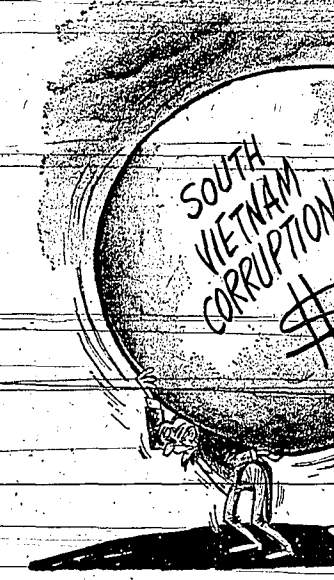

### Area Residents Are Asked To Support Fund Drive For Unwed Mothers Home

Magic Valley residents were asked today to support the Salvation Army's \$375,000 capital fund drive in April for new buildings for the Booth Memorial Home in Boise.

Twin Falls area girls have received medical care, schooling and counseling at the home for two years.

J. R. Simplot, Idaho industrialist and general chairman of the campaign, said that the funds are sought to build new residential cottages and auxiliary buildings owned by the Booth Memorial Home and adjacent to the present home.

The structure would replace the oldest wing of the present building, erected before 1900. It is used as a dormitory now.

Last year the Booth Memorial administrative staff, four nurses, a social service worker and four teachers took care of 231 unwed mothers, ages 13 to 28. Some came from Idaho communities, some from neighboring states. The latter came under reciprocal agreements made by

Booth with homes in other areas. The girls' medical care begins with their arrival and extends through the post-partum period.

Brig. Marie Anderson reported four Boise physicians are on the staff. Actual deliveries take place at Boise's two general hospitals. The girls return to Booth

able to return to their own homes. Last year, many of the girls gave up their babies for adoption.

School-age girls who enter the Booth Home early in the semester attend classes taught by four teachers, three in one municipal school district. If they complete the work, they receive credit from the district. This enables them to continue their education when they return to their own homes, the brigadier said.

"We hope they will be dropouts from school for only a few months, not for the rest of their lives," she said.

**COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP)**—Carl T. Dreyer, one of the major figures in the emergence of films as a modern art form, died today after a brief illness. He was 78.

A producer and director, he made three films which rank high among those important in the development of movies. They are "The Passion of Joan of Arc," "Gertrud," and "Day of Wrath."

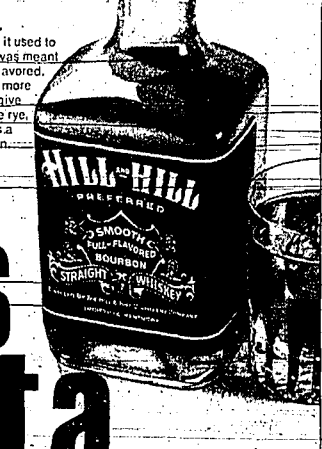

# Spring Is Damp In U.S. Areas

Cold and snowy weather marred the arrival of spring in the north and Ohio, but it was generally mild—though occasionally damp—in most other sections of the country.

Snow fell from Colorado to Minnesota and temperatures dropped in the north and the northern Rockies and the adjacent plains. Sheridan, Wyo., registered a wintry 11 above zero before dawn.

Thunderstorms rumbled through the night from southern Texas to Michigan and Ohio. Heavy rain soaked parts of Missouri and Arkansas, ranging up to 1 1/2 inches at Smith, Ark., and 1 1/4 inches at Girardville, Mo.

Rain also dampened waterlogged sections of southern England for the fourth day in a row, but amounts were light compared with the heavy rain which flooded Massachusetts and Rhode Island Monday and Tuesday.

Damage from the floods was estimated unofficially in the millions of dollars. The Weather Bureau said that while brooks and small streams were recording some rivers in eastern Massachusetts would overflow due to rise for the next few days.

Temperatures outside the midcontinent snow belt were in the 40s and 50s and clear in much of the East and South and the Far West.

# Life Was Not Endangered By 4 Bombs

WASHINGTON (AP) — A panel of American and Danish scientists has confirmed earlier conclusion that human, animal and fish life was not endangered by the shattering of four hydrogen bombs on frozen bays off Thule, Greenland.

The group of 21 scientists completed Tuesday two days of conferences to review the data taken to minimize any dangers resulting from the Jan. 21 crash of an American B-52 bomber carrying the hydrogen weapons. They said they would continue to watch the situation.

