Dealers Curtail Trading Gold Rush Becomes Stampede

LONDON (AP) — Europe's gold rush became a virtual stampede today as dealers curtailed trading in the London market. The curtailment was the first such action taken since the formation of the international gold pool in 1969. London's dealers made clear there was no suspension of sales. They raised the price of gold five cents to \$52.20 an ounce and refused to take smaller orders. No big orders were refused.

LBJ Has Close Primary Win, Nixon Shows Well



CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — New Hampshire Democrats returned a startling decision today, picking President Johnson as a narrow winner in the state's primary election. Johnson's victory was the narrowest in the nation's opening presidential primary, with Richard Nixon showing well. Nixon's slim edge in the delegates pledged to him, and presidential preference poll was 532 votes out of 543 declared candidates, in virtually complete, unfeeling figure. As a result, there were 24 delegates pledged to Johnson, while 19 persons were pledged to Nixon. The Minnesota senator thus confounded the forecasts and gained his first officially selected delegates to the Democratic convention. There were additional votes for McCarthy written in on Republican ballots. Their number was not known, and the ballot-writing won't be tabulated for days. But the drama was in the Democratic story. It was a sign of political trouble for Johnson and a leadoff success for McCarthy, whose campaign was a platform protesting Vietnam policy—once was scored as an consequential, by Democratic professionals. Minnesota's McCarthy surpassed his forecasts and won the state, but his name was not on the ballot, but the state Democratic organization's production in its campaign. The turnout in both parties was a record. Johnson had a smashing victory, Rockefeller said it was not significant because there was competition. The near-final count had Johnson leading McCarthy by less than 4,000 votes. Nixon's promoters had forecast a 3-1 victory—and even that prediction was toned down from earlier ball talk. The contest for delegates appeared to be reversing the verdict of the primary. Nixon was in the state, not local administration. He said that Carnas County members would vote through the state, gave themselves a mental pat on the back for the approval of the sales tax, which they supported avidly.

Allied Forces Kill 300 Enemy Troops In Battles

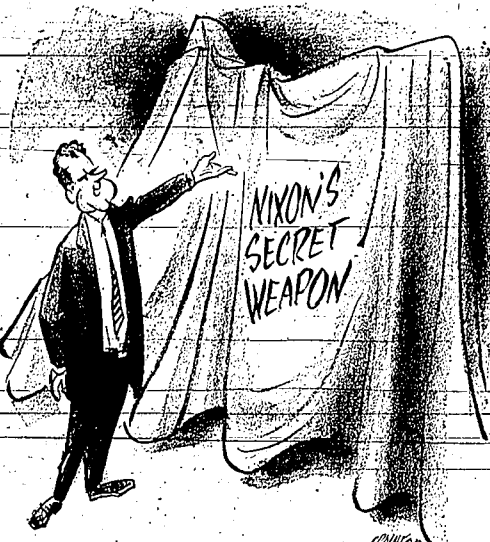

Liberation Army Forms To Invade Vietnam

SAGONG (AP) — The South Vietnamese government's chief spokesman said today that a volunteer "liberation army" is being formed to invade North Vietnam.

U.S. officials expressed complete surprise at the report. The spokesman, Director General of Information Nguyen Nho Linh, said the invasion army would be made up of Vietnamese who are "sick and tired of those people who want to 'liberate' South Vietnam." This was a reference to the Viet Cong, who call themselves the South Vietnamese "Liberation Army."

Vietnam Press, the government news agency, reported earlier today that authoritative sources had said a "high-rank-

ing number of the vice president's office is forming a March to the North Army." The vice president is Nguyen Cao Ky, the former commander of the air force who was premier for two years before he and President Nguyen Van Thieu were elected last fall.

"Many military men, political figures and representatives of groups and religions have been contacted for support for the formation of the army," Vietnam Press said.

"Moreover, several retired officers and with best military records are actively participating in the formation of the March to the North Army's command staff."

Linh told a newsman the new

force would ask the government to provide it arms and ammunition and would be called the North Vietnamese Liberation Army. He said it would consist of guerrillas and would not be part of the regular South Vietnamese Army.

Many of the officers for the new army would come from South Vietnam's Hoa Hao and Cao Dai sects, Linh said. Both are ultranationalist religious sects which, until recent years, maintained their own armies. They are strongly anti-Communist.

U.S. officials had no comment. They are likely to be highly skeptical since the South Vietnamese armed forces are having trouble increasing their net strength by 65,000 men.

