## Marines Beat Off Red Attack Near Khe Sanh

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Marines beat off 200 to 300 North Vietnamese troops attacking a hill overlooking the northwest fortress at Khe Sanh today. The Viet Cong opened a fresh heavy attack in Saigon while fighting continued in Hue and other targets of the Communist offensive against South Vietnamese cities.

whether the 3½-hour ground assault on Hill 881A, accompanied by a heavy artillery attack on other positions at Khe Sanh, was the start of the expected North Vietnamese offensive along the northern frontier. But the U.S. Command disclosed it had moved 2,500 paratroopers from the 101st Airborne Division to the northern sector "to be prepared for any contingency."

The North Vietnamese attacked a Marine company holding Hill 881A with Bangalore torpedoes, explosive charges and bazooka-type rockets. The hill is a bald patch of scarred earth that dominates the northwestern approach to the Khe Sanh Marine base, three miles away.

## U.S. May Apologize To Koreans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara appear to be paving the way for a possible U.S. apology to North Korea if that's essential to receive the captured Pueblo vessel and her crew.

McNamara was asked whether he could say flatly that the Pueblo had not at any time entered the territorial waters of North Korea.

# Taking Monthly Snow Survey No Job For Faint Of Heart

 HAILLEY — "Snow surveys of today have it easy compared to the grueling hours spent skiing to courses in the high Sierras in bygone years," say many persons.  
 Well, maybe—but taking snow surveys the first of each of the wintry months is still no job for the faint of heart. But for those hardy men who enjoy the thrill of adventure, with an ever-changing sequence of events, it is a challenge.

Reuben Bradshaw, Soil Conservation Service snow surveyor for Big and Little Wood Rivers and the headwaters of the Salmon River, has many stories to relate of difficulties he has encountered while doing this work.  
 His latest occurred Jan. 29 in getting his monthly snow measurements at Garfield Ranger Station at the headwaters of Muldoon Creek, up from the Carey valley.

"The snow was loose and fine and there was just enough wind blowing to spiral it in front of me and all around us, making it impossible to see. We crept along in an attempt to keep our machines upright, trying to pick a trail in the trackless sea of white which encompassed us that would not land us upside down a snowfall.  
 "We finally arrived at the cabin and, when the tension was gone, discovered our clothing was soaking wet.

"Building a fire in the cabin's stove we managed to partially dry our clothes, warmed ourselves, ate lunch and went out and ran the course for snow depth and water content.  
 The wind had subsided when we started back, but not before it had erased every vestige of our trail. Visibility had become worse and we just got the chains on, and get back on the road.

"Jim Mechem, who has lived in the Carey valley all his life came along and we appreciated his help in finding my way to Carey in his pickup truck.  
 Mr. Bradshaw reported snow depth at the Garfield course was 28 inches with 6.1 inches of water content; up from 16 inches of snow with 2.9 inches of water as of Jan. 1. Snow depth on the same date in 1967 was 47 inches with 10.4 inches of water. In 1966 it was 27 inches with 7 inches of water and in 1965 it was 58 inches with 17 inches of water. The 15-year average for water content at this course on Feb. 1 is 7 inches.

The snow depth on Galena summit, which is reached by skiing in from U.S. 93 from a point just beyond the summit on the Salmon River side, is now 53.3 inches, with 13 inches of water content. In 1967 it was 41 inches of snow with 7.6 inches of water. In 1966 it was 71 inches of snow, with 18 inches of water; in 1965 there was 43 inches of snow with 12 inches of water and in 1964 there were 102 inches of snow with 32 inches of water. The 15-year average for water content here is 15 inches.

At the Horse Creek course snow depth is 48.6 inches with 10.7 inches of water, against 22.4 inches of snow with 5.5 inches of water as of Jan. 1. On Feb. 1, 1967, the depth was 68 inches

with 17 inches of water. The same date in 1966 there were 38 inches of snow with 11 inches of water, and in 1965 there were 64 inches of snow with 20.3 inches of water. The 15-year average water content here is 13 inches.

Snow depth at the Graham Ranch is now 36 inches, with 7 inches of water against 15 inches of snow with 2.6 inches of water last Jan. 1. On Feb. 1, 1967, there were 51 inches of snow with 12.7 inches of water. The same date in 1966 there were 33 inches of snow with 8.6 inches of water, and in 1965 there were 67 inches of snow with 22 inches of water. The average water content here over the past 15 years is 9 inches.

Sun Valley's Baldy Mountain showed 47.4 inches of snow with 10.3 inches of water content against 26 inches of snow with 4.9 inches of water Jan. 1. On Feb. 1, 1967, there were 72 inches of snow with 17.8 inches of water; the same date in 1967 there were 42 inches of snow with 11 inches of water. The average 15-year water content here is 13.6 inches.