Operations are under way at the crash site to retrieve remnants of the bombs and plane, as well as to remove tons of contaminated snow.

# Backs Legislation

# Families Of American GIs Granted Swedish Asylum React In Shock Or With Approval

NEW YORK (AP) — Families of some of the eight American servicemen granted asylum in Sweden Tuesday have reacted in shock, ranging from those to qualified approval at the defectors.

The Allen Commission in Stockholm announced Tuesday that the eight have been given a 1 year "on humanitarian grounds." One of the defectors' husbands has already turned himself in to the FBI.

An Army spokesman said Erwin Joseph Foster, 26, a former sergeant, was different from the other defectors.

"I respect his opinion because he's a man 500, over 2-1/2 years ago he did it that way," the spokesman said.

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# Mysterious Poison Kills Thousands Of Utah Sheep

SKULL VALLEY, Utah (AP) — Sheep by the thousands are dying in Western Utah's semi-desert Skull Valley. Buffed federal and state scientists say death apparently is by some kind of poison affecting the animals' nervous system.

The area, which one observer described as "a sea of dead sheep," is between 20 and 30 miles from the U.S. Army's Dupuy Provig Grounds where biological and chemical warfare tests are conducted.

An Army spokesman said the installation "definitely is not responsible." Some 5,000 sheep reportedly have died since Thursday scattered around the range one day all on Hatch land and dead carcasses and sheep that by Denver interests.

Agriculture Department urged a plant poison is behind the mass deaths, but added: "With death apparently in the same area, one livestock in the same area are unaffected. Veterinarians are unable to keep them in the back gave no clue to the killer. Government nutritionists were running tests on forage.

The sheep are in an area where poisonous plants are central nervous disorder. Alden K. Barton, Utah State from the Army installation land livestock supervisor, says he knows of no other past case like this.

"We haven't been running any former state livestock committee tests out there that would cause sheep to die. The loss was estimated at \$300,000."

Tom Donnelly, Dupuy losses are peculiar "but a tough information officer, said: "Our scientists conducted tests and ruled out programs which are part of the installation's mission," he said, adding that the sheep from the Dupuy's ecological and epidemiology division was helping agricultural people look for the cause.

Dr. Jordan E. Rasmussen, Utah State veterinarian in Utah, said he too doubts Dupuy tests have anything to do with the deaths.

He neither blamed nor hinted at the sheep's death by the closing of a 19th century anti-Russian play, the party did say.

# Area Women Aid World Hospitals

Badly needed medicines, equipment and even hospital gowns are supplied to hospitals in underdeveloped countries through an annual program conducted by such groups as the South Central Idaho Medical Society Auxiliary.

Mrs. George E. Brown, president of the local auxiliary, said her organization has just completed several days of work packaging and shipping the annual collection of medicine and equipment to the Direct Relief Foundation, 5801 S. Hartman, Calif. From there the articles will be processed again and sent out to hospitals throughout the world where there is a special need for the various supplies.

Many of the persons visiting the hospitals have no other medication available except the donations of such groups as the local auxiliary.

Local auxiliary members, assisted by husbands, also collect surgical equipment, hospital gowns and even dressings that are not being used by local doctors for shipment to foreign hospitals where they can be put to use.

Mrs. Brown said this is only one of many such programs conducted annually by the local society. Another project consists of an annual contribution to the hospital ship, Hope.

While packaging and shipping is usually only once a year, the collection of items is a continuing year-around program.

# Kennedy Proposes Guarantees Giving Slum-Dwellers Chance With Housing

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. of their communities, Robert F. Kennedy, labeling President Johnson's housing visions be established for people program inadequate, proposes dislocated by new construction from slum-dwellers—the chance to help build, manage and eventually own their own housing projects.

Addressing before the senate housing subcommittee, the New Haven, Conn. senior proposed amendments to the administration housing bill to provide that at least 75 per cent of new housing be built in urban poverty areas. Johnson has called for construction of six million new units within 10 years.

Kennedy's testimony was prepared for today's hearing. Kennedy, speaking the Democratic presidential nomination, also proposed that homebuilders be required to hire at least 25 per cent of their construction crews from among residents of the areas where new housing is being built.

