## City OK's Budget Without Hiking Salaries; Firemen Plan To Ask Referendum

Twin Falls firemen lost the first round in their battle to get a wage increase when the city council, after a 10-minute public hearing, passed the 1968 budget in the amount of \$2,207,241.

More than 150 people jammed the City Hall council chambers Monday night to watch the public hearing. But, of all those

present, only two spoke out against approval of the budget. Firemen said they will now take the pay raise question directly to the people by submitting signatures calling for a referendum vote as soon as possible. An attorney will be hired to handle the legal work, firemen said after the meeting.

OTTAWA (AP) — Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson's Cabinet awaited his return from Jamaica today before deciding whether to resign because the House of Commons voted down his proposed 5-per-cent income tax surcharge.

## Red Antiaircraft Guns Sighted At Saigon Base

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnamese military headquarters reported today that aerial observers had sighted several Communist antiaircraft guns menacing a section of Saigon's Binh Son Nhut Air Base. South Vietnamese bombers were sent to destroy them.

A Vietnamese spokesman said the gun positions were spotted about 2 1/2 miles south of the air base, one of the busiest in the world, which came under heavy rocket attack Sunday during the communists' "second wave" offensive.

Unofficial reports circulated that the Communists were planning another attack tonight on the South Vietnamese capital, a city of nearly 3 million people. The Viet Cong were reported to have distributed leaflets in several sections of the Gia Dinh suburb threatening an attack and urging the people to support them in an uprising. Police and military units already are on a full alert.

The "second wave" Communist offensive last weekend has subsided, but there was no assurance it wouldn't heat up again. Intelligence reports reaching the U. S. Mission here in the Mekong Delta province of Kien Hoa, the Viet Cong province committee received a directive from the Communist high command to provide maximum reinforcements to support the Viet Cong in Saigon in the "second wave."

## First Asian Heart Transplant Fails

BOMBAY, India (AP) — King Edward Memorial Hospital announced today that its surgeons last Sunday performed the first heart transplant in Asia. It said the patient lived three hours after the operation.

The hospital said a 35-year-old man who was doomed because of cardiomyopathy was given the heart of 20-year-old woman in a 2 1/2-hour operation.

## Livestock Hall Of Fame Honors Area Men

Five area men were honored for their outstanding work in agriculture and livestock in a banquet Monday night at the Holiday Inn, Twin Falls.

The five men who were named to the Southern Idaho Agricultural Livestock Industry Hall of Fame were the late Warren Daigh, former Twin Falls County agent; Otto Florence Jr., general manager and vice president of Independent Meat Co.; John W. Noh, Kimberly; and Frank Jougard, Rupert, both longtime sheepmen; and Dr. D. A. Jackson, Twin Falls veterinarian.

Mr. Youtz told those attending the banquet that Mr. Daigh, who died Jan. 8, was a county agent for 38 years in Clark and Oregon, and fought hard to bring agriculture and the livestock industry up to the standards they are today.

Mr. Rich told of how Mr. Jougard came to this country from France and how he got started in the sheep industry. He said that Mr. Jougard at one time handled 8,000 sheep.

These five men were commended Monday night during the Hall of Fame banquet for their contributions to the livestock industry as well as agriculture in Magic Valley.

Mr. Florence, who has upgraded the meat packing industry in Magic Valley as well as

in the Western States, was presented the Hall of Fame award by Cecil Brim, Buhl rancher. Mr. Florence has been general manager of Independent Meat since 1951 and along with his brothers, has operated the business since then. Mr. Florence belongs to many national and state organizations related to the meat packing industry and livestock industry.

Gene Hull, vice president, Twin Falls Bank and Trust Co., presented the Hall of Fame award to Dr. Jackson for his outstanding work in veterinary services to the livestock industry in Magic Valley. Mr. Hull told of Dr. Jackson's early practice in the area and how he got started in this area.

Mr. Jougard, who has been a county agent for 14 years, has been county agent at Rupert for 13 years, five years at Pocatello and seven years in Oregon. While he was a county agent he was known as "Dean of Idaho County Agents."

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WASHINGTON — I will bet 3 to 1 that if President Johnson screwed his diplomatic courage to the sticking point and told India to get lost he would become an overnight hero to plain Americans from Bangor, Me., to Long Beach, Calif.

As the U.S. taxpayer must be fed up with well-nursing a government that opposes American foreign policy every inch of the way, and yet continues to fill the air with cries of "Gimme!" India's latest rebuff to the hand that feeds her received slight attention, perhaps because her ingratitude is such old hat. She cast her vote with Communist Poland to refuse to let the International Control Commission, for which she provides the chairman, do a better job of Cambodia's border with South Vietnam.

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fact that both Prince Sihanouk of Cambodia, surely no tool of Wall Street, and the South Vietnamese regime had urged the commission to step up its investigations. With the third member of the commission, Canada, outvoted, the commission instead decided it would respond only to specific Cambodian complaints of intrusion.

India whimpers that the world was indifferent to her perils. President Johnson had written Mrs. Gandhi urging her to go along with the American proposal to strengthen the three-member ICC set by the 1954 Geneva Accords. He pointed out, among other things, that the Geneva documents did not require the ICC to wait passively for complaints of border incursions but stated it could "act on its own initiative."

## Court Of The People

The American public's constitutional right-to-know was squarely on the line Monday at the American Bar Association annual convention being held in Chicago.

The greatest friend of truth and justice is the responsible news media, which is interested in justice for the sake of justice.

Up for adoption was far-flung recommendations — the so-called Reardon Report — prepared by the association's Advisory Committee on Fair Trial and Free Press.

