AS AN ESTIMATED 2,000 persons watched, the old smokestack of the Amalgamated Sugar Co. tumbled, then with a dull thud crumbled into dust at 1:57 p.m. Sunday. The crowd immediately was covered with heavy black dust as the years' accumulation of soot was carried by a stiff breeze over the area right. The "funeral pyre" of the long-unused smokestack was lit at 1:30 p.m. and the crowd watched with mounting interest until the structure started to lean and then fell, with its top landing in the exact spot designated by

engineers from M. W. Kellogg Firm, Denver, who had laid a fire where the top of the smokestack was to hit. Cars were parked solidly from the factory to the Livestock Commission Yards on one side of the railroad tracks and also along Occidental Avenue for nearly a quarter of a mile. Tires and sand were put over the two sets of railroad tracks to cushion the blow of the falling structure. The smokestack, which was 18 feet in diameter at the bottom and narrowed to eight feet at the top, was estimated to weigh some 1,400 tons.

## Vietnamese Bomb Reds Holding Out In Hue's Citadel

SAIGON (AP) — Vietnamese warplanes bombed and strafed Communist forces holding out in Hue's Citadel today after U.S. Marine reinforcements were sent into the walled fortress for the first time in the two-week battle.  
The allied assaults were part of an all-out effort to drive the Communist North Vietnamese regulars and Viet Cong guerrillas from areas they have held since Jan. 31.  
The Communists, holding the Citadel's southeast corner, put up a hail of 50-caliber anti-aircraft fire at the attacking planes. Cloudy cover lifted to permit the first air attack on the fortress in 10 days.  
Two companies of Marines—about 300 to 400—entered the Citadel from landing craft sent up the Perfume River Sunday and another two companies of Leathernecks were taken to the Citadel's northern wall by assault boats today.  
The Marines have already captured the southern part of Hue in a series of street battles in the old imperial capital since the Communists attacked Hue in the early stages of their big offensive against 35 cities and towns. South Vietnamese troops pushed the Communist troops into one corner of the Citadel but had been unable to drive them out.  
The U.S. Marine force in Hue was about 1,000 men. AP correspondent George McArthur reported from Hue that the Marines were meeting only occasional sniper fire in the southern part of the city 400 miles north of Saigon.

## U Thant, Soviets Discussing Peace

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union publicly urged on the Vietnamese Communists to new victories today while Kremlin leaders secretly discussed peace prospects with U.N. Secretary-General U Thant.  
After his talks, Thant departed for London to confer with Prime Minister Harold Wilson. He had come to Moscow from India where he met with Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, U.S. Ambassador Chester Bowles and a North Vietnamese diplomat.  
Britain is co-chairman with the Soviet Union of the Geneva conference which ended the French-Indochina war in 1954. India is a member of the International Control Commission for Vietnam.  
Complete Soviet support for the peace programs of Hanoi and the Viet Cong, and promise of continued aid in fighting the United States, were given here while Thant was meeting with Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, Communist party General Secretary Leonid I. Brezhnev and President Nikolai S. Podgorny. Thant refused to talk to reporters before he left.  
Thant's London schedule called for a meeting Tuesday morning with Foreign Secretary George Brown and Luncheon with Wilson before departing for New York.  
Wilson said Sunday after a visit to Johnson that he supported President Johnson's San Antonio formula as the road to peace in Vietnam. He said he had carried the proposal to Kosygin when he visited Moscow Jan. 22-24.  
Johnson in a speech in San Antonio, Tex., last September promised an end to the bombing of North Vietnam when there was assurance from the Communist side that this will lead to prompt, productive peace talks. North Vietnamese Foreign Minister Nguyen Duy Trinh said last week the end could begin as soon as the bombing stopped.  
Wilson was interviewed on the CBS television-radio program "Face the Nation."

