## Better Mail Service Is Sought

The South Idaho Chamber of Commerce has gone on record as supporting increased and improved air passenger, air freight and mail service in Idaho.

At a directors meeting here Tuesday at the Holiday Inn, resolutions adopted recently by the North Idaho and Eastern Idaho Chambers of Commerce were discussed and Bill James, Rupert, was appointed to replace Bob Jones, who has resigned.

Ed Elliott, Burley, reporting for Clayton Stewart, chairman of the airport committee, pointed out that efforts should be made through legislation and all other means to inaugurate an intra-state air passenger and air freight service.

Directors decided that the South Idaho chamber go on record as approving a private air service acquiring a U.S. mail contract to facilitate mail service in the Magic Valley area, which would encompass air freight and express as well as passenger service.

"The whole structure of passenger schedules, mail and freight contracts should be closely examined toward the possibility of awarding a future contract to other carriers with more interest in improved service to Magic Valley," the resolution states.

Directors discussed the poor mail service since the railroad has discontinued express and dispensed with mail on all trains. A comparison was made of the services available by the Sun Valley Airlines and West Coast Airlines.

The chamber's highway committee, headed by Ken Curtis, recommended that the group first learn what highways will be improved in the next five years, as planned by the State Highway Commission, and then work on the basis of that information.

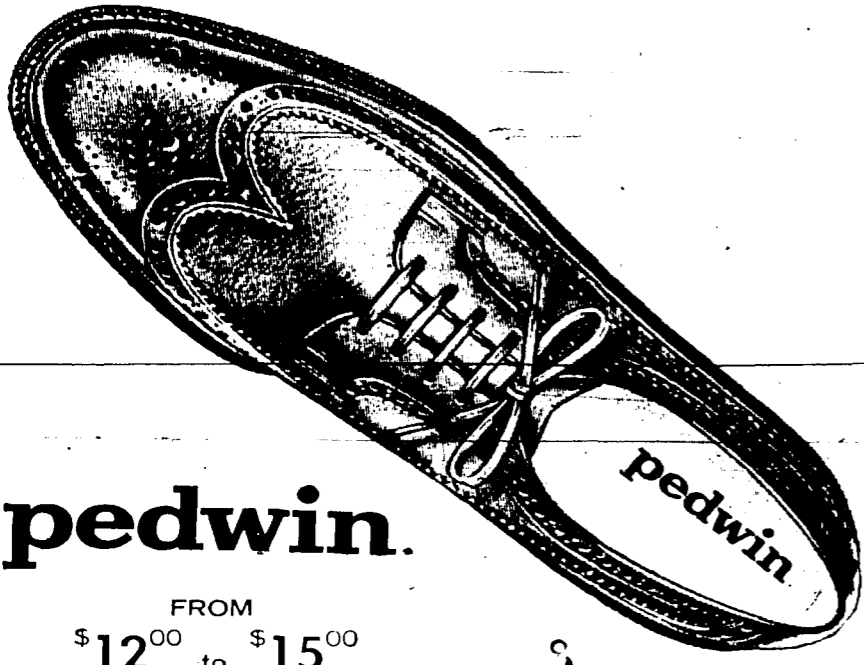

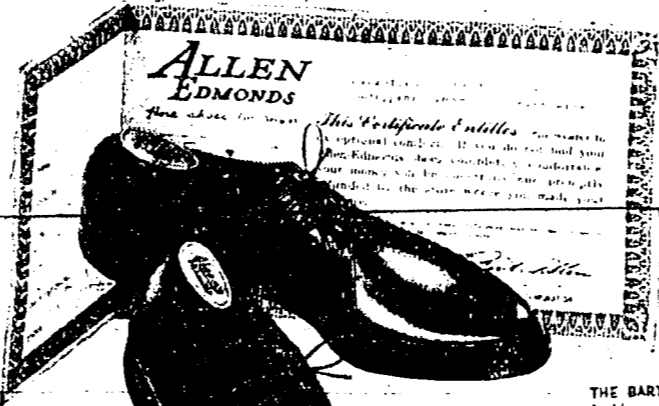

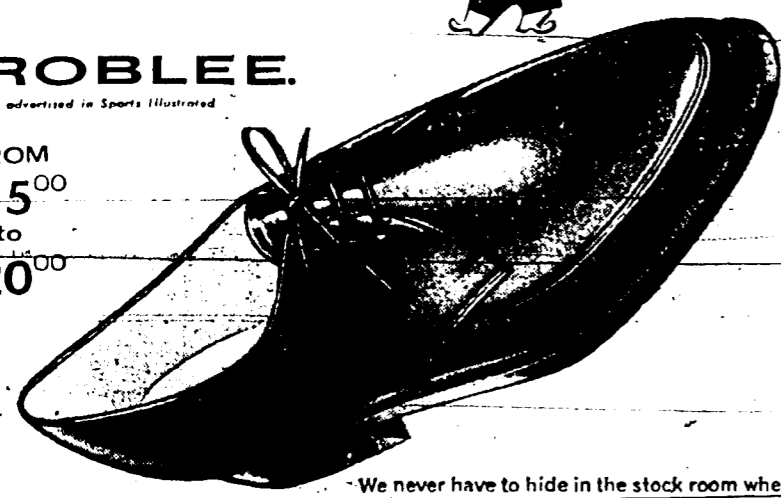

## Calls Set For Hershey's Resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Draft chief Lewis B. Hershey's recommendation that local boards speedily conduct Selective Service law violators has generated calls for his resignation from Capitol Hill.

Eight House Democrats issued a joint statement Wednesday asking Lt. Gen. Hershey to step down as Selective Service director. They also urged President Johnson to reverse Hershey's Oct. 26 recommendation to local draft boards.

Hershey's position on draft law violators also drew a proposal for a legislative remedy from Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., who said "We simply cannot tolerate the existing situation."

In a Senate speech, Kennedy offered a bill that would prohibit use of induction to punish either legal or illegal protest activities. He said such legislation is needed because of widespread fear the draft will be used "as a tool to frighten potential anti-draft or antiwar demonstrators."

Kennedy acknowledged there's no chance for passage of his bill this session, which could wind up this week, but urged early action on it next session.

The eight congressmen said Hershey's continuation in office serves "a constant provocation to those Americans who view the contempt for the Constitution by an officer of the federal government as a reason and excuse for their own disregard for lawful political procedures."

## Convention Unit Set For Clarkston

CLARKSTON, Wash. (AP) — A convention center and motor hotel with facilities for a hell-poor—expected to cost more than \$2 million—will be built in downtown Clarkston, developers said Wednesday.

Louis A. Bartley, Clarkston and former Spokane real estate man, and three California real estate developers plan the project.

Included is a motor hotel with 150 rooms, a 180-person capacity dining room, banquet facilities, meeting rooms for 650 persons, a swimming pool, coffee shop, lounge and space for leased shops.