The lawyer is an advocate — and he should be. He wants to see the cause of his client prevail. We would have it no other way.

1. That courts be encouraged to exercise contempt power against a person who "disseminates by any means of public communication, an extrajudicial statement . . . If the statement is reasonably calculated to affect the outcome of the trial and seriously threatens to have such an effect."

2. That court rules provide that the defendant may move the public be excluded from parts of a trial and from parts of a pre-trial hearing.

# Saigon Repair Program Is In Danger

**SAIGON (AP)** — The Saigon government's program to repair the vast damage wreaked by the Viet Cong's lunar new year offensive appeared in danger today, informed sources reported. Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky and Maj. Gen. Nguyen Duc Thang had resigned from the National Recovery Committee named to administer the program.

Ky was chairman of the committee and Thang was its chief of staff. The latter is the energetic former boss of the nation's pacification program; U.S. officials consider him one of the best men in the government.

Ky's resignation, reported by a member of Premier Nguyen Van Loc's Cabinet, was considered an indication of the inability of Ky and President Nguyen Van Thieu to work together, even under the pressure put on the government by the intensified Communist attacks since the end of January.

Ky reportedly told the committee at a meeting today he was resigning because he was tired of reports saying his planning to utilize the committee's powers to take over the government from Thieu.

Thieu reportedly told Ky he was satisfied with the work he had done and did not care about the reports. But American sources close to the committee reported Ky was adamant and probably would not attend any more meetings of the group.

Mr. Knoble, in his late 70's, died Thursday at Phillips, S. D., and funeral services were held Monday at Quinn.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Gladys Smith, and eight grandchildren. Cottonwood, S. D. His wife, Lois, died in January, 1966.

He was a 30-year resident of Richfield. Richfield relatives include two nephews, Forrest Armstrong, and L. T. Sanders.

# Plane Crash Victims Are Identified

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — Three victims of a Sunday afternoon plane crash in far southern Utah have tentatively been identified as California. San Juan County Sheriff Ross Muslemann said late Monday that badly burned bodies of the three had been brought out of desolate, rugged terrain near the Arizona border.

He said a light aircraft piloted by a man believed to be a Leo Crooks, age unknown, of San Bernardino, went down shortly after attempting a take-off from a remote landing strip constructed during the uranium boom of the 1950s.

Muslemann said papers found at the scene indicated the two passengers were a Rich Townsend, North Hollywood, and Julie Cannon, 22, an employee of the Columbia Broadcasting System in Los Angeles. Townsend's age was not available.

Muslemann said positive identification would be impossible until dental records of the three were forwarded to Utah authorities.

The young woman recently moved from Provo, Utah, to Los Angeles, her father, Angus Cannon, said.

# Nominees For Oscars Selected

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner," a film about an interracial romance, tied with "Bonnie and Clyde," a story of crime in the 1930s, with 10 nominations each for the 40th Academy Awards.

A child's fantasy tale, "Doctor Doolittle," ranked next with nine. The nominees, announced Monday, included the late Spencer Tracy in "Doctor Doolittle," "Bonnie and Clyde," "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner," "The Graduate," and "In the Heat of the Night" were named contenders for the best picture award.

Tracy was nominated for the ninth time as best actor for his performance in "Coming to Dinner." Warren Beatty for his role as Clyde, Dustin Hoffman in "The Graduate," Paul Newman as "Cool Hand Luke" and Rod Taylor for "In the Heat of the Night."

Tracy's nomination was a record for an actor.

His roles in "Captains Courageous" in 1937 and "Boys Town" in 1938 brought him Academy Awards for Best Actor. Dean has been nominated posthumously and none awarded to an actor three times.

Nominees for best actress were Anne Bancroft for her portrayal of a lonely old woman in "The Whisperers," Audrey Hepburn for her role in "Wait Until Dark," and Faye Dunaway, Anne Bancroft and Katharine Hepburn for roles in "Bonnie and Clyde," "The Graduate" and "Coming to Dinner," respectively.

Sidney Poller, who starred in two of the films named for best picture, failed to gain a best actor nomination.

The Negro star won the Oscar for his role in "Lilies of the Field" in 1963.

The awards will be handed out at Santa Monica Civic Auditorium April 8.

## Nixon Often Uses Football Metaphor To Talk Politics

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) — Richard M. Nixon is an avid football fan and in talking politics he often uses a football metaphor.

Example: "The spotter high in the stands can see things on the field that the players can't see. That's how I regard my years out of office. I've had time to observe, read and think and as a result, I've spotted things we can do about America's problems."

Nixon is campaigning in New Hampshire and Wisconsin this week, intent on winning—and winning big—in the presidential primaries of those states on March 12 and April 2, respectively.

To continue his own metaphor, Nixon has become a political Bart Starr, the polished pro quarterbacking a young, fast-thinking team. He mixes his plays for maximum gains—foreign affairs, domestic issues, tempered criticism of President Johnson, an occasional sharp thrust at potential rivals, solid argument laced with humor.

He has been very quick to seize on developments in the news and update his campaign by commenting on them. The latest examples were the North Korean seizure of the Pueblo, the garbage strike in New York City, the dispatch of more American jet fighters to South Korea.

Another tactic has been to refer, with increasing frequency, to the actions of the Eisenhower Administration in which he served for eight years as the vice president.

He reminds his audiences that "President Eisenhower not only ended the Korean war but kept us out of others for eight years," and that Eisenhower made extensive use of his vice president.

