celebrate Holiday Of Their Own Around World

From peaceful village greens, where church bells rang to war-torn Vietnam where GIs fought and died—from the bountiful board of the LBJ Ranch in Texas to Plymouth, Mass., where Thanksgiving began 340 years ago—Americans around the world today celebrated a holiday that is their very own.

For many millions the day began in church—giving thanks for favors large and small.

There were turkey and all the fixings for folks at home, wounded service men in hospitals, down-and-outers in big-city shelters and even inmates of many prisons.

Divided over a faraway war, deeply disturbed by brave issues on the home front, but prosperous as never before, Americans also turned to national sports events to celebrate the day.

By plane, train, bus and private car, families gathered from far and wide to spend the day together. Fog delayed and canceled many flights Wednesday from airports on the Eastern Seaboard.

President and Mrs. Johnson had flown to their ranch home near Johnson City, Tex., on Tuesday night for a holiday stay with their family.

Joining them for the Thanksgiving meal were their daughters, Luci and Lyndy. Luci's husband, Patrick J. Nugent, and their son, Patrick Lyndon; Lyndy's fiance, Marine Capt. Charles S. Robb, and others in the family circle.

Mary Davis, a family cook, was preparing a meal of turkey with cornbread dressing and giblet gravy, green beans, almonds, sweet potatoes with marshmallow topping, asparagus, molded cranberry sauce, ambrosia, angel food cake, fruit cake and coffee.

For American servicemen and women around the world, Uncle Sam provided 2.72 million pounds of turkey.

## Benefit Measure Has Rough Road Ahead

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic sponsors of the Senate Social Security bill that proposes record cash benefits anticipate a tough conference with the House in the effort to work out a final version.

Some experts on the legislation believe differences between the two versions are so serious and numerous that a final agreement may have to wait until the next session of Congress, which starts in January.

But Democratic leaders say they are determined to get the far-ranging bill to President Johnson's desk before Congress quits this year.

The measure cleared the Senate Wednesday by an overwhelming 78-16 vote after six days of floor debate.

But a few senators, including Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, said they voted for it with the expectation and hope that the final product would be much closer to the House version.

The Senate made more than 100 substantive changes in the House bill, passed last August. But the strongest disagreement with the House is expected to center in two areas.

The much higher Social Security benefit and tax levels approved by the Senate.

Senate softening proposed House restrictions on the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program.

The Senate measure goes along with the benefit levels—including a \$70 monthly minimum, up 50 per cent from the present \$44, and a 15 per cent general increase for others now on the rolls.

Tied in with this is an eventual \$10,800 taxable wage base, a big jump from the present \$5,000. This \$10,800 base would go toward financing greatly increased benefits proposed for those retiring many years in the future.

Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., and his House Ways and Means Committee rejected the administration-backed level after six months of close consideration earlier this session.

Mills' House approval of a bill containing a 12 1/2 per cent general increase with a \$50 monthly payment and a \$7,600 wage base.

But Democratic backers of the Senate bill contend the benefits it contains are the lowest possible if many old persons are to be lifted out of poverty and given meaningful retirement payments.

Mills inserted toughened welfare provisions into the bill in the committee, after voicing alarm about the big increase in the number of AFDC recipients,

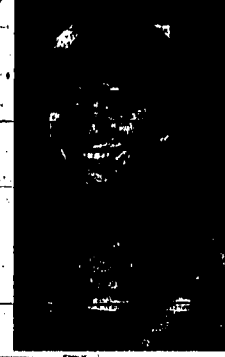

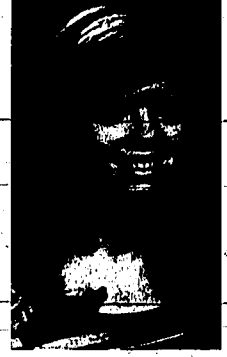

Strength Viewed Beirut, Lebanon (AP) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt said today the effective strength of Egypt's armed forces is greater now than before the June 5-10 war with Israel. Nasser was making his first public statement in four months and only his second speech since he offered to resign after Egypt's defeat in the war. Nasser decided to stay on after Egyptians indicated they still supported him.

NEW YORK (AP) — Mrs. Horbert Bayard Swope, widow of the famed newspaperman who won the first Pulitzer Prize, died early today in Columbia Presbyterian Hospital after an illness of five weeks. She was 77.

Mrs. Swope, witty, petite, brown-haired and brown-eyed, made her home into a gathering place for writers, politicians and intellectuals during the 1920s and 1930s.

Her husband, who died in 1958, won the first Pulitzer Prize in 1917 for a book called "Inside the German Empire." He became executive editor of the New York World in 1921 and chairman of the state race commission in 1933.

## 4 Little Girls Offer Hope In Successful Liver Transplants

**DENVER, Colo. (AP)** — Four little girls—too young to know they're making medical history—offered hope for thousands Tuesday when doctors outlined their progress as the most successful liver transplant patients in medical history.  
 As recently as four months ago, there was no known record of anyone surviving longer than 31 days following any type of liver transplant.  
 Now there are these four.  
 The first, Julie Rodriguez, 25-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Rodriguez of Pueblo, Colo., had her transplant 122 days ago on July 24.  
 She bounced alongside with mother, arms swinging into a news conference. Julie is virtually ready for discharge from the hospital, and spends about half her time outside, leading an all but normal life.  
 The most recent patient, Carl Lynne MacCourt, 15½-month-old daughter of Mrs. Marilyn MacCourt, Salt Lake City, made her appearance in a stroller and had a shy smile and a wave for newsmen. She received her new liver 45 days ago, on Oct. 8.  
 Kerri Lynn Brown, daughter

of Mr. and Mrs. Dale L. Brown, Long Beach, Calif., also arrived in a stroller and didn't seem at all impressed by her visitors. She is 15 months old.  
 The oldest, Paul Kay Hansen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Hansen, Fort Worth, Tex., was carried in. She is 25 months old and received her new liver Aug. 1.  
 There have been some serious but so far not insurmountable complications with these cases, but generally doctors at the University of Colorado Medical Center, where the transplants were performed, are optimistic.  
 They are hopeful progress with liver-kill-parasites—advances in kidney transplantation, a field where some patients are doing well after the surgery.  
 The doctors are reluctant to

make long range predictions but "the fact that they are doing well is encouraging," said Dr. Carl G. Graff of Sweden, a Public Health Service international fellow in surgery. "It's too early to tell" about the future, he said.

## 2,000 Persons Are On Rental Blacklist In Detroit Area

**DETROIT (AP)** — Names of 2,000 persons are on a rental blacklist which began circulating in the Detroit area shortly after the July riot.  
 A man who helped prepare it says its purpose is to "protect the rights, privacy and security of both tenants and landlords."  
 Officials of the Builders Association of Metropolitan Detroit, which prepared the list, said it was issued to landlords as a way to screen undesirable tenants applying for apartments.  
 The list resulted from a group of "concerned citizens" including about tenants "who constantly disturb their neighbors, vandalize their apartments and victimize their landlords," and was suggested last April, said Irvin Yackness, executive director of the association.  
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 Yackness said the list has been distributed to landlords for 375 apartment buildings involving 50,000 to 75,000 rental units in the six-county area in and around Detroit.  
 Other reasons cited for the list, which covers all income levels, were to identify tenants who habitually pay rent with checks or give loud parties.  
 Yackness said the list is not "an attempt to impose a big brother-watch-over-tenant-it-is simply an effort to protect the rights, privacy and security of both tenants and landlords."  
 He said landlords need to be protected from only a small percentage of tenants.  
 Joseph Sterner, executive director of the Building Owners and Managers Association of Detroit, said he views the program "with a jaundiced eye," adding that "it could lead to lawsuits and would be very difficult to administer."  
 He urged an "owners beware" policy in which landlords make a careful check of rental agencies before renting to a prospective tenant.  
 A spokesman for the Detroit Real Estate Board would say only that the builders' association was "extremely reputable" and that no similar project had ever taken hold in Detroit.  
 Open housing laws, including measures to protect tenants' rights, are pending before the Michigan Legislature.

