Several Subjects Omitted From Session Agenda

BOISE (AP) — Omission of several controversial subjects from a possible agenda for the Idaho Legislature's special session this month does not mean they will not be included in the official call, Gov. Don W. Samuelson said today.

Among items on the list released Wednesday for list to consider at the session he is calling for Jan. 29:

Missing were a number of subjects: one of them public school financing — which was included in a 28-item list made public at the time Samuelson conferred with legislative leaders early this month.

It was after that conference that the governor announced he would call the session.

But the governor, through an aide, emphasized today that the 18-item list he sent lawmakers is not the official agenda for the session.

He said he provided it for the legislators so they could obtain a better understanding of the issues and to guide them in acting on the proposals, if they come before the session.

Samuelson said the final agenda could include some subjects not on that list and might skip some that are on it.

Six of the items deal with for-

est fires. These included retiring some \$180,000 in deficiency fire fighting warrants and five suggestions posed by an interim fire protection study committee.

Items not listed included appropriations of more money for public schools, court reform, more money for State Hospital North, and delay or repeal of inventory tax phase out.

Among items on the list released Wednesday which Samuelson asked the legislature to consider were:

—Appropriation of some \$175,000 to prepare Farragut State Park for the 1969 National Boy Scout Jamboree.

—Revision of the state vehicle weight control law to provide a penalty for violation and to provide impounding authority.

—A change in state employee pay periods from monthly to bi-weekly periods.

—Allowing Washington County Irrigation district to waive the six month waiting period before bond elections and officials contend voters received erroneous information.

—Correction of an omission in the new city code to allow bonding for city halls and jails, and to extend the payout period on city local improvement district bonds to a similar period allowed counties.

Area Airman Dies In N. D. Plane Crash

MINOT, N. D. — William Mason, Kimberly, an Air Force S. Sgt., was among 12 people killed Wednesday when a huge tanker plane crashed on takeoff from Tughrick-Minot Air Base here.

A two-star general and eight other Air Force officers were also killed.

An Air Force investigating team is seeking the cause of the crash. The seven crewmen and six passengers in the plane were from March Air Force Base, near Riverside, Calif.

Sgt. Mason had been in the Air Force since November, 1955, and was graduated from Kimberly High School in 1955.

Maj. Gen. Charles M. Eisenhart, 53, vice commander of the 15th Air Force, died when the plane burst into flames upon impact with the ground. Bodies and parts of the plane were thrown more than 1,000 feet in all directions.

Sgt. Mason was a crew chief aboard the aircraft when it went down. He is survived by his wife, Margaret Walsh Mason, Sunnyvale, Calif., and his two children, Michael and Kerry William Mason, living at home; his foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Long, Nevada City, Nev.; four sisters, Mrs. E. M. (Rosemary) Poulter, Twin Falls, Mrs. Irving (Zelda) Michaels, Bridgeport, Conn., Mrs. Charles (Patricia) Stokes, Thomaston, Ala., and Mrs. Ed (Shirley) Calhoun, Colorado Springs, Colo.; and two brothers, George L. Mason, Stocking, Calif., and Richard Eugene Mason, Kimberly.

Sgt. Mason was born March 30, 1935 and lived most of his life at Kimberly.

LBJ Urges War Against Crime, Draws Applause

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson proposed expanding the war against crime and big-city problems and lists a "really true" cease-fire as a priority goal in any Vietnam peace talks.

The President, in his Wednesday night State of the Union message to Congress, urged enactment of a 10 per cent income tax hike to help pay for new attacks on unemployment and slum housing.

Johnson said it would take a \$10.4 billion boost in spending to finance the program in reporting the fiscal 1969 budget would reach a record \$186 billion — with a built-in \$8 billion deficit sure to go higher if the tax boost isn't approved.

Only when he called for federal action to aid cities and states in combating crime and to halt "mail order murder" through gun-control legislation did the President get enthusiastic reaction from the lawmakers during his 40-minute, nationally televised address.

Many members of Congress did not attend the joint session.

Johnson renewed demand that North Vietnam respond with military restraint to a halt in U.S. bombing and other war-policy critics as Sens. J.W. Fulbright, D-Ark., and Robert

F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., responding with silence amid applause.

Johnson drew greater applause in calling for a \$2.1 billion program aimed at creating jobs for 500,000 hard-core jobless through federal-private business cooperation and a \$100 million slum-rebuilding program.