Investigating Mindoka County sheriff's officers said Mrs. Clarence (Jennie) Rose, 63, Burley, was taken to the Mindoka Memorial Hospital where she was treated for her injuries and released.  
Pamela S. Davis, 14, Rupert, driver of the other vehicle, received minor bruises and was treated by a physician.  
Officers said the accident oc-

curred when Clarence Rose, 60, Burley, driver of the first vehicle, apparently pulled into the path of the Davis auto after stopping at a stop sign.

Mr. Rose was cited for failure to yield the right of way. Damage to Mrs. Davis' 1965 Dodge was estimated at \$800, and to Rose's 1963 Chevrolet at \$500.

They said it was felt Goddard shouldn't testify because his differences with Johnson would be exposed.

"It's an awkward position, but there hasn't been any muzzling," said Theodore C. Kron, assistant FDA commissioner. "The commissioner isn't the kind of guy you can muzzle anyway."

Goddard was to have been the lead-off witness at Monday's scheduled hearings by the Senate juvenile delinquency subcommittee. The hearing was postponed and no new date was set.

The subcommittee chairman, Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., was reported angered by what sources said was a decision by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare not to have Goddard appear.

HEW officials said their decision was in line with the known wishes of President Johnson. Goddard has testified before Congress previously that he did not favor making possession of

LSD illegal. Cron said Goddard hasn't changed his mind.

President Johnson proposed in his recent "crime" message to Congress that possession of LSD, which now carries no penalty, be made a misdemeanor.

An administration source said there's "no one in the department who recommended that." The source said HEW policy-

makers agree that penalties should be sought for manufacture, sale or distribution of LSD but that "we shouldn't make criminals out of knuckleheaded kids who try the stuff."

A team of government scientists reported today that a new study discloses LSD often causes opposite moods to occur in practically the same time in a given user.

For example, they related, a user can feel tense yet calm, or serious—but silly—within the same few moments.

Dr. Martin M. Katz, a psychologist of the National Institute of Mental Health, and two colleagues, told of the findings in a report in the Journal of Abnormal Psychology.

Rep. William L. Springer of Illinois, ranking Republican on the House Commerce Committee, said meanwhile that the proposal to make possession of LSD punishable by a maximum one-year jail sentence is inadequate.

A Commerce subcommittee opened hearings Monday on the administration drug control proposals.

NEW YORK (AP) — Grants totaling more than \$3 million for "strengthening of predominantly Negro colleges" were announced today by the Ford Foundation.

The three largest grants were \$1,107,225 to Tuskegee Institute in Alabama and \$857,770 to Hampton Institute in Virginia to assist the general development of the schools over the next 3 1/2

years, and \$297,000 to Texas Southern University at Houston to develop a new graduate curriculum for business training.

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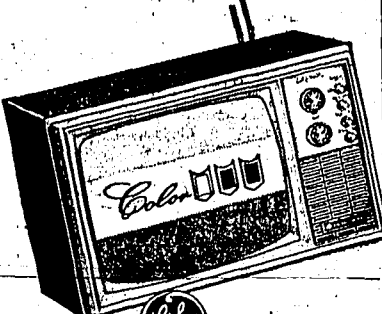
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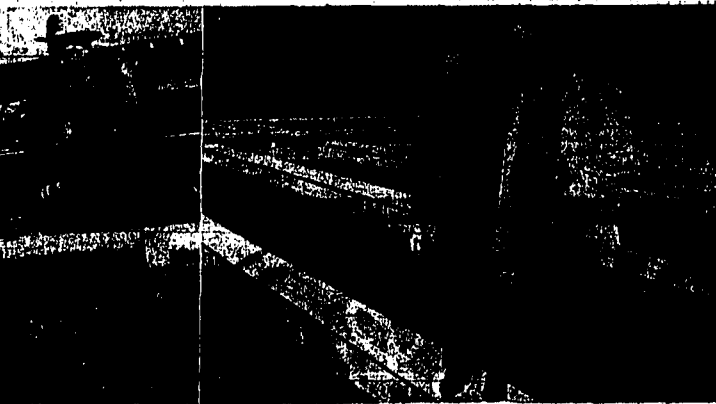

**Mystery Of Thousand Springs Explained**

Years ago before the dawn of man, but after the mountains were formed and long after the ice had melted, a biological mystery was formed in South Idaho. The mystery lasts to this day. In fact, businessmen have capitalized on it.

It may take three or five years for the water to reach the spring near Hagerman.

When it does, it goes out of the north canyon wall through a natural tube formed through the ages.

Water coming out of the south side of the canyon wall is just part of the filter system. When the Snake River Canyon was formed, it cut the filter in half but left the natural drainage tubes in the canyon wall.

Therefore the water from this underground filter flows to the lowest point, or the Snake River Canyon. There, the water rushes into the river or into drainage ditches plied by man.

The source of this water has to be from many places. No one river could furnish the amount of water that daily pours from the tubes in the canyon's wall.

Billions of gallons a year. Seeing this source of water going to waste, the Idaho Power Co. sought to harness the power. It bought the water rights. But the company is not selfish.

The water is given to those who want to use it, and the men who raise fish for a living can put the water to good use.

The water, in turn, can be used again for irrigation, and after its use by the fish farmers it is even better for growing crops because it contains organic waste from the fish.

Fish are big business from Hagerman to Hansen. There is one national hatchery, three state hatcheries, one supported by Idaho Power and many, many privately owned fish hatcheries.

The Hagerman Chamber of Commerce, headed by president Ralph Sullivan, feels there is a great potential in the fish raising business.

