NEW YORK (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower says the United States can win the Vietnam war and urges that U.S. troops be permitted to pursue enemy forces across South Vietnam's national frontiers.

Malaysia Mobilizes Civil Defense Units

 KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — The Malaysian government mobilized civil defense groups today as reports came in of more communal violence between Malays and Chinese in northwest Malaysia.

Deputy Prime Minister Tun Abdul Razak said the civilians would be deployed along coastal areas where order has been restored to free police and army troops to quell new rioting in the interior.

It was the sixth straight day of racial clashes between Malays and Chinese in the northwest part of the country.

The nationwide toll from the riots that began last Friday as a protest against monetary devaluation rose to 10 dead and 200 injured, half of them seriously.

A police spokesman said 882 persons have been arrested.

The civilian defense groups are composed of volunteers who have received extensive training in assisting the police and military.

They were previously used during the 1948-60 Communist insurrection and the 1963-66 guerrilla war with Indonesia.

"The most important thing is to localize the trouble," Razak said after the weekly cabinet meeting.

Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman broadcast an appeal for calm and blamed the riots on Communist terrorists and sympathizers of Mao Tse-tung.

But reports from northwest Malaysia said most of the attacks were made by Malays on Chinese. The Malays resent the economic domination which the hard working Chinese have attained.

Rahman toured many of the riot areas today, including his home state of Kedah, where limited martial law was declared Tuesday.

He warned that "the Communists are out to create trouble and chaos if they can take over the country."

Extra police sent to Penang, the island city where the riots started, were withdrawn and sent into the mainland interior.

No major incidents reported in Penang, and the curfew was lifted for four hours in the morning to let housewives shop.

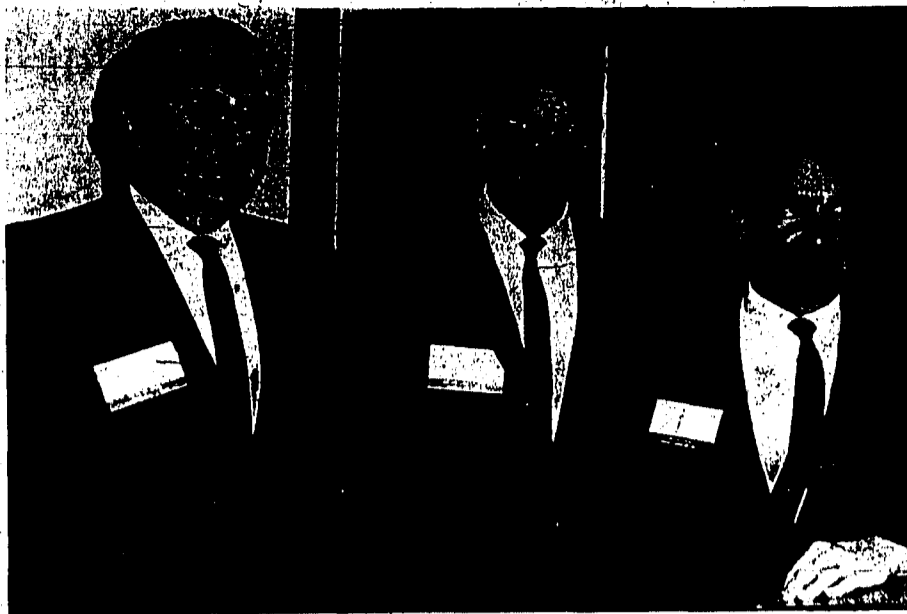

Living Costs Rise During October

WASHINGTON (AP) — Living costs rose three-tenths of one per cent in October, mainly because of higher prices for new automobiles, clothing and services, the government reported today.

Food prices dropped two-tenths of one per cent, but this was less than seasonal, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said.

In its annual evaluation of automobile prices, the bureau said new car prices went up with introduction of the 1968 model, with retail prices averaging 2.7 per cent higher than a year ago.

Manufacturers' prices averaged just 2 per cent above a year ago after allowance for net quality improvements in 1968 models.

The balance of the retail price increase was attributed to smaller dealer discounts and trade-in allowances and higher sales taxes in certain states as well as higher freight charges.

The actual increase in manufacturers' prices for cars averaged \$37.54. The bureau said that \$20.65 of this increase should be attributed to safety improvements and \$11.20 to changes designed to reduce the output of air pollutants.

Deputies May Breach Family Fortress Against World

DOMINGUEZ, Calif. (AP) — A house that has become one family's fortress against the world may be breached by sheriff's deputies armed with warrants for the arrest of two of the nine occupants who say they won't come out "until God instructs us to."

Robert Holt, 36, has turned the rented home in this Los Angeles suburb into a retreat for himself and eight relatives. They closed the doors and drew the curtains in April.

They have lived there since without lights or heat. Weeds in the once well-tended lawn are now 6 to 8 feet high.

"You never hear a sound from that house," said Herman Hayes, a neighbor. "It's very sad and a mystery none of us can understand."

In the house are Holt, an engineer; his wife Loyce, 35; their daughters Robbie, 6, and Sally, 9; Holt's mother, Ella Holt; Holt's brother, Ralph; his sister, Ella Mae Johnson; and her two sons, Colton, 17, and Andrew, 19.

When they first began their retreat they spoke to visitors through a broken window pane in the front door. Now queries meet only silence.

Utilities have been turned off. Mail was delivered, then picked up when it was not taken in.

Nobody knows how they get food.

"The savings and loan association that owns the house sent an attorney Tuesday with a notice that the Holts must pay rent if they move out within three days. He got no response.

When school started in September, the Holt girls didn't appear. Instead their parents went to Compton Municipal Court to plead guilty to keeping their daughter out of school.

But Judge Harry Schaffer wouldn't accept the pleas. He said there may be a constitutional question of freedom of religion involved in the Holt's refusal to let their children attend school.

He ordered them to appear for a court hearing Monday. When they failed to appear, he issued bench warrants for the arrest of Mr. and Mrs. Holt.

Authorities say they aren't sure how to go about serving the warrants.

If ever a man looked the part of a Western sheriff—one of the good guys in the white hats—it is Jim Benham. Arid better yet, Jim Benham has acted the part, filling the boots of the Twin Falls County sheriff to perfection for the last 12 years.

Sheriff Benham is a lawman's lawman. During his tenure here he has earned the respect of law enforcement agencies throughout Idaho and much of the Intermountain West. What is even more important, he also earned the respect of the people in his home county. He traditionally was the top vote-getter in Twin Falls County elections, proving that his constituents felt he was doing a good job.

Common sense is Jim Benham's

stock in trade. This, combined with a sense of dedication to good law enforcement, has resulted in Twin Falls County enjoying a high quality of performance from its sheriff's department that is not too common.

In view of this, it is with a great deal of regret that the residents of Twin Falls County greet the news that Sheriff Benham is resigning to take over the post of state brand inspector. Jim Benham feels that the new post has a lot of attractions, however, and feels he is bettering his personal situation.

He's going to be a hard man to replace, and Twin Falls County will miss him. We hate to lose him, but we wish him all the best in his new job.

No Safety In Numbers

Anyone with a concern for the remnants of many species of wildlife is unlikely to be tickled by the return of the feather in fashion or warmed by the new uses of furs for floor coverings, wall hangings and blankets.

