## News Seize Hospital Run By U.S. Doctor

SAIGON (AP) — Communist forces sent hundreds of rockets and mortar shells raining down on military bases, command posts and other installations today and seized a hospital run by an American woman doctor. The shelling was the heaviest since more than two weeks ago. Viet Cong troops blew up the hospital and fired "indiscriminately" into some of the wards. One Montagnard tribesman patient was killed and four wounded.

U.S. officers said the doctor, Patricia Smith of Seattle, Wash., was safe in a secure area of Kontum city. One German nurse, however, was said to have been abducted. The hospital is on the outskirts of Kontum, a central highlands city 275 miles north of Saigon.

The U.S. Command reported new action along the eastern end of the demilitarized zone dividing the two Vietnams. It said U.S. Marines and air cavalrymen killed nearly 300 Communist troops in a series of battles Sunday east of the Marine command post at Kontum. The enemy kept up its daily shelling of Kontum.

But just outside the north of Saigon, 200 Communist ambushers killed 48 American soldiers and wounded another 25, most of them in the first eight minutes of a machine-gun attack

Saturday. The U.S. Command disclosed the attack Sunday.

U.S. pilots flew 48 missions against North Vietnam Sunday, many of them radar-guided because of the overcasts of the continuing northeast monsoon.

The major strike was an attack by Navy A6 Intruders from the carrier Enterprise on the Thac Bac cargo transfer and storage complex on the Red River 1.5 miles southeast of the center of Hanoi. It was the second attack on that target in three days.

The major targets of the Communist shelling included six allied air bases, a U.S. Navy base, the base camp of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division and the 4th Infantry Division, the country's biggest old tank farm just

outside Saigon, a big Marine supply base and two Green Beret Special Forces camps.

In the shelling of the district town of Duc Duc just below Da Nang, Viet Cong mortars left 150 houses burned, 100 killed and 200 wounded. South Vietnamese headquarters said.

The attacks were the heaviest since Feb. 19 when Communist forces hit with rockets and mortar shells in Saigon and 40 other cities and allied installations in the second wave attacks. The second wave followed the Communist biggest offensive of the war launched against 25 major South Vietnamese cities during the lunar new year Jan. 31.

## San Francisco Teachers Return To Work, Florida In Stalemate

San Francisco teachers return to their classes today after a one-day walkout, but the strike by some 20,000 Florida teachers enters its third week with negotiations ending a 7 1/2 day strike in Pittsburgh's 3,000 teachers who struck last Friday.

In San Francisco, the teachers' union announced that the walkout was over and there would be no reprisals against those who struck.

In Pittsburgh, Albert Ponder, president of the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers, said "the biggest picket line is the history of Florida's 400 teachers. In their demand for more money, they shut down schools at noon Friday. Most junior and senior high schools were closed, with students at one high school going on a 'window-smashing rampage.'

Sunday night, after 22 hours of talks between strikers and a special fully woman panel, San Francisco Mayor Joseph Alioto announced that the walkout was over and there would be no reprisals against those who struck.

## Oil Slick Plagues San Juan

SAN JUAN, P.R. (AP) — High waves left patches of oil as far as 30 yards inside the beach at some of San Juan's luxury hotels today, but tourists were not deterred to get their sun.

Some of the six-million gallon cargo of Venezuelan crude oil spilled from the tanker ship, the Empire Sunday and 20 oil slicks four miles long and a mile wide became an immediate threat to beachgoers and the hotels.

The Liberian-registered ship split in two as she approached the coast of San Juan. The crew was rescued.

President Johnson, resting for a week at the game Air Force base in western Puerto Rico, ordered a group of conservation specialists to San Juan to give assistance to local authorities and Coast Guard crews fighting the oil slick.

The spill, which occurred at the Puerto Rico Sheraton went out on the beach early this morning, forcing hundreds of beachgoers to leave the water, keeping an eye on the oil patches. Many oil slicks were by hotel officials to stay out of the water.

Puerto Rican hotels are at most full in the middle of the tourist season.

At the Caribe Hilton, workers were sweeping the hot beach clean as fast as the oil could accumulate.

It was the second such mishap in a year. Last March 18, the 61,000-ton American-owned Tropicamer, owned by the British, broke up on a reef off Britain's southwest coast and spilled millions of gallons of oil onto the southern England and France.

The British government is suing the owners for \$5,000,000 for the cleaning operation.

The U.S. Coast Guard sprayed kerosene, kerosene and other chemicals for the oil threatening the tourist beaches three miles away, but officials said trying to cover the entire slick would be a tremendous task.

"I don't think anybody will be swimming in the Bay," said an assistant manager of the Caribe Hilton.

## "Health In America" Plan Is Proposed By Johnson

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson proposed a \$15.6 billion "Health In America" program to Congress today that would more than double federal outlays for birth control programs; boost efforts to slash infant deaths and provide new incentives for the training of more doctors.