He said there were indications all North Vietnamese troops had withdrawn from the fighting for the south side, leaving only local guerrillas, including some who infiltrated among the 30,000 civilian refugees.  
Lt. Col. Phan Van Khon, provincial chief, mayor of Hue and district military commander, said Communist troops in Hue executed 300 civilians Friday and buried them in a mass grave south of the city. He said the grave was in an area not yet reached by allied forces but that his reports of the executions were precise and unquestionable.  
The victims were province officials, technicians, policemen and others who long had been involved in the fight by the Communists, he said.  
A Vietnamese civilian reported 125 to 150 Catholics being led from the city as captives Saturday.  
Fighting also continued in Saigon and in the bombing of the day, and communiques and field reports said U.S. and South Vietnamese infantrymen, helicopter gunships and fighter-bombers killed 223 Viet Cong in running battles around a government area on the east bank of the city northeast of Tan Son Nhut Air Base and near the Saigon racetrack on the city's western outskirts.

## President Park Considers Trip To U.S.

SEOUL (AP) — South Korean President Chung Hee Park is reportedly considering a trip to talk with President Johnson if U.S. presidential envoy Cyrus Vance could resolve the U.S.-South Korean rift over Korean security.  
Vance and Park met for the first time today. Vance's mission is to quiet South Korean fears that the United States is tending toward appeasement in the Pueblo incident and neglecting the increase in the infiltration of armed North Koreans into the South.  
Johnson sent Park a personal letter last Thursday, and Vance was expected to deliver another such letter today. Informed Korean sources said Johnson may have invited Park to Washington and, depending on the results of his talks with Vance, Park may decide to go.  
In a move "welcome to the South Koreans, the American officers who head the U.N. Command in Korea asked for a meeting with North Korea to air claims of Communist truce violations—in and through the demilitarized zone."  
North Korea rejected the command's proposal to meet today, but it was indicated that the Communists proposed meeting Wednesday and that this would be acceptable to the U.N. side.  
A U.S. military spokesman said four North Koreans crossed into South Korea around midnight Sunday, but American sentries repelled them in a brief clash. No casualties were reported.  
There was speculation that Vance would also meet with North Korean representatives before his scheduled departure Tuesday afternoon. The United States and North Korea have held five secret meetings since the Communists seized the U.S. intelligence-gathering ship Pueblo Jan. 23.  
No official reports have come out of the talks, but reliable Korean sources said they believed three injured Pueblo crewmen and the body of one sailor who died would be returned soon.  
The secret meetings lifted the South Koreans, traditionally

strong allies of the United States, who are more concerned about the security threat raised by the Communist commando raid into Seoul Jan. 21 in an attempt to assassinate President Park.  
The commandos failed, but a police chief was killed in a gun battle with them only 800 yards from the presidential mansion. Allied forces later killed 27 of the infiltrators and captured one.  
South Korean officials also were expected to ask Vance for return of operational control of their 500,000-man armed forces, now held by American Gen. Charles H. Bonesteel III, the commander of U.N. forces in South Korea.

## New Delhi Alerted To Meet Violence

NEW DELHI (AP) — Police in New Delhi and other cities went on the alert today to meet possible Hindu-Muslim violence following the mysterious death of the president of a right-wing Hindu party.  
The body of D. D. Upadhyaya, president of the Jan Sangh party since its founding in 1959, was found Sunday on a railway platform at Moghular, in Uttar Pradesh State, about 200 miles southeast of New Delhi.  
Upadhyaya, who had been traveling to the state capital of Lucknow, was reported to have died of skull and lung injuries, but no further details were made public.  
A huge funeral procession was planned in New Delhi today.  
Badr Madhok, a member of Parliament and a Jan Sangh member until two months ago, told newsmen: "It was a clear case of murder. It was planned murder." Other Hindu leaders made similar charges.  
Hindu-Muslim tension rose last week in Kashmir State after the head of a cow was found and Muslims were blamed for the sacred animal's slaughter.  
Communal bickering also came up in the opening budget session of Parliament in New Delhi today. The Communists and Socialists walked out on a speech by President Zakir Husain and members of the DMK party from Madras State boycotted the session. The DMK party is among those resisting abolition of the Hindi tongue in Madras.

