JEROME—The parents of the Vancouver, Wash., girl who was killed in a one-car accident on Interstate 80 near Jerome Friday, are still in St. Benedict's Hospital here, but all the four surviving children have been discharged. Attendants said Wednesday that Mr. and Mrs. William M. Root, who were moving with their five children from Vancouver, B.C., to Salt Lake City when the right rear tire of their Chevrolet stationwagon blew, are in fairly good condition. Joan Root, 16, and Mary, 6, both have been discharged. The two other children, Theresa, 7, and David, 4, are still in hospital for treatment for minor injuries and released at the time of the accident. They are staying with a local family. Killed in the crash was Kathy Root, 13. The family vehicle went down an embankment and landed upside down in the median strip between the two lanes of the interstate.

## December Weather Summary

December was a cold and dry month in Southcentral Idaho valleys. Records kept at the Twin Falls Entomology Laboratory show this December to be the coldest in the month since the first of December, 1849. In Magic Valley mean monthly temperature ranged from 21.7 degrees at Gooding to 25.8 at Twin Falls. These mean temperatures were from 5.8 to 7.9 degrees below long term normals for reporting points in Magic Valley in Camas Prairie and the Snake River Valley. Temperatures averaged around 7 to 9 degrees below normal. Coldest nighttime temperatures occurred around mid-month—below zero readings were common in the Snake River Valley. Precipitation was below normal in all of the southcentral area for the month of December. Monthly totals ranged from 35 of an inch at Burley to 56 of an inch at Gooding and 57

# Governor Surveys Matters That Might Come Before Legislature

BY EARLE L. JESTER BOISE (AP) — Gov. Don W. Samuelson said today he has asked all state agencies to advise him this week of anything they think requires prompt action by the legislature.

The information, he told his news conference, will help him provide the financing, repayment of the deficiency warrants might wait until the regular legislative session.

If the special session is decided upon, Samuelson said, probably will be about Jan. 22. The governor said he hopes it will run no more than five days.

(Continued From Page One) to be considered, he said, he felt a young doctor who has not yet established a practice might be willing to accept such an assignment for a year or so and come then be replaced by another young doctor.

This, he explained, would involve a doctor on a temporary physical only when the resident doctor had a night off. County officials, the sheriff said, agreed to propose such a system to hospital board members.

Sheriff Corder added that he believed any law enforcement officer should be willing to give any assistance possible when a life is at stake.

Police Chief Frank Barneff said there have been other instances of long delays in obtaining the services of a doctor on an emergency call at the hospital. He said county officers reported the New Year holiday involved "well over an hour."

Dr. Thad Scholer, a physician and surgeon and the county coroner, said he was at the hospital a few minutes after the shooting and saw the injured, pending arrival of another physician.

He said autopsies performed following the deaths indicated the Melles died at the scene of the shooting from a bullet wound in the chest. Mr. Melles, he said, also died of a bullet wound and from internal bleeding from the lung which was punctured by the bullet.

Efforts were made to obtain a child, he said, but the only such specialist available was in Ketchum and could not arrive before the woman died.

## Salmon Tract Snow Pack Is Under Normal

The snow pack depth on the Rosser-Salmon Tract Watershed is below normal, according to Glenn Nelson, chairman of the Twin Falls Soil District board of supervisors.

Mr. Nelson said although the depth of the snow pack is low, the water content generally is about normal because of the high moisture content.

He added that the soil conditions were very dry the past couple of months and the soil moisture at lower elevations is improving and at higher elevations it has improved slightly.

The snow depth and water content were measured recently by the Soil Conservation Service.

The Jan. 1 survey shows that Magic Mountain had 13.3 inches of snow, 5.7 inches and 1.1 inches of water content.

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## REK Pledges

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., says this year's Democratic nominee will be President Johnson and he expects to campaign for him.

At an airport news conference Tuesday night, Kennedy said the survey was taken by former Vice President Richard Nixon who would help the Democrats whereas the choice of New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller would make the campaign difficult for the Democrats.

Kennedy declined to answer questions about possible effects on the election of the Vietnam War or Negro ghetto conditions.

Chairman of the Senate subcommittee on Indian Education, Kennedy left for his home today for the Kashish Point 300 miles north of here.

He planned to return Thursday to open hearings at the American Indian Center in San Francisco.

"The American Indian is truly the forgotten child of the United States," he said. "Of all our failures in meeting our responsibilities to him, perhaps the most serious is our failure to provide him with the education opportunities he needs to reach a level of normal and economic life."