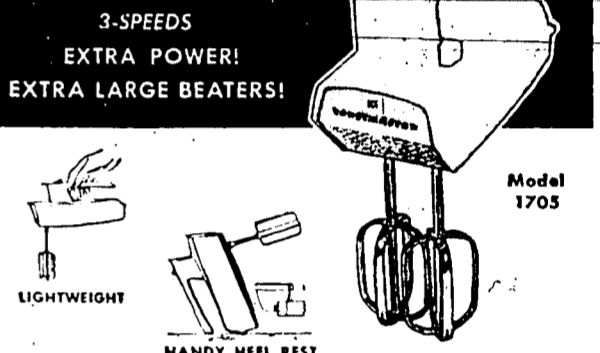

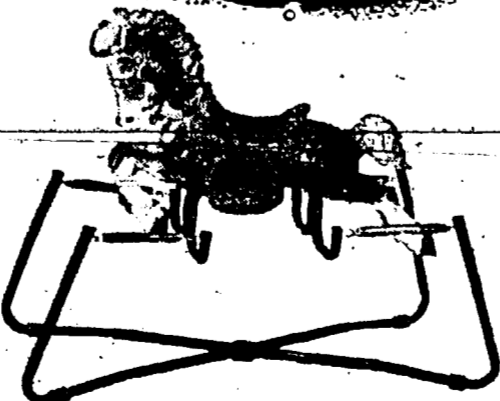

**TWO ARRESTED**  
BOISE (AP) — Ada County Sheriff's officers arrested two persons Wednesday for questioning in connection with an Orofino robbery.

Officers in Boise said Don A. Bentley, 32, Idaho, and Whitley Bates, 32, Montana, were booked on charges of "suspicion of burglary and possession of narcotics."

Deputies said the suspects' hometowns had not been determined.

The two were held in lieu of \$10,000 bond each.

**DAMAGES ASKED**  
BOISE (AP) — A Soda Springs, Idaho, woman Wednesday filed a U.S. District Court complaint asking \$342,116 damages from a trucking firm in connection with the Sept. 16 traffic death of her husband.

Mrs. Margene Sparks filed a complaint against the Salt Lake Transfer Co., of Utah, and the American Red Ball Transit Co., Inc., of Indiana.

Mrs. Sparks alleged that her husband, John W. Sparks, died from injuries received in an accident at Soda Springs in southeastern Idaho which involved a truck owned by the defendants and driven by Ralph J. Sadler.

The complaint alleged that the accident resulted from Sadler's negligence.

**POSITION FILLED**  
BOISE (AP) — Former State Sen. Will S. Defenbach, 41, Boise will take his position on the Idaho State Industrial Accident Board on Jan. 1, it was announced Wednesday by Gov. Don W. Samuelson.

Samuelson announced Defenbach's appointment at the same time he announced the resignation of 25-year board member Ben W. Oppenheim, effective Dec. 31.

Defenbach is an attorney and has been an industrial accident referee since he resigned his legislative seat earlier this year.

**STUDENTS CHOSEN**  
BOISE (AP) — Students at the College of Idaho and the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., were chosen Wednesday as Idaho's candidates for Rhodes scholarships.

Tom McFadden of Boise, the College of Idaho student, and Richard H. Witherspoon of Pocatello, the West Point cadet, will go to Portland for regional competition Saturday.

## U.S. Has Space Craft That Can Hurl Nuclear Warheads

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — A Defense Department researcher says the United States has developed a space vehicle that can hurl nuclear warheads at several cities.

Dr. John S. Foster Jr., director of defense research and engineering told a dinner of the Dallas chapter of the Association of the U.S. Army and the Dallas Council on World Affairs on Wednesday that the "space bus" would counter additional missiles deployed by the Soviet Union.

After the main booster has cut off the bus can make minute adjustments of its speed and direction, and after each adjustment can eject one of the several reentry vehicles with nuclear warheads that it carries, Foster said.

Thus each warhead would be delivered on a trajectory to a different city, or if desired, all could be delivered within one city.

**MAN SENTENCED**  
MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — James Carey, sentenced to 25 years in prison for second degree murder, was to be taken to Boise Wednesday to begin serving the sentence at the state penitentiary.

Carey, 47, of Cambridge, Idaho, was convicted Nov. 5 in U.S. District Court for the 1965 Christmas Day shooting death of Washington County Deputy Sheriff James Alexander.

The 25-year sentence was imposed Tuesday by U.S. District Court Judge Tom Felton. The minimum term for a second degree murder conviction is 10 years.

**RECEIVE CERTIFICATES**  
BOISE (AP) — Fifty area young persons Wednesday received bicycle safety certificates of merit from Idaho Secretary of State Pete T. Cenarrusa.

Cenarrusa said the certificates indicated the young students had passed a state course in bicycle safety directed by Carl Burt for the State Department of Law Enforcement.

Cenarrusa said similar schools would be held in other parts of Idaho.

## Common Mart Countries To Discuss Issue

BRUSSELS (AP) — The five Common Market countries that want Britain in their economic bloc decided today to bring the issue to a head with France at their meeting next Monday and Tuesday, a West German official said today.

Foreign Minister Willy Brandt of West Germany and the foreign ministers of Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg made the decision at a breakfast meeting called by Brandt.

The West German official said the decision whether to start negotiations could go either way at next week's meeting of the Common Market council. But he said the five would insist on a decision.

The source said the five agreed that the decision must be unanimous. They did not question President Charles de Gaulle's right to a veto, he said.

He added that they also agreed the applications of Britain, Ireland, Denmark and Norway should remain a live issue even if the decision goes against negotiations—provided the applications still want to get in.

The officials said that if things reach that point, all concerned will have to consider what to do next.

**POWER FAILURE**

## Allies Aren't Doing Job Of Keeping Tabs On Red Troops In Cambodia

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House Armed Services subcommittee says allied forces in South Vietnam aren't doing a good enough job of keeping tabs on Communist troop sanctuaries in Cambodia.

"It is the firm view of the subcommittee that adequate search and surveillance measures are not being carried out," said Rep. L. Mendel Rivers, D-S.C., in discussing recommendations made by the subcommittee.

Rivers told the House Wednesday the subcommittee also concluded:

- Allied progress in the war is too slow.
- Halts in bombing of the North put the U.S. forces at a disadvantage.
- Military commanders should be allowed to pick primary targets, including anti-aircraft batteries and Soviet-supplied surface-to-air missile sites.
- Halphong, North Vietnam's principal port, shouldn't be allowed to continue processing Communist war materials. There was no specific word on whether the subcommittee felt the port should be bombed or mined.
- The group also called for additional South Vietnamese troops to be trained and equipped.
- In other war-related developments: Officials at a State Department briefing said this country would have the sympathetic understanding of major world capitals if it gave U.S. forces permission to pursue Communist troops into Cambodia.
- They added there's no plan to attack Cambodia but that if incidents occurred near her border during "hot pursuit" actions, such incidents would be disturbing but nevertheless un-

## Artificial Heart Machine May Be Implanted In Man's Chest

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government says an artificial heart machine has been developed which may soon be implanted in the chest of a patient threatened with heart failure.

The heart-assisting device is almost ready for human use, researchers said Wednesday, but they didn't specify how soon.

Dr. Lester Goodman of the Public Health Service told a news conference the implantation factor marks a big advance. He said the device has been implanted so far only in calves and further development will be carried out.

The government officials said the new machine has several advantages over a heart-assisting device developed by Dr. Michael E. DeBakey of Methodist Hospital in Houston, Tex. But they called DeBakey's machine a breakthrough, adding, "We aren't calling this a breakthrough."

