## U.S. Relief Being Sought

# Europe's Gold Rush Skyrockets



WITH GOLD SALES soaring in Europe to the highest peaks in history, goldsmiths and goldminers are besieged with business. LONDON (AP) — Europe's gold rush skyrocketed today in a buying spree that economic experts said threatens monetary stability.

London, Paris, Zurich and even the normally small Frankfurt market reported levels of gold that dealers had never dreamed possible.

Paris, where sales normally are two to three tons, had more than 40 tons Thursday. This was the highest amount of gold ever sold in Paris, more than twice Wednesday's record high of 16 tons. The Bank of France was said to have sold the amount London dealers expected sales to top 200 tons.

There was a stampede for gold in Paris. Dealers and foreign exchange markets reported a complete collapse of gold prices and a sharp rise in the price of gold bullion and foreign exchange markets.

More than 40 tons were sold in London. The pattern of sales in all markets showed the buyers were stretching up gold silver and other precious metals.

This was an indication that the market was shifting its savings into something he considered safer and more solid than paper money.

"Only firm action by the United States to reduce its foreign debt is to reduce its foreign debt," one source observed.

SAIGON (AP) — Enemy troops attacked an Army supply convoy from ambush along winding Route 14 in the central highlands, but U.S. tanks and helicopter gunships splintered the enemy's attack.

The U.S. command said 43 North Vietnamese regulars and Viet Cong guerrillas were killed in the short, midday fight. Nine enemy soldiers were killed and wounded.

The enemy sprayed the 4th Infantry Division convoy with bazooka-type rockets and heavy automatic weapons fire and hit the vehicles. A commando unit threatened from roving guerrilla bands operating in Saigon's suburbs.

# Kennedy Steps To Break Of Candidacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy has stepped out of the presidential campaign and a key ally says he will not challenge the incumbent.

Kennedy huddled with political advisers in New York City last night after saying in Washington he is reassessing whether to run against President Johnson.

The New York Democrat said he would not have to campaign actively in the primaries.

"Otherwise, there is no reason to believe that I would be a serious challenger," he told newsmen.

Kennedy said the major obstacle to his candidacy had been the fear of deeply dividing the Democratic party if he was supported by personal ambition or animosity toward Johnson.

But Kennedy's strong showing in New Hampshire removed that obstacle.

"He has reassessed his position all along the way," Sen. Robert F. Kennedy said today. "I said I intended to stay in the race, but I have decided to step out of the race."

A close aide said Kennedy's decision was made by March 23, the date of the New Hampshire primary.

Another factor in his reassessment, Kennedy said, was the fact that "Richard Nixon is very likely to be the nominee of the Republican party."

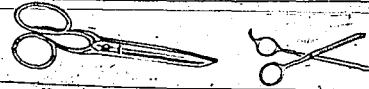

How can the relationship between Britain and the United States be preserved and improved by mutual understanding? This was the question posed last year by the Edward L. Bernays Foundation in a competition undertaken as the first step in a drive "to dissipate the myths, half-truths, illusions and stereotypes that 70 million Americans and 53 million Britons have about each other."

They ranged all the way from a two-hour television spectacular to be beamed to both countries under the theme, "A Salute to British-American Friendship, to a recommendation that a joint commission write a definitive history of the American Revolution to become one of the centrepieces of the bicentennial celebration in 1976."

National Deafness

The "people's right to know" is the implied reverse of the free press and the right to be informed. But what if the people, or most of them, don't want to know? Two social scientists at the University of Michigan claim that studies show that newspaper stories or television programs dealing with world affairs generally attract only the small proportion of the population which is already well-informed.

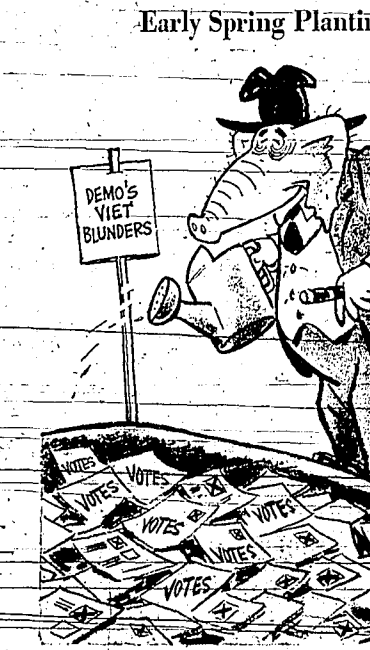

Q—What causes spastic colitis? Does it lead to a peptic ulcer? Is there any connection between spastic and mucous colitis? What is the best treatment? Is rest necessary? It is best treated by a diet of colitis-including allergies, chronic anemic dysentery and other intestinal troubles and persistent use of laxatives.

