# Two Oldest Draft Board Members Agree On System

The two oldest draft board members in Utah and Idaho agree that the Selective Service system is fair, but they disagree on the relative worth of today's young men.

Samuel E. Leigh, 89, Cedar City, Utah, and John J. Quinn, 82, Horseshoe Bend, Idaho, were among those interviewed by The Associated Press for a nationwide survey on the attitudes of the oldest retiring draft-board members.

Both men served their boards since the start of the draft system until Jan. 1, when new regulations forced them to retire along with more than 1,500 others.

The regulations call for mandatory retirement of draft board members at age 75.

"I've never regretted drafting anyone," said Leigh. "It's better than the law, and one person's not any better than another to me," Quinn agreed.

He said he felt the draft system has been fair, but he questioned the exemptions for college students. "There are some guys who wouldn't be going to college if it were not for the draft," he said, "and lots of kids can't afford to go to college."

Leigh said the prospective

draftees of today do not measure up to the men of World War I. "Those of World War I were better men," Leigh said.

Quinn disagreed, saying potential draftees are better qualified today than in the past because educational opportunities are greater. He said that physically they are about the same.

Neither said he experienced what he would call undue pressure to grant a draft exemption. "Some people worked on me," Leigh said. "But I never gave in. I always tried to go by the law."

Quinn said that if there had been any undue pressure, "I would have paid no attention to it."

Leigh and Quinn agreed that there has been more dissent against the World War II Quinn himself has doubts about Vietnam.

"I sometimes wonder why we got into a land war on the Asian continent," he said. "We shouldn't have. But we're there. We can't cut and run."

Both men are lifelong residents of their respective areas. Leigh was born a few miles outside Cedar City and lived in that community until recently, when he moved to the Iron County Rest Home at Parowan, Utah.

Leigh said he was involved in public work most of his life. He was sheriff for a time and served as postmaster for 30 years. He also operated a hardware store and grocery store until his retirement six years ago. He now lives with a son in Horseshoe Bend, which is north of Boise.

Neither Leigh nor Quinn was called to serve in the armed forces, but the Horseshoe Bend board drafted four of Quinn's brothers and one grandson. He said board rules disqualified him from participating in those cases.

Leigh said he agreed with Selective Service Director Louis Hershey that boards should induct draft-deferred protestors whose actions are not in what Hershey called "the national interest."

Quinn qualified his answer. "If they just protest verbally and don't break any laws, I don't agree with Gen. Hershey," he said. "But if they break the laws, I don't go for that."

Although both were forced to retire, neither felt the new regulations should apply to Hershey himself.

"I don't believe on a certain age for retirement of anyone," said Quinn. "Some older men are more mentally alert than younger men. And they have all that experience behind them."

Leigh agreed, saying the question of Hershey's retirement "ought to be left with him. He's a good hand, and it wouldn't hurt to keep him a while longer."

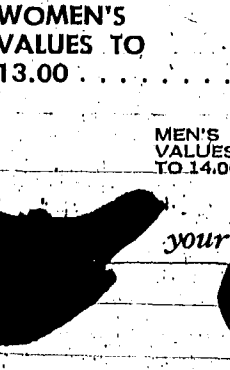

### Judge Rules Columnists Are Liable

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge has ruled columnists Drew Pearson and Jack Anderson are liable for damages for using files stolen from the office of Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn.

The summary judgment against the columnists was made Tuesday at Dodd's request in U.S. District Court. But Judge Alexander Holtzoff said the question of damages would

have to be settled at a later trial.

Dodd is suing Pearson and Anderson for \$1 million.

The columnists have conceded writing articles based on material allegedly taken from Dodd's files by several of the senator's employees. The articles dealt largely with the Connecticut Democrat's finances.

Dodd was censured by the Senate June 22 for using political funds to pay personal bills.

Holtzoff said his ruling concerned only whether a person is liable for damages if he receives purloined documents and uses the information they contain.

The judge rejected Dodd's

contention that his rights to privacy were violated.

"The court concludes that the publication of the material of which the plaintiff complains is not protected by the cloak of the right of privacy, because the publication relates to his activities as high-ranking public officer in which the public has an interest," Holtzoff said.

### Fact-Finding Group Asked By Mansfield

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—President Johnson has been asked "as a last resort" by Senate majority leader Mike Mansfield to create a presidential fact-finding commission with authority to order labor and management to bargain toward ending the 187-day-old nationwide copper strike.