Marshall Turner, a mechanical engineer who built the machine, said another key advantage is that it provides a smooth flow of blood. He said this should eliminate blood clots, the main problem of DeBakey's pulsating machine.

Turner said his machine would be capable of doing all the heart's work but added it wouldn't be used to that extent

because clots might form in the unworking heart.

Like DeBakey's, the new machine would assume some of the work of the heart's left ventricle, the main working and pumping muscle.

Turner said implanting the machine in the chest keeps all the blood flow inside the body. He said this contrasts with DeBakey's machine, which pumps blood into an external device and then back into the body.

Furthermore, Turner continued, implantation cuts the danger of infection because connecting tubes aren't required.

Turner's machine, about the size of a fist, is driven by a small electric motor. It pushes the blood with two rotating wheels which run against a blood-carrying tube. The wheels compress the tube but don't close it.

Turner said a big problem so far has been with the motor. One burned out after being used for 11 days in an experiment with a calf.

The machine would have to work several weeks before it was used with humans, said Goodman, who also is a mechanical engineer, specializing in development of biomedical equipment.

The machine was developed by Turner and Dr. William Pierce of the University of Pennsylvania.

## Douglas-Fir Tree Noted Most Popular For Christmas

SHOSHONE — The most popular Christmas tree in the Pacific Northwest is the Douglas-Fir, according to Ivan Hopkins, county extension agent. It was the leader in the nation from 1950 to 1960, but in recent years has been second place to Scotch Pine. Douglas-Fir still accounts for about 22 per cent of the nation's Yule trees.

The seasonal information, along with many more facts about other species of Christmas trees, tips on their selection and care, and traditions of evergreen is given in a publication just distributed by the University of Idaho college of agriculture.

It was written by Vernon Burdison, extension forester. Free copies are available at the county agent's office. The bulletin is entitled "Your Christmas Tree," current information series No. 62.

Twelve species of Christmas trees more or less common in Idaho are described. The publication tells how to identify them by their needles and other characteristics. The various types are adapted to different purposes and tastes.

For example, Douglas-Fir although the leader in this area, has branches that are usually

too pliable for heavy ornaments. Open-grown grand fir has relatively stiff branches and has more formal appearance than Douglas-Fir. Nearly all Scotch Pine are sheared trees, shaped to good form. Some varieties of Scotch Pine must be tinted green for desirable color.

Select a fresh tree and take care of it after you get it, Burdison advises. There are two main reasons why some trees may not remain fresh until they reach the market. The first is that many growers start cutting trees as early as they can safely do so.

Weather is a major factor. Storage conditions after cutting may not be in control of the grower. Secondly, temperature during transportation may not be favorable. Warm weather

or very cold weather with low humidity can reduce freshness. Trees grown locally are usually fresh when put on a retail lot. As a rule, they are cut later than trees shipped from more distance.

### Simple Formula Will Make Yule Season Safer

SHOSHONE — For a safer holiday season, Christmas trees may be treated with a simple home-cooked formula to keep them green and reduce fire hazard, according to Ivan Hopkins, county extension agent.

This information, he states, is covered in detail in the Dec. 7 Idaho Farmer magazine.

"In tests conducted last year by various fire officials, it was evident that the trees treated with green garde formula or similar materials were not as easily ignited and did not burn as fast as the ones that had stood in plain water.

"The micronized iron is available in small inexpensive packages at garden supply and nursery stores."

The simple formula:

- Mix four tablespoons of micronized iron into a gallon of water.
- Add and mix two cups of light corn syrup and four teaspoons of chlorinated household bleach.
- Saw one-inch off the bottom of the tree to remove clogged resins. Then smash the base of the trunk with a hammer to crush the fibers.
- Stand the tree in a tree holder and pour in the solution. Add warm tap water each day as needed to keep it filled.

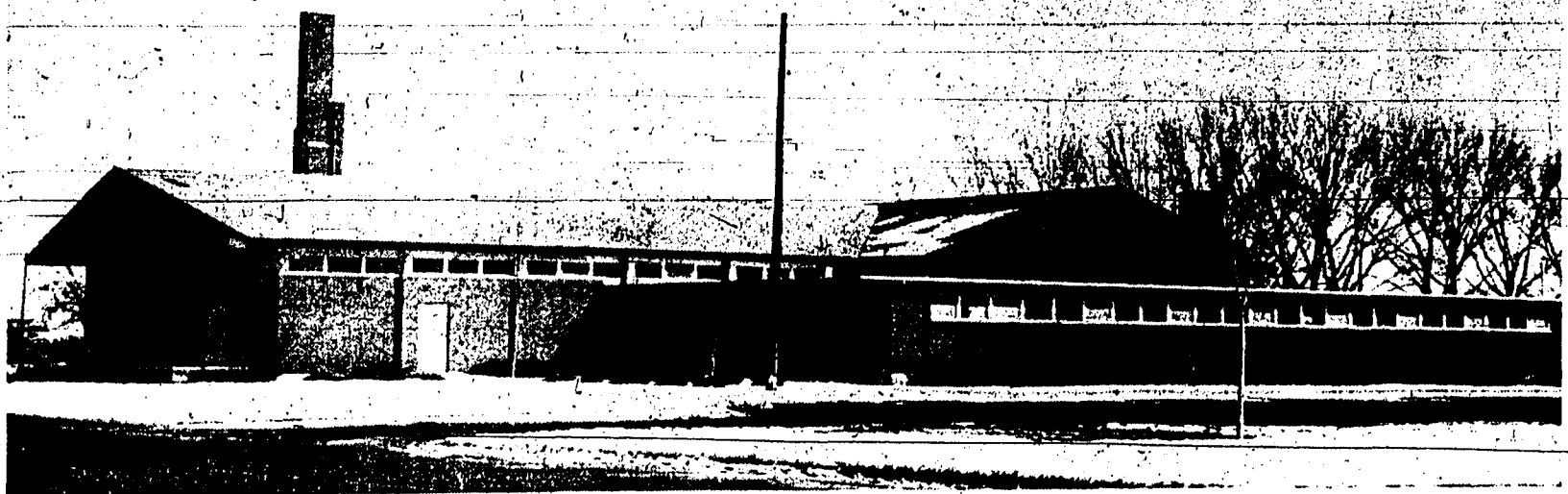

## Nonwhites' Jobless Rate Is High

WASHINGTON (AP) — The jobless rate for nonwhites in the nation's 15 largest metropolitan areas is "more than twice as high as that of whites," says Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz. In these areas, he told a Wednesday news conference, about 27 per cent of total unemployment was made up of non-white workers who account for only 14 per cent of the 23.1 million persons making up the civilian labor force. He said the nonwhite jobless rate for the 15 areas combined was 77 per cent more than double the rate for whites. The figures, based on the first nine months of the year, were in a Bureau of Labor Statistics report and gathered from the Census Bureau's current population survey which samples more than 50,000 households monthly. New York and Los Angeles, the two largest metropolitan areas studied, accounted for 12 per cent of total U.S. unemployment with about 180,000 jobless workers in each area.

# Army Uses Artillery Shotguns

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has started using what amounts to huge artillery shotgun shells against the Communists in South Vietnam, sources report.

New artillery rounds fired in regular 105mm Howitzer pieces spray thousands of dart-shaped steel shafts over broad areas of jungle or open territory.

