Government Pay Hike Is Cleared By Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress, clearing its decks of most major money measures and aiming for weekend adjournment, has okayed spending billions of dollars for government pay raises and to fight poverty while endorsing a \$4.1 billion over-all spending cut.

Congressional action Tuesday included these developments:

—Both Senate and House passed and sent to President Johnson legislation for a \$5.4 billion, three-step pay raise affecting 5.5 million federal workers and servicemen. The legislation also includes a hike in postal rates, raising to 6 cents the cost of mailing a letter.

—The House passed and sent to the Senate a \$1.61 billion appropriation bill for the Office of Economic Opportunity, \$370 million less than Congress already

has authorized for the antipov-erty program.

—The Senate passed and sent to the President a bill requiring most federal agencies to cut most spending by 10 per cent—move designed to save \$4.1 billion.

—Today the House is to take up a Social Security bill that would boost all benefits by at least 13 per cent as well as hike Social Security taxes. The bill provides for minimum monthly benefit payments of \$55 compared with the current \$44.

—President Johnson is expected to sign the pay-raise bill for government employees and servicemen in time for them to get by Christmas retroactive, in-creases from last Oct. 1. Total cost of the raises by 1968, when all stages are in effect, is esti-mated at \$5.4 billion. It would

Pioneer 8 Weather Craft Beaming Strong Signals

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Beaming back strong signals to earth, a robot interplanetary weatherman named Pioneer 8 rocketed into orbit around the sun today to help warn astronauts of deadly solar radiation storms in space.

En route to the sun-circling path between that of earth and Mars, Pioneer 8's fiery delta booster rocket successfully kicked a radio-relay communications satellite into orbit around earth to be used for resting America's man-to-the-moon tracking network.

Perched aboard a fiery Delta rocket, the twin payload blasted off at 9:08 a.m. EST, to close out the 1967 launch schedule at Cape Kennedy.

The sleek Delta booster aimed to drill radiation-hunting Pioneer 8 into a sun-circling orbit between that of earth and Mars, while dropping off the communications craft en route as a satellite of earth.

If all experiments operate as planned during the next six months or more, drum-shaped Pioneer 8 could provide the best information yet on how great a danger the sun's radiation poses to astronauts. It also possibly could lead to a foolproof means of predicting when dangerous flares will explode on the sun so manned flights can be sched-uled around them.

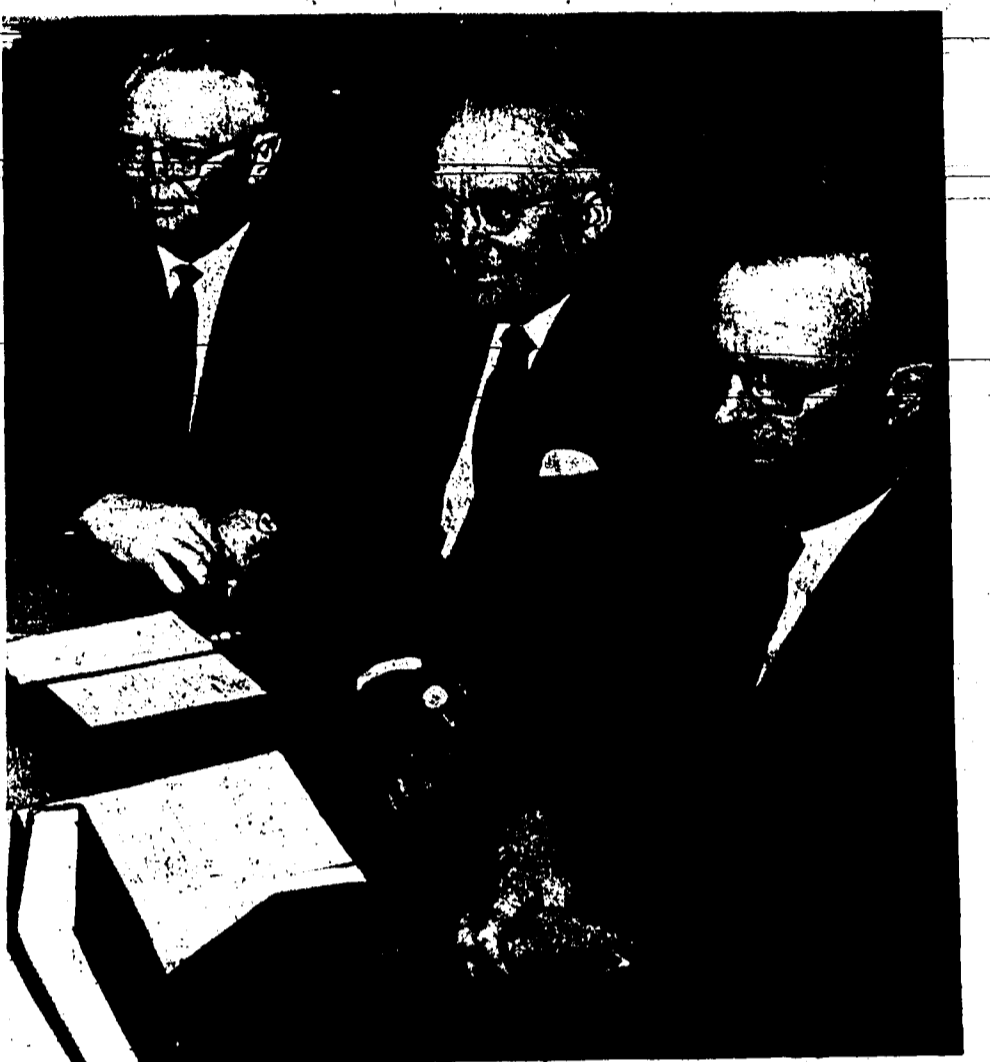
Meanwhile, the eight-sided communications payload—called TTS for test and training satellite—was to act as an orbital relay station to exercise America's Apollo man-in-space global tracking network. Scientists packed the TTS in the engine compartment of the three-stage Delta's second stage so it could spring free into Earth orbit while the upper stage propels Pioneer 8 into a sun-circling path.