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP) — The decomposed body of a man found in the Clearwater River near Lewiston was identified today as that of Sylvester Fanning, 48, a Lewiston truck driver.

Fanning reportedly drowned on Christmas Day in 1964. The body was identified through dental work.

## Subzero-Cold Stings Vast Part Of U.S.

Subzero cold stung a vast stretch of the country from the Rockies to New England today while snow, sleet and freezing rain, hobbled motorists from Texas to New York.

The mercury tumbled to 20 below zero at Hibbing, Minn., as the latest in a series of Arctic invasions, that began before Christmas, settled deep in the midcontinent. Denver registered 4 below before dawn and it was 7 above zero at Kansas City.

The Weather Bureau had indicated Tuesday night that readings of zero or below could be expected in parts of 23 states.

Heavy snow, sleet and freezing rain, hobbled motorists from Texas to New York.

The storm of ice which hit much of the region Tuesday and continued today, closed numerous schools in Arkansas; Kentucky and Tennessee. Scores of traffic accidents were reported and there were many reports of motorists being stranded on Tennessee's hilly roads.

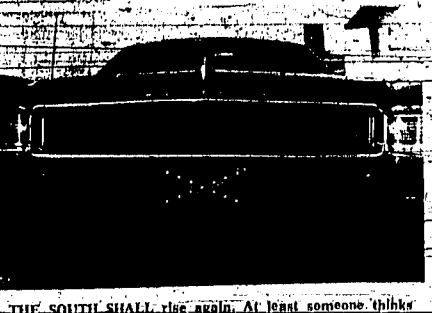

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### Cuban Motorists Line Up For Coupons To Purchase Gas

HAVANA (AP) — Cuban motorists lined up today for coupons to buy 8 to 25 gallons of gasoline a month after Prime Minister Fidel Castro ordered rationing on the ninth anniversary of the victory of his revolution.

In a speech at the big anniversary celebration in Havana Tuesday, Castro said the rationing was needed to conserve fuel supplies from the Soviet Union, he said his Communist government was forced to dip into the armed forces fuel reserves in 1967.

For the first time on such an occasion during his regime, Castro avoided the expense of parading tanks and rockets the Soviet Union has furnished him, Castro argued. Castro's speech through Havana's Revolutionary Plaza.

Within hours afterwards lines began forming for gasoline coupons being distributed at neighborhood offices of the Committee for the Defense of the Revolution. The amount of the ration depends on the size of the car, with Ford and Chevrolet in the 10-15 250-horsepower range allotted 20 gallons a month.

The total number of automobiles in Cuba was not made public, but Castro said in his speech it had been about 300,000 and was diminishing.

Havana Radio said government rationing also would be subject to fuel controls. Government vehicles were put on the coupon purchase system last October, but this was described as a move to keep government employees from using their private cars.

Castro said since his forces The prime minister boasted that his government is "at its highest point" but warned that 1968 will be "one of the hardest years of the revolution" and the public must make a major effort.

## Two Opinions

Two recent statements on the Vietnam war could hardly have come from two more prestigious sources, nor could they have expressed two more apparently opposite viewpoints. First, Gen. David M. Shoup, retired commandant of the Marine Corps, disputed President Johnson's contention that the war is vital to long-range U.S. security. It is really a civil war, he said, between "those crooks in Saigon" and Vietnamese nationalists seeking a better life. Communists in Asia do no threat to the United States.

Militarily, Shoup is justified in blasting as "pure, unadulterated poppycock" the simplistic, knee-jerk notion that the war in Vietnam is a prelude to the Communists "crawling up the beaches of Los Angeles." The forces of world communism are not going to island-hop across the Pacific to invade the United States. But the fact that an outright attack on the United States would bring reciprocal disaster to the Communists does not mean that they have given up hopes of making their ideology prevail throughout the world. There are other ways to achieve this, and the gradual absorption of the weak and unstable nations of the "third world" is one of them.

The general and the professors are not too far apart on another point. The war in Vietnam is very much a civil war, as Shoup says (although it is also more than that), and the search for a better life is very much involved. So he would undoubtedly agree with the professors when they urge more reliance on Asian leaders and Asian peoples for the solution of their own problems.

Again, when the professors urge more emphasis on "seize-and-hold" operations and less "search-and-destroy," they are stating a corollary to the general's contention that we will never win a military victory over North Vietnam unless we are willing "to commit genocide on that poor little country."