## Nixon Promises He'll Present Own Personality For Judgment

 Richard M. Nixon says that if he seeks the presidency next year he will present his own personality for judgment by the people—not an artificial one.  
 "I'm not going to take any speech lessons; I'm not hiring any high-powered public relations firms," Nixon told a newsman Wednesday night. "When a man is constrained or artificial, he doesn't get through."  
 Nixon's comments followed an appearance on NBC's "Tonight" show where he told host Johnny Carson that his faulty makeup for the televised Kennedy-Nixon debates was a big factor in his 1960 loss to John F. Kennedy.  
 Nixon, already tagged as first choice for the Republican presidential nomination by delegates to the 1964 convention who responded to a recent Associated Press poll, got more good news. CBS reported its surveys show he's practically a clinch for the nomination if he wins the New Hampshire and Wisconsin primaries. And when Carson asked him to indicate whether they would vote for him, the applause meter was driven to its limit.

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# LSD Causes Birth Defect In Infant

BOSTON (AP)—University of Iowa pediatricians say they have encountered the first documented case of a baby born with birth defects because her mother had taken the hallucinatory drug LSD during pregnancy.

They said they are certain that LSD caused the defect in the baby because there is no evidence of birth defects in the families of father or mother, both parents were healthy, and the mother had taken no drug except LSD during her pregnancy.

The baby, girl, born in Iowa last summer, has a severely deformed right leg.

They also said that in both the mother and the father laboratory analysis revealed breaks in their chromosomes, tiny cell structures which carry the genes, or hereditary units.

Her 19-year-old mother took enough LSD at four times during pregnancy to have hallucinations, "to go on a trip," the pediatricians say.

# Conditions Found Bad In Meat Plants

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—The U.S. Agriculture Department found improper conditions in 10 meat packing plants operated by American Meat Institute members this year, and 40 in 1966, the Des Moines Register said Thursday.

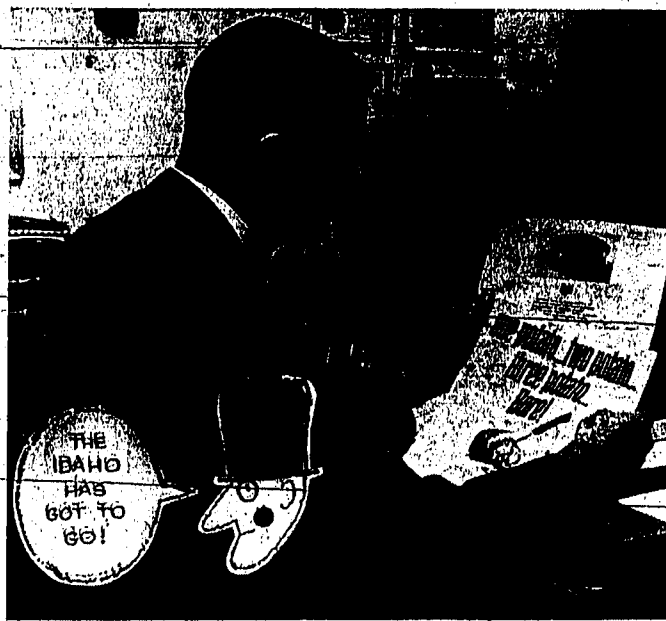

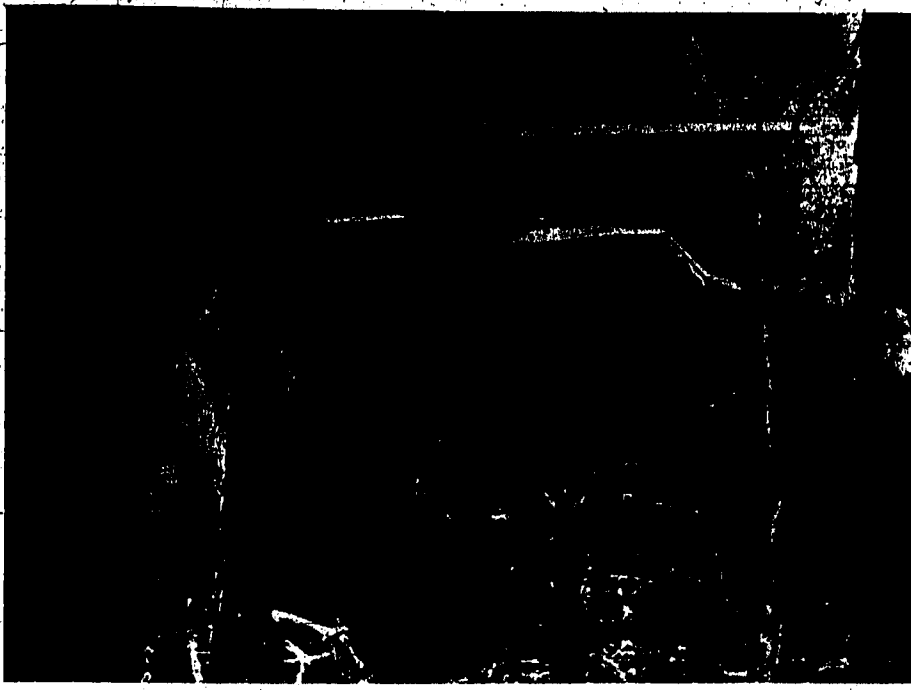

# Alcoholism Is Neglected Problem

NEW YORK (NEA) — Pinpointing the saturated soldiers of the nation's ever expanding army of hard-core alcoholics is something like looking for flowers in San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury district. Open your eyes and you'll find them blooming all around you.

But it's something else when you try to find a so-called "problem drinker." There are plenty around but few people care to claim the title.

That's one reason why a recent report by the National Institute of Mental Health labels alcoholism as the most misunderstood mental problem in the United States today. Problems that people refuse to talk about just have to be misunderstood.

As John W. Gardner, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare says, "No other national problem has been so seriously neglected as alcoholism."

A quick look at the report explains why the problem drinker has become such a problem in this land of moonshine for the masses.

Seventy per cent of the nation's excessive drinkers could easily be mistaken for teetotalers, at least on the surface. They live in respectable communities and, according to the report, perform "more or less effectively" in their jobs.

The Skid Row bum, once the symbol of the excessive drinker, doesn't fit the "Jet-Age" image. Today's stereotype might better be the "Martini-gulping professional" to whom the liquid lunch has become a way of life.

Assuming there are about 80 million people in the United States who take a drink now and then, and taking into consideration the rough estimate of 4.5 million alcoholics, the odds on any drinker falling into the bottle would appear to be about one in 18. But the report is quick to note that the figures are about as vague as the memory of a man after a three-day drunk.

It's estimated that excessive drinking costs industry about \$2 billion a year. But probably the most staggering statistic—and again this is only an estimate—is that drinking is a factor in at least half of all fatal traffic accidents. The figure may run as high as 87 per cent, but nobody can be sure.

Just about everyone who has ever crawled out of bed with a blistering hangover has reached the point where he thinks

he's an alcoholic, and he may be right. But the figures are hard to come by.

"It is impossible to determine," states the NIMH report, "if the rate of alcoholism is increasing, decreasing or remaining steady."

Or, as one volunteer worker for Alcoholics Anonymous says, "You can do a lot for people who really want help and who are willing to admit that they've gone as far as they care to go where drinking is concerned. But you can't do a thing for people who want to kid themselves, and that takes in a lot of people."

Those people are the problem drinkers.

Since Prohibition didn't work, most experts are of the opinion that the best way to handle the drinking problem is through an education program aimed at young people, or tomorrow's potential problem drinkers.