At the Muldoon course, up from the Carey valley, there is 22.4 inches of snow with 4.6 inches of water content against 12 inches of snow with 2.2 inches of water 3 months ago. On Feb. 1, 1967, there was 40 inches of snow with 8.5 inches of water; in 1966 there was 25 inches of snow with 6 inches of water and in 1965 there was 43 inches

## Snake River Water Supply Said Good

**BURLEY** — "The outlook for irrigation water for the 1968 season is very good," announced Glenn Simmons, Minidoka Project superintendent.  
 End of January snow survey reports indicate the water content of the snow on the Snake River watershed to be sufficient, with the carry-over storage in the reservoirs, at this time, to practically assure a flood operation on the river this spring.

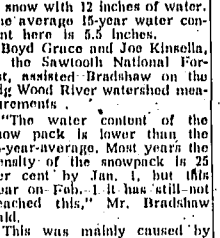
If the present trend on the watershed continues through March and April, the reservoirs on the Snake River at the Minidoka Project will fill, and water in a sizable quantity will spill past Milner Dam.  
 A total of 48 inches of new powder snow in the Lewis Lake Divide Area, 30 inches of which fell Feb. 1, snow pack information—a planned travel by snowcat is difficult and impossible in some areas. As the snow settles and consolidates, the survey will be completed, Mr. Simmons said.

Q: Almost every night and sometimes during the day I experience an unpleasant crawling or creeping sensation in my legs. Some relief is obtained by washing about. Is this due to poor circulation?

A: Poor circulation could be a factor. Consult your doctor. In many cases leg discomfort similar to that described comes under the heading of the "restless leg syndrome." The exact cause is unknown and symptoms are not related to any specific disease. Various forms of treatment may be applied, depending upon the age and physical condition of the patient.

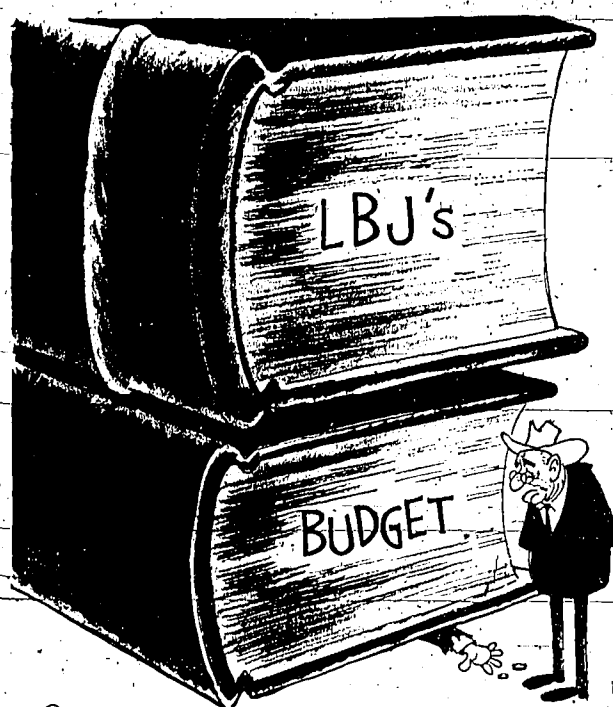

# Porsches Take Top Spots At Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Germany's mighty little Porsches, with Englishman Vic Elford bringing the winner home, roared to a smashing 2-3 victory Sunday in the car-racing 24 hours of the Daytona Sports Car Race.

Setting a brutal pace that knocked the big opposition out early, the amazing white speedsters turned the race into a parade in the final 10 hours as Porsche took a commanding lead in the race for the 1968 world championship.

It made no difference who had the wheel of the winning car. It was far ahead, five times as fast as the runner-up. Necessary driver changes were made in the last two hours, so each member of the Porsche team could share the honor of the triumph.

And at the end, three cars swept across the finish line abreast, taking the checkered flag of victory together.

A pair of Ford GT-40s, outgunning the Porsches in horsepower more than two-to-one, were the only cars that had a chance to make a late charge. But they couldn't match the Porsche durability in the fierce grind of America's longest race.

Jackie Ickx of Belgium and Brian Redman of England set a record-shattering pace for most of the first 250 miles, but the breakdown of the first GT-40.

For the next 750 miles, Paul Hawkins of Australia and David Hobbs of England kept the other GT-40 in a see-saw duel with the Porsches. Then it limped off the course and the field belonged to the Germans.

The average speed of the winning car was 105.697 miles an hour. The record of 108.020 was set by Lloyd Ruby and the late Ken Miles in a Ford in 1966.

The 29-year-old Beman, a sophomore on the pro tour who won the U.S. Amateur title in 1960 and 1963, had already finished with a fabulous seven under par 65 for a total score of 348, 12 shots under par for the distance.

Palmer finished with a 68 for the tie and they went immediately into the sudden death on the par four 15th. Each got the par but disaster struck Beman on the par four 16th. His second shot went into the fringe of the gallery to the right and he chipped out clean across and just off the green. Palmer meanwhile was on in two and got down easily in two more to win.