Conservationists shudder at the memory of the egret's near disappearance as the result of fashion demand for aligettes. Fortunately, the egret today is protected and the feathers now making a nostalgic comeback for the styles of the '30s are types that can be collected without endangering wild species.

Ostrich, turkey and goose feathers all can be produced commercially and the adjacent, whose tail-feathers provide marabou, is carefully protected for his value as a scavenger.

But the trends in fashion dictate vigilance by conservation agencies to avert possible elimination of a form of wildlife in the interests of haute couture or the fad of the moment. Such a possibility exists in current efforts to promote skins of animals native to Africa or Asia.

North America's own polar bear is threatened because of irresponsible inroads made in the name of sport or commerce.

International organizations are already sounding warnings about the

disappearing herds of East Africa, last stronghold of the great beasts. How can these alarms be dismissed when the difficulty of persuading young African governments to preserve natural habitats for their wildlife is aggravated by the obvious commercial opportunities some of the animals afford?

Providing supplies of zebra skins for wall hangings requires the killing of that many zebras. The same goes for skins of any other diminishing African or Asian species that might fall into commercial fashion.

Such warnings cannot be dismissed as the groundless fears of nervous Nellies because there remain vast herds of wild animals in Africa, at least not until it is conceded that the skies of America were once darkened by the flight of millions of passenger pigeons and its plains were black with a sea of bison.

Their fate hardly makes a case for calling fears for African and Asian wildlife groundless. It makes a compelling case for action now to avert the thoughtless extinction of more of nature's creatures.

There seems to be a growing attempt to create new demands for the less-exotic furs that have fallen out of fashion as attire, which provides at least some encouragement.

On Thanksgiving Day a Twin Falls mother and her five children were burned out of their home. She is on welfare, and through the tragedy of fire, lost everything she owns.

It can happen to anyone. Fortunately, many residents are covered against such a loss by insurance. But Mrs. Theida Martin was not.

The house was insured, but it was rented and insurance covered replacement only. Since the fire, Mrs. Martin and her children have been forced to accept the well-meaning efforts of neighbors and relatives. But in her efforts to get enough money to live, find another home to rent, get food and clothing for the children, Mrs. Martin found many doors closed.

She was even turned away by her church, the excuse being anyone on welfare was not eligible for church aid.

In a last-ditch effort, she approached Twin Falls County commissioners. Commissioners have agreed to help; they even dipped into their own pockets. But, alas, county aid is only token help.

Mrs. Martin's immediate problem is one of housing. She finds it hard to rent. Owners are reticent, understandably, to rent to a woman with five children.

But if a community were ever given a chance to show its Christian feeling toward others less fortunate, there is no better time.

The rest are all handsome types who can run away from home and go to Hollywood if they are cold-shouldered by an unappreciative electorate. Indeed, California's Gov. Ronald Reagan already has been there, and sometimes behaves as if he'd never left, although there's a rumor going around that he can now spell deficit.

In a day when the ideal of male beauty sometimes seems typified by unshaven beatniks and unwashed flower children, there is comfort for the more solid citizen in the fact that although all the GOP candidates are well endowed with pulchritude, their comeliness is of the square variety.

The flighty young lady who killed me for the captain of the high school football team in the tedious Thirties would have been happy with any one of them.

George Romney's good looks are probably the squarest of the

lot. He is what is sometimes pausantiously described as the "man's man" type, the rugged, substantial and avuncular male whose appearance promises right thinking and security. He is at once the corporation tycoon, the wealthy clubman, the rugged outdoors man, the comfortable father. A dame might get bored with Romney eventually, but she'd always know she could trust him not to go around kissing unattached females at the country club.

Nelson Rockefeller would give Charles Boyer a run for his money as the wealthy man-about-town, aging-but with an aura of eternal youth. Besides his good looks, which sometimes suggests a Middle European ancestor, he has the aristocracy bestowed in America by large fortunes. Moreover, there are women who discover a fascination in a man who starts a second family after 68.

New York's Mayor John Lindsay is the epitome of the East Side Ivy Leaguer with pried a terrace Southampton and Palm Beach. His lean good looks are those of a man who has always had it pretty good, who went to all the right schools and played only the right sports. He is impeccably good brandy, apres ski and squash court. He would not be caught dead sailing the wrong boat or inviting the wrong guest to dinner.

Lindsay has his Midwestern

counterpart in Sen. Chuck Percy of Illinois. There is, inevitably, more of the grass roots in Percy because of his geographic heritage, and because he is a self-made rich man. But he is acceptable in the proper Eastern clubs for his casual good manners, his excellent tennis and his air of belonging. Females would find him challenging as a solidly respectable male to whom they would have to make the first overture. But whose good looks hold promise of a possible awakening.

Since there are now more women than men who vote, it would seem that not only Lincoln but Lyndon Johnson would be doomed to defeat no matter which Apollo the Republicans decide to nominate. After all, Jack Kennedy proved that a touch of the Greek god is not necessarily a liability in a Presidential candidate, even among the male bloc.

But this is not to suggest that Johnson retire forthwith to the banks of the Pedernales and count his money. He has one important ingredient of the human female going for him, to wit, high-minded perversity. If there is one constant in the average woman's makeup it is her stubborn unwillingness to do what is expected of her. Come November, 1968, she is quite capable of voting against beauty just to confound the male experts.

Loss Of Taste

Q—I am 67. All my food seems to taste the same. My sense of smell is impaired too. What is the cause and what is the treatment for this?

A—Most people who complain of a loss of taste are suffering from a loss of smell as it is this sense that gives them their ability to distinguish flavors. They are still able to recognize the four true tastes—salt, sour, bitter and sweet. Loss of the sense of smell is usually caused by chronic nasal congestion, nasal obstruction due to polyps, or chronic allergic rhinitis. It is made worse by heavy smoking and frequent use of nasal decongestants.

Relief depends on discovering and removing the cause. The treatment may take the form of desensitization, antibiotics, drugs of the cortisone group or an operation. Prerequisites to any successful treatment program are to quit smoking and to make sure there is enough humidity in the air you breathe.

Q—What would cause a metallic or a bitter taste in my mouth? What can be done for it?

A—A metallic taste may be caused by excessive smoking, the action of an acid saliva on a metallic dental filling, sleeping with your mouth open or taking

certain drugs that contain a metal ion. A bitter taste may be caused by excessive belching, neglected teeth, certain drugs, a hiatus hernia or ruptured diaphragm, or a chronic infection in the mouth, nose or throat. The treatment requires the elimination of all possible sources of the abnormal taste.

Q—For two years I've had an unbearable taste in my mouth and odor in my nose. Is there any way to get rid of it?

A—These symptoms are a great source of worry to elderly persons. They may be caused by a chronic infection in the nose, throat, gums or lungs; heavy smoking, or the excessive use of mouthwashes. Frequently, worried preoccupation with the possibility of having had breath aggravates the condition or at least its effect on your equilibrium.

Q—I am just getting over an attack of myasthenia. Is this a dangerous disease?

A—Myasthenia gravis, a disease characterized by general weakness, is one of many diseases for which there is no cure, but which can be controlled with proper treatment. Neostigmine, which requires a doctor's prescription, or a related drug is usually effective.