In another major domestic proposal, the President suggested a 10-year program to provide six million new housing units for low and middle-income families.

He prefaced his domestic proposals, which included calls for new national civil and consumer protection programs, by saying:

"In our cities last summer, we saw how wide is the gulf for some Americans between the promise and the reality of our society.

"We cannot change all of this in a day... The issue is not whether we can change this; the issue is whether we will change this.

"I know we can. I believe we will."

Johnson's estimate that the Southeast Asia conflict will cost \$25 billion in the fiscal year beginning July 1 was immediately disputed by Rep. Melvin R. Laird of Wisconsin, chairman of the House Republican conferees.

Johnson's Vietnam policies, said: "We still are told the nation can wage and win two wars — the one in Vietnam and the war on poverty. We are waging one, but not winning either."

The President's renewed appeal for a 10 per cent income tax surcharge, coupled with his announcement that spending would be increased by some \$10.4 billion, drew criticism or opposition from such prominent Democrats as Sen. William Proxmire, chairman of the Joint Economic Committee, and Sen. Russell B. Long, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Republicans joined in the attack.

But other Democrats came to the President's support, including Speaker John W. McCormack and House Democratic Leader Carl Albert.

The key congressman on the tax issue, Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, of the House Ways and Means Committee, declined comment, saying he wanted to see Johnson's spending figures first. The budget is due for presentation to Congress by Jan. 29.

Mills has been maintaining that unless there is a significant spending cut, he would not go along with a tax hike.

PUC Orders Individual Toll-Free Phone Setup

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission decided Thursday a petition for extended area service to customers of Mountain States Telephone Co. in the Gooding, Wendell, Shoshone and Jerome areas, but ordered the company to provide on an individual basis, such service to customers who desire it.

Frank Long, manager of Mountain States Telephone Co. in Twin Falls, said the additional monthly cost, based on an estimate made at a hearing on the issue in August of last year, would be about \$2.85 for one person, residential customer in Shoshone, and about \$1.85 for the same type of customer in Gooding and Jerome.

The overall toll-free telephone service in those areas would have been between 50 cents and a dollar, depending on the area.

Mr. Long said another petition is pending before the PUC which requests toll-free phone service among about 15 Magic

Valley towns. He said the commission has asked the telephone company to make a study of the proposal and the results of that study will be submitted at a hearing which has not been scheduled as yet.

A primary reason for the telephone company's opposition to the toll-free system is that it would be an unfair cost for people who would have no use for the service.

At a hearing in Gooding in August, Mr. Long said his company submitted an alternative plan — the plan which the company was ordered to follow through on in Thursday's ruling by the PUC, that of individual toll-free service.

He said that most of the people who would be using the toll-free system are businessmen and he felt that this segment of the population had the most use and desire for toll-free service and would have no objection to paying the slightly higher cost on an individual basis.

Treaty Set

GENEVA (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union presented today a new and complete draft treaty to halt the spread of nuclear weapons.

The treaty contained an article, No. 3, on international controls which was left blank in the original draft submitted to the 17-nation disarmament conference last Aug. 24.

The new draft also included substantial amendments aimed at meeting strong criticisms by non-aligned nations, particularly India.

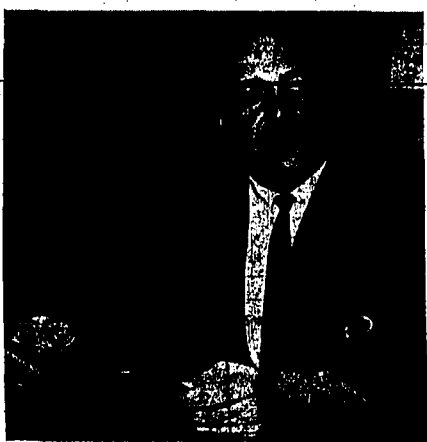
Peace Remarks Received Coldly

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's State of the Union remarks on peace prospects drew a frigid response from some fellow Democrats and other initial congressional reaction pointed to continued hostility toward increases in taxes and spending.

Johnson told Congress Wednesday night that if a basis for peace talks can be established with North Vietnam his hope would be for a complete cease-fire as the first order of business.

His brief remarks on the prospects for peace drew applause — but not from Democratic Sens. Robert F. Kennedy of New York and J. William Fulbright of Arkansas. They are leading critics of Johnson's war policy.