Other Kennedy amendments would provide that "poverty-area residents be given a voice in the rebuilding

of the nation's housing problems. But, he said, while the administration bill calls for a partnership between government and business in a large-scale housing program, "it simply does not offer business the kind of amount of practical incentives that will be needed to attract it into slum areas."

He said his proposed amendments would correct the "major defects" in the President's proposal.

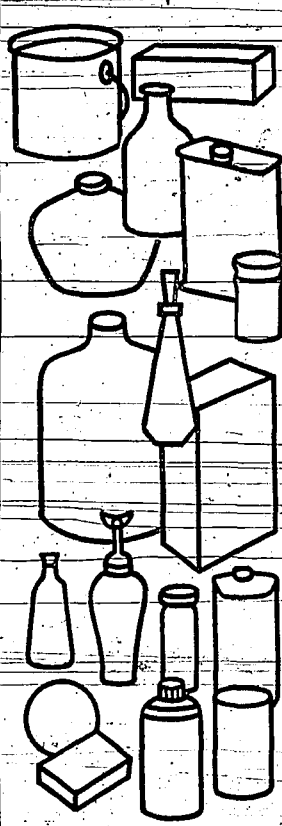

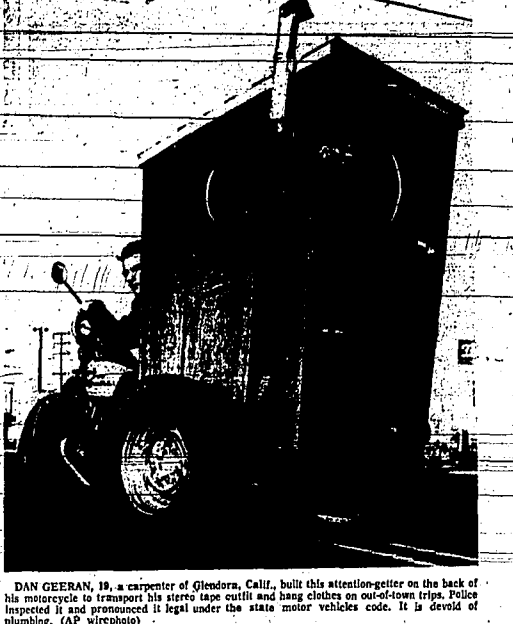

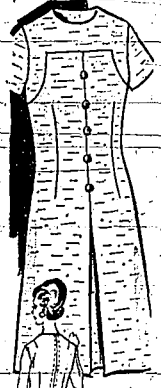

## Players Association Outlines Bargaining Points With Owners

CHICAGO (AP)—The National Football League's Players Association presented a list of demands to management Tuesday and some of them met with objection.

It was the first formal collective bargaining session in professional football history. The demands covered a 25-page agreement with amplification on these points:

A grievance and arbitration procedure. No discrimination on any basis of race, religion or national origin.

The right to negotiate individual player salaries. The right to the individual player and the individual club owner. A minimum yearly salary of \$13,000. Such a minimum on a standard contract is \$5,200, but has gone as high as \$12,000.

A pension contribution of \$5 million annually to provide increased pension benefits, increased widow benefits, and increased insurance benefits.

An NFL-American Football League All-Star game, not necessarily an extra game, with the major portion of the receipts going to the benefit funds.

A complete review of the operation of the league's business affairs.

Basic pay now is \$10 per day during the exhibition season.

No player shall be required to report to camp, or fined for failure to report, unless he has signed his contract.

Share of gate receipts and post-season playoff games. Severance pay in event a player is cut from the squad when the season is under way.

A player who is traded shall be reimbursed for his moving expenses.

It should be understood that we are not out to disrupt the normal functions of the league.

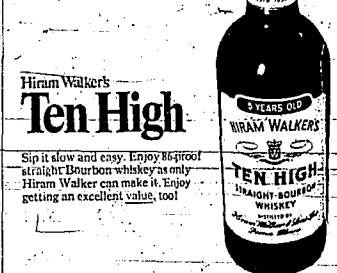
Dan Shulman of Chicago, the NFLPA's attorney, said the union's faith reaction from the league's owner representatives.

Consideration must be given to the total economic pie of the league structure. Economists would include minimum salary and the pension fund, among others, but these are things we have to work out."

