New Year Brings 3 Babies

A seven-pound-five-and-three-quarter-ounce dark-haired daughter joined the family of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Humberger, 137 Moreland Ave., Tuesday morning and was the first baby born at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital in 1968.

Scheduled to be born Jan. 1, young Miss Humberger came into the world at 12:48 a.m. Tuesday, about three hours after her young mother entered the hospital.

The Humbergers, who have lived in Twin Falls for two years, have two sons, aged 4 and 11.

The youngest addition to the Humberger family has not yet been named. "My wife was thinking about calling her Dale Ann, but we haven't decided for sure," Mr. Humberger said.

Mr. Humberger is employed at Electric Equipment Co., 1850 N. Main St. Mrs. Humberger is a homemaker and is dressed in a Christmas stocking, a tradition at the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. The stockings are made by the hospital Guild.

During 1967, 766 babies were born at the hospital. Assistant administrator James Eason said the figure is low, adding that about 1,300 babies were born in 1940, the year of the baby boom after World War II.

The first baby of the year at Cassia Memorial Hospital was a daughter to Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Clark, 125 West 24th St., Burley. The girl, Karin Clark, was six pounds, two and one-half ounces and came into the world at 8:48 a.m. Monday, New Year's Day. It was the third child for the Clarks.

James Allan Rogers became the first 1968 baby at Gooding Memorial Hospital. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Rogers and was born at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday. The couple has a daughter, age 2 1/2, Little James, who weighed six pounds, 13 ounces when born.

Probe Continues In Shooting Here

Investigation continued Tuesday by Twin Falls city and county authorities in the early New Year's Day shooting that left a Twin Falls couple dead and a third man in critical condition in Magic Valley Memorial Hospital.

Police Chief Frank Barnett said his office is continuing to question several witnesses to the shooting of Kent Gordon Melles, 26, and his wife, Linda Melles, 27, and the wounding of Vernon Mort, 21, Hansen.

Chief Barnett said there were at least three witnesses to the shootings, and all indications pointed to a murder-suicide in the death of the Melles couple.

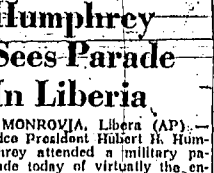

More than 4,000 men of the army, coast guard and national guard marched past the reviewing stand at Monrovia's Barclay Street. Humphrey led the parade marking Monday's inauguration of President William V. S. Tubman to his sixth successive term of office.

Dr. Barnard's Second Heart Transplant Seems Success

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP)—Dr. Bernard N. Barnard and a team of surgeons performed another heart transplant today, replacing the damaged heart of a 68-year-old Cape Town dentist with that of a man who collapsed and died from a brain hemorrhage.

Dr. Barnard said the new heart transplanted today started beating on its own after the operation. The patient's condition was described by Barnard as "very good."

Three Island State Park Land Purchased

Arthur Okun Is Chairman Of Council

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson today named Arthur M. Okun, a 39-year-old economist, to succeed Gardner Ackley as chairman of the council of economic advisers. Okun will be the youngest man ever to hold that post.

In other actions from his LBJ Ranch, the President signed four bills aimed at helping seafarers. He said the bills reflect small measures "a large concern for America's men at arms" and show America does not forget service in freedom's cause.

Johnson named Ackley Monday to be U.S. ambassador to Rome. The Texan White House said Okun, now a member of the three-man council of economic advisers, would move in to the \$30,000-a-year chairmanship after the Senate approves Ackley in his new post.

There was no announcement on who will fill the vacancy in the council.

1,800 Drug Addicts Riot, Burn Center

NORCO, Calif. (AP)—Some 1,800 drug addicts at the California Rehabilitation Center burned buildings and rioted for more than five hours this morning.

Officials at the neighboring Corona Fire Department reported four or five buildings burned, including the center's firehouse, a housing gardening center and a cafeteria. By 5 a.m. the fires were subsiding, but still burning.

At 10:30 a.m. business manager at the center, said he did not know what provoked the riot. Fire officials said the inmates threw rocks, bottles and other objects at them as they tried to battle the flames, and to escape, they entered the grounds.

The center is open to inmates sentenced to the minimum six-month confinement. The center is open 24 hours a day.

Transformer Blows Out, Cuts Power In Jerome

JEROME—A huge transformer in the Idaho Power Co. substation near here blew up Tuesday morning and left nearly half the city without power for at least an hour.

The cause of the transformer failure is not known, officials said, but no one was hurt when it blew up. Power in St. Benedict's Hospital and other critical places in the city was restored within minutes of the outage when main power lines were shut down.

The business district south of Main Street was affected most by the outage, and power to all city schools went out. Lights were flickered on in most schools shortly after the failure, but Washington School remained without power Tuesday afternoon.

School officials said they will transfer those students to other schools in order to finish the school day.

New CSI Courses Offered

Among new classes scheduled for the coming semester at the College of Southern Idaho are one in integrated humanities and another in beginning the family.

Both courses begin Jan. 15, with the humanities course concluding April 23 and the family course concluding April 9.

The integrated humanities course already has about 100 students registered, Dr. Donald Kelth, academic dean, said. The class will be lecture type and will touch on most phases of the humanities. It will feature a variety of subject matter, variety of instructors, no examination and no textbooks.

The family course will be limited to about 10 or 12 couples who are in their first few years of marriage. The course instructors will be used, with the course drawing on many areas people versed in specific categories.

A number of instructors will be clergymen, social workers, psychiatrists, gynecologists, pediatricians, bankers and insurance brokers.

Economics, religion and sex and interfaith marriages, finances, children, pregnancy, sex, marital "commitment" and the roles of partners in a modern marriage will be discussed in group discussion type classes.

Both courses are two credit. Beginning the Family meets from 8 to 10 p.m. on Mondays and Integrated Humanities also meets on Monday.

"Another new course will be an academic course in credit course on the livestock industry. It meets from 8 to 10 p.m. on Monday and Thursday.

Dr. Kelth said that other new courses, which may be of interest to specialized groups of people will be offered.

New Tax Takes Effect, Gasoline Prices Go Up

Gasoline and diesel fuel in the Twin Falls area will cost a penny a gallon more this year because of an Idaho tax hike which went into effect Monday.

The state tax is now seven cents a gallon, instead of six.

The tax increase is seen at service stations throughout the city, where prices are being raised. Several service stations were polled Tuesday.

The increase is due to a law passed by a special session of the Idaho Legislature earlier this year. The increase is expected to bring in about \$3.5 million this year.