The general has spoken bluntly and simply, the professors in more measured terms, buttressed by careful logic. As two extreme points of view of an immensely complicated situation, they may help us arrive a little closer to the central truth that underlies both of them.

Hard upon this came a warning from 14 scholars specializing in Asian affairs that the stakes in South Vietnam "go far beyond that nation" and that a Communist victory there could invite larger and more costly wars. Among the experts were such academic luminaries as Edwin O. Reischauer, Harvard professor and former ambassador to Japan, and A. Doak Barnett of Columbia University.

U.S. involvement in Southeast Asia, they believe, "has bought time for some 200 million people to develop" without being ceaselessly confronted with internal-external threats from communism.

A Communist victory in Vietnam, they claim, would encourage those forces that believe violence is the best way of effecting change, would endanger chances for political stability in Southeast Asia, damage U.S. credibility and adversely affect the morale and politics of this country's Asian allies and the neutral nations.

What makes the whole Vietnamese problem so confusing is that both of these viewpoints are essentially right. A professional soldier, who knows what can and cannot be done

## Greek Crisis

For a small nation with a population of 8 1/2 million, there seems to be an inordinate amount of concern about what happens to Greece.

Why should it really matter whether Greece has a dictatorship of the right or a dictatorship of the left or a constitutional monarchy or just wittowans among in political anarchy?

The country has fewer people than New York City, fewer than the State of Ohio. Its national budget is smaller than that of many of our states.

The political situation in New York or Ohio has little bearing on world affairs. Why should the situation in Greece worry a nation like the United States, which is 70 times as large.

It is because a city or a state, no matter how large, are but parts of an even larger whole, a whole ruled by one law and one government. A sovereign nation, no matter how small, is still a sovereign nation. The larger whole of which it is a part is an ununited jumble of rival states and shifting alliances, more or less

split down the middle by two major ideologies.

The competition by the two giant leaders of each half of this whole for the allegiance, or at least the friendly neutrality, of the smaller parts thus gives the latter a strategic weight and leverage far out of proportion to their actual size or strength.

As the world is constructed today, the fall of Greece to communism would be a grave breach of the dike that has held in Europe since the late 1940s. Yet a fascist regime in that country, while staunchly anti-Communist, is a defeat for the very way of life and government the dike was intended to preserve. Add to this the continuing threat of war between Greece and Turkey, another vital stone in the Western Alliance.

It will not be until the world is somehow fashioned into a unified whole, in which all nations co-operate in pursuing goals of common interest, that a political upheaval in one part of the world can be looked upon as a purely local tragedy and nothing more.

WASHINGTON—Except as a passing commentary on the self-serving psychology of the Saigon regime, the utterances of South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu are meaningless in life maneuverings to negotiate an end to the Vietnam war.

Official Washington's viewpoint is that formation of a coalition government with elements of the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front is the only way to get peace. From here on, every American effort will be directed toward working out that formula.

There will be the usual backing and filling characteristics of political diplomats at work, and with Lyndon Johnson running the show these exercises in glum-throky will be particularly in evidence. From this time,

as the exigencies of international politicking demand, the administration will vary the emphasis on "the formula" and perhaps even shelve it temporarily. But Saigon has been told in the clearest of language that eventually there must be a deal with the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front.

President Thieu has been assured by Johnson that the United States will have cautiously,

with due regard for Thieu's domestic political problem.

The simplest common sense, since Thieu's principal support flows from the South Vietnamese military, which is opposed to any deal with the Viet Cong. Besides, Washington cannot treat Saigon too cavalierly. It has made a huge investment in South Vietnam and cannot run the risk of having that investment imperiled by the overthrow of the Thieu regime.

As one State Department source put it: "Thieu needs us to stay in power, but we need him, too. The success of any deal with the NLF will depend on the capacity and competence of the Thieu government to battle it out with the enemy at the peace table."

That is why Washington is inclined to point out that there is "nothing new" in Johnson's campaign for talks between Saigon and the NLF. It is part of a continuing effort to give the impression that the Thieu government is making no concessions, but that Johnson is merely restating principles agreed upon long ago by Washington and Saigon. But there is, in fact, something quite new. Until last week, Johnson had hesitated publicly to endorse such talks.