In most persons, this stimulus is sufficient to start peristalsis in an hour after finishing breakfast. My doctor has prescribed paregoric, which helps but the condition returns when I stop taking the medicine. What should I do? ### Labor Party Begins Period Of Testing

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson's embattled Labor Party began a period of testing today in the first of eight special parliamentary elections. Its prospects were not good.

Labour held six of eight seats vacated by death or resignation but stands a chance of losing the majority. Conservative reserves won the other two in 1965 and are expected to keep them.

The vote today was in London's South Kensington district, a solid Conservative constituency of small-apartment dwellers and businessmen. The Tories won there in 1954 with 64 per cent of the vote. The question today was how much would the margin increase as a result of the growing displeasure with the government.

A nationwide Gallup Poll gave the Conservatives a 19-per cent popularity lead. The Daily Mail's national opinion poll put the Conservative lead at 33.7 but Conservative leader Edward Heath's overnight Wilson hit popularity for the first time, 45 per cent to 40 per cent.

Even if Labour loses seven of the by-elections, Wilson's majority in the 630-member House of Commons would be a decisive 68. But public opinion as reflected in the election results could affect government policies.

The next four by-elections come March 29 and will be influenced by next Tuesday's national budget. It is expected the government will reflect Wilson's austerity program to put the economy back on its feet. Higher taxes and tighter credit are forecast.

Polling dates have not been set for the last three by-elections but they are expected in April.

The Daily Mail poll also predicted a resounding endorsement of the government's recent legislation restricting colored immigration, which most newspapers and liberals had deplored. Of the 1,803 voters questioned, 79 per cent approved the legislation, 15 per cent disapproved and 6 per cent said they had no opinion.

### Death Toll In War Tops 500 In Last Week

SARIGON (AP) — The U.S. death toll in the Vietnam war topped 500 last week for the 19th time in four weeks, the U.S. Command reported today.

The command said 508 Americans were killed in combat and 2,191 wounded in the previous week.

In the week of Feb. 11-17, the number of Americans killed was the highest of the war—543. There were 470 killed in the week of Feb. 18-24.

South Vietnamese military headquarters reported 418 government troops killed last week, 1,193 wounded and 88 missing or captured. This was a sharp rise over the week before, when 139 were reported killed, 779 wounded and 92 missing.

The U.S. Command reported that allied forces killed 4,335 of the enemy last week, while the South Vietnamese said 5,327 were killed and 488 captured. Discrepancies in the report of enemy casualties by the two commands is not unusual.

The report raised total American combat casualties in the war since January 1955 to 12,754 killed, 125,101 wounded and 1,065 missing or captured. Nearly half the wounded—56,437—did not require hospitalization.

The weekly summary also said allied troops had killed 10,557 of the enemy since the start of 1961.

**Housewife's Law Course Is Offered** — BY DEE WEDEMEYER — NEW YORK (AP) — A housewife's government course purchased home and finds it has no appliances. A quick check of the fine print in deed shows the appliances were not included in the purchase.

Another woman gives her property to her husband and checks with the trustee's instruction, "fill in the amount." The trustee fills in the amount—a little.

"These housewives are not stupid," says Prof. Henry Selin, 61, who has been teaching a two-semester Women's Law Course at New York University for 19 years. "It's a combination of being in a hurry and being too trustworthily."

The Women's Law Course was established in 1899 "for the better protection of women's rights."

At that time they had few rights to be protected. Women were not allowed to vote. They could own property, but it was subject to the dictates of their husbands.

And of more importance to the small band of suffragettes who advocated the course were being admitted to law school.

