63 Killed As French Jet Crashes Into Mountain

POINTE-A-PITRE, Guadeloupe (AP) — Rescue crews headed for a landing site about 30 miles away, Wednesday, after a French jet plunged into a mountain, killing 63 persons on board, including a woman identified as the wife of a state official, William Zwickert, died when the plane hit a mountain side Tuesday night.

The plane plunged into a mountain side at 6:27 p.m. near the town of Pointe-a-Pitre, Guadeloupe, and was due in Guadeloupe, Air France's main service area in the Caribbean, about 55 minutes later. Officials said the weather was good at the time of the crash but that they had received emergency messages from the pilot.

En route from Santiago, Chile, the plane was flying at an extremely low altitude, heard to explode like a bomb.

What Is Pornography? It May Be On Shelves Of Newsstands

SOME OF THESE BOOKS would be recommended reading in any library, a few are a little on the shady side and at least one, this writer feels, is pornographic. Others may not think so. The magazine, "Playboy," contains some of the best writing available in the world today, but it also contains some pictures that could be termed "suggestive" by certain adults and a large majority of teenagers. Reading habits and pornography were questions posed to many Twin Falls residents during an opinion survey last week.

For 72 cents, sometimes less, some of these books that any youth in Twin Falls can buy a dirty book or get his hands on a magazine full of pictures of nude women or men, some of them in compromising positions. Picture such titles as "Office Strands," "Gay on the Range," "The First Book mentioned here, which can be purchased for 75 cents in Twin Falls, has a very colorful beginning. It leaves no doubt in the reader's mind and the opening lines are a piece of work for the latter. "Gay on the Range," deals with the homosexual. On the back cover it says "Paris, the West, without women."

I purchased all three books last week, but I had to wait for a few minutes because three teenagers out of them a girl with her hand was paying for their books—books of the same title I held in my somewhat trembling hand. These books, I must state here, was for this article. I feel the teenagers are just a few of many available. My purchase also started on the magazines.

The director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, J. Edgar Hoover, said in a letter recently, "The publication and sale of obscene material is BIG business in America today."

He goes on, "Degenerate sex pictures and pornographic literature, currently sold and sold in most cities and communities, get greedy anti-merchants must be eliminated."

What is pornography? The FBI's Director of the FBI says, "It is the sale of obscene material in magazines, books, or other printed matter."

That is, it is one of the hardest questions to answer. "FBI's Director says never has a case and the United States Supreme Court has never ruled on the merits of the individual case. They are no broad, sweeping guidelines for judges to follow, and even lawmakers, Congress and members of the Idaho legislature have not cleared things up."

Idaho law prohibits the publication of material that deals with crime, sex and violence when the motive in such articles is to arouse sexual desire. Conviction of distributing such material is punishable by a \$1,000 fine and two years in prison, or both. It is a felony.

Recently, Lewiston and Caldwell passed obscenity ordinances. A tremendous controversy arose. Some contended the ordinances were restrictive, harmful, that it was an over-reaction. Several years ago the book, "Fanny Hill," by John Cleland, was banned from the Twin Falls school system. The book deals with a youth who writes four-letter words throughout.

In visiting with school officials I presented the three books I had purchased, along with my own copies of Ernest Hemingway's "Farewell to Arms," John Steinbeck's "East of Eden," Ed McBain's "Killer's Wedge," and Max Shulman's "Anson." Got a Matchbox?" Mr. Hemingway's book deals with illicit love-making and illegitimate birth. Mr. Steinbeck's book deals with a prostitute's mother.

However, neither one of these books comes close to being obscene. Both are tremendous works of art and can be enjoyed by young and old alike and can read again and again.

For a full day I visited with people carrying my stack of books and "Playboy" magazine under my arm. I showed them around and asked for opinions. I visited with ministers, school officials, law enforcement officials, attorneys, and men and women on the street. Some talked with me for under 15 years of age.

An estimated 40 million copies of "Playboy" magazine are sold in the United States. It is a small minority, although it is sold in every part of Twin Falls society.