The tortuous strategy of the Johnson Administration is per-

haps best illustrated by the State Department's gingerly handling of Vice President Humphrey's Dec. 7 radio remarks that the U.S. would not necessarily reject inclusion of "non-Communist" members of the NLF in some further South Vietnamese government. The "non-Communist" adjective was merely a bit of necessary nonsense, since no NLF leaders of stature are "non-Communist," and therefore Humphrey's statement went beyond anything the administration had said on the record.

But the State Department hastily assured the Saigon government that it opposes the "non-Communist" position of any coalition government. Sure it does. Lyndon Johnson is not about to offer the world the spectacle of a brutal Uncle Sam "imposing" anything on little South Vietnam. Such a coalition would not be "imposed," but would be the result of private negotiations between Washington and Saigon in which Washington would use its muscle with all discretion.

Johnson is pleased to note that the excesses of some anti-war protesters has given his Vietnam policy added support. But he knows that what every body wants is an end to the war. And since it has been decided at the highest levels that this can be accomplished only by dealing with the NLF, that is the way it is going to be.

On top of that, I could, as many columnists do, fill up my column with letters from readers. I subscribed to this approach, not assured that my original premise was wrong, but I accepted the challenge because, at that time, there were so few conservative columnists being published that there were still at best, but they number has been added to by others to the end that conservatism is receiving almost equal billing with the liberal writers who have for so long dominated the editorial pages of our country's newspapers.

This is one reason that I have no hesitancy in announcing that my column will not appear after today, but it is not the only reason. I have become more active

conservative bent, both old and new, my gratitude for their friendship and ability to be willing to expose the weaknesses and mistakes of the liberal approach.

## D-C Operation

Many women are advised each year to have a D and C. This is the operation in which the uterine cervix is dilated (D) and the uterine lining is scraped with a curette (C). It is a simple operation that requires only a few minutes but it should be performed in a hospital to insure aseptic conditions. The anesthetic is usually the type that can be injected into a vein. The operation is done chiefly to establish a diagnosis but it may be curative. Following the operation, there is usually no pain but rather a dull heaviness in the pelvis similar to the feeling associated with menstruation.

The scrapings are examined under a microscope just as are the more common Pap smears. The operation is performed chiefly on women who have bleeding or spotting from the uterus after the menopause. When the cause is a polyp or a cancerous cervical stage, the operation is curative. In younger women a D and C may be done to establish a diagnosis of endometritis or tuberculosis of the uterus.

Dilation of the cervix in younger women is often all that

is needed to relieve painful menstrual periods. When a woman has a miscarriage, a D and C is often necessary to stop the bleeding.

If every woman who has uterine bleeding after the menopause would have a D and C, many more uterine cancers would be discovered in their early stages than is now the case. This could mean the prompt removal of the tumor and the saving of many lives. In these cases where examination of the scrapings reveals a cancer, the resulting peace of mind would make the operation worth while.

Q. My son is taking Maalox for muscle pain. Does it have any side effects? Is liver extract a form of iron?

A. Morphine, barbiturates, atropine, nuxvomine, insulin, and headache. It is more expensive than aspirin but is not believed to be any more effective in relieving pain. Although whole body iron is iron, liver extract is a good source of this element. Liver extract and iron are both used in combating some forms of anemia.

## Parents Right?

WASHINGTON (NEA)—If a four-year study of Stanford and University of California students is correct, this student generation does a great deal of worrying.

A third of the seniors at the two schools were questioned on how often they have felt depressed in the past few years. Half the senior men and two-thirds of the senior women reported periods of depression as occurring an astounding "few times a week" to "a few times a month."

Something around three-fourths of the students said that in their senior year they had felt physically out of sorts between once and five times a month on the average.

The meaning of this meaning the years after 50, looked pretty bleak. Between a quarter and a third of the senior students said they believed that the people are happiest during their first six years of life and a third thought the happiest time was from 25 to 35. Only one out of seven chose the years after 35. Less than 3 per cent opted for any time after 50.

Most of the senior students questioned seemed to feel they got more out of the assignments they did from their professors, their studies or their textbooks.

In fact, the survey found evidence that college has less impact on students' intellectual development than on their social development. About one senior student out of seven believed he had "increased intellectual activity and curiosity" as a result of his four years in college. The most often mentioned changes were "more self-confidence, independence and more stability."

The single most meaningful experience of the college years most often checked was "love, marriage or conjugal family." Between half and two-thirds of the women seniors and 30 per cent of the senior men thought that close relationships with friends of the opposite sex had done a great deal to change them. A third of the men and

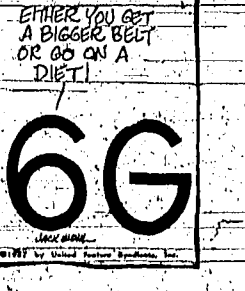
a third to a half of the women seniors thought that close relations with friends of the same sex had done much to change them.