"In these swinging states, the woman's lot has improved, but the problems she faces have grown more complex. Even a small purchase can present problems if a shopper learns the hard way that a warranty differs from the salesman's promise."

Over the years, women attending the course have ranged in age from 18 to 60. Selin says they are enrolled for varying reasons. One woman is simply curious; another wants to check up on her lawyer; and there is always one who is going through a divorce procedure.

"We don't want to give lawyers out of these ladies, although some have gone on to law school and even have become judges," he says. "We just want to make them aware when they need a lawyer."

For instance, he wryly tells his classes, beware of what you say about the neighbor over the backyard fence.

"You might be leaving yourself open for a slander suit."

# Castro To Take Over All Clubs

By FENTON WHEELER

HAVANA (AP) — Resounding his battle cry against all private enterprise in Cuba, Prime Minister Fidel Castro declared Wednesday night the Communist party would soon take over all private bars and clubs.

In a 4½-hour speech the Cuban leader also said the 1967-68 sugar crop would fall 2.5 million metric tons short of the goal of 8 million tons, but he pledged Cuba would overcome its economic troubles. He also got in some barbs at the Soviet Union.

Dressed in his familiar green fatigues with a jacket against the cool night air, Castro said some people were living like parasites during the nation's difficult days.

"We intend to eliminate all private businesses," he told a crowd of several thousand and a nationwide radio and television audience. But as in the past he set no deadline for this.

The crowd gasped when he reported that a study of bars has shown that 41 per cent earn more than \$100 a day. State agricultural workers in Cuba earn \$5 a month.

Indirectly referring to the recent Russian limitation of oil to Cuba, Castro said Cuba has let out all the problem to get it out," he said. "We have to drill and drill more."

"He reported that a second oil well found near Havana is twice as good as the one reported discovered a few days after Castro announced gasoline rationing for Jan. 2.

Near the end of his speech Castro referred to the National Airlines plane hijacked Tuesday en route from Tampa to Miami and flown to Havana. He said it appeared three Cubans became involved with life in the United States and forced the plane to Havana. He said Cuba charged for hijacking but that the National crew "lacked fortitude" before returning to Miami.

It should be recalled, Castro said, that the United States has a number of Cuban ships and planes that have not been returned. He said the Swiss Embassy, which intervened in the National plane hijacking, should be interested in this.

## FBI Reports 23 Per Cent Spurt In Big-City Crimes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI reports a 23 per cent spurt in big-city crimes paced an overall 16 per cent jump in the nation's major crime rate last year, and called last summer's riots as a factor.

The 23 per cent hike was in cities of 500,000 to one million population.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said in a report released today that crime in the suburbs was up 16 per cent and jumped 17 per cent in rural areas. A 17 per cent jump was recorded in cities of 25,000 population and over.

The FBI said arrests of persons under 18 years old rose eight per cent.

Included in the increased police arrests was a rising volume of arrests for offenses against public order — such as the buffalo said in a statement accompanying statistical data.

Arrests of adults rose by three per cent after declining slightly in 1966, the report said. Crimes of violence were up 17 per cent, led by robbery which increased 27 per cent from 1966. There were 12 per cent more

murders, 9 per cent more rapes and 8 per cent more aggravated assaults.

Property crimes jumped 16 per cent. Auto thefts rose 17 per cent, and burglary and larceny of \$50 and over in value were up 16 per cent, the report said.

Household goods favored federal present control, said officials. Assault where a gun was used as the weapon rose 22 per cent and one of five assaults was committed with a gun.

## Ky Calls On People To Free North

SAIGON (AP) — Vice Pres. Richard M. Nixon called on the Vietnamese people today to liberate North Vietnam from Communist rule and rejoin their country.

In a speech to Roman Catholic villagers 13 miles north of Saigon, Ky said the government would give weapons to anyone who could hold one if they were anti-Communists.

The vice president presented arms for self-defense to several Roman Catholic parishes in Binh Hoa province.

Down with the Communists is not enough," he said. "You have to say 'Down with the Communists; Communist henchmen and colonialists; We will go to the South to live. Most of them were Roman Catholics who now constitute one of the most militantly anti-Communist groups in the South."