## Resigns

PITTSBURGH (AP) — J. W. Abel, president of the U.S. Steelworkers Union, resigned today from the board of the American for Democratic Action (ADA) over the group's endorsement of peace candidate Sen. Eugene McCarthy for president.  
"The board's repudiation of President Johnson on the basis of a single issue in a time of national emergency and commitment, while ignoring the President's over-all record of accomplishment, in areas of traditional concern to ADA, is unwarranted, unrealistic, shortsighted and ignores the realities of the present political situation," said Abel's resignation.

## Firemen To Issue Pay Raise Petitions

Twin Falls firemen will begin circulating petitions Tuesday in an effort to gain citizen support in a battle aimed at getting a \$4 a month increase for the city's firefighters.  
Firemen have been meeting with the city council, presenting their views and getting the city's views on a pay raise. The last such meeting was Friday night. It lasted two hours and at that time it was announced the council has budgeted \$3,000 in the 1968 budget to pay for a complete fire department study.  
The councilmen said then they believe city employees are "underpaid about \$100 a month, but added it would take a "huge" tax increase to raise all city wages.  
The city councilman John Angerbauser said Monday, "A lot of people in Twin Falls are underpaid. If we okay an increase to firemen, we would have to increase wages paid in other departments."  
He said he wondered if the taxpayer in the city would agree with such an increase, "which could cost the taxpayer an additional \$500,000."  
Firemen said they have encouraged citizens to support "circulating the petition" in return. The petition asks that the fireman's wage be increased 40 cents an hour.  
The petitions will be presented to members of the City Council at a budget hearing at 7:30 p.m. next Monday at City Hall.  
Firemen said they base their petition on 13 points, most of them dealing with the allegation firemen are "underpaid \$100 a month." They also challenge certain figures on Fire Department costs in the city. The fig-

## Magistrates Rap Legislature For Lack Of Action On Traffic Laws

Members of the Idaho Magistrates Assn., alarmed over the mounting highway death rate in Idaho, have reiterated their appeal to the Idaho Legislature and Gov. Samuelson to consider legislation for tightening up traffic laws and driver regulations.  
Reed P. Maughan, Twin Falls Justice of the Peace, Monday released a letter sent by the association to the governor urging consideration of specific recommendations which the association said were requested but have gone unheeded by the legislature and governor.  
Pointing out that Idaho's magistrates have greater contact with the state's driving public than any other court, Glenn A. Phillips, Arco, association president, said there has been considerable criticism of the courts in traffic law handling, but most of the fault lies not with the courts, but with the state's laws.  
In the open letter to Gov. Samuelson and the citizens of Idaho, the Idaho Magistrates Assn. listed three proposals that it said are long overdue, but ignored by legislators: asking stronger traffic laws. These were ignored, they added.

## County Nearly Ready To Adopt Budget

Commissioners of Twin Falls County said Monday morning they hope to be ready to adopt their 1968 final budget by 5 p.m.  
Although state law states the budget should be adopted on the second Monday of February, the Monday meeting can be adjourned if budget figures are not complete by the end of business on that date.  
Commissioners said that while Monday was open for hearing on the proposed budget of \$3,560,285, they anticipated very little taxpayer interest.  
Members of the Twin Falls County Farm Bureau asked for a meeting with the commissioners during the day and members of the group supporting a \$15,500 mental retardation center budget were at the commission meeting.  
Ray Lincoln, spokesman for the group, said they were not on hand to protest any budgeting, but rather to support the amount set aside for their project.  
Of the total county budget only about one-third or \$1,247,130 will be provided through taxes and although the tentative figure is higher than last year's budget, commissioners say they do not see any tax increase for the current year under the proposed budget.