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota, seeking the Democratic presidential nomination on a platform of opposition to

Terreton Is Stunned By Four Deaths

TERRETON (AP) — This little Jefferson County community was stunned Thursday by what appeared to be a case of young "Tetter" mother, going berserk and drowning her three young children, then fleeing into the cold night where she later died as the result of apparent exposure.

Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 27, daughter of Mrs. Raymond H. May, Rupert, and her three children, Carme, 7; Jeanne, 5; and Joseph, 2, all died in the still unexplained tragedy, according to Jefferson County sheriff's office.

The tragedy occurred at the family trailer home located about eight miles from Terreton. Joseph Wilson, father of the children and only survivor, explained the tragedy, according to the sheriff's office.

The children were discovered in the bathtub about 9 p.m. Wednesday after returning home from making deliveries. He is a mechanic employed in Terreton.

Officers followed tracks in the snow leading to a nearby field where they found Mrs. Wilson unconscious. She died a short time later, apparently from exposure.

Rupert neighbors said the Mays are hard-working, well-thought-of people. Mrs. Wilson grew up in the Rupert area.

Classes Open, Then Close At Kimberly

Kimberly schools reopened Thursday morning, only to close again at 10 a.m. as more students were out with the flu than were absent Tuesday afternoon when classes were closed for 10 days.

Wayne Crook, Kimberly high school principal, said there were 40 children absent in the grade school compared to 27 Tuesday. The high school reported 100 more absent than Tuesday, making nearly 100 students out of school with illness.

School officials indicated there were several types of sickness, including stomach flu, sore throats as well as severe colds and congested lungs. The 1/2-day closure, followed by opening and a second closing, follows a similar pattern experienced at the school two years ago.

Classes now are scheduled to resume Monday, officials said.

Mazzone Resigns As T.F. Scout Executive

Michael J. Mazzone, who has served the Snake River Area Council as Scout Executive the past four years, submitted his resignation Wednesday night at an executive board meeting at the Boy Scout Service Center.

Mr. Mazzone reported that he has been selected to serve as a member of the faculty of the National Executive Institute for Boy Scouts of America. The appointment is effective Feb. 15.

The institute is a training program for Scout executives and is being completely reorganized in conjunction with Cornell University.

While working with the Institute Mr. Mazzone will complete his Master's degree in administration.

He is one of only five executives in America to be selected to assist in the new program.

Alden Barber, chief scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America, indicated that it was because of the impressive record of the Snake River Area Council and the Chief Seattle Council that Mr. Mazzone was selected.

Some of the strides the council has taken since 1964 include making heavy investments in the council's membership, upping camp attendance from 461 to 2,100 and boosting the council operating budget from \$41,000 to \$75,000.

Scouts in the council who have attained the rank of Eagle have gone from 35 in 1964 to 87 in 1967. There also have been a dozen new units added in the council during the time Mr. Mazzone has been Scout Executive.

Trial Continues—Judge Admits Statement Made By Defendant

JEROME — Chief of Detectives Tim Qualls of the Twin Falls police department took the stand Thursday morning in the fourth day of a first degree murder trial here for Michael Dillon, 18, to identify several pieces of evidence and read a statement taken from the defendant March 29.

Officer Qualls assisted the Jerome city and county officers in the investigation of the March 14 slaying of Mrs. Alta Simer, 66, Jerome, of which young Dillon is accused. She was fatally beaten in her Jerome home.

Defense attorney James May raised an objection when Mr. Qualls started to tell of a statement he took from Dillon. Mr. May contended there was no lawyer present. Dillon's parents were not present, and said the defendant had a mental age of 13, an IQ of 81 to 82 and did not understand his constitutional rights.

Assistant Jerome County Prosecutor Frank Rettig contended this point of question had already been raised previously and on each occasion the court had overruled Mr. May's objections. Judge Theron Ward, Fifth Judicial District, in Thursday's session overruled the objection and the statement was admitted.

Mr. Qualls then read the statement he said was given him by Dillon, stating the defendant saw Mrs. Simer at her home on the evening of March 14, 1967. She had called him over to inquire about the theft of her purse.