"It has expanded in the past years with the advent of frozen foods and fast transportation of live fish," he said.

Disease is a problem. The Hagerman Valley is the center of the nation's trout business. Last year nearly 4.84 million pounds of trout were raised in the area. About 4.02 million pounds of this was privately raised, and the rest came from the national or state hatcheries.

Increases in the business are being seen every day, and great strides are predicted within the next few years.

But to protect this investment, to protect the trout, the fish farmers need to guard against disease.

James Warren, a biologist at the National Fish Hatchery, helps. His is a full time job, attempting to insure the farmers that his crop of fish will be safe — his investment insured against disease.

Hagerman does represent the growers, it is alleged.

Construction of such a diagnostic facility at Hagerman would cost between \$30,000 and \$50,000. The staff would consist of three to five professional biologists and two or three technicians.

The annual payroll would amount to about \$30,000 and operations would add another \$10,000 annually to the Hagerman economy.

Hagerman does not know if it will get the diagnostic facility. The matter is still being studied in Washington, D.C.

A diagnostic unit at Hagerman would aid fish growers a great deal, Mr. Sullivan said, "and it would help the Hagerman economy. We need all the new business we can get."

Where the fish grower faces grave-disease problems with his fish now, the problem would be reduced to a small degree with a diagnostic laboratory.

Shipment of fish would be held, and impurities of eggs to raise trout would have built-in safeguards.

An average of 60 per cent of the eggs hatched in the Hagerman valley grow up to full sized trout. Growers feel this average could be increased with a diagnostic laboratory.

Mr. Sullivan said, "We are talking about such a small amount of money, in comparison with the national budget, that we may have some trouble getting the facility simply because no one wants to take the time with such a small item."

The program to get the facility at Hagerman has been headed up by John LeMoynne, chairman of the facility committee for the Hagerman Chamber of Commerce.

I remember that part toward the end of his speech where he said something to the effect that 'our hearts go with you.' And I remember the part about the Marines over there needing us. I felt warmly towards him."

At Ft. Bragg, N.C., Army Sgt. Major Anthony Garcia said Monday, "These guys are professionals. Soldiers aren't usually impressed, but these guys were because it was the President."

At El Toro Marine Corps Air Station in South California, of Johnson, "I'm sure he didn't

like sending people off to a place where he knew some would be killed and wounded. I'm sure it made the men feel better that he showed his concern."

Some Marines disagreed with part of Johnson's speech in which he said, "This is a decisive time in Vietnam. The eyes of the nation and the world—the eyes of history itself—are on that brave band of defenders who hold the path to Khe Sanh."

"I think it's a decisive time in the history of our country," commented Marine 1st Lt. Richard Maddox of San Francisco. "I'm not sure Khe Sanh is the turning point."

Asked Monday if he thought the battle of Khe Sanh would be decisive, Dornhofer replied, "I don't think so . . . I think the summer will be decisive."

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# Owners Of School Speculate

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Two university instructors are trying to figure out what to do with a 24-room school, complete with library and gymnasium, which they bought unintentionally for \$3,851.

"We aren't going to turn those children out into the street," said Roy Stumpf, who along with Bob Goemans inadvertently purchased the estimated \$200,000 two-story school.

"It's going to be a real challenge deciding what to do with the school," Stumpf said, with tongue in cheek.

Last summer, the two instructors at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, entered a real-estate bid for Bellevue School, one of two abandoned one-story school buildings offered for sale by the Green Bay Board of Education.

"We put a bid in on it for speculation," Stumpf explained. "The land might be worth something some day."

"But there seemed to be something wrong with the deed, so I asked the city clerk. He assured me it was all right, so we dropped it there."

Stumpf and Goemans found out Friday they owned Allouez School, a few blocks away.

"The city attorney called me," Stumpf said. "How he found out about it, I don't know. He asked for a swap. I still didn't know what property we owned, so I asked him and he was honest enough to tell me."

"As I told the office," Stumpf added, "I told him he could inform the school board they could continue using it. He didn't think that was very funny."

"I asked how the mistake was made. If they know, they're not telling," he said.

Stumpf still doesn't know exactly what he is part owner of. "I've never been inside," he said. "We drove by the building Saturday, and I pointed out to my children that that was our school. They were quite impressed because a lot of their friends attend school there. It's pretty close to where we live. We talked to the janitor and I assured him he had a job as long as he wanted it."

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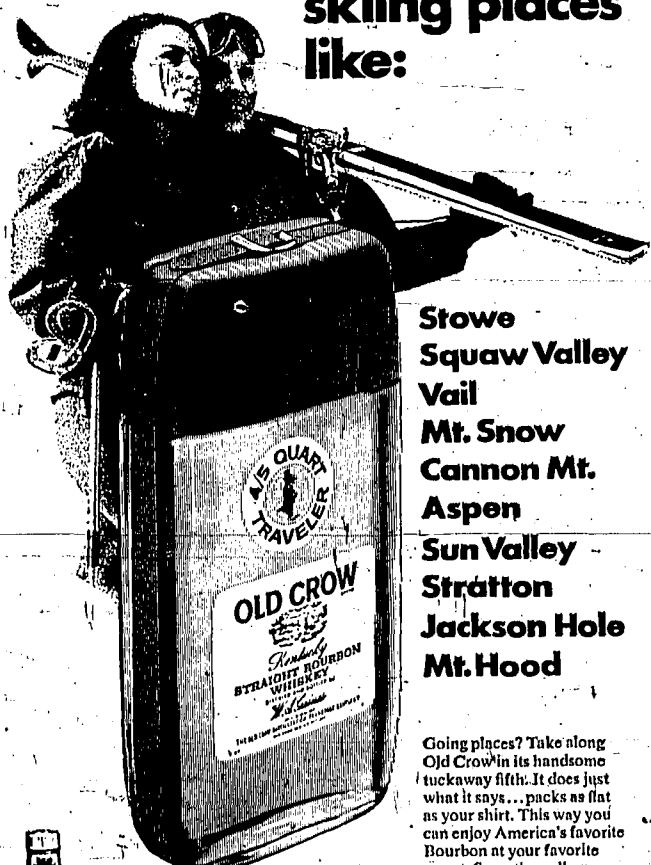

