# Kennecott, Union Members Fail To Reach Agreement

# Ritual And Rifle Contest Slated

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—No agreement was reached between Kennecott Copper Corp. and striking union members Sunday, discouraging hopes for a settlement early this week.

Many observers expected an imminent settlement when tentative agreement was announced Friday by company and union negotiators at the White House talks in Washington, D.C.

Gov. Calvin L. Rampton said Friday, "the men will be back to work and Kennecott will be producing in the next few days."

Optimism was further increased when agreement was announced Saturday between the Joint Union Bargaining Committee and Phelps Dodge Corp.

But Salt Lake City spokesmen for United Steelworkers of America, AFL-CIO, said Sunday. Several officials and local union bargaining committees in meetings since announcement of the tentative agreement were unable to settle local issues.

A spokesman said settlement of local issues was reached only with one of the "big" unions, Kennecott's Utah Copper Division.

The company and bargainers of International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 1438 announced agreement Friday.

A Kennecott spokesman said Sunday, "It appears most of the unions are reluctant to resolve issues that still block the way to a settlement and a subsequent return to work."

Steelworkers spokesman Dave Bennett described the Utah talks as "like a mule train—there has been no movement."

Another Steelworkers official said, "some local issues are so important to the rank and file worker, especially after as long as we've been out, that we can't afford to give in now."

He said local issues definitely should have been settled before a contract ratification vote of the strikers would be taken.

The tentative agreement would cover 10,000 Kennecott workers, mostly in the mining, smelting and refining of copper operations in western states.

The proposal provides for \$1.11 an hour wage and benefit increases over 40 months. The wage increases amount to

slightly more than 54 cents an hour.

The package offered 6,000 Phelps Dodge workers in Arizona and El Paso, Tex. amounted to more than one dollar an hour. The actual wage increases varied from 41 to 78 cents.

Representatives of 30 unions told the members Sunday they had secured a "real victory" and appeared to have no doubts the contract would be ratified Monday.

One union official said: "The struggle was worthwhile. We not only benefit from the new contract, but future workers in the copper industry will benefit."

Sylvan Schnaltachter, Steelworkers representative, said in Tucson: "It marks a new period in labor relations in the nonferrous metals industry."

The unions planned simultaneous ratification to insure common contract expiration dates.

Eastern employees of Phelps Dodge would have a different contract and a different expiration date.

Some observers viewed this agreement as a major setback to the unions which held out until last week for a companywide contract with one expiration date.

Western Kennecott and Phelps Dodge operations together employ more than one-third of the 50,000 copper workers on strike since last July. The two other major producers, Anaconda Co. and American Smelting and Refining Co., reportedly still are negotiating in the White House talks.

# Humphrey Says It's Modern Medical Miracle How Democrats Heal Wounds

By The Associated Press

Medical President Hubert H. Humphrey says a "modern medical miracle" is the way Democrats heal their wounds after national conventions and latest legislative developments indicate that's what they may need in 1968.

As Humphrey spoke optimistically of his party's powers of re-

juvenation Sunday, his presidential contest, was embroiled in a political deal.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., and President Johnson aides traded charges over Kennedy's reported offer not to run for president if Johnson appointed a blue-ribbon commission to resolve Vietnam war policy.

A high administration source

called Kennedy's proposal an ultimatum and said Johnson would not accept a political deal.

Kennedy said the White House widened its credibility gap by distorting the proposal.

Kennedy said he would have "grave reservations" about supporting Johnson for re-election if Johnson gets a political deal.

"We are going to follow the same policies we are following at the moment,"

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, also an anti-Johnson candidate, rejected Kennedy's offer to aid his Wisconsin primary campaign and said Kennedy "I don't altogether approve of what he's done in the past three or four days."

McCarthy rejected Kennedy's offer of becoming Kennedy's vice presidential training mate.

"I don't think that's beyond imagination," he said.