She indicated, the statement continued, that she did not believe Dillon was responsible for the theft. They went into the Simer home, drank a cup of coffee, ate a sandwich and an orange and then went to the

woodshed together where Dillon touched Mrs. Simer's arms with wood. She returned to the house alone.

Dillon, the statement continued, then heard a scream. He went into the house by the back door, heard the front door alarm and ran to the front of the house where he saw a black car pull away.

Dillon stated to the officer he then discovered the body of Mrs. Simer. According to the statement read by Qualls, Dillon left the house and went to an auction. He returned to the house and See TRIAL, Pg. 2, Col. 6

Work On Student Center—Monastery Due To Begin In March

Construction of Ascension Priory, a small Benedictine Monastery and a foundation from Mt. Angel Abbey in Oregon, will begin in March at a site adjacent to the College of Southern Idaho, according to Father Patrick Moagher, O.S.B., Prior.

A Newman Center in the building will offer library, lounge and discussion areas to both Catholic and non-Catholic students at CSI. The priory will include a chapel with seating for approximately 70 people, six minutes' restrooms, a room for 20 retreatants. One- to five-day religious retreats will be offered to the faculty of the area.

The project is being sponsored by the Catholic Diocese of Boise, Mt. Angel Abbey, and hopefully, interested area benefactors.

New members from the monastic community at Mt. Angel will be assigned to join the new priory. Two Benedictine fathers have been in the Jerome area since 1965 working on the project. They will establish monastic life within the priory and will serve the spiritual needs of CSI students and visiting retreatants.

The original site of the proposed priory was 600 acres of cultivated land near Jerome. The acreage, which was dedicated

Plane Shot Down Over Bay Of Cadiz

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — An American citizen identified as an ex-paratrooper who tried to sneak into Cuba in a private plane with a gun and camera has been shot down, the Cuban radio said today.

The plane was described in the broadcast, monitored in Miami, as a Taylorcraft with identification No. 129647. The broadcast said the pilot was shot down north of the Central Cuban city of De Rancho Velez and the plane fell on an island called "Falcon's Key."

Soviets Express Double Standard

One day after a closed-door Soviet court convicted four defendants in a literary trial, the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia waded indignantly over what its headline called "the fate of a poet."

In a column subtitled "Democracy Inevitable," the newspaper expressed anger that this poet had been convicted, it said, because of his views.

Izvestia was not talking about Soviet writers, many of whom have been sent off to prison for their views. It was talking about the case of the American Negro poet, LeRoi Jones.

Jones had allegedly participated in a violent Newark, N.J., riot last summer, when he was convicted recently for illegal possession of lethal weapons. His trial was open and widely publicized. He was freed on bail and was at liberty, pending his appeal, to keep speaking on religious and social subjects wherever he pleased about his government.

The Soviet writers convicted last week were sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor on various charges of anti-Soviet activities. The trial court was closed except to those selected by the prosecution. All through the trial there was no mention of it in the Soviet press. Only after the conviction did one Soviet newspaper briefly report the fact that it had been held. Principal press organs ignored the proceedings.

"There will be no jail for the Russian writers," nor for any convicted before the tribunal. They will be no opportunity for them to keep speaking engagements or even to whisper publicly what is on their minds.

But the way Izvestia tells the story to its Russian readers, the United States is a savage persecutor of writers. Here in what Izvestia had to say about the trial of LeRoi Jones.

"The bourgeois newspapers and journals are silent about the reprisals against the gifted poet whose verses have been included in an anthology of modern American poetry. Official literary societies also display total ignorance. . . Only the workers' newspaper, the Worker, came forward with an exposure of his tortures."

NCAA Committee Changes Three Football Rules

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP)—The NCAA committee on football rules today announced three changes in college football rules.

The committee said it would change the line of scrimmage and the fair catch rule. It also would change the rule on the number of players on the field.

The committee also yielded to a strong demand from college coaches, and abolished a one-year-old rule allowing only ends and backs to go downfield under the snap of the ball.

Committee chairman Ivan B. Williamson, athletic director of the University of Wisconsin, said the new regulations "will make football a safer game."

The "sucker" rule was eliminated by prohibiting interior linemen from moving once they assumed a position in the line. Under the old rule, the linemen frequently shifted for the purpose of drawing the opposition players offside.

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Alcindor Is Released By Hospital

LOS ANGELES (AP)—All-American star Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, UCLA's No. 1-ranked basketball player, was released from the university's eye clinic Wednesday but remained uncertain whether he will play against second-ranked Houston in Texas Saturday night.