Under the law, the increase will be taken off in 1969 unless the legislature votes to extend it.

The Idaho Department of Highways contended earlier this year that the money was needed to match federal highway money.

In Twin Falls, some station operators will ask 31.9 cents a gallon for regular and 36.9 cents a gallon for ethyl. However, most operators in major stations will be asking 33.9 cents a gallon for regular and 37.9 cents a gallon for ethyl.

The increase for each gallon is up to the individual operator, and prices do vary in the city.

Distributors are charging a penny more a gallon for the fuel, and most operators are raising their prices because of the extra charge. It was reported.

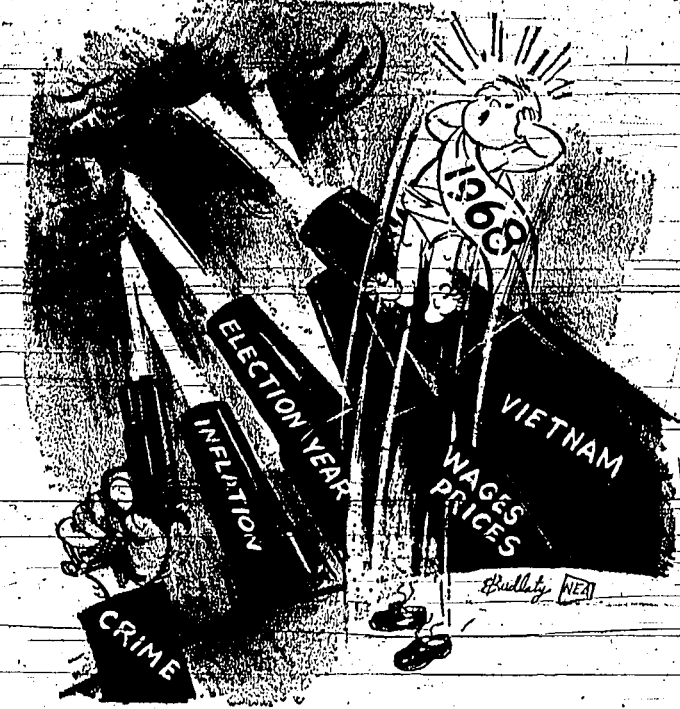

Exit 1967

The year just past saw no diminution in the popularity of that age-old and ultimate way of getting one's point across—the resort to force.

But compared to the terrible draft riots in New York in 1965, the recent miserable little demonstrations in that city looked like temperance society tea parties.

Consider 1967. The rights and wrongs of the Vietnam war were not so much debated as wrestled, with the biggest match of the year staged in the nation's capital.

Conspicuously absent from the scene in 1967 was any mass uprising among those of the public aligned on the other sides of the various issues, and resorting to the same tactics of civil lawlessness to express their opinion in return.

An outspoken and sometimes obnoxious student minority pulled at the universities as if it were engaged in the annual frosh-soph tug of war.

Much is made of the average American's desire to remain "uninvolved." Maybe this is not always something to be deprecated; maybe it is one reason why the excesses of the law have not been met with the excesses of the many.

But what is remarkable about these sundry protests is their one-sidedness and isolated effect.

With remarkable patience and growing understanding, most people are facing up to these new and threatening social developments. If there is any underlying general reaction, it is the realization that the root causes of our national ills must be discovered and corrected, not wished away.

Yes, platoons of police and national guardsmen were frequently called out—sometimes regiments and battalions—to do some pushing and prodding in the name of public order and sometimes swing clubs and toss tear gas bombs and sometimes shoot.

Besieged, plagued, assailed, cautious of the future, the overwhelming majority of Americans in 1968 will continue to stage a real demonstration of a free nation's ability to govern itself.

Varicose Veins

Q. I surface varicose veins are injected and there is still persistent pain, does that mean that the deep veins are involved? If so, would redness or swelling appear on the skin surface? In the deep veins, are varicose veins should be stripped or injected?

A. Persons with varicose veins may have some aching of the legs at night and moderate pain on pressure over the distended veins. If, after treatment of your varicose veins, you still have severe pain in your legs, there is other cause, such as arthritis, should be sought.

Q. My veins were stripped 13 years ago and my leg still swells several times a year. What can be done to prevent this, aside from wearing an elastic stocking?

A. Removal of the involved vein by stripping is a satisfactory treatment in most cases. If, after either injection or stripping, there is a recurrence, it sometimes happens, this does not mean that the veins originally involved have come back or that you have had a relapse. It means the development of new varicose veins.

Q. I have heard that if you have varicose veins or spider veins and rub them with vinegar twice a day, they will eventually disappear. Is this true?

A. No—not even if you rub them with vinegar four times a day.

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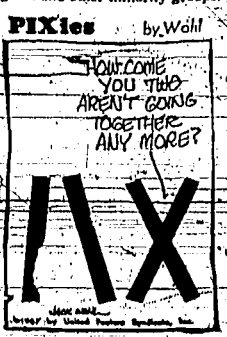

A significant improvement, Mr. Long said, is better party line facilities in rural areas.

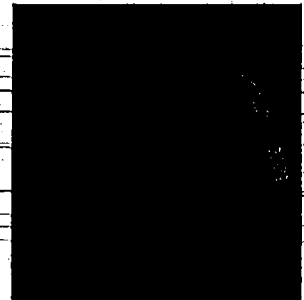

Counterfeit Ring Arrested By Vietnamese

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnamese national police said today they had arrested several Chinese counterfeiters and seized \$250,000 in fake U.S. dollars, thereby foiling what they called a Red Chinese attempt to destroy the economies of South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

Police said the counterfeiters, of Chinese descent, were operating in the black market on equipment to counterfeit the currencies of South Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.

Police reported they closed in on the counterfeiters last Thursday in Saigon, the Chinese section of the city, and seized a printing press, paper and ink and complete and incomplete \$5 bills. The counterfeiters' printing plates also were seized, they said.

Several persons, including one who fled to escape, were arrested, officials added, but police declined to disclose their names, saying the investigation was continuing. A police statement said, "In the present case, there undoubtedly will be death sentences given to the Chinese counterfeiters."

Police said they had been investigating for five months "an important clandestine economic and financial organization led directly by Communist authorities on the Chinese mainland, whose purpose was to counterfeit various marks in order to subvert the economies of many countries in Southeast Asia, and especially the economy of South Vietnam."

U.S. Treasury Department and Secret Service officials have here been investigating. As far as was known, none of the fake U.S. bills had gone into circulation.