In a letter to the President dated Jan. 10 and released at Helena Tuesday, Mansfield, a Montana Democrat, urged that copper producers had rejected his earlier plan for a fact-finding board to represent producer, labor and the public.

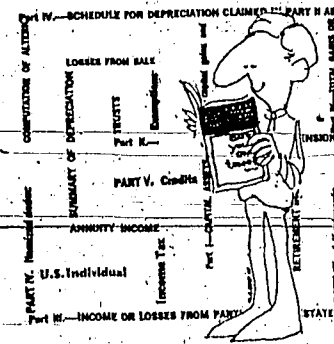
Unions accepted the earlier proposal but refused to meet in Montana with a state-appointed fact-finding board with which the Anaconda Co. had agreed.

In view of the producers' rejection of the earlier proposal, Mansfield said, "I am, therefore, asking, as a last resort, that you intervene in this stalemate situation and consider the possibility of creating a presidential fact-finding commission to endeavor to bring an end to this crippling strike."

The Anaconda Co. is the only one of the four major producers which has negotiations scheduled with the United Steelworkers and other striking unions. Those talks are set for Jan. 23 in Butte.

The other producers are Kennecott Copper Corp., Phelps

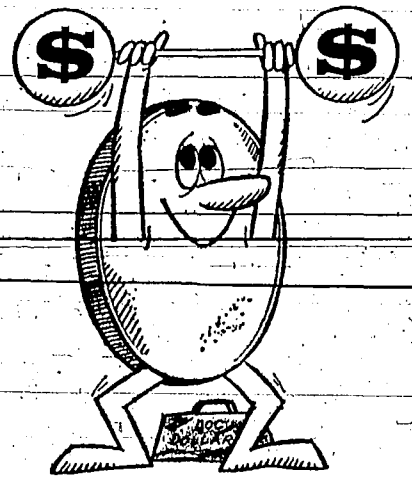

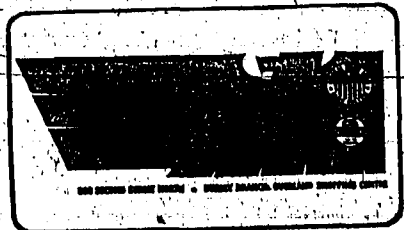

# Idaho News

**AUCTIONS SET** — WALLACE, Idaho (AP) — Auctions this weekend are planned to dispose of the 76-year-old Providence Hospital, its antique furniture and all appliances.

The historic hospital was recently closed after federal officials said it was unfit to care for medicare patients.

The 67,000-square-foot main building, five outbuildings and all equipment and supplies are to be auctioned Saturday and Sunday in Wallace.

**BIDS OPENED** — BOISE (AP) — Bids were opened Tuesday for two stockpiling projects in North Idaho by the state Department of Highways.

The apparent low of four bidders for furnishing cover coat for a stockpile on U. S. Highway 95 at New Meadows was J. F. Konen Construction Co., of Lewiston, at \$23,085.

The apparent low of six bidders for furnishing aggregate for roadmix pavement and cover coat in a stockpile at Grangeville was Dentley Co., of Lewiston, at \$22,750.

**TEST UNDER WAY** — LEWISTON, Idaho (AP) — Tests are under way here on a \$25,000 chemical process intended to take the odor out of certain paper mill operations.

Pottlatch Forests, Inc., is experimenting with the process which uses chemicals to stabilize "black liquor."

Black liquor—leftover chemicals from the paper cooking process—is the chief cause for odors in sulphate or kraft mills. The new system, in effect, uses fresh air to stabilize black liquor compounds to eliminate formation of most of the odoriferous gases.

## Protesting Teacher Is Suspended

EUGENE (AP) — Fifth-grade schoolteacher Ronald Kunkle said he was baffled after the Eugene School Board voted to suspend his suspension Tuesday night.

The board voted 6-1 against him following a two-day hearing.

"The whole thing just puzzles me. But I think the school board has to be commended for this. They gave me a hearing after all," he said.

Kunkle had been criticized for the way he handled his class. He participated in a peace march in San Francisco and that told his pupils who he went. He encouraged the youngsters in his class to carry signs in protest against the school's playground safety policy. And he refused to have his class salute the flag every morning saying, "I'll fight up there. You salute this line you want."

