

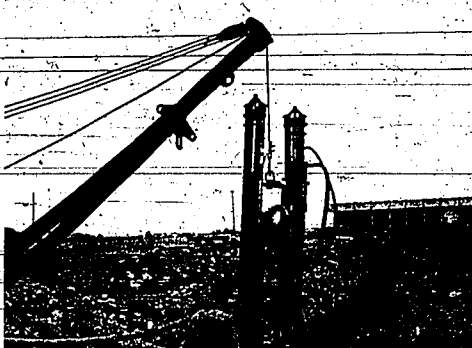

Union Officials, Copper Producers Resume Meetings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Representatives of 26 unions and four major copper producers resumed under White House auspices today separate meetings in an attempt to end the 23-day-old copper strike.

President Johnson initiated the talks here Monday and the industry said it would accept the unions to put aside at least temporarily their demands for company-wide bargaining, a major roadblock to settlement.

But presidential press secretary George Christian denied to-



day the President had pressed the labor negotiators to Christian first on economic issues, the other stages might fall into place.

Johnson said the strike has cost copper workers \$20 million a day. The 25-day-old strike has cost the companies \$123 million in after-tax profits.

The four major producers include Kennecott, Anaconda, Phelps Dodge and American Smelting and Refining, have declined to discuss the company-wide bargaining issue.

The unions representing some 200 striking workers want to make any company deal simultaneously with all unions representing workers at the plant. An expiration date for all union contracts, Anaconda filed unfair labor practice charges against the unions against the United Steelworkers and a large group of other non-union workers at the company-wide bargaining issue.

The complaint was filed Monday with the National Labor Relations Board in Seattle, Wash.

The NLRB last week obtained a U.S. federal court restraining Kennecott from firing the unions after a similar complaint by Kennecott.

Associated contends only wages, hours and working conditions are mandatory bargaining points under federal law. It has asked the court to force Kennecott to bargain on other points until its company-wide contract demands are met.

A "networkers" spokesman said, following the President's call for night-and-day talks, that the unions are "not ready for discussions without preconditions — a stance believed influenced by the NLRB action on the Kennecott complaints.

"Wages along with pensions and other benefits are the key issues in the long strike.

"The unions are asking a three-year contract with wages on top of \$2.65 to \$3.67 an hour for various jobs.

Johnson said the union and company representatives "are working to pin in vital support for settlement."

Explosives Found Along Rail Tracks

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Five one-pound cartridges of plastic explosive were found along Kennecott Copper Corp. railroad tracks.

The explosives, in sticks similar to dynamite but more potent, were discovered Monday in weeds near the company's railroad tracks and near utility poles providing power for the trains.

The explosives, called C-3, had been wired and had a fuse. A member of Kennecott's security force, Bob Rouns,

County Sheriff Capt. Paul Labounty said black tape had been placed on five of the sticks and wires had been strung out for several blocks.

A deputy said — the C-3s had been attached to the ends of the sticks and the wires would have topped poles "like matchsticks" for blocks, or possibly for a mine.

An FBI agent said the explosives were tied to the cartridges in a hasty and very nonprofessional manner.

Deputies said the explosive may have been part of the making of a bomb at the Tooele Army Depot.

The explosive also could have been used in a sabotage attempt. Companies are required to record the name and address of buyers.

A Kennecott spokesman said use of the explosives would have disrupted the railroad service between Bingham and the company's plant at Magna.

Work Pressed On Last Phase Of New Twin Falls Water System

TRENCHING FOR the installation of water lines in the third and final phase of the Twin Falls water development project is now in full swing, thanks to favorable weather conditions.

Here crews are busy with trenching to prepare for laying pipeline in the vicinity of the College of Southern Idaho, DeWetter Brothers, Twin Falls, have the \$1,028,468 contract for final distribution lines and a chlorination center. The entire new system is expected to be ready for use by summer.