## Grant Will Be Used For Five Schools In Detroit Riot Area

DETROIT (AP) — The Board of Education will use a \$6-million federal grant for five schools in an area that was the heart of the city's riot area.

School Supt. Norman Drachler said the money to be used on a junior high and a high school—some of the largest such grants ever made—Monacel said elementary school classes will be held in the same cases as few as three in pregrading and premath classes.

On the other hand, there are man-made gardens, in all of the states, that offer special attractions. Some are maintained by the public authorities. Each spring there's a tour of New York's Greenwich Village gardens, and you'd be surprised how many people, both old and young, are scented within sight of the skyscrapers. You may turn through a little front gate to find yourself in a rock garden alive with crocuses. Or perhaps a back door leads into a blaze of flowers.

On a bigger scale, there's Virginia's Historic Garden-Week. You're in a bag on participating in this. Wherever you wish to lead for the horizon, you will find the first breath of spring. Then you may find that getting into the Garden Club of the

## Government Planners Set Approach For Keeping Slum Youths Off Streets Is Applauded

By GAYLORD SHAW  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Government planners are making a major shift in the multimillion-dollar effort to keep slum youths off the streets—and out of trouble—this summer.

Instead of trying to find teenagers who want summer jobs, programs this year are aimed more at finding businessmen who will hire the youngsters.

"The problem is the supply of jobs, not the supply of kids," said Gerald M. Crasman, executive director of the President's Council on Youth Opportunities. "We've got plenty of jobs who will hire the youngsters."

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, council chairman, reported recently that last summer probably an equal number did not even bother to look because they considered the quest hopeless.

One problem, another official conceded, was that the government "rarely raised the price in full summer last year with radio commercials which after plugging the summer programs, told listeners to call for information operators. Ask for 'Summer Youth.' Call now. Don't let time slip by. You'll call may slip from your mind. It could be the most important call you make this summer."

"The kids got the idea that all they had to do to get a job was to pick up the phone," the official said. "We're going to make sure we don't have that problem this year."

The council is dropping all references to information operators in its radio commercials. In "what you need" is a spin-off. "You're young people need more than anything else, a job. If you're a business man, hire a younger worker this summer. Ask your friends to do the same."

As a way to underscore the new emphasis, President Johnson named Henry Ford II, chairman of the National Alliance of Businessmen to conduct a three-year nationwide program to locate or create jobs for 500,000 unemployed persons.

In addition, Ford's group was asked to try to place 200,000 disadvantaged youths in meaningful jobs this summer. Referring to racial tensions, Ford told government last month that "these people must be given a chance to earn a decent living for themselves... our very national unity depends on it."

Humphrey urged local officials not to consider summer programs "as an anti-riot device," but added: "It is obvious that idle young people increase the potential for local disturbances."

Humphrey's youth opportunity council was formed a year ago to coordinate federal, state, local and private programs. Eight cabinet officers are among its 10 members.

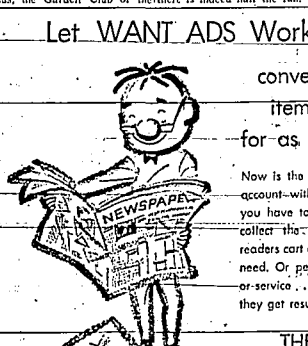

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# Edward Kennedy Challenges American Policies Toward China In New Book

By G. C. THELEN Jr.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., challenges America's containment policies toward China in his first book published Tuesday.

"If we look at what China has done — rather than what she has said, the portrait of a forceful, impatient for trouble leader, Kennedy said in 'Decisions for a Decade,' published by Doubleday & Co. Inc.

"The kind of war we are fighting in Vietnam will not gain the long range objectives we have there," he said. "The widespread destruction we are creating will only make a workable political future for that country more difficult.

Military support for certain regimes in Laos, Korea and South Vietnam "has at times harmed, rather than promoted, our national interests," Kennedy said.

"We paid and trained their ar-

...mies, and taught their police to put down demonstrations, apparently on the theory that it was more important for these governments to control the population than to serve it," he said.

To make our China policies more realistic, Kennedy said, we should "attempt a relaxation on our total trade embargo, bring China into arms limitation talks, increase cultural contacts, and work for her admission to the United Nations, and equal footing with Formosa.

"An alternative to search-and-destroy tactics in Vietnam, he suggested, is a military posture "designed to protect and hold areas of heavy population in order to maximize the safety and security of the Vietnamese people rather than to search out and destroy the enemy."