But Humphrey announced he will personally campaign for Johnson in state primaries, said Johnson war policy.

McCarthy would support nominate Johnson for reelection and predicted both Kennedy and McCarthy would support Johnson President.

"My, how wounds do heal right after conventions," Humphrey said.

The vice president appeared on ABC's "Issues and Answers," Kennedy on NBC's "The Hunt for the Next" and McCarthy on CBS' "Face the Nation."

Kennedy was asked what he would do about the Vietnam war and he replied: "I would begin a de-escalation of the effort."

A congressional poll meanwhile, showed McCarthy favored over Johnson in Wisconsin where the nation's second primary comes April 2.

McCarthy got 43.6 per cent and Johnson 34.7 per cent of the sampling by Rep. Robert W. Kastenmeier, D-Wis., in his district dominated by Madison, the state capital. The poll was taken before Kennedy announced his candidacy Saturday and he got a 6 per cent write-in.

On the Republican side, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller promised his "most earnest and careful consideration" whether to declare himself an active presidential candidate next week and enter Oregon's May 28 primary.

The promise came after a Sunday meeting with Oregon backers in his New York City apartment—Rep. John Dellenback, co-chairman of the Oregon Draft Rockefeller Committee, said the governor gave no hint what his decision will be.

Dellenback also said California Gov. Ronald Reagan may be

WASHINGTON (AP) — A steel tape barbed with razor sharp teeth may one day replace the barbed wire now used on the battlefield.

### Search, Rescue Meeting Slated

HAILEY — A combined meeting of various groups interested in the area between Sun Valley and the Lost River is "dead" as of 8 p.m. Tuesday at the National Guard Armory hall, to which representatives of all organizations and individuals interested in the work are invited.

At a recent meeting held in the Blaine County Sheriff's Office, the Blaine Fish and Game Department, which is in charge of the Sawtooth Rovers Four-wheel Drive club, the Sawtooth Band Operation, the Sawtooth Forest and the Idaho Fish and Game Dept. were represented.

The goal of the men is to organize a Search and Rescue group for the Wood-River and Stanley Basin areas. The use of Civilian Band radios is being organized in the program, with Sheriff Orville Drexler's office as the base of operations.

**JUDGING ANEMIA**  
Q. Are pale lips a sign of anemia?  
A. They can be, but the creases in the palms of the hands are probably more reliable for judging pallor than the lips or other mucous membrane areas. Unless anemia covers the skin creases across the palms, normally, they are bright pink color. The reddish-pink color is constant regardless of how pale the intervening skin appears. Although these signs of anemia may be of general interest, the diagnosis of anemia should be made by a doctor on the basis of laboratory blood studies.

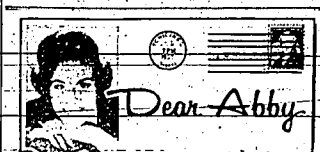

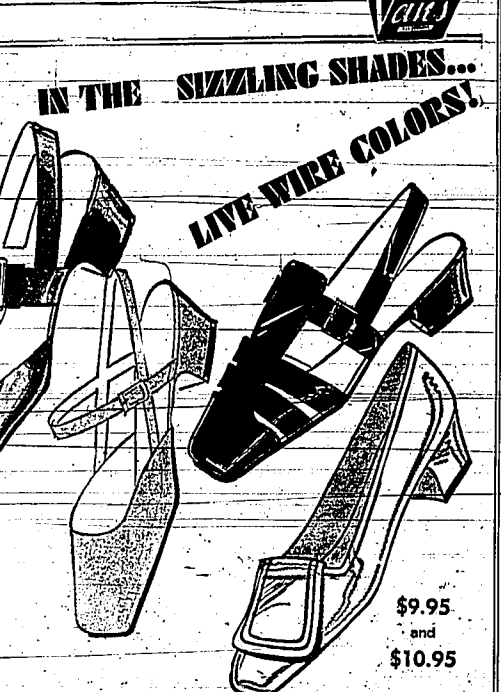

# Ethics Code To Be Hit

By JOHN CHADWICK  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Proposals for public disclosure of financial standing by senators appear certain to draw attack from both opponents and backers of a strong Senate code of ethics.