Last November the school board transferred Kunkle to another school. Kunkle refused to go. The superintendent suspended him. Finally, the school board voted to suspend Kunkle, 34, said the transfer was the result of pressure from angry parents.

His supporters asked the school board to hold a hearing on why he was fired. It was the first hearing of its kind ever held in Eugene.

The girls were among 4,500 youngsters invited to a Christmas party sponsored by management of the Pruitt-Igou Housing Project Friday, Dec. 27. More than 11,000 persons live in the project.

The photograph of the two crying youngsters was distributed in the United States and Canada by The Associated Press wirephoto network. The response was almost immediate.

## Pennsylvania College LSD Story Is Being Checked Out

By **LEE LINDER PHILADELPHIA (AP)** — The identity of six students reportedly blinded by the sun while under the influence of the drug LSD and the Pennsylvania college they attended when it happened 18 months ago, still was a secret Wednesday.

Continued pressure from the administration of Gov. Raymond Shafer apparently stilled immediate disclosure of the name of the school involved at least until a current investigation of the incident is completed.

State Sen. Benjamin Donolow, a Philadelphia Democrat, had promised to reveal the college but later told a news conference he was asked to remain silent "until the state checks out all the facts."

Donolow said he investigated the LSD story and "determined it is true." However, he has disputed the version that the six young men, all of whom were totally and permanently blinded.

"Two of the boys have some slight perception," he said. Donolow also said four of the students changed their curriculum and were enrolled in other colleges "in order to accommodate their defect and two remain at the same institution."

He acknowledged that the incident occurred, as originally claimed, in a college in Western Pennsylvania. But he declined to confirm or deny a published report that it was Edinboro State College.

However, Edinboro's president, Dr. Chester T. McMorrey, said in a statement it wasn't his school.

The governor's office at Harrisburg confirmed again, despite Donolow's version, that the six students were permanently blinded by staring, unblinking, at the sun while lying in a meadow near the college.

Donolow said that the six, found by three other students, all were sworn to secrecy by the college. The state senator said the stricken youths were treated by private doctors and never taken to a hospital.

## Cab Drivers Get City OK On Fare Hike

NEW YORK (AP) — After a one-day protest strike, New York City union taxicab drivers have accomplished what they set out to do—get the city to approve a fare increase that will net an estimated \$15 a week more pay in the pockets of full-time drivers.

Cabs started appearing on the streets shortly after last midnight.

During the tie-up of practically all the city's 11,000 cabs, the City Council approved a proposal by Mayor John V. Lindsay that will raise the cost of the average 2.4-mile ride from \$1.05 to either \$1.30 or \$1.35.

The 20,000-member union, which represents the drivers of the 6,800 fleet cabs, called the one-day strike for pressure City Hall to speedily resolve the months-long fare-increase dispute.

The union was joined by almost all of the owners/drivers of the 4,000 independent cabs of the city.

The new contract increases the fleet drivers' pay to about \$15 a week, plus tips.

## Fire Bombs Hurlled Into Judge's Room

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Police say two flaming fire bombs were hurled Tuesday night into the bedroom of a judge who had sentenced two drug smugglers to prison.

There were no injuries and only minor damage, police Lt. J.E. Bacon said.

Circuit Court Judge James C. Adkins Jr. said today that a recent issue of the publication, "Black Voices," had intimated he would be burned unless he released the workers on bond.

The latest plea to release Carole Thomas and Irvin Dawkins on appeal bond was turned down Tuesday by the Florida Supreme Court, clearing the way for a move in federal court.

Mrs. Thomas, wife of a University of Florida Medical Center faculty member and mother of three, a white woman, was sentenced to four months in jail. Thomas, a Negro, drew six months.

Adkins handed out the sentences Dec. 27 on a contempt of court citation when the pair admitted writing an earlier article in "Black Voices," charging that the Gainesville Police Department and Alachua County grand jury were "klan-infested."

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## Man Booked For Shooting His Wife In Courthouse

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "When he learns I have filed this action for divorce, he will release his anger on me and I have fear of the moment when he learns of this action...he will commit violence on my person."

— So wrote Hildegard Dilbeck, 43, in an affidavit filed with a divorce complaint Sept. 8, 1966.

She married song writer Thomas Christopher Dilbeck in 1958. They separated, childless, two days before she filed the divorce complaint. She said they had \$400,000 in common property.

After filing a counter divorce complaint in October 1966, Dilbeck filed answers to questions from his wife's lawyers last May in which he said he and his wife had never been intimate.