None of the people questioned said the magazine or literature was obscene. But this same group did pick the three questionable books.

"This is terrible," one said. The reaction was that the three books I purchased after the teenagers were "pornographic."

Some did say they would have read the entire book to make an intelligent decision, but they added, "From the cover I can see I don't want my kid reading it."

What is the law-enforcement view on all this? Some said they had a bad influence on the kids of the kid in the neighborhood. Some said it was a direct result of pornography. Mr. Hoover of the FBI says, "The police have a tough time, especially in Twin Falls, since there is no city ordinance governing obscene material or pornographic literature."

They are, but the matter is very difficult to legislate. And, in this reporter's opinion, there is no great problem in neglecting the matter to legislate. A few that I showed it to through the magazine to look at especially the "centerfold."

"Playboy" magazine has long been considered a high quality magazine, but some of its pages can be pretty suggestive. The magazine contains the best fiction and non-fiction, and well-known American politicians have donated articles.

Paul Getty, one of the country's richest men, regularly writes for "Playboy," giving advice to young executives or businessmen on the world of high finance.

So how can you just read a book "over" and then find shelves of all material that is objectionable?

People's tastes vary, and what is bad for one person may be just right for another. The question is do the youngsters have the judgment to feel they do not, others feel they do. The general opinion is that the questionable books should be kept away from youngsters.

But our man said, "Kids will get them anyway. The parents bring them home and the kids pick 'em up and take them to school to give to their friends."

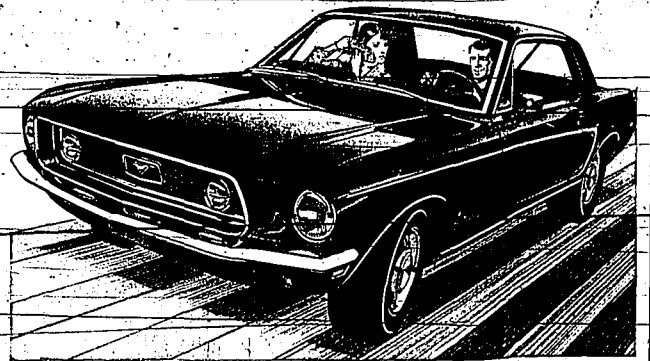

WALLACE MEET SET

The campaign, he said, will be a "push to get Wallace's name on Idaho's ballot" or electors for him under the law providing for independent candidates for state or national office.

McCormack Won't Back McCarthy

BOSTON (AP) — Some prominent Massachusetts Democrats Tuesday said they would not back John W. McCormack, say they will resign as candidates for the state delegation to the Democratic national convention rather than be forced to cast fitful votes for Sen. Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota.

President Johnson sent word Tuesday that he would neither enter the April 31 state presidential primary nor allow a stand-in to run for him, leaving McCarthy the lone candidate for the Democratic ballot when the filing deadline passed at 5 p.m.

A new Massachusetts law requires delegates, under penalty of fine or imprisonment, to vote on their first ballot at their own discretion. The law also provides that no delegate may refer to the poll in the state unless he releases them in writing.

Joining McCormack in promising to resign from the party's official slate of delegates were the Postmaster Lawrence F. O'Brien, a great resident of Spring-Guard Army, and also the field who had been considered a possible stand-in for Johnson, McCormack's nephew, former Treasury state-Atty. Gen. Edward J. Valley and the upper Snake River Valley area.

The only chance that Massachusetts' 72 convention votes might be kept from going to McCarthy appeared to be a write-in campaign for Johnson. Democratic leaders immediately began discussing the possibility, but some observers doubted there would be adequate time.

Sources close to the delegate slate, composed almost entirely of candidates favorable to Johnson, said resignations also are expected from Lester Hyman, chairman of the Democratic state committee; Maurice A. Donohue, president of the Massachusetts Senate; Robert H. Quinn, speaker of the Massachusetts House; and all or most of the state's congressmen.

Candidates have until March 8 to submit their resignations.