A Harvest Of The Whirlwind

WASHINGTON — In the financial crisis still rocking the markets of the world reputations are falling like overripe plums. The latest is the wind of frantic day-to-day improvisation. Is the whirlwind of a critical reckoning that will bottom out no one knows where.

In all this one of the worst-kept secrets in Washington is the unhappy plight of Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. (Joe) Fowler. He did not want the job, having only had a brief interval in private law practice after a stint as Under Secretary of the Treasury. But, the last man out of the door, he was grabbed by the President for an office that had been difficult to fill.

A poorly kept secret, too, is Fowler's different qualifications in the field of fiscal and monetary know-how. The secretary is a friendly, compassionate, generous-spirited man. His great recommendation for the job at the time of his appointment in April, 1965, was his ability to work with Congress. A courtly Virginian with a store of anecdotes and humor, he knows on a friendly first-name basis a great many members of Congress.

But this qualification was largely nullified when the President and Chairman Wilbur Mills of the House Ways and Means

Committee fell out over a tax increase versus a \$5 billion cut in government spending. Fowler has ever since been ground between that upper and nether millstone, a most unenviable position.

The President's wrath has grown as Mills dug in and Congress was plainly not in a mood to talk about taxes. Fowler, who has a lot of company in this respect, is a victim of timing. The President was being strongly urged in January, 1966, to ask for a tax increase at that point, anticipating inflation to come. One of the stoutest advocates was Chairman William McShesney Martin Jr. of the Federal Reserve Board.

The Democrats then controlled the House by an overwhelming margin, thanks to the Johnson landslide of 1964. However, unpopular a tax increase is under any circumstances, the view of experienced observers was that within six months the Congress would have swallowed the bitter pill. In the November election Republicans made a net gain of 47 seats, and for all practical purposes the Administration had lost a hold over the House. The Republicans have insisted that they will not provide the estimated 50 votes needed from their side of the aisle to put over a tax increase until late February or March. It will then

have the greatest impact on the presidential campaign.

The President in his recent dramatic performance gave \$30 billion to \$35 billion as the probable deficit at the end of the current fiscal year without a tax increase. It was the first time a figure of that magnitude had been tossed in and it can hardly have reassured Europe's central bankers anxious over the increasing outflow of dollars.

Nor can it have given any comfort to the Secretary of the Treasury and the budget director. The best estimate is still for a deficit of \$22 billion to \$27 billion, and while that ain't his it is less alarming than the President's scare figure.

Despite the handicap of his chronic bladder trouble — he is frequently in pain — Fowler works hard at his job. He was given good marks for his efforts in the conference in Europe to achieve a system of "paper gold" that would augment the present woefully deficient condition of dependence on the dollar and the pound with an adequate gold backing.

What has been done falls far short of the need. Devaluation of the pound is a kind of desperate improvisation. The effect can at best be temporary.

The financial flap makes palpably evident the gap between the propaganda of the word and the propaganda of the deed.

Auto Safety For Baboons

WASHINGTON — The National Catholic Society for Animal Welfare has strongly objected to using live baboons in automotive safety tests at the Ford Motor Co. The society claimed the use of baboons was "cruel and mean," but Ford came back and said the tests were far more meaningful than those in which dummies were used.

The tests included the use of an air bag. Those baboons which used the air bag on impact of crashes up to 64 miles an hour survived. The baboons which didn't have the air bags for protection were killed.

"I am afraid I have to go along with the animal welfare society on this one. Why should animal baboons be the patsy for tests that will save human beings?"

Probably Ford first got the idea because there are no many human baboons driving cars these days that they thought they might get as close to the real thing as they could. Of course, you could say the same thing for dummies that are driving around.

It seems to me that a compromise should be found that would satisfy both the animal welfare people and the automotive safety people.

The solution is to use real people in the safety tests, at least those that correspond to the physical appearance and mental ability of baboons.

If we know that human beings can take this tremendous punishment, we can apply these findings to baboons, and the baboons won't have to be sacrificed to an industry they couldn't care less about.

The next problem is where to find the human beings for the auto safety experiments, at least ones that look and act like baboons when they're driving a car. The answer is that they're everywhere.

"Every American knows at least one, usually the man or woman in front of him when he's driving his own car.

But it would be unfair to enlist this person in the experiment because while he might look like a baboon to you, he might look like a baboon to somebody else.

The only fair way to select human beings for these auto safety tests is by the point system. Most states now provide that after a certain number of moving offenses the driver loses his license. This has worked great hardship on many people who need their automobile for their work and personal welfare.

Instead of losing their license, these drivers could be sentenced by the judge to go to Detroit and report for auto safety experiments. If they survived the experiments, they would be permitted to keep their license. For those that didn't survive the tests, nothing would be lost because, on the basis of the way they drove, they wouldn't live much longer anyway.

Most animal baboons I talked to think this idea has merit. The consensus was that they don't mind going up in space, and they're even willing to participate in cancer experiments. But they feel they shouldn't be wasted in auto safety tests, particularly since there are so many human baboons available.

New Defense Aide Must Set Authority Early

WASHINGTON (AP) — The next secretary of defense will have to establish his authority early.

The armed services, named by Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, are likely to test his successor's mettle.

The new Pentagon chief also may have to face a Congress bent on showing him it is boss. For nearly seven years, Congress has snarled under what some members have called McNamara's arrogance and "know-it-all" attitude.

The next defense chief also will inherit vexing problems from McNamara, among them the Vietnam war and the still troubled F111 fighter plane project once known as the TXF.

McNamara also will leave behind him a fundamental budget reform which is his monument.

That budget approach, which he installed and enforced on the services in 1961, probably will continue to operate to suppress service bickering over the split-up of defense dollars.

It is this budget reform, among others, that McNamara has claimed is "driven into the bedrock" of the huge military establishment and will remain after him.

He also brought about fundamental alterations in basic national defense strategy, switching from reliance on massive nuclear retaliation to a more flexible ability to meet Communist threats at every level of war, from insurgency on up.

McNamara's philosophy, as he spelled it out to the Associated Press some years ago, was to establish a single final authority over the enormously complex defense establishment.

"Whoever is head of the department should run it," McNamara said. "The head of any organization ought to place himself in position to make decisions and to stand behind them."

McNamara, working 12-hour days, has made hundreds of separate decisions, involving billions of dollars, in personal 15-min-by-15-min reviews of military budget proposals each year.

This detailed personal involvement has been criticized by some on grounds a really good administrator would delegate as much authority as possible to trusted subordinates.

The generals and admirals have often chafed under McNamara's imposed restraints, but none have dared to challenge him in public. He has made no secret of his determination to keep the armed services from quarreling among themselves or lobbying outside of the department for their projects or interests.

NAVY COMMENDATION MEDAL he received recently is pinned onto his uniform by Ronald Jennings, En. (C.), who is attached to the local Navy Recruiting station. The medal is one of about 1,000 in existence and was awarded on the basis of duties performed aboard the USS Rival, a mine sweeper scheduled to deploy to Vietnam duty. Because of Jennings and another engineer, the engine of the mine sweeper was brought up to standard in time to deploy on schedule. The medal was accompanied by a commendation letter signed by Secretary of the Navy Paul H. Nitze.