Vietnamese Won't Renew Visa Of Newsweek Chief

SAIGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese government has refused to renew the visa of Newsweek magazine's Saigon bureau chief, Everett Martin, and told him to leave the country within seven days.

The South Vietnamese government has been at odds with Martin for months because of his "editorial" criticism of the South Vietnamese army.

It would be the first expulsion of an American newsmen from South Vietnam since 1962, when the late President John F. Kennedy expelled James Robinson of the National Broadcasting Co. and Francis Sullivan of Newsweek.

Australia Mother Sees Her Quints

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — The proud mother of Australia's first quint, 14-year-old Mary Brahman, saw them today for the second time since they were born Sunday morning.

Mrs. Brahman walked from her third-floor ward to take the elevator to the nursery on the fourth floor of Brisbane Women's hospital to see the mother and children are doing well and the crisis period is over.

The quintets were weighed today for the first time and they will be weighed every four days.

Columbus Agreement Is Win For NAACP

 NEW YORK (AP) — An agreement reached in Columbus, Ohio, guaranteeing 140 jobs for Negroes on Ohio State University construction projects looks like a clear-cut win for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

But to the NAACP staff members who negotiated it, the pact symbolizes the end of decades-long federal and state efforts to enforce anti-discrimination statutes, and shows that pressure must be applied relentlessly to get unions and builders.

"It is an indication of the failure of voluntary compliance," said Herbert Hill, national labor director for the NAACP.

"There is a federal executive order issued by President Johnson forbidding discrimination in all federally financed construction. The U.S. Division of Contract Compliance is a dead letter. They have never enforced it. They operate instead of voluntary compliance."

In Washington, the head of the division, Owen Killey, replied that federal funds for the Ohio State projects had been held up since last May.

"That was when U.S. District Judge Joseph P. Kenny ruled in suit brought by the NAACP that government funds may not be used on projects where there is racial discrimination in hiring."

The judge also held that the state had primary responsibility for requiring that such work forces be integrated, and that under his order the agreement was reached last Thursday, more than six months later.

Until last month, according to

Dr. David McConnell, a university biochemist who headed the NAACP negotiating team as labor chairman of the Columbus branch, the university had made no attempt to implement the pact.

McConnell, who is white, said negotiations with the NAACP began after he gained admittance to a Washington meeting of Health, Education and Welfare Department officials last Dec. 1 by convincing the federal government that the NAACP was a serious force.

At that meeting, he said, "We got some of the preliminary facts established. Namely, we held HEW as well as the state of Ohio responsible. Then HEW told the University they wouldn't let \$1 million in matching funds go unless they settled their piece with the NAACP."

"It was really a squeeze play between the federal government and the NAACP, and the federal government ran scared because it's an election year. We threatened to name them in a suit before the same court on the same issue covering the entire state of Ohio."

Director Killey of the HEW's Division of Contract Compliance confirmed the meeting with McConnell, but said that when the NAACP representative asked to be admitted, he was invited to sit and express his views. And, said Killey, the decision to withhold federal funds for the Ohio State projects was made last May, not at the December meeting.

In Columbus, the university's equal opportunity commission, headed by Dr. McConnell's alleged that the school hadn't tried to implement the court order.

Republicans Could Win Control Of Senate In 1968 Elections

WASHINGTON (AP) — The odds are heavily against it, but there is a possibility Republicans could gain control of the Senate in the 1968 elections.

Some party strategists argue this should become a priority GOP goal.

"The Republicans need 15 additional seats to gain a Senate majority for the first time since 1947. But most forecasters expect them to capture far fewer than 15 new seats."

The National Committee for an Effective Congress, a liberal-minded, nonpartisan group, considers a GOP gain of six seats to be "a prudent estimate at this time."

But one GOP official contends the Republicans could take control if the party's top figures in contested states would become Senate candidates.

"If the will is there, the power is there," he said. "Whether the vision is there, I don't know."

It would take an historic Republican landslide next November to produce the party turnover that would give the GOP a majority.

Here are the mathematics of the situation:

The terms of 31 senators expire next year. Twenty-three of them are Democrats, 11 Republicans.

There are now 64 Democratic senators and 36 Republicans.

Forty-one Democratic senators and 24 Republicans are serving terms which extend beyond the current 90th Congress.

This means the Democrats would need to win 10 of the seats contested in 1968 to hold clear control, while Republicans would have to perform the politically awesome task of winning 20.

A GOP victory of that magnitude is improbable. But one Republican professional contends the party could do it by putting some of its biggest names into Senate races next year.

For example, this party official said, the GOP would like to persuade such men as former Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton, to run for the Senate; Scranton has said he will not seek public office again. Washington-based Republicans believe he could capture the Senate seat now held by Democrat Joseph S. Clark.

In Ohio, the official said, Gov. James A. Rhodes would be a potent candidate for the Senate seat of Democrat Frank J. Lausche.

Oregon's Gov. Tom McCall could seek the post held by Sen. Wayne Morse, another Democrat, the official said, even though that might cost the GOP control of a state house.

But there is no evidence that the moon-the-party official mentioned would consider Senate races.

And the long-shot Republican task is more difficult because two GOP incumbents have announced they will not run for re-election.

Sen. Frank Carlson of Kansas and Sen. Burke F. Hickel of Iowa plan to retire after the current Congress ends.

Carlson probably could easily have won another term; the Iowa situation is not so clear. Dick P. Florsheim, a formidable challenger for the GOP seat.

Ex-Dodd Aide Writes About FBI Dealings

NEW YORK (AP) — James P. Boyd, former assistant of Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., has written that the FBI, in return for speeches praising the bureau and its chief, J. Edgar Hoover, made its agents available to Dodd as chauffeurs and private detectives.

In an article in the Jan. 13 issue of the Saturday Evening Post, Boyd says that when Dodd was traveling across the country "U.S. immigration officers and on occasion FBI agents who pressed into service as chauffeurs at various times."

"On at least one occasion," Boyd wrote, "FBI agents in New York City were detailed as chauffeurs to drive Dodd around on social calls. I know, too, that the FBI at times made its agents available to Dodd as private detectives, to fill members of his staff who have incurred his suspicion."

Alien Signup Is Urged For Buhi

BUHI — Alien registration month has been proclaimed by Reed, Maughan, retiring Buhi mayor.

All citizens, employees and officers of the city are asked to encourage every alien within the city to report his address at the nearest post office of Immigration and Naturalization Service offices during January. The proclamation is issued annually in compliance with the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952.