On Tuesday, the day the divorce case was scheduled in Superior Court, Hildegard Dilbeck was shot to death in a courthouse corridor and her husband booked on suspicion of murder and attempted murder. Three persons were wounded, one critically.

Police gave this account:

Dilbeck, 62, sat on a bench outside the courtroom where the case was to be heard. His wife, his lawyer, a friend and an accountant sat nearby in the corridor.

Witnesses said Dilbeck drew a .25-caliber pistol, shouted "Kill... Kill... Kill," shot his wife in the side and emptied the pistol on the persons near her.

The friend, Mable King, 45, was listed in serious condition at Dominguez Valley Hospital.

One of the other wounded persons, Daniel Sheahan, 34; Mrs. Dilbeck's lawyer, was in critical condition at St. Joseph Hospital at Burbank. The other John B. Norberg, 58, a San Marino accountant and witness for Mrs. Dilbeck, was treated for a minor flesh wound.

Dilbeck's business lawyer, Edyth Jacobs, said: "He was a successful song writer. However, I think he made most of his money in real estate." The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers said its records show only that Dilbeck was the coauthor of "I'll hold you in my heart until I catch hold of you in my arms" in 1947. Dilbeck's lawyer, Max A. Goodman, who arrived after the shooting said the main point of contention in the divorce action was \$200,000 in property. Dilbeck lived in Long Beach; his wife lived in Bell.

# Withdrawal Of British Forces Concerns Senator Mansfield

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Mansfield expressed concern Monday in the Senate over the British government's plan to pull out of the Middle East in the wake of the British announcement of its plans to pull out of the area in a budget-cutting move. "We have no plans to take effect at least two years earlier than anticipated and apparently exceeds the scope expected by U.S. planners." Mansfield said in an interview. "I am sorry they would feel they were forced to take this step because I am certain we will be asked to fill the vacuum east of Suez. I don't know how we are going to do it because I don't think we have the man or resources for it." It was clear from private conversations that many officials and military officials shared Mansfield's belief and concern. They contended as one of them put it, "We are not prepared to extend our commitments" in view of the strains of the Vietnam war and existing worldwide American commitments. Officially the U.S. government expressed regret that economic necessities forced Britain to cancel a billion-dollar purchase of P-111 supersonic fighter planes and to evacuate all British troops, ships and aircraft from East of Suez in three years. The new withdrawal plan will take effect at least two years earlier than anticipated and apparently exceeds the scope expected by U.S. planners. "We hoped they would keep small garrisons at least in the Persian Gulf area and their pullback is going to be much more rapid than we thought it would be," one source said. What concerns U.S. military strategists is that the British withdrawal and possible new Persian Gulf area commitments by the Soviets are establishing a widening foothold in the Red Sea-Indian Ocean area. They also foresee a likelihood the United States may be confronted with a Soviet challenge in the face of growing public sentiment for a reduction, and possible reduction, of U.S. military commitments around the globe. American authorities expressed hope the nations in the Persian Gulf area—including Iran, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait—would form a defense and economic commitment association to make up for the departure of the British influence in that area. Officials said Australia and New Zealand would like to see the United States fill the gaps left by Britain in the Indian Ocean area, but indicated the Australians and New Zealanders should prepare to go it alone. "The U.S. Navy long has been concerned about the Indian Ocean, although until now it has been regarded as Britain's province. Some Navy sources suggested the British pullout might lead to creation of a separate Indian Ocean fleet. They also said there has been talk of bolstering the present U.S. Navy fleet with a sea plane tender, a British carrier east of Suez but that will end with the pullback. The 54 P-111 long-range warplanes were intended to give Britain a striking power throughout the Indian Ocean-East region.