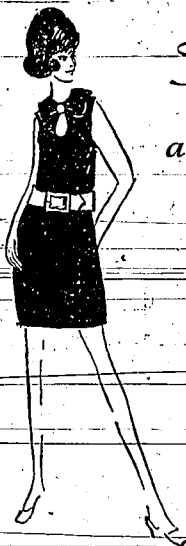

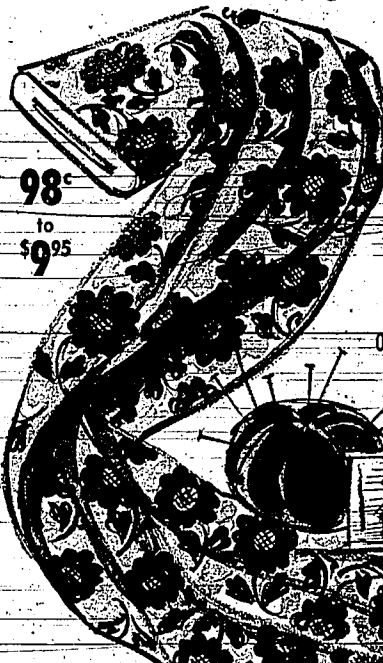

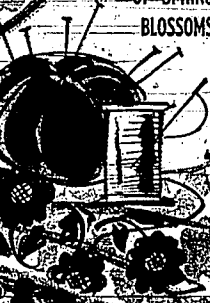

U.N. To View Action On Rhodesia

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. Security Council is expected to meet in the next few days to consider taking action against white-ruled Rhodesia for hanging five black Africans.

Thirty-six African nations requested an urgent council session in a letter delivered Tuesday. It declared that "the failure" of U.N.-imposed economic sanctions on Britain's breakaway colony "has been dramatically demonstrated by the recent tragic assassination of political prisoners."

Only Malawi and Gambia of the African bloc abstained from signing the request, but some diplomats said the decision to seek a council meeting was taken reluctantly. African nations have generally urged that Britain use force against the regime of Prime Minister Ian Smith, but the British government refused.

The five Africans hanged were convicted of murder. They were the first persons executed since Smith declared the territory independent of Britain in late 1965.

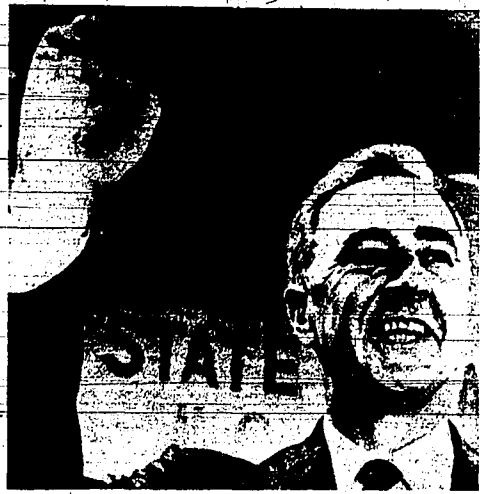

Meany Accepts Challenge For Convention

WASHINGTON (AP) — George Meany has accepted a challenge for a special AFL-CIO convention to judge whether the United Labor is foundering under his leadership. But he said challenger Walter Reuther must first agree to abide by the verdict.

Reuther, the United Auto Workers president who joined with Meany to found the 11-million-member labor federation 12 years ago, can have the special convention he demanded "if he puts his gun away," Meany said.

Reuther, who for more than a year has been attacking the 12-year-old Meany's leadership in the AFL-CIO presidency as "stagnant," "undemocratic" and "vegetating," called meeting today of the Auto Workers Executive Board to consider the offer of a special convention.

Meany said the AFL-CIO 23-man Executive Council unanimously approved to the demand for a special convention if Reuther first promises to show up and accept any decisions of the convention.

But he said the council "unanimously rejects out of hand the ultimatum" by Reuther that he should pull his 1.5 million Auto Workers out of the federation if he doesn't get the convention.

Meany said this didn't mean Reuther would have to promise not to secede from the AFL-CIO in order to get a special convention.

Reuther indicated earlier he couldn't accept any precedents to a special convention.

"I pray that the American labor movement can see the light," said the 60-year-old, red-haired Reuther.

Reuther gave up the presidency of the Congress of Industrial Organizations in 1959 to promote Meany, president of the American Federation of Labor, as head of the merged 18-million-member organization.

Reuther, speaking at the convention of the AFL-CIO's 6.5 million-member Industrial Union Department, said he favored neither a U.S. withdrawal nor escalation of the war in Vietnam, Meany is among Johnson-strength supporters.

Reuther, at his convention, and Meany, at AFL-CIO headquarters, exchanged statements at news conferences a block apart, but neither moved for a personal confrontation.

"I'm going to write him a letter," Meany said. "As soon as I get around to it."

Health Works Are Directed By One Man

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sprawling health operations of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare have for the first time been put under one man — Dr. Philip R. Lee, assistant secretary for health and scientific affairs.

The change, effective Tuesday, put Lee in charge of several programs including medical care, Medicaid, and health activities of the Children's Bureau.

Lee also will direct and coordinate activities of 45,000 health employees operating under an annual budget of about \$11 billion.

Surgeon General William H. Stewart, head of the Public Health Service, and Commissioner James L. Goddard of the Food and Drug Administration will report to Lee rather than to the secretary of health, education and welfare.

High Polish Officials Are Ousted

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The Polish government ousted three high officials Tuesday after the local Communist party chief had promised action against managers whose children took part in three days of rioting.