ULTIMATUM ISSUED
BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The Kurds of northern Iraq have issued an ultimatum to the Baghdad government to fulfill Kurdish demands by Thursday or face a Kurdish boycott, informed sources reported today.

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McNamara has served more than two years longer than any of the seven previous secretaries of defense. Even among his critics, he is conceded to have run the Defense Department with greater effectiveness and discipline than any of the others.

If it had not been for the Vietnam war, McNamara probably would have left the Pentagon after the completion of four years. Associates have said he told them on occasion "a man should move on after four years in such a job because he becomes stale."

There are those who claim this has happened to McNamara

—that he and his aides have offered few new ideas in recent years, but have spent their energies defending old ones which they put into effect with dazzling speed and virtuosity in the early days of the McNamara stewardship.

It is obvious that McNamara is a tired man. He is a millionaire and needs no job for income purposes.

Most Pentagon observers had expected him to stay in office at least until after the 1968 presidential election. Whether he is being eased out because President Johnson may regard him as a political liability is a matter of conjecture. Few of his staff had any advance word of his nomination to the World Bank presidency.

Loyal McNamara supporters will insist he left on his own terms.

The timing of his departure is uncertain.

But now that the word is out that he is leaving he becomes a

lame duck secretary—and lame ducks lose their clout very quickly.

He said they are required to check trucks and loads to keep truckers within the legal load limits.

The stations will be located at Priest River, Sandpoint, Hope, Moyle Springs, Kootenai, Grandville, Salmon and the intersection of U.S. Highway 95 and 2.

DECISION EXPECTED

BOISE (AP)—A decision on a proposal by three groups for a truck freight rate increase is expected within 10 days, the president of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission says.

At a formal hearing of the commission Tuesday in Boise, only one protest was registered against the increases which will average 5 per cent.

President Ralph Wickburg said the commission would deliver a decision in about 10 days.

A spokesman for Simplot Soil-builders protested the rate increase for dry bulk fertilizer.

Three separate groups applied for the increases which vary according to type of freight and from group to group. Representatives were Garrett Freight, Inc., Pocatello; Intermountain Tuff Bureau and the Idaho Motor Carrier Bureau.

York Hits Rollback In School Levies

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Education Association asserted Tuesday that a rollback in tax levies by some school districts violated "the established objectives of the state's legislators."

A legislator who was instrumental in obtaining enactment of a resolution calling for the rollback said, however, that the districts which followed that procedure were carrying out the intent of the lawmakers.

Wayne York, executive secretary of the teachers' group, said in a statement "It was the intent of the 1967 Legislature that school districts be permitted to use their 30-mill maximum levy on the full value resulting from the new assessments."

He asserted that "pressures from some legislators' county commissioners and taxpayer groups which bordered on duress and intimidation of school trustees and administrators resulted in a sizable number of school districts using a reduced school maintenance and operation levy."

Sen. Philip E. Batt, R-Wilder, chairman of the Senate Liaison Tax Committee, said the special session of the legislature last June refused to pass a bill which would have required that tax levies be rolled back to compensate for increases in assessed valuations.

"However," Batt added, "The legislature felt so strongly that caution should be used that we passed a resolution almost unanimously in both houses, asking each local taxing unit to use utmost discretion in setting their levies."

"There was certainly no intention on the part of the legislature to require each school district to levy the full 30 mills. In fact, the intention was to encourage school districts to levy only for their minimal needs."

Percy Says He's Not Running

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republican Sen. Charles H. Percy insists there is no trace of presidential politics in an effort by his home-state Illinois supporters to raise \$100,000 to help finance his Senate office.

Nor, said Percy, does the fund bear any resemblance to the one which exploded into political trouble for Richard M. Nixon when he was running for vice president 15 years ago.

"It's a mistake to compare them," the Illinois senator said in an interview.

Percy, who plans to leave Dec. 6 on a personally financed world tour, said again he is not a candidate for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination.

In Chicago, Thomas J. Houser, a lawyer who managed Percy's Senate campaign last year, said a group of supporters is trying to raise a minimum of \$100,000 a year to defray the expenses the senator faces in maintaining offices in Washington, Chicago and Centralia, Ill.

Houser said it is "simply erroneous" to consider the fund a part of any national campaign move in Percy's behalf.

He said Percy has spent \$70,000 of his own money this year—his first in the Senate—to pay office expenses in excess of congressional allowances.

"Despite the fact that he has secure personal funds, this is a burden some of his supporters want to help him with," Houser said.

Percy became a millionaire in business before he turned to politics.

"I thought it was a very nice gesture on those people's part," said Percy. "The allowances here are simply inadequate. You just can't possibly maintain on a Senate allowance an adequate office for a state the size of Illinois."

Percy said he couldn't compute off-hand just how much the official allowance is. It is based on several factors, including the size of the state a senator is from and staff size.

He has a staff of about 40 but his official allowance is sufficient only for 27 employees. Percy said he already is putting his \$30,000 Senate salary and all his speechmaking fees back into the cost of running his office.

House group is soliciting would be controlled by a committee, carefully audited and used to help cover staff salaries and expenses, mailing, printing, reports to Illinois residents and similar expenses.

National Committee for a Sane Policy on Vietnam said the vote was a "major endorsement of President Johnson's policies."

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Education Association asserted Tuesday that a rollback in tax levies by some school districts violated "the established objectives of the state's legislators."

A legislator who was instrumental in obtaining enactment of a resolution calling for the rollback said, however, that the districts which followed that procedure were carrying out the intent of the lawmakers.

Wayne York, executive secretary of the teachers' group, said in a statement "It was the intent of the 1967 Legislature that school districts be permitted to use their 30-mill maximum levy on the full value resulting from the new assessments."

He asserted that "pressures from some legislators' county commissioners and taxpayer groups which bordered on duress and intimidation of school trustees and administrators resulted in a sizable number of school districts using a reduced school maintenance and operation levy."

Sen. Philip E. Batt, R-Wilder, chairman of the Senate Liaison Tax Committee, said the special session of the legislature last June refused to pass a bill which would have required that tax levies be rolled back to compensate for increases in assessed valuations.

"However," Batt added, "The legislature felt so strongly that caution should be used that we passed a resolution almost unanimously in both houses, asking each local taxing unit to use utmost discretion in setting their levies."

"There was certainly no intention on the part of the legislature to require each school district to levy the full 30 mills. In fact, the intention was to encourage school districts to levy only for their minimal needs."

Safety Sedan Model Shown By Official

NEW YORK (AP) — Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vincent L. Tofany has displayed a state-financed scale model of a "safety sedan" that he says would withstand a front or rear end impact at 50 miles an hour.

The model, developed at a cost of \$385,000, was shown at a news conference Tuesday.

Among the score of safety features are:

—A periscope that juts up from the roof, with an eye mirror to the left of the steering wheel, giving the driver a panoramic view to the rear and sides without having to take his eyes off the road for long. The device has a wide-angle viewing lens of 100 degrees.

—A hydraulic energy-absorbing bumper that extends 12 inches and operates automatically as soon as the car goes over 37 miles an hour.

—A silhouette with no jagged edges that would impale a pedestrian.

—A four-wheel drive with an antilock braking system.

—Structural design to withstand a sideswipe crash at 40 miles an hour and a roll-over without collision at 70 miles an hour.