A 17-member commission working out of Stanford University, with a \$1 million grant from the National Institute of Mental Health, reported recently that a national policy to promote drinking in the family would help prevent the development of problem drinkers in the future.

The commission recommended that the legal age for buying alcoholic beverages be reduced to 18 in all states (it is 21 in most) in one move to "assist young people to adapt themselves realistically to a predominantly drinking society." The lowering of the age, the commission feels, would make liquor available to young people "in a more reasonable, healthier context."

Family drinking, normally restrained, hopefully would go a long way toward getting young people pointed in the right direction.

"People brought up in totally abstinent traditions who later take up drinking apparently are more likely to become problem drinkers," the commission found.

Few problem drinkers were found in Italian, Jewish and Chinese families where alcohol is usually introduced to members of the family in "a relatively routine and unemotional manner."

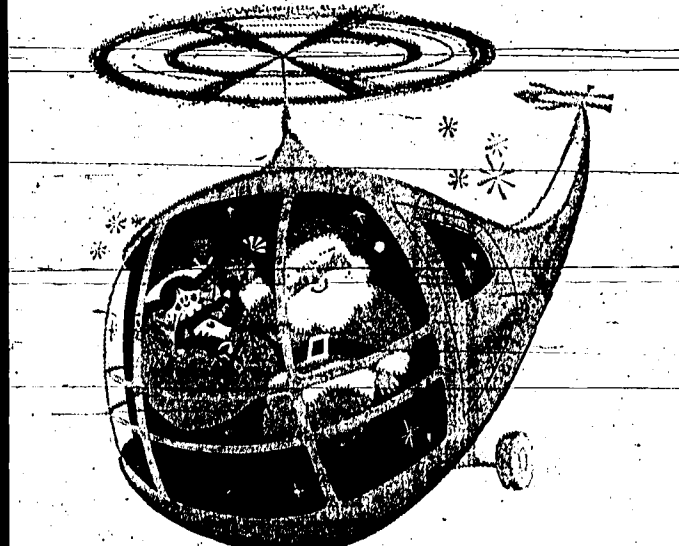

# Lake Michigan May Be Site Of Airport

CHICAGO (AP)—A jet airport more than one half the size of Manhattan on the bottom of Lake Michigan? In a city that laid its foundation in a basin of mud, reversed the flow of a river, rebuilt itself after a disastrous fire and pioneered the skyscraper, it just could be.

A "hole" in Lake Michigan off Chicago's South Side—surrounded by a dike and accessible from shore by a combination bridge-tunnel—has been proposed as one of 15 sites for the city's third major airport.

"With an airport in the lake, Chicago would be the only city in the world which would be capable of handling the present family-of-jets, jumbo-jets and the supersonic jet aircraft in an airport located in the heart of the city," said Mayor Richard J. Daley.

Officials have given no indication of when a site for a new airport will be given final approval. But aviation experts say the city will need a new airport by 1975, despite the planned expansion of O'Hare International and Midway airports, to handle increased traffic.

The possibility of almost unlimited expansion is one of the advantages of an airport in the lake. But the proportions of such a project would be monumental and it would have a price tag to match.

A feasibility study concluded that the lake site could be prepared in four years at a cost

ranging from \$247 million to \$284 million.

The task of wresting the land from the lake would be similar to Holland's centuries-old struggle to reclaim land from the North Sea. The project would begin with the construction of a circular dike in the relatively shallow waters of the lake about 3 1/2 miles off 31st Street, just south of the downtown section.

One boat and scows would haul more than 50 million cubic yards of sand, gravel and rock to the site—some six million cubic yards more than went into construction of Egypt's Aswan High Dam on the Nile River—and dump it into the water to form a circle with a diameter of four miles.

The dike, varying in height from 50 to 80 feet and about 12 1/2 miles long, would enclose an area of 8,000 acres—more than half the size of Manhattan. The water, ranging in depth from 33 to 55 feet, would then be pumped out to expose the lake's floor.

Borings into the lake floor showed that the layer of sand and clay covering the bedrock should present no problems in construction.

The saucer-like dry spot in the lake would be connected with shore by a short causeway built out from the Stevenson Expressway, a long, low bridge almost to the dike and a short tunnel underneath the dike into the airport.

But despite the prestige a lake airport might bring to the city, some hope it never is more than a sketch on an engineer's drawing board.

"We did not expect them to propose an airport on the bottom of the lake," said Charles H. Ruby, president of the Air Line Pilots Association, based in Chicago. "That means there's a built-in obstruction all around—at the end of every runway."

Ruby said the airport would be inoperable when mist from the lake freezes on the runways. "You can't operate under those conditions," he said. "The winds would blow in and splash water all over the place."

The engineering study says the dike would be high enough and wide enough to thwart the most severe breakers. And it would be faced with 13,700,000 cubic yards of stone—more than four times the amount used to build the Great Pyramid of Cheops.

"You get lower ceilings and visibility down on the lake than you do inland anytime such a problem exists," Ruby said. "We're not against airports; we're for them. But we think they should be operable 365 days a year and 24 hours a day if possible."

Air line executives meeting in Chicago when the engineering study was released said collectively that an airport in the lake is an intriguing idea but that it must be thoroughly examined before construction.

# Winds Of Change Around Capitals May Result In New State Constitutions

Winds of change are in the air around state capitals this year, and the end result could be some new state constitutions and many more amendments to the basic charters.

State constitutions have come under fire for being antiquated, too wordy or too frequently amended. Many state legislators apparently agree, and constitutional referenda will be held in at least nine states during the next 12 months.

The proposed revisions range from minor amendments affecting only one county to new constitutions.

In several states—where revisions have not been approved by legislatures—there are movements to begin consideration of updating the documents next year.

Voters in Alabama will decide Dec. 5 on 18 constitutional amendments dealing primarily with local issues and state bond issues.

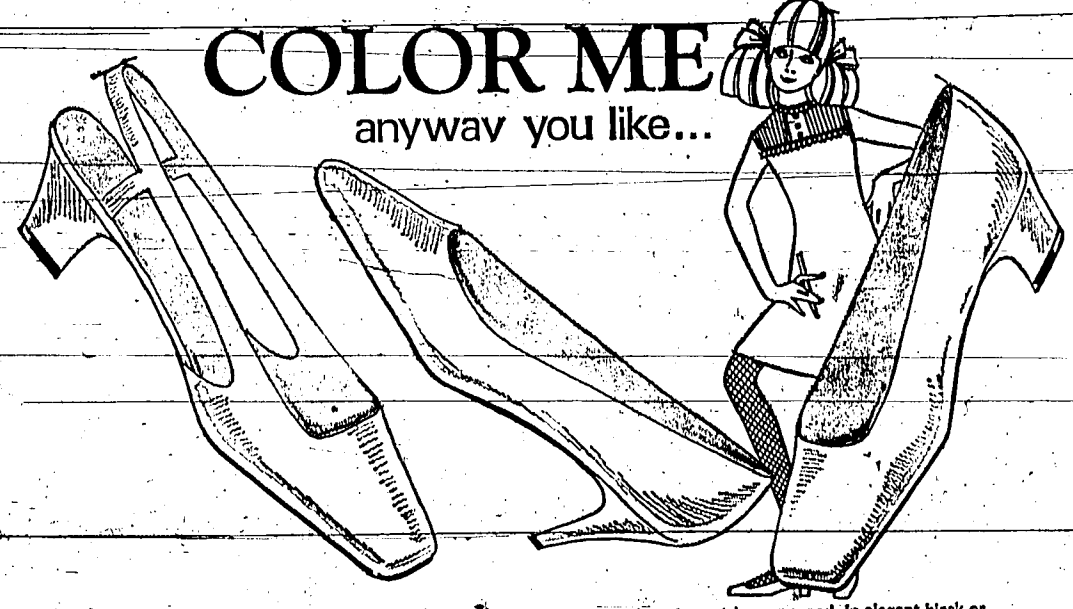
A constitutional convention convenes Dec. 1 in Pennsylvania and the convention's proposals will go to the voters in April's presidential primary. The convention is limited to four issues: taxation and finance, reapportionment, local government and judiciary.