By contrast, only about a fourth of the students felt that ideas presented in courses of study by teachers had had "much influence in causing the change that had taken place in their way of thinking or acting in the four years of college. Half thought the teachers and courses had had a "moderate" influence.

Looking at the changes students saw in themselves from another viewpoint, the seniors reported that being away from home had had considerable influence. One of the major factors causing them to change since their freshman year, about half the seniors felt was "conflict in social problems and conflicts in relationships."

Apparently most of the students had not turned to their professors for solutions to these problems and conflicts. Despite this inner conflict somewhat over half the seniors believed that "in the main" they should be right about things.

This after all, is quite a compliment for parents in this day, and age.

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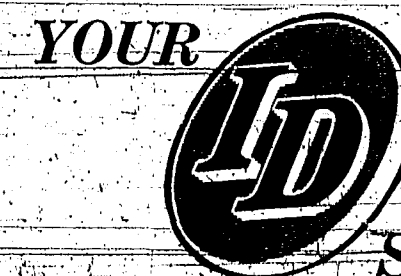

### Former U.S. Hospitality Aide Dies

# Professor Thompson Claims Three Men Fired In Kennedy's Assassination



"Dad, I've decided what I want to do. I want to be a DRUG-gist!"

LOS ANGELES—(NEA)—Think Thompson may be helping America's "reconstruction," but at the expense of his own.

Thompson—John is his real name—is a philosophy professor with an admitted obsession. He is obsessed about the assassination of President Kennedy and his devotion to that subject has culminated in his recently published book, "Six Seconds in Dallas."

He thinks America is collectively neurotic about the assassination and the concern over whether or not the Warren Commission fingered the right man in Lee Harvey Oswald. Perhaps his book will help, but meanwhile Thompson is developing a few neuroses of his own.

"Doing the book," he says, "was fascinating for me up to a point."

That point was when the lawsuits began rolling in. The biggest was filed by Time, Inc., claiming infringement of copyright. Thompson brags much of his contention that the killing

was the work of three assassins on the famous Zapruder home movie of the crime which is owned by Life Magazine. When Time, Inc., Life's parent organization, would not give him permission to publish stills from the Zapruder film, Thompson had sketches made from the film. Time, Inc., objects.

"It looks now," Thompson says, "as though I'll be hiring 18 lawyers and will have to spend the next three years in court."

This displeases him. He wants to get back to the academic and philosophic life, to his classes at Harvard College in Pennsylvania, to his studies.

"I have other work to do," he says. "I'm involved in the study of Nietzsche and 19th-century European philosophers."

It's a long way from 19th-century European philosophy to 20th-century political assassinations, but Thompson became interested in the case immediately. He began clipping out newspapers, reading, studying, pictures, thinking.

"At first it was curiosity," he says. "Then it became fascination. Finally, it was an obsession."

His work, one of several which have disputed the Warren Commission findings, is marked by its scholarly, low-key style. Thompson fully believes that three men did the killing.

"I'm sure," he says, "that 50 years from now it will be accepted that President Kennedy and Gov. Connally were fired on by three gunmen from three different locations."

Was Oswald one of the three? "That's one thing I cannot determine to my own satisfaction. There seems to be an equal amount of evidence on both sides."

Will we ever know for certain what happened that day in Dallas? "I think that a close examination of all the films will lead us to know how it was done. Yes. But who did it and why? It is extremely doubtful if we will ever know."

## Special Tax Rules Are Set In Case Of Sickness

Some, or all, of the wages or salary you received from your employer while you were absent from work because of sickness or injury may be exempt from tax. The amount depends upon the length of your absence and the percentage of normal pay received.

Let's consider first the income earner who in 1967 received more than 75 per cent of his regular pay (it could have been full salary).

In his case, sick pay exclusion begins after a 30-day waiting period. After the 30-day period the sick pay exclusion is the full wage payment up to a weekly maximum of \$100.

For periods of less than a full week compute the exclusion on this basis: If you normally work a five-day week the maximum daily exclusion is \$20 or actual pay, whichever is lesser; for a six-day week the lesser of \$16.67 a day or actual pay.

Entirely different rules apply when sick pay is on the basis of 75 per cent or less of regular pay.