The financial disclosure recommendations by the Senate ethics committee, reported to the Senate just last Friday, come up for debate today.

On the eve of the debate, some senators were saying private disclosure of financial resources is the right approach through the laws on bribery and fraud. That's the traditional way.

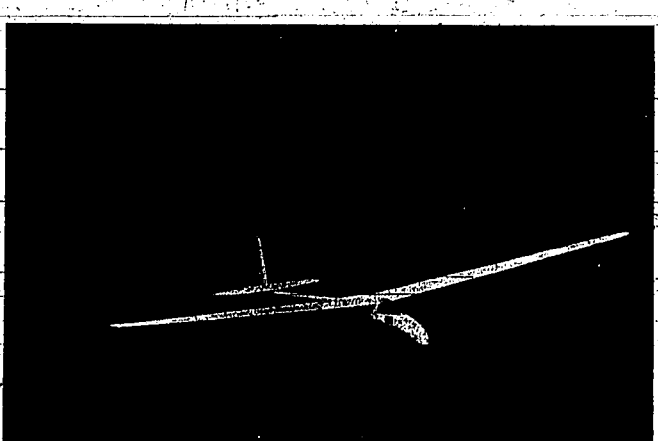
Members of the ethics committee's own members, Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., said he supports efforts to require full public disclosure of financial interests by senators and top Senate aides.

The Senate last September rejected 46 to 42 a proposal by Clark to require senators and top aides to disclose their financial interests in a public report they would have to disclose contributions and honorariums in excess of \$300 for speeches, articles, television, speeches and similar activities, received in the previous year.

A second, confidential report would include federal income tax returns and a listing of assets, liabilities, legal fees, gifts and other financial interests.

The information would be kept in sealed envelopes unless a special committee by majority vote, decided that access to it was necessary for an investigation of misconduct charges.

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen—who long has opposed mandatory financial disclosure as making "second-class citizens" of senators—look no immediate stand on the proposals.

## Reformists Predict Novotny Won't Be Removed For While

PRAGUE (AP) — Reformist sources predicted today that Antonin Novotny will not be removed as president of Czechoslovakia until after the central committee of the Communist party holds a caucus March 28.

Novotny, under fire for his Stalinist past and orthodox tendencies, has been urged by local Communist meetings throughout the country to step down before he is thrown out.

The Czech news agency CTK said Josef Spacek, a central committee member, had revealed that the committee's member-presidium split 5-4 last January on whether to oust Novotny as party chief. He apparently was replaced by a majority vote in the 110-member committee, which installed Alexander Dubcek. Spacek later was named to the presidium, giving Dubcek a majority there also.

Roman Catholic convents and monasteries closed by the Stalinist regime almost two decades ago may be reopened if the new leadership accepts a proposal disclosed by Dr. Josef Plojhar, Minister of Health and chairman of the Communist-led People's Party.

He said his party hopes that all former monks barred from pastoral functions will be free to exercise them again.

Plojhar, himself a member of the Catholic clergy, announced that the Czechoslovak Catholic peace movement has set up a commission that will seek rehabilitation for clerics jailed or otherwise wronged during the Stalinist period. He said he was

HAVANA (AP) — Cubans have enjoyed their first nonalcoholic weekend in memory since the overthrow of the former dictator.

Neither guerrilla fighting, revolts, World War II or U.S. prohibitions ever kept Cubans off from their rum, so it was a far from experience.

"I didn't know what to do with myself Saturday night," said one swinger who frequents the local cabarets.

Thousands of others lined up at the movies, went to the beach Sunday if they had gasoline which is rationed, or just wandered about.