TTS was designed to receive Earth-to-space signals on the same radio frequency used in Apollo manned flights, while re-turning signals to ground track- ing stations on frequencies which will be used to report spacecraft and astronaut status during an actual mission.

Pioneer 8 was to team up with other radiation-studying space-craft already operating, includ- ing Pioneer 6 located 144 million miles ahead of Earth and Pioneer 7, which is trailing this planet by about 68 million miles, to study solar events from dif-ferent points in space.

Man-to-the-moon planners are primarily interested in the solar flares—a great radiation storm that blows constantly through space. The phenomena, caused by huge thermonuclear reac-tions called solar flares beneath the seething surface of the sun, send huge clouds of radiation particles streaking through space at more than a million miles an hour.

About 50,000 miles in space on the sunlit side of Earth, particles from this wind smash into Earth's magnetic field and form the Van Allen radiation belt.

Biggest Airlift Of War Pushes Troop Strength To 475,000

SAIGON (AP) — The biggest airlift of the Vietnam war pushed U.S. troop strength in South Vietnam to about 475,000 today, more than the peak in the Korean war at its height 14 years ago.

The U.S. Command took the security wraps off the transfer from the United States of two

more brigades of the U.S. 101st Airborne Division, World War II's Screaming Eagles of Bas-togne. About 7,000 of the para-troopers have been flown across the Pacific since Nov. 17, and another 3,000 are due by Dec. 29.

Wearing combat fatigues with a .45 revolver and dagger tucked in his belt, the 101st com-mander, Maj. Gen. Orlino M. Barsanti, snapped a salute on his arrival today at Bien Hoa Airbase and reported to Gen. William C. Westmoreland: "The 101st Airborne Division is present for combat in Viet-nam."

Westmoreland, now com-mander of all U.S. troops in Vietnam, was the Screaming Eagles' commander from 1958 to 1960. The division's 1st Bri-gade has been in Vietnam since July 1965.

When completed, the airlift will have involved 373 trans-pacific flights, which after dis-charging men and supplies gener-ally took off within 15 minutes on the 9,783-mile flight back to 101st Division Headquarters at Ft. Campbell, Ky.

U.S. spokesmen said the airlift is the longest and largest ever staged direct from the United States to Southeast Asia "and gave us an excellent op-portunity to test our airlift capa-bilities."

Temperatures Are Coldest In 3 Years

Coldest temperatures in Magic Valley for the past three years were recorded Tuesday night with Fairfield having 24 degrees below zero.

Coldest temperature was re-ported at Stanley where the mercury dropped to 35 below zero. At Galena lodge it was 15 below while Smiley Creek lodge, on the Salmon river side of the summit, reported a minus 26.

Blaine County sheriff Orville Drexler issued a warning not to use sleds on Galena Summit. He said Charles Hansen, Stan-ley, who was trucking cattle over the summit was barely able to keep from running over five children coasting on High-way 89 over the summit.

It is illegal for snowmobiles to be used on the highway, the sheriff said, and it is extremely dangerous for skiers to be on a public highway.

In Twin Falls it was zero Tuesday night, but Rupert had a minus 13 and Burley a minus 7 with Hailey reporting six de-grees below. Jerome had minus five, Kimberly minus three and Gooding had one degree, ac-cording to the Weather Bureau.

King Constantine Asks People To Help Oust Military Regime

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — King Constantine of Greece called on the eight million peo-ple of Greece today to help him oust the military regime and re-store democracy and freedom.

His dramatic appeal raised the specter of civil war.

As he spoke troops and tanks took up positions around key buildings in the capital, and the government radio declared the government was ready to de-fend itself.

The king's appeal was made by shortwave radio from Laris-sa, site of a large North Atlantic Treaty Organization base in central Greece.

It came shortly after reports circulated that the 3rd Armored Corps in Salonika, the major city in northern Greece, had re-belled against the military dic-tatorship.

The 27-year-old monarch de-clared the leaders of the coup April 21 were only a segment of the army.

Bomb Scare

HEYBURN — More than 700 Heyburn elementary and junior high students had an unexpected half-holiday Wednesday as the result of a report that a bomb had been placed somewhere in the school buildings.

Earl Boyd, principal, said buses took students home at noon and the buildings were emptied after the sheriff's office notified him of the threat.

An adult telephoned the Ponderosa Inn at noon, ap-parently getting the wrong number, to report that a bomb had been placed in the school. The switch-board operator contacted Sheriff's officers who were searching the school facilities Wednesday afternoon.

Precautionary Measures Ordered In Tire Losses

HEYBURN — The possibility of foul play has not been ruled out in a rash of school bus accidents in which rear tires have fallen off buses three times re-cently, one of them causing property damage.

Dale Trantham, school trans- portation director for Minidoka County, says special precautions are being taken on all school buses.

The latest incident in which a rear wheel has fallen off a bus occurred Monday at 3 p.m. on a bus driven by Mrs. Donna Hleb. The incident happened on Baseline Road west of Rupert. There were no injuries and mi-nor damage to the bus.

The bus that lost a wheel Mon-day had been visually checked within a week's time and the other two had been checked the

same day that they lost wheels.

The first two buses involved had six nuts on each wheel and the third one had 10 nuts on each wheel. Only one nut was found at the scene of the first incident, in which a wheel crashed through the window of a Paul care after coming loose from the bus.

No nuts were found at the site of the second incident and one nut found at the third.

Mr. Trantham stressed that this may or may not have any bearing on the matter.

The first incident happened on the morning of Halloween, the second last Friday afternoon and the third was the Monday afternoon incident.

Bus drivers have been direc-ted to check tires and wheels be-fore driving.

