### Autographing Party Held At Burley For New Author

BURLEY — William R. Filler, author of "Where There's Smoke," Wednesday autographed copies of his new book just off the press at Sa'le's Gift Cellar, 239 W. 13th St., Burley. The autographing party was hosted by Mrs. Mez McMurray and refreshments were served.

Mr. Filler and his wife, Vera, reside at 204 W. 25th St., Burley, and they moved here from Reno.

"Where There's Smoke" is a novel about the men who fight man's relentless enemy, fire, in our western forests.

Born and reared in a small Pennsylvania farming community, Mr. Filler chose to gain knowledge through travel rather than in high school. A non-too-successful three-year Navy career was followed by working eight years on the Southern Pacific Railroad engine service.

He spent two years in CCC Camps and U.S. Forest Service, and several more years in industrial and highway construction.

His service career was renewed in a Nevada National Guard unit. He was commissioned from the ranks in 1943, to serve in Europe, occupied Japan and spent 13 months in Korea.

Loss of useful vision forced his retirement as a major in 1960. In 1963 he began writing his novel in longhand and being unable to see his work, he became discouraged. In February, 1964, he entered a school for the blind and was taught to type.

In August, 1965, Mr. Filler again returned to his writing of his novel, now able to type his story. The manuscript was at last completed and mailed to Carlton Press, New York, in March, 1966.

The background for the story was from information and experience Mr. Filler gained during his years he worked in the CCC Camps and the U.S. Forest Service.

The story is a convincing plea for an awareness of the beauty and value of the great trees of our timberlands.

The story concerns an ex-Army lieutenant, Gordon Baird, and moves from the courtroom setting which is the scene of his conviction, to the high Sierras.

### Royalists Cut Off Capital Of Yemen

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Royalist reports from Yemen today said the Royalists had cut off the capital city of San'a to prevent Russian military equipment from arriving for the besieged Republican government. Royalist sources in Beirut in contact with their leaders at home said the road from the Red Sea port of Hodeida to San'a was cut after the Royalist command "learned that Soviet armored forces were going to land at Hodeida."

They said San'a was cut off from all sides and the Royalists were attempting to damage the airport to prevent Russian supplies from arriving by plane. Egyptian troops have been the chief bulwark of the Yemeni Republicans, but the last of these are scheduled to leave Hodeida Friday. Egypt's Middle East News Agency reported Wednesday from San'a that the Republican government had begun issuing arms to people of the city "to protect the gains of the revolution."

No confirmation was available for any of the reports.

Officers were also asked by Holiday Inn officials to investigate two individuals who left sometime Tuesday night without paying a \$45 bill for lodging and meals.

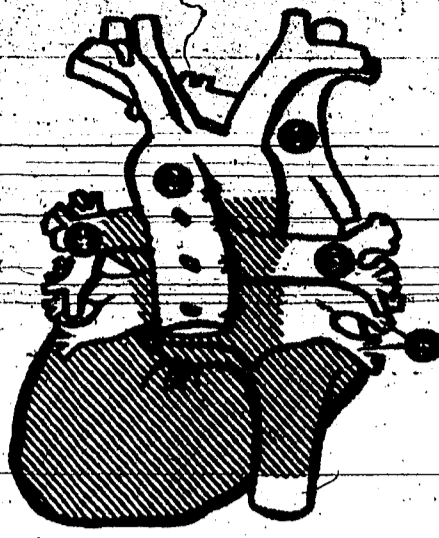
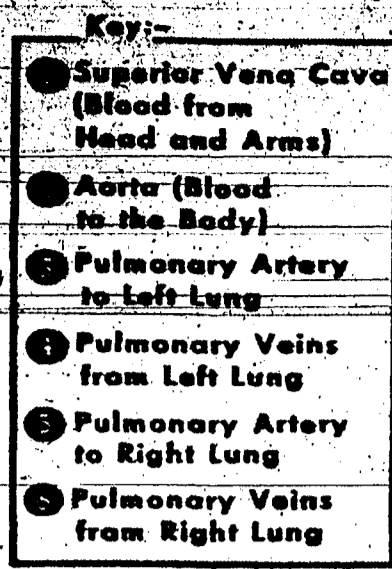
## Defeats Two