Travel Tax Being Studied

WASHINGTON (AP) — It would be possible for a U.S. tourist to travel abroad, pay nothing to the balance-of-payments deficit and yet still assist with the tax on overseas spending proposed by President Nixon.

This would apply to American tourists who confine their overseas spending to Ceylon, Guinea, India, Israel, Pakistan, Tunisia and the United Arab Republic.

These are countries in which the United States has an overabundance of local currencies—sometimes called counterparty funds—which can be used by U.S. businessmen and tourists. Most of the currencies were obtained through sales of U.S. food to nations that couldn't afford to pay dollars.

U.S. ambassadors and consuls in these countries will be authorized to sell U.S. dollars for the local currencies without any extra charge and the dollars stay on the U.S. books. The balance of payments isn't hurt.

The officials said the travel tax legislation sent to Congress in February provides for no exemptions based on specific countries visited.

An American could buy a plane ticket on a U.S. carrier, take a globe-circling trip and his fare would remain in the United States, adding nothing to the balance-of-payments deficit.

Under the administration's proposals his ticket would be subject to a 5 per cent excise tax. His destination wouldn't change that.

But by visiting only those seven countries and converting his dollars into local currencies at the U.S. Embassy, he could avoid any impact on the dollar drain through his spending. On returning to the United States, however, he would still be socked by a travel tax designed to reduce the balance-of-payments deficit.

Hijacked Plane Is In Cuba

By CHARLES GREEN
HAVANA (AP) — Havana Radio said today that a Jordanian and two Colombian hijacked the Colombian airliner diverted to Cuba Tuesday by between 32 and 36 persons aboard.

The broadcast said the passengers and crew were guests in the Hotel Versailles in Santiago where the plane landed in eastern Cuba. It gave no indication when they would be allowed to take the plane back to Colombia, but this is expected soon. In the past, passengers and crew members of hijacked planes have usually been allowed to leave within 24 hours.

The broadcast said the crew was forced to fly to Cuba by Italy-Analyse, a Jordanian who lives in Mexico, Colombia; Enrique Ortiz Acosta and Aristides Villalobos.

The Colombian DC4 plane was hijacked here since last Aug. 6, including two other Colombian aircraft. In each case the hijackers asked Prime Minister Fidel Castro's government for political asylum, but there has not been an announcement that any of the requests was granted.

Among the passengers Tuesday were several children, a Colombian senator, two congressmen and an aide to President Carlos Llerenas. The Colombian senator, No. 10, citizens were reported aboard.

The plane carried four crew members, but there were conflicting reports on the number of passengers. Colombian sources said there were 28 while Havana Radio said 37.

After the plane landed at Santiago in eastern Cuba, Ureca was taken to a hangar where three men with guns had seized the plane and he believed they were Colombian. Before Ureca could give more details, the telephone connection was cut.

The pilot, Capt. Pedro Wiles, radioed Bogota during the flight that he was being forced at gunpoint to fly to Cuba.

The airliner, which was owned by Avianca Airlines, was on a nine-run around Colombia when it was seized. The Colombian government said the three gunmen commended the plane after it flew to a small town near the Venezuelan border in an area where Castro guerrillas have been reported active.

Idaho Education Situation Is Analyzed

BOISE (AP) — The Legislature is expected to take action on a bill that would increase the average public school student in Idaho last school year. It cost \$407.77 — \$448.18 in 1962-63 — or about \$42 — per \$25.

Supporters Of McCarthy Claim Control

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) — Supporters of Sen. Eugene McCarthy's peace candidacy claimed control of party machinery at a meeting of congressional districts today after heavy turnout for Democratic precinct caucuses.

It came up at a four-day convention for McCarthy backers in what amounted to a grass-roots test of Vietnam policy in more than 3,000 precincts of McCarthy's home state Tuesday night.

If the claims hold up, McCarthy will net at least 15 seats on the 56-member delegation Minnesota sends to the Democratic national convention.

The Johnson-Humphrey forces clearly will control the Minnesota delegation, but the ousting of McCarthy support obviously hurt.