Legislative Committee Studies Welfare Costs At T.F. Meeting

Rising costs in county and state welfare programs and nursing home care were al-re-dy being held throughout the legislature that may streamline the handling of welfare cases throughout the state," he told county officials.

Attending were county com-missioners from Twin Falls, Je-rome, Cassia, Camas and Lin-cola counties.

In open discussions, commis-sioners listed their major prob-lems as nursing home costs for indigent patients and in some instances a lack of cooperation and communication with the De-partment of Public Assistance.

John Clark, Cassia County commissioner chairman and Cas-sia Commissioner J. W. Beck said their major complaint is that state records through the DPA are not available to county officials for a better coordina-tion of services.

Mr. Beck complained that his county pays a supplement of \$35 per patient in nursing homes, but in the event the fam-ilies are able and willing to as-sist, whatever they can pay is cut from the state and federal assistance, leaving the county in no better position.

Nearly all counties reported nursing homes are not able to meet costs on the allotted \$225 per month per patient allowed by state and federal programs.

Mr. Loveland explained the functions of five-man commit-tees now authorized in the coun-ties as "watch dogs" or coordi-nating units between county and state welfare operations.

He urged that if these commit-tees are not now functioning in the counties, they may be estab-lished. He also asked the county officials their views on the ap-pointments of these committees and the extent of their authori-ties.

Some felt the authorities of the committees should be more extensive and that their appoint-ments should be made by the county commissioners rather than the two political party cen-tral committees of each county.

Canada Asks U.S. For Peace Gamble

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Foreign Secretary Paul Martin of Canada called on the United States today to risk as much in a gamble for peace in Vietnam as it has risked for war.

The appeal took on additional importance because it was made in the presence of 14 for- eign ministers in the Council of the North Atlantic Treaty Or-ganization, including Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

Rusk spoke after Martin, but a conference source said he did not respond to the Canadian's statement.

"The time has come," Martin said, "to risk as much in a gam-ble for peace, and we know it would be a gamble, as has al-ready been risked in ever-wid-ening attempts at a military so-lution."

After President Charles de Gaulle withdrew France from the military organization of the alliance, Belgian Foreign Min-ister Pierre Harmel proposed that the members examine what it could do in the future. Its main job remains to act as a shield against Soviet aggression, but many Europeans are convinced this is no longer so necessary, and want to put the emphasis on reducing tension with Moscow.

The "Harmel exercise" has produced a still secret plan which is far from being agreed upon. Despite elaborate efforts to avoid even the appearance of giving NATO any authority over East-West relations, there have been many objections from Rog-ger Traynor, the permanent French representative at NATO headquarters.

French officials are highly suspicious of anything that seems to limit De Gaulle's free-dom to seek his own arrange-ments with Moscow.

Retherford Quits ISU Coaching Job

POCATELLO (AP) — Claude Retherford, colorful basketball coach at Idaho State University, has resigned because of ill health, the university announced today.

Dan Miller, 26, Retherford's assistant, will step up to head coach, the announcement said.

The announcement contained no statement from Retherford or Athletic Director Milton (Dubby) Holt.

Before today's announcement, the Twin Falls Times-News re-ported that Retherford would be discharged because of an argu-ment with school officials.

Retherford, 41, joined Idaho State in 1965 after compiling a 71-49 record at Fullerton JC in California. Miller played under Retherford at Fullerton.

BOISE (AP) — A 31-foot tall Sub-Alpine Fir tree was deliv-ered to the state capitol Wednes-day and, after being decorated, will be displayed in the rotunda during the Christmas season.

Iowan Wins Passage Of Law Banning Nepotism

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Iowa congressman has won his six-year fight for passage of leg-islation to ban nepotism from the federal government — from the smallest post office to Congress and the White House.

Rep. Neal Smith, a Democrat serving his fifth term, says the power of federal officials includ-ing judges to hire relatives or get jobs for them in other fed-eral agencies is unfair to other jobseekers.

"I don't think the government gets its money's worth when you have that sort of thing," Smith said in an interview. "There are exceptions—some of these relatives work hard—but the bad overcomes the good."

Smith's antinepotism proposal was a rider to a bill raising the pay of federal workers and hik-ing postal rates. Congress passed the measure Tuesday and sent it to President John-son, who's expected to sign it.

The measure would prohibit any government official with authority to hire or promote employees from putting his rela-tives on the payroll.

The legislation defines a rela-tive as one who is related to the public official as father, moth-er, son, daughter, brother, sis-ter, uncle, aunt, first cousin, nephew, niece, husband, wife, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, stepfather, stepmother, stepson, stepdaughter, stepbrother, step-sister, half-brother or half-sis-ter.

The measure will not affect relatives already working for congressmen and other officials.

The 47-year-old Smith's strag-gly in getting his rider through reflected an absence of enthu-siasm for it in a Congress that, according to a recent Associat-ed Press survey, includes some 50 members with relatives on their payrolls.

After it appeared his plan would die quietly in committee, he proposed it as a rider during routine debate on the postal-pay bill. Only about 80 of the 434 House members were on the floor and it went through.

Smith said some absent op-ponents of the plan weren't happy when they found out what he did. "But if they were interest-ed in amendments they should have been there," he added.

Once the rider was in the bill, congressional sources said, it would have been embarrassing for any member to fight it.

"About half the relatives working in Congress do their work; half don't earn their pay," Smith said.

But the Iowa Democrat said his main concern was "wide-spread abuse" in the hiring of relatives by postmasters in small towns. In Iowa alone, he said, 111 postmasters have rela-tives on their payrolls.

"I don't know how many thou-sands of relatives there are in offices nationwide," he said.

He said many people don't even apply for jobs in small post offices because everyone assumes the postmasters' rela-tives will get any job that opens up.