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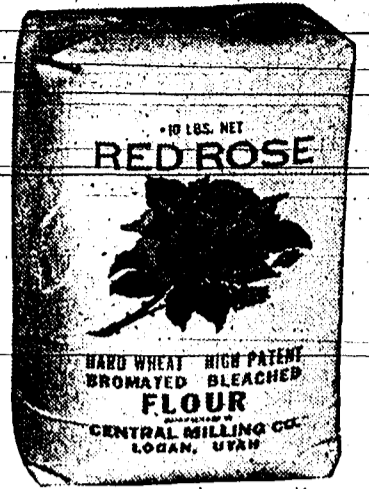

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# Director Of Police Is Freed

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Arkansas State Police Director Lynn A. Davis got out of jail Wednesday and tightened the secrecy surrounding the alleged plot to assassinate Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller.

The Arkansas Supreme Court voted 6-1 to free Davis, who was jailed Tuesday after being held in contempt of court for refusing to answer questions concerning the source of information that led to gambling raids here Sept. 9.

The high court agreed to release him without bond, pending a review of the proceedings when Davis appeared before Circuit Judge William J. Kirby. Davis had refused to tell Kirby and the Pulaski County grand jury the name of a confidential informant, contending that it would "jeopardize his informant's life or property." The grand jury is investigating gambling.

The Supreme Court's ruling was a surprise, furnished by Rockefeller 10 days in which to file a brief explaining why the contempt citation should be quashed.

Shortly after his release, Davis was questioned about the purported plot against Rockefeller. He answered each query with a firm, "No comment."

Rockefeller confirmed at a news conference later in the day that he was aware of the alleged assassination plot and appeared ready to tell newsmen some details. He refrained after an aide cautioned him that Davis had declined comment.

Rockefeller had just been asked whether the purported plot had sprung from a recent crackdown on gambling.

# Lynda Bird, Fiance Find No Privacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The President's daughter and her Marine fiance lost a major skirmish in their battle for some privacy—their newly rented house has been discovered in a quiet Arlington, Va., neighborhood.

The Wednesday disclosure, three days before their wedding, was sure to disappoint Lynda Bird Johnson and Capt. Charles S. Robb.

Robb earlier told reporters he and his bride-to-be had rented a furnished house in the "Washington metropolitan area." But Robb said he preferred not to discuss it any further "just so that we do have some privacy."

"I think you will understand," added the 28-year-old Marine.

But it didn't take long for their secret to leak out, especially when neighbors spotted some unusual telephone installation going on at 3556 Valley St.

The house, located in a cul de sac development—one of a cluster of 15 homes, reportedly in about the \$50,000 range—is an L-shaped, ranch-style dwelling.

The couple had planned to live there for a brief time until Robb reports March 29 to Camp Pendleton, Calif., on his way to a year's duty in Vietnam.

The First Family was saddened by the death Wednesday night of pastry chef Clement Maggia, 74, who had been in the process of completing a 6-foot tall, 250-pound wedding cake.

Maggia died of a heart attack after dining with his wife and relatives at a Washington hotel. The executive chef and instructor at the Greenbrier resort hotel in White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., had baked the cake there and come to the White House Monday to put the five layers together and apply the elaborate white fondant icing.

Earlier Robb paid his \$2 for a marriage license at the District of Columbia marriage license bureau. He went alone but was quickly surrounded by photographers. Robb apologized to the clerk for the resulting commotion.

He and Lynda were supposed to have a free night Wednesday from the round of partying in their honor. They were out somewhere together when the news came of the chef's death and the secret of their house got out.

# Senate Sponsors Of Education Bill Apparently Have White House Backing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate sponsors of the \$14.2 billion aid to education bill have apparent White House backing in efforts to overcome Southern objections to federal school desegregation enforcement procedures.

The new peace-making effort, designed to avoid long debate as Congress heads toward final adjournment, contrasted with bitter words exchanged during Wednesday's session.

At one point, the usually mild-mannered Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield told one senator he was "off his rocker."

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., manager of the bill, said an amendment will be offered to provide some assurances sought by Dixie senators.

Morse said the proposal will involve a fixed date, perhaps Aug. 1, by which the Department of Health, Education and Welfare must announce annually whether a school district will receive federal aid. If a cutoff or denial notice were not issued by then, the district would receive the money throughout the school year starting in September.