# Campaigning Romney Is Turning Up In Living Rooms All Over New Hampshire

SALEM, N.H. (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney is turning up in living rooms all over New Hampshire. The household visits are a major feature of a primary campaign that Romney contends will win him the first major test of the race for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination. "I have a feeling that we're really going to score a real upset here," the Michigan governor said as he headed for 10 more New Hampshire homes. Heartside campaigning is a technique imported from Michigan. The plan is to have his supporters in communities across the state proclaim their homes neighborhood campaign headquarters. "This does bring a campaign closer to everybody," he explained at a Nashua home Tuesday night. "When you've got a home headquarters you've got a staff 24 hours a day." Romney hopes to open 500 such outposts before the March 12 primary. He is to visit about 150 of them himself. His wife, Lenore, is covering a different route, dropping in at homes, too. At each stop the format is the same. Five college girls, clad in paper dresses emblazoned with Romney's name, sing campaign songs, numbers like "Romney Makes the World Go Round." The music may have been one-hundred-drink coffee in a bunch doughnuts. Romney managers find the hosts generally reluctant to serve liquor because the candidate does not drink. Romney arrives, shakes hands, then gives his standard New Hampshire speech. He calls for neutralization of South Vietnam, economy in government, attacks concentrations of economic power in labor and big industries, and warns that crime menaces the nation and "civil guerrilla warfare" threatens the cities. Then he asks for questions, which generally stress Vietnam, the economy, and his own presidential prospects. It all takes about 30 minutes. At the end, Romney has a gift for the host and hostess, medallions carrying the Michigan motto "On our own" and his signature on the other. They are identical to the medallions carried by Michigan soldiers during his visit to South Vietnam.

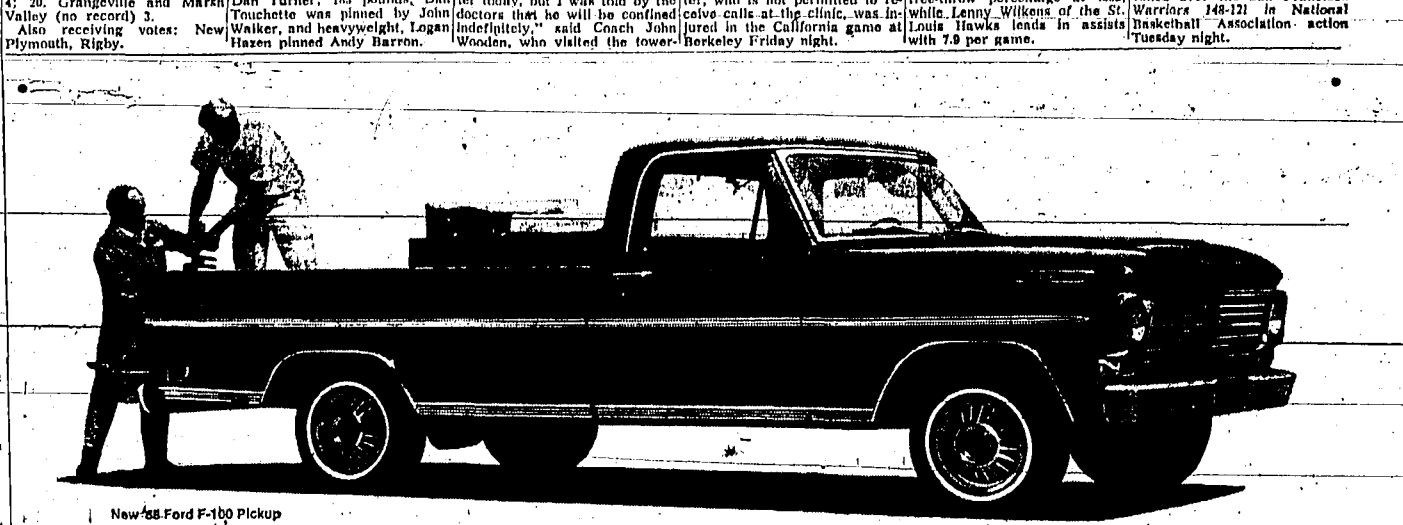

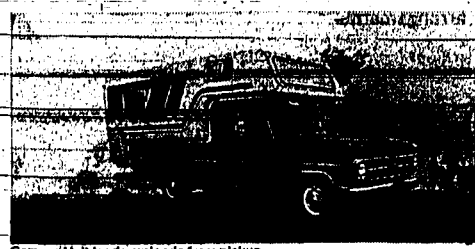

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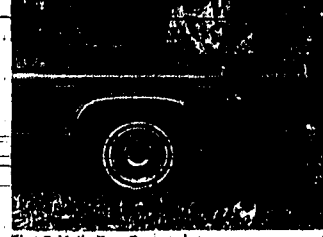
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## Noted Tenor Ralph McFarlane Due To Present Concert Here, 8 P.M. Sunday

## Study Says It Costs More To Keep Women Well Dressed

By NEIL GILBRIDE WASHINGTON (AP) — The Labor Department has made official what most husbands already know—it costs a lot more to keep women well dressed than men.