Kennedy reiterates his charges of "corruption and in-difference among the rulers of the country."

"We should do all that is necessary to help the Saigon government prepare to take over busi-

ness to suppress these movements, especially if, when these nations for the mandate, we simply secure the landlords," he said.

"It is pure foolishness to think that disorder, a natural process of change, can be something stopped in Asia. It is equally foolish to confuse all such disorder with outside aggression or political subversion."

Asian nations, Kennedy said, "should be treated as self-sufficient equals, not as wards we must preserve from danger. As for the insurgencies which may come, they stem from causes far too deeply rooted for us to attempt to suppress."

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**Inflation Hits Furniture**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — One moving day soon you might pick your living room furniture in your suitcase and carry it to your brand-new home. It looks as if inflatable plastic furniture of 20 feet, says Sujan K. Souri, president of the firm. It isn't ready for a family, he points out, but at present it can be used as a temporary shelter for construction workers or a pool house.

The idea might particularly appeal to young people who will find such furniture useful in college dorms, at during their early years of marriage.

A room at the showrooms of Mass Art, the firm that spurred the inflatable furniture movement, looks like something out of outer space—clear plastic chairs, leather effects in combinations of green and pink or lavender and purple set in metal frames, vinyl cubes and pillows in psychedelic and pop designs. It takes from five to seven minutes to blow up a chair with an ordinary vacuum cleaner.

The manufacturers claim that the furniture will last from two to ten years, if you don't stick pins or knives in it. If you do puncture a chair, there are replaceable parts at \$5.

"We have an inflatable house, a lamp, chair, settee and art, set among other furnishings. Bubble shaped windows set in the facade of the "house" illustrate the possibilities of plastic for such purposes.

An airium of the same smoked plastic provides an idea for ceiling treatment. Tiny white lights and branches of greenery peak through there.

Not all see-through furniture is inflatable. Plexiglas, lucite and other plastics are being used to bring the clean, clear look of furniture into homes.

The most popular item in this clear plastic look is perhaps the cube table. It is seen everywhere—in the homes of top designers and in the posh houses of well-to-do people, often combined with priceless furnishings.

See-through furnishings are clear cubes with round balls of light in the center, or plastic cubes with white lights within.

The store also showed a hand-colored, collage of plastic—culture, collage and wall hangings with the look of a dress and travel.

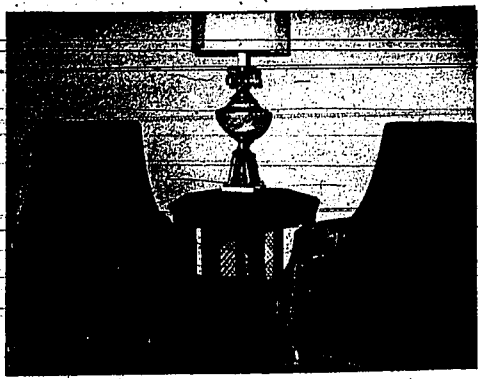

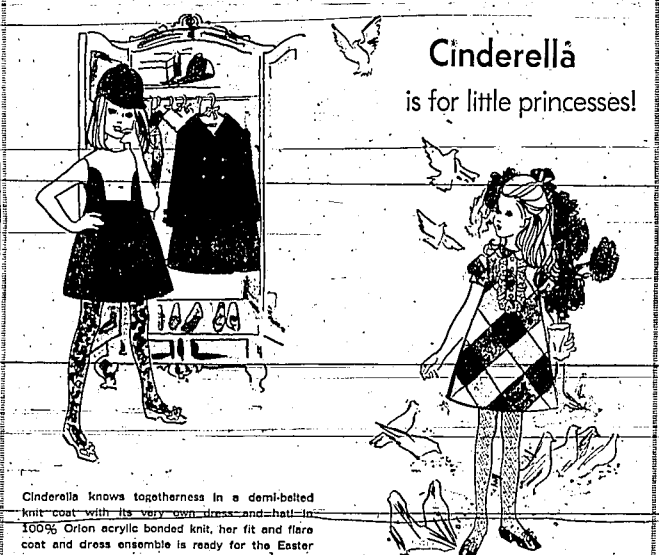

If you have pierced ears, the "ear piercing" has reached the rage stage. For about two years, it has been a fashion staple. This season, the most glorious earrings, in colored plastics, burl, silver, silver and antique gold, are made for pierced ears.