In a special message, Johnson outlined "five major new goals" for each infant mortality, provide more health personnel, combat soaring medical costs, lower the accidental death rate, and seek volunteer efforts by doctors, hospitals and others to provide "better health" for all Americans.

The \$15.6 billion program for the fiscal year beginning July 1 would bring the current annual outlay of \$3 billion.

Johnson asked Congress to increase funds for birth control activities to \$6 million from \$2 million. He said this would make family planning information and birth control devices or contraceptives available to an additional 1 million women.

He also announced plans to create a center for population studies and human reproduction, primarily to direct family planning research and ask for an initial appropriation of \$12 million to support it.

The chief executive said infant mortality is unacceptable, although it has dropped from 25.2 deaths per 1,000 children under the age of one in 1950 to 24.1 last year.

## LBJ Bids To Start Talks To End Strike

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson bids today to generate around-the-clock negotiations aimed at ending a 7 1/2-month-old copper strike he has said could hurt the U.S. defense effort.

Johnson summoned leaders of the 26 unions and four major copper producers involved in the strike to the White House yesterday afternoon.

"I shall request the parties to resume collective bargaining negotiations around the clock basis with the assistance of the secretaries of defense, labor and commerce," the president said Friday in calling the meeting.

Saying there is "no foreseeable prospect" that the companies and unions will otherwise settle their differences, Johnson warned the strike could have a substantial effect on our defense effort.

Some 30,000 workers in 22 states are striking four major producers: Kennecott, American Smelting and Refining, Anaconda and Phelps Dodge.

Stalling the issue is a union demand for companywide bargaining—a demand the companies have refused even to discuss.

The unions want to make each company deal simultaneously with all unions representing its workers at all its facilities in several states, with a common contract expiration date for all unions.

Wages and fringe benefits also are at issue, with the strikers seeking a package similar to the \$1.07 an hour recently granted by U.S. Metals Refining Co., Gary, Ind., when it settled with its striking workers.

Wages at the four major firms range from \$1.65 to \$1.67 an hour.

White House-sponsored bargaining sessions have led to settlement of recent strikes in such key industries as steel, railroads and airlines.

## Claim Against City Of Jerome Argued In Court

BOISE (AP) — A claim against the city of Jerome for close to \$100,000 for an extension of a water main was argued before the state supreme court Monday.

The city attorney contended that the city did not know of the claim until after the water system was accepted.

He contends the claim by Mann is unconstitutional because by constructing the water system extension without prior approval of the city council, Mann was obligating the city to a future cost. Hence, he argued, they should not be liable for the cost.

## New Police Chief Comes To Jerome

JEROME — Jerome's new police chief, C. L. (Chuck) Puntney, 44, arrived here today to begin his new job Monday.

The former Payette police chief was hired by the Jerome city council Feb. 21 after city council members investigated the resignation of Capt. Eita Hall, two months ago.

Since then John Hays, a patrolman, has been acting chief. The new police chief will get a salary of \$50 a month.

Chief Puntney told the Times-News Monday morning, "I am very pleased with working conditions here and they are a big improvement over what I had before."

He added there are openings on the Jerome police force for two new patrolmen and urged anyone interested in the posts to contact him.

A veteran law enforcement officer, Mr. Puntney had been recruited by the Payette city council to replace the late chief after difficulties with the mayor there last fall resulted in his resignation.

The Jerome police force has but two policemen in addition to the mayor and the new chief. By how fully staffed it is expected the force will consist of nine persons.

## Research Satellite Speeds Into Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A research satellite that rocket blasted away from Cape Kennedy night on schedule today rocketed into orbit the fifth Orbiter Geophysical Observatory, into space.

The satellite is part of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration reported the satellite monitor, still attached to the Agena second stage, was in an initial transfer orbit more than 100 miles above the earth.

The satellite is expected to orbit nearly an hour, the Agena engines restarted to push the satellite into a higher orbit ranging from about 175 to 92,000 miles high. On this path it will move continually in and out of the Agena's second stage.

The control center reported OGO 5's solar panels and other instruments are being deployed on schedule and that the flight was progressing very well. The more sensitive experiments, such as magnetometers, are unreeled on the end of long booms to prevent interference with the Agena's solar power sources in the main body of the spacecraft.

The satellite carries 25 scientific instruments, more than on any previous U.S. satellite. They are intended to probe the earth and they are a big step yet at how the nonnuclear flare eruptions on the sun affect our atmosphere, weather and communications.

Officials at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, which manages the project, are hopeful the OGO findings will help develop a foolproof means of detecting solar storms, which could cause power outages and satellite malfunctions.

## Civil Disorders Unit Pushes For Steps To End Race Crisis

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of the President's Commission on Civil Disorders are joining big-city mayors in pressing a city-wide Congress to take prompt, multibillion-dollar steps toward solving the nation's racial crisis.