Tofany said the projected cost for manufacturing the four-passenger car would not be any higher than a comparable conventional vehicle now in production.

He said the car could go into mass production by the early 1970s if the federal or state government provided \$5 million more for further testing. Finding a manufacturer willing to build the car is another factor, Tofany said. The design calls for a 4,000-pound car with a V-8 engine.

The Fairchild Hiller Corp., an aerospace firm, developed the design under a \$385,000 contract with the state.

NEW YORK (AP) — It was a typical American family reunion except that two of the brothers were governors, one president of a bank and all of them named Rockefeller.

John, Nelson, Laurence, Winthrop and David Rockefeller gathered Tuesday night for the annual awards dinner of the National Institute of Social Sciences.

Each of the sons of the late John D. Rockefeller Jr. and the Rockefeller family as a whole was presented a gold medal for "distinguished service to humanity."

"I'm glad you require that the recipients of your awards be present in person," said John D. Rockefeller 3d, the eldest at 61. "It gives me a good opportunity to see my brothers."

He noted that family planning and population problems had been his chief concern for many years. "But tonight's occasion makes me wonder," he said, "if my parents had been exposed to today's ideas of family planning, my brothers Win and David might not have made it."

He also described himself as "the only one of the five who is unemployed."

Nelson, 59, is governor of New York; Laurence, 57, is a conservationist and also president of the Rockefeller Brothers Fund; Winthrop, 55, is governor of Arkansas; and David, 52, is president of the Chase Manhattan Bank.

NFO Chief Sees Winter Of Activity

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The President of the National Farmers Organization said Tuesday night the NFO plans "a winter of activity," kicked off by the organization's national convention Dec. 6 and 7 in Louisville, Ky.

"We intend to give farmers the opportunity to wage the economic battle that we feel is necessary to preserve the family-type farm," declared Oren Lee Stanley of Rea, Mo., 12-year head of the organization now counting members in 30 states.

"This means giving them the opportunity to have an all-commodity action — no price regulation — and decide whether they want to continue low prices or put a price tag on their products."

The alternative, he said, is a takeover of farms by corporation farmers.

Interviewed by a panel of newsmen on a "Face Nebraska" television program originated by KOLN-TV in Lincoln, Stanley said the farm income picture is "far more serious than most people realize."

In the next 12 to 24 months, "disaster is really facing the American Farmers," and the only answer to disastrously low farm prices is the collective bargaining espoused by the NFO, he said.

The past 60 days have seen the largest membership gain in the NFO's history, he added. But total membership remains a secret because the NFO is dealing with some of the largest companies in the nation "and they have a communications system that's like lightning."

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Smylie Hits Criticism Of War Policy

BOISE (AP) — Strident criticism of administration policy in Vietnam was described Tuesday as "a shabby, shocking, ugly thing" by former Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

At a public appearance—rare since his ouster from office a year ago—Smylie, lasted-at-fon-Frank Church, D-Idaho, for his opposition to the war.

"No one really disagrees with the agreement to disagree," which is the foundation of our democratic society," Smylie said in a talk to a service club.

"But the kind of strident adjectives that have begun to dominate senatorial comment in these last weeks does not qualify as the pursuit of honest disagreement."

The former three-term governor recalled a recent speech in which Church warned that excessive executive power in foreign affairs might make a "Caesar" of the president.

"All of this heaping of scorn and embarrassment on the principal foreign policy officers of the United States has come about because this so-called 'Caesar' together with 75 per cent of Congress, is unwilling to give up Vietnam in pursuit of some rather indefensible pseudo-intellectual objectives," Smylie said.

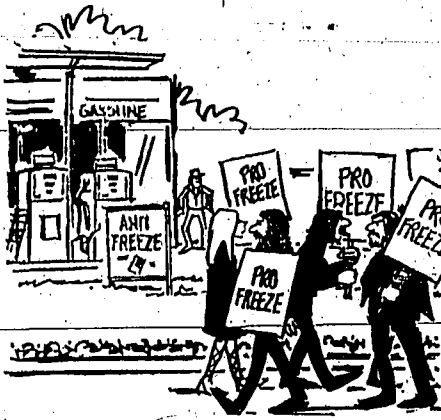
Advocate Of LSD Leaving Public Life

Leary, living in Laguna Beach with his wife of two weeks, condemned the use of drugs for "selfish kicks." He said he is giving up his work with the League for Spiritual Discovery, a group he founded.
"LSD, when used properly, is a sacrament aimed to produce love-of God and man," Leary told the Laguna News-Post. "If it is used for selfish kicks it is harmful."
Leary said he and the former Rosemary Woodruff, 33, a former actress and model who worked as his administrative assistant, were married Nov. 11.
He said they were married in a sunrise ceremony at the top of a mountain in the desert near Joshua Tree, Calif. They will live in Laguna Beach for the winter, he said.
Leary, a psychologist, left Harvard University in 1963 following criticism of his advocacy of using the psychedelic drug LSD.

Hair Piece Can Be Crowning
Glory For New Coiffures

The greatest beauty coup of our age may be that hair pieces have become fashionable.

Husbands don't seem to mind a bit. The fashion is a boon to bald and balding women who suffer untold embarrassment. It makes ladies out of hoydens, and older women can take years off their appearance wearing one of these crowning glories.

You can become unsophisticated or a femme fatale in an instant with hairpieces. New ideas observed in a catalog (Joseph Marshall's) include sleep-wigs, designed to be draped over a pillow and a Lady Godiva fall that is 42 inches long.

The only thing necessary is to develop the knack of putting the hairpieces on your head. But somehow, no matter how you attach one, it can't look messier than the way your own hair often looks. Few people suspect for that reason. And there are 76 colors that will blend in with your own hair if you must absolutely be deceptive.

Fashion models who wear hairpieces all the time can put them on in a jiffy. Model Heather Hewitt attached one of the long falls in a few minutes. First, she made a large pin curl of her own on top of her head. Leaving her front hair free, she attached the fall to the pin curl and then took the front section of her own hair and put a rubber band around the ends, just as she would for a pony-tail. She pulled it back over the fall and then wound the fall around the rubber band, pinning it carefully down.

The hair fall may be divided also at this point into two sections. Each section is braided and attached to the back of the head. The braids can be left loose or draped.

Another variation may be made by putting one big pin curl on top and on either side of the head of hair as well as at the front of the head where hair is made into one large pin curl. The fall is then pinned to the large pin curl on top. The front is then back-combed (hold end of hair and comb in opposite direction). The hair is then gently combed over the fringe, creating a natural looking front hair line. Side curls are removed and hair is tucked behind the ear.

Beban Beats Simpson And Keyes In Balloting For Football Heisman Trophy

NEW YORK (AP) — Gary Beban, UCLA's record-setting quarterback, Tuesday won the Heisman Trophy, annually awarded to the outstanding player in college football.

Beban polled 300 first-place ballots and 1,068 total points to beat out O. J. Simpson, Southern California's dynamic running back. Beban will receive the Heisman Trophy, the 33rd, on Dec. 7 at the Downtown A.C. Simpson finished with 251 first-place votes and 1,732 total points. Simpson, a junior, was the nation's leading rusher. Larry Keyes of Purdue, who led the nation in scoring, finished third with 278 first-place votes and 1,368 points.