Burley Mayor Gives Report On City Plans

BURLEY—A progress report was given by Mayor Joe Peters during the noon luncheon Monday of Chamber of Commerce at Bryan's Cafe.

Since January, 1966, the city water department has replaced the 1/2-inch line with 6-inch line from Fifth Street to the Snake River and from Overland Avenue and Fifth Street to Hiland Avenue.

A six-inch line was installed and connected to the fire hydrant near new Hanzel Motor and BPA Office on West Main Street.

Two blocks of old wooden low pressure pipe have been replaced from Baptist Church to Highway 30 with metal pipe, he said. New pipes were installed from 27th Street North on Burton Avenue.

A total of 11 new fire hydrants have been installed as well as 15 valves on the main lines.

At present the surveying crews are working on 27th Street because the water lines there are a dead end and pipes are being installed so there will be no dead end pipes.

At present there is just one auxiliary unit for pumping water and it is located at the Hogan Well.

"In January a proposal will be presented to the city council for another pump auxiliary unit to be placed on another of the wells in the city," Mayor Peters stated.

Lloyd Hollinger, chamber president, announced that a special Christmas program is being planned for next Monday's meeting, and members were urged to bring their wives or guests.

The chamber board of directors extended special thanks to the city employees for putting up the Christmas street decorations.

Dealer Gives Testimony In Theft Case

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—A San Antonio surplus government property dealer testified in federal court Tuesday that he bought \$67,000 worth of aircraft parts for a Lewiston, Idaho man and that all but one per cent of the items were stolen from Kelly Air Force Base.

The testimony came from Allen G. Kane during the second day of trial of Gerald Wilson, a Lewiston, Idaho, aviation company executive charged with conspiracy to steal, receive and conceal government property.

Kane, in cross-examination by defense attorneys Tuesday afternoon, said that 99 per cent of the airplane parts he purchased for Wilson over a period of months were stolen from Kelly.

He said he began buying aircraft parts for Wilson in 1960 after contacting Gilbert Tarin and Rogerio Arocha, two San Antonio men who have been convicted in connection with theft of government property.

Kane said he made shipments for Wilson to Lewiston, Idaho, and to New York.

He testified receiving large amounts of money from Wilson in payment for the aircraft parts.

Kane is under indictment on a charge of conspiracy in connection with stolen government property.

Groceries Turn Into Money Sack

PROVO, Utah (AP)—A bag of groceries turned into a bag of money for a Provo woman.

Then it turned back to groceries.

Mrs. Donald Muth left a food store with what she thought were two bags of groceries she had bought just before the store closed.

Store personnel soon discovered the day's cash receipts had been put into a bag similar to Mrs. Muth's groceries and put into the woman's auto.

The mistake was soon corrected by a swap of grocery bags, for Mrs. Muth had cashed a check, leaving her name, address and telephone number.

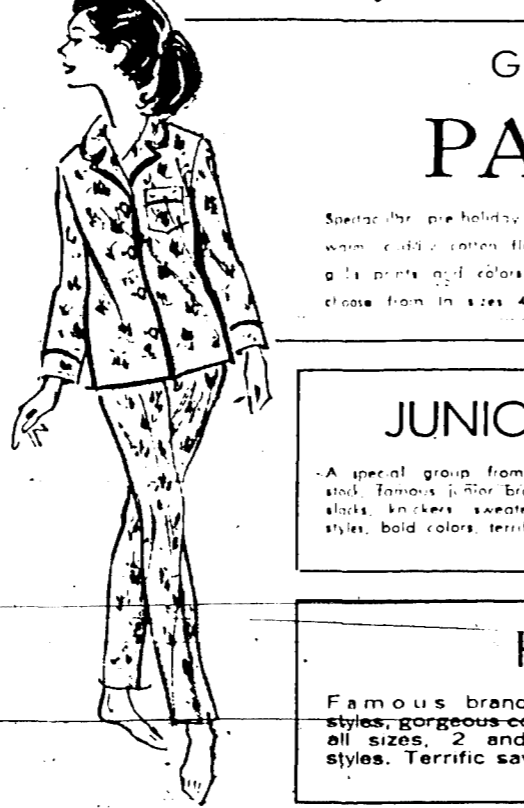
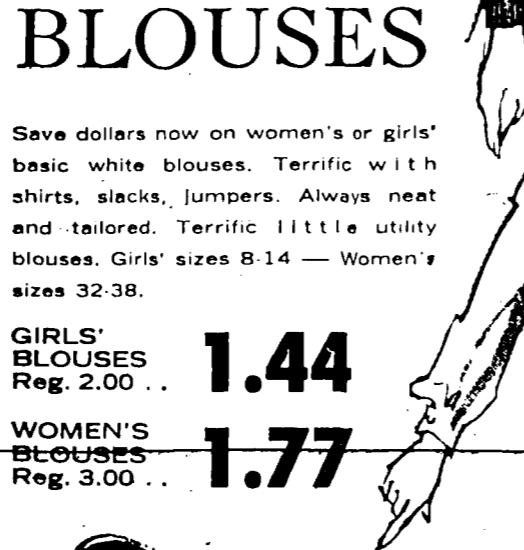