Four commission members and a half-dozen mayors appeared on nationwide radio-television broadcasts Sunday and urged what one mayor termed "an infusion of billions of dollars to correct" conditions that spawned last summer's riots.

The panel's landmark report became involved as well in the campaign for the Democratic

# Colorado River Basin Bill "Points Gun" Right At Idaho

BOISE (AP) — A Congressional subcommittee has pointed a gun right at Idaho in language it incorporated into the Colorado River Basin bill.

Speaking in the Democratic caucus, Jackson Day, Democrat, said a House Interior subcommittee had written into the bill language permitting augmentation of the Colorado River or its tributaries from outside the river's basin.

At an earlier news conference, Jackson said "it is clear that the committee undoubtedly plans to divert the Snake from its headwaters in the Green River in Wyoming. Idaho faces a serious situation and the people of this state should be cognizant of this change in tactics," he said.

The Washington Democrat said the augmentation was strip-ping water from the main Colorado, but the bill was changed to allow augmentation in tributaries as well.

The full House Interior Committee probably will approve the bill, Jackson said, after which it would go to the Senate. He said he anticipated that the bill would be offered as an amendment to a Senate-passed "Arizona Project" bill last year.

Jackson, who was introduced by Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said it was obvious that the congressmen from Colorado, River Basin states and Southern California had decided to forego any effort to divert water from the mouth of the Columbia to the Colorado because of its cost.

As chairman of the Senate Interior Committee — which probably will receive the bill when it reaches the Senate — Jackson said he would appoint Church head of a Senate-Interior conference committee. He said he also would name Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, to the committee.

"There is no doubt that we need every drop of water in the Pacific Northwest," Jackson declared, explaining that there were 20 million acres of arid land now lit in the Northwest. "We don't know how many industries there will be in the future which require water."

RAMEY AIR FORCE BASE, P.R. (AP) — Lady Bird Johnson apparently deserves most of the credit for persuading her husband to seek some fun in the sun away from the LBJ Ranch.

President Johnson flew back to the White House after a day and a half in Puerto Rico, his first holiday spent away from his home acres in Texas since he took office.

Mrs. Johnson is known to endorse those who seek the sun especially partial to the Virgin Islands and has enjoyed several vacations there.

Daughter Lynda Bird and her husband, Chester S. Robb, honeymooned at Saint John's, in the Virgin Islands. Thus it appears that Johnson has been under considerable family pressure to find a winter vacation land away from the ranch.

On the other hand, Johnson's Puerto Rican trip, with its emphasis on recreation may have been prompted by a presidential hunch that it would do the country no harm, at a time of anxiety and frustration over the war in Vietnam, to see him pursuing a relaxed course.

Johnson's visit to this ilk base of the Strategic Air Command was brief. But old friends say "a senator he used to be, he is a man and leave such resort spots as Acapulco, Mexico, much sooner than he originally had planned."

### Humanities Commission OK's Requests

**DOISE (AP)**—Requests from nine groups for all its obtaining federal funds were approved by the Idaho Arts and Humanities Commission.

Commission members discussed pessimistically the prospects for obtaining operating funds for the next biennium. No funds were provided for the commission by the 1967 Legislature, although the commission formally was made a state commission. It has operated on federal and private funds which are now exhausted.

A resolution was adopted to ask the 1969 legislature for only necessary administrative funds.

Dr. D. R. Theobald, former University of Idaho president, said that if sufficient funds are not obtained by next year, the commission should be discontinued.

Members of an official state commission should not be asked he said, to spend their own time and money without compensation.

Another member had a different idea. "Some of the finest things we could do don't cost money," said Dr. Chester Hill, head of the Ricks College music department.

Because the commission's funds have run out, members resolved not to meet again this year. They also decided to not meet again next year.

## Israelis Hit Nasser's Vow For Land

**TEL AVIV, Israel (AP)**—Israeli officials said today that they were "seriously setback to peace."

"We can only hope there is a difference between this sort of demagogic and actual policy making in Egypt," said Foreign Ministry spokesman David Rivlin.

Nasser, a three-time loser in war with Israel, told a rally near Cairo Sunday that Israel's announcement last week that it no longer considers the west bank of the Jordan River "enemy territory" would "cast her

"We will be a solidly united front against our common enemy," Nasser said.

Rivlin commented: "When the whole world is looking to Israel as the Arab leader, it is a big step and talk peace, Nasser's speech was very disappointing and confusing."

Officials said there had been signs of moderation in Cairo in the last few weeks. "Nasser was like" speech dashed hopes that Egypt and Jordan are willing to meet "three in direct negotiations."

However, some informed sources believed Nasser made "his fieriest declarations" to restore his prestige in the Arab world rather than to impede the possibility of peace talks.

Israel announced last week it was willing to meet the Arabs under UN auspices and hinted that contacts with Cairo and Amman indicated "the Arabs would probably sit down at the conference table."