2 Congressmen Propose Meeting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two congressional aides proposed a convention of leading citizens from the 15 North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations to consider the "deepening international monetary crisis."

In an open letter to the governments of the NATO countries, Reps. Paul Findley, R-Ill., and Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz., said the convention "could seek agreement that the goal of the United Nations Federal Reserve Group serving all of its members."

Postponed

KETCHUM — The Ketchum Sun Valley Snowmobile Carnival originally scheduled for Jan. 13-14, has been postponed until Feb. 24-25, Max Peck, president of the Snowmobile Association, reports.

A presidential envoy in a whirlwind visit to London gave the British government a detailed explanation of Johnson's move to slash the dollar drain and then flew on to Bonn for talks with Willy Brandt, West German foreign minister.

U.S. Undersecretary of State Nicholas Katzenbach had arrived before dawn from Washington at the head of a mission sent to brief European governments on the implications of the monetary measures.

In the London stock market, shares of hotels and restaurants and other issues connected with tourists slumped sharply because of Johnson's efforts to curtail overseas travel by Americans.

In Paris the dollar rose 53 points to 4.014 francs and in London it rose 30 points to 2.40325 pounds.

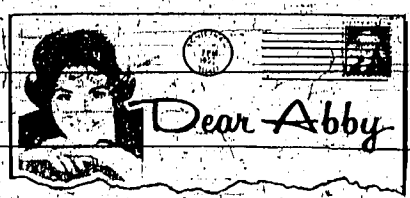

Bonds Issued By Albion College For Improvements

MAGIC VALLEY CHRISTIAN COLLEGE, Albion—Some \$100,000 of general obligation bonds have been issued by Magic Valley Christian College to improve the physical plant and provide additional operating funds.

Charles R. Loveland, business manager of the college, reports a good share of the bonds already have been sold to interested individuals. The college hopes to complete the sale of bonds by the end of January and Mr. Loveland notes the bonds make an excellent investment to friends of the institution.

The bonds are dated Nov. 1, 1967, and bear an annual interest of 7 per cent, payable semi-annually. Interest payments from Nov. 1, 1967, to Nov. 1, 1970, are \$100,000. The bonds are in denominations of \$100 and \$500.

Bonds will mature on Nov. 1, 1970, Nov. 1, 1973, or Nov. 1, 1975. The college has the right to retire the entire issue on or before Nov. 1, 1970, or the nearest paying date.

Volkswagen Introduces "Automatic Stick Shift"

Volkswagen is introducing a torque converter transmission which eliminates the clutch pedal and puts an end to gear changing in traffic yet allows shifting for those who want it.

Called the "Automatic Stick Shift," the new three-speed transmission is available on the VW "Beetle" and Karmann Ghia.

Deliveries of the new models to more than 1,000 Volkswagen dealerships in the U. S. began this week. The new transmission is optional extra cost.

The shift lever is on the floor and the shift pattern is similar to that of a standard three-speed transmission. However, only two of the three forward gears, Drive 1 and Drive 2, are used in normal driving. The remaining one is a low range gear, used for hard pulls with full loads.

Those who prefer to drive without any shifting may do so by using the Drive 2 position exclusively. Drive 1 which provides starting and passing for a top speed of about 55 miles per hour.

Moving the shift lever from Drive 1 to Drive 2 at about 30 miles an hour assures excellent performance in all speed ranges. Maintaining one in any gear, the car's top speed of about 75 miles per hour.

The torque converter in the new transmission system not only multiplies engine torque, but also permits the car to be brought to a stop in any gear without moving the shift lever. The converter, produced in Germany under license from Borg-Warner, has its own oil supply and there is an oil temperature indicator on the instrument panel.

The transmission's single-plate dry clutch is operated by vacuum and is automatically disengaged as soon as the shift lever is moved a fraction of an inch either forward or backward. A vacuum tank insures that shifting will take place even if vacuum in the engine in-

take manifold momentarily drops.

An soon as the shift lever is released by the driver, the clutch automatically re-engages. This aspect of re-engagement varies with engine load, assuring smooth operation under all driving conditions.

For those who prefer to run through the gears for top performance as well as for personal enjoyment, the transmission can be used as a stick shift gear with three speeds. Low range, Drive 1 and Drive 2, clutch operation is fully automatic and there is no clutch pedal. For fully loaded starting on steep grades, Low range is recommended. Low is also useful in providing an extra gear when on long downhill runs or on icy pavement.

Over-pull fuel consumption under normal driving conditions with the new transmission is about 25 miles per gallon, about two miles per gallon less than with the VW's standard conventional four-speed hand-shift transmission.

Mountain Scaling Team Snowbound

MOOSE, Wyo. (AP) — The 12 members of two assault teams planned to scale 13,764-foot Grand Teton Peak by "New Year's Day" foundered in a snowbound today by a they steel but 2,000 feet below summit, with hope of a winter conquest fading.

Park rangers at Moose reported a short radio conversation today with expedition leader Paul Petzold, 59, of Lander.

Petzold said prospects of a successful mid-winter assault on the famed peak "don't look too favorable on the basis of the present forecast."

The forecast is for poor weather — snowing but strong winds which has kept the group huddled together in a small hut since Saturday night.

Ranger Duane Graf said Petzold indicated that with the kind of a forecast, the group begins descent tomorrow.

If the climbers fall in the attempt to scale the north face of Grand Teton, it will mark the third straight attempt frustrated by the weather.

The expedition has three or four days of food remaining.

Ore-Ida Moyes Headquarters

ONTARIO, Ore. (AP) — Ore-Ida Foods, Inc., which produces frozen potato and other vegetable products, announced Tuesday it is moving its corporate headquarters from Ontario to Boise.

The firm, a wholly owned subsidiary of H. J. Heinz Co., Frank Armour Jr., chairman of Ore-Ida and vice chairman of Heinz, said plans call for completion of the move by late summer. He said a location in Boise has not yet been chosen.

Armour said space is not available at the Ontario plant to integrate all sales and marketing functions and it was decided Boise would be a better location for such an office.

In addition to its plant in Ontario, Ore-Ida has processing facilities at Burley and at Greenville, Mich.

Pope Names Non-Italian Clergymen

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI today appointed 34 non-Italian prelates and clergymen to policy-making and advisory positions in the Roman Curia.

The move was considered a major step in the pontiff's long-standing effort to internationalize the Roman Catholic Church's central administration, accused by progressive clerics of being dominated by Italian conservatives.

Vatican experts could not recall a larger group of foreigners appointed to the Curia at one time. In addition to the 34 foreign clerics, six Italians also were named.