In such cases the waiting period is reduced to seven calendar days. Thereafter, the sick pay exclusion is on the basis of actual pay received or 75 a week,

# You don't have to wait six months to receive

whichever is lesser. If the employee on such a reduced income basis during illness or injury is hospitalized at least one day his exclusion begins from the first day of such enforced absence.

After the first 30 days his exclusion goes up to the weekly maximum of \$100 or actual pay, whichever is lesser.

This sick pay exclusion is reported on Page 2 of Form 1040 under the heading, "Adjustments to Income."

Whenever such an exclusion is claimed Form 244, available from IRS, or some other suitable statement must be attached to the return.

The statement should show the reason for absence, first day away from work, date returned to work, your regular salary, salary or wages paid during your absence and the percentage that constitutes normal pay.

Remember, that in order to claim a sick pay exclusion you must have been paid by your employer during the period of enforced absence from work and the amount so paid must have been included in your gross earnings as shown on your W-2 slip.

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**Mrs. Brooks Lashes Out At President**

Mrs. Mary Brooks, Idaho state senator from the 21st district, and high ranking National Republican official, leveled criticism Tuesday at President Johnson's handling of Interstate Highway Funds.

The President's suggested cut of highway funds by some \$600 million would pose a great threat to western states, with low population and "wide" open spaces, she said.

She charged that while highway funds are part of federal expenditures in the proposed "unified" budget and thus are held back from highway spending, they simply become frozen funds and produce an artificial reduction in the President's budget deficit.

### Frustrated Bandit In Denver Leads Officers On Long Chase

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — Threatening death to seven hostages — "I'll shoot them one at a time if I have to" — a frustrated bandit led officers on an all-day, 250-mile chase Monday, then surrendered to a captive police sergeant when his commandeered hospital van ran out of gasoline.

Daniel Williams, 26, of Denver, was jailed for investigation of armed robbery, kidnapping and assault with a deadly weapon. His roommate, Louis Maple, 23, was arrested at the scene of a bank robbery in a supermarket holdup that launched the drama. He was held for investigation of armed robbery.

Store employees were getting ready to open when the two gunmen slipped in behind a delivery man. They ordered everyone into the basement but one employee slipped away and signaled their predicament to two passing girls who notified police.

One gunman got the drop on Denver police Sgt. Lawrence P. Morahan and forced the officer to drive him away along with three other men in a police cruiser. Twice during the subsequent chase the gunman switched vehicles, ending up in the hospital van.

By the time the gunman and his captive hand-made their winding seven-hour tour of the city, Colorado police officers of the hostages had been wounded, three had been released and the rest of the party was within four miles of the supermarket where it all started.

Neither of the two shooting victims was injured seriously. One was taken to a hospital after the shooting and taken by helicopter to a hospital. The other was among the four persons still in the van when Williams surrendered.

In the end, it appeared to be the constant pleading for surrender by Sgt. Morahan, a 46-year-old father of eight, and nursing officers' strategy of waiting it out that brought the ordeal to a halt.

"He kept on him all the way down to give up," said Andy Anderson, 29, the market's meat department manager, who suffered a slight leg wound.

Finally, that's how it happened.

"We ran out of gas," said Morahan, a 30-year veteran with the police force. "I was here for an hour and a half. I didn't want to get into a populated area."

More than 60 carloads of police, held at bay by the man's repeated threats to shoot his hostages, waited momentarily. "He told me to tell the officers to stand back," Morahan said. "And he stopped momentarily and then he says, 'tell 'em to come here' and he touched my shoulder and I looked around and he turned the guns on me."

The man had been armed with a .45-caliber pistol and Morahan's .38-caliber service revolver.

With Anderson and Morahan in the van when it stopped were Kenneth Schmidt, a University of Colorado Medical Center employee who was forced to drive the van, and Carl Haynes, 17, who was among the four hostages taken at the start.

Earlier, the gunman released Denver businessman Kenneth Ward, 43, whose car he had commandeered briefly, to warn police to stay away or he would shoot the captives.

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## France Ready For Olympic Spectacle

NEW YORK (NEA) — What costs \$5.5 million, uses 27 hours, 30 miles of cable, 35 color cameras and needs 250 people? A winter television spectacular, that's what.

And when it comes to spectaculars, nothing fits the word better than the Winter Olympics from Grenoble, France.