3 States Head For Teacher Showdown

Over 20,000 Pennsylvania teachers boomed and shouted down Gov. Raymond P. Shafer as he signed legislation today that would strip them of their jobs if they do not accept a 6 percent pay raise.

Viet Cong Driven From Provincial Capital In Battle

SAIGON (AP) — Three hundred Viet Cong invaded a provincial capital in the southern part of Vietnam today and seized the town, but government troops drove them out of the town after a day-long battle.

The Viet Cong captured the provincial capital of Binh Hoa, 140 miles from Saigon. It was the second straight day of wide-scale Viet Cong offensives in the area.

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Teachers' Salaries Compared

BOISE (AP) — The much-discussed average teacher salary is at best a rude measure of how well teachers in a particular state are compensated, compared to other states. The average figures by themselves give no clue as to what goes into making up the average and they do not take into account such factors as cost of living, saying the average salary for that state should be comparable to other states. York discussed the situation in Idaho in an interview and his statements complicate these figures. The percentage of male teachers in the total teacher population in Idaho compares favorably with other states, York said. Wayne York, executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association, an affiliate of the NEA, has used these averages to "compare Idaho" to other states. The National Education Association each year produces a booklet ranking the various states in certain statistical indices, including average teacher salary. In the February edition of the IEA's newsletter, York said, "compared to Washington, every classroom teacher in Idaho picks in \$1,700 a year just for the privilege of teaching in Idaho." In Idaho, he could get \$1,500 more in Oregon, the average in the U.S. is \$1,550 more than it is in Idaho. These figures come from the IEA's rankings, which list these average annual classroom teacher salaries for western states: Idaho \$5,045; Alaska \$9,414; California \$8,900; Washington \$7,750; Oregon \$7,550; Utah \$6,640; and Montana \$6,375.

This means that Idaho has a more than \$7,000 a year, compared with a national average of \$3,7 per cent. The question might not be answered in the family. York said the turnover rate of Idaho teachers is the highest in the nation. He said some 13 Idaho teachers out of every 100 quit each year while the national average is now 8.9 out of each experience and, not provide the rate in pay increases for experience Idaho is increasing. Idaho, he said, "is a training ground for teachers," adding that some districts encourage their teachers to work in Idaho. We keep them for a long retention of teachers.

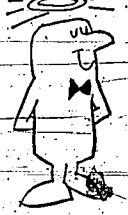

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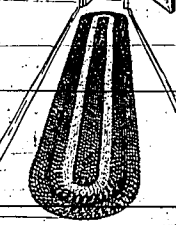

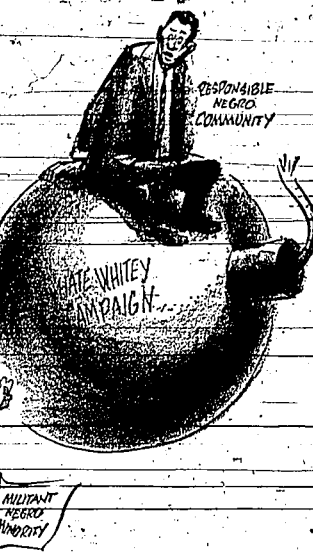

Boy, 7, Has Lots Of Parents

Little Kam Pui is one of five children whose father is a fugitive, earning their living from the sea. The boy's father suffered a stroke while at work and has been unable to support his family.

The boy's mother is hired to sew a coat used by patients to take them to the lighters and earns \$24.55 per month. Members of the family reside on the small fishing boat.

Irene Heninger, chairman of the Soroptimist program, said this is one of the club's major annual projects. It is supported not from club funds in general, but by separate contributions by club members who are interested in the project.

Under the program, foster parents adopt only youngsters who are continuing their education. Special training also is made possible for the older adopted sons and daughters; Mrs. Hennings said.

Support for Wong Kam Pui has been provided by the local club since Christmas, when a special effort was made to provide gifts for him. Club members have received several letters from the boy through his teacher or friends explaining how the club's efforts are helping with food, education and clothing and expressing the boy's appreciation.