And, says a report in the Monthly Labor Review, the higher cost of clothing the ladies persists from age 2 to 72.

The greatest spending differences are at the ages of 16 and 17, when the average girl's wardrobe costs 42 per cent more than a boy's.

The report by Ann Erickson of the Department of Labor's Living Conditions Studies added Tuesday that both sexes become more clothes-conscious in their mid and late teens.

"Although 18 to 24-year-olds had the highest clothing bills, their average expenditures were only slightly higher than the 16 and 17-year-olds," said the report.

"Persons in both age groups tend to be fashion-conscious, like to have special clothes for dates and school activities, and often have more money to spend on clothing than younger teenagers—they are more likely to have income from part-time or full-time jobs," it said.

The report, based on a survey

of buying habits over several years, said the average family of the same ages. But those figures said, "For men, the lowest clothing purchases were reported for fathers with young children, whose children were all under 18," it said.

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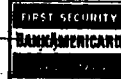

# Americans Will Pay Higher Premium For Supplemental Doctor Bill Aid

WASHINGTON (NEA)—A lot more elderly Americans than expected have run up doctor bills and related charges under the supplemental "doctor bill" insurance which 17.6 million of them signed up for in Medicare's first year and a half.

That means the monthly premium the signers pay (watched by the government) goes up in 1968 to help meet the added cost. Some 39 million doctor bills already have been paid under the program.

Very likely that premium will climb some more in the years ahead. The original Medicare law said the government could raise it every two years. The 1967 revisions changed that to read "every year."

Incidentally, people who become eligible for this insurance at age 65 but do not sign up at the first official opportunity automatically have to pay a higher premium if and when they finally do sign up. It rises about 10 per cent for each year of delay.

The 1967 Social Security law revisions make it easier hereafter to claim benefits under the supplemental doctor bill insurance.

There are two ways to get payment. If your doctor agrees, you can assign the matter to him and he applies to the gov-

ernment for payment. If he will not do this, you formerly had to pay the bill and then apply for payment by the government.

Beginning in January, 1968, if your doctor does not wish to apply for payment, you can do so even if you have not paid the bill. All you need to do is get an itemized bill and send it in with your application.

Supplemental insurance covers doctor bills run up through office visits; house calls; services performed in a hospital or extended care facility.

But routine physical checkups are not included, and neither are vaccine shots, tests for eye glasses or hearing aids.

Plastic surgery for "cosmetic reasons" is out. So is ordinary dental care. As for psychiatric care outside a hospital, the insurance covers just half of the bill, up to \$250 a year.

Besides doctor bills, the supplemental coverage included a certain kind of diagnostic test like X-ray checkups, radiation therapy, surgical dressings, casts, etc., artificial limbs and some other artificial devices, rental or purchase (new) of durable medical equipment like wheel chairs or iron lungs, ambulance service if other transport would endanger the patient.

Supplemental insurance has a deductible feature. You have to

pay the first \$50 of covered service you get each year. You also have to pay 20 per cent of the balance of your bill for the various supplemental services.

You get this kind of insurance, of course, only if you sign up for it.

The first enrollment period starts three months before the month you reach 65 and runs for three months after that birthday month. To be sure your protection starts as soon as you are 65, you should sign before your birthday month.

If you pass up this first chance, you will not get another until the next so-called general enrollment period. The new law now provides that these shall come from Jan. 1 to March 31 each year. But, as noted, if you wait your premium goes up. The longer you wait, the more it costs.

If you do sign up and are also getting regular Social Security benefits, your premium will simply be deducted from those payments. If you do not get Social Security, the government will notify you later how to pay premiums.

You can drop doctor-bill insurance at any time, and end of coverage becomes effective at the end of the calendar quarter following the quarter in which you serve cancellation notice.