EDITOR'S NOTE — While one knows, they will die should anything go seriously wrong with the supply of air, water or heat—in short, with their environment aboard the tiny spacecraft.  
But mankind at home on earth is threatening ominously to destroy his own planet, by actions as careless as astronauts deliberately tampering with their life-support system. Mankind on earth is even running out of places to throw away his garbage and trash.  
The earth is actually only one huge spaceship. It spins at 1,000 miles an hour; it wheels around the sun once a year at 66,000 m.p.h.; it is one captive planet of the sun, whirling within the Milky Way galaxy at 630,000 m.p.h. on the sun's enormous cosmic mission.  
Every human being thus is a member of a space crew. Planet earth keeps them alive with one total environment; only one, to supply the air, water, food, heat, all the materials to support all of its current 3.3-billion passengers. By some predictions, within 30 more years there will be five to seven billion passengers, all dependent upon and in turn influencing earth's self-contained environment.  
At accelerating pace, man is poisoning, polluting and abusing his earth environment.  
"We are exploiting the earth the way a parasite exploits its host. But if our host earth is killed, we have nowhere else to go," says Dr. Harold G. Cassidy, Yale University chemist.  
Air in city and country alike is becoming increasingly polluted, at rising risk to human health and life. Water in streams, lakes, ocean shores is becoming more contaminated, smelly, dangerous to health and aquatic life.  
Man in his tenure has caused the extinction of at least 300 species of animals, has destroyed forests and grasslands, and created dust bowls.  
Uncontrolled noise impairs hearing and "stress" urban Americans have forgotten what tranquility is." one conservationist observes.

# Portland Man Talks In T.F. On Vietnam

"Today the chance of negotiation with Ho Chi Minh is gone," Kelsey Hinshaw, Portland, American Friends Service Committee, declared at the Y building in Twin Falls Wednesday night.

Mr. Hinshaw reported on a seminar he recently attended in Washington, D.C., with State Department, Pentagon officials and congressmen at which "Paths of Peace" were discussed.

The speaker said he feels the U.S. has missed beyond the point of negotiation and outlined three possibilities for the U.S. concerning the Vietnam war.

"We can completely lay waste to Vietnam, continue the present policy of gradual escalation or decide we've had enough and get out," he declared.

The speaker favors the third proposal and suggested the peace-keeping force there should be composed of non-whites from Southeast Asian countries.

"When over 50 per cent of the people of the U.S. favor pulling out of Vietnam, that is what we'll do," he noted.

He noted that Ho Chi Minh is considered a national hero in Vietnam and added that prostitution is the "No. 1 business in South Vietnam."

## H. Lindsey, Noted Actor, Dies At Age 78

NEW YORK (AP) — Howard Lindsey, actor, director and playwright for more than a half century—but familiarly known to millions as the irascible father in Broadway's "Life With Father"—died Sunday of leukemia. He was 78 years old.

Lindsey not only appeared in "Life With Father," for over five of his seven years' run, he wrote it with the late Russel Crouse, with whom he collaborated on 20 plays.

Lindsey's wife, Dorothy Cliney, portrayed the mother in the play.

Among other hits resulting from the Lindsey-Crouse association, which ended in 1962 with the death of Crouse, were "State of the Union," which won them the 1944 Pulitzer Prize; "Aranic and Old Lace," which ran for over three years; the musical "Anything Goes," with the aid of Evelyn Berlin; "Call Me Madam," which starred Ethel Merman.

Lindsey also wrote the book for "The Sound of Music," starring Mary Martin, for which he was given the 1960 Antoinette Perry Award.

Born in Waterford, N.Y., March 29, 1880, Lindsey attended the Boston Latin School, spent a year at Harvard University, and studied at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts.

## Yost Reveals Gains In Tax Levies

BOISE (AP) — A tax expert said Saturday taxes levied against all property in Idaho totaled \$87.9 million in 1967, a gain of \$7 million over 1966.