The uncertainty applies to the Bruins' nonconference tilt at UCLA Thursday night with the University of Portland.

The 7-foot-plus junior checked out of the Jules Stein Eye Clinic and wearing a patch over his injured right eye, attended an 11 a.m. class.

"Coach (John) Wooden said he doesn't know if Alcindor will play in either game," said Vic Kelley, director of the athletic services at UCLA.

Alcindor suffered the eye injury in a game with California's Bears at Berkeley Friday night during a rebound play with the Bears' 6-5 forward, Tom Henderson.

Wooden said UCLA game films show that Henderson accidentally jammed Alcindor's eye. Cal's coach, Rene Herreras, said his films indicated the injury was self-inflicted.

"The Bruins' big game of the week, if not the year, is the one to be nationally televised from Houston's Astrodome."

Wooden's warriors will be seeking their 47th consecutive triumph Thursday night. UCLA is 12-0 this season and Houston is 16-0.

Probate Judges Advised To Use Caution In Setting Fees For Indigents' Counsel

Probate judges from Southern Idaho were admonished Wednesday night by Justice Joseph McFadden, Idaho State Supreme Court, to use some special caution in establishing fees for counsel for indigent defendants. Justice McFadden said he felt fees should not be as low as to reflect on the reputation of the attorney appointed, but they must not be exorbitant.

Justice McFadden, addressing the January meeting of the Association of Probate Judges and Juvenile Officers during a dinner session at the Holiday Inn, suggested the judges in the Probate Courts and Justice Courts get together with their district judges to determine a fee schedule.

Discussing the new laws which provide for the appointment of counsel for the indigent, defendants including minors, Justice McFadden said the days are gone forever when a judge would rather bypass the naming of an attorney in the event of an indigent defendant.

"Services of an attorney representing a minor or other defendant in a more serious criminal matter is now an essential ingredient for any judgment of a court that restricts the freedom of that individual," he explained.

Under the new law, he explained, the court must provide an attorney when the defendant is unable to do so. This, he said, requires a careful screening by the court to determine if the defendant is or is not able to finance such services on his own.

"Frequently these fees are then reimbursable, he said, in the event the defendant is later able to pay. Some counties are hiring public defenders to handle

Ford Unveils Experimental Research Car

WASHINGTON (AP) — An experimental \$18,500 research car—that has a gold-plated steering wheel as an essential component—has been unveiled by the Ford Motor Co. as a device which someday may help improve driver licensing and rating.

The wheel was plated with gold, they said, because it conducts electricity well—in this case the electric impulses of heart beats transmitted through a driver's hands to the wheel and then to tape recording equipment inside the car.

The driver's seat was described as a "medical monitor chair" which enables measurements of the heartbeat and breathing rate of a person sitting in it through the skin without the use of any attached electrodes or other devices.

Company officials said here Wednesday the car may also help provide more detailed information on the effects of alcohol, drugs, fatigue and illness.

The repatriation of Egyptian prisoners of war resumed today for a delay of four days caused by storms blocking roads across the Sinai Desert.

The Israeli-Egyptian exchange is expected to be completed next Tuesday or Wednesday.

Most Americans Would Donate Vital Organs

NEW YORK (AP)—Seven in every 10 U.S. adults, or a projected 80 million Americans, would be willing to have their heart or other vital organs donated to medical science upon their deaths, the Gallup Poll said today.

The 80 million figure is based on an adult population of 114 million persons, the poll stated.

The level of education and age are important factors in the willingness to be a donor. More than eight persons in 10 with college training expressed a willingness to be donors, but among those with a grade school background or less only a small majority, 54 per cent, indicated a willingness, the poll said.

Persons under 50 would be more inclined to consent to be donors than would older people, the survey indicated.

Little difference between the Catholics, Protestants and Jews was found in their willingness to

donate.

The reasons given for reluctance to donate organs were age or health, moral or religious beliefs and doubts about the success of such operations.

Survey results came from answers to the following question asked by Gallup interviewers: "As you may have heard, a doctor in South Africa recently transplanted a heart from a dead person to a live person. Would you be willing to have your heart or other vital organs donated to medical science upon your death?"