One well-aimed round can kill hundreds of enemy troops massing for an attack. Military men report the weapon has been used with lethal effectiveness in such actions as Communist charges against American artillery positions below the Demilitarized Zone. "I've seen reports of enemy soldiers actually being nailed to trees by these things," one officer commented.

Information on the antipersonnel cartridge has been cleared for publication by the Defense Department's security review office but defense officials decided not to announce its development through the Pentagon. A possible reason was the ugly nature of the weapon.

The new artillery round was first sent to the war zone on a test basis but is expected to become a standard ammunition item. It still bears its experimental designation of XM546.

Army officials say the round can be used either for close-in defensive fire or conventional direct fire. It works this way: The round is fired into the air by a propelling charge, then explodes in flight projecting thousands of shafts specially made to fly in a fan pattern. A fuse on the projectile allows commanders to set the distance at which the dart package bursts.

Each shaft weighs 8 grains. The entire round weighs 28 pounds and is slightly over 34 inches long. Its fuse begins ticking away as the projectile spins out the artillery tube.

Recorded Messages Sent To GIs  
NEW YORK (AP) — A five-year-old girl in a bright green dress spoke into the microphone of a tape recorder and told her daddy, "Happy New Year and don't forget to bring the bike."

A college girl clutched the microphone, closed her eyes and whispered to her boyfriend: "The holidays just won't be the same without you."  
A mother burst into tears after telling her son: "I want to wish you a very happy Hanukkah, a very Merry Christmas, and a Happy, Happy New Year."

The three were among hundreds of New Yorkers who have been recording Christmas messages to their sons, fathers, husbands and boy friends overseas. Since Nov. 20, a steady stream of family members with servicemen abroad have been showing up at Red Cross headquarters here, taping their messages with the help of volunteers and mailing them to loved ones from Vietnam to West Germany.

"The response was very slow to begin with, but it's picked up tremendously this past week because it's getting closer to Christmas," said Catherine Sullivan, head of the Overseas Service League, the Red Cross auxiliary sponsoring the "Voices From Home" project.

"As of tonight we will have made about 250 tapes," Miss Sullivan said Wednesday. "By Sunday, we hope that we'll hit 500."

PLANO, Tex. (AP) — An autopsy has been completed in the death of Evalyn McLean, 25, who was once among the heirs to the famed Hope diamond. Miss McLean's body was found Tuesday in the rambling ranch home where she lived alone. Neighbors in this Dallas suburb broke into the home after they saw no activity there for several days.

Officials said results of the autopsy would be released soon. The funeral for Miss McLean is today. The body will be cremated. Miss McLean's body was discovered lying on a bed, fully clothed. There was no indication of foul play. Justice of the Peace B. B. Carpenter said. She was the daughter of John R. "Jock" McLean of Palm Beach, Fla. A former Dallas debutante, she had never married. She spent her time working with the horses she raised and trained at her horse ranch six miles northeast of Plano.

The Hope diamond was once owned by her grandmother, Washington hostess Evalyn Walsh McLean. Miss McLean and six other grandchildren were never allowed to so much as touch the diamond, a stone reputed to have brought ill luck to most who were associated with it.

The diamond was bought from Evalyn Walsh McLean's estate by New York jeweler Harry Winston in 1947. He gave it to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

Evalyn Walsh McLean liked to wear the Hope diamond to her gala Washington parties. She claimed she had turned down offers of nearly \$2 million for the diamond. She said she bought it in the early 1900s after her marriage to the late Ned McLean. Mrs. McLean paid \$40,000 for the stone and took it to a priest to have it blessed.

The diamond, according to its legend, was once possessed by King Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette but disappeared after the French Revolution. The first owner of the stone was a French traveler named Tavernier, who sold the diamond to Louis XIV of France. Tavernier later was ripped to death by a dog pack.

The stone derives its name from Henry Thomas Hope, a London banker who bought it in 1830.

## 16-Year-Old Negro Does Amazing Scientific Work

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — As a senior at Parker High School, 16-year-old Bracie Watson isn't saying what research he's doing now. But his teachers won't be surprised, whatever it is.

As a ninth grader, he grafted skin of an hour-old chick to another. The chick with the new skin lived to be frying size.

As a 10th grader, he took the kidney of one dog and transplanted it into another. The dog suffered no ill effects—and even bore a litter of eight puppies a few months later.

As an 11th grader, Watson took several embryo rats from the bodies of their mothers and kept them alive for hours in a mechanical womb which he designed and built.

He says his interest in such things began when he joined a science club his first year at Parker. His skin graft project took first prize in a local science fair. The fair was for Negroes only, and winners could not enter regional contests.

This discouraged Watson, but one of the judges was a professor at the University of Alabama Medical Center. He invited the student to use his lab at the center and Watson jumped at the chance.

## Humphrey Says Johnson Has "Sort Of Hit Sawdust Trail"

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey says President Johnson, who hasn't announced he'll seek another term, already "has sort of hit the sawdust trail" in a reelection campaign.

Humphrey, talking Wednesday with newsmen in Miami Beach, Fla., was referring to the President's speech to the AFL-CIO convention there the night before. Johnson called congressional Republican leaders "wooden soldiers" whose "old Republican buggy can only go one way, and that's backwards—downhill."

On Capitol Hill, Republicans responded to the speech in predictably partisan fashion while—less predictably—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield rose to the GOP's defense. House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford commented: "The Great Society of Lyndon Johnson has become a runaway locomotive with a wild-eyed engineer at the throttle."

Ford and other GOP leaders demanded equal air time for the three television networks which broadcast Johnson's speech. The CBS network offered a half hour at 7 p.m. Friday, but there was no immediate word from NBC or ABC.

Johnson sharply criticized Republicans in Congress for opposing his domestic program but Mansfield commented: "I must say in all candor many laws wouldn't have passed this year and in past years without Republican help. So if there is any blame, I think you can spread it impartially."

There are nay-sayers and yea-sayers in both parties," Mansfield said. Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen said, "I don't see how you can throw a rock at a whole party. Bills got out of committee all right. They got many Republican votes."

In other political developments: Oregon Gov. Tom McCall, who backs Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller for the presidency, predicted in Salem, Ore., the New Yorker will eventually emerge as a candidate and win the GOP nomination.

McCall said he thinks Rockefeller might become a candidate in June—after the primary elections. Rockefeller has maintained he isn't and won't come a candidate.

Rhode Island Gov. John H. Chafee, chairman of the Republican Governors' Association, charged Rep. Melvin R. Laird, R-Wis., with harboring hostility toward the 26 GOP governors.

Chafee was speaking to the assembly by Laird, chairman of the House Republican conference, that the governors sacrificed their influence by not backing a single candidate for the party nomination.

# Irregularities In OAS Finances Probed

By DICK BARNES  
WASHINGTON (AP) — A second congressional subcommittee will join a growing list of probers into reported financial irregularities within the Organization of American States.

Reports of alleged mismanagement of OAS money in Washington came amid announcements of OAS money irregularities abroad, the firing of a top Washington OAS official for alleged political interference and a deadlock over selection of a new secretary general.

Sources cite one bizarre liquor-buying incident prior to this year's Latin American summit meeting and hint of other alleged misdoings.