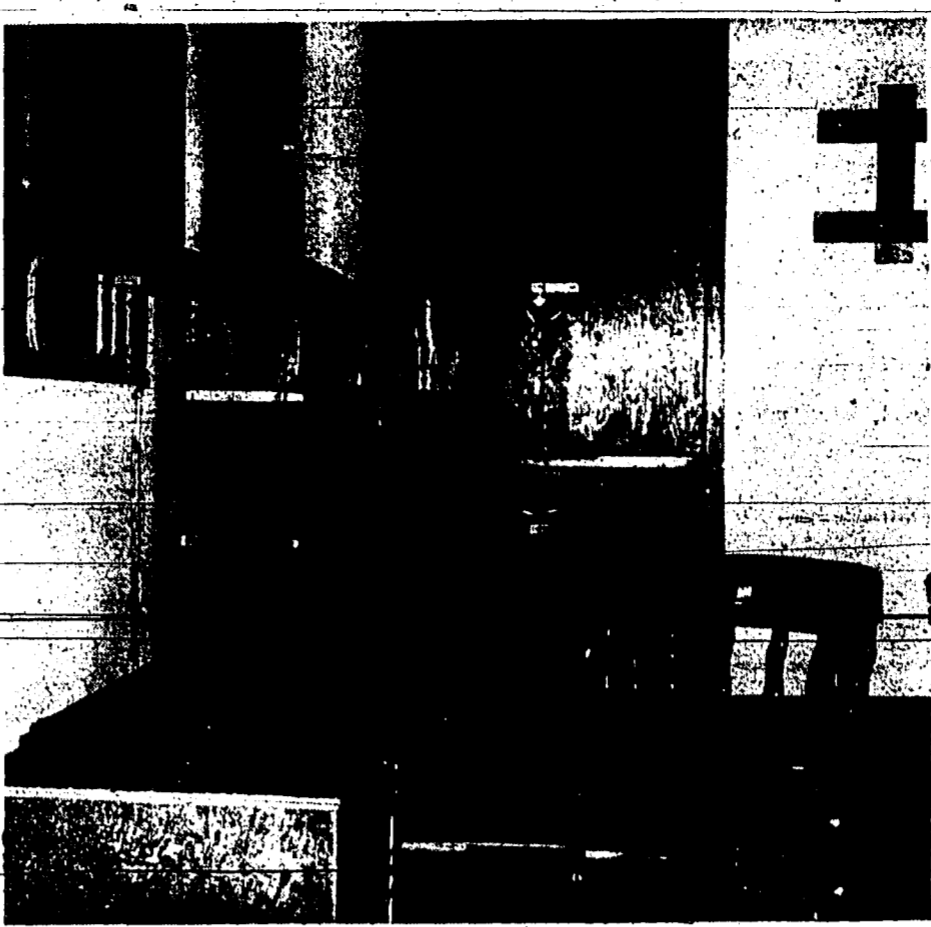

Report Views Greek Press Censorship

GENEVA (AP)—The International Press Institute, in a report prepared before today's developments in Greece, said "the poisoning in public opinion is now complete" in that country.

The report said Greek censorship, imposed when a military junta took over in April, intensified in August with the installation of a new press controller, Col. K. Vryonis.

"His telephoned instructions to publishers are backed by intimidation and the direct threat of imprisonment," the institute observed.

Instructions issued in October, the report said, forbade the publication of any reports on Vietnam which could be interpreted as anti-American, or of any articles showing in a favorable light the life of Communist countries. Editors also were told to refrain from comment on Greek political parties and leaders.

The Institute, an organization of journalists and publishers on five continents, sent a member of its secretariat to Greece to gather information. He talked with officials and editors.

National Grange Official Is T.F. Hall's Featured Speaker

Enactment of a surtax is the only fair solution to present increasing costs of government services and operation, Harry Graham, National Grange legislative representative, told a group of Magic Valley grange members in Twin Falls.

Speaking Monday night in the Twin Falls Grange Hall to some 100 members from Twin Falls, Cassia, Minidoka, Jerome and Gooding counties, the national grange officer said that only with an all-out effort to cut the national budget and enact a surtax can the United States have a responsible national fiscal policy, he said.

Congress, he said, readily reduced taxes by some \$28-billion four years ago to stimulate the economy and now has failed to put some of this back to work to control inflation.

"Surtax," he continued, "is a tax on a tax and thus the only fair way to obtain revenue from those with salary increases and profits which are contributing to inflation."

"Unless this tax is enacted, interest rates now approaching eight per cent will go even higher. The Farm Credit Administration's debentures brought 6.25 per cent last week. A 2 per cent increase in interest on a \$50-billion farm debt is intolerable."

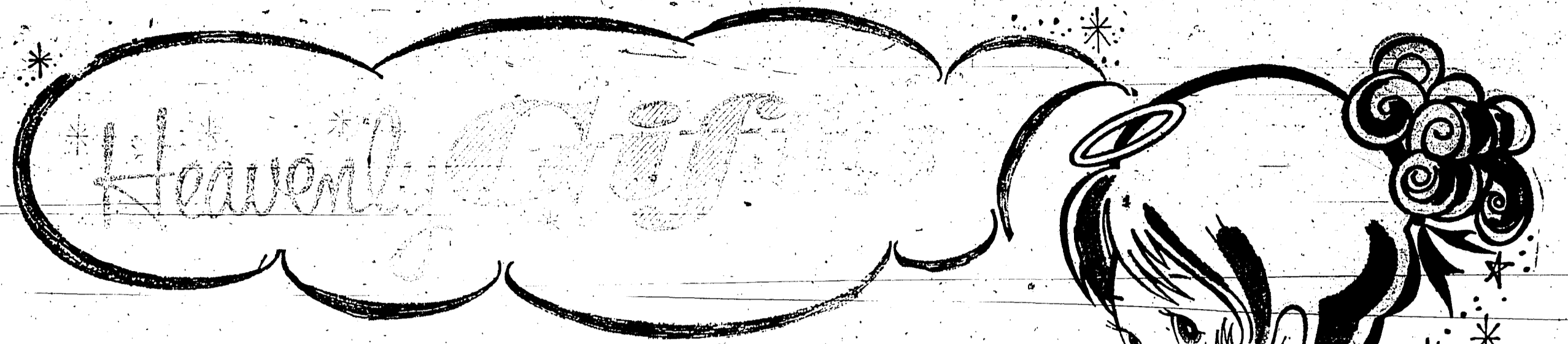

Schedule Too High For Plant

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—An official of a proposed magnesium project which is considering a \$52 million plant in Utah says a power schedule offered by Utah Power & Light is too costly.