HEW uses this financial weapon to push for desegregation. This amendment would substitute for one sponsored by Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., and strongly supported by other Southerners who had made clear its adoption was their price for not blocking passage of the full bill this year.

Russell's proposal would bar HEW from holding up or denying aid applications to any dis-

trict once the school year has started.

Morse said Russell's plan thus would mean a district could drag its feet until the school year had begun and then do anything it pleased about integration for a year.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., fighting for Russell's amendment, angrily declared orders had come from the White House and HEW to kill all weakening civil rights amendments.

Mansfield and Morse denied this. But Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, said he could believe Stennis' charge. He said an amendment he had sponsored, which would have cut the total authorization in the bill by \$2.4 billion, was "blitzed by orders which came down from the

White House."

**FORMS DELAYED**  
BOISE (AP) — Federal income forms for 1967 will be distributed later than usual, the internal revenue service said Wednesday.

John C. Anduiza, information officer, said the forms will be mailed to taxpayers about the first of the year.

He said printing of the forms has been delayed pending consideration of proposed new tax legislation in Congress.

**CONSOLIDATION URGED**  
BOISE (AP) — Idaho has about 964 separate local governmental units and money could be saved by consolidating many of them, the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho heard Wednesday.

State Rep. William J. Murphy, D-Wallace, is chairman of the Idaho Legislative Council's Committee on Local Government, which is currently studying consolidation of smaller government units.

**TRAINING BEGINS**  
COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP) — Training for Idaho law enforcement officers in techniques of riot control began this week with a two-day class for 30 officers here which ended Wednesday.

It was the first of six sessions to be held across the state to train the men "to the point where they can be moved anywhere in the state and work as well-trained units," according to Don Morrissey, of Department of Law Enforcement.

# Church Urges Donations Asked By LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, urged Wednesday that Congress set U. S. contributions to international organizations at the full \$141 million asked by President Johnson.

He submitted an amendment to the foreign-aid appropriation bill to carry out his recommendation.

The Senate has recommended \$130 million and the House \$125 million.

The Senate is not expected to act before next week on the aid bill.

Church said the proposed cuts would affect the United Nations Development Program, "which was our idea in the first place," the Indus Basin Development Fund and the refugee program in the Middle East.

**WITNESSES TESTIFY**  
MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP) — State witnesses testified Wednesday in the first degree murder trial of Thomas C. Linn, 50, Mountain Home.

Linn is accused of the fatal shooting June 25 of Pelesforo D. Garcia, 18, Caldwell, Idaho, in a Mountain Home bar.

**PRESENTATION OVER**  
BOISE (AP) — The prosecution completed its presentation Wednesday in the first degree murder trial of Edward J. Quinlivan.

Quinlivan is accused of causing the July 9 death of his wife, Blanche. She died of burns suffered in the June 16 fire at the couple's home in Boise.

State witnesses testified they heard Mrs. Quinlivan, after being taken from the burning home, say her husband doused her and the house with gasoline before starting the blaze.

**"SHORT" KILLED BOY**  
KELLOGG, Idaho (AP) — An apparent "intermittent short" circuit was named Wednesday as the cause of the death this week of a 17-year-old Kellogg High School basketball player in a whirlpool bath.

Thomas Brainard was electrocuted Monday.

Electrical engineer Dan Murphy of Spokane inspected the whirlpool machine and reported to Shoshone County Prosecutor Richard Magnuson.

Magnuson said there was an intermittent short in the plug and cord that fed power to the machine and that it appears the boy touched a water faucet and completed the circuit to the ground.

# Last-Minute Disputes May Threaten Adjournment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Only the possibility of last-minute disputes over antipollution and foreign-aid bills appears threatening plans to adjourn Congress by the end of next week.

A controversial meat inspection measure cleared both houses Wednesday and leaders expect action before adjournment on such major bills as Social Security benefit increases, hikes in postal rates and federal pay, and perhaps elementary and secondary education.

Left behind until next year in the drive for adjournment will be such bills as interest disclosure, higher education, crime prevention, civil rights and President Johnson's proposed 10 percent income tax surcharge. In a move related to the tax proposal, Senate-House conferees finally agreed late Wednesday on a proposal aimed at cutting planned federal spending by some \$4.1 billion this year. The spending cut is attached to a "normally" routine measure to keep agencies going which have not received their annual appropriations.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House will create a "think factory" to find solutions to the nation's future urban problems through a concentration of intellectual and scientific brain power.