Party regulars had predicted only 50 delegates for McCarthy at most of the caucus.

McCarthy, 51, is opposing President Johnson in a half-dozen state primaries, starting with New Hampshire next Tuesday. He has made the Vietnam war his primary issue.

Vietnam was clearly the issue in most of the state party caucuses, with the turnout hitting record proportions in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area.

Dr. John C. Wright, a University of Minnesota professor who backs McCarthy, said the "concerned Democrats" claimed the 3rd, 4th and 5th congressional districts for the party dues. Each of the 10 St. Louis area districts will elect five delegates to the national convention.

State Sen. Joseph P. Kamp, campaign chairman, acknowledged loss of the 3rd and 5th districts today.

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP)—Leaders of the seven Soviet Bloc nations met today for a Warsaw Pact summit meeting threatened with more wrangling between the Russians and the maverick Romanians. Tet Offensive Shows Reds Have Weapons For Specific Tasks

By GEORGE MCARTIUR (SAIGON AP)—In the long past days of the war against the French, Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap's guerrillas hoisted their weapons were almost all captured on the battlefield. Simultaneously, the Communists began to ship in more modern weapons, including the RP77 grenade launcher and the changes became apparent about one year ago. American intelligence estimates that 75 per cent of the war supplies entering North Vietnam originate in Russia. Most of the rest comes from Red China with a small stream from other Red bloc nations. The 32mm mortar could fire captured U.S. 4.2 inch mortar. It became the mainstay of wide area harassing attacks on entering North Vietnam original installations, with a range of about two miles. The RP77, also known as the B20, was designed for use against tanks. This light, shoulder-fired weapon, similar to the old U.S. bazooka, has proved deadly against tanks, fixed installations and vehicles. Its rocket-boosted charge can penetrate 10 inches of steel. It has been used effectively against armored cars in the Mekong Delta province. The captured mortar is slightly less lethal than the U.S. M16 but also less complicated. The AK47 is now the standard infantry weapon for North Vietnamese regulars and almost all guerrillas. They are flowing in steadily—some captured AK47s have been manufactured as recently as 1957.

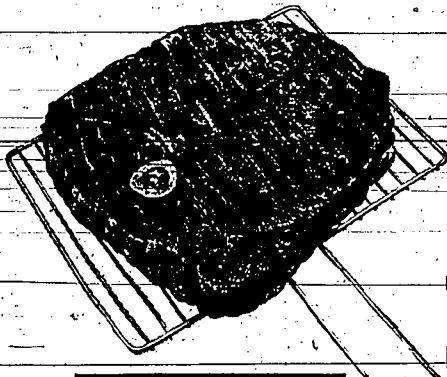

Hughes Is Man Who Thinks Big, But His Plans Remain Mystery

By DICK KLEINER

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — (NEA) — "Almost anywhere you go in southern Nevada, you see signs of Howard Hughes' presence. Drive down the Strip in Las Vegas; and you see four big hotels under construction. Drive out of town, into the scrubby desert, and you see mile after mile of open land which he is buying.

What is he planning to do? And why has he elected to settle here, when with his wealth he could go anywhere?

Nobody knows for sure, of course, Hughes likes it that way, enjoys the mystery that surrounds him and rears in the aura of confusion his mysterious dealings cause.

One deal which is the most typical—even though it is virtually settled, there is a vestigial mystery which keeps Las Vegas guessing.

Hughes wants to build a new jetport for Las Vegas. The Clark County commissioners are currently considering his proposal and nobody thinks they will turn it down. The deal boils down to a simple exchange—he'll build the county the jetport in exchange for old McCarran Field, closer to Vegas.

The county and city are negotiating the deal. They are to build a new field, big enough to accommodate the SSTs and they even hope to have a terminal port could become a West Coast terminus of all international SST flights eventually. Hughes has proposed the building of a rapid transit line, linking the jetport and Las Vegas.

The mystery is, however—what does Hughes have in mind for the old McCarran Field? He already owns some parts of it, but would wind up owning all.