Alvin G. Ash, of Tacoma, Wash., managing director of The Magnesium Project, made the remark Tuesday at a hearing conducted by the Utah Public Service Commission.

The hearing is in its second day in Salt Lake City.

Ash added that unless power were available at a lower cost, he proposed that the plant be located near Declo, Idaho, where power from the Bonneville system would be available.

The lead-off witness in the hearing, E. W. Rowley of National Lead Co., said Raft River Rural Electric of southeastern Idaho has offered to provide a rate of three and one-tenth mill per kilowatt hour. This, he said, was cheaper than the Utah Power & Light offer.

Rowley said the power was the most important single factor in the cost of production. National Lead is deeply involved in the financing of the proposed plant.

If built in Utah, the plant would be on the shores of the Great Salt Lake.

Utah Power & Light sought details from the witnesses on costs, transportation and market outlets. This information was declined, however, on the ground it was confidential and its disclosure might help competitors of The Magnesium Project.

Iver Bradley, a professor of economics at the University of Utah, said such a project would have an initial annual effect of more than \$8.7 million on the Utah economy.

Rowley said some \$2.5 million has been spent on ponding, pumping and evaporation studies in Utah.

National Lead and the Hogle-Kearns Co. formed a joint venture for the project, with National Lead putting up 80 per cent.

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Young Lions Roar In Britain

LONDON (NEA) — Sir Winston Churchill and Lord Beaverbrook were not only close friends but also close war-time team. Beaverbrook built the planes with which Churchill won the Battle of Britain.

Were they alive today, these two British leaders would rejoice to see that their descendants are not only following in their footsteps but that they are the best of friends as well.

Winston S. Churchill II, 27, grandson of the late prime minister, first met Jonathon Aitken, 25, great-nephew of Lord Beaverbrook, when they were both undergraduates at Christ Church, Oxford. They have since kept in close touch, each following the career of the other with keen interest.

Winston junior is the spitting image of his grandfather, with the same high forehead and jutting chin — all that is missing is the famous bulldog growl.

Young Aitken, on the other hand, bears no resemblance to the gnome-like Lord Beaverbrook, who was Britain's biggest newspaper, Aitken is 6-foot-3 and has been so busy growing that he hasn't yet filled out.

There was never any question

but that both of these young cubs would go into politics, just as the lions whose proud names they bear did before them. Curiously, both were slugged down on their first try to get into Parliament, Aitken being defeated in the 1966 general election, while Churchill was beaten more recently when he stood for Parliament at a by-election at Gorton.

But again there is family precedent for these initial setbacks. Winston senior also lost his first election when he stood for Oldham in 1899. As for Beaverbrook, he was never elected to office, but settled for the role of a modern Yorick, the king-maker.

Few here doubt that the young lions will soon be roaring from the Conservative back benches of the House of Commons. Churchill has been approached by the Conservatives of Kettering to be their candidate at the next general election, while Aitken has already been chosen as candidate for a safe Yorkshire seat, with a present Conservative majority of 10,000 votes.

While marking time until the next general election, the young lions are both making names for themselves in journalism, again following an old family tradition.

Nixon, Ike Disagree On War Point

CHICAGO (AP) — Former vice president Richard M. Nixon said Tuesday he disagrees with his former boss, Dwight D. Eisenhower, who has said he would approve of invading the demilitarized zone in Vietnam and of engaging in "hot pursuit" of the enemy.

Nixon said Eisenhower was "absolutely right from a military standpoint" when he said invasion to knock out the enemy should be considered.

"But the problem is," Nixon said, "if we move in we extend the ground war. I oppose any extension of the war on the ground—in North Vietnam, Laos or Cambodia."

Nixon made his remarks during the taping of a segment of Kup's Show for airing over Chicago's ABC television affiliate, WBKB-TV, Saturday night.

Ground action should be limited to South Vietnam, Nixon stated, with stepped-up air strikes against positions in the north. He described his position on the war as being between the "super-hawks" and the doves.