Proposals for constitutional change will be on the ballot in seven states in November 1968. The states are Montana, Michigan, Idaho, New Hampshire, Colorado, Nebraska and Massachusetts.

A NABET spokesman said the new contract will bar schedule changes without sufficient notice.

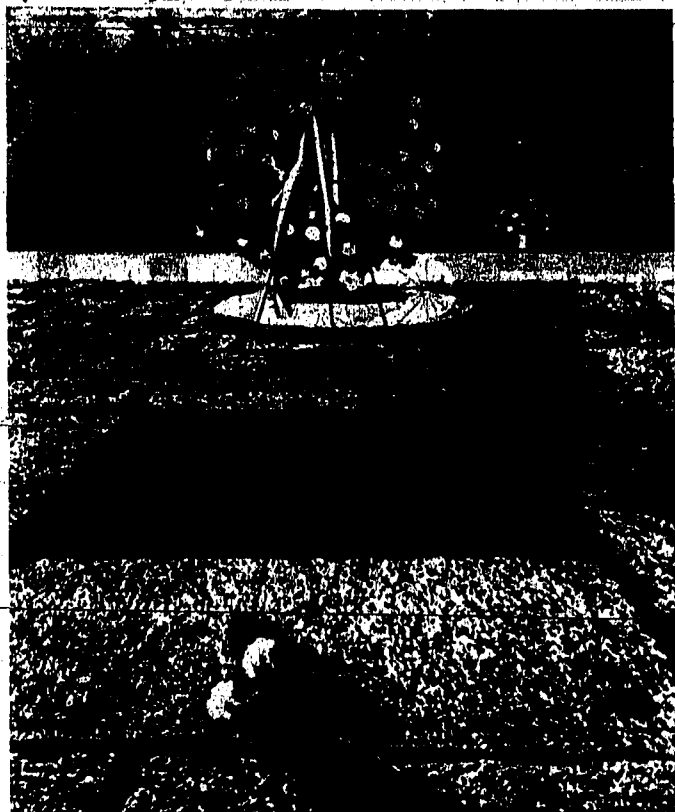
The pact includes other increased benefits.

## 4 Deserters Laugh At U.S. Protest

MOSCOW (AP) — Four American sailors who left their ship in Japan last month laughed when told the U.S. government protested that they are being exploited in the Soviet Union, it was reported today.

The sailors left the carrier Intrepid in protest against the war in Vietnam. They were brought to Moscow by an organization called the Soviet Peace Committee.

The peace committee said today the Americans "will be given every opportunity to put their views to wide circles of people." But it said they do not want to talk to Western correspondents.

The four are Richard D. Bailey, 19, Jacksonville, Fla.; John Michael Barilla, 20, Catonsville, Md.; Craig W. Anderson, 20, San Jose, Calif.; and Michael A. Lindner, 19, Mount Pocono, Pa.

The sailors spoke out against the Vietnam war Wednesday at Moscow University in an auditorium packed with more than 1,000 students. They got frequent and heavy applause.

The Soviet government has made no response to the U.S. protest against this country's "assisting, harboring and exploiting" the Americans. Nor has it given any answer to a request made by the U.S. Embassy for a consul to see them.

Komsomolskaya Pravda, the newspaper of the Young Communist League, reported that one of its correspondents told the sailors about the State Department protest.

"The four Americans shrugged their shoulders, looked at one another, then burst into laughter," it said.

## The Daily Investor

Q. A year ago last August the company for which I work allowed employees to buy common stock at a 10 per cent discount from market value. I was entitled to buy 20 shares. But, because I am nearing retirement, this did not appeal to me.

My children, however, were interested, and I agreed to buy 20 shares. The money is deducted from my pay check each month and the children pay me. One son is buying nine shares, each of the others is buying five shares.

A 50 per cent stock dividend has been declared. So, when I have finished paying, I will receive 43½ shares. That created a problem. How do I get these shares changed, so that each of the children receives the proper number of shares?

A. You'll have to do some fancy refiguring of family finances. As a result of that 50 per cent stock dividend, each two shares became three shares. So, when the time comes to transfer those shares to your children, each of them will be entitled to receive half again as many shares.

Each of the children who started out to buy (through you) five shares has really been buying seven and half shares. The one who began buying nine shares has really been buying 13½ shares.

Companies don't issue certificates for half or other fractions of shares. Your kids will have to square this away by buying and selling half shares among themselves. They'll be operating their own unofficial little stock market.

When you finish paying for the stock, through payroll deductions, you won't receive a certificate for 43½ shares. Most likely the company has an arrangement for you to buy an extra half share—making you the owner of 44 shares. Or, you might end up as the owner of 43 shares. In that case the price of the extra half share would not be taken out of your pay check.

Any way it works out, you can arrange to have the stock transferred to your children's names, after you finally take possession of the stock. You can do that by sending your stock certificate to the transfer agent, with instructions to issue new certificates for the proper number of shares, registered in the name of each of the children.

But watch yourself. There can be a kicker in this. In some employ stock purchase plans the employee purchaser (that's you) is required to hold the stock for a period of time before transferring it. The time limit varies from one company to another. This should have been explained to you—before you signed up to buy the stock.

Q. You wrote that both common and preferred stocks "represent ownership in a corporation" and, if a company liquidates,

dates, preferred stock usually is paid off before the common stock.

I am boggling over the meaning of "ownership" in this context. It has been my understanding that a common stockholder is an owner of a company in a sense that a preferred stockholder is not. In liquidation, isn't the owner of preferred stock treated more like a bondholder?

A. Sort of. If a company goes through the unhappy process of liquidating, the bondholders get paid off first. Bonds are debt obligations of a company.

In the case of liquidation a company must pay off its bonds and other debt obligations before it can even think about paying anything to its stockholders.

Assuming that there's something left after the debts are paid, the company must then pay the owners of the preferred stock. Preferred stocks are usually paid off at par value.

If there is anything left after that, it is whacked up among the owners of the common stock.

# Don't Do Your Christmas Shoplifting Early--It's No Joking Matter

On a cold November afternoon a pretty woman carrying a large brown bag and dressed in a warm, downy coat walked into a downtown Twin Falls store.

She went first to the jewelry counter. When a clerk wasn't watching she scooped seven expensive necklaces into her handbag.

Then she walked to the fashion department, tried on a \$300 fur coat, and when the clerk turned her back, walked away.

Heading toward the rear of the store, the woman disposed of her old coat by pushing it under a display counter. Then she put a pair of shoes and two women's wallets in her purse and started for the door.

In a little less than 10 minutes she had taken more than \$400 worth of merchandise from the store.

But it was all a test.

The model was Connie Dilworth of the Times-News advertising department. She was observed in the Sears store by this reporter; Jan Sainsbury, Times-News feature writer, and the assistant store manager, Brent Westphal.

Mrs. Dilworth's spree was captured on film. Her afternoon at Sears was for the purpose of this article, and for nothing else. Sears was very cooperative.

The demonstration shows how easy it is to be a shoplifter. But shoplifting isn't worth the risk. A conviction can land a person in jail up to six months, and can also not a person a fine up to \$300.

And that is for a shoplifting conviction of under \$150 in stolen merchandise.

If a person takes more than \$150 in merchandise, he can be found guilty of grand larceny, a felony. Such a conviction could put a person in the Idaho State Prison for a long, long time.

And a long time in the Idaho State Prison is a long time by any standards.