The dry weekend resulted from an order by Prime Minister Fidel Castro closing all private and state bars and cabarets. Beer and wine with meals were the only exceptions.

The shutdown of clubs and casinos is expected to last one Saturday night just before the help in these places were reporting for work. It caught hundreds of Cubans, including government officials, by surprise as they prepared to go out on the town.

The crackdown apparently stemmed from economic rather than moral reasons. Because of the poor sugar harvest this year, the government needs all the manpower it can get and must shut out as many luxuries as possible.

# Grieving Women Who Have Lost Sons, Husbands In War Are Harassed By Mail

WASHINGTON (AP) — Grieving women who have lost husbands and sons in the Vietnam war are being subjected to a barrage of andiar diatribe sent anonymously through the post office.

The Associated Press obtained copies of this material from the widow of a soldier killed in combat. It came in the form of a letter addressed to the widow, marked "Suzanne, Calif." and bearing the return address, P.O. Box 497, Sunnyside, N.Y.

The post office box number is held in the name of J.L.L. Hummel. The same name appears at the end of an essay included in the material mailed to the widow.

Also included was a reprint of an antiwar essay printed last summer in The Christian Century, a highly respected non-denominational religious weekly published in Chicago.

On Dec. 19, 1957, The Christian Century filed an order for \$100 to prohibit the reprinting of the article.

A spokesman for the magazine said the order for reprints was signed by the publisher, Box 497, Sunnyside, N.Y.

A telephone call placed to an H. L. Hummel in Sunnyside was answered by a woman. She said her husband is 87 and could not hear well enough to carry on a direct conversation. She relayed questions to him. He answered into the telephone himself.

The man, a sheet and blanket salesman, said he had ordered the 100 reprints of the Christian Century article because he wanted to read them mailed to the widow.

"I would not say for sure if it didn't or did. I don't remember sending any of this to women who have lost a son or a husband. What if it did? I don't see anything wrong with it. There's no law against it, is there?"

"It's definite and it's not acting," he said. "I'm not acting." He said Timothy J. May, general counsel to the Post Office Department, "Short of being mailed to you, you can use first-class mail to say almost anything to anyone about public issues."

In the intervening 23 months, it has pinpointed 305 specific sources with only one successful prosecution. That involved a parolee from a federal peni-

NEW YORK (AP) — Rising prices, a tax increase, high interest and interest rates, a threat of tight credit and more inflation are among the prospects for American consumers in 1968. These are the dark clouds in the picture.

The salary index is the American consumers will continue to improve their already high standard of living, with their incomes and disposable income almost certain to exceed an estimated 3 per cent advance in living costs.

As 1968 comes into clearer focus it seems apparent that Americans may be in a mood to spend more. The most important is that in 1967, despite any tax increase, there are perhaps as many uncertainties about the future economy as there were a year ago. But the chief worry of 1967 was a recession. Now it is behind us.

Initiation is the big danger of 1968. It can be as frightening as a recession, it is less ominous threat in the public mind. Inflation, after all, is often the product of a vigorous economy.

Here are some economic highlights of the past year and a preview of several consumer areas:

**Jobs** — A low rate of unemployment. The jobless rate remained very low during 1967, under 4 per cent for most of the year, and a continuation of the same is expected in 1968. This means that most of the workers who want jobs will be able to find them.

**Wages** — Wages will be confined mainly to the unskilled, who will continue to see their jobs eliminated by the rapid implementation of new technology. Technological unemployment is a continuing problem, but there are indications that it is being tackled more effectively now.

More attention will be given to job training, especially among Negroes, whose lack of skills is pronounced and joblessness rate, as shown by urban riots, this problem is critical.

As a result, public and private programs will concentrate as never before on upgrading worker abilities and an encouraging employers to offer job training programs.

**Personal Income** — Higher again. The nation's personal income in 1967 will reach nearly \$700 billion, and a December report of earnings of that will be in wages and salaries, the rest in bookkeeping and farmer income.