Q. I invested \$40 a month in a mutual fund for 10 years and reinvested all dividends and capital gains distributions. I completed the plan two years ago and have since left my investment with the fund. I now have 453 and a fraction shares, which I could redeem for about \$13 each. Now, they have started charging me a custodian fee, besides an administration fee, every three months. I'm kind of up a tree. Should I cash in my fund shares and buy blue-chip stocks? Or would it be better off leaving things as they were until I retire in eight years? A. Besides being up a tree now, you've been up the creek with that particular mutual fund from the day you started investing in it. Frankly, your money would work better for you almost any place else than it has in that mutual fund. You put in \$1,800 of fresh new money \$40 a month for 10 years. If you cash in, you would get \$5,889 for your 453 shares—based on a redemption price of \$13 a share. But that's not the \$1,089 profit it might seem to be at first glance. All the dividends and capital-gains distributions you reinvested should be added to the \$4,800 you paid in, to provide your true total cost. So, your cost is more than \$4,800 and your profit (if any) is less than \$1,089. As an investment, that fund has been a flop. I can't tell you how it's going to do in the future. Neither can anybody else. But, using its past performance as a guide, the natural impulse is to redeem and get your money. Then you can put your cash to work in something worthwhile, such as good individual common stocks or a better-performing mutual fund. It's bad enough that you have a dud investment. Those extra fees really broke it off. If after reading the column in which you wrote about income taxes on interest from U.S. Savings Bonds, I called the Internal Revenue Service. They said what you wrote is not true. They said that people do have to pay tax on interest received from Savings Bonds. What do you say now? A. That both you and whom ever you spoke to at the IRS had better learn to read. The column you mention clearly differentiated between Federal income taxes and state and city taxes. The importance of a study of institutional investments grows daily. For institutions—banks, insurance companies—have grown from about \$58.6 billion in assets in 1945 to more than \$565 billion now. Not all this financial power is in stocks, of course, but the role of institutions will continue to grow. Insurance companies now are planning to form their own mutual funds. 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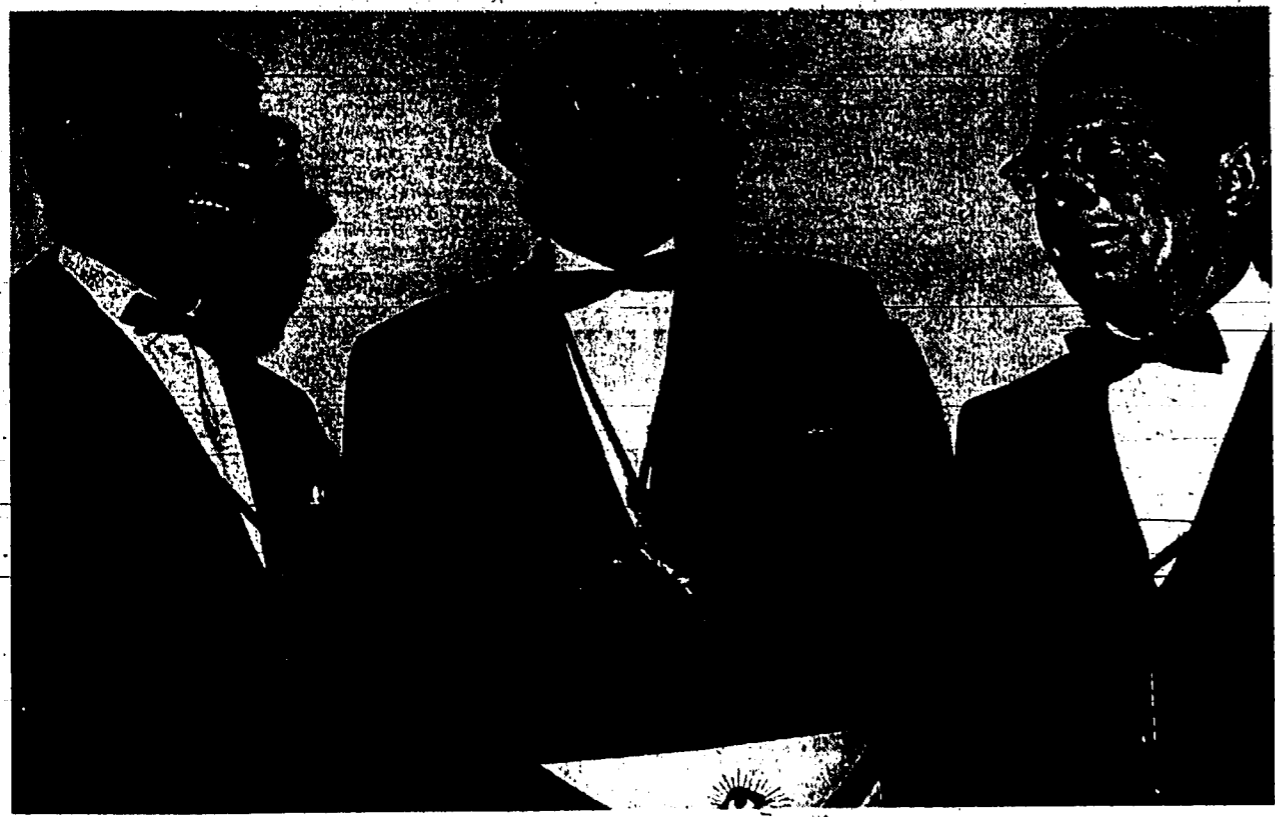

Tony Mareno Continues On Treasure Dig

MANZANITA, Ore. (AP) — Time goes on and his expenses go up, but Tony Mareno continues to dig for the legendary Neahkahnie Mountain treasure. Mareno, 38, came to Oregon from California three years ago and was a house painter in Salem until he saved enough money to start the search last spring. Mareno says he could reach the treasure at the 40-foot level "sometime in the next two weeks."

His equipment, large casings and power shovels, are being supplied by Salem contractors Ray Daniel and Karl Trussell.

Mareno had planned to give 20 per cent of what he found to the San Rafael Mission in California, but expenses have been so high that this is out, he says. The state also gets 25 per cent.

"I guess I will just put the problem in God's hands, and let him figure out the solution," says Mareno. "He's pointed the way to everything connected with the project so far."

The legend has it that a Spanish ship grounded on the Northern Oregon beach in 1632 and that the treasure was buried.

Mareno says the treasure may have been put there in preparation for colonization of the Oregon coast.

Mareno says he discovered the location of the treasure by interpreting writings on rocks. He contends he unlocked the secret of the markings by studying the book of Deuteronomy in the Bible.

At 16 feet, Mareno says, he found a piece of a cup. A scientist at the University of Oregon, he says, identified the cup as "hand made in either Barcelona, Spain, or Greece in the 1500s."

Last week's storm and high tides caused little damage to his excavations, which were covered. Mareno believes "the hand of God" spared the excavation site.

Americans Learning Vietnam Is Graveyard Of Reputations

SAIGON (AP) — Americans are learning the hard way what the French, in their last day in Vietnam, knew only too well: Vietnam is the graveyard of reputations.

Vietnam relentlessly grinds people down. Few ranking Americans have departed Vietnam with their reputations enhanced. Many failed to understand the dynamics of the war, particularly the military officers who insisted on viewing Vietnam in conventional military terms.

U. S. Gen. Fred C. Weyand spent a year in Vietnam before, as he explains, "The truth dawned on me."

Now the 6-foot-5 Californian is one of the handful of American general officers who seem to understand the social and political aspects that make this conflict so different from other wars the United States has fought.

Few generals have the acumen to bridge the gulf that has divided the military and civilian approaches to the Vietnam war. Weyand has done it.