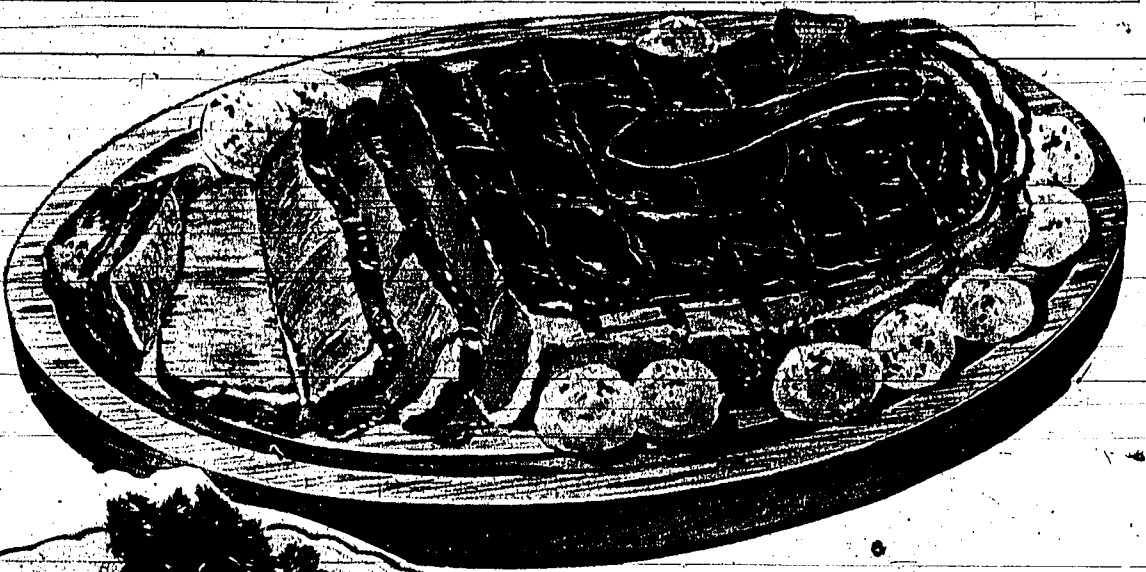

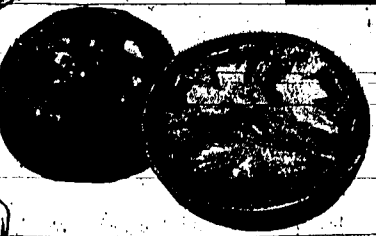

Britons Realize 'Squeeze' May Be Only Start Of Things To Come

 LOOK — "Spend today—save tomorrow. It's common sense." The placard in a store in Covent Garden, a few yards from the Royal Opera House, expresses the tone in Britain today.
 Despite some pinch in the pocketbook, Mr. and Mrs. Briton have survived the first two months of devaluation with cautious relief that things have not been worse.
 They thought life was going to be really tough when Prime Minister Harold Wilson's Labor government cut the value of the pound from \$2.80 to \$2.40 last Nov. 18.
 But Britons are no less apprehensive about the future because things may not have been as bad as expected the past two months.
 They know that the squeeze may only be beginning, especially with the new government's austerity measures announced this week.
 So far prices have edged up, particularly on hundreds of individual food items. But the increases have only been fractional to date and at least some of the increase in meat prices stems from the outbreak of foot and mouth disease rather than devaluation.
 Shoppers and suppliers alike are convinced that prices will be a lot higher by the end of 1960.
 Shoppers need little such urging as the "spend today—save tomorrow" placard. They prefer to spend money in the bank. London department stores reported Christmas buying exceeded the previous year.
 There has been a good deal of selective buying and rather less impulse buying, according to some stores.
 One store in London's west end, American-founded Seligson's, reported selling \$240,000 worth of refrigerators and \$240,000 worth of electrical equipment in a few days at its New Year sale.
 Although British tourists will find their devalued pound buying less in most countries abroad, travel agencies report no letdown in advance bookings for summer holidays.
 Prime Minister Wilson claimed at the time of devaluation that the money of the ordinary Briton was not being cut in value, but most people prefer the view of Peter Murray, a top British disc-jockey.
 Said Murray: "I am not a businessman and I have no investments. What money I have I put in the bank. For me, devaluation means that the money I have in the bank is worth 14.3 per cent less than it was when I put it in the bank."
 Murray added wryly: "I shall have to learn to beg."