The nonprofit corporation, to be called the Institute for Urban Development, will be launched with the help of a recent \$10 million grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Renewal. Its future income will come from contracts with federal, local and state agencies.

## Boise Cascade Leads Urban Blight Attack

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Boise Cascade Corp., which last year turned trees into \$415 million in sales, is leading an attack on urban blight.

The company's officers, who expect this year's sales to exceed \$700 million, eye the venture with the same dollar sign sense that has guided Boise Cascade since it began expanding from a lumber company with sales of \$35 million in 1956.

Since 1956, the company has added pulp and paper (now 60 percent of sales), office supplies, pre-fabricated homes and trailers and suburban development to its original logging, timber and building supplies line.

## U.S. Heart Transplant Not Connected With First Try

NEW YORK (AP) — Four grim men pushed their way into the small, crowded auditorium in the basement of Maimonides Hospital in Brooklyn. They had been up all night.

"I think, first of all, I'm sorry to have to report to you that we have bad news, not good news," the speaker, Dr. Adrian Kantrowitz, 49, disclosed Wednesday that his 22-man medical team had failed in the second attempt in four days to transplant a human heart. The transplant of the healthy heart of a dead two-day old boy into the breast of a 2 1/2-week-old boy was completed but the child died 6 1/2 hours later.

**Guatemala Has Swift, Muffled Violence**

**GUATEMALA (AP)**—Starting home one evening, a prosperous businessman was about to get in his car when four men wearing national police uniforms stopped him.  
 Thus Carlos Herrera Dorion, 65, was kidnaped almost in the heart of the city. He was fortunate. Police rescued him four days later without payment of the \$150,000 asked.  
 The day after that case was solved, another prominent industrialist, Jaime Oswaldo Re-

ynos, was machine-gunned to death while driving to his plant outside the city. A specially assigned police bodyguard, riding at his side, was gravely wounded.  
 In the same week, Guatemala newspapers reported two other kidnappings and three murders.  
 These are recent examples of swift, muffled violence going on behind the modernistic glow and bustle of this mountaintop capital in Central America. It's the product of a deadly urban war that has claimed over 1,000 lives

—perhaps as many as 4,000—in 16 months.  
 The conflict is a threat to badly needed stability in a country that has known only thin stretches of peace since U.S. intervention prevented a leftist takeover in 1954.  
 Behind the violence are four recognizable elements: extremists from the left and right, organized hoodlums and a clandestine police-military operation combatting all of them.  
 A Castroite guerrilla threat to the government of Julio Cesar

Mendez Montenegro seems to be liquidated. But die-hards have moved into the urban centers in an effort to acquire new financing for their operations through kidnappings and holdups.  
 At the same time right-wing extremists, originally mobilized under the name of Mano Blanca (White Hand) to fight the leftist guerrillas, would like to topple the military-backed Mendez regime. They feel its increased taxation and reforms threaten traditional privileges. Some high-ranking officers are known