What's the starting place for this new fashion fancy? The telephone! Call your doctor and inquire about ear piercing. He may do it himself, or he may recommend a reputable jeweler for the task. Either way, the process is simple, and so painless you still be waiting for something to happen when your new earrings are already in place. It takes less than five minutes, from beginning to end.

Your doctor or the jeweler will first sterilize the skin with antiseptic. Then he'll measure and mark the hole. The holes, where the holes should go. Don't be astonished to find that your ears aren't identical—nobody else's are, either.

Once the ears are pierced, earrings must be inserted immediately to keep the skin from growing back. These earrings, whose stems will be secured before use, are called "buttons" or "posts." They should be made of real gold, at least 14 karats in quality. Other metals and cheaper gold won't work as well; by oxidizing, they can cause minor irritation of the earlobes.

Wear those first earrings for a month to six weeks. If you remove them too soon, the skin won't be accustomed to its new shape, and re-piercing the earlobes will be needlessly difficult. During that time, cleanse the lobes twice daily with hydrogen peroxide to keep them clean and healthy. And wear the earrings in a gentle half-circle each time you cleanse.

Even after the month has passed, don't leave the earrings out for any length of time. Since stem sizes vary, you may have trouble inserting some earrings. Never force them. Try using the stems through will only irritate your lobes. Instead, use a dab of "Vaseline" petroleum jelly to the stems or wires. The stems will be needlessly difficult. 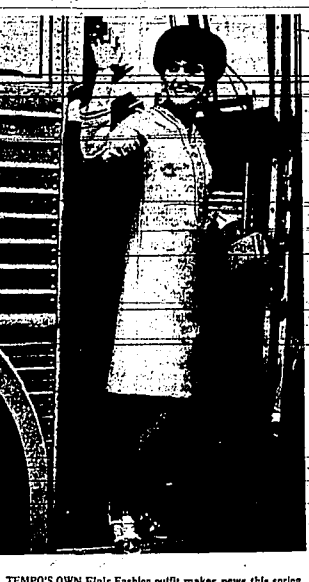

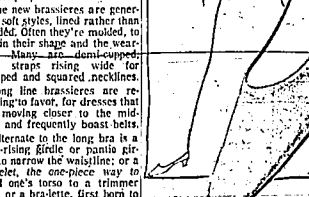

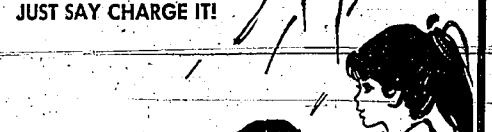

NEW YORK (AP) — Now that menswear is making all as much fashion news as women's, the traditional ladies' luncheon may change its character.

Men may be the stars of the fashion shows. After all, women are perhaps more enthusiastic about what men are wearing than men are about what women are wearing. (Watching "underfed" female models give overfed ladies complexes.)

In the mushrooming style market women need guidance in selecting the right clothes to wear during the holidays when they cannot seek advice from the recipients without spoiling the surprise of their gifts.

Their dilemma will be the basic conservative male animal really wear the new "things"? Chances are they will if the men are the public eye. That is why the men on stage, in the movies, on television, in politics and society are also the style pace-setters.

To test the males at women's luncheons theory, and more specifically to provide style guidance from the headline makers, The Associated Press recently held a men's fashion show for women's editors attending the American Press Institute luncheon at Columbia University.

The headline makers were: Actor Gig Young, currently starring in "Girl in My Soup"; Metropolitan Opera singer Tim Kravitz; CBS sports commentator Jack Whitaker; Alton Cord, co-starring with Kirk Douglas in "The Brotherhood"; Forrest Tucker currently making the film, "The Night They Drove Old Dixie Out"; comedian Red Buttons; another top funnyman, Nippy Russell; Arthur Hill, co-starring with Ingrid Bergman in "The Sandlot"; and Earl Blackwell, New York Mayor Lindsay's official greeter; and Earl Blackwell, who runs the Celebrity Register.