Shoplifting in Twin Falls hits Twin Falls businessmen hard.

About \$500,000 annually is estimated. Throughout America, businessmen estimate losses at more than \$7 billion annually. This is close to the figure gained illegally by the Cosa Nostra or Mafia in its gambling operations.

Shoplifters fall into three categories. The habitual thief, the professional and the everyday shopper who takes small items. Often the latter steals for many reasons—out of money at the moment, the thrill of the theft, or because of outrage at having to pay a big price for a small item.

Teen-agers and the ordinary, everyday, well-meaning shopper caused the biggest losses. Next are the habitual thieves, then the professionals.

A person who steals frequently has psychological problems, law enforcement officials say.

Employees are constantly warned to watch for the shoplifter. A woman with a large handbag brings a pang of anticipation to the heart of any clerk, and winter, when people wear heavy coats, store managers miss sleep each night worrying about what thieves will think of next.

Shoplifters are busiest when a store is active, especially during holiday seasons.

Seventy-eight per cent of all shoplifters are women. Mainly because women shop more than men, but also because women are generally more status conscious than men. They like new things.

In one store, a man, dressed in long work clothes, walked in, picked up a carton of cigarettes, then started through the check counter. A suspicious clerk called the manager. The man was found to have no less than 48 cartons of cigarettes hidden in his clothes.

A woman with a baby in a stroller was stopped once. She had several expensive dresses hidden beneath the sleeping baby. People in supermarkets will often check out a normal amount of groceries, but hide several dollars worth of merchandise on them while going through the check stand.

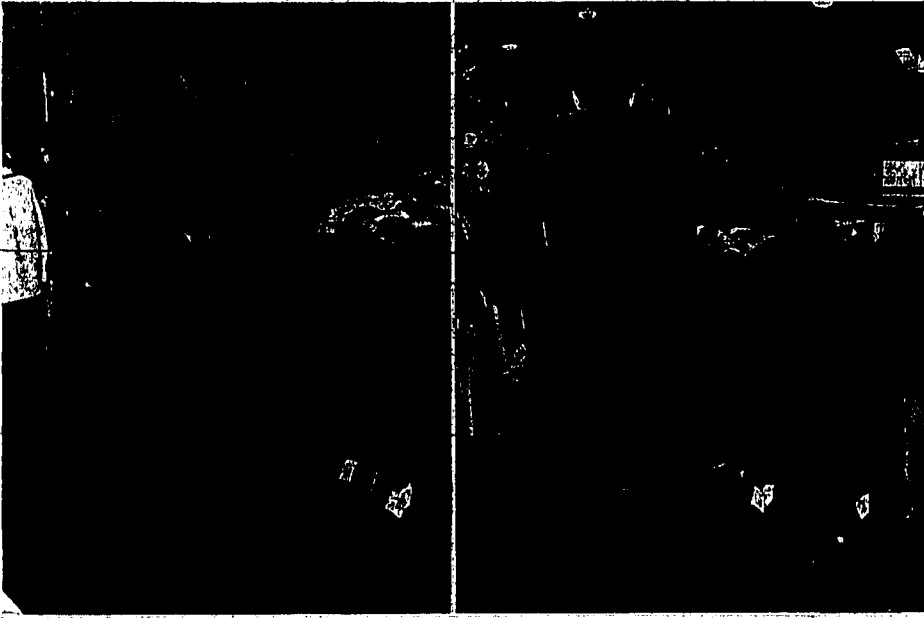
One of the most effective devices for detecting shoplifting was recently invented by an electronics concern. This method is not used yet in Twin Falls.

They magnet dots are placed on each item of merchandise. When this merchandise is checked out, and paid for, the dot is de-magnetized. When the person walks out of the store, nothing happens.

But if that dot has not been de-magnetized, watch out. Going through that door, every bell in the store will ring.

Considering the loss to business by shoplifters, the electronic detecting method is very cheap.

Store personnel and managers have to be very careful of libel in stopping alleged shoplifters. Recently, a lawsuit was filed in which a plaintiff asked more than \$800,000 damages against an Idaho store. The plaintiff had been accused of shoplifting, but contended no crime was committed.

In a real situation, Mr. Westphal would talk with the suspect, making all possible efforts to cause the woman no embarrassment. But if our model had been allowed to leave, she would have taken with her nearly \$400 worth of merchandise. It is roughly estimated that shoplifters cost Twin Falls merchants \$500,000 a year.

Some bring their own brown bags, receipt tickets and staple the receipt over the top, staple the package closed, and walk out undetected.

To make this method work, the thief takes an item from one store, but slips that item into a paper bag with a receipt from another store. This lets the clerk know that what the

thief has in the bag was purchased at "another store."

The thief gives the appearance of having shopped all over Twin Falls, while in reality the numerous packages are filled with stolen items.

The thief can, in one day, make several thousand dollars. He sells the material to a black market outlet, either in the city, the state, or another state.

There is no doubt among businessmen that shoplifting is getting more widespread. Sociologists could have a ball with the why of it all.

But shoplifting costs the consumer, because businesses have to raise prices to make up the loss.

So efforts are being made to police the stores. In Twin Falls, and in the nation,

## Americans Aren't Only People With Day Called Thanksgiving

NEW YORK (AP) — Americans aren't the only people with a day called Thanksgiving. Canada and Japan have one too and many other countries in the world celebrate similar occasions.

An English vicar once said: "Thankfulness is the rent we pay God for living on this wonderful earth." And for centuries people have been giving thanks for their blessings around harvest time.

The American Thanksgiving, first observed by the Pilgrims in 1621, is a religious celebration that the Lord for good things the past year has brought. It is also a day of family reunions, big dinners and festivities.

Canada holds its Thanksgiving on the second Monday in October. Representatives of Latin American countries in Washington have observed Pan-American Thanksgiving since 1900. Although it has taken place on the same day as the American Thanksgiving, now a special Mass is celebrated on a Sunday preceding U.S. Thanksgiving.

Nov. 23 is Thanksgiving in Japan. The Japanese eat hard-boiled and offer thanks to the legendary hero Prince Ninigi. The occasion is especially celebrated among the farmers who bring in a harvest, make the new wine and depend on Ninigi for abundant crops.

The Swiss observe the Monday preceding the last Thursday of November by bringing their own harvest to the capital city of Bern. Farmers set up stalls and sell their goods. Later there is a big parade through the town.

On the island of Sardinia, off the Italian coast, the Feast of the Redeemer takes place the last week of August, which marks the end of the harvest season. The people give thanks for the year's crops in a religious ceremony. A few days later, the hunting season begins.

At harvest time in India's Punjab State, natives dance the "Bhangra" in the dance, men carry long wooden sticks and wear brightly studded jackets.

In southern Germany—Bavaria—the end of the harvest season and the beginning of the hunting season is marked by the Redentore festival. People wear fancy dress and perform folk dances which date from the 13th and 14th centuries.

Catholics throughout Europe celebrate Nov. 11 as Saint Martin's Day in honor of Saint Martin of Tours who once shared his cloak with a beggar. He generally is considered to be patron of the harvest. His day coincides with an ancient feast of Dionysus.

Germans call the day Martinstag and invite their neighbors to share their table.

In Denmark, the people call the occasion Mortensaften, Saint Martin's Eve, because it comes on Nov. 10. When the crops are gathered and the pease fat, Mortensaften is celebrated with family dinners.

La Saint Martin is Saint Martin's Day in France. It is marked by gaily and feasting on roast goose and the new wines. Also in France, from September through October, grape and wine festivals are celebrated in various provinces in honor of the new wines.

In Italy, the day of San Martino is observed with the traditional tasting of the new wine. The Italians believe Saint Martin shared his cloak with a poor drunkard. Therefore, the day is celebrated in Italy by all lovers of wine.