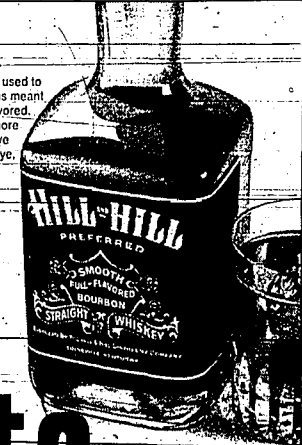

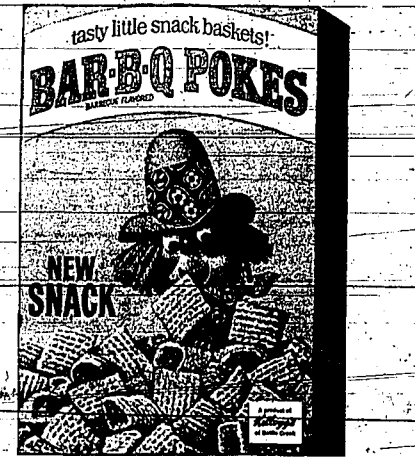

Minutemen Hunted By FBI After Plot

SEATTLE (AP) — The founder of the Minutemen militia in Idaho was named by the FBI Tuesday after being indicted in a plot to blow up a police station and possibly plan as a diversion for bank robbery.

Secret-federal grand jury indictments returned Feb. 29 against Robert DePugh, DePugh, founder and head of the paramilitary organization, and Walter Patrick Payson, 21, were made public Monday by U.S. District Judge William G. Bunt was set at \$30,000 for each man.

The 47-year-old De Pugh and Payson, both of Northport, Idaho, were charged with conspiracy in plans to blow up the police station and Power station, and nearby Redmond before robbing three banks there and another bank in suburban Tega Cay, N.C. — FBI said De Pugh was last seen several weeks ago in Northport, where he is owner and operator of a bicycle Co., an anti-drug firm.

The FBI said the plot was not carried out because De Pugh refused to sign the list of seven other men here. Jan. 26, the day the alleged plans were to go into effect.

Duane J. Carlson, 25, one of those arrested Jan. 26, was described as a resident of a home in the area, but DePugh denied this at Northport at the time.

DePugh was linked by officials with the secret group, described by the FBI as a group whose purpose is to defend the United States against internal Communist takeover.

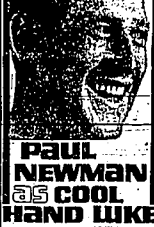

Newsman Have Race Workshops

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department Community Relations Service has been holding race relations workshops for newsmen throughout the country and several more are planned this spring.

A spokesman discussed the project Monday after the president's Commission on Civil Disorders recommended that people who seek a goal of integration both in its news presentation and in its personnel.

The commission said the news media had not reported adequately on the causes and effects of civil disorders and the underlying problems of race relations.

In workshop sessions, which last two or three days, the Community Relations Service has been training today's newsmen, Negro area residents and the service's field workers to discuss community race problems.

A principal aim is to change the news media's reporting of race news to a more objective and less prejudicial tone.

The service opposes bringing top-management news people into the workshop sessions.

The need for the day-to-day working press, the assignment editors, make-up editors, reporters.

He added:

"We try not to treat these as 'one-time' events. We try to concentrate on race violence and that sort of thing. Generally speaking, the press has met the challenge in having race news — it's not in this area they've had the difficulty in handling this trouble."

"The mere fact that there is a riot sometimes is in part a reflection that the media hasn't done its job well. Too many people in the photo fleet it's a 'white press'."

The first workshop was held about a year ago in San Diego for newsmen in that area. Others were held at Michigan State University, Hartford, Conn., and Columbia University.

Four are planned for this spring at Omaha, N.Y., Syracuse, N.Y., Los Angeles, and Houston, Tex.

About half a dozen other workshops are under consideration.