The appointments were made to the Church's mission agency, called the Holy Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples, and to the top administrative body for religious orders, known as the Holy Congregation for the Religious.

Israel Exchanges 500 Prisoners

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israel repatriated about 500 Egyptian prisoners of war Monday, an army spokesman announced. Two were said to be high-ranking officers.

There had been no previous sizable prisoner exchanges between Israel and Egypt since the June war except for wounded men. Israel holds some 5,000 Egyptians; Egypt holds fewer than 20 Israelis.

Zar, manager of the Ponderosa Inn, said.

It was while playing the title role in "Finian's Rainbow," on Broadway that he first won national acclaim and he has appeared with "Death Valley Days," "My Three Sons," "State of the Union" and many other popular TV programs.

Constantine Says He Could Have Fought

NEW YORK (AP) — King Constantine of Greece, now an exile in Rome, says he could have made a fight of it against the military junta in Athens, but decided against it for fear of destroying his nation. But he said his effort was not a failure and produced some "positive results."

In a signed article in the current issue of Life, the King laments the failure of his attempted counter-coup against the junta to the lack of support from military units he had been sure would back him. He made his effort Dec. 13, and a day later fled the country.

"I realized," he wrote, "that to persist would have meant total civil strife and the destruction of the Greek armed forces — thousands of men — I still had the air force, the navy and some of the army units loyal to me and could have made a fight of it. This was not my goal. I wanted to build my country, not destroy it."

The King said he had not acted earlier against the junta, for fear of "unlimited bloodshed," but finally was compelled to act, his basic aim being to reshuffle the government and pave the way toward elections.

The council at its Saturday meeting will review work of a number of committees which were assigned study subjects by the 1967 session.

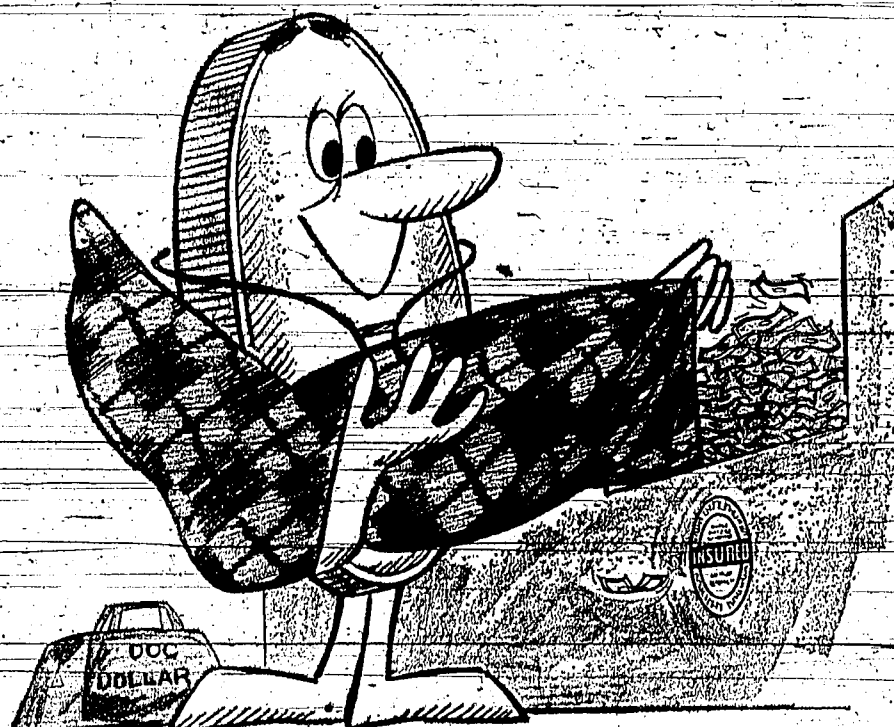
Legislative leaders are expected to meet with Gov. Don W. Samuelson to consider subjects to be presented to the special session of the legislature planned for late this month.

'Social Benefit' Enterprise Shows Huge Expansion Since 1937 Beginning

Editor's Note: This is the first of a series analyzing the changes currently being made in the Social Security and Medicare regulations.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The massive "social benefit" enterprise called "Social Security" has grown from slender beginnings in 1937 to a level where, in 1968, it expects to pay out \$25.2 billion to some 23.8 million Americans aged 65 and over. The outlay will rise, and go to more and more people as the years pass.

In late 1967, Congress enacted into law revisions of the 31-year-old system, which will provide for increased benefits for those to the elderly and others in the system's history.

The total will shoot up a record \$2.8 billion in 1968, and then rise in 1969 to a point \$3.6 billion above where the outlay would have been under the prior law.

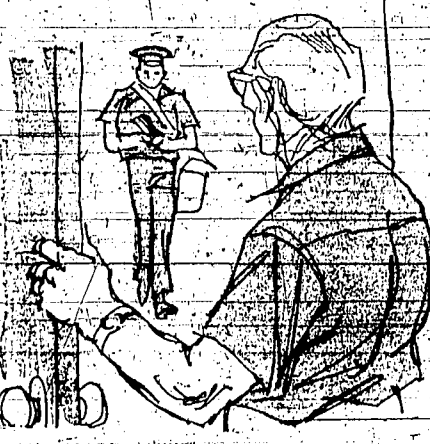
The average increase in benefits is in the range of 13 percent, but a worker around 50 who can expect to contribute many more years of taxes to the system can look ahead to benefits that will be 19 percent, and a worker 25 to 27 will ultimately get benefits 30 percent higher.

Later articles in this series will discuss in some detail the changes made in basic Social Security, and for most by far, their benefits are their major source.

But since younger retirees, survivors and disabled persons represent seven million of the total of beneficiaries, and many children are included, the program has "young dependents" often overlooked but deserving fuller examination in later articles.

As recently as 1959, only about a fourth of the Americans 65 and over were protected under Social Security. Today 85 percent are so covered, and other federal programs bring the percentage to 90. Coverage, obviously, is not far short of universal.

Of course none of this is the gift of providence. It has to be paid for—by you, the Social Security taxpayer; by your employer in matching payments; and by the government. Higher benefits are going to cost more taxes are going to rise, and that's another story "to be told here.



is figured that Social Security keeps more than 5.6 million aged poor folk out of real poverty.

Of the nearly one in every eight Americans who draw monthly Social Security benefits, just short of 17 million are 65 and over. About half of these people have no other regular income, and for most by far, their benefits are their major source.