The Dutch believe the traditional Saint Martin feast originated in Roman times when the goose was sacrificed annually as a thankful offering for the harvest.

In Portugal, the widely celebrated Feast of Saint Martin is marked by the guzzling of red Portuguese wine, chestnuts roasted over flaming embers and the slaughter of a pig.

Martin Gas, Martin's Goose Day in Sweden, is highlighted by the family feasting on a luscious roast goose from the province of Skane, famous for its geese. In some northern provinces, marstromming, a fermented delicacy made from small Baltic herring, is the culinary delight of the season.

In England, there are harvest festivals of thanksgiving throughout the country. The time varies from August to mid-October, depending on local harvest conditions. Churches are decorated with fruits and vegetables characterizing the harvest and services are held to give thanks to the Lord.

Throughout history, there have been occasions of giving thanks. When the Pilgrims settled in America, it was only natural that they continue the tradition.

# Weber Dominates Final Stats For Big Sky League

Weber State College Wildcats dominate the near-final Big Sky Conference football statistics despite finishing the season in a third-place tie in the standings. The final game of the conference is played Thursday against Portland State in Oregon.

Hard-driving back Lee White of Weber wound up the season with 1,378 yards in total offense, with Montana State University's ace tailback Don Hias second

with 1,245. Both have been selected for the East-West Shrine game in San Francisco.

White also was the league's top rusher and shared scoring honors with Jim Pearsall of the University of Idaho, both racking up 64 points.

Weber commanded the top of the heap in team statistics, totaling 3,401 yards in offense to Montana State's 3,134. The Wildcats also broke the league pass defense record by holding opponents to 38 per cent completions, compared to the old mark of 42 per cent also set by Weber State.

The University of Montana also was under the old mark with its foes held to 40 per cent in successful aeriats.

Montana took top honors in team defense, allowing 283 yards per game on an average of 562 carries attempted against the Grizzlies.

Wildcats received five other honors. Tom Tuckett caught 43 passes for 476 yards and the lead in that department. Paul Waite hit 40 per cent of his passes for 1,212 yards. Steve Smith punted 83 times for a 44-yard average. Luther White shared interception honors with Montana's Jim O'Neill. Each had six.

And Tuckett shared player of the week recognition with O'Neill. Tuckett caught 13 passes for 101 yards and one touch-down last week. O'Neill's outstanding defense included two interceptions and 73 yards in runbacks which set up two touch-downs against Portland State.

Montana State's Gary Popiel and Montana's Don Raines garnered 26 punt returns each to break the league mark of 17 set by Bobcat Jim Tuss in 1965. Popiel's 385-yard return total also bettered Tuss' mark of 273.

Busby Lintormer of the Vandias headed the kick-off returns with 23 for 479 yards.

## Sports FROM ALL ANGLES

It is becoming an annual thing to propose that the Southern Idaho Conference be divided into eastern and western divisions, and some likely candidates from the East.

The Pocatello schools' active support of this thing. Just what it is, exactly, does not seem clear, but we can name several who oppose it. In yesterday's mail we received a mimeographed proposed lineup for this conference. It shows some thinking. But there is one unfortunate fact in any discussion of dividing up. That is unless the Boise schools aren't divided, the overall fairness of the plan is not there.

This is the proposal set forth in letter, which was received, we assume, by all schools involved. In the Eastern Division they have placed Pocatello, Highland, Blackfoot, Idaho Falls, Kaysville, Bonneville, Minico and Burley.

It suggests that if Madison of Rexburg, Jerome or Buhl is interested, they would go to the east "as they would stand a better chance of winning."

On the West there is Boise, Borah, Capital, Caldwell, Nampa, Twin Falls and Meridian. It suggests that Mountain Home, Bishop Kelly and Emmett stay out.

Enrollment figures included indicate about 11,000 in the eastern side and right at 10,000 in the west, although the west will be at least two teams light.

At the end of season—each member school scheduling only nine games—the playoffs would pit the divisions against each other, champs against champs, runner-up against runner-up, etc., right down through last place.

The basic premise, of course, is to eventually force the Idaho Intercollegiate Activities Association to formulate and sponsor an official state playoff.

We agree with several points prescribed but overall disagree with the plan.

In the first place we feel it can be fairly stated that year-in and year-out two of the best three or four teams will come from the Boise-City area. Tradition tells us that, despite the renewed vigor shown at Idaho Falls, the winning football teams come from the west side of the state. Even Twin Falls, which over the last 20 years has compiled a less than mediocre record, is ahead of Idaho Falls, Pocatello and Highland.

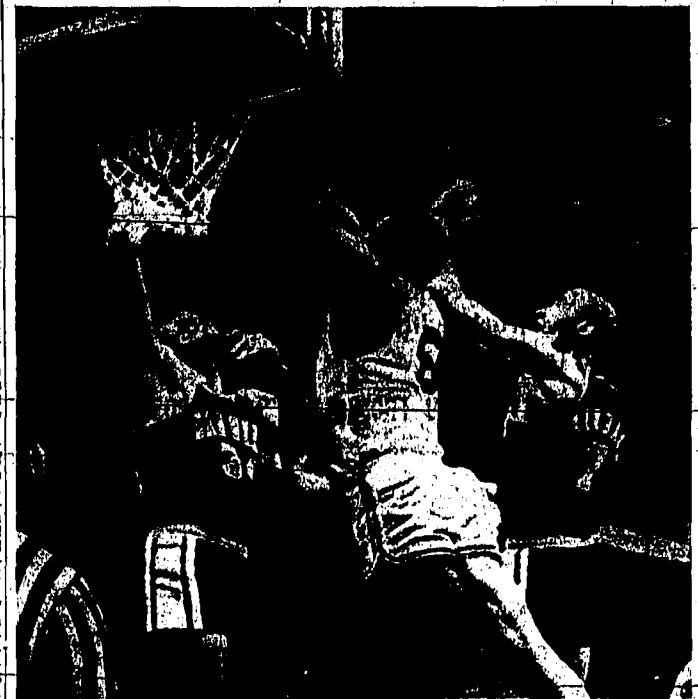
Another point of disagreement arises in season scheduling. It wouldn't be possible, if sufficient interested were to be piqued in the playoff, for there to be any cross-scheduling. An example, say Idaho Falls is winning the Eastern side and plays Twin Falls. It would be a third or fourth on this side. If Twin Falls won that game, it would hurt your Armistice Day playoff. But disallow some of these cross scheduling and it throws the west side into the position that the Boise schools have been following—playing all September out of state against teams that lend nothing to the interest within the state.

The idea of Jerome and Buhl joining, is not sound in that the imbalance of enrollment would weigh them down, excepting the usual season. Consider this year. Buhl, after taking its drubbing in the hands of the Wildcats, had to come back the next week against Borah. It is possible for the small school to maintain some athletic competition with big schools if there is sufficient time in before to allow for solid preparation and pointing and a period thereafter to mend. Week after week of SIC caliber ball would decimate the smaller schools.

In the past couple of days the grid outlook of Buhl and Jerome may have brightened in the demise of the Big Eight Conference. As Gooding Coach Jim Wallace points out, it is possible for the South-Central Conference to become a complete athletic entity and not at the expense of any other.

Wood River, Gooding and Filer could join the SIC while Jerome, Buhl and Mountain Home could stay with Minico and Bur-

## Cannon Feels Catch Career Just Starting

Billy Cannon agrees that he's past his peak as a runner but finally he's getting started in catching. Cannon had his biggest day as a tight end last Sunday, grabbing six passes—three of them for touchdowns—as the Oakland Raiders overcame an early Minnesota edge and whipped the Dolphins 31-17.

The performance made Cannon the Associated Press choice as American Football League Offensive Player of the Week.

"A football player reaches his speed peak as a senior in college," says Cannon, who won the Heisman Trophy and was the subject of a bitter court battle between the American and National leagues in his last year at Louisiana State.