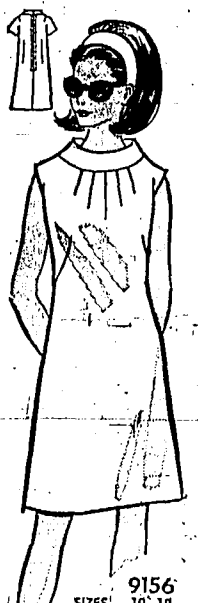
You know that whatever the old lady did, you wouldn't like. And by the way, how much did you pay your mother-in-law for sitting? And do you ever call her unless you want her for something?

### Red Troops Overrun Laotian Post

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Communist troops have overrun a Laotian Army outpost 30 miles northeast of Vientiane, the government said.

A government spokesman said about three battalions of Communist troops took the government outpost, which was about 12 miles from the town of Pakxang, on the Mekong River. The position fell early Sunday morning after an all-night battle.

The spokesman did not give the size of the government force or the number of casualties.

The announcement came just as the International Control Commission for Laos was preparing to leave Wednesday for the southern town of Saravane, where the government claims a large force of North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao are preparing a major attack.

It was still doubtful today if the Polish commissioner would accompany the commission members from Canada and India even though the Laotian premier Prince Souvanna Phouma, asked the ICC to investigate the "grave" situation in Saravane.

### Bobby Baker Indicted On Liquor Count

OCEAN CITY, Md. (AP) — Bobby Baker has been indicted by the Worcester County grand jury on charges of liquor law violations.

The Valentine Day indictment against Baker, owner of the Carousel Motel in Ocean City and former secretary to U.S. Senate Democrats, was made public Monday by Calvin Hall, county clerk.

In addition to Baker, the indictments were against Baker's wife Dorothy, and Robert S. Bounds, a co-applicant for the Carousel liquor license.

Police Chief J. Jack Phillips said the charges stemmed from a raid on the Carousel on New Year's Eve by his department, as well as sheriff's deputies. Phillips said liquor was being sold after hours and all evidence was confiscated.

### Meany Has Plan To Cut U. S. Strikes

By NEIL GILBRIDE AP Labor Writer

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — AFL-CIO President George Meany says voluntary arbitration by "impartial" outsiders might be the answer to the nation's rising rash of strikes by public workers ranging from garbage men to teachers.

State laws forbidding strikes, under which some union leaders have gone to jail, aren't the answer, said the chief of the 14-million member labor federation.

"I think there is a basic right of an individual to quit his job if he doesn't like the conditions under which he works and I don't think he should lose that right because he happens to be a civil service worker," Meany told newsmen Monday.

"On the other hand, there is a basic right of the general public to expect service from these workers," Meany said.

"I think it might be that you could set up some sort of a system of voluntary arbitration by which the unions would agree that their conditions would be set up, not by some politician holding a public office, but by some system of impartial people," Meany said.

Union organizing of public workers has been one of the most rapid areas of the labor movement's growth in recent years and has been marked by strikes of policemen, firemen, teachers, welfare workers, garbage collectors, and many others.

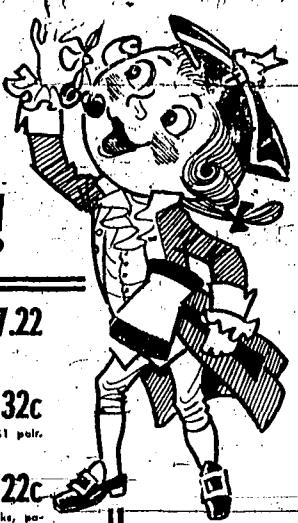

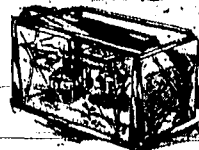

# Democrats Backing McCarthy Work To Deal LBJ Defeat In Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) — Rebellious Democrats backing Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy for president are working to deal President Johnson an embarrassing political defeat on Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's home ground two weeks from today. Administration loyalists frankly admit they're worried.

The confrontation will come March 5 at party precinct caucuses—one week before McCarthy and the Johnson-Humphrey forces clash in the New Hampshire—preferential—primary.

In Minnesota, the precinct caucuses are the grass-roots starting point for selection of national convention delegates. From the precincts, delegates are sent to ward, city, district and state conventions, which choose delegates to the national convention.

Because precinct caucuses are open to anyone who voted Democratic in the last election, party officials fear the meetings will be packed with voters attracted by McCarthy's opposition to the Vietnam war.

Many of these are likely to be college-age voters and that further complicates the problem. One party official pointed out that Humphrey had been unable to devote much attention to the party since he became vice president.

"There are a lot of young people who have come into the party who don't even know Hubert Humphrey," he said.

National Committeewoman Geri Joseph predicted in an interview that McCarthy will get no more than 5 of the state's 62 delegates. John Wright, associate professor of the University of Minnesota and vice chairman of the Minnesota Concerned Democrats, has predicted that "We can get 32 votes for Gene McCarthy for president."