But since younger retirees, survivors and disabled persons represent seven million of the total of beneficiaries, and many children are included, the program has "young dependents" often overlooked but deserving fuller examination in later articles.

These matters also will be more fully treated farther on in the series.

The Social Security system has a lot of critics today. The most common are those who argue that it is not a very good insurance program. (Actually it has been from the outset a blend of an insurance plan with citizen tax and a straight assistance program.)

Because Social Security payments for many Americans above poverty levels and we are in an era of "poverty fighting," the system is being attacked nowadays on a new count: for doing enough to combat poverty.

Taylor was appointed to the court in April, 1949, and since has been elected to three six-year terms. Smith was appointed in December, 1964, and has served two full elective terms.

Also scheduled for next Monday are the annual memorial services conducted by the Supreme Court to honor members of the bar who died during the past year.

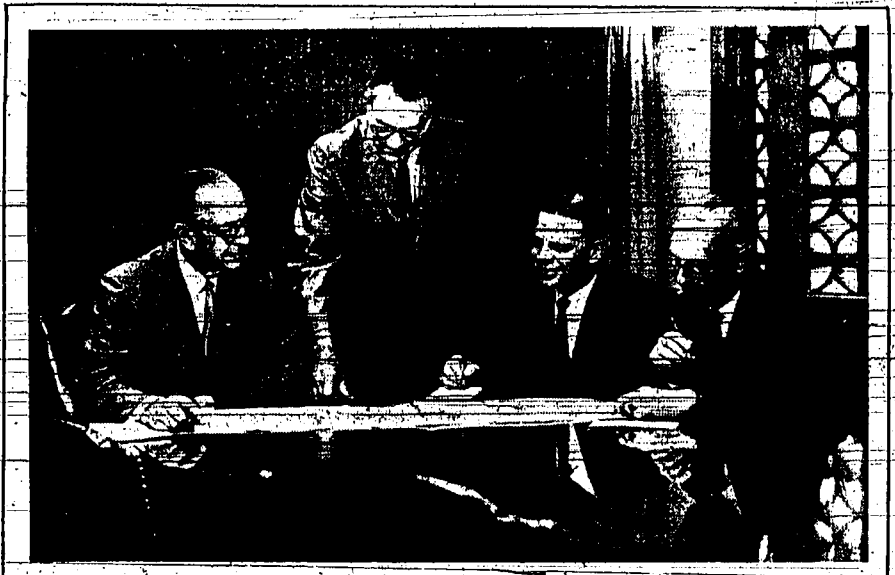

Governors Agree On Education Aid

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP)—Western governors generally agree the federal government will have to increase assistance to that state's higher education in the next 10 years, and preferably with non-farm-related grants.

Dr. Gene A. Budig, University of Nebraska, asked governors of Utah, Idaho, Colorado, California, Alaska, Oregon, Nevada, Washington and Arizona for their views on higher education.

Only Democratic Gov. Calvin Rampton of Utah said his state could advance in higher education without increased federal dollars. He said such an attempt would mean, however, "a strain on state resources."

Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan of California said he will seek financial solutions to the increasing cost through more than the more specific grants-in-aid approach presently used by the federal government.

Reagan said he favors block grants or federal tax credits.

Idaho's Republican Gov. Don Samuelson also advocated the non-specified aid, saying the state "know better where to apply educational funds."

Budig, who was chief aide to former Gov. Frank B. Morrison of Nebraska, said the governors generally favored increased federal aid for increased expenditures in higher education, particularly as compared to other state services.

He said most of the chief executives felt they should not become involved in the actual operation of the schools.

"Governors should not become involved in the internal academic affairs of the institutions, which are essentially the responsibility of the faculties and administration," Republican Gov. John Love of Colorado said.

Soviet Units Stationed In Mongolia

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet tank and anti-aircraft missile units have been stationed in Mongolia under a defense agreement intended to provide protection against Red China, informed sources said today.

The Red army combat units went into Mongolia last year in part to guard Soviet military buildings along the northern border of Communist China. China has asserted claims to adjacent parts of Soviet Siberia and to Mongolia, a Soviet satellite between Siberia and China.

Soviet officials reported here that Soviet combat troops had taken up stations in Mongolia during the previous few months. Details were not then available.

Other informants said today that the Soviet forces include both tank units and ground-to-air missile units. Neither the tanks nor the missiles were described as being among the most modern or advanced in the Red army.

Roads Slick From Rockies To Dixie

Freezing rain, drizzle, snow or sleet slicked highways from the northern Rockies in Dixie today as the piercing cold that numbed the Midwest spread through the East.

Another blast of frigid air moved down into the north-central states. Sub-zero readings were widespread.

Hazardous driving warnings were in effect for an 11-state area from Wyoming to North Carolina.

New England ushered in the new year with bitter cold temperatures. Readings dropped to 30 below zero in parts of northern New England and to zero to 15 below in southern sections.

New York's Erie snowstorm covered the region with an average of 4 inches of snow.

It was cold and clear in up-state New York. Early morning temperatures generally were well below zero. It was 20 below in Massena and in the St. Lawrence Valley.

The middle and western sections of Tennessee and the Cumberland Plateau area of eastern Tennessee had rough driving conditions with accumulated snowfall on top of frozen rain.

The United States has a huge surplus of confetti and streamers as New Year's celebrations, the world again tackles its besetting problems and renews its quest for the elusive goal of peace.

On the advent of 1968, statesmen, church leaders and world leaders round the world spoke of the urgent need for peace. But few, if any, seemed sure it would come in the 12 months ahead.

Pope Paul VI, Vatican City's pontiff, said in a prayerful appeal for peace that the world was "in a state of great confusion and disorder." He warned that "new terrible obstacles," especially in Vietnam, arise to complicate that question.

The world, he said, "feels a great temptation to relegate peace to the realm of utopianism. It is the duty of those who are called upon to lead men to the goal of peace to remain faithful to it." He said the world is "in a state of great confusion and disorder."

Q. You have stated, quite correctly, that when people own the securities from the company stock jointly the word "and" must appear between their names on the stock certificate.

For various complicated reasons the word "or" cannot be used between the names of the joint owners of jointly-owned stock. But had you better inform your readers that it is possible to have dividend checks from jointly-owned stocks arrive with the word "or" between the names.

Good thought! When that arrangement is made, either of the co-owners can endorse and cash the dividend checks. This comes in handy when one of the owners is sick, out of town or otherwise unavailable.