A fleet halfback, Cannon was the first big name snared by the AFL in the bidding battle that preceded pro football's peacemaking merger last year.

After three productive seasons at Houston he got hurt and then was traded to Oakland where he began his new career as a tight end. Now, three seasons later, he has developed into a first rate pass catcher.

"This year, for the first time, I've felt I could do an adequate job there," says Cannon of his new position. "My weight is up and I know I can do a better job now than I have in the past."

Cannon had caught only 21 passes and scored two TDs in two seasons at tight end. But his six interceptions and three TDs against the Dolphins gave him 18 catches and six scores this year.

"My speed has diminished," admits Cannon, "but I still can beat some defensive backs."

Does he prefer his new job at tight end?

"No, running back is still the game," says Cannon. "Running with the ball, you either gain or get greased."

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# FBI Laboratory Noting 35th Anniversary

The nation's and the world's most up-to-date crime fighting tool, the Federal Bureau of Investigation Laboratory, celebrates its 35th anniversary Friday.

Since its inauguration in 1932, the laboratory has made millions of examinations and has solved and assisted in gaining convictions on innumerable cases which, without modern,

up-to-date scientific data, would not have been solved.

More important, perhaps, is the fact that many innocent people have been proven innocent because of the findings of the FBI laboratory.

The various branches of the laboratory are many. The need for the vast laboratory is evident as crime goals to be a bigger and bigger business.

It was not until several years

after the organization of the FBI that the need was made clear for scientific investigation of crimes, and the laboratory was launched at Washington, D.C.

A multi-use department, the laboratory does extensive research on cases the FBI is investigating. No other laboratory are maintained in the various FBI divisions in the United States and all material, etc., which must be investigated, is

sent to Washington, D.C., for analysis.

The multitude of material available to assist in research on fingerprints, handwriting, paints, etc., is phenomenal.

The FBI laboratory also performs an important service for local law enforcement agencies. The facilities there are utilized to a great extent by most peace keeping agencies in the United States.

Evidence connected with most major crimes in Magic Valley in past years has been sent to the FBI laboratory for analysis and investigation. Through the services of the laboratory, local agencies have been able to submit much more acceptable evidence into court.

A recent example of the value of the FBI's laboratory to local agencies was the identification of a mysterious body found dead of gunshot wounds near Paul.

It was through the assistance of the FBI that Minidoka County authorities were able to identify the body. After weeks of mystery surrounding the body, it was finally identified and a hand removed and sent to the FBI laboratory. There, the man subsequently was identified by fingerprint comparison.

The case still isn't solved, but because of identification of the victim, it's a lot closer to a solution than it was.

No case is too small for the FBI laboratory.

Take the case of the New Jersey laundry that was bilking Uncle Sam by merely air tumbling Navy laundry. The FBI stopped it and through the use of science, was able to prove that the dark blue blankets were not being cleaned—and the operator of the laundry was arrested and fined.

The case was not too spectacular but shows the ingenuity of those associated with the laboratory—the ingenuity that has aided in countless murder, burglary, robbery, forgery, kidnapping and other cases.

The youths were hospitalized Sunday and released Tuesday afternoon.

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## Soviets May Be Bent On Developing Significant Amphibious Warfare Force

WASHINGTON (AP)—Pentagon sources say the Soviet Union apparently is building a second helicopter carrier and suggest the Soviets may be bent on developing a significant amphibious warfare force.

naval infantry is being developed as an elite force. Naval infantrymen wear a distinctive uniform, topped off by a black beret.

If the Soviets use their helicopter carriers in the same way

as the United States, they would station them off potential trouble spots of political interest to the Soviet Union.

In event of a decision to establish a Soviet military presence, the Soviet navy could fly

naval infantrymen from the carriers and land them in helicopters on foreign shores.

So far, Pentagon experts said, the Soviets have only a tiny capacity for any kind of cold war "show of force" amphibious operation.

"It's a drop in the bucket now," one intelligence expert said, "but we really don't know to what extent they are going to expand their naval infantry and amphibious capability."

The sources interpreted the development as a sign the Soviets may be belying taking a lead out of the American book and building a force that could intervene with Marine-like troops in overseas crises.

The construction of the new vessel reportedly is in its early stages, but Pentagon experts said it appears to be a helicopter carrier like the first such Soviet ship whose existence was disclosed publicly only about a month ago.

The first helicopter carrier, about 600 feet long and less than 30,000 tons, is being outfitted near Odessa in the Black Sea, the sources said. The second carrier is being built in the same place.

The rise of Soviet interest in amphibious warfare has been a matter of concern for the United States and for its North Atlantic Treaty Organization partners.

Since the Arab-Israeli war last June, the Soviets have maintained a fleet of more than 45 warships and supporting vessels in the Mediterranean. Five of these ships are amphibious types.

Coupled with this is the evident attention the Soviets are giving to their "naval infantry," roughly a counterpart of the U.S. Marine Corps.

After an on-again, off-again history, the Soviet naval infantry apparently was revived a little more than three years ago. Estimates now place its strength at only about 3,000—roughly 1 per cent of the size of the Marine Corps.

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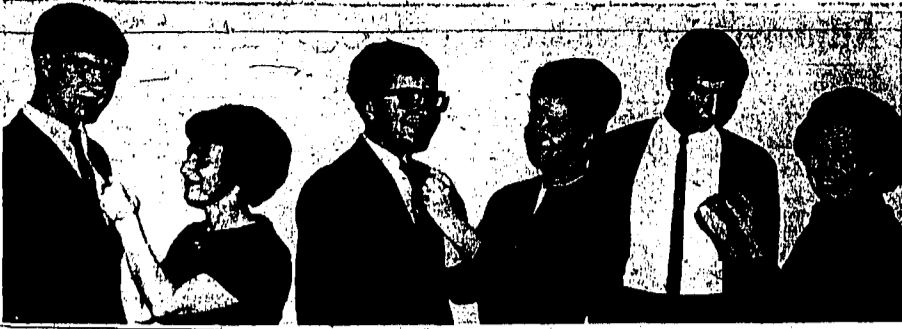

## Montana Teacher Has Strenuous Job

**SUNBURST, Mont. (NEA)**—When it comes to overworked, underpaid schoolteachers, 26-year-old Karen Speer is a textbook illustration.  
 Miss Speer teaches at O'Loughlin Elementary here. Or, rather, Miss Speer IS O'Loughlin Elementary.  
 O'Loughlin is a remnant of the past, a one-room schoolhouse which operated 18 miles from the nearest paved road. It sits in the middle of a hayfield. The nearest other structure is an outhouse.  
 The school is both office and home for Karen Speer. She teaches at one end and lives at the other. She seldom leaves the building.  
 Her daily routine begins about 6 a.m.  
 First duty, of course, is to eat. She draws well-water from a pipe and selects food from a larder. The larder is full. It must be. In the winter-time she's often stranded in the school for weeks at a time.  
 She doesn't mind being cut off from the world, however. She has a dog named Waco for companionship and protection. Besides, as O'Loughlin's only librarian she has plenty of books to read; there is "Black Beauty," "Little Women" and "Rutabaga Stories," to name a few.  
 After breakfast, Miss Speer reads for work.  
 Initially, she sweeps the floors. As O'Loughlin's only janitor, her tasks also include cleaning the toilets (the inside ones), washing the windows, dusting the erasers and sundry other maintenance.  
 She says she doesn't mind janitorial service but draws the line. She always has area farmers cut down the wheat in the playground.  
 At 8:30 the kids arrive... all seven of them.  
 "Good morning, Miss Speer!" The kids are all from close by farmhouses. They are lucky to have O'Loughlin Elementary and Karen Speer in the vicinity... otherwise they'd have to class.