A report on a special \$20,000 audit of OAS financial management—paid for by the United States—is expected in mid-February but U.S. Ambassador Sol

M. Linowitz say it's not aimed at the reports of irregularities. The House Inter-American Affairs subcommittee headed by Rep. Armstrong L. Selden Jr., D-Ida., called Linowitz to testify Tuesday on what he knew about the reports. Linowitz said after the closed meeting no specific clues have come to light.

Rep. John J. Rooney, D-N.Y., whose House Appropriations subcommittee approves U.S. funds for international organizations, told a reporter Wednesday that OAS and its administrative arm, the Pan American Union, will get special scrutiny at budget hearings expected in about six to eight weeks.

The United States supplies 66 percent of the OAS budget—\$11.4 billion in the current fiscal year.

Secretary-General Jose A. Mora, whose term expires next May, told Monday night of these actions:

—The firing of Director Julio Cesar Banzas of the Pan American Union office in Buenos Aires "after a thorough investigation revealed the misuse of funds contributed by the Argentine government to the National Committee on the Alliance for Progress and which he received as a member of that committee." Mora said OAS funds were not involved.

—Transfer of Jose Salinas, Pan American Union office director in San Jose, Costa Rica, to Washington after numerous overdrafts in accounts. Mora said a probe is under way to determine if any money was misused.

—Instigation of an audit of OAS activities in the Dominican Republic which Mora said were being financed from the unspecified remnants of \$57 million contributed by the U.S. Agency for International Development after the Dominican crisis of April 1965. Sources indicated very small sums were involved.

The liquor incident described by sources involved perhaps 100 or more OAS staff personnel who flew to Punta del Este, Uruguay, for the Latin summit conference last April 12-14. Each staff member was given money along with his airline ticket to buy three bottles of Scotch whisky at the tax-free sales room in Kennedy International Airport, New York.

The whisky was destined for an OAS reception at the conference, but the reception never was held. At the last minute, sources said, the OAS staff held its own party with the OAS-financed liquor.

The OAS director of administrative affairs, Luis Raul Belmonte, was fired from his \$10,000-a-year Washington job by Mora earlier this month. Belmonte allegedly tried to influence the vote of the Dominican representative in balloting for a new secretary general. The voting is deadlocked and no new ballot is expected before mid-January.

"No, no," Romney told newsmen in the West German capital's small and almost deserted railway station. "The answer to the question is no."

Grounded by fog in his round-the-world fact-finding tour, Romney spent much of Wednesday at London Airport, canceled a visit to West Berlin and arrived in Bonn by train from Amsterdam after midnight.

Touching on the idea of neutralizing Vietnam, which he mentioned in Paris last week, Romney said: "It is one of the alternatives I am exploring. It is something I am going to study as I go along. I am interested in any suggestions any of these people have as to a practical solution to the Vietnam problem."

Meetings were arranged for the governor today with members of West Germany's social-conservative coalition Cabinet and several members of the parliament.

## Reds Claim U.S. Planes Hit Hanoi

**TOKYO (AP)** — Communist dispatches said U.S. planes staged a heavy raid today on Hanoi, which had been sheltered lately by monsoon clouds. The Soviet news agency Tass said about 50 planes took part, bombing "residential quarters and other objectives." It did not define the other objectives, presumably the military targets. The official Vietnam News Agency said in a broadcast from Hanoi that four planes were shot down, three over the Communist capital and its suburbs. The fourth, it said, was felled in a dogfight over Thai Binh Province, 50 miles southeast of Hanoi. Tass said the raiders loosed "delayed-action pellet bombs designed to kill civilians." ## 500 Students Stage Strike At Rochester

**ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)** — About 500 students struck the University of Rochester today, forcing cancellation of some classes. The dispute stemmed from suspension of 23 graduate students who held a sit-in demonstration against a Dow Chemical Co. recruiting team last month. The students, some carrying signs, milled around buildings in the center of the main campus. A few professors refused to cross picket lines. This resulted in the cancellation of their classes. The university has an enrollment of 5,700, including 3,400 fulltime undergraduates. The strike, expected by student leaders to grow during the day, was voted Wednesday night by the student cabinet, after the administration suspended the graduate students for a full semester. Daniel Gutman, president of the Student Association, said the strike would continue until the administration rescinded the suspensions. The university's chapter of the American Association of University Professors earlier condemned the suspensions. In announcing the decision on the 23 students Tuesday, Provost McCrea Hazlett said they were suspended because coercion of others violates the fundamental spirit and moral foundation of the university.

# School Aid Fund Battle May Slow Down Congress

By JOHN BECKLER  
WASHINGTON (AP) — A fight between urban and rural congressmen over federal school aid funds threatens to slow down Congress' rush to adjourn by week's end.

Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., told the House earlier Congress could not adjourn without passing a bill extending the act. But unless agreement comes promptly today he is likely to run into heavy pressure to put it over until next year.

the antipoverty program approved by its Appropriations Committee. Although the House has voted only \$1.6 billion for the antipoverty program, little difficulty is expected in reaching a compromise at about the \$1.78 billion figure that Director Sargent Shriver of the Office of Economic Opportunity says he needs to continue the program at its present level of operations.

House and Senate conferees met until near midnight Wednesday in an effort to agree on a formula for funding the Elementary and Secondary School Act but broke up in wide disagreement.

The school bill is one of four measures congressional leaders want to wrap up before the session ends, but it will take a firm hand to hold the homeward-bound legislators in Washington past Friday night.

In the school bill conference, members from urban areas are quarreling with rural representatives over proposed changes in the formula for allocating funds that would increase the amounts going to rural areas at the expense of large Northern cities.

There also could be trouble with another of the bills. Senate liberals are balking at some proposed welfare aid restrictions in a measure that would boost Social Security benefits and taxes. There is talk of trying to delay final action on it until next year.

The other two bills, appropriating funds for the foreign-aid and antipoverty programs, moved forward Wednesday and should get another boost today.