Actually, the dividend disbursing agent will make out the checks and mail them to anyone the registered owners of the stock request. You can instruct the bank to make the dividend checks out to just one of them. Or, owners of stock can direct that the dividend checks be made payable to some other person—perhaps a relative you are helping to support.

Don't overlook the fact that different convertibles have different conversion features. One company's convertible bonds might be swapped for common stock, while another's convertible might be swapped for a share of common stock. Check each one up with your broker before you even think about making a move.

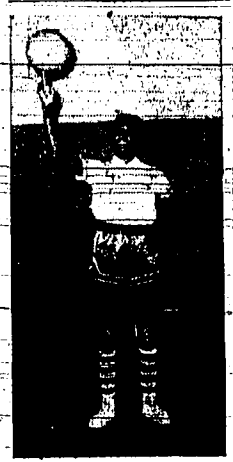

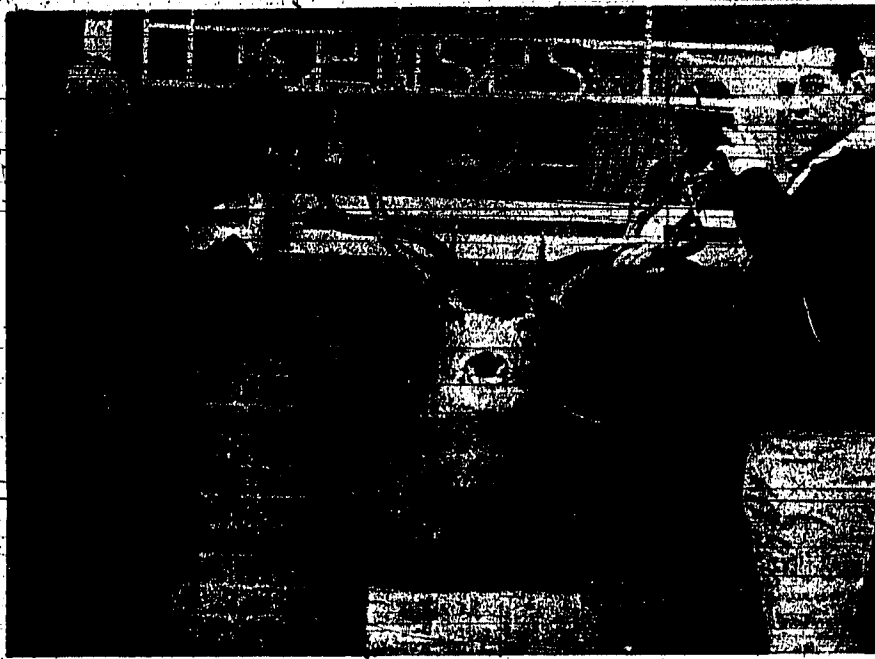

Blasts From Ammonia-Filled Cars Force Mass Evacuation

DUNREITH, Ind. (AP)—Thunderous explosions from ammonia-filled tanker cars after two freight trains crashed forced a mass evacuation Monday night and set fire to two busshouses and several homes.

All 236 residents of this east-central Indiana community were evacuated safely.

Three firemen and a policeman suffered minor injuries.

The Dunreith Canning Co. plant and a service station were destroyed by flames, which also spread to 10 houses. Some were empty migrant worker dwellings, officials said.

A westbound Pennsylvania Railroad train derailed and side-swiped an eastbound Pennsylvania freight, W.R. Sheets of Zionsville, spokesman on the westbound train, said he believed a rail broke under the 75th car of the westbound train. Flames broke out almost immediately, he said.

Officials quickly removed townspeople from the danger area of the chemical-laden tankers.

Mrs. Mabel McGuire, who lives a half block from the accident scene, said one explosion "looked like the whole world was on fire on Wasatch National Forest land in 1917."

The blast was felt in areas 25 miles away. A pilot said the explosions shook his small plane as he flew over Dunreith, which is about 35 miles east of Indianapolis.

Traffic was rerouted from busy U.S. 40 which parallels the Pennsylvania main line through Dunreith. A migrant, William Will of Cambridge City, said he heard the crash and saw several freight cars rolling down the highway toward him. "I whipped the car into an alley and got out of there," Will said.

Despite heat from the burning wreckage, crewmen were able to separate the front portion of the westbound train and move it out of town.

Roland Walls, assistant fire chief in Richmond, ordered firemen and volunteers to stay away from the burning wreckage until dawn. Walls said there were "four to five dangerous substances that could cause an explosive reaction with water."

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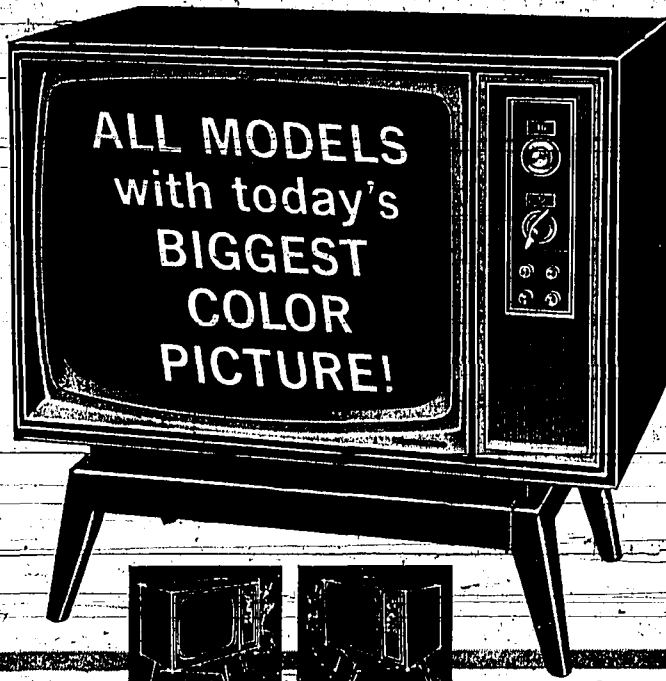
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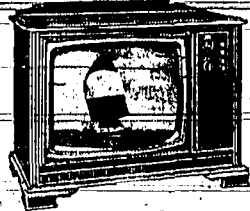
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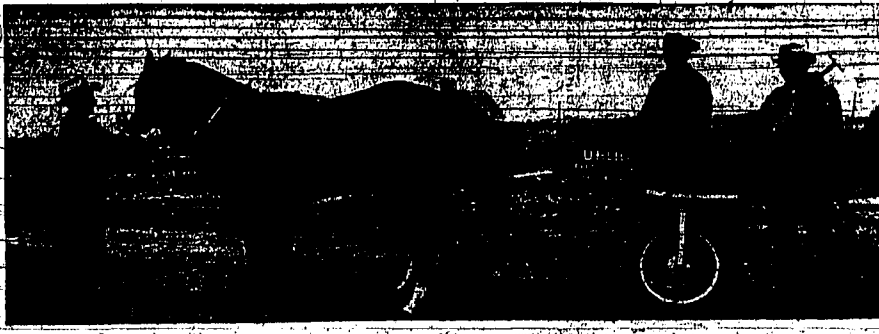

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U Thant May Call Special U.N. Meeting

Directors Of IT & T Vote Down Merger

NEW YORK (AP)—Directors of the International Telephone & Telegraph Corp. have voted unanimously to cancel the agreement for a \$2.8 billion merger with the American Broadcasting Companies Inc.