The day started out over the 7,010-yard par 36-36-72 course in 85-degree weather. It shaped up as a duel between the champions of the field, Billy Casper and Palmer. Casper held a lead of one stroke over Palmer and Beman was virtually unnoticed four strokes off the pace.

Casper increased his lead to two over Palmer and Beman was still four shots behind. Beman then put on a spurt, birdieing the 12th, 13th, 14th and 16th for a 32 and it appeared it might be good enough to win the \$20,000 top money.

Palmer, playing behind Beman, birdied the 11th on number 15 but sank a 20-foot putt to just escape with a bogey 5. Casper wound up with a 71 for 350 and a tie with Tom Weiskopf, who shot a 60.

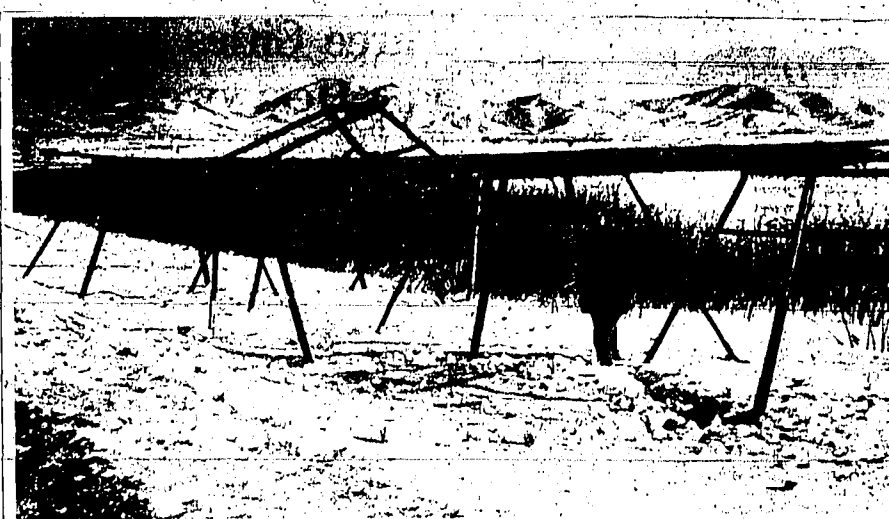

## Sportsmen Aid In Establishing Goose Population On Carey Lake

CAREY — A final step in establishing a permanent nesting population of geese on Carey Lake is being undertaken this winter. The department and gun club have the job of placing the still-legged platforms in the lake before the first snowfall.

Using material provided by the department, the outdoor group has built six nesting platforms and will set them in place this winter while the lake is frozen.

The department introduced a good population to the lake a few years ago, taking the surplus goslings produced at the Idaho Falls park. The young geese have thrived on the department-owned lake but evidently lack of proper nesting grounds have prevented them from returning in good numbers.

However, some limited nesting has been observed the past two or three years with the birds selecting the tops of muskrat mounds.

Although these are the first nesting platforms constructed under the auspices of the department, they follow a pattern used formerly with wooden ones. This design has been used with good results on the Blackfoot Reservoir.

Errett Twombly, Carey, spearheaded the project, allowing use of his service station for storing the materials and his equipment in construction. Other members are loaning use of their snowmobiles for placing the platforms on the ice.





Q. I own 100 shares of stock in a company that apparently has gone bankrupt. But I don't have any official notice of this. Can I declare this for a loss when I file my income tax return for 1967? Or must I wait until I get a final decision, sometime in the future?

A. If the stock became worthless in 1967, you should report your loss on the income tax return you file for that year. You do it on Schedule D of the income tax forms, where you list all your capital losses and (hopefully) gains. You put down the price you paid for the stock and the date on which you bought it. Then you list that stock as being worth "zero" as of Dec. 31, 1967.

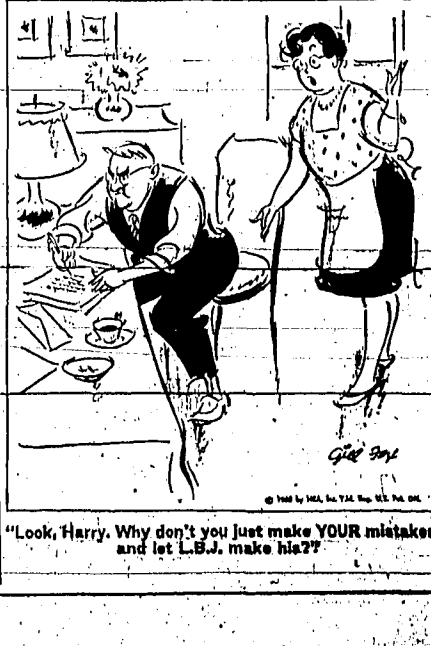