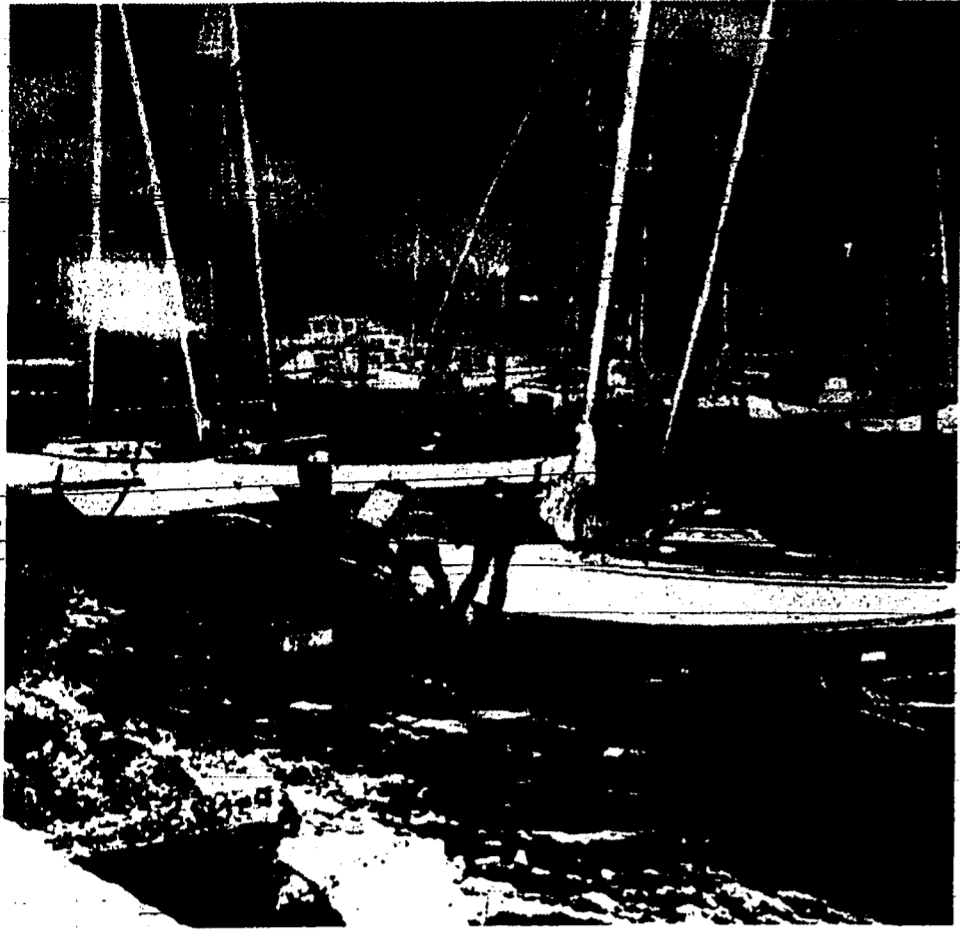

## GI Deaths Are Down For Third Week

SAIGON (AP) — The number of American servicemen killed in combat in the Vietnam war dropped slightly last week for the third week in a row, while South Vietnamese casualties soared to a 1967 record of 380 dead.

The U.S. Command in its weekly summary said 194 Americans were killed in combat and 1,643 wounded. The number of dead was 13 less than the previous week, but the number of wounded was more than double the 634 reported the previous week.

Mirjam Vire-Tuominen, the organization's secretary-general said it had received a message from a sister group in the Soviet Union saying the sailors want to come to Finland.

"Our committee is also willing to invite them here for talks and a series of speeches," she said. "We have already asked the Finnish foreign minister about the possibility of their obtaining visas to come here, but so far we have had no reply."

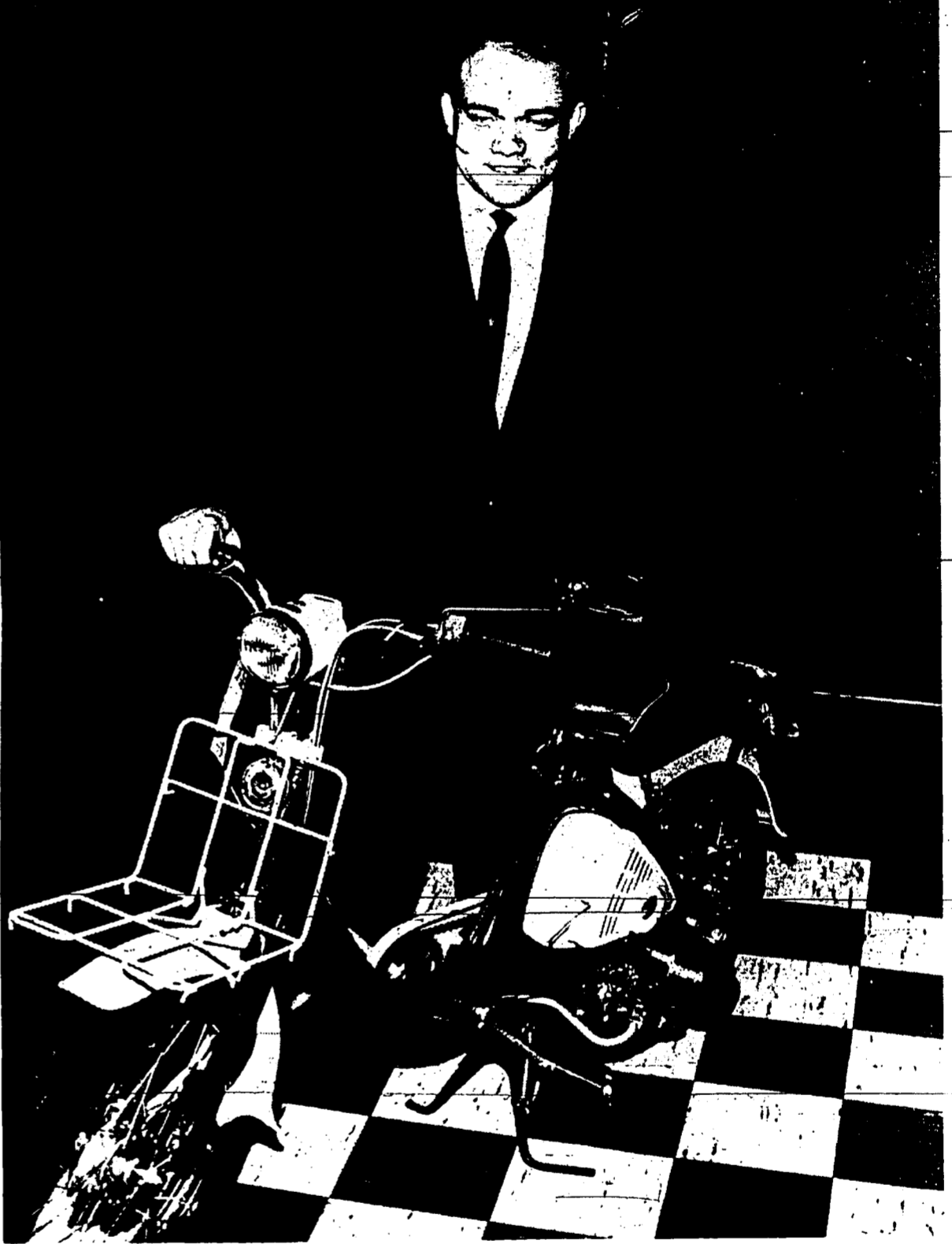

When this year's rubber bridge championships started at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas, Sands vice-president Sandy Waterman told us that he hoped the winners would be ordinary

Of course, 1933 Culbertson was a pretty good system. One of its features was the Culbertson four and five notrump which preceded Blackwood. Mr. Krost's two spade call was a trifle weak by modern standards, but he had a six-card suit and 4 1/2 honor tricks. Mr. Krost's four notrump showed either two aces plus the king of spades or three aces.

South's five no-trump bid showed two aces whereupon North went to six spades. Mr. Merritt's final bid of seven spades had become a cinch. He knew that Mr. Krost held two aces and the king of spades from the four no-trump bid and spade support from the six-spade bid.

Three rounds of trumps took care of that suit, and dummy still held a trump to ruff the last diamond. Mr. Merritt had actually played the hand that far before showing his cards. You can't be too careful in the final round of any tournament.