The proposed merger, which would have been the largest in broadcasting history, was fought by the Department of Justice on "antitrust" and other grounds.

The ITT directors voted Monday at an unusual New Year's Day meeting, only hours after the Dec. 31 deadline that had been set for either party to withdraw from the two-year-old merger agreement.

The directors cited long delays in obtaining final approval of the consolidation.

Leonard H. Goldenson, president of the American Broadcasting Companies Inc., said he regretted the ITT decision. He said that while the merger was pending, ABC's corporate hands were tied, but now it plans to move vigorously and forcefully to strengthen and expand our company's interests and growth.

Drug Addiction Is Horrible Fate That Users Face

many large cities in America, at almost any time, the screams of a young man or woman can be heard in the hollow corridors of a jail complex. The screams are not human. The sound is enough to send chills down your back. On investigating, one will find wretched forms kneeling in a jail cell. The form is of course human, but is it? It looks more like an animal being tortured. Sweat forms on the brow, the arms and legs twitch, the eyes roll back in the head, and there are the cramps.

These are cramps a swimmer has never experienced. These cramps rip from the inside and they throw the body into violent spasms. Backs have been broken, skulls fractured and the pain is severe.

It is hard enough, in fact, that the form once human will beg to die. The form will do any

thing to get an addict going through the ordeal. Heroin, cocaine, LSD, and other drugs. There is no reward, and its effects, produced by a dream-like state like LSD, are dangerous. But cocaine also is a dangerous drug.

Twin Falls Police Chief Frank Barnett told of an experience he had in Washington, D. C., recently. "I saw a cocaine addict. The man, stripped to his shorts and never having any scars in my life." The addict was appearing as a witness before several police department officials. "For some reason a cocaine addict feels like someone is crawling under his skin. He wants to cut it out, and will literally carve himself apart with a knife."

Marjuana, on the other hand, is a mild drug. Advocates of its use will say the drug does no harm to the body. The advocates are in error, or so noted

psychiatrists and physicians believe.

The trouble comes from lack of conclusive proof. Physicians do not have subjects who have used the drug over an extended period of time.

But marijuana has been used in Greece for the past 400 years, and physicians there have had ample time to make thorough studies. Their findings? Marijuana is highly dangerous.

It is believed the drug causes serious personality changes. It lowers moral inhibitions and causes physical damage to the brain, eyes, heart, lungs and liver.

A marijuana addict, according to Greek authorities, is one who smokes two (marijuana) reapers or cigarettes a day for two years.

At that time, defects in the eye and personality changes can be detected, medical reports state.

But these studies have been made in Greece. Physicians in

the United States are still pretty much in the dark about the effects of marijuana. Tests in this country are not extensive and do not cover the life span of an individual.

And widespread use of marijuana in America is a recent thing, most of it coming from the hippie movement.

There is evidence locally, that even middle-aged persons are getting marijuana and smoking it to get rid of after-work tensions.

Use of marijuana in this group is very limited, evidence indicates. But use does indicate a problem of the future. Marijuana may well take the place of the cocktail, although it may be many times more hazardous.

Ignorance and tension combine to create desire for the use of marijuana. LSD, other excitants, of course, for the more powerful drugs.

Sociologists commonly agree that extended use of a drug by an individual creates drug dependence, and, in turn, creates the desire in the individual for a more powerful kick. The end result is usually addiction or dependence on one of the hard drugs — heroin, cocaine, morphine.

An addict is a person to pity, and strangely enough, the addict is a person who feels sorry for himself. The addict is ashamed of his plight, and regrets the day he got started on the drug.

But to the addict, once hooked, there is no turning back. An addict, even cured, is scarred

to death of going back on the road of drug addiction. As a result, his life is not the same again. He is always ruled by the little white powder add what he can bring.

Addicts are generally weak persons, authorities report, that addiction is not limited to the class of personality. It can strike anyone.

And any place is becoming Idaho.

To cope with the problem, law enforcement officers are striking out with their strongest tool — information.

Narcotics information is being sent out from the state level by the Department of Pharmacy, and police officers, versed in narcotics use, are trying to get the message across to teenagers and adults alike.

Physicians are doing their part, school officials are helping.

Drug use in Idaho is a problem, of that there is no doubt. How widespread in anyone's guess. But efforts are being made to find out how widespread.

With the information being gathered, it is law enforcement's hope that tough, strong and intelligent narcotics laws can be drafted at the next meeting.

New Yorkers Have Subway Bus Service

NEW YORK (AP)—The first regular work day of the new year was a happy one for New Yorkers today. They had subway and bus service after weeks of worry about the threat of a transit strike.

As a bonus, they had word from Mayor John V. Lindsay that the Transit Authority said its contract settlement with two unions Monday would not cause a strike in the near future.

The fare had gone up 5 cents as a result of the settlement that ended the 12-day subway and bus strike which started New Year's Day two years ago.

The Transit Authority and two unions representing its employees reached agreement on new two-year contracts shortly before 7 a.m. Monday. The original strike deadline of 5 a.m. had been extended two hours as 48 hours of almost continuous bargaining neared a climax.

The new agreements are subject to ratification by the members of the AFL-CIO Transport Workers Union (TWU), which represents 36,000 transit employees, and the AFL-CIO Amalgamated Transit Union, which represents 12,000 others.

A major feature of the settlement will permit an employee to retire at half pay after 30 years of service if he has reached 50 years of age. The TWU had fought for retirement at half pay after 20 years without any age provision.

The settlement also provides an immediate 5 per cent wage increase and a 6 per cent increase on July 1, 1969. The TWU had fought for an across-the-board wage increase of 30 per cent. Current wages range from \$3.18 to \$4.16 an hour.