As with everything else, the rumors fly.

One school of opinion believes he will erect a permanent World's Fair on the site. Another knows that he is planning to build a massive structure to house all of his various

industrial operations—a self-contained plant-and-city in one structure. A third body of thinkers feels the airport would be an ideal site for Hughes' aircraft Co.

That's the way it is with everything Hughes does, here in every action, breeds a counter-rotation of rumor.

Among the rumors which fly around the black-leg tables are:

• He is going to build a medical center in town to rival the Mayo Clinic.

• He is going to buy all the hotels in Las Vegas and utilize them as a gambling operation.

• He wants to control all the private land in the state of Nevada (the state which has the highest percentage of public land, thereby leaving the smallest percentage of private land and making it easier for one man to control).

• He is going to build gates

across both ends of Las Vegas strip and charge admission.

Most of these are ridiculous—some are they? With a man of Hughes' wealth and eccentricity, anything is possible. Then, too, the actions of his aides are not calculated to create conflict in his orthodox behavior of the group.

A Las Vegas man built himself a new home. It cost \$250,000 and was furnished elegantly. Soon after he moved in, a Hughes associate called and said, "Mr. X, we want to buy your house for a Hughes executive."

When the man said it wasn't for sale, the Hughes man said, "We know just what you paid for it and we'll give you a half million—but you must move out tomorrow." The man refused.

Hughes and his team, it seems obvious, know what they are about, and have known for some years. One old associate says that, several years ago, he saw on Hughes' desk a statistical breakdown on Las Vegas, covering every conceivable aspect of the city's economy and personality.

Hughes does something overnight, people who know him say. "He plans well ahead and he plans thoroughly."

Being the case, why is he in Las Vegas? There must be a motive. Many have been advanced by Las Vegas, and probably one or more have some truth to them.

First, Hughes is known to have long enjoyed Las Vegas. He used this as a base in his old flying days and, later, when he was still being sent, he often stayed here. (Significantly, he always stayed at the Desert Inn, the first hotel he bought.)

Second, Nevada has state income tax (although that may change any year) and no state inheritance tax. For a man with his money, that is desirable.

Third, Las Vegas is open 24 hours a day. Hughes likes to operate that way—and finds that nature a convenience.

Fourth, Las Vegas is uniquely suited to his method of operation — it can be controlled by one man more easily than any place else. Who controls the Strip hotels, it is said, controls Las Vegas. It is a small town, geographically and in its personality, and Hughes and his team can easily find out everything about anybody.

Fifth, Las Vegas is still imbued with pioneer spirit and great optimism about its potential. The state and local officials and the citizens believe this is where the future is — and they are receptive to a man who thinks big.

And Howard Hughes thinks big.



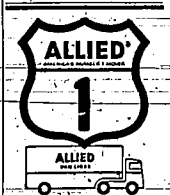

Gov. Rampton Speaks At Rail Meeting

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gov. Calvin Rampton joined a number of witnesses Wednesday in claiming the economy of Utah will suffer if passenger rail service is eliminated between Salt Lake City and Butte, Mont.

They testified in the second day of hearings before the Interstate Commerce Commission on a proposal by Union Pacific Railroad to drop passenger trains between those points.

Ogden, Pocatello and Idaho Falls also are served by the trains, which the railroad says operate at substantial losses.

The railroad says it lost more than \$100,000 on the trains in the first nine months of 1967. It says future operation of the trains will only increase the loss, because the Post Office withdrew in November the handling of mail on the line. The mail operation was the biggest source of revenue on the trains, the railroad says.

Gov. Rampton said he believes "special circumstances justify the out-of-pocket costs" of operating the trains. The governor said there are frequent times during the year when he makes it dangerous or impossible to travel by air or road.

"There is a continuing need for rail passenger service," he said. "Our economy demands it."

The governor said he opposes what he calls "the recent movement by railroads to eliminate passenger service."

He said the proposed elimination of the Salt Lake City-Butte train, which runs daily between the points, "is a step in that direction."