"I have mixed emotions over winning," said Beban in a telephone interview. "I'm surprised at the choice because there were three fine candidates. Of course, I'm very grateful."

Beban, Simpson and Keyes dominated the balloting, with fourth place going to fullback Larry Csonka of Syracuse, who had 139 points.

Next came Kim Hammond of Florida State, followed by Bob Johnson of Tennessee, Granville Ligens of Oklahoma, Dewey Warren of Tennessee, Wayne Meylan of Nebraska, Terry Hanratty of Notre Dame, Dennis Homan of Alabama, Paul

Toscano of Wyoming, Ted Hendricks of Miami of Florida and Chris Gilbert of Texas. A total of 1,631 ballots were cast by a nationwide panel of sports writers, sportscasters and telecasters.

Major League Clubs Pick Up More Players

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Fourteen major league clubs picked off 23 minor league players in the annual draft grab bag Tuesday for a total of \$524,000.

The Chicago Cubs, New York Yankees and Houston Astros each took three. The New York Mets, Atlanta Braves and Minnesota Twins selected two each. Oakland, Cleveland, Los Angeles, Washington, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and Boston took one each. California, the Chicago White Sox, Detroit, Philadelphia, San Francisco and St. Louis passed.

Such faintly familiar names as veteran infielder Chuck Hillier, outfielder Sandy Valdespino, Andy Kosco and George Spriggs, catcher Bill Brayton, Ken Suarez and Jim Schaffor and pitcher Joe Moeller were among those plucked. Better known names such as Dick Ratz, Bo Belinsky, Ed Charles and Willie Kirkland were neglected.

Of the 23 minor leaguers selected, 20 went for the \$20,000 price tag. There were only three first-year men at the bargain \$8,000 rate, a testimonial to the ability of most organizations to cover up their price talent by advancing them to the big league club before the draft.

He earned the trophy this year with a spectacular season in which he gained 1,586 yards in total offense and accounted for 19 touchdowns passing and rushing. In three years, he has piloted UCLA to 23 victories, five losses and three ties. UCLA was 7-2-1 this season.

"It is inconceivable that anyone could be of more value to a team than Beban is to ours," said his coach, Tommy Prothro. "He can be a loser for 50 minutes but keep you poised for the big play that will make you a winner."

A scrambler, Beban relies on his ability to run almost as much as his passing. "I've always admired scrambling quarterbacks like Fran Tarkenton," he says. "I think they are the wave of the future in football."

Selected by the National Football Foundation as one of its scholar-Athletes, Beban is an outstanding student as well as a fine athlete. He is a B student, majoring in history.

All his teammates respect Beban's play calling ability. "He is our man in the clutch," said UCLA Athletic Director J. D. Morgan, "and to the players in the huddle, he is God."

"There's something about the way he manages things out there," says fullback Rick Purdy, "that gives everyone confidence. You just know whatever he calls is right." He finished his three-year varsity career with over 5,000 yards gained in total offense and established himself as the top career quarterback at UCLA which has produced Bob Waterfield among others before him.

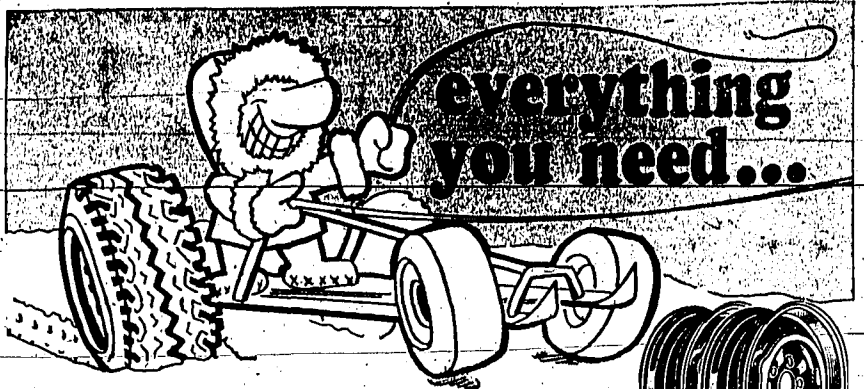

The announcement came as no surprise in Twin Falls as Jewell,

Idaho To Announce Coach's Resignation

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The resignation of University of Idaho head football coach Steve Musseau, reportedly tendered a week ago, is expected to become official here Wednesday, reliable sources said Tuesday. Neither Musseau nor university officials would comment on the resignation, but they declined to deny it. Confirmation of the resignation came from an unimpeachable source close to the situation. Dr. Ernest W. Hartung, university president, said unofficially Tuesday on the status of Musseau would be premature prior to Wednesday's scheduled meeting of the University's Athletic Board of Review.

Idaho Coach Job May Be Wide Open

Hartung said "an official announcement will be made after the meeting." He said the announcement could be expected about 11 a.m. Musseau, asked if he planned to return next year, said "Of course." But he would not deny the report that he had already submitted his resignation. Musseau just finished his third football season at Idaho with a 13-win, 17-loss over-all record, one of the best football records by any Idaho coach since the 1920s. The Vandale closed this season with a 4-8 record. Hartung also said the board Wednesday would have more to say about the university's overall athletic program. In a byline story in the Wednesday morning edition of the Spokane Spokesman-Review, Sports Editor Harry Missildine said "Ed Troxel will be named head football coach at the University of Idaho today, replacing Steve Musseau." Missildine gives no source for his story on Troxel. "In many quarters, it was felt," said Missildine, "that Troxel's move to Idaho last year prefigured an eventual change in the head coach. Troxel's reputation, salary and status in Boise was not consistent with a move

prior to leaving for the convention, reported to officials of the Magic Valley Cowboys Baseball Club, Inc., that signing of the working agreement was merely a formality. All points had been agreed upon in telephone conversations and letters. Jewell also had stated he would be trying to line up a sixth working agreement but had said then he doubted the league was prepared to go to six members. He said interested groups in Boise and Burley had been contacted on the matter of providing playing facilities and meeting financial and other requirements for membership. Neither had answered with all points covered prior to his leaving.

Playing with five teams will necessitate a slightly longer schedule with no scheduled off days, Jewell said. This will be offset by the three and four-day layoffs the bye team will have every three weeks. Representatives of the major league clubs saw some benefit to the three and four-day off periods, pointing out the loop is basically instructional and will allow managers to work on individual and team mistakes that develop during the games. Most Pioneer League managers in the past have stated more time would allow them to accomplish more in the way of individual instruction instead of having to worry about a game each night.

The Magic Valley franchise is returning to the Pioneer League for the third time since it was organized in 1939. It dropped out due to lack of attendance and financial trouble in 1950 and 1960 but returned in 1961 to win the national attendance banner and the Larry MacPhail trophy. President May Have To Mediate Dispute

BY ROBERT T. GRAY
WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson may be asked to mediate a continuing dispute between Secretary of State Dean Rusk and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee regarding information on the Vietnam war.

Some members of the panel are growing increasingly impatient over Rusk's rejection of invitations to appear before it and publicly answer questions on the administration's Vietnam policies.

Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., says he wants to take the controversy directly to the President for a decision.

His plan calls for having the committee authorize Chairman J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., to register a formal protest with Johnson over Rusk's refusal to appear at a public session.