In other words, a majority of the delegation. Other observers think McCarthy could wind up with as many as 8 to 10.

Despite the stakes, both sides appear to be trying to campaign on what was described as a "gentlemanly level." They want to avoid a rending clash like the battle two years ago over picking the party's gubernatorial nominee. That intraparty feud is blamed for the Republicans capturing the state house in 1966.

But Mrs. Joseph said the McCarthy-Humphrey contest can't help but get rougher. "A fight like this always gets nastier and nastier," she said.

The DFL's ruling body, the State Central Committee, has given a strong endorsement to Johnson and Humphrey, but a separate Johnson-Humphrey campaign organization has been set up under the direction of State Sen. Wendell R. Anderson.

Anderson says the reason for the soft campaign is this: "When Sen. McCarthy runs for re-election in 1970, we will support him. We feel in November he will support the Johnson-Humphrey ticket. We want to conduct ourselves so this will happen."

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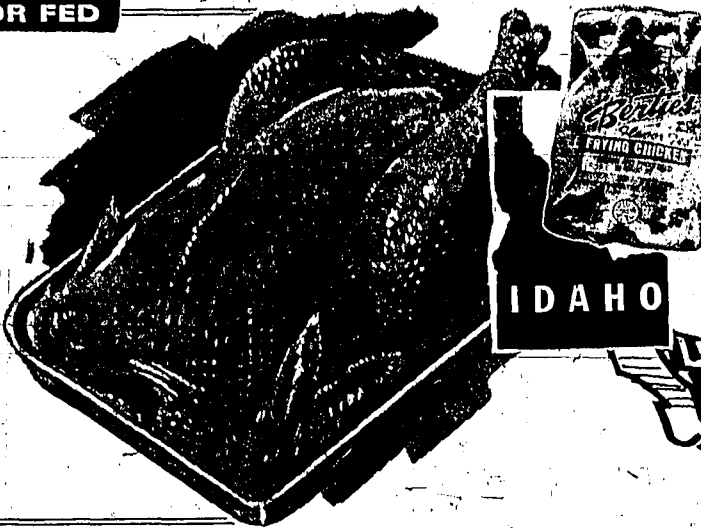
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# 2 District Cage Tournaments To Start Wednesday

This is the happiest moment of the high school basketball season. After 20 games, all the teams are exactly even and visions of district and state championship trophies are placed with more than a little luck — dance brightly in every player's dreams.

Unfortunately, only five will realize district hopes and just six of the 24 will advance into state competition.

Those battles begin on two fronts Wednesday night with the A-3 and sixth district A-4 classifications getting the jump. The A-3 tournament opens at 6:45 p.m. Wednesday with Glenn Ferry meeting Valley and Wendell at 7 p.m. and Murrough vs. Shoshone in the nightcap. All that tournament will be played at Shoshone.

The sixth district A-4, slated for Burley High School's gym, will send Oakley against Rockland at 7 p.m. and Murrough against Hansen at 8:30 p.m. Raft River has the bye.

The A-2 tournament opens in Buhl Thursday with the fifth district A-4 starting play Thursday at the Gooding State gym. The A-1 event begins at Burley Friday.

Due to a conflict in using the gym, the sixth district A-4 will play in Burley Thursday night with the first-night losers meeting in the first game and the winner of the Murrough-Hansen game playing the second. It will take Friday off and resume Saturday night, then wind up at Burley Feb. 27 and 28.

At Shoshone, where two state tournament berths are at stake,

Wendell will meet Shoshone at 6:45 p.m. Thursday with Castleford taking on the winner of Declo-Kimberly in the nightcap. Both nights will start at 8 p.m. with Jayvee games.

The A-3 tournament figures to be the lightest in years with Wood River moving up to A-2 after winning the Big Six conference.

The likely three will be Kimberly, Glenn Ferry and Valley but the others, Wendell, Declo and Castleford, have a good chance. Only Shoshone, hit by disciplinary problems and down to using largely sophomores, appears out of the running.

Kimberly has a couple of the best players around, in Larry Rietz and Lynn McManis but the Bulldog defense hasn't been consistent and neither has the scoring. Glenn Ferry picked up good momentum late in the season and, of course, there's always that Coach Gordon Brown tournament reputation to beat. Valley has a fine scorer in Don Meyer but the Vikings still are relying on sophomores in key places and youngsters must answer the tournament's pressure test.

For a while Wendell was the best A-3 team in the district but the Trojans began giving up too many points and lost that distinction. Castleford, although playing in the largely A-1 Magic Valley Conference, stepped out of that league often enough to prove it could play with their A-3 counterparts. The Wolves are tough against a team that can't shoot from the outside, because Coach Mary Cox generally uses a zone and likes to press.

Declo is hard to figure, losing a couple of good boys for various reasons, but it appears that 6-2 Gary Malloy has made his presence with Coach Keith Wilson and his teammates and will be available for tournament duties.

In the Sixth district it should be a battle between league champ Oakley and runner-up Murrough, which also is the defending state A-4 title.

Murrough is strong with Billy Nebeker and Gary Quinnett but could use more height. Oakley appears the best balanced with Don Craner, Kim Martindale, Rulon Tolman and a couple of freshmen.

Rockland, with a fine scorer Ed Nelson, could be a darkhorse while Hansen and Raft River appear in the "wait until next year" category.

## Ten Million Fans Watched Pro Football

NEW YORK (AP) — Professional football in the National and American Leagues attracted a total of 10,951,652 fans in the past season for league games, exhibitions and postseason contests.