From the American Institute of Men's and Boy's Wear came models dressed in six important style trends: 1. As Ken O'Keefe, fashion director for the Institute explained, the looks were:

1. The Civic look of the '50s: In this instance, a tan and brown double-breasted sports suit with dark shirt, and checked tie.
2. The Shaped Look: a conservative, single-breasted, button suit with slimming waistline.
3. Colorful evening wear: Illustrated by white dinner jacket over blue shirt, black tie. (The Institute thinks turtlenecks are out of place on the evening fashion scene.)
4. Bulky sweater: plaid pants for at home, where the spokesman for the menswear industry thinks turtlenecks are out of place.
5. Jump suit for the jet age, this one in blue corduroy, also for leisurewear.
6. Rugged individual in skins and furs, this time in thigh-length green suede jacket, turtleneck, suede slacks, plain pants, and suede shoes.

More colorful clothes—particularly shirts—got a unanimous vote. Opinion was divided on the jump suit. Tucker did not think it did much for the figure, but while the spokesman gave it a vote for comfort.

Turtleneck for sports or evening? Or at all?

"Always wear a turtleneck if you can escape wearing a tie," advised Cord who was wearing a black one.

Age is the deciding factor in the opinion of Tucker. "If put on a turtleneck the problem they face is," he said, "putting it at the skin under his neck."

Other questions the team of celebrated experts thrashed out:

Who are the style leaders today, American or European?

"It works both ways, definitely," said Kraus who lives in Hamburg and likes the new colors of American shirts.

### Father-Son Relationship Necessary For Juveniles

(AP) — When a boy loses his father, should he analyze the problem, they through death, divorce or desertion—his chances of becoming a juvenile delinquent are higher.

And the boy with an intellectual father—one who is physically, but has turned his back on his responsibilities, is in even greater danger, according to several Florida experts.

"I would guess more than 50 per cent of boys who come to the attention of the juvenile court are fatherless," says Juvenile Court Judge Robert Halvorsen. "There's no question about it. Fatherless boys get in more trouble than boys with fathers."

Why does a good father—affectionate and a fair disciplinarian—make such a great difference in how a boy turns out? A boy learns how to be a man from his father," says a psychologist. "He gets his conscience from his father. A mother's love is unconditional. But in our culture, traditionally, a father shows his love most when a child meets his standards. A child meets his standards on conditions of love—so the boy feels he can get away with more with mom," he said.

If a boy has an intellectual father, he's even worse off than the boy with no father," the psychologist continued. "He's learning the wrong kind of lessons. He's likely to wind up with contempt for the father who talks about standards but doesn't enforce them. The child may pay lip service to certain standards, but really does not please. Those with intellectual fathers actually want someone to draw lines for them and enforce them. They'll do things—do not do—to act and go so far overboard in the efforts they put in to please."

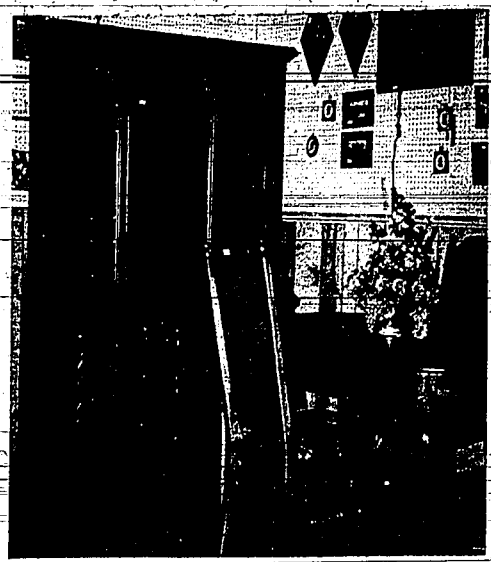
Problems arise, too, when a mother, left alone, tries to fill in masculine, as well as feminine, roles. "This sets up ambivalence in a boy toward women. It can lead to homosexuality," any the experts.

According to juvenile court counselors Cleo Griffin, Israel Heard and Robert Marshall, the crimes committed by fatherless boys, or those with disinterested fathers, are usually breaking and entering, assault, rape and molestation.

What can a mother alone do to prevent her son from getting into trouble?

"She shouldn't try to be both mom and dad, just a better mother," says Mrs. Pat Barnard, another juvenile court counselor. "She should learn to be a responsible, stronger parent herself."

Providing some sort of healthy masculine image for a boy to look up to—an uncle, teacher, football coach—is the most important thing a mother should do.