From Feb. 8 through Feb. 18, ABC-TV will telecast live highlights of the games via satellite. In addition to the live coverage, there will be taped recaps, fed to the United States via satellite and telecast shortly after arrival.

It's television's largest undertaking and it is in the hands of producer Chuck Howard, a young man with a schoolboy face and an upturned nose. He has been working on the "event" since May, 1965, when ABC won the bid to telecast the games. Now, everything that he can control is controlled, but he has three worries.

"A possible satellite failure is one of my worries," he said. "The weather is another. It can be foggy at Chamrousse, where they have the skiing. It can be on foggy they have to cancel the event. Or it can be just foggy enough to have it, but spoil our coverage. My third worry is a

terrible performance by American athletes, which would certainly have an adverse effect on our viewing audience."

The way the telecast of the Winter Olympics and the Summer Olympics from Mexico City in October, are planned and budgeted, they will be profitable, Howard says.

The total package, he adds, is over \$20 million.

For that money, sponsors want an audience. The Olympics is considered a sure bet to get one, even from among non-sports fans.

"The Olympics is nationalistic," Howard says, "and someone who is not a fan can still

wrap up—it's a beautiful event, with Alpine scenery and the sheer joy of watching sports. And it's not complicated. Even hockey is an easy game to understand. Also, we're in prime time which gives the sports fans a good chance to get caught up in the game."

Victory in the opening ceremony will be seen in the States at 8:45 p.m. Feb. 6. ABC will telecast a 30-minute preview on Sunday, Feb. 4. This will be a primer of events for viewers, and should help increase knowledge of the events involved. It will also introduce the sportscasters, Jim McKay, Curt Gowdy, Chris

Schenkel and Bill Fleming. Nearly two-thirds of the equipment and technicians used are American-made. Some of the equipment is being built in the States, and supplying some technicians.



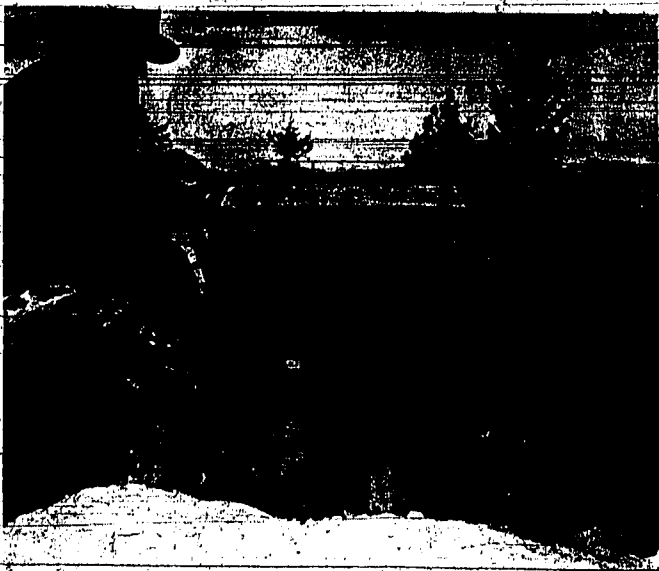

Pennsylvania Atty. Gen. William C. Sennett, repeating at a news conference today the story was a "hoax perpetrated" by Yoder, said, "We reviewed all the files in the Office of the Blind and have concluded that there were no fraudulent payment of benefits and no resulting financial loss to the Commonwealth or federal government."

Yoder, state commissioner for the blind, was suspended Jan. 18 from his \$20,600 post by Gov. Raymond P. Shafer after an initial investigation uncovered inconsistencies in the case. Yoder, who is blind, is now in a Philadelphia psychiatric hospital at his own request.