The Polish news agency PAP gave no explanation for the dismissal of the three, but accused-controlled newspapers had accused their children of leading protest demonstrations which touched off the rioting.

The three were Jan Gruzdzki, vice-minister of forestry and timber; Jan Gurecki, director general of the Finance Ministry; and Fryderyk Topolski, head of a Warsaw industrial plant.

(Sources in Washington said all three are Jews.)

Western observers predicted more dismissals and possibly a number of trials of students would result from the rioting, the worst in Poland since three days of disturbances in 1957 stemming from the closing of a student magazine.

The current unrest began with protests in January of a popular play. Several newspapers have blamed the subsequent disturbances on pro-Israeli intellectuals upset by the government's anti-Israeli policy after the June war.

Negroes Head School In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Board of Education has appointed a Negro principal and vice principal to replace white officials at a predominantly-Negro high school where pupils have been boycotting classes.

The board appointed Lewis L. Johnson Jr. as principal and David Stewart vice principal of Jefferson High School in South Los Angeles. A spokesman said the board did not view the appointments as yielding to pupil demands.

Walkouts by up to 3,500 students, complaining of discrimination and other problems, embroiled seven high schools after eight days of turmoil.

Violence hit two schools Tuesday in the town of Venice, west of Los Angeles, about 1,000 pupils left classes Tuesday and fifty-eight were locked in a crowded school. Eleven youths were arrested.

Three hundred Negro youth starts at Edison Junior high set fires and broke windows before leaving school. It took 12 men and police squads to subdue the Venice youths, who were booked on suspicion of failure to disperse, assault with a deadly weapon and other charges.

A boycott of classes at five East Los Angeles schools in an area where there are about one-million persons of Mexican descent showed signs of declining.

The victim was identified as Mrs. Elizabeth Castro and also as Mrs. Harris.

Burley police also police said Harris was on a \$10,000 bond awaiting trial in the Nov. 19 armed robbery of the home of a Burley family.

Robert H. Marr, Billings, also is of Phil Harris. Marr, 34, Billings, still is in Cassia County Jail on charges in connection with the robbery. Burley police said.

Some \$500 was reported stolen in the Burley hold-up.

Police said Harris was in a Billings hospital March 9 from a beating inflicted Feb. 29. Officers said Harris is a salesman at the hospital in a cab which picked her up at Harris' address.



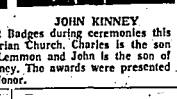

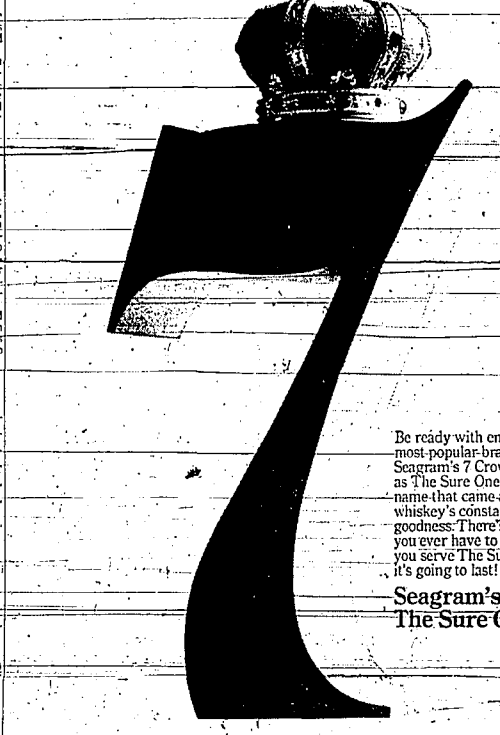

Idaho Drivers May Have To Watch Skies

BOISE (AP)—Idaho drivers may soon have to watch out for airplanes as well as unmarked police cars if they plan to break traffic laws.

The Idaho Traffic Safety Commission Tuesday approved a test project in which an Air National Guard helicopter and a state police car will team up to catch speeding drivers.

Gov. Don W. Samuelson supported the project last year, and Idaho's traffic death toll climbed to a record of 276 for the year.

Idaho's adjutant general, Mal Greer, is in charge. He said the Idaho National Guard would cooperate in the tests, the first of which will be over Interstate 80N between Mountain Home and Boise.

He said fixed-wing aircraft will be used in other parts of the state, on highways designated by State Police Superintendent L. Clark Hinn.

The traffic safety project is one which will qualify for two-thirds funding by the federal government—and Bennett said it would be one of the least expensive. "All we need is an airplane, a patrol car and a stopwatch," he explained.

A women's traffic safety crusade in Idaho was proposed by Mrs. Wilbert Cammack of Burley, who recently returned from a Washington, D.C. meeting of the National Association of Women Highway Safety Leaders.

make as many tricks as no-trump as the other declarer would make at spades. How can he?

One way is to win the heart immediately diamond finesse. If it works and the queen of diamonds is not at the top—a suit of four cards or more, he will make four diamonds—two hearts and either four or five spades depending on the location of the spade king and also will make as many tricks as the spade declarer.