# Train Discontinuance Protests Are Varied

By ROBERT KUESTERMAN

Most of those who objected to the proposed elimination of Salt Lake City-Butte train service in public hearings completed this week admitted they seldom rode the train. Some, however, said they wanted Union Pacific to continue the service for a variety of reasons — ranging from maintaining the shipping line of dead bodies to the Interstate Commerce Commission in Utah, Idaho and Montana, involved only one of more than 100 proposed discontinuances scheduled for consideration this year.

Union Pacific contends it is losing money on trains 35 and 36 between Salt Lake City and Butte, via Ogden, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

R. B. Johnson, Omaha, U.P. passenger traffic manager, testified in Salt Lake City that passenger traffic on the trains has declined steadily since the railroad efforts to promote it.

The railroad says it lost more than \$200,000 last year during the first nine months of the year. The railroad predicts losses would be considerably greater this year since the U.S. Post Office withdrew mail handling from the trains in November, U.P. said the mail service brought the most revenue.

Johnson said the number of passengers last year fluctuated between 87 and 84 per trip during the heavy travel months in the summer and averaged about 50 per trip the rest of the year.

Most of the witnesses testifying at the I-C hearings were opposed to the discontinuance. Generally, they did not dispute that Union Pacific is losing money, but they often contended the losses are due to poor service from railroads.

Some witnesses contended the railroad has an obligation to continue the unprofitable train as a public duty. They argued discontinuance would leave their areas at times — such as in winter — without transportation, and in any event would do serious transportation and economic harm.

Gov. Calvin L. Rampton of Utah and Salt Lake City Mayor J. Bracken Lee were among many who accused railroads in general of trying to get rid of passenger service.

Rampton said there has been a "recent movement — by all railroads to cut down on passenger service."

Rampton said there are frequent times when air service doesn't operate and the highways are closed by weather. At such times, he said, trains are the only available transportation.

Mayor Lee agreed "Railroads are deliberately trying to decrease passenger service."

They have set standards of food go down," Lee said.

The mayor said financial losses "might be the result of years of planning" by the railroads themselves.

Ogden City Manager Charles J. Kelley said he had not used trains for years, but "if the quality of that service were improved, the comfort and cleanliness of the service improved, the scheduling made more dependable, the convenience of ob-

tainings reservations were increased. "I would probably use this passenger service," Ernest C. Steel, chairman of the Montana Railroad Commission, said. "The three-state railroad served by these trains is desirable for new growth rate, both provide passenger transportation facilities well in the background of that growth. It is essential that transportation facilities continue to exist."

# McCarthy Concerns Johnson's Advisers

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's political advisers, genuinely concerned that Eugene J. McCarthy may beat the President in Wisconsin's April 2 presidential primary, are plotting a major overhaul in strategy.

An informed source says they will junk two tactics which they believe backfired against Johnson in Tuesday's New Hampshire primary, where McCarthy captured an impressive 42 percent of the vote.

One of these, the well-placed informant said, is the message that "Hanoi is watching" for an anti-Johnson turnout that might strictly U.S. dignity over the war. The other is the use of pledge cards. Johnson said in a public expression of indifference to the President's strategy.

"You may be pretty sure," said the informant, "you won't hear of those two gimmicks again."

Johnson's advisers definitely do not share the President's public-opinion-of-indifference in the New Hampshire results.

"New Hampshire simply isn't something you can brush off readily," the source said. "We have serious problems. And we've got to face up to the fact that McCarthy can take the President in Wisconsin."

"That would really hurt."

In the three weeks remaining before the Wisconsin test where the President will be on the ballot—his strategic plan is to pin down the Minnesota senator on specific alternatives to Johnson's Vietnam war policy.

McCarthy's opposition to conduct of the war has been the basis for his steadily mounting campaign to wrest the Democratic nomination from the President.

Johnson's advisers believe their major failure in New

Hampshire was "not naming McCarthy down on his alternatives."

"We let him get away with depicting the war in broad generalities," the informant said. "That's not going to happen in Wisconsin."

The administration tactic will be to have state party officials, labor leaders and administrative figures press McCarthy for specific alternatives in Vietnam. But since the President has yet to make a clear choice, not campaign in the primaries, the informant said, "I wouldn't think there would be any Cabinet officers or other really high officials taking part."