Such a motion, prepared for introduction at a committee meeting today, could not be voted on until another session expected Thursday.

A Rusk agreement to appear publicly could head off a protest to the White House, Gore said. He commented in an interview after a Senate speech in

which he complained of Rusk's continuing refusal to agree to discuss Vietnam before the committee with the public and press on hand.

The secretary has said repeatedly a more candid and fruitful exchange of views can be had in private session.

But Gore posed a series of questions he said Rusk should be asked to answer in public. They covered goals and national security aspects of the Vietnam military effort.

"How can either the President or the Senate discharge their respective responsibilities to the American people without inclusive public examination of these policies and questions?" Gore asked the Senate.

Rusk last appeared before the committee in public on Vietnam in February 1966. Criticism of administration war policies has increased sharply within the Foreign Relations Committee since then.

The panel includes several outspoken opponents of Johnson on Vietnam.

In addition to Fulbright and Gore, they include Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., who is expected to announce Thursday he will challenge Johnson in presidential primaries on the Vietnam issue.

Gore made public in his Senate speech the extensive correspondence between Fulbright and Rusk over the past year on the possibility of an open session.

In one reply, Rusk told Fulbright: "It is not easy for the secretary of state to discuss particular situations in particular circumstances in public without risking considerable damage to our foreign relations."

Yorty Claims War Protests Pre-Planned

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mayor Samuel F. Yorty of Los Angeles and Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, contend agitators manipulated antiwar demonstrations in places where President Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk recently spoke.

Yorty told the House Committee on Un-American Activities Tuesday the demonstration in his city last June against Johnson was manipulated and planned in advance by groups seeking a confrontation with police.

Johnson was in Los Angeles then for a Democratic party affair.

Yorty said the demonstration outside Johnson's hotel was an outgrowth of a parade held to protest the President's Vietnam war policy.

Yorty said one parade sponsor was the Peace Action Council headed by a man identified by committee staff members as active in Communist Party activities in Southern California.

In a Senate speech, Lausche said a plot led to the demonstration at Indiana University which interfered with a recent speech given by Rusk.

Lausche said he's sure manipulators seeking to destroy the U.S. image are behind antiwar demonstrations on several campuses.

Egyptian Documents Will Be Turned Over To BYU

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A Book of Mormon, and Doctrine and Covenants.

Church official Tuesday said a recently discovered Egyptian document will be turned over to Brigham Young University for intensive study.

After that, said President N. Eldon Tanner, the papyrus, believed 3,000 to 4,000 years old, will be turned over to the historian's Office of the LDS Church for safe keeping in a vault.

Tanner, who is second counselor in the Mormon Church's First Presidency, returned to Salt Lake City Tuesday from New York, where he obtained the fragile artifacts from the Metropolitan-Museum of Art.

With them he had a letter considered to be Joseph Smith, founder of the Mormon Church. They are a portion of an original Smith collection, some of which was destroyed in the Chicago fire of 1871. Until recently it was believed that the items now in church possession also were destroyed.

Among the items brought to Utah by President Tanner is the ancient original of a facsimile drawing accompanying some of the Mormon Church's scripture, the "Book of Abraham." The "Book of Abraham" is part of "The Pearl of Great Price," one of four volumes of scripture accepted by Mormons. The others are the Bible, the Doctrine and Covenants, and the Pearl of Great Price.

Dr. Nibley on "The Pearl of Great Price" and religion at BYU, and is considered an authority on ancient Egypt.

President Tanner said one objective of the study will be to determine whether the Egyptian hieroglyphic and hieratic symbols contain any of the text of the "Book of Abraham."

Sen. Brooks Tells Republican Women Of Discontent In U.S.

State Sen. Mary Brooks, R-Carey, told members of the Twin Falls County Republican Women's organization Monday that there is an "air of deep discontent and disillusionment throughout the nation today."

Mrs. Brooks, who also is vice chairman of the National Republican Committee, was guest speaker at a luncheon at the Rogerson Hotel Roundup Room.

Mrs. Brooks said the disillusionment stems from several phases of the current administration—phases which will undoubtedly be major campaign issues in 1968.

She said that people are disillusioned with the increasing costs in dollars and lives in Vietnam, the limited contribution of the South Vietnamese and the conflicting reports of what is happening in Vietnam.

Another category of disillusionment is the loss of a "once-strong respect for law and order. Instead of firm action about all we get from the administration is brave words about a long-promised 'war on crime.'"

She also slammed the "ever increasing expenditures on the home front" and said that the combination of "increased non-defense spending and mounting defense costs has touched off the most serious wave of inflation the country has experienced since post World War II days.

Detroit Council OKs Ordinance

DETROIT (AP) — The Detroit Common Council passed an open housing ordinance by a 4-2 vote Tuesday. Scores of white citizens bitterly pledged to circulate repeal petitions.

Council President Edward Carey termed the ordinance prohibiting discrimination in housing sales and rentals as a "moderate approach to a major problem."

But spectators, who milled around after the brief council session, cried "Wallace for President," "Minority Rules," and "We'll get a referendum." Several refused to give their names to newsmen.

Support Asked

JAKARTA (AP) — Outnumbered Indonesian commandos, battling more than 500 Communist guerrillas in West Borneo for the third straight day, called for air support from Java after coming under intense mortar attacks, informed sources said today. The guerrillas appeared to have the upper hand.

Value Decline Of Pound Dramatizes Economists' Claim Of Dollar Weakness

NEW YORK (AP) — The decline in value of the British pound dramatizes what some economists regard as a weakness in the American dollar which, they contend, can be remedied only by a cut in government spending and an increase in taxes.

Britain devalued the pound from \$2.80 to \$2.40 on Nov. 18 as part of an effort to bring its world trade into balance. The country has been importing more than it exports for months and its money has been flowing steadily outward. Devaluation has the effect of lowering the price of British goods on the world market.

Imbalances accumulate each year, causing an outflow of gold. The United States has about \$13 billion in gold available to pay foreign dollar claims but there are about twice as many foreign and domestic claims as there is gold to redeem them.

"The big message coming from devaluation is that we now have with us in a more meaningful way than ever the question of confidence in the dollar," said Dr. James J. O'Leary, board chairman and chief economist of Lionel D. Edie & Co., Inc., economic consultants.

The British action shows that the United States must give foremost priority to curbing its own balance of payments deficit, said Survey magazine of the Morgan Guaranty Trust Co. of New York.

The United States has maintained for years a favorable trade balance. Exports this year are running at the rate of about \$31 billion and imports at about \$28 billion to \$27 billion.

"In a sense," said O'Leary, "the devaluation of the pound is a product of devaluation in confidence around the world in the dollar. If we had the pro-tractor of this year—it was minus \$544 million.

The U.S. balance of payments last year was minus \$1,357 billion compared with minus \$1,335 billion in 1965 and minus \$3.8 billion in 1964. In the first quarter of this year—it was minus \$544 million.

The balance of payments deficit stems from government expenditures—those for the Vietnam war are the largest—which take millions of dollars out of the country each year, as do American tourists and private capital investments abroad.

"No country can permanently escape—the consequences of chronic deficit in its international transactions," said Survey magazine. "And what is implied immediately is any and to the slow-paced, almost casual consideration of national spending and taxing policies."