Max Yost, Executive manager of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, said the calculation was based on questionnaires filled out and returned to him by county clerks.

He said the average property tax levy was \$9.40 per \$100 of assessed valuation, up from \$9.05 per \$100 but below the \$10.20 average for 1964, prior to the enactment of the sales tax.

The total property tax bill for 1964, Yost said, was \$78.2 million and in 1965, the year the sales tax became effective, it dropped to \$76.3 million.

Since then, Yost said, increases in assessed valuation and in levies by some taxing districts have boosted property tax collections to \$80.9 million for 1966 and the \$87.9 total for 1967.

"Judging from the 1968 budgets which we have reviewed," Yost added, "it appears that 1968-property taxes could take another increase — unless there is more taxpayer interest in the budgets than there presently appears."

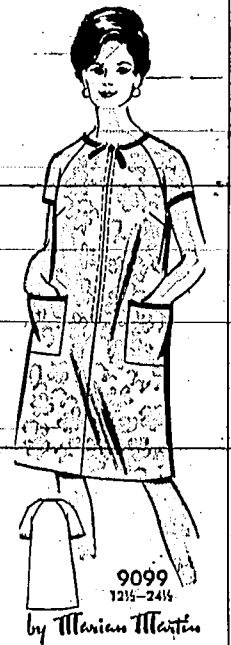

# Southern Demo Carries Portrait Of Lincoln

WASHINGTON (AP) — At least one Southern Democrat in the Senate joined Republicans in honoring the birthday anniversary of Abraham Lincoln, GOP patron saint and Civil War president.

Amid preparations for "Lincoln Day" observations around the nation, traditional occasions for speeches and campaign fund-raising efforts by Republican politicians, Sen. Harry F. Byrd Jr., D-Va., said of Lincoln:

"He was one of our great presidents."

Byrd said Northerners shouldn't be surprised that a Southerner such as himself thinks highly of Lincoln, born 139 years ago.

He noted Lincoln's declaration of "charity toward all."

"Had he lived," said the senator in an interview, "the plight of the South would have been much less severe."

Visitors to his Senate office find a portrait of Lincoln in a prominent position on Byrd's desk, emblazoned on the front of his leather-covered appointment book.

"I'm a great admirer of Lincoln," he said. "When I see one like this in a stationery store, I buy it."

One of Byrd's hobbies is history, and much of his reading has been concerned with Lincoln and his time, the senator said.

"What was perhaps our most tragic era—because of this war which was a fight within the family, so to speak—produced two of the greatest leaders we have had: Lincoln and Robert E. Lee."

NEW YORK (AP) — Men are busy today collecting tons of garbage rotting on New York streets, but the governor and Mayor John V. Lindsay agree on one thing: the city is in a state of emergency.

Differences between the two nationally prominent Republicans escalated over the week-end as Governor Rockefeller's action Saturday night to end the city's 9-day, illegal strike by the Unemployed Sanitationmen's Association.

Rockefeller, in an unprecedented move, placed the city's 10,000 sanitation workers under state control and put them back on the streets. By then, garbage had a 10-to-1 edge on the collectors—10 tons for each man.

Lindsay, already fuming because Rockefeller balked at the city's request for a National Guard call-up, exploded at the state takeover, calling it unwise and a threat to every city in the nation.

County Judge F. Ryan Duffy Jr. first sentenced Groppi to 30 months in the House of Correction, then stayed the sentence and imposed probation.

He told the priest that should he be arrested again during the period of probation, the jail term would be reinstated.

Father Groppi was convicted by a jury last Friday of resisting arrest during an attempted march last August. The demonstration, held during a brief period when Milwaukee Mayor Henry Maier attempted to ban such activities by proclamation, ended in a melee with police. More than 100 persons were arrested, including the priest.

The court ordered the fine paid within 24 hours.