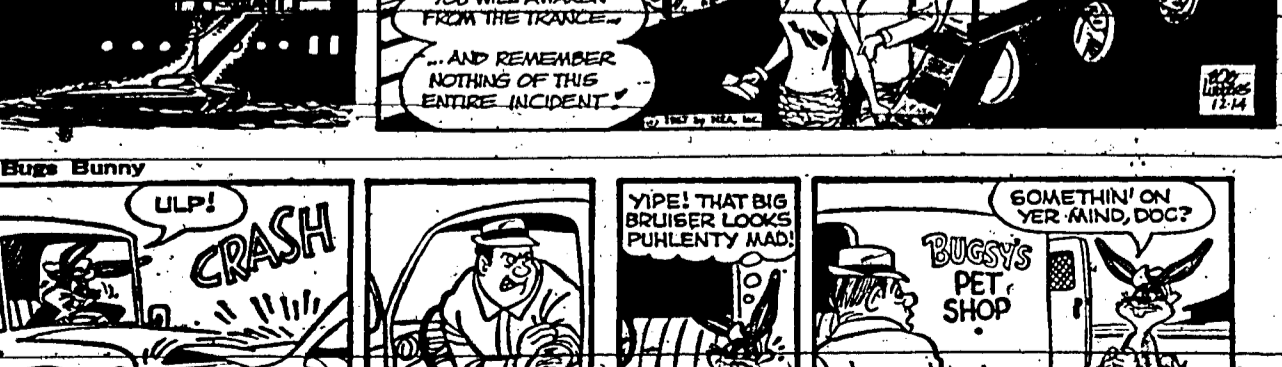
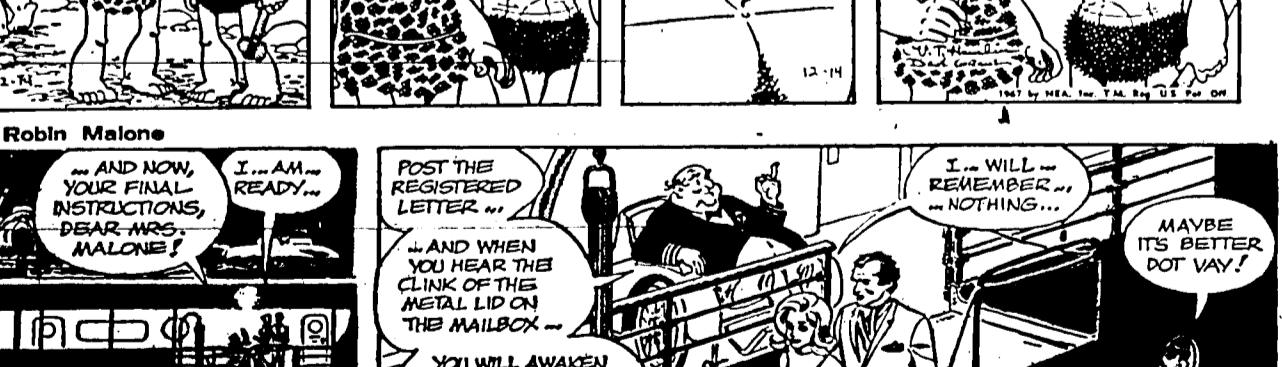

**Residents Claim Bottom Creek Well Named**

**BOTTOM CREEK, W. Va.**—(NEA)—There are some 250 residents living in pestilence and privation of this dilapidated coal community and a good many of them are of the bitter opinion that the place is well-named. Bottom Creek, they say, is the low water mark in United States society. It is 80 largely forgotten families living in 50 sagging shacks. It is a few dozen outhouses so overfilled that a convenient stream has been pressed into service. It is a pair of torn trousers per child and no glass in the windows. Bottom Creek is another era. Daily newspapers are rarely read here. Women wash with scrub boards. Wood-burning kitchen stoves are turn-of-the-century vintage. The stark, dim, danglecord light bulbs look like Edison originals. It's sad here. Almost sickening. "It's about as far down as a body can get," says one penniless resident on relief. "A man he's dead and buried." Happily, Bottom Creek is not altogether typical of either West Virginia or the 13-state, 17,000,000-populated Appalachian region of which West Virginia is the core. But neither is the community only a rare exception. Places like this—some even worse—blemish these far-flung hills like festering boils. This fact is, of course, no revelation. Appalachian poverty has been public record for 100 years. But what is noteworthy—or should be, at least to the taxpayer—is that the pockets continue to exist (even grow worse) despite massive transfusions of federal and state money designed to eliminate them. This year alone the West Virginia Office of Economic Opportunity will funnel nearly \$30 million to fight poverty. State welfare and assistance agencies will kick in many millions more. Uncle Sam will top both donations with astronomical sums. Yet, in Bottom Creek anyway, hardly a dollar's worth of progress will be felt. "I hear they're spending plenty just to build new roads around the state," says one unemployed coal miner. "Well, what for? I ain't even got a

car." Indeed, the sophisticated planning of state and federal poverty agencies fails miserably to impress the really poor of Appalachia. Families without running water just can't comprehend the long-range programs of bureaucracy. A sick woman wants nearby medical help... not the promise of developing commerce. A middle-aged, unemployed miner with silicosis wants a job... not adult education classes. Homeless nomads want shelters... not model city plans. "I ain't much on all the high falootin' programs," a ditty Mrs. Bill Mitchell. "I just wish somebody would help my husband fix the hole in my kitchen floor." Here in Bottom Creek, the poverty needs are mostly all like Mrs. Mitchell's... so fundamental as to possibly be incomprehensible even to dedicated poverty officials. Some examples: Roy Knuckles, 60, father of five, unemployed on welfare, needs a pair of scissors to cut the hair of his 5-year-old boy, whose locks are shoulder-length. Roger Harmon, 22, uneducated, unemployed, needs some kind of new, warm jacket to replace the Army issue blouse he now wears. Mary Elaine (not real name), 46, needs assistance to keep her husband's home from being chopped apart by firewood-seeking neighbors. Gladys Johns, 45, a cook, needs legal assistance to fight an eviction notice from an alleged slumlord whom she has publicly criticized. Other Bottom Creek wants are more standardized. A once-prosperous nearby mine has been closed for 15 years, and 50-60 per cent of the community is in want of employment. At least that many also need medical and nutritional inspections. Also clothing, home repairs, dental care. In sum, the people of Bottom Creek need almost everything. When asked what emergency assistance she covets most today, one resident, Pat Church, says: "Lord, I don't even know where to begin listin'." Despite this want, however, and the critical condition of Bottom Creek and its citizenry, no small or large improvements are likely to result from either state or federal aid this year... or next, or the year after. "Money helps," explains local poverty worker Ergie Smith, "but it's not the real solution. All it does is make the poor more and more dependent. What we have to do is begin to make them less and less dependent." Smith's idea is not new. He's saying that Bottom Creek will improve only when poverty officials realize that residents must be motivated, not mothered. But how to motivate them? That's the rub. "Well," opines one Bottom Creeker, "some of them government people might start by comin' here and sittin' in our outhouses at midnight, when the temperature is 30 degrees. Then ask us what WE think should be done."

**Richfield Has Library Change**

Mrs. Clifford Dayley, a library board member, has been substitute librarian while Mrs. Faddis is in Boise because of family illness.