The NFL set a new attendance record of 5,941,360 for its regular season, an average of 53,848 paid at each of 112 games. The increase amounted to 11.3 per cent with capacity crowds at 65 of the 112 regular season games.

The AFL drew 2,295,697 for the regular season, an increase of 6.3 per cent and an average of 36,440 for each of 63 regular season games. In 1960, its first year of operation, the AFL drew only 226,156.

The two league offices released the totals Monday but did not break down the figures in individual teams.

## Hackenschmidt Dies At Age 92

LONDON (AP) George Hackenschmidt, The Russian Lion and one of the most famous figures in wrestling history, died Monday in his 92nd year.

He made wrestling history more than 50 years ago by winning two ferocious battles with Ahmed Madrali, "The Terrible Turk."

Hackenschmidt was world champion catch-as-catch-can heavyweight wrestler for 14 years and was called the strongest man in the world.

Hackenschmidt never smoked or drank. In his 80s, he still kept fit by jumping over the back of a chair 50 times at one go. He did that once a week.

Hackenschmidt died in a hospital in Dulwich suburb, where he had been since last November. Cause of death was not announced.

## Chance Signs Pact With Twins

ST. PAUL-MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Minnesota Twins President Calvin Griffith landed another big fish in baseball contract negotiations Monday when he announced that 20-game winning pitcher Dean Chance had agreed to terms.



# Portugal Achieves Big Propaganda Victory

BISSAU, Portuguese Guinea (AP) — Portugal appears to have achieved a major propaganda victory over black African guerrillas as a result of an official visit by President Americo Thomaz to Portuguese Guinea and the Cape Verde Islands.

Nationalist rebels in this tiny wedge of Portuguese territory on Africa's western bulge are expected to face an increasingly difficult time in attempting to convert half a million members of 30 different tribes to their cause.

The Thomaz trip was considered a success in reasserting Portugal's determination to continue the six-year struggle against what it calls "terrorist and bandit" forces supported by international communism throughout this steamy, river-crossed jungle country about the size of the Netherlands.

There had been speculation that Portugal was about to give up this small unproductive territory; but Thomaz' tour seems to have put an end to that.

The venture, carried out by order of Prime Minister Antonio de Oliveira Salazar, also served to dispense contentions that the areas bordering Senegal and the Republic of Guinea, black and white residents of this capital city suffer from nerves and dwindling morale as a consequence of the six-year war in the interior.

The so-called "invisible war" being waged in Portugal's three African territories, of Angola, Mozambique and Portuguese Guinea continues without letup; and it is far from invisible here. Bissau is a tense little town. It is no Salgim, but the rumble of rebel artillery is clearly heard almost every evening as outlying army outposts come under attack.

The town swarms with Portuguese and native soldiers, sailors, airmen, paratroopers and marines. It is headquarters for the military thrust against the enemy seeking independence from five centuries of Portuguese rule.

It is "psychological warfare," with both sides claiming unseen victories which have cost the lives of thousands.

The Thomaz party traveled unchallenged into five villages of the interior in addition to his five-day stay in this chief port and capital city of 35,000. If ever there was a time for Cabral's rebel forces of 4,000-6,000 to show its defiance, this was it. But there were no incidents.

Despite the rebels' unexpected lethargy at this time, however, Portuguese Guinea remains in the grip of guerrilla warfare and the possibility that the insurgents may eventually win out over some 25,000 top Portuguese troops and a native force of 10,000 is not being discounted.

Well-armed guerrilla bands travel at will over a large part of the country, particularly in the areas bordering Senegal and the Republic of Guinea. Black and white residents of this capital

## India Court Ruling Stirs Controversy

NEW DELHI (AP) — A special court decision awarding India 80 per cent of the Rann of Kutch wasteland stirred protests Monday among politicians who want the whole area for India.

Pakistan awarded 10 per cent, seemed satisfied, as did the Indian government.

Pakistan and India went to war over the Arabian Sea coastal swamp-desert area in the spring of 1965. Later that year, they set up a three-man court to judge the issue and agreed to abide by its ruling.

Special interest in the sparsely populated Rann developed after reports circulated that oil might be found under its salt marshes and sand hills.

The Rann is in two sections—the Great Rann to the north, 220 miles long and 25 to 50 miles wide, and the Little Rann, 65 miles long and 35 miles wide.

India claimed the whole territory because its Hindu ruler joined it to India when the subcontinent was partitioned in 1947 to create the independent nations of India and Pakistan.

Pakistan claimed 3,500 square miles of the northern Rann because it had been controlled by the province of Sind, part of Moslem Pakistan.

The special court's neutral chairman and its Pakistani representative, gave the majority ruling on the Rann in Geneva Monday.

There were reports in Geneva that India and Pakistani officials would meet within two weeks to discuss how the decision could be carried out.

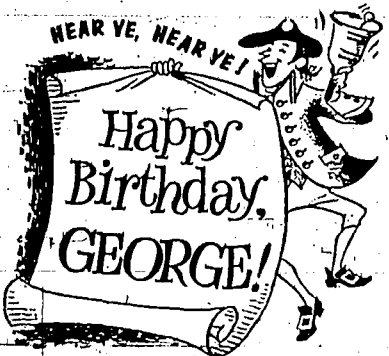

### Connally Hits Position Of Sen. Kennedy

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Gov. John Connally of Texas said Monday that the position of Sen. Robert Kennedy, D-NY, on Vietnam has damaged the whole conduct of foreign affairs by the United States.