# Bright Satellite, Echo 1, Is About To Die

WASHINGTON (AP) — Echo 1, the U.S. satellite that long has ranked as the brightest and most easily observed spacecraft circling the earth, appears to be about to die.

The Goddard Space Flight Center, Greenbelt, Md., confirms reports by amateur sky-watchers that the balloon-like Echo—observed by millions of people in every corner of the country since its launching Aug. 12, 1960—may drop back to earth any time.

A Goddard spokesman said the North American Defense Command has forecast, on the basis of computer studies of the satellite's recent orbit, that it may fall into the earth's atmosphere about March 31.

But Echo 1 is a large, very light spherical object and therefore somewhat unpredictable.

# Idaho News

**BOY IS SHOT**  
MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP)—A Mountain Home boy was in fair condition in a Boise hospital Sunday night after he was struck in the chest by a small-caliber bullet as he walked along the Mountain Home Municipal Golf Course.

The wounded youth was identified as 14-year-old Jeff Day.

Elmore County Sheriff's officers said they believed the shooting was accidental and that the bullet came from a gun fired nearby in Abbeys Canyon.

Officers said investigation would continue into the 3 p.m. shooting.

# Patrolmen Wear History On Sleeves

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Montana highway patrolmen their penchant for the past clearly visible, literally—wear history on their shirtsleeves.

On the shoulder patch of each patrolman, and also printed in bright yellow on their patrol car insignias, are the figures 3-7-77, the dread symbol of Montana's frontier vigilantes.

Many historians believe the figures represent the dimensions of a grave—3 feet wide, 7 feet long and 77 inches deep. The 3-7-77 was the number of the men who first brought law to the rough and tumble Montana Territory.

"We chose the symbol to keep alive the memory of this first people's police force," said Alex Stephens, chief of the Montana Highway Patrol and designer of the insignia. "This was the first group of civilians to organize as a body to uphold the laws of this state."

Vigilante activity in the fledgling police territory began in the 1860s, though the original movement started in the California gold fields. The groups dealt swift punishment to persons they considered to be offenders, though the innocent sometimes suffered when the vigilantes took the law into their own hands.

The cryptic set of figures soon became identified with vigilante action and were feared by highwaymen and other outlaws. Later they became a symbol of faith—and peace—of mind—for Montana settlers.

The figures may have been a warning to an outlaw that his presence was no longer desired in a particular town. They meant that a grave was to be dug quickly for those who ignored the ominous warning.

In all, 32 persons were hanged by extrajudicial vigilante groups. A number were banished and others fled.

# Dianna Holum Grabs 3rd Spot In Speed Skating To Win 2nd Medal At Games

GRENOBLE, France (AP) — The U.S. Olympic team, still ecstatic over Peggy Fleming's smashing triumph in figure skating, put something else to rest about Sunday when Dianna Holum won her second medal of the Winter Games by finishing third in the 1,000-meter speed skating race.

Miss Holum's achievement, however, did not completely overshadow the disappointing performance of Cynthia and Ronald Kauffmann in the country's figures-of-the-pairs skating and the fourth loss by the witless U.S. hockey team, this one a 3-2 decision to Canada.

At the same time, France's Jean-Claude Killy took a half step toward being sweeter than the three men's Alpine King races, posting the fastest time in the first of two giant slalom runs, and Italy's Eugenio Monti, nine-time world champion high jumper, ended years of frustration by winning his first Olympic gold medal.

Miss Titova also bettered the old record with a time of 1:32.9, one-half second ahead of Dianna Holum, who finished in the 500-meter with a record in the 1:50.0.

Jenny Fish of Strongsville, Ohio, who was in the 500 triple tie, placed 23rd in the 1,000 in 1:38.4, but Jeanne Ashworth of Wilmington, N.Y., was seventh in 1:34.7 after finishing 16th in the 500. Miss Holum was 13th in the 1,500.