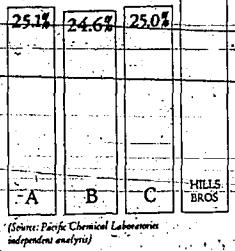

# Nixon Is Saving 'Big Guns' To End War For Use Against Johnson

By **RELMAN MORIN** — Richard Nixon has been discussing this and other questions in an interview in his Fifth Avenue apartment in New York, N.Y. Nixon says the reason he is not ready to spell out the details of his plan to end the war in Vietnam is because he is reserving his "big guns" for use against President Johnson if he loses the Republican presidential nomination.

Asked if he intends this as a pledge, Nixon replied emphatically, "It's a pledge."

Nixon formula, no gimmick, if I had a said, "I am reserving my 'big guns' for use against Johnson."

Johnson, that would be a moral issue.

But I do have some specific ideas on how to end the war. They are primarily in the diplomatic area.

He said he considers the chances "60 to 40 against" the possibility that the North Vietnamese will agree to come to the conference table before the national elections next November.

With regard to his own actions as a contender or candidate only in the campaigning, Nixon said: "I'm not going to carry on my office," Nixon said. "In my case, the fact that the foreign policy issue became predominant in the race and I could travel abroad and speak with some authority on it—that raised me above the others."

If domestic problems, not the war in Vietnam, were predominant today, Nixon said, "I don't think there would have been a tendency to look to me. I think the tendency would have been to go to what has been called 'those who manage the cities and states.'"

In that case, he continued, Gov. Romney of Michigan would have been in a stronger position to make the race for the presidency.

Nixon said Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York "has some expertise" in foreign policy, "but he himself has taken the job well."

He referred to the fact that Rockefeller has not stated his preference on Vietnam in recent months.

Nixon repeated his assertion that if Rockefeller wants the GOP nomination he must enter.

He wound up his campaign and win some primaries, Rockefeller, long asserting that the lack of a real candidate, has said he will not decide within 10 days whether to permit his name to remain on the ballot in the Oregon primary, May 28.

In 1964, the governor won over Barry Goldwater in the Oregon primary.

Nixon's figures in the New Hampshire primary were impressive. Among them: He got 79 per cent of the vote, a total of \$4,000, exceeding the forecast.

The write-in campaign for New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller obtained 11 per cent of the vote. The 11,931 votes for Rockefeller were about of the campaign's target.

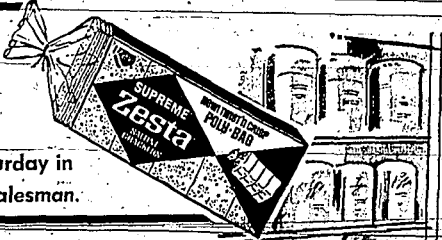

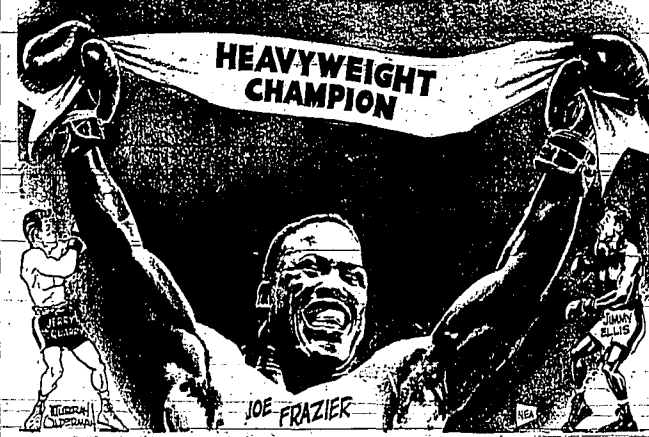
Bush said he happened to know of two former teammates at Crane High in Chicago, and felt he could help both in adjusting to CSI.

# Polish Rioting Spreads As Police Wield Clubs

WARSAW (AP) — Anti-government student demonstrations spread from the capital to eight Polish cities Wednesday with police in Poznan, the steel city, clashing with several hundred rioting demonstrators.

In Cracow, authorities were also said to have used force in dispersing a parade of some 3,000 demonstrators. In Lodz, a university student group, the "Flash" group, was active in the city.