travel 30 miles, one way, to the nearest school.  
 "Good morning, children."  
 The teacher has arranged the kids in one group, according to class. Three first graders sit on one flank row, two second graders sit on the other. A third and fourth grader are placed in the middle.  
 Miss Speer admits she doesn't know if this arrangement is the best. Perhaps she should segregate them. As O'Loughlin's only principal she reserves the right to change her mind later.  
 "Now, first graders, take out your colors."  
 "Yes, Miss Speer."  
 "Second graders, your spelling."  
 "Yes, Miss Speer."  
 "Third graders, science and fourth graders, your readers."  
 Following assignments, the teacher walks from grade to grade, which is to say from desk to desk, for personal communication. She spends about 15 minutes on each child, in each subject, six hours a day.  
 The kids themselves are quiet and alert. There is no horsingplay. The class is too small and Miss Speer has eyes in the back of her head.  
 As morning draws on, though, the children begin to fidget. Boys yank on their stretch socks. Girls tuck down the hems of their Sears Roebuck dresses. A hand raises. A drink of water? Go ahead, John.  
 Finally, lunch. Yippeee!  
 The school recesses 45 minutes at noon. As O'Loughlin's only cook Miss Speer removes TV dinners from her refrigerator (the kids supply the meals) and uses a hot plate to fix the day's food.  
 After eating, the kids race outdoors. They organize games, they play at a nearby creek, they chase off the cows that wander over. As O'Loughlin's only ground monitor, Miss Speer is always nearby.  
 Soon, too soon, it's back to class.

The afternoon is the same as the morning. Using excellent and generally up-to-date texts, Miss Speer teaches, prods, encourages and gently demands. Geography, history, English, even the new math.  
 "What does ice do, John?"  
 "Shrug."  
 "Does it sink?"  
 "Hesitation."  
 "No, of course not, it floats."  
 When the class is confused by a fact the teacher explains it in demonstration. As O'Loughlin's only lab technician, Miss Speer illustrates the floatability of ice, using tray cubes in a water glass.  
 Thus it goes all day. Instruction in penmanship. Lessons in art. Some personal attention to a speech flaw. A bandage for a finger scratch. A sewing kit for a knee patch. Lemonade for a treat.  
 Taxpayers in Tootle County pay Karen Speer a \$4,500 salary for this individualized, face-to-face form of education. But she's not complaining. She likes the job. She likes the school.  
 "All right, can we hear a pin drop?"  
 Silence.  
 "Class dismissed. See you all tomorrow."

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# Gov. McCall Criticizes Legislative Session As It Adjourns In Frustration

SALEM (AP) — The special Oregon legislative session finally adjourned in frustration Tuesday night and got a tongue-lashing from Gov. Tom McCall for failing to achieve most of the major goals.

"The legislative process in Oregon is near the point of breakdown and the people are the losers," said the governor.

The session lasted 23 days and failed in all but one of its objectives. The one success was to adjust the budget to meet a predicted \$32 million deficit in the current two-year period.

The legislators failed to achieve property tax relief, to raise taxes or to improve school financing.

"In politics you never get a full loaf, so you talk about a half-loaf as being better than none. But in this case we got a dog biscuit," said the Republican governor.

McCall blamed the Democrats for the impasse. The Democrats who are in the minority in both houses, blamed the Republicans.

"All the Republicans accomplished was to raid the veterans' fund," said Rep. James Redden, D-Medford, House minority leader. He was referring to the controversial transfer of \$15 million from the Veterans' Home Loan Fund to the general fund to help meet the deficit.

Most hope of new financing was pinned on the governor's proposal for a 3 per cent sales tax, but it went down to defeat Monday.

Legislators decided to stay over one more day to try for income tax reform and school help.

A conference committee of both houses drafted the bills, but both went down.

The Senate voted 10-11 to give school districts modest tax bases, but the House killed it, 24-23.

Then the Senate defeated 18-17 the bill to permit use of the federal income tax return to figure the state income tax.

The income tax proposal drew objections because it introduced a net receipts tax of one-half of 1 per cent. The take from this would have been used to lower existing income tax rates. Some legislators said more study was needed.

The Senate is controlled by a coalition of 11 Republicans and seven conservative Democrats. There are 12 other Democrats.

"The majority party in the House and the Senate coalition were conscientious throughout

the special session. While they buckled down to an admittedly distasteful task, others played cruel games with Oregon's future," said the governor, who took office this year.

The Democrats fought back. "The session has increased bitterness among legislators; it has spent taxpayers' money; it has further damaged the image of the institution. This is the penalty for electing executives to office who have not had political experience. Gov. McCall made a mistake in calling this session; he could help rectify it by publishing a statement now that this is the legislature that would make it futile to convene another special session tomorrow or next week or next year. It serves no constructive purpose to reopen a \$4,000-a-day theater for the obstructionists," said McCall.

Monday night was sleepless but uneventful. On Tuesday the North Vietnamese struck with renewed fury.

## Living And Dead Have Gray Pallor In Battle Of Hill 875

HILL 875, Vietnam (AP) — Four after hours of battle gave the living and the dead the same gray pallor on Hill 875. At times the only way to tell them apart was to watch when the enemy mortars crashed in on the exhausted American paratroopers.

The living rushed unshamedly to the tiny bunkers dug into the red clay.

The wounded squirmed toward the shelter of trees blasted to the ground.

The dead—propped up in bunkers or face down in the dust—didn't move.

Since Sunday the most brutal fighting of the Vietnam war has ebbed and flowed across this remote hill in the western sector of the Dak To battleground. The 2nd Battalion of the 173rd Airborne Brigade went up 875 first. It nearly died.

Of the 16 officers who led the men across the ridgeline Sunday, eight were killed and the other eight wounded. Eleven of the 13 medics died.

The battalion took its first casualties at midday Sunday as it crested Hill 875, one of the hundreds of knolls that dot the

ridges in the Dak To fighting region near the Cambodian-Lao border.

All weekend as the paratroopers moved along the jungle hills enemy base camps were uncovered. The biggest was on 875 and D Company lost several men in the first encounter with the bunkers.

A Company moved back down the hill to cut a landing zone and was chopped to pieces by a North Vietnamese flanking attack.

The remnants fled back to the crest of the hill while a paratrooper propped his gun on the trail and kept firing at the advancing enemy, ignoring orders to retreat with the others.

"You can keep gunning them down, but sooner or later when there is enough of them they'll get to you," said Pfc. James Kelly of Fort Myers, Fla., who saw the machine gunner go down after killing about 17 North Vietnamese.

D Company, hearing the roar of battle below it, returned to the crest of the hill and established a 50-yard perimeter. "Because we figured we were surrounded by a regiment," one of the soldiers said.

**Rice Issue Could Become Crisis-In Dry Indonesia**

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—This by many estimates. The government is already using next year's rice stocks to meet this emergency. Another bad crop could be disastrous for the people and the troubled government.

Thailand also is facing shortages and has reduced exports to Indonesia. The Philippines is a rice-importing nation and is selling here only for badly needed hard currency.

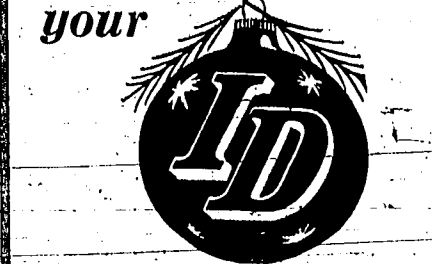

Transportation costs are high and inflation continues to force up rice prices.

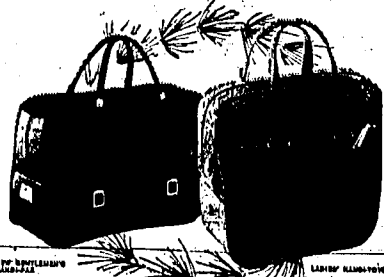