The governor said Kennedy's public statements on Vietnam are especially unfortunate in light of the role he played in the administration of his brother, the late President John F. Kennedy.

Connally said Kennedy's words and his actions have been a source of discord in this country.

"They've had a detrimental effect on the whole attitude of people in this country and an even more disastrous effect insofar as Ho Chi Minh and the Communist world are concerned," Connally said. He did not elaborate.

Connally was in Atlanta to address a Jefferson-Jackson Day fund-raising dinner for the state Democratic party. He made his remarks at a news conference.

Although Connally declined to say whether he thinks Kennedy's Vietnam position is politically motivated, he did say, "Obviously, Sen. Kennedy hasn't conducted himself in a manner designed to help President Johnson."

The Texas governor, a close friend of President Johnson, said he thinks the President is fighting a tough presidential campaign this year, and added that he does not see any potential Republican candidate who can beat him.

### Airline Makes Record Single Plane Order

NEW YORK (AP) — American Airlines announced Monday commercial aviation's biggest single order in an \$88-million purchase of a jumbo jetliner designed to carry 223 passengers.

American said it had placed a firm order for 25 McDonnell Douglas DC10s costing more than \$400 million and has purchased options to buy an additional 25 to bring the total commitment to more than \$800 million.

The three engine DC10s, called the Airbus, are designed to fly up to 3,000 miles at a cruising speed of 600 miles per hour. The planes are aimed at hauling large numbers of passengers in heavy air traffic corridors.

In the announcement, American said it has committed an unspecified amount of money it would lose if the options for the additional 25 airplanes were not exercised.

"It represents a firm indication of our intentions," said American President George A. Spataro.

### Cut Is Urged In Prices For Tourists

WASHINGTON (AP) — A White House task force recommended Monday a broad range of cut rate prices for tourist services—including a 50 per cent discount on domestic airline fares—to attract foreign visitors to the United States.

The Industry-Government Special Task Force on Travel set up by President Johnson in November recommended discounts on transatlantic air fares of 25 per cent, a 25 per cent discount on domestic rail fares, and 10 per cent discounts on charter bus rates on trips involving 400 miles a day. These recommendations are now pending before regulatory agencies. The reduction would apply only to visitors from abroad.

The task force also recommended a substantial increase in the budget for the U.S. Travel Service, a waiver for visas for foreign tourists and businessmen and creation of a National Tourist Office to coordinate the promotion of foreign travel to the United States. This office would start with an annual budget of about \$30 million in the next fiscal year.

The task force report is part of an effort by the Johnson administration to reduce the international dollar drain by about \$3 billion this year. The balance-of-payments deficit last year was \$3.57 billion.

Robert M. McKinney, publisher of the Santa Fe New Mexican and task force chairman, said the recommended program does not negate the need for the travel tax which President Johnson has proposed on American citizens traveling outside the Western Hemisphere to reduce this country's balance-of-payments deficit.

The House Ways and Means Committee is holding hearings on that legislation.

McKinney said the travel industry estimates the potential impact of the report's proposals at about \$150 million in benefits to the balance of payments during the first year.

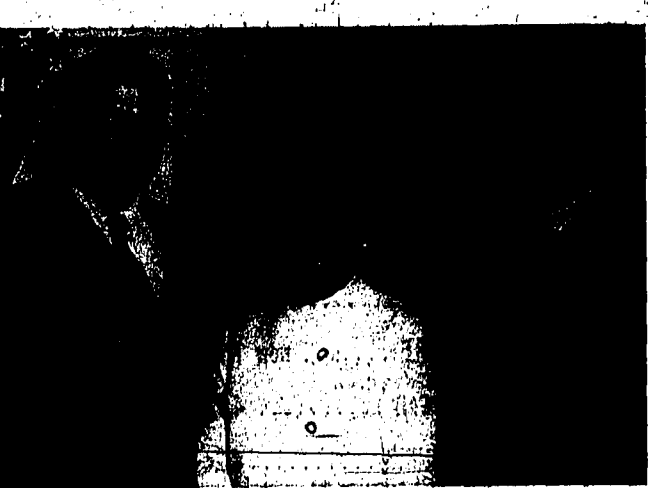

# BRIDGE

### MINOR REBID BAD TACTICS

Some forms of hand hogging are almost congenial. Take the man who feels that he must rebid any five-card suit. He won't be wrong too much of the time but he will lose a great deal of partnership satisfaction.

An example it didn't cost North anything at all to rebid his five-card diamond suit. At

trump, North would have gone on to five diamonds. He might have made that contract, although good defense would hold him to 10 tricks, but in any event he would have been struggling as declarer instead of relaxing as dummy.

Why did he say that it didn't cost him anything that time? The reason is that when you open with one club or one diamond and your partner responds two no-trump you should simply bid three no-trump unless your hand is so unbalanced that you think a suit contract is better or unless you want to invite a slam.

North certainly didn't want to invite a slam. He had 13 high card points of his own and his partner's two no-trump call had shown 13-15 so that the opposition was marked with at least 12 high card points.

North didn't have a singleton and his partner's two no-trump bid had indicated a really balanced hand. Although it didn't hurt this time, suppose North really is interested in a slam some other time.

South will remember this hint and make no effort to get there.

least it didn't cost him anything this time. The reason was that South simply rebid to three no-trump, and North was smart enough to pass.

Playing at three no-trump South won the heart lead with his ace and led a spade to dummy's queen. East took his ace and led back a heart whereupon South made five diamonds and two tricks in each other suit. If South had bid four diamonds instead of three no-