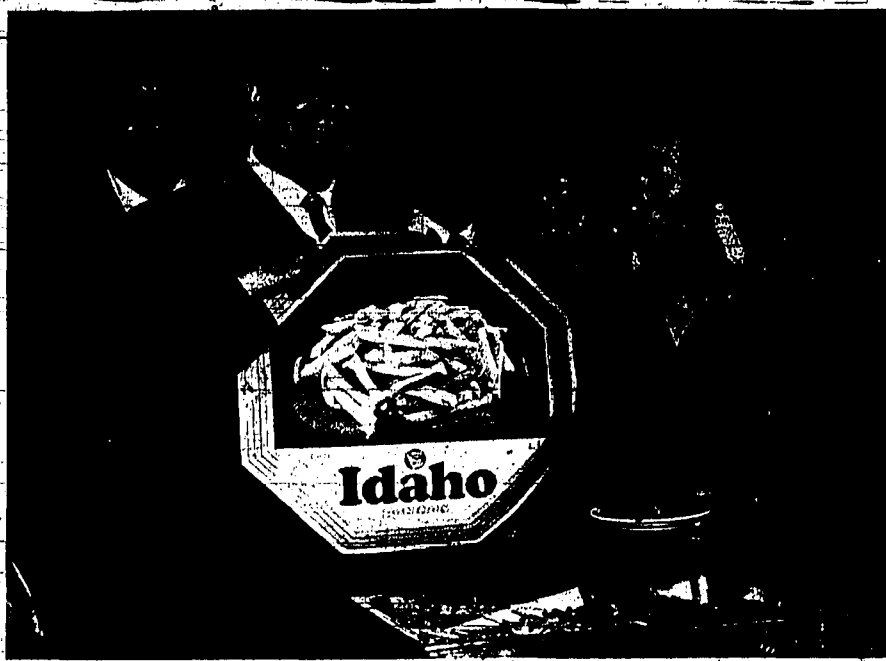

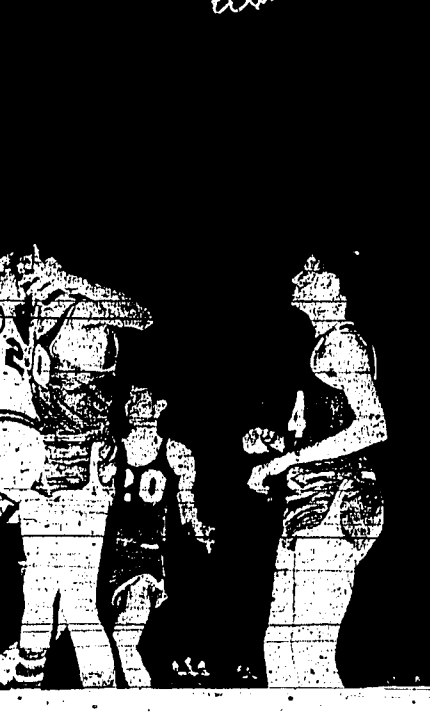

**Economy Is Viewed By Rockefeller**

**ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)**—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller urged lawmakers today to practice restraint in spending and painted a picture of a worsening economic plight in the world and nation. The governor, who insists he is not a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, used his annual message to the New York state legislature to urge all levels of government "to strike the balance between what is doable and what is desirable." "It seems to me that we have arrived at a moment which cries aloud for a pause to take stock," Rockefeller said during the last eight years, he has embarked the state on massive spending programs to upgrade education, curb pollution, and improve transportation and health care. "To a people, and as local officials, we must face the fact that government at all levels—just like a family—cannot spend way beyond its means for long without weakening its credit and undermining its strength," Rockefeller asserted. He said that "we may well be reaching a point where the level of expectations of the American people is rising at a rate which is out-running our capacity to raise revenue on a sound basis on a basis that will not seriously affect economic growth and increased job opportunities."

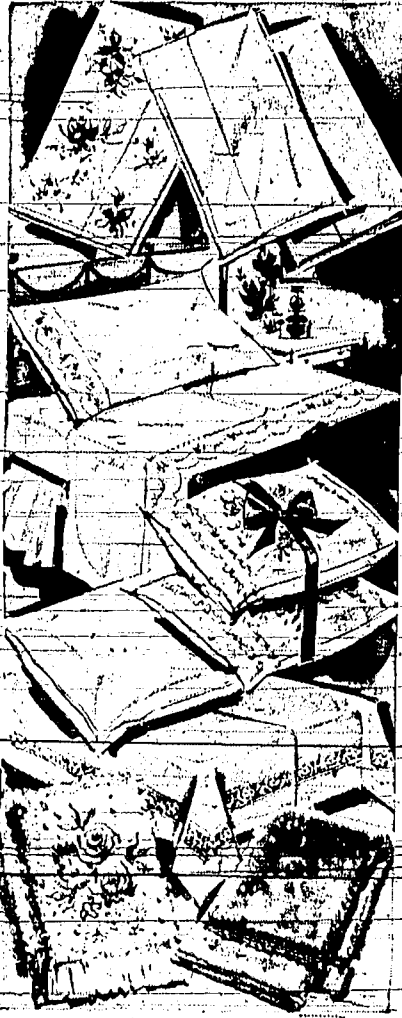
**Automakers Build Fewer Cars In 1967**