Hope that British devaluation would prod Congress to pass the Johnson administration's proposal for a 10 per cent surcharge on individual and corporate income taxes, and lead to a cut in government spending, was expressed by several economists.

"We need the tax to pay for the Vietnam war," said one, who asked that his name not be used. "We can't tolerate a deficit of over \$20 billion and still maintain financial respectability in world markets."

LEAD CAUSES UNLUCKY SCORE

The unlucky expert looked so dejected that we made the mistake of letting him inflict his latest tale of woe on us. We will never learn to dodge him. Here is the lament: "In last

to my hand by ruffing another spade... back to dummy with a second club ruff. One more spade ruff and I draw trumps and made the rest of the tricks because dummy's spades were set up. If I hadn't finessed the trump to get the extra entry to dummy, the ruff would have fallen on me.

We didn't quite understand that trump finesse. Maybe he was just practicing his finesses to see if they were going to work. All he had to do to make the hand would have been to win the trump in his own hand; play his ace of clubs and ruff a club, ruff back to his hand with a spade, ruff another club, ruff another spade; draw trumps and discard his last club on a high heart. We asked about this and why he claimed to be unlucky.

He replied: "I never thought of that play, but I still wound up with a bad score. At every other table a club was opened and each other declarer managed to ruff three clubs and wind up with an overtrick by discarding his singleton spade on a heart."

Nixon Acknowledges Problems

Richard M. Nixon says he decides to avoid primaries if he declines to seek the Republican presidential nomination but acknowledges he could not be assured of overcoming a "Nixon is a loser" tag.

The former GOP vice president said Monday that while he'd prefer to skip presidential primaries and save himself for the November race, "the primaries provide the only arena where you can test your strength with the voters."

"And I welcome that test,"

said the man who lost the presidency to John F. Kennedy in 1960 by only an eyelash, then suffered a second setback two years later when he ran for governor of California.

Nixon, expected to announce his candidacy in January, also said the GOP should make clear it supports President Johnson's Vietnam policies—a position diametrically opposite that of Johnson's fellow Democrat, Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota.

McCarthy, an outspoken Vietnam policy critic, is expected to announce Thursday he'll oppose Johnson for the Democratic nod. The early announcement is viewed as an effort by McCarthy to bring under a single banner—his—the now-splintered opposition to the President's war policies.

Meanwhile the Louis Harris poll reported finding that Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., whose views on Vietnam appear closer to McCarthy's than Johnson's, now leads Johnson by 52-32 percent margin among voters asked who they'd prefer to see as the 1968 Democratic nominee.

The Harris sampling compared with a Kennedy lead of

42-41 per cent in September of 1966 and 48-39 per cent just a month ago.

The poll, copyrighted by the Washington Post, found more than half those interviewed felt Kennedy had many of the same "outstanding qualities" as his brother, the late President Kennedy.

In other developments:

- Washington sources foresaw political implications in the impending resignation of Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara to head the World Bank. They said some were sure to read into the resignation evidence that Johnson planned an all-out air attack on North Vietnam.
- Carlisle, which McNamara has opposed—designed to end the war before next year's elections.
- Charles F. Frankel resigned as assistant secretary of state amid reports his action was in protest of Johnson's Vietnam policies. Frankel declined to detail his reasons, saying: "It would not serve a good purpose to discuss them."
- Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said he'd support Johnson for re-nomination only if the war were being de-escalated by the time of next year's Democratic national convention.

Stewardess Files Suit Over Charge

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A 28-year-old former stewardess Tuesday filed a \$6-million suit against a private detective agency and two of its agents, claiming she was a victim of a "master plan" to seduce out senior stewardesses in favor of fresh, young faces.

Carmeline Greene, an attractive brunette who has been flying for National Airlines for eight years, said two agents of the Wackenhut Corp. reported drunk that she drank during a flight from Los Angeles to Miami and that she spent an excessive amount of time in the cockpit.

Miss Greene, who was fired July 17, six days after the flight, said in her suit that the charges were untrue and that the agents, Julius Dalich and Dan Sifford, "falsely, wrongly and maliciously" wrote a report that they "knew at the time was false."

The Circuit Court suit said her firing was "part of a master plan and strategy of the Wackenhut Corp. to seduce out each and all of the senior stewardesses could be similarly discharged."

Officials at the Wackenhut Corp. said they had not yet seen the suit and would reserve comment until their lawyers looked at the charges.

National Airlines said it "would not dignify the report with a comment" when told about the "master plan" to ditch the older and better-paid girls.

However, a spokesman for the firm said Wackenhut agents had been employed for security reasons for 10 or 11 years. He added that security, "in a broad sense, extended to riding on the planes and checking the welfare of the passengers."

Miss Greene's attorney, J. B. Spence, said he has sworn statements from other crew members on the DCs that the charges are false. The other crew members said Miss Greene was in the cockpit only for a few minutes on business and swore she was not drunk nor drinking on the flight, Spence said.

It appears to be a plan by NAL to get rid of its senior stewardesses and hire fresh young faces and save money," said Spence.

Spence described the suit as a test case and said he knows of six or seven other senior stewardesses who recently were fired.

Gas-Electric Minicar Has Been Built

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal officials announced Tuesday the development of a gas-line-electric minicar concept they said is a breakthrough in the battle against city congestion and air pollution.

The car, as developed by the University of Pennsylvania with the help of General Motors Corp., would be about half the length of average-sized American cars. It would seat three adults and have a top speed of 60 m.p.h.

The car could be built with existing technology and be in wide use in about five years, officials said.

With its battery-driven electric motor working in combination with a small gasoline engine, the little car would have about the acceleration of a Volkswagen sedan, officials said. And they estimated the cost would be about that of a Volkswagen—around \$1,600.

The minicar would be about the same width as a conventional-sized car.

Air pollution from the car would be about one-tenth that of present cars, officials said. Automobiles now produce about 60 per cent of the air pollutant.

Secretary Robert C. Weaver of the Department of Housing and Urban Development said at a news conference that the little car would greatly reduce city parking problems.

The department sponsored the research project with a \$300,000 grant.

The minicar would have a battery-charged by the gasoline engine during use.

Senate Votes To Retain Provision

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted by a narrow margin Tuesday to retain in a pay bill for federal workers a provision critics said would give a pension windfall to a federal judge who is a longtime personal friend of President Johnson.

It rejected 30 to 38 a motion to strike from the bill a section under which Judge Paul J. Kilday of the U.S. Court of Military Appeals, a former Texas congressman, would receive an additional \$8,400 a year pension, or a total of \$20,400 a year.

A total of 38 Democrats and 3 Republicans voted against the motion. It was supported by 29 Republicans and 7 Democrats.

While the section did not mention the 68-year-old Kilday by name, his backers said he is the only official who stands to benefit at present.

His term expires in 1976. Final action on the over-all

measure is scheduled Wednesday.

Kilday was a congressman from Texas for 24 years before the late President John F. Kennedy named him in 1961 to the military court, a part of the executive branch.

Under present law, his maximum retirement pay would be based on his salary while a congressman, rather than the higher salary he has received as a judge.

His present salary is \$33,000 a year. Congressional salaries in 1961 were \$22,500 a year and are now \$30,000.