**Secret Service In Britain Is No Longer Such Top Secret**

**European Staff Correspondent - LONDON (NEA)**—Every American schoolboy knows who J. Edgar Hoover is the same as he knows that the Green Bay Packers don't really pack anything. But here the name of Sir Martin Fournival-Jones, Britain's top spy-catcher, was a carefully guarded secret until a magazine let the cat out of the bag recently. The magazine not only identified Fournival-Jones as the head of British Security (M15), but it named the head of British Intelligence (M16) as well. He is Sir Dick Goldsmith White. The article will probably result in an overhaul of voluntary press censorship system here whereby such information is kept from the public. In America things are different. Not only are J. Edgar Hoover and the FBI well-publicized, but even the Central Intelligence Agency has its own public relations officer and is listed in the Washington telephone book. The CIA head, Richard Helms, appears before congressional committees regularly and is even free to make public statements. Here you would search the London telephone book in vain for any listing of the Secret Intelligence Service (M16), which is the British counterpart of the CIA. As for Sir Dick Goldsmith White, he isn't even listed in Who's Who. He is the mysterious, faceless individual always referred to in James Bond books as "M." Although the government is hopping mad that the identity of its two top spy chiefs has been leaked, it is regarded in other quarters as a healthy sign. For the government's hush-hush policy has created an "almost pornographic public curiosity" concerning the intelligence services, as the Observer points out in a recent editorial. By contrast, the American policy is an open-handed one. In Washington, for example, any visitor can go on a conducted tour of FBI headquarters. A guided tour of M15 would be unthinkable in Britain. In the first place, no one is even supposed to know that M15 has headquarters in Curzon Street, Mayfair.

In the second place, the headquarters themselves have the sinister look of Hernando's Hideaway. Some of their windows are bricked up; Bib-muscled chaps in fawn-colored raincoats come and go. At British Intelligence (M16) headquarters in Queen Anne's Gate the muscles are not so noticeable. Fawn-colored raincoats, too, are in shorter supply. Until now the identities of Britain's security chiefs have been protected by voluntary

press censorship known as the D-Notice system. (A government committee issues D-Notices to newspapers listing subjects that should not be published in the national interest.) But now that system has broken down, and many newspapers feel that it should be scrapped altogether. The Observer feels that the government should take the public into its confidence: "Let them admit that we have our equivalents of the CIA and FBI. Let the chiefs of these services become publicly known personalities. And let these chiefs explain their function in broad terms... as they do in America." If this suggestion is followed, Sir Dick Goldsmith White will have to get used to being pointed out in restaurants and seeing his name in the gossip columns.

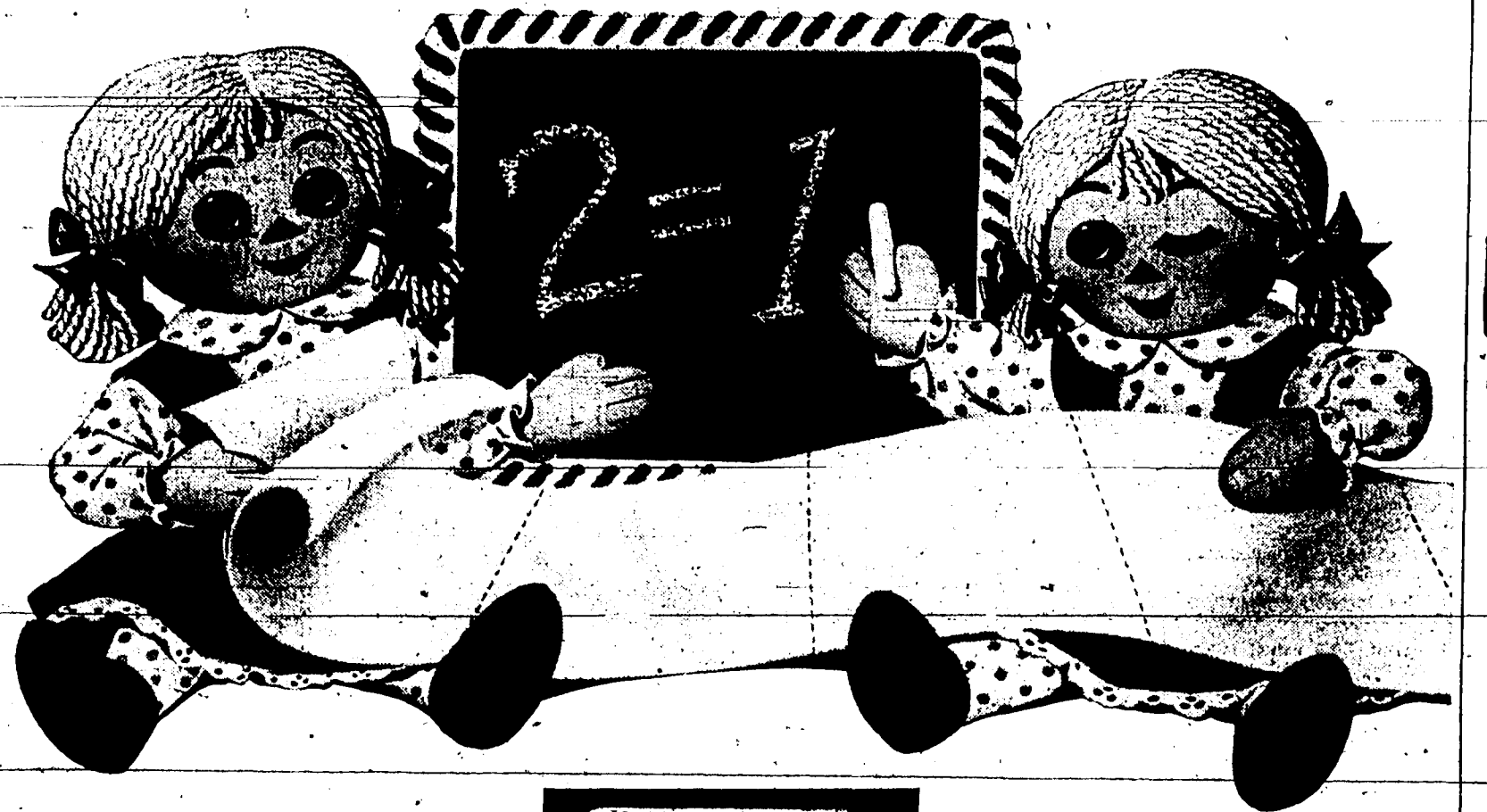
**Driver Hurt In 3-Truck Mishap Here**

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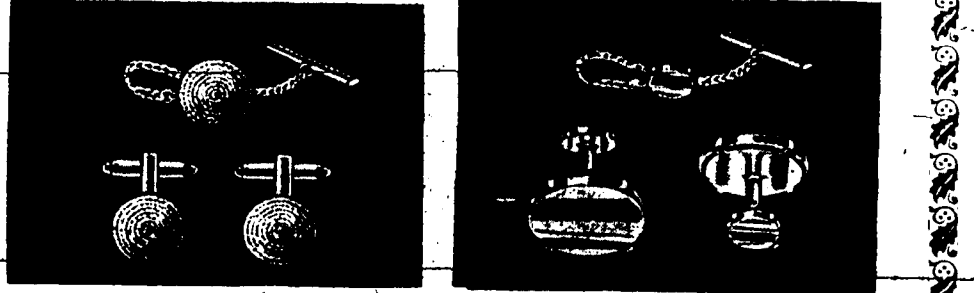


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
