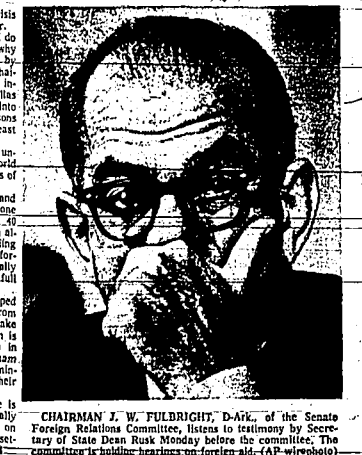

## Bombing Halt Offered

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk offered today to stop the bombing of North Vietnam to get war settlements going. He said he would not say any more about the bombing, but he said he would be willing to meet their principal condition—stopping the bombing.

Rusk noted that "we have up to us the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin incident were due to discussion of the war. Rusk said he had hoped that increased criticism from the administration would be a deterrent—but that unfortunately it did not have that effect."

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# Nixon Makes Last Sprint In New Hampshire

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP)—Richard M. Nixon staged a final effort seeking to turn out the Republican vote while Democrat Eugene J. McCarthy stuck to his standard low-key style in windup campaigning for Tuesday's election in New Hampshire's presidential primary.

Nixon's final campaign stand today featured a series of brief visits to his headquarters in five cities: one at a breakfast reception Sunday night, urging Republicans to vote Tuesday, telling them: "We're going to win. We're going to win in March and we're going to win in November. It's going to be a new day for America."

There appeared to be no way Nixon, the only major candidate among nine on the Republican

ballot, could lose in New Hampshire. The real question? How big a margin can he produce over the late-starting write-in movement for New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller?

While Nixon was shaking hands and appealing for a big New Hampshire send-off, Rockefeller conferred in New York with more than 20 Republican leaders who urged him to run for president.

They said Rockefeller would counsel with other Republicans within the next few days and Oregon Gov. Tom McCall said the call for a draft to propel the New Yorker into the campaign was "almost irresistible."

Nixon said Rockefeller "may be closer to presidential candidacy. He said he did not know much about the New York session—I wasn't invited to that

meeting and I didn't have it bugged."

The former vice president said that if Rockefeller becomes an active rival for the nomination "I will pledge" to campaign on issues, not on personalities. "I will not campaign against him any more than I did against Gov. (George) Romney," Nixon said.

Michigan's Romney had been Nixon's chief opponent in New Hampshire. But Romney was out of the running, knew it, and withdrew as a presidential candidate on Feb. 23.

McCarthy, the Minnesota senator challenging a President Johnson's re-nomination, said if he can get 25 per cent of the vote Tuesday it will be a signal of significant criticism for re-nomination policy on Vietnam and other issues.

"I'm hopeful, and this is not

just a vague hope, that we may very well run over 30 per cent," McCarthy said.

McCarthy planned to record an election television program in Boston, then return to New Hampshire to await primary results.

He suggested that if the administration—Is—considering sending another 200,000 men to Vietnam this should have been presented to the people of New Hampshire so they could render a judgment on it in the primary.

"If they really have this in mind," he said in an interview, "they ought to let us know so that there could be a judgment by the people up here."

Democratic Gov. John W. King, chief spokesman for the write-in campaign conducted for Johnson, said "the president would win Tuesday by a three to one margin."

# Violence Seen In Warsaw

**WARSAW, Poland (AP)**—Violence broke out again today in downtown Warsaw as police dispersed a jeering crowd of youths in front of the main gate of Warsaw University.

For more than two hours several thousand persons lined the streets fronting the university. Youths chanted, "Gospo, Gospo" at passing police cars and pushed into the busy boulevard, blocking traffic.

Police tried to clear the air as police moved in to disperse them.

A group of teen-age boys set a fire on the steps of a church across the street and shouted insults and threw rocks at helmeted police and plain clothes auxiliaries.

It was the third outbreak of violence in Warsaw since student demonstrations began last Friday.

Truncheon-wielding police charged into the youths massed on the steps of the church and were met with a shower of rocks.

Backing from policemen, the youths ran for shelter into the church and shut the two big oak doors. The police did not enter the church.

The doors opened every few minutes and youths hurried to throw bricks and other objects at passing policemen.

A battle line was formed with the youths holding up signs. Police auxiliaries kept passers by away from the church.

# Figuring—Late At Night

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## Peculiar Protest

"Now, some of my best friends are Jewish, but this phrase has been used so often in a variety of forms as a hypocritical preface to a bigoted statement, that it has become almost standard form for pressure groups in presenting opposition to just about anything. There is absolutely no intention here to imply any bigotry on the part of the Farm Bureau, but the procedure outlined above is pretty close to the tactics used by a group of Farm Bureau members Thursday night in protesting expenditure of tax funds to finance establishment of a mental retardation center in Twin Falls.

It is built. Which, when all the rhetoric and frothing are striped away, means just one thing—the group that showed up at the Thursday night meeting does not want a mental retardation center in Twin Falls.

For an opposition group to select a "12th-hour" meeting—one called primarily to decide on a site for an already approved center—at which to throw a stumbling block in the way of the project, doesn't particularly put it in a favorable and impartial light.

Through the hard work of a lot of people, a project has been worked out whereby this area can acquire a mental retardation treatment facility (which advocates foresee as the nucleus of a complete mental health treatment center) valued at \$12,000, for a total outlay of \$12,000 in county tax money. Repeated assurance has been given by state health officials that they are not only willing, but anxious to take on the expense of operating the facility once

it is built. And, according to testimony given at a legislative hearing last year, it is expected that the state actually can save money in its overall mental retardation program through the operation of such strategically located day-care-type centers, rather than treating the patients in residency at a central state hospital.

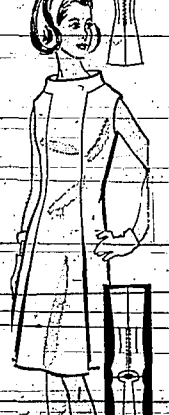

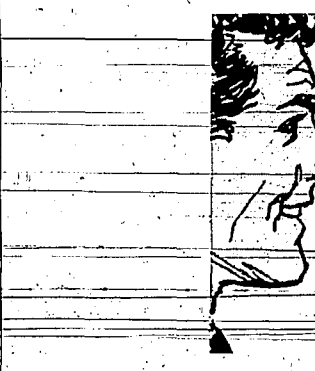

# Does Information Leak To Market?

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The price of stock in a certain company suddenly jumps one point amidst heavy trading on the New York Stock Exchange. The next day the government awards a full contract to that same firm. Suspicious ares. Did a government official leak advance word of the contract? Or buy a stock? The Treasury Department reports that it could have meant windfall profits for bond speculators.

The information deal with \$20 million sale of U.S. bonds. The Treasury report traced the leak to a middle-level employee who died of a heart attack a week after he was suspended. "I am not convinced this leak was only one that was current," said a spokesman, Wright Patman, D-Tex., of the House Banking Committee. He wants to investigate.