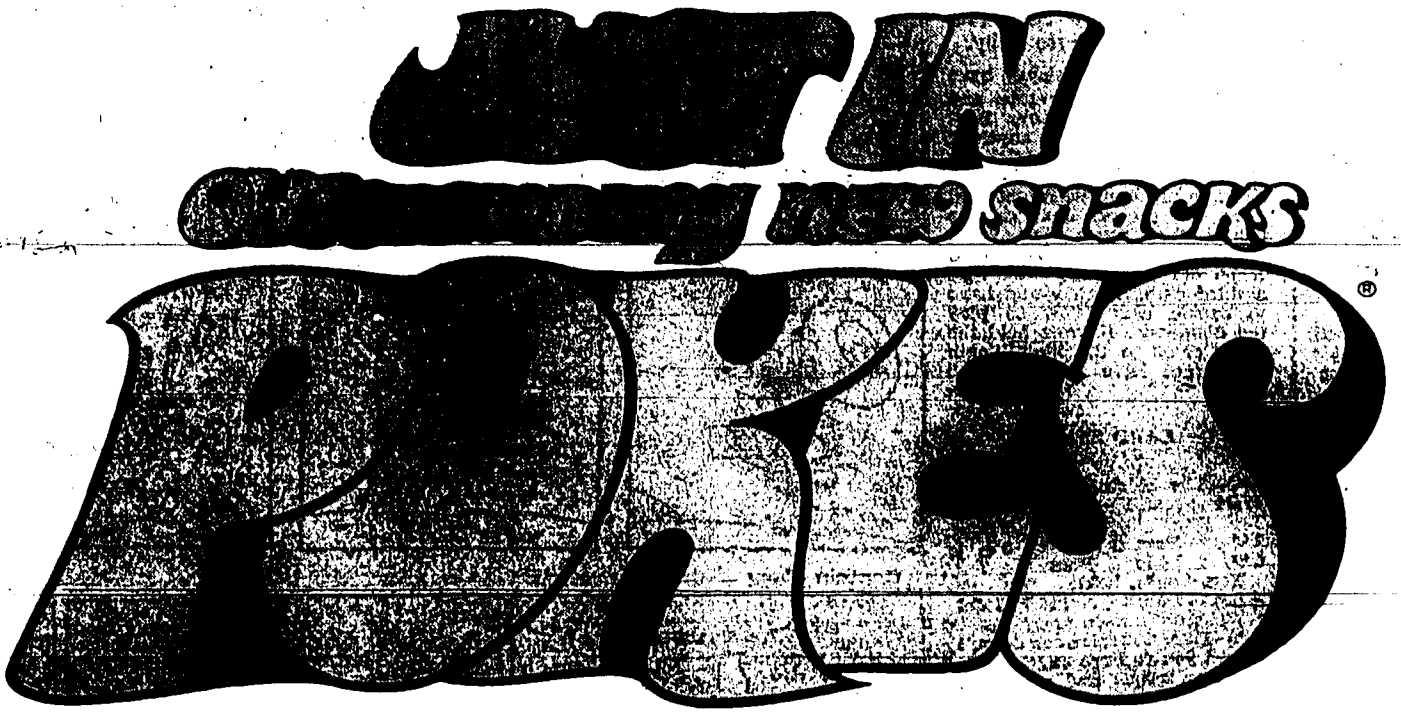
to be sympathetic to the rightists, whose strategy of urban violence is aimed at frightening investors and weakening the national economy.  
 There are increasing signs, authorities say, that organized outlaw bands, posing either as far rightists or leftists, have moved into the fight purely for profit.  
 Men in key positions for political evaluation say that despite the upsurge in violence during November, the urban conflict is in its final stages. Internal secu-

rity, thoroughly reorganized with some U.S. aid, is being beefed up with a \$10.3-million budget in 1968. Armed forces funds have been trimmed from \$14.6 million in 1967 to \$14.1 million in next year's \$200-million national budget.  
 These sources believe President Mendez Montenegro has solidified his position. They expect him to become the first democratically elected president to finish out his term of office since Juan Jose Arevalo in 1951.  
 Guatemala needs sharp reforms. Of its 4½ million people, 40 per cent live totally outside the national economy.

**Flower Power Parents Unite, Seeking Way To Bring Children Back Home**

By JEAN HELLER  
WASHINGTON (AP) — "I hear other parents talk about how their kids are in college or are doctors and teachers and what can I say? My son's a dirty, rotten social dropout."

It takes courage for a mother to get up in front of people she hardly knows and say a thing like that. But here, every Tuesday night, it happens.

The mother and those who gathered to hear her were parents of hippies. They were drawn together by the mutual hope of mutual help in searching for some way to get their runaway children to come home.

Episcopal church located just one block from Dupont Circle, Washington's hippie area.

At first, the group meetings were tense, a little like the opening of a new chapter of Alcoholics Anonymous, as one parent put it.

"When parents first come, they're belligerently defensive," a father said. "They think only their children need help. They find it very difficult to sit in front of other people and admit that they may have failed their children as much as they think their children failed them."

"The road back from this problem isn't a one-lane road. The parents and the children have to travel it together."

Some parents think they have found the road back and are anxious to tell other NSPFC members about it.

"After hunting for a year I found my son and to my surprise he agreed to submit to a (mental) examination, not so much out of willingness to return to the fold but more out of interest in what the doctors would do to him," one father said at a recent meeting.

He volunteered to give the group full details on the examination and its results as soon as he could.

"If it helps my son maybe it can help some of you," he said. "I have hope."