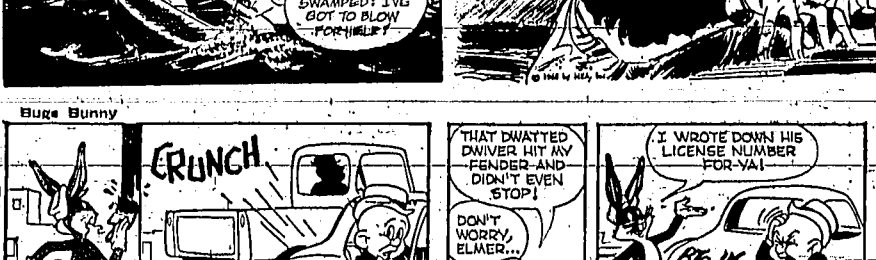
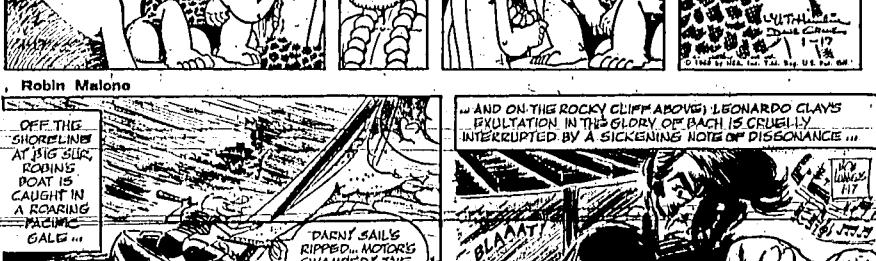

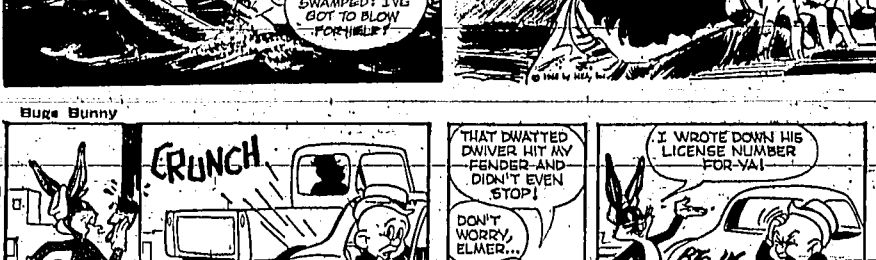

# Dr. Barnard's Life Is Changed

**CARE-TOWN:** South Africa (AP) The tall, lean heart surgeon hurried along the corridor toward the small lecture room where television cameras and newsmen were waiting for his daily news conference.  
 At the door he braced himself, trying to erase the tired lines from his face.  
 Then his face lit up with a smile of genuine pleasure. Waiting just inside the room were the wife and two daughters of probably his closest friend and colleague, Dr. Marthinus C. Botha. Christian N. Barnard knelt and hugged Tessa, 9, and Michelle, 7. The two girls throw their arms around his neck as he asked: "Where have you been? I haven't seen you for ages."  
 He pointed to the polished table crowded with microphones on the far side of the room lit by the glare of television lights.  
 "I have to go over there and talk to these people," he said. "But I'd much rather talk to you than any of them, Michelle. Will you come over and sit on my knee?"  
 Elizabeth Botha shook her head. It was enough that her immunologist husband had been caught up in the swirl of publicity that followed the world's first human heart transplant. She wanted herself and the children left out.

"Botha's brow-furrowed in astonishment at the question.  
 "Of course not. You can see that you meet him yourself every day at the press conference. He won't ever change. He's not the sort who does."  
 But fame and publicity have had their effect on Barnard in another way.  
 Visiting doctors, newsmen and civic authorities, wanting to congratulate him or bestow honors on him, take up hours of his time. People who have never met him want to shake his hand.  
 All sorts of clubs and organizations seek him as their guest. He is invited abroad to take part in televised discussions with other famous heart surgeons.  
 On top of all this he has his regular work to do.  
 Among other things, he has to keep alive retired dentist Phillip Blumberg, the world's third human heart transplant patient. Before that there was Louis Washkansky, the first man in the world to have his heart replaced with another. He lived with it for 18 days.  
 Somehow Barnard manages to meet most of the requests. Somehow he managed to satisfy nearly all the exhausting demands on him. He is very conscientious.  
 Has his home life been disrupted? —  
 "Not really," he says. "I can't take my daughter out water skiing any more but my friends take her out instead." Daughter Doreen, 17, is one of the world's half-dozen best women water skiers and Barnard has long been an enthusiast.  
 Does he still manage time to relax with his wife?  
 "Oh, yes."  
 But friends and colleagues tell a different story.  
 Even when he is home his phone rings continually.  
 Barnard's wife "Louwkie" is fed up.  
 "All I want now is to get back to normal living," she says.