Here is what Weyand says about the war: "It is so unconventional that we are having a hard time understanding it. The U.S. military organization has had to be tailored and modified to fit itself to this kind of war."

"Our American terminology doesn't fit it, either. We have had to devise new names like 'county fair,' 'hamlet festival,' and 'search and destroy' to describe what we are doing."

"It is difficult to paint a word picture of what is happening here in Vietnam, even to mili-

tary men skilled in the business," Weyand's "moment of truth" came early this year after he assumed command of Field Forces 2, equivalent to a corps in earlier wars. Its region includes Saigon, the northern Mekong Delta and the rubber plantations and piedmont that stretch up to the central lowlands.

The 51-year-old soldier served in the China-Burma-India theater in World War II. He brought the 25th Division to Vietnam

from Hawaii in December 1965, and commanded it here for one year. Operating in the Cu Chi area northwest of Saigon, a hotbed of guerrilla activity, Weyand figured that he and his division had made solid progress during 1966.

"We had, too," he recalls, "but it was progress under my concept of conventional warfare. When I took over command of Field Forces 2 I began to realize the enormity of the Vietnam problem. I had not known how

deeply the Communists were embedded in the countryside, that the threat was as acute, or that Saigon was as close to being strangled as it was." Weyand had come to Vietnam to fight another Korea, where he commanded an infantry battalion through five battle campaigns. He became instead a student first, then an adept practitioner, of military-political warfare. Many observers regard his region as the one place in Vietnam where solid progress can be charted. They say Weyand and his top civilian official, Texas-born John Paul Vann, are applying tactics likely to show long-term results.

The United Fruit Company and The Peanut Butter Conspiracy didn't bother me, except, at first, I thought the latter was the kindergarten set.

The kids have hopes for me now, they say. You see, after the peace rally in Washington I started suggesting names for new groups. There was The Teething Ring, for example. But the one they think is really groovy is Dr. Spock and The Peaceful Diaper.

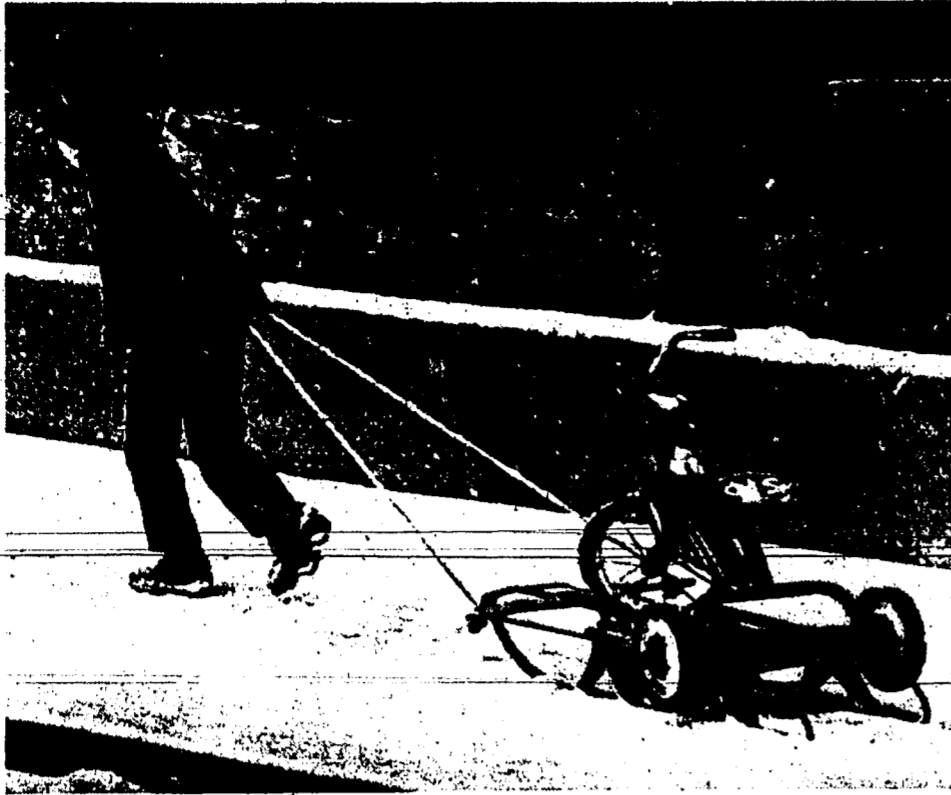

Father Says Body Of GI Is Not That Of His Son

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — A grief-stricken father today contended the body of a Vietnam veteran shipped to Sarasota was not that of his son, while Army officials maintained that it was.

"To me it is still not him—it is not my son," said Fred H. Hettich. "None of us feels it is him."

But after initial uncertainty, the Army announced that it is positive the body is that of Cpl. Donald L. Hettich, 19, whom officials say was killed in a helicopter accident.

"The family apparently just doesn't want to think it was their boy," said Staff Sgt. John Caldwell of Fort Stewart, Ga., who escorted the body from Dover, Ga., to a Sarasota funeral home.

Hettich said he had "no doubt that my son got killed," but that the Army had delivered to him the body of a stranger.

The father saw the body Monday at Hawkins Funeral Home. He said his son, who left for Vietnam July 28, had been shot in the hand during an earlier incident, but that the body in the casket did not show a scar.

In addition, he said, his son was a helicopter mechanic. The first telegram from the Army said he was a door gunner in a helicopter which lost power and crashed during November.

Fingerprints of the body were taken Monday and rushed to Washington. In the meantime, Army officials at Hunter Field in Savannah, Ga., issued a statement that the body had been mistakenly identified and that a search was on to determine who lay in the casket.

But late Tuesday morning, word came from Washington that examination of the fingerprints bore out the identity of the Hettich youth.

Funeral Director Robert Hawkins said all members of the Hettich family except Fred had accepted the Army's word of confirmation.