"He doesn't wear the way-out clothes. The hair and the beard, yes. He has withdrawn from everything material, devoted himself to a life of meditation, living on brown rice and tea, yes. But he lives in a relatively clean place. Kooky but clean. He smokes a little pot, a little opium. He paints when he feels like it."

"But when I found him a year ago he was living in filth and

such a crowded condition that you couldn't get inside the door without retching. So he hasn't gone down. If anything, he's come up a little bit."

The mother whose son left four years ago said: "I hear about the others who are making progress and I feel good for them. I really do. But after four years—I can't help thinking, oh dear God, it must be my turn!"

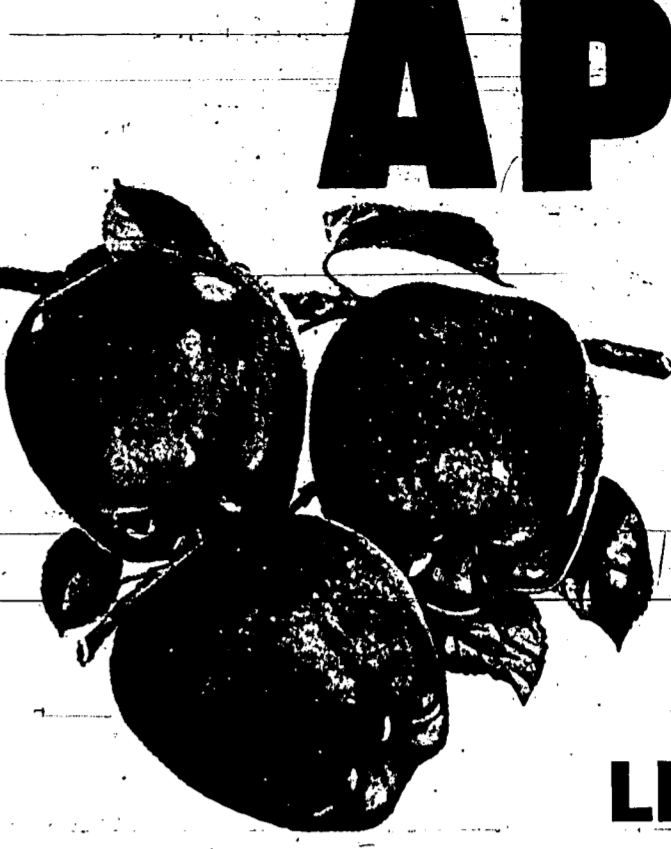

# Christmas in Vietnam.

Only 4 more shipping days. By air.

Your gift for that very special serviceman can make Christmas Day a lot brighter, even in Vietnam. But it has to travel almost halfway around the world.

To be sure it reaches him in good condition and in good time for Christmas... just follow these important steps.

1. The deadline for mailing by surface transportation, November 11th, is already past. *To be sure your package arrives on time, send it air mail—and mail it by December 11th at the latest.*

(The Post Office Department and the Department of Defense have been assured that all *air mail* packages received by then will be delivered to Vietnam by Christmas.)

2. Make sure the name and address is complete and clearly legible, placed lengthwise on the lower right hand side of your

package, leaving room for the necessary postmark, notations, etc. Be sure to include the important 5-digit A.P.O. or F.P.O. number in the address to avoid serious delays.

3. It may be necessary to mark the package, "Gift—export license not required." Ask your post office.

4. Make sure the postage is fully prepaid. Your post office can help you determine the amount.

5. If you are using Christmas seals, or other labels in aid of charitable projects, put them on the back, not on the address side of your package. The Post Office issues a special Christmas stamp which is legal postage and should therefore be above the address.

6. Mail the package at the proper window in your post office, not at a letter box.

7. The post office can also tell you what weight limit applies. (It varies by A.P.O. and F.P.O. number.)

8. Be very sure the package itself is secure and substantial. Take into account the contents, the climatic conditions, and the handling within Vietnam. Paper alone or ordinary pasteboard boxes are inadequate. Canvas or similar materials, double-faced corrugated cardboard boxes, solid fiber boxes or wooden containers are recommended. Contents should not shake or rattle.

If you have any further questions, your post office can answer them for you. But by following these key suggestions, your serviceman should have your gift package intact and in time for Christmas. And that's the best way to tell him your heart is with him.