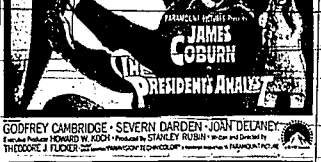

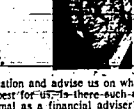

Eagle's Nest Cuts Driver Education Cost

By RUTH KOONCE MILLER

A unique new system in driver education has been introduced at O'Leary Junior-High School with an expectation that per student cost will be decreased substantially.

Driver education students spend a total of 18 weeks in the course, with the first six weeks of that term dedicated to "in-car" education. This is where the new system, and the saving, comes in.

"Two-way radios have been installed in the three cars used at O'Leary. Full-time driver training instructor Dallas Ward maintains a watchful perch in his eagle's nest window over the driving range at O'Leary.

With the use of the two-way radios, Mr. Ward can instruct the drivers to stop, turn, back up or park.

Because of Mr. Ward's overall supervision of the three cars at once, student instructors can be used in actual in-the-car instruction. The use of student instructors will lower the cost of the program considerably.

John Campbell, principal at O'Leary, stated that the student instructors are carefully selected and are selected because of their responsibility, maturity, driving ability and the ability to "keep their cool."

At present the O'Leary cars, loaned by local car dealerships, are using radio equipment loaned by United Electronics.

Duane Kirk, director of driver education for the state, is enthusiastic about the pilot program of driver education, and has assured Mr. Campbell that the state will underwrite the cost of solid state radio equipment in the cars.

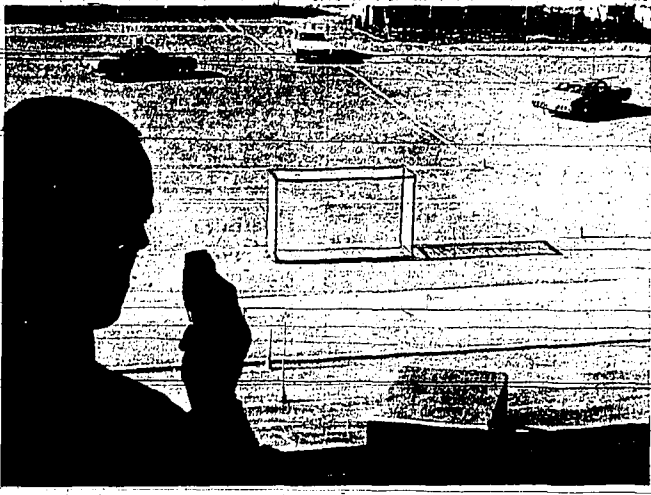
With the solid state equipment, Mr. Ward will be able to communicate on four channels—one for each car and a master channel for simultaneous communication with all cars.

While the student instructors are contributing directly to the success and lowered cost of the program, Mr. Campbell feels that they, too, are gaining the chance to review what they earlier learned in driver education.

These "old pros" also seem to be on the same "wave length" as their students, making for better communication between instructor and student.

These student instructors get an credit for the hours they give in assisting in the driving program. They give this time, which would normally be credited to an elective subject.

The state allows \$35 per student for a semester of driver education. O'Leary has been using \$38 of that sum and Mr. Campbell said that because of the radio equipment and student

driving range. Mr. Ward, through the use of two-way radio connections, is able to instruct the drivers of the three cars. In the cars with the students are carefully selected student-instructors.

help, the cost can probably be cut to about \$24 per student. Student help is used only on the driving range, or which no other traffic is allowed. Students are required to drive no more than five miles an hour on this range, so the possibility of any major damage or student injury is negligible.

An adult instructor, either Mr. Ward or Leo Wright, accompanies students whenever they drive on public roads.

The worth of driver education has been proven, not only in monetary savings to parents through decreased insurance premiums, but by safety records. Statistics prove that the driver who has had driver education is more courteous, cautious and just generally a safer, better driver.

