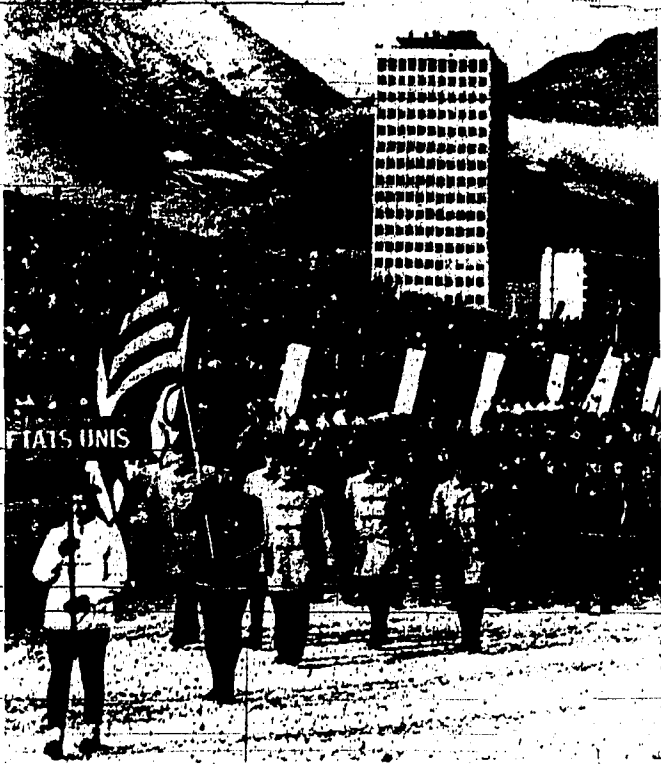

Mishap Mars U.S. Hopes

10th Winter Olympics Begin

GRENOBLE, France (AP) — The 10th Winter Olympics opened today with French President Charles de Gaulle presiding over the opening ceremony at the Grenoble center stadium and only one of America's brightest medal hopes sidelined by a tragic mishap on the last day of practice.

Roblin Morning of Santa Monica, Calif., broke her right leg practicing for the women's downhill competition Monday. A decision was expected today on possible surgery for the 20-year-old skier.

There were other minor scrapes and scratches as contestants finished their preparations for the games which will last from all over the world to oppose each other every four years.

President De Gaulle presided over colorful opening ceremonies in a 60,000 seat stadium built for the games. The Olympic committee was overwhelmed with some 1,500 Olympic athletes.

There was a light slate today with just three hockey games scheduled. The opening ceremonies—a spectacular production on which local officials had worked for months—dominated the day's activities.

There were the predictable last-minute squabbles Monday with Russian team officials slapping American wrists for what the Soviets called the aggression in Vietnam and the International Ski Federation clashing with Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee.

SAIGON (AP) — Attack and counterattack widened devastation across South Vietnam today as the Communists pushed their biggest offensive of the war into its second week.

Large sections of Saigon and Hue lay in smoldering ruins, and towering columns of smoke rose into the sunny skies as South Vietnamese dive-bombers, U.S. helicopter gunships, artillery and tanks blasted Communist troops in scattered sections.

Officials Study T.F. Intersections, Label 62 Dangerous

Twin Falls is a city of nearly 700 intersections and 62 of these have been termed "dangerous" by the city engineer's office.

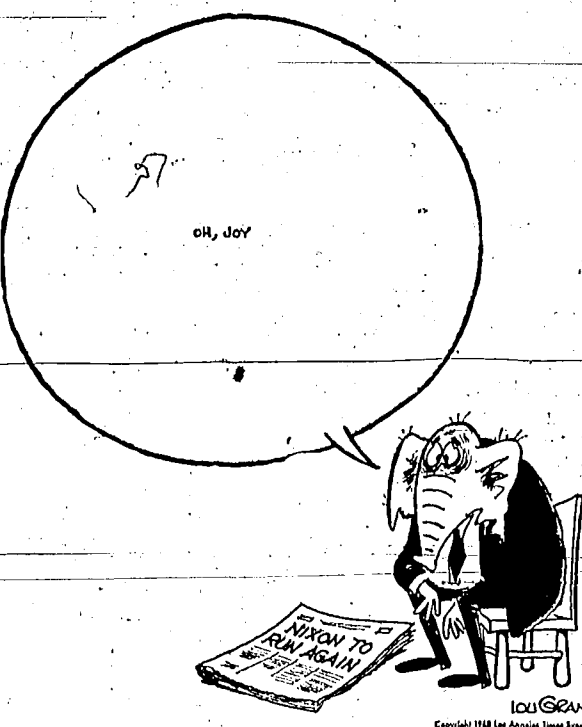

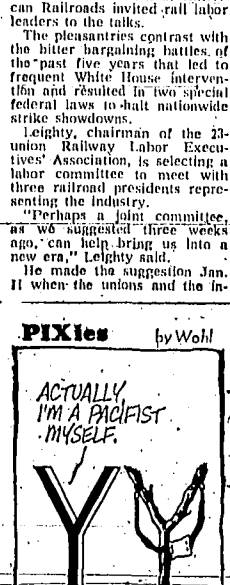

Battle For Open Tennis Almost Won

LONDON (AP) — The British believe they have almost won the battle for Open tennis, with the United States as their ally.
 Norman Davis, chairman of the All-England Club which plans to throw this year's Wimbledon open to pros and amateurs, said Monday:
 "Now that the Americans have sided with us, I feel open tennis has come to stay."