There also is an advantage to the student. At 16, with driver education, youth can be licensed to drive with adult supervision. Students who have not taken driver training must wait until 18 to be licensed.

"It's an incentive for them," Mr. Campbell says. "Most kids

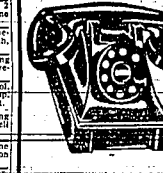

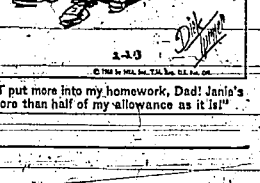
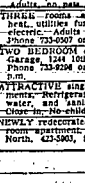
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Hotels In San Juan Closing

SAN JUAN, P.R. (AP) — Five San Juan hotels have closed their beaches since oil from a wrecked tanker spread over the sands, but other hotels west of the spreading oil slick reported their beaches still unpolliuted to day.

Thousands of tourists left the beaches Monday as oil kept rolling in from the 12,000-ton Ocean Eagle, which spilled in half-on-a-reel Sunday as it approached San Juan Bay. The Liberian tanker carried six million gallons of oil.

"Many tourists seem to be taking the problem in stride," said Puerto Rico's director of Tourism, Hector Pimentel.

There were reports that some hotels were getting cancellations, but there was no indication that these were running at any great number.

Puerto said beaches sullied by oil, could be cleaned by the removal of an inch of so of sand.

Marine biologists said, however, that "on paper" it is, we have a serious problem over our hands. "On paper" means the pollution would be gone in months. By late Monday the slick covered about 10 miles of water.

Three tubboats tried in vain to pull the Ocean Eagle's bow from the harbor mouth Monday. The oil continued to spill. Coast Guard spokesman said the plan had been to drag the bow at least 150 yards away, and sink it in 100 feet of water.

President Johnson had been planning for all occasions at the me Army Air Force base, in western Puerto Rico, when the tanker wrecked. He ordered American military units to help local authorities and Coast Guard crews fighting the oil slick.

Coast Guard ships poured emulsifying chemicals onto the oil, trying to dissolve and sink it. A spokesman reported "encouraging results" but said the slick was still a major threat.

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Cooperatives Set Records During 1967

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's farm cooperatives did a record \$1.7 billion business in the year ended June 30, 1967 — 7 per cent over the previous year.

This was reported in a recent survey by the Agriculture Department in its efforts to help cooperatives do a better job in marketing and buying for their farmer members.

The department said the survey showed the cooperatives have increased their business volume 61 per cent in 10 years. Sales of farm products totaled \$12.3 billion. Purchases for members — mainly of production supplies — totaled \$3.1 billion.

Cooperatives in California, a decline of 11 per cent. The Minnesota and Iowa ranked department said this reflected a first, second and third in bust decline in the number of farmless operations. 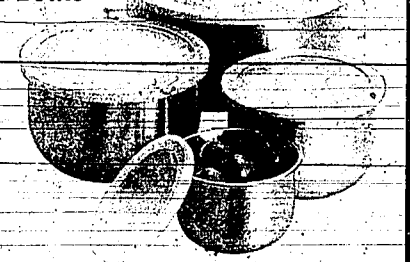
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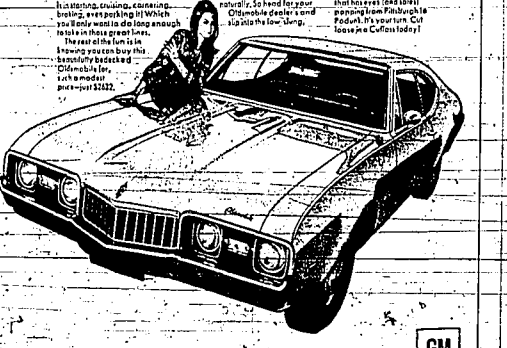
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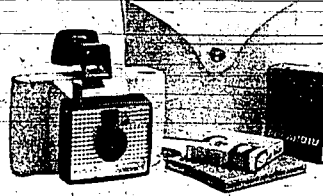


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
